



Government plan for three-year trade licences

Kenya's Trade Licensing Act is being reviewed so established companies will be granted licences up to three years.

The bill was disclosed by the Minister of Commerce and Mr. Kibaki when he spoke to the House in the Kenya Club in Nairobi yesterday.

He promised that the Government was looking into the Act, which was charged to the Licensing Act to help small businesses.

There are a lot of things being done at the moment about the licensing Act, but people have a lot of light of the fact that the Government is fully aware of the fact that the stability in the country was only underpinned by giving the majority of the people a stake in the economy.

"One does not need to be a Marxist to realise that a change is needed. Unlike the former White Highlands, the change in the commercial sector has been slow. There was no-one prepared to undertake it."

To remedy the shortcomings which have come from the Act, the Minister is now thinking of revising the Act so that it would be more open to ensure that established businesses (unlike the former White Highlands) should be granted licences for a longer period—two to three years without being subjected to annual renewals.

"The Government is also considering introducing amendments to the Act to ensure that businessmen applying for licences for the new year have ample time to do so. It is felt that this would enable established businessmen to have a say in the process."

Representations had been made to him to look into the present demarcation of powers and the general trading area. After consideration it had been decided to stick to the existing demarcation. It is felt that this would be reviewed if need arose.

The Minister launched a strong attack on some large companies which in an attempt to circumvent the provisions of the Act were opening up small branches at places where they claimed they had only minor shareholders. While the Government welcomed new businessmen, it was determined that such companies should be discouraged. The Minister also attacked some companies which he claimed were trying to obtain the Kenyan licence programme by suddenly recruiting local staff.

This type of attitude, he had to insist, would not be tolerated. The Government will be forced to make individual decisions on different companies, ensuring that the law is being observed.

The Government would be happy to see that companies which have not enough trained local personnel to run their businesses are trying to do so in their own way.

Troops ring Zambia's key installations

'NO CAUSE FOR ALARM'

President Kaunda announced in Lusaka yesterday that Zambian troops had been deployed to guard key installations in the country rather than the Rhodesian border, but said information he had received about alleged Rhodesian plans to bomb Zambia was very authentic indeed, despite a denial from Salisbury.

Asked about the report of increased troop movements on the Rhodesian side of the Zambezi border, Zambian Defence Minister J. M. Kapanda said: "I do not think the presence has been out of the ordinary. There is nothing to cause alarm."

But in some of our newspaper headlines we shall not take chances at all. We shall keep our soldiers there, for some time until we are reassured about the Rhodesian situation.

Zambian troops were reported to have set up camp in Zambia in strength at the bridge and near the police station patrolling the border. Troops were guarding the bridge at Victoria Falls which crosses the Zambezi river.

It was reported from Salisbury that Rhodesian troops increased the number of their watch along the Zambezi Valley for African guerrillas.

But there were no indications in the Rhodesian press that the Government has issued any special instructions to guard the reported Zambian border. Rhodesian officials, discussing the possibility of a Rhodesian attack, say in reality that the Zambian side has the presence of 100,000 of the Rhodesian army.

Rhodesian Government spokesmen yesterday said that the presence of Zambian troops on both Zambia and Lesotho had an area of up to 500 miles from Zambia was a common one, and the Rhodesian Security Forces were preparing special measures.

President Kaunda has denied that Zambia could be the target of guerrilla attacks from Rhodesia. He said that the Rhodesian Government had had a key position in the Rhodesian Government for many years and a statement to guard the Zambezi would increase the number of Zambian troops in the area.

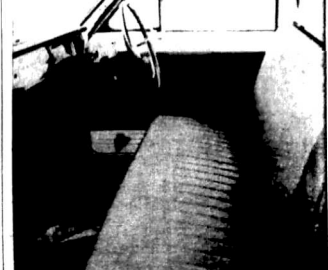

This was immediately answered by the branch secretary of the N.U.T. in his memorandum: 750 teachers terminated in December, 1968 — which was a recurrent annual feature.

Soon after the Assistant Education Officer responsible for staffing had issued up-to-date copies of enrolment and staffing lists. It was learnt that only 124 teachers had been laid off this year.

Before the officials of the commission left the meeting they were thanked by the officials of the teachers' union for having come after which the chairman of the council thanked all those present before their departure.

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In the increasing struggle to get on top of the problem for Kenya's disabled a major step will be taken on April 11 when the Mayor of Nairobi, Councilor Isaac Lagazono, officially opens the Special School for the Physically Disabled on Nile Road.

