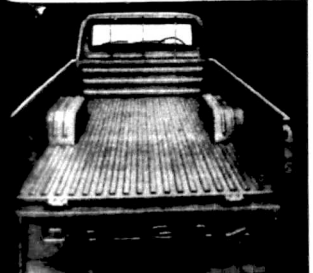

## Pop star gains £1m. in a day

Tom Jones, the Welsh pop singer who was once a builder's labourer and is now one of the world's highest paid entertainers, yesterday became a stock market share and in the process became richer than nearly 100,000.

He is part owner of a company called Management Agency and Miss, which manages many of the stars, including Elton John, Humphrey Bogart and Mary Hope.

Yesterday, Management Agency offered its shares to the public for the first time. The offer was at 13s 3d each but within a matter of minutes, said one stockbroker, were offering 14s 6d to get hold of a share.

This valued the company at nearly £4,000,000 and made Tom Jones's own stake worth more than £1,000,000 and to which he has already collected £212,197 in cash for shares he sold to float the company.

shares stake now worth about £100,000 on top of the £200,000 he has already collected in cash. Tom Jones's earnings are at present estimated at £100,000 a year.

## THEIR LOSSES

American experts in Saigon believe the Communists have launched their current offensive "on the cheap" through the use of both guerrilla and conventional military units.

The innovation was believed to have a double origin in the need to take Chinese advice in favour of a classical guerrilla struggle while keeping Soviet plans for more orthodox tactics.

Alongside its regular units, the National Liberation Front has set up a new type of commando called the "Cum". South Vietnamese intelligence believes the Cum consists of a 60-man unit divided into three.

Element One of the Cum recruits prospective military targets who are usually big game hunters. Element Two consists of sappers whose task is to penetrate the target's security perimeters. Element Three seeks to engage and kill the target's security forces and parties sent to track down the attackers.

American military experts attribute low enemy losses to the effectiveness of the Cum as a fighting body. They are also convinced the Vietcong is making increasing use of the Cum.

Investigation of an American munitions dump explosion indicated that someone - probably a Vietnamesed - triggered the device on a mortar as it was unloaded from a ship.

NLF fragments have also been sighted in South Vietnam's navigable rivers. Their main weapons or underwater sabotage are Soviet-made magnetic mines which they attach to boat bottoms or bridge pilings.

Special units engaged in these activities operate mainly around Saigon, where they force the Americans to protect their base head

quarters and facilitate the job of regular Vietcong units in penetrating defence lines without incurring crippling losses.

The Americans believe the Vietcong has committed virtually all its forces during the past two weeks of its offensive.

In this initial stage, they calculated that the Vietcong effort was designed to put the American and Saigon forces on the defensive while the NLF dug in around prime targets.

It is believed a possible second phase could feature conventional Vietcong ground attacks following the bury of enemy bodies.

As Vietcong artillery bombardments dropped sharply from some 40 on Tuesday to only 10 yesterday, many Saigon observers saw in this a sign that the Communist offensive's second stage was about to begin.

American troops killed 76 Vietcong who had attempted to ambush a large U.S. supply convoy near the Cambodian border on Tuesday.

The guerrillas unleashed a barrage of machine gun and rocket grenades from the line of trucks, but were hurled back by heavily armed personnel carriers.

The convoy, made up of about 50 trucks, was moving food and ammunition along dusty roads about 10 miles from the border and 11 miles southeast of Tay Ninh, said the scene of recent heavy fighting.

Light Americans were wounded in the fighting and one vehicle was damaged. The convoy continued on in its journey, the spokesman said.

Vietcong forces hiding in underground tunnels attacked American troops, killing six and wounding 14 of them in a five-hour battle. Fifteen of the guerrillas were killed, the spokesman said.

## Guinea assassination plot

A revolutionary court announced in Conakry yesterday that a number of people, including army officers, have been arrested and would be tried for plotting to assassinate Guinea's leaders.

The court's announcement broadcast over Radio Conakry and mentioned in Dakar, said the plot against the regime of Mr. Sekou Touré had come to light following the arrest of three soldiers from Labe - Central Guinea - in the capital.

At the present stage of the inquiry it is clearly established that this movement, which has direct links with French imperialism, is acting in complicity with African Governments, the court charged.

French mercenaries are living in certain neighbouring countries. They have under their authority African mercenaries who have received an

appropriate training, the court added.

The court said that numerous attempts at subversion in Guinea have failed, the enemies of the Guinea revolution have failed as their goal the physical liquidation of our principal leaders.

It added that officers and non-commissioned officers had been arrested. They had denounced other people who had played a part in this machination and who are and will be the object of proceedings before the revolutionary court.

The radio announced that meetings would be held at all levels tomorrow to discuss the plot. It added that each of the country's national federations and sectors should immediately set up revolutionary committees, charged with watching over the interests of the revolution.

The radio also said that the number of 200,000, except that they included officers and non-commissioned officers, those who had played a role in the February 22 incident, were taken into custody. They had been held. These were flown from Libreville to Conakry.