It was in the middle of last year on this joint effort on the part of the Nairobi City Council and the Association for the Physically Disabled of Kenya got under way when the £10,000 structure was opened last year and the building had its first occupants on February 1. Nearly 80 children are now attending.

Students can fail to be impressed by the air of excitement that greets the children at the school. They are smiling on every face as they pass through the school day which would have been too miserably to contemplate.

Chance to lead a fuller life

The school, which stands on a site of about three acres, has ample room which would allow the building of a hostel extension to accommodate about 100 children from up-country who at present have no chance to take advantage of such an institution.

The school is an ordinary primary school, but as the pupils are physically disabled in one way or another they receive treatment in the school's orthopaedic treatment room which has been donated by the Magyibba Foundation of Thika.

Lions Club of Nairobi. Forts desks and chairs and other furniture donated to the association by the Major Mary Trust in 1967, have been moved to the new school and the City Council has provided the roof.

Mr. Oliver Johnson a corrective therapist with the I.C.K. Place Corporation is in charge of treatment. His understudy is Mr. Moses Njaha.

Before arriving at the Nile Road school the children must have gone through the Children's Orthopaedic Clinic in Robra Road. Each child helps the other in any way he or she can and there is a great spirit of comradeship.

The clinic's staff saw life shock how much the treatment of handicapped children is intertwined with problems of education and social welfare. Some examples:

Joseph aged 7 was born with a congenital absence of both legs and was brought to the clinic in 1967 by his father. Although the parents had previously been advised that he had both legs amputated they did not agree to the drastic step until January, 1968 when he was admitted to the hospital. He stayed there for two years having eight operations including being a girl.

In December 1968 he was sent home with his legs still in plaster of Paris and his parents trapped to find a home in Nairobi where Joseph could start to go to school. He is a bright intelligent happy child and is now in Standard I at the Special School.

Yeresa 11 was brought to the clinic in 1967 by a community development officer. She was a crawler and did not know a single Kikuyu word. Her mother had been mentally an invalid. After she had been given special treatment and clothes and taught how to walk she moved to her home for the poor and needy in Eastleigh where she is given a room and her food. She

was then admitted to the school and is now in Standard II.

Bulawa, born with spinal bifida, admitted by his parents and placed with Peter Pankaj. He is paralysed from the waist downwards but is intelligent and has now been admitted to Standard II.

Kithumba, 12, was brought to the clinic in 1967 by her father. She had poliomyelitis in 1955 and was a crawler. Both knees were severely contracted and she was unable to stand. Her knees were straightened out with plaster of Paris and she now walks and almost runs in calipers and crutches. She was admitted to the Special School in 1965 and is now in Standard III.

Most of the children have at least one parent and they must live in the Nairobi area. All those who can walk to the school on calipers and crutches do so. They are picked up by the clinic's minibuses.

The association wants to give the school a different name from the cumbersome and unhelpful one it has now.

The name *Mbatia* has been suggested for which means courageous. It was discovered and named by the school pupils and staff. The association would be pleased to receive any other suggestions for a name.

A headmaster, Mr. J. K. Eram was appointed in 1967. He has 25 staff and a total of 100 pupils.

During which 2 1/2 weeks of the African Club's Evening Centre will be highlighted as well as that of the school on Nile Road and the Children's Orthopaedic Clinic.

It is an exciting and a very interesting experience to see the work of the mobile orthopaedic school travels to centres at Malindi, Kisumu, Embu, Eldoret, Nakuru, Kericho, Ruaraka and Hurler. The vehicle is a Rebo which



was donated by the Austrian M.I.V.A. a charitable concern which puts up funds so that certain organizations such as the APDK can obtain vehicles.

This, however, still leaves the association with the need to pay for the equipment and provide a salary for the physiotherapist.