On the way, the arrested pushed their escort out of plane in mid-air and tried to divert the aircraft to neighbouring Mali.

The radio announced that meetings would be held at all levels tomorrow to discuss the plot. It added that each of the country's national federations and sectors should immediately set up revolutionary committees, charged with watching over the defence of the revolution.

**AGREEMENT ON SINGLE UNION**

**AT THE LAW**

This feature is intended to help the new African businessman with explanations and advice. Their queries are invited and can be answered privately or through publication. This service is entirely free of charge. The service is conducted in conjunction with the Management Training and Advisory Centre in Nairobi. This article, the first in the series, is by Mrs. Margaret Roger, B.A., LL.B., of the Faculty of Law, University College, Nairobi.

The modern businessman, whether his business is a one-man concern, whether he is a member of a partnership or operating a small private company, or managing a firm of some huge international concern, finds himself increasingly restricted by the rules and regulations which form the Commercial Law.

Before he can trade in the name of those forms of business, the name of the concern must be registered with the Registrar of Business Names Act. If he is trading under a name other than his natural name. For example, the individual trader, John Kimani, trading as Wanjani Green-grocers, must register the name Wanjani Green-grocers at the office of the Registrar-General, otherwise trading contracts which he enters into in the course of that business, may not be enforced by the courts. The same Act applies to sole traders, partners and to certain companies.

If the businessman is conducting a defined business within the Trade Licensing Act, 1967, he is required to hold a trading licence. It is important to note that the Trade Licensing Act applies to both citizens and non-citizens. The purpose of the Act, business includes wholesale or retail trading, manufacturing or distribution, advertising, beauty, picture showing, motor-vehicle repairing, cinematograph film exhibiting, advertising, commissioning or indenting agent, manufacturer's representative, produce dealer or produce broker, business broker or management consultant, or insurance broker and estate agent.

The main distinction between citizens and non-citizens is in regard to the granting of licences to trade in what are described in specified areas of sub-divided "general business area". Licences to trade in "specified goods" for example, maize, maize-mel, sugar, phosphate, rice, fresh vegetables, sheep, cattle, kangas, skins and kerosene, would normally be granted to citizens, but may be granted to trade outside the general business area. A citizen company or individual, as a company more than half the capital of which is held by persons who are citizens of Kenya.

It will probably be necessary for the businessman to employ staff who are not citizens of Kenya. He then finds himself confronted with legal problems. He must deduct PAYE and pay his employees from that PAYE card which he, as employer, must purchase from the Commissioner of Inland Revenue. As the case may be, these rules are laid down in the Security of Income Act, 1968.

Similarly, under the National Social Security Fund Act, 1968, it is compulsory that an employer must deduct contributions from his employees.

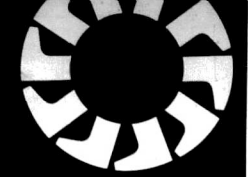

The development of the footwear industry in East Africa has been due largely to the enterprise of the East Africa Bata Shoe Company, which this month celebrates its thirtieth anniversary as footwear manufacturers in Kenya. This supplement endeavours to record the achievements of the East Africa Bata Shoe Company and to show what the industry means to the people of Kenya today.

## THE BATA COMPANY

### Three years of growth



Three years ago, when the East African Bata Shoe Company first started the local manufacture of footwear in a small, corrugated iron structure off Makupa Road in Mombasa, the shoe wearing habit was not exactly prevailing in East Africa.

In fact, when the company set up in Kenya as a footwear importer in 1935, East Africa was considered to be one of the most undeveloped markets for footwear and clothing.

In those days the combined importation amounted to one million pairs of shoes a year and only one in fifteen people could hope to possess any sort of footwear.

The large-scale wearing of shoes in East Africa and the gradual elimination of bush-worm shoes in Kenya began to make shoes in Kenya. Demand soon outstripped the capacity of the Mombasa factory and in 1940 the company erected its first local factory and set production on a firm basis.

Immediate steps were taken at Limuru to train local people in the production of mechanical footwear and some that day training within industry has remained one of the most important aspects of the company's activities.

A special Technical Training School was started in 1955 providing a comprehensive three-year course for young men wanting to make a career in the footwear industry.

Local advancement has been a steady process since 1940 and is now employed 700 local craftsmen.

The factory complex at Limuru, which comprises all the manufacturing facilities, from locally produced holes and soles, until the production of leather shoes and sandals, canvas and rubber shoes, gumboots and cloth shoes.

The first production unit for the manufacture of style shoes and rubber shoes was established at Limuru in 1948. Modern machinery and production methods at the factory complex, furnished with those used in the most up-to-date footwear factories in Europe and North America.

Large quantities of local raw materials are utilized by the Limuru factory in its manufacturing process. Apart from wattle, wattle, willow, sole, and rubber, some 10,000 hides and skins are processed annually by the tannery.

Increasing quantities of locally manufactured textiles are also being used in all Bata's making.

Since 1948, the local production of shoes has grown from 100,000 pairs in 1948 to over 1,000,000 pairs in 1967. The bulk of the company's production is distributed throughout Kenya, while the rest is sold to other parts of the East African continent.

Bata was one of the first companies in Kenya whose retail sales were organized by the African merchants and staff. From this successful training their management.

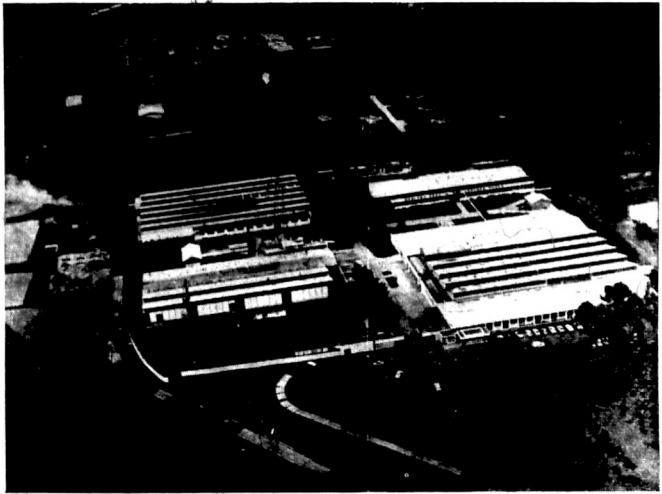

Bata, Canadian head of the Organization, has summed up the Bata philosophy: "The Bata Organization has always been guided by the conviction that our industry should establish itself as part of the community, making its contribution to raising the standard of living and the well-being of the country in which it is located. Moreover, these new enterprises should provide progressive opportunities for the development of local personnel."  
"It is largely in this sense of mission that the secret of achievement lies."



## Training the men for the job

The Bata Shoe Organization's factories it is a great pride in training local people in all aspects of modern shoemaking. The Bata standards, which are provided for Kenyan people, have been part of the program for over 25 years in East Africa. The company has been one of the most important aspects of Bata's training schemes in its Technical School, founded in 1955. The school provides practical and theoretical training for young men who wish to make a career in the footwear manufacturing industry and finally prepares them for managerial positions.

The course, which is a revision of the course followed in the City of London and Guildhall in shoe manufacture. Subjects studied include rubber and leather technology, shoe design, engineering and chemistry. Students receive practical and theoretical training, as well as studying the English language and mathematics. About a third year students also attend classes at the Kenya Polytechnic.

The school can accommodate 45 pupils, who must have at least a preliminary education, certificate with good passes in arithmetic and English language.

Students receive a company stipend to cover the cost of their training and living through out the course. This includes meals, board, medical facilities and pocket money.

Pupils at the Technical School must take their studies seriously and those who fail their annual examinations are not allowed to continue their training.

A great many graduates who have shown exceptional ability have benefited from further advanced courses arranged by the world Bata Organization in co-operation with technical colleges in overseas countries; most of them now hold important managerial positions.

The phenomena of medieval times were much occupied in trying to force metal into gold in a far more haphazard way. Bata is turning untrained men into top management executives. Unlike the alchemists, Bata is meeting with considerable success.

Selection for this high quality management training in stringent examinations must have first class Cambridge School Certificate passes, or the equivalent, between the ages of 17 and 22 and must show a high potential and pass a series of tests.

During the 18-month course they receive a salary and are accommodated in furnished accommodation with the Bata sales organization.

They are actually put to work, under supervision, in the various departments, like dealer and purchasing, export and import, where they are expected to perform a sound working know-

ledge of the functions of the departments.

In addition, they are given at least two main tasks to work on, involving the complete planning strategy and tactics for the project.

Features of the course are three monthly assessments of each individual's progress, and frequent informal orientation sessions with management. If the successful completion of their training the men are appointed to managerial posts within the company and led already well on their way in the job.

Organized sales training courses were started at Limuru in 1946. These courses, which cover both basic and advanced sales training, are held several times each year.

They not only ensure that Bata sales staff give a high standard of service to customers, they also provide opportunities for promoting young men to graduate to responsible posts within the company's sales organization.

During the past 12 years nearly 500 Bata employees have been through these courses.

Those who show a special aptitude for the art of salesmanship are given an advanced course overseas. Almost invariably, employees who benefit from these courses return rapidly on their return to Kenya and many of them are now holding top management and supervisory posts with the Bata sales organization.

With the continuing development of the footwear industry in Kenya, there will be even greater opportunities in the future for many more young Kenyans who make their careers with the Bata Shoe Company.

# SHOES IN THE MAKING



## 1—Product development

The creation of a shoe requires a combination of artistic skill, a knowledge of chemistry, a profound understanding of the use of materials and the manufacturing processes involved, and the ability to sense the tastes of particular markets.

It is a highly skilled process and many factors must be considered before a design is put into production.