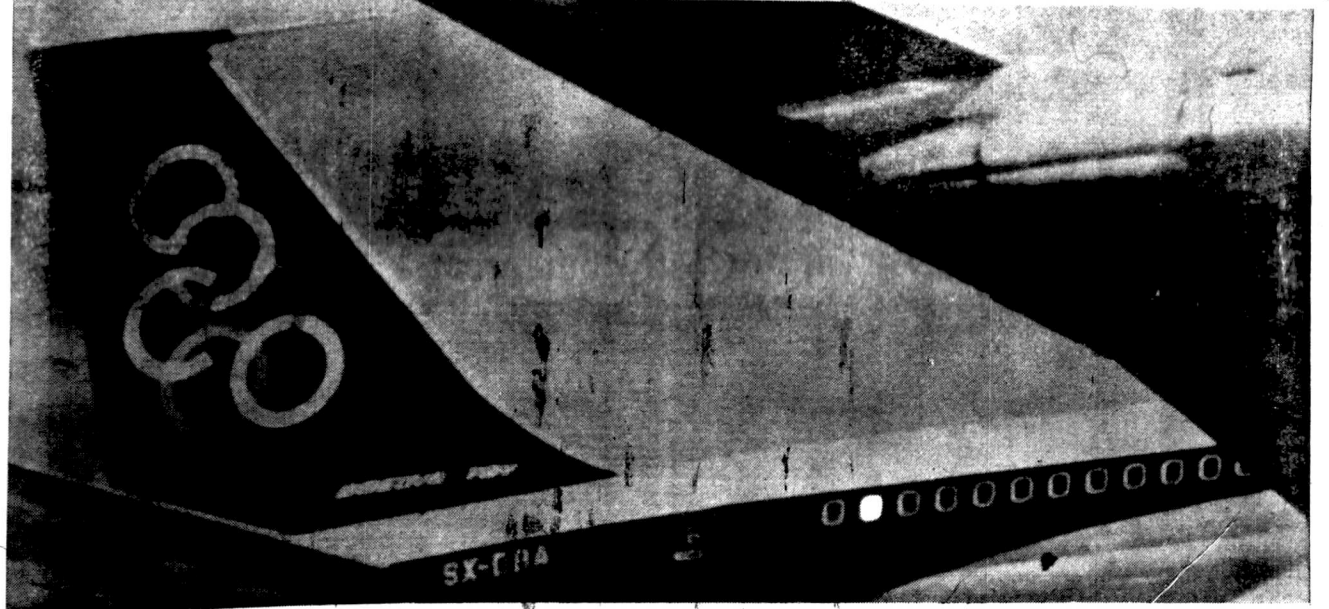
The association, which is a voluntary body, was formed in 1958 and consists of people who are interested in the welfare of the disabled and who have joined the society as members.

Its objective are the rehabilitation and training of any disabled person to assist him to become self-sufficient and to enable him to contribute to the national development.

The association's executive committee is elected at an annual meeting and consists of members in their various capacities from the management committee of the school.

The body has an annual budget of about 100,000 shillings. It is a voluntary organization and its members are not paid. It is a non-profit-making organization and its funds are used for the benefit of the disabled.

Forest viewpoint in the hills of Ukambani

People who regard the 300 miles between Nairobi and Mombasa as just "a lot of road" to be covered on the journey to the Coast are missing some of the most beautiful — and accessible — country in Kenya.

Of course, most people have done the tourist circuit round Taveta West National Park, but less well known are the Chyulu and Tera Hills, and some of the re-forested hills in south-east Ukambani. In the latter area stands Nzau.

The 6,000ft mountain whose gigantic cliffs are almost occasionally in the distance from the road as the traveller passes through small fields and villages.

To reach Nzau one must follow a rather rough track from Emali for about 20 miles — and then comes the greatest surprise of all, in spite of the forbidding cliffs, which one sees from the road there is in fact the most beautiful view of the hills of Ukambani.

with a sheer drop of up to 2,000ft on two sides.

Almost at one's feet there is a mosaic of fields and villages criss-crossed by roads and rivers and the distance the other hills of Ukambani. In clear weather, Mt. Meru and the hills of the Nandi can be seen.

The beautiful pine forest on Nzau was planted by Forest Department between 1912 and 1959 as a part of a scheme to provide a water catchment area and prevent erosion.



The plan has been a great success, as before water used to flood down during the rains but cause even more erosion in the parched settlement areas below.

The trees used were sub-tropical pines and the fact that they are still not very high shows how hardy the pine is in this kind of work.

A bonus for the people of Ukambani has been that the forests on Nzau and three other mountains, Makali, Kitondo and Kiterere, are now yielding wood for fuel and building, and soon there may be a surplus for export.

Altogether 12,500 acres have been reafforested in Ukambani, mainly on the mountains in the south.

To camp among the pine trees on such a lofty viewpoint is one of the delights of living in East Africa and a Forest Department official said people were welcome to visit such places provided they took great care not to start any fires. A fire in 1960 destroyed all the trees on Nzau and at fresh start had to be made.

The official also pointed out there was a small fee of 3/- a person under the Department.