The product development department at Limuru comprises a team of 12 men, who produce designs for men's, women's and children's shoes ranging from economy-priced shoes to safari boots and shoes for the sophisticated markets of Europe and North America. Extensive market research is carried out before a design is put into mass production to ascertain whether the shoe is marketable.

Many of the shoes designed at Limuru are fashioned from local leather, but increasing use is being made of synthetic materials, like the vibox produced by the new vibox plant at Limuru.



## 2—The tannery

The Limuru tannery, which was set up at the same time as the shoe production unit in 1940, has undergone intensive modernization in recent years and is now one of the most well-equipped tanneries on the

whole of the African continent, comparing favourably with the best in Europe and North America.

The tannery occupies an area of over 31,000 square feet and is served by its own railway siding. Special evaporation ponds have

been contrived to save the tannery from pollution. Some of the skins are processed in Kenya, but the bulk of the tanning is done in the factory, which produces a large percentage of the leather used in the shoes of men, women and children.

## 3—The leather factory

The leather shoe factory with its 100 skilled operators and highly mechanized equipment produces more than 80 different designs each year, including boots for the Kenya Army and Police Force.

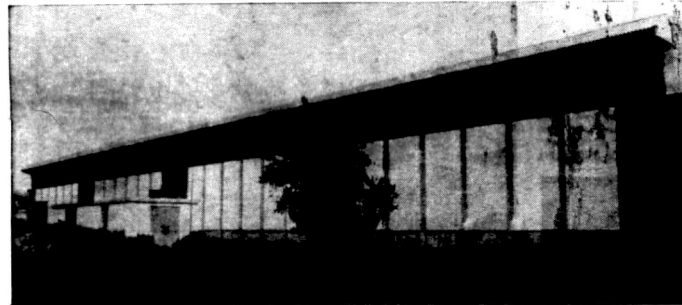
Specially designed safety boots and shoes are also produced, according to specifications laid down by the Cambian mining authorities who place regular orders with Limuru.

An average leather shoe takes about 2½ hours to complete from the time the various components are cut to the moment when the finished shoe is ready to be dispatched.

During this period the different parts of the shoe upper have been sewn together, it has been assembled on a conveyor belt and passed through complicated machines which perform intricate operations such as lasting, heel setting, sole laying and pressing.

## 5—The Vibox factory

The latest addition to Bata's production facilities at Limuru, the vibox factory is the only plant of its kind in the whole of East and Central Africa.

Vibox, which is a sophisticated

and highly developed form of man-made shoe material, is used extensively in present-day footwear manufacture, particularly for women's and children's shoes.

It can be produced in many different colours, finishes and thicknesses, washes easily, is very hard-wearing and keeps its appearance for a long time.

Prior to the establishment of this new plant at Limuru, all such material had to be imported from overseas. Now local production is saving valuable foreign exchange as well as providing cheaper shoes for Bata customers.

## 6—Quality control

All the materials used in the manufacture of a Bata shoe are subjected to stringent laboratory tests before the shoe goes into production. At every stage of production, skilled supervisors examine it for defects in material or workmanship and help it is packed every shoe produced in the factory is scrutinized again by an expert quality checker.

As a final quality check, finished shoes are taken at random and tested for destruction in the laboratory.

Tearing shoes and the materials from which they are made is an essential part of the Bata production processes at Limuru.

## 4—The rubber factory

Here over 100 workers are employed in the rubber factory, as well as in the leather and shoe-making departments.

The most important material used in the production of the finished product is the rubber, which is supplied to the factory from the Kenya and Uganda plantations. It is then processed in the factory, which produces a large percentage of the rubber used in the shoes of men, women and children.

## Welfare and social life of a Bataman

The peaceful sea gardens and rolling pastures of Limuru provide a sharp contrast with the bustle and activity of the Bata factory. Here, on 151 acres of land belonging to the company, most of the factory's 1,250 employees live, work and play.

They live well on good wages in modern houses and flats, built by the company and some 100 children attend the Bata kindergarten.

Employees have their own mini-supermarket, which stocks provisions and a wide range of household articles, and the Limuru shopping centre is less than half a mile from the factory.

At the Bata clinic, which is staffed by fully trained personnel, employees and their families receive free treatment for all illnesses and injuries of an outpatient nature.

Working conditions at the factory are among the most modern in East and Central Africa and wages and employee fringe benefits are of a very high order. Industrial relations are stable and labour relations between the company and the union are good.

Regular cinema shows and dances are held in the spacious social hall, which has its own stage, where employees put on their own dramatic and variety shows. There are also facilities for table tennis and Bata families gather in the hall to watch television each evening.

The playing field alongside the factory includes a full-size football pitch and one of the few private athletics tracks in Kenya that is up to international standards. Bata has two football teams, which play regular fixtures.

## AN EXPANDING EXPORT MARKET

Last year exports of Kenyan-made Bata shoes to 20 African countries reached an all-time high of 1,000,000 pairs.

The 1968 record figures, for Kenya, Uganda, Malawi, Zambia, and Burundi, were exceeded in 1969, when exports of 1,225,000 pairs were shipped to 22 African countries.

The year-to-date revenue earned in 1969 over the two-year period.

Exports of finished shoes in 1969 also increased considerably. Leather produced at the Limuru tannery is currently being exported

to Rwanda, Zambia, Tanzania and Uganda.

In 1968 shoes from the Limuru factory were exported to North America, Europe, Bahrain, Muscat, Singapore, Mauritius, the West Indies, Somalia, Zambia and the Seychelles.

The world-famous Bata safari boots and shoes, designed and produced at Limuru in many different sizes and colours, feature prominently in most export orders and they are becoming increasingly

popular in North America and Europe, where there is a special outlet for an African-made safari boot.

Bata boots developed at Limuru for this market include hippo hide boots, fashioned from skins made available to Bata as a result of game cropping operations in Uganda.

Zambia is the largest single export market for Kenya-made

Bata footwear. African transport facilities, particularly in Kenya, have helped to expand these exports and Bata continues to invest further in the region. In 1969, this further valuable contribution to Kenya's economy.

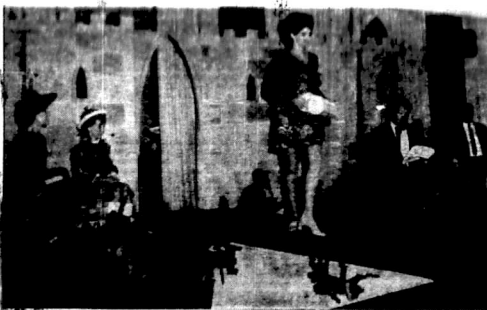

# Survey on employment in East Africa position

## State control of labour

Measures to ensure the maximum employment of citizens move on apace in the East African countries. Kenya has introduced its entry permit and trade licensing systems. Uganda's Immigration Bill is pointed towards Ugandaisation of the public and private sectors.

Governments are fully justified in seeking to provide jobs for their own citizens, but also for foreigners where possible and absorbing the school leavers. It should be noted, however, that after all, or nearly all, of the expatriates have departed, there will still be an annual output of youngsters from schools and universities looking for jobs in societies where promotion will be slowed down by any person to employ a non-citizen unless a non-citizen holds a valid employment permit. The Minister will have power to declare certain classes of employment to be restricted. Restrictions on the employment of foreigners will not apply to those engaged in non-profit-making organisations set up for religious or charitable purposes, or who are exempted from such restrictions by the Minister. Foreigners who are already employed will remain exempt until their current terms expire.

A survey on the Asian community in East Africa in the light of recent or pending legislation will be presented to the British Government in the next few days.

It was undertaken by Mr Martin Ennals, secretary-general of Amnesty International, on behalf of the London-based all-party U.K. Citizenship Committee. Its own secretary, Mr Prof. Patel, was declared a prohibited immigrant by the Kenya Government when he arrived in Nairobi about five months ago.

Mr Ennals updated the statistics in his first (1968) report on the future of the Asian community produced by the committee at the time of the Commonwealth Conference.

The second report will deal less with numbers than with the present Asian non-citizens holding valid trade licensing laws in Kenya and Zambia and the difficulties they are expected to face in Uganda, and to a lesser degree in Tanzania, where the issue has some extent been resolved.

The report will deal particularly with the question of frozen assets, the role of the British High Commission, as well as with passport-holders, as well as with the human problems involved, including those concerned with the young.

Mr John Hunt, the young Tory M.P. who is chairman of the U.K. citizenship committee, has no objection whatsoever of making political capital out of the report. It may, however, be made public for a further round of Ministerial interviews.

## sympathy over China 'PREVENTIVE ACTION' POSSIBLE

The Soviet Union's apparent attempt to gain Western sympathy for its case in the current Sino-Soviet dispute could herald Russian "preventive action" of some kind against China, Western observers speculated in Paris yesterday.

The U.S.S.R.'s sudden change of tack this week in making friendly overtures to France and West Germany through its ambassadors in Paris and Bonn caused some surprise in western capitals. Russia's Ambassador to Bonn, Mr. S. Ivanov, called on Chancellor Kiesinger in Bonn and, in Paris, Mr. Valerian Zorin, on the French Foreign Ministry. Both envoys gave the official Soviet version of the border incident of March 2 when Soviet border guards shot at Chinese on the Ussuri River.

It was a marked break with the Kremlin's customary practice of keeping the West out of its quarrels with China.

Hitherto, the only occasions on which the subject had arisen in talks between Soviet and Western leaders was in confidential or off-the-record exchanges.

This week's approach were neither formal nor calculated leaks. The Soviet Union has formally called on the Soviets to bear witness against "Chinese aggressiveness" involving that the yellow peril.

word article which claimed that the clash had been launched by China's leaders in an attempt to smooth over internal "contradictions" in China and to cement the nation in time for the ninth party congress.