Mrs. Evans, 39, said: "I cannot think why more young women do not go into this kind of engineering. I think it may be because the work engineering has connotations of hard, heavy work in my kind of work, I hardly ever get my hands dirty."

She does not exactly know what gave her the desire to become an expert in the field of electronics. My father was a printer, my husband is a physicist with Lockheed.

"I felt this interest arising and I decided to do something about it so I went to two universities, the San Jose State University in California and Ryke University in Houston, Texas, and here I am

travelling the world telling people about the kind of work I do."

As we walked around the airport packed with thousands of pounds-worth of equipment, Mrs. Evans spoke about digital analysis, frequency-time impedance and cascaded data. Businessmen bombarded her with questions which were answered without hesitation.

Would she advise young women to think about this kind of work? "Yes, most certainly," she said. "We feel that the developing countries need the kind of equipment we make."

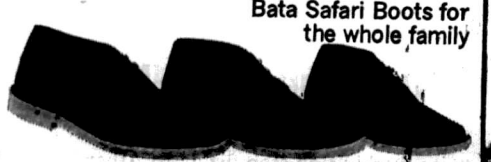

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Costly but great

One of the most successful of the American compact cars is the Ford Falcon which was first marketed in 1960. For a number of years the Falcon range has also been manufactured by the Ford Motor Co. of Australia. The local Ford agents, Hughes Ltd., now import the Fairmont model.

This is the more expensive car stocked by Hughes Ltd. and is a luxury version of the Falcon. The Fairmont is a spacious four-door saloon with an overall length of 15ft. 4in. and a large car in the eyes of many motorists.

The interior of this Australian-built Ford is an comfortable and well-furnished as you would expect from a car with a Nairobi price of £2,190. The seats can only be described as luxurious. They are deeply padded and the copious foot bucket seats are fully reclining. The range of fore-and-aft adjustment covers for the latest driver and leaves plenty of leg room for the rear seat passenger.

When driving the Fairmont, I found the engine compartment, which is the space allocated to the power unit of most British and continental cars, is a very well thought out. The engine compartment is a large circular compartment with a large circular speedometer with a needle which shows tens of a mile, but does not have a trip counter. A circle of similar size, to the left of the speedometer, contains fuel and water temperature gauges. The instruments are warning lights for oil pressure and alternator failure. 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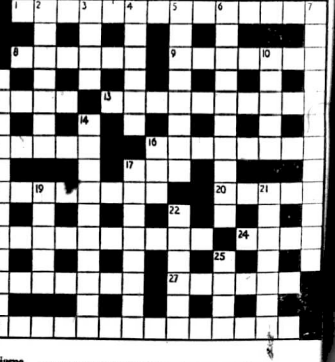

the 6,000ft. mountain whose planing cliffs are glimpsed occasionally in the distance from the Mombasa road as the traveller passes through Emali.

To reach Nzau one must follow a rather rough track from Emali for about 20 miles — and then covers the greater surprise of all. In spite of the forbidding cliffs which one sees from the road there is, in fact, a Forestry Department track which leads right to the summit.

From the top the view is magnificent. The sides of the mountain drop down steeply on three sides,

with a sheer drop of up to 2,000ft. on two sides only.

Almost at one's feet there is a mosaic of fields and villages criss-crossed by rivers and roads, and in the distance the other hills of Ukambani. In a weather high faraway landmarks are Millimero, Mt. Meru and the hills of the N.F.D.

The beautiful pine forest on the mountain has been planted since 1959 as part of a general plan to reafforest the hills of Ukambani to provide a water catchment area and prevent erosion.

The plan has been a great success, as before water used to flood down during the rains, and cause even more erosion in the parched settlement areas below.

The trees used were sub-tropical pines and the fact that they are still not very high shows how harsh the terrain in which they were planted used to be.

A bonus for the people of Ukambani has been that the forests on Nzau and three other mountains, Makuli, Kitondo and Kitende, are now yielding wood for fuel and building, and thus there may be a surplus for export.

Altogether 12,000 acres have been reafforested in Ukambani, mainly on the mountains in the south-east.

To camp among the pine trees on such a lofty viewpoint, one of the delights of living in East Africa, and a Forestry Department official said people should welcome to visit such places provided they look great care not to start and fires. A fire in 1960 destroyed all the trees on Nzau and a fresh start had to be made.

The official also pointed out there was a small fee of one shilling for campers in forests which are under the Department.

One of the most successful of the American compact cars is the Ford Falcon which was first marketed in 1960. For a number of years the Falcon range has also been manufactured by the Ford Motor Co. of Australia. The local Ford agents, Hughes Ltd., now import the Fairmont model.

This is the most expensive car stocked by Hughes and is a luxury version of the Falcon. The Fairmont is a special four-door saloon with an overall length of 15ft. 4in. and is a large car in the eyes of most motorists.

The Fairmont has a pleasing uncluttered line with a very slight hint of the "Coke bottle bulge" at the rear door which is a characteristic of several current American cars. The interior of this Australian-built Ford is a comfortable and well-furnished as you would expect from a car with a Nairobi price of £2,190. The seats can only be described as luxurious. They are deeply padded and the copious foot bucket seats are fully reclining. The range of fore-and-aft adjustment, casters for the front seats and leaves plenty of leg room for the rear seat passenger.

Before driving the Fairmont (which the engine compartment) is the industry's best equipped car to be seen in Nairobi. This is a 3.6-litre six-cylinder engine which develops 135 h.p. at 4,400 r.p.m. In contrast to the rest of the case being supported into today, the Fairmont gearbox has three speeds instead of the usual five. The gear lever is mounted on the steering column and the gearbox is of the "fall-synchronism" type.

Although the combination of a five-speed gearbox will not appeal to drivers with a sports car approach to motoring, I soon discovered that driving the Fairmont provides plenty of motivation. The engine has excellent torque characteristics

and the gear ratios are well chosen. As a result the Fairmont is a true top gear car and cruises effortlessly. The acceleration is impressive, my passengers who were also impressed with the smoothness of the engine.

The example which I tested had only just completed the minimum running-in period and it was not surprised that the overall fuel consumption figure for my test was 22 miles to the gallon. Under normal driving conditions the Fairmont fuel consumption should be in the 24 to 26 m.p.g. range.

Australian cars have acquired a reputation for being able to cope with rough conditions and I was pleasantly surprised by the way the Fairmont handled on unsurfaced roads. When driven very hard on curran the tail tends to swing slightly, but this is easily controlled. It rode on rough surfaces as good as a miller which has been fitted with high average speeds.

The steering is low geared and requires considerably more movement than that of British and continental cars. I was accustomed to this rapidly and discovered that the steering which has been required was not tiring. The steering is light in operation and the returning action is very positive. By also gear steering the Fairmont is above average.

The major criticism of the car is that the back seat is rather low down but the dashboard is high. This means that to reach the back seat one has to reach the dashboard.

Instrumentation is simple. There is a large circular speedometer with a needle which sweeps round a scale of 0 to 100 m.p.h. but does not have a trip control. A circle of smaller size contains fuel and water temperature gauges and there are indicator lights for oil pressure and alternator failure. The instruments are shaded by a ledge and are clearly visible. I was disappointed to observe that the speedometer needle on the test car swung noticeably at high speeds.

The boot protrudes forward from the windscreen on an almost horizontal plane instead of sloping downwards. As a result the driver is unable to see the road surface clearly.

The dusty section of my test run proved that the Fairmont has effective dust proofing, both in the front and luggage compartments. Almost to bumper level which makes the loading of luggage an easy matter. The spare wheel is located in a well set into the floor of the boot. This positioning is annoying if a puncture occurs when the full load of luggage is being carried but it does provide the maximum possible space.

The Fairmont will suit the driver who likes a car which is straight forward to operate and simple to maintain. I found that the Fairmont has tremendous passenger appeal, stemming mainly from the excellent seating arrangements, the comfortable ride and the complete absence of noise. A popular feature is the effective air conditioner.

Bearing in mind the enthusiasm which passengers expressed for the Fairmont and the car's simplicity, I would not be surprised to see an increasing number these Australian cars being driven by chauffeurs.

Unquestionably the Fairmont is a car which has been developed by the individual who wants a combination of comfort and prestige.



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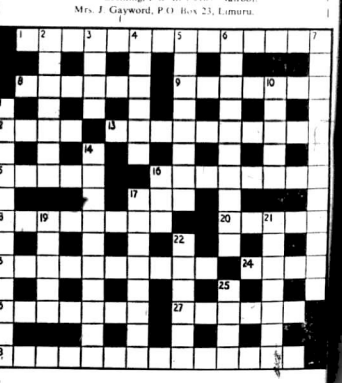

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Society's gift will help house pygmy hippo

The East African Wild Life Society had donated £450 to Kenya National Parks for the completion of the enclosure to house the pygmy hippo in the Nairobi Orphanage.