The Communist paper *Pravda* reported that the unit involved in the March 2 clash had fought Chinese troops in the same area on January 23 when they used rifle and sub-machine gun bursts to beat back 25 Chinese soldiers who tried to cross the frontier carrying the little red book. Chairman Mao's quotations.

Mongolia's Foreign Minister has made a "vigorous protest" to China over the "illegal detention" by the Chinese authorities of a dispatch from the Mongolian railways. Tass news agency reported in a dispatch from Ulan Bator.

Known as soapstone in English, eggware in Kisii and *luta* in Luo, is Kenya's hidden treasure which for years remained unexploited in spite of its known value.

There are plentiful deposits of soapstone on hillsides in the Mt. Longo location in the Southern Division of Kisii District. Four major quarries have been opened for the use of the stone.

When a Kisi or Luo begins to work soapstone, he first selects the best quality material and then uses a hand-operated machine to cut the stone into slabs of the required size.

Since 1950 goods made from soapstone have appeared on displays at shows in various parts of Kenya. The carvers gained confidence and expanded sales to Uganda and Tanzania. Recently they found an even larger market in their own country.

One of the carvers, Mr. M. O. Ombao, said that the carvers have been able to sell their wares in Nairobi. There are a number of carvers' co-operatives and the carvers are now being trained in the use of modern tools.

**The old invincible**

150 years ago Chief Njoro must be one of the oldest people in Africa. Beyond doubt he is a centenarian and it is thought that he is about 107.

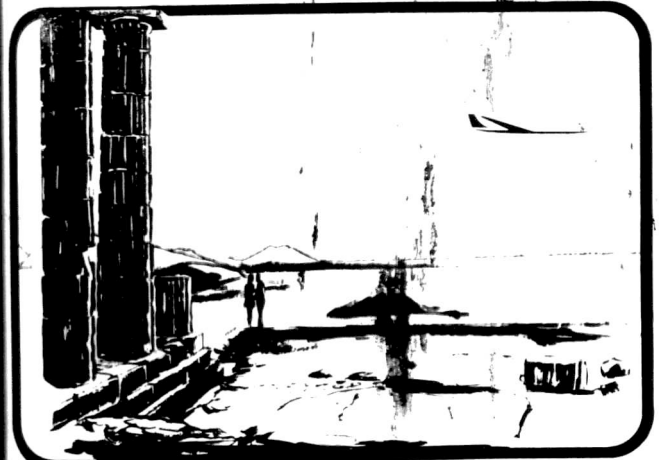

How Starehe meets the financial challenge

Nairobi's Starehe Boys' Centre this year marks its 10th anniversary and to cap the occasion the centre's magazine has been issued in an enlarged edition.

The magazine, appropriately named "Endeavour" carries an interview with the director, Mr. G. W. Griffin, who highlights some of the centre's past and present problems.

On the staffing position there is grave concern over the shortage of trained or graduate teachers for the secondary and technical divisions.

To handle 500 boys at the level of the centre has led to Government-paid teachers. The figure may rise to nine. The Ministry of Education is doing its best but it may well be years before it can provide full assistance.

Speaking about the future Mr. Griffin said he was confident the first output of these boys was taking place and they were being fine young men—mature, reliable and full of go.

In a letter Mr. Griffin thanks the East African Standard for its help in gaining support for the centre. It was a mighty factor.

The magazine also contains a number of contributions by students who gave their impressions.

A form these boys says: "When I was taken from the classroom I found the teacher was a European who had a small nose, such as I had never heard before. "If we are to keep our doors open and if we are to expand to take in yet more disadvantaged boys to the target figure of 1,000, we need many more donors," says Mr. Griffin.

On the staffing position there is grave concern over the shortage of trained or graduate teachers for the secondary and technical divisions.

To handle 500 boys at the level of the centre has led to Government-paid teachers. The figure may rise to nine. The Ministry of Education is doing its best but it may well be years before it can provide full assistance.

Speaking about the future Mr. Griffin said he was confident the first output of these boys was taking place and they were being fine young men—mature, reliable and full of go.

In a letter Mr. Griffin thanks the East African Standard for its help in gaining support for the centre. It was a mighty factor.

The magazine also contains a number of contributions by students who gave their impressions.

A form these boys says: "When I was taken from the classroom I found the teacher was a European who had a small nose, such as I had never heard before. I was seated with several other boys and the peculiar pronunciation she gave my name she showed me my desk and when I looked around I noticed the other boys had only a few desks. I was a bit confused. Instead of the great pile I had heard would give me, in my great surprise, I found a desk and there was a chair. I thought this was a clever idea."

Drink test saved 1,000 lives

Recently there have been several prosecutions against motorists who have been charged with driving while under the influence of drink. Despite deterrent sentences there does not appear to be any decrease in his type of offence.

The problem of drunken drivers has been reduced in Britain by the introduction of the breathalyzer test in October 1967. The full effect is not yet known but the test is presented in a recent analysis produced by the Ministry of Transport.

In the first ten months 1975 fewer people were killed and the decrease in the number of people who were seriously injured in road accidents totalled 10,222 compared with the corresponding period in the previous year.