It is perhaps of interest to note that the Wild Life Society donated £13,000 to research and conservation projects during 1968, ranging from anti-poaching units in Masailand establishing a biological research laboratory for the Selous Game Reserve.

This is the first donation, however, for the establishing of a zoo in Kenya and there is no doubt the addition to the Nairobi Orphanage will prove to be popular.

There is much confusion thinking on the holding of animals in captivity and the releasing of animals into the wild. Much money and even more words have been expended on the problem of releasing animals reared under artificial conditions back to the wild.

Sentimentalism and anthropomorphism have clouded realism. The Nairobi Orphanage had a number of young ostriches which were reared to young adults. The time came for them to be released into the park, the authorities had the greatest difficulty in insisting that the ostriches lived in the park and not in the orphanage.

For weeks after their release they fed around the orphanage and insisted on coming back into the pen at night. Similarly the release of the buffalo from the orphanage was accompanied by the greatest

difficulty in continually driving them back into the park and freedom.

It was decided to return a young lion to the wild and an attempt was made to have a pride adopted. The other lions, including a number of youngsters, rejected the newcomer and it was observed that he was steadily losing condition, becoming thinner and weaker.

Much has been said of the return to the wild of other lions, but this has really been successful. It has been necessary to force the lions back into the wild state against their wishes. Hugs, reared by Stephen Ellis from a cub, was released to freedom, but he had no wish for it.

He preferred to be fed rather than seek his own food. The picture of a lion looking into the distance with his jaws open, in its eyes wistfully imagining its lost days on the savannah, is an illusion.

A lion is essentially a lazy creature waiting no more than to be left to sleep for 17 hours a day. If food can be brought to him he can see no reason at all for moving. This is not to say that small cats are acceptable as a means of keeping lions, but certainly there appears to be little desire for the much wanted freedom. Enclosures carefully thought out for an animal's requirements can produce a contentment unknown in the wild.

The releasing of animals bred in captivity can also bring bread and butter, particularly in the case of lions, cheetahs, and other potentially dangerous animals. Having lost all fear of man and the man-smell they are liable to wander into houses and approach man for no better reason than friendliness or curiosity.

The man, not realising that this is not a wild animal, panics and chases panic in the animal with disastrous results.

There will be many still who remember Jole, the lioness with a wonderful disposition. She wandered freely around the warden's camp at Tavos, playing with the dogs and allowing a tiny black and white mongrel to scramble over her and bite her ears.

She wandered into the front garden of someone who mistook her for a wild lioness and shot her. When news of her death was received it was like hearing of the end of a personal friend. It would be too dramatic to say that such animals cannot be returned to the wild, but it would be true to say that it is questionable whether such a return is desirable and can in fact be dangerous, both to the animal itself and to others with whom it may come in contact.

The moment comes for many singers — whether to risk having a throat operation which would improve his health, but at the same time damage his voice.

The latest artist to face this dilemma is Hussein Shebe, singer with the Adhania, the Kenya band which is proving so popular at the moment in Ethiopia.

Hussein finally decided to have a tonsil operation in Addis Ababa after being persuaded by a Yugoslav doctor there that it was the right course.

The doctor himself is a former opera singer who had had the same operation without any effect on his voice.

At the moment, Hussein is in Nairobi visiting friends and relatives, but he will not be able to try out his voice after the operation, which took place a fortnight ago, until he returns to Addis in four days time.

Hussein tells me that the band had a personal message from the Emperor of Ethiopia thanking them for taking part in the International Fair in Addis Ababa.

They hope to return to Kenya for a week next month to give a series of concerts at City Hall and the Starlight Club.

Although they will return to Ethiopia to complete their contract and later give performances on a tour of Italy, Hussein informed me that they will always regard Kenya as their home.

The band has improved tremendously, said Hussein, and he laid emphasis on the lead guitarist, Fadiq Gwada, for whom he predicts a great future.

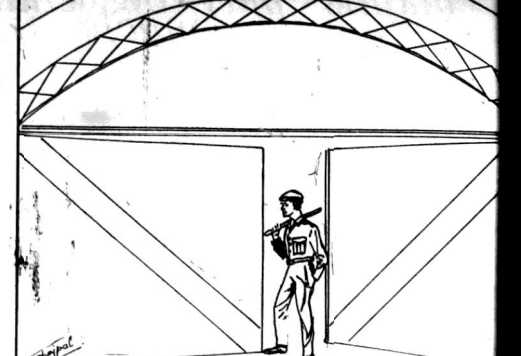
Hussein's favourite singer is Tom Jones, whose feeling for soul music he thinks is remarkable considering he is a European. "But Tom Jones can sing any type of music, not just soul, which is the weakness with many others," said Hussein.