The success of the breathalyzer test in cutting down the number of deaths and serious injuries came by accident on British roads is illustrated by statistics which show an average number of people killed or seriously injured in road accidents in 1974 compared with the corresponding figures for the previous year.

During the period October 1966 to October 1967, the average was 52 on Friday nights and 68 on Saturdays. From the introduction of the current rules in October 1967 to March 1968 these figures have declined drastically and the comparable total for Friday nights was 25 with 31 on Saturdays.

In simple terms, the regulations in force in Britain today allow the police to carry out a roadside test whenever the circumstances justify this action. If a driver is caught speeding or driving against a red traffic light the police would be justified in suspecting the offending motorist of the test.

After an accident, the test may be applied to the drivers involved and a motorist suspected of drinking is taken to a police station for more thorough tests which include the measurement of the individual's blood alcohol content. This is an alcohol content of more than 80 milligrams per 100 milligrams of blood is automatically disqualified from driving for one year.

The number of breathalyzer tests carried out is comparatively small in relation to the population of Britain. The main deterrent seems to be the psychological one of knowing that involvement in an accident or any traffic offence may mean the application of a breathalyzer test.

In addition to the effect of the breathalyzer test the occurrence of serious road accidents has declined by the improvement in the handling and braking characteristics of cars manufactured in the past few years. The regulations that post-1965 cars must be fitted with a rear seat belt to minimize the injury risk from accidents and the rules governing

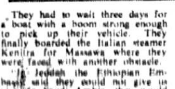

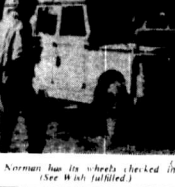

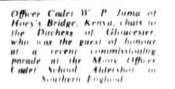

This was easily a winner. Who now must massed bands, soldiers marching by and all kinds of military activities? It was particularly impressive by the demonstration by members of the General Service Unit.

Among other things, they gave a demonstration of how they would deal with a riot. Their performance was appreciated by the thousands.

They moved about the ground at shrill cries of command and quickly returned order to the situation and their "toes" were soon being planted in the sun it was like watching a re-enactment of the Battle of Thermopylae.

Tuesday on television was the night of the Eds on at 6.45 in *Tarzan*. Tarzan the editor of Kenya's *Swahili* newspapers explained how the newspaper business in Kenya was prospering. There were film shots taken in the various offices.

The *Press Conference* that night the Editor of this newspaper was in the hot seat. This week it was announced that he had won a Silver Medal for editorial at the time of the Olympic Games. The award was made known after the judge of the competition, organized by the *Union de Periodistes de Mexico*, had come from all over the world.

It would seem that the reason for the Editor's appearance was to speak about the award and matters closely related to it, but the show wandered wide of the mark and many of the questions

were just picked out of the air without any research. One of the inquiries was asked to elaborate his questions but could not do so. Another question inferred there were some incidents about the fact that the awards were from overseas. No one questioned the fact that the Olympic medals won by Kenya's athletes were from overseas.

There is no doubt about it. If you are going to be an interrogator you must know your victim thoroughly. (Other questions must be pertinent to what is on the air and to be a case of the bitter bit).

At the Monday evening in *Mambo* (Leo Mr. Boaz Omeri of the *Daily Nation* spoke of the award of a Bronze Medal to his paper. In New York there is a race between the white and the Negroes. There are thousands of Puerto Ricans in the city and they have presented a sizeable social dilemma. They are usually poor and have to live in slum areas and the kind of life with limited horizons often breeds violence.

Sunday's episode of *The Nurses* was called *Road of Silence* and was about a White American boy who was brought into the hospital after he had been hit by an attack on him by a Puerto Rican boy who was later arrested at the hospital as a Puerto Rican girl who passed for White. (The attacked girl was before the judge. He tells her that he was really the attacker. He received 180 days when the Puerto Rican (John Peter) boy fought back.

This was her quarry. Would the police believe her if she told them? Would they believe that she was just trying to save another Puerto Rican?

There was a great deal of heart searching about the stupidity of race antagonism. The message was two-fold. Always do the right thing in a moral problem and things aren't always what they seem.

In the same way as Hollywood often uses Italians and Irishmen to play Red Indians, the Puerto Rican movie was played by Susan Roman which I imagine is Jewish. I had an interesting talk this week with a visitor from Moscow who told me about television in the Soviet Union.

In Moscow there is the tallest structure in the world as television towers more than 500 metres tall. From it radiate four channels, one as new production come along every early afternoon and go on to about 11 or 11.30 p.m. but nearly every channel operates in the morning with entertainment shows for people who have to work at night.

There are more than 20,000,000 sets in use throughout the land. There is no advertising as we know it. As new products come along they are mentioned several times, but they are dropped, not to be mentioned again. Of course, in this kind of advertising, no money changes hands as everything is State-controlled.

There are quiz programmes but they do not have the fabulous

prizes that can be won in Britain and America. For instance, you cannot win a trip around the world on Russia. To do this you must be the quizzer as team affairs between various educational institutions.

Are there any detective series? Yes, there are, but they are made by the U.S.S.R. They are mostly Czechoslovakian in Poland which serves other Eastern countries besides Russia.

One very popular programme in Russia is a Saturday night show entitled *I See You Live in Nations*. It is a show where well-known personalities, writers, artists, actors, singers, comedians, are gathered in a studio restaurant and are interviewed in an informal manner.

Quite a number of English and American films are seen on Soviet television but they have one thing in common. They are never about space.

Both beautiful and intelligent — that is how Robin White describes the actress who is the star of *Breaking from Experience* to be broadcast on the B.B.C. African Service on Monday. For she is the current Miss Kenya and holder of three degrees from universities in the United States.

Inspector Monkobu discusses now she sets about entering the Kenya Police Force. He is a husband and what she hopes to do back in Kenya when the time for her family life is completed. She is a former Miss Kenya and the United States her childhood as a farmer's daughter in Iowa and school in a missionary school in Uganda.

The age of elegance is far behind us, and there is little left to remind us of it in this latter half of the twentieth century.

Going the rich grandeur of yesterday's houses gone, the magnificent banquets where champagne glasses were raised to the toast, reflecting the light from sparkling crystal chandeliers, and beautifully dressed women packed through a wealth of food and apparel at the delicate and expensive wines.

The race then was slow but steady. Although we may recall with pride the waltz of lives our mothers and grandmothers were used to, today's had in a mere shadow of what it was.

For most people it is just not practical to try to keep family tradition alive, but there are small groups of people who successfully manage among themselves to bring back a little elegance, not through snobbery, which it could be mistaken for, but for the sake of their own pleasure.

Such a group in East Africa is the Wine and Food Society which is affiliated to the International Wine and Food Society which has branches all over the world.

It was no simple matter to get the approval of the committee to write this story for the society has never invited publicity. Unlike any other society this one thrives best when its membership is kept small and select so anyone who reads this article and wishes to become a member may have to content to wait until some of the present members leave.

The Wine and Food Society was started in Britain by its president,

Mr. Andre J. Simon, a Frenchman in 1913, as a retirement hobby after selling champagne in London for 15 years.

It was a challenge to start a society devoted to gastronomy after the Bank of England had just wiped out and every one was very downhearted. It did not seem criticism.

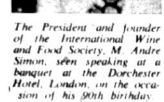
However, Simon's dedication in a few years had built up a solid nucleus of 100 members and guests. It was held at the Café Royal where a five-course lunch was served accompanied by long white Abaco wines. Reading 1929 and a Grande Reserve Champagne all for the price of one bottle.

At the annual meeting the following month 184 people sat down to a fine Bavarian dinner at the Savoy, which they find very good.

It is doubtful whether members could do quite so well today, but as a fair number of members represent the wine or food trade the functions organized are usually extremely reasonable.

Recently the society celebrated the 50th birthday of the president, Mr. Simon, with a banquet at the Dorchester Hotel in London and presents for the occasion were members from several overseas branches, including Mrs. Rebe Freeman Thomas, representing the East African branch and her husband Robert.

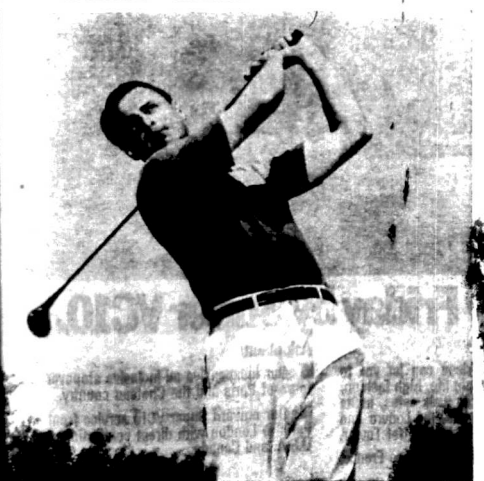

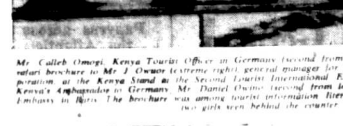

# Ordered to pay salary arrears

On the question of arrears with effect from 1967, Mr. Coker said that the court had ordered that when his financial position made this possible, the arrears should be paid in instalments. This offer is being accepted, unconditionally, in full by the union.

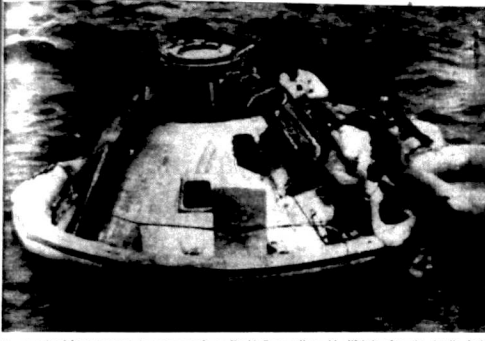