Suitably enough, Tom Jones also had a throat operation and it is this which is thought to account for his remarkable voice. We will have to wait until Hussein returns to Ethiopia to find out whether East Africa has another Tom Jones on its hands.

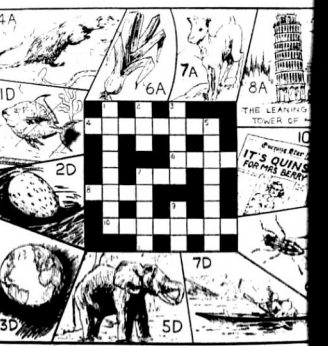


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Pictorial crossword

fast rules on this type of horticulture. The only way to succeed is by trial and error; however, I noted a few points to Dr Piers' method of cultivation which may be of use to you.

His potting material varies from shredded tree bark, sometimes a mixture of them. The only orchids he is willing to pot in peat are those which are not susceptible to rot. The only exception is the case of the orchid which is being grown for ground orchids.

Dr Piers waters his orchids about once a week, except when the weather is very dry and hot. The plants are watered every day so that they have all day to drain and the heat evaporates any excess moisture that may cause root rot. Fertiliser is used once a month on the plants and Dr Piers does not believe in using it more often as it tends to soften the roots.

He is today one of the leading experts on East African orchids and is a founder member of the Kenya Orchid Society and has written a comprehensive book on the subject which will be available in bookshops in a few weeks' time.

You develop a sixth sense about where to find them, and in most cases you are right.

Until recently the African orchid botanist was practically unknown, except to those people outside Africa who are becoming interested in them and often exchange some of their own plants for African ones. East African orchids are amongst the finest from Africa.

Like most orchid lovers, Dr Piers is sensitive to the suggestion that orchids are parasites.

Never insult an orchid by calling it a parasite. It is an epiphyte and attaches itself to an upright of a tree, but does not draw life from it as many people think it does.

Dr Piers grows orchids for his own pleasure and does not offer to sell out blooms. To grow orchids commercially he says one needs to have extensive resources (including the tall me of one who has a few thousand pounds of capital with which he hopes to start a commercial orchid nursery).

He was soon rid of that idea when he found he would need at least 1,000 plants to earn how much that would cost him. He is now a schoolteacher. "Not that he knew any more about teaching than he did orchid growing," Dr Piers added.

From his collection, Dr Piers always has a few plants in flower as any time. "I have had flowering orchids in the house for as long as I have been collecting them."

The best way to collect orchids is to study catalogues from commercial nurseries and buy according to one's pocket, avoiding both the very cheap plants and the very expensive.

A few plants to begin with will give the experience with orchids that one needs before going in for expensive varieties. Societies such as the Kenya Orchid Society are a great help to beginners as the

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Writer's work led to schools founding

The doors of the ultra-modern primary school in the Kenya town of Giabuabu near Nyeri last year opened for the first time. 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written an Akkiva Reader for use in schools and a dictionary of Akkiva words available to the printers. But his major work remains unpublished. He was working on 'The Burning Spear', a collection of Mr. Kenyatta's poems from the library of the general public.

I received a few folk tales that he had written and put together some contributions from friends I knew. It was extremely helpful. It helped me a great deal as I realised that it was one of the things that I wanted to do for some time.

I always felt that there was a lot of folk tales available to the people of Kenya. It was a pity that they were not being collected and put into shape. I knew I was putting them into permanent form for the young people who would have the opportunity of sitting by the fire and listening to my grandmother talk.

According to the writer, most of the folk tales available to African children are still that penned for European writers. Consequently, our own children are mystified by the background of Santa Claus and the Puff of Handed in which he is so out of keeping with their own cultural background. It makes for quite a bit of mental torture.

Since Mr Njauri published his book in 1964, he has seen a mushroom of African folk tales materialise. Not only are they of an amateur and entertaining nature, but they are also particularly from the Kenyan who consider it his class and compare it with the others available. But I have a long way to go before I know whether I have a successful writer or just one of the Africans who has tried and failed.

In the meantime he has a couple of ideas to make up his backlogs. He has in part and inevitably only in this case the discrimination he has expressed for his stringent political views and his unending search for knowledge.

Mr Njauri differs from most African writers in that he is not particularly in the stress he lays on the fact that the African folk tale is no longer to be seen as a message as it has done in the past. Most of them are written in themselves and they are abstracted and conceived purely for entertainment.

Therefore, when our educated Africans take a deeper interest in writing they will be able to write a great number of stories and plays that are not necessarily based on any recognizable incident but are solely for entertainment and recreation.

People of the Streets has also been a valuable insight through the author's sensitive point of view into the lives of the poor and the author's random selection of material.

Apart from his humane interest, this book is of value in its demonstrating how this times is the line of demarcation between a documentary and a literary piece of writing.

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Russia calls for new talks on China border

Moscow has called on Peking to resume frontier talks, first begun in 1964 and later broken off in a Government statement which uncompromisingly blamed the Chinese for the March 2 and 15 attacks against Soviet frontier guards.
The attack resulted in the loss of many men on both sides. Despite the Soviet warnings and appeals to the Chinese to abstain from further similar provocations, the statement went on, new attempts at armed intrusion into the Soviet territory occurred again on the same area on March 14 and 15.
On the occasion units of the Regular Chinese Army, supported by artillery, first attacked the Soviet armed frontier forces, destroyed Danmarks Island, the Moscow statement said.
The attack was, it said, repeated, but caused further victims.
The statement went on: Now the Chinese authorities are attempting to exact responsibility for these armed clashes. They state that it was the frontier guards who were besieged on the Soviet Union.
The Chinese side does not correct the fact that its army personnel acted according to a plan prepared in advance but tried to prevent the violation of its territory by an unprovoked invasion.
In reply, from the Chinese side, the statement said, the question of Danmarks Island, which is situated in the Peking Bay, is a matter of international law.
The Chinese Government, it said, is ready to discuss the question of Danmarks Island on the basis of the principle of equality and mutual respect.
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VIETCONG CONTROLS HALF MEKONG DELTA

The Vietcong is in more or less complete control of more than half of the Mekong Delta and more than one-third of its population, according to an official American report published last week in Saigon.
The report, which is the first American admission since the Vietcong government can exercise control over almost 50 per cent of the Mekong Delta, says that the Vietcong has taken over about 48 per cent of the region.

PROFILE OF GEN. YAHYA

Chief Martial Law Administrator

Gen. Yahya Khan, Chief Martial Law Administrator, is a distinguished military leader. He served in the Indian Army before joining the Pakistan Army in 1947. 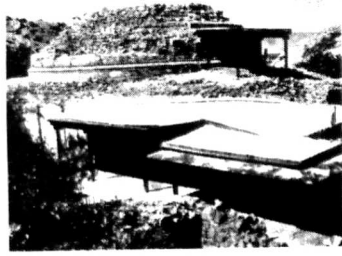
It is in the valley of Haris that the green aspect of history is seen. The valley is a great city which attracted the attention of the Macedonian conqueror Alexander and which later saw the rise of Aaska the greatest of the Hinduist kings.

A number of monasteries and stupas were built in and around Taxila the remains of which now bear testimony to the days when Buddhism was the prevailing faith. With the break-up of the Mauryan Empire Taxila appears to have lost its importance and its name becomes obscure.

These figures are particularly unusual with life and movement and their six legs of which only three are visible. The Dharmarajika Stupa is situated at a picturesque spot about a mile to the southeast of Sarsik. At the time of excavation nothing but a portion of its raised dome was visible. From the accumulation of the ages however emerged some of the stucco reliefs and images which are well preserved and depict a high standard of art.



During the course of excavations in the green valley of Haris the three stupas, six vias and a number of monasteries and stupas have been discovered by the archaeologist. The site is known as the Murree which is situated in the valley of the Murree. It is situated on a small plain past Kamra Saha a small stream. The layout of the site is a rectangular area with a central courtyard and a number of small structures.

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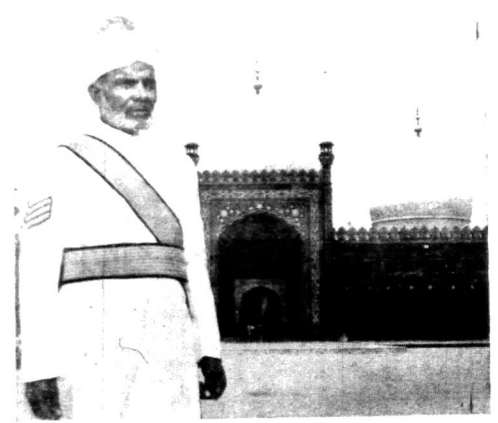
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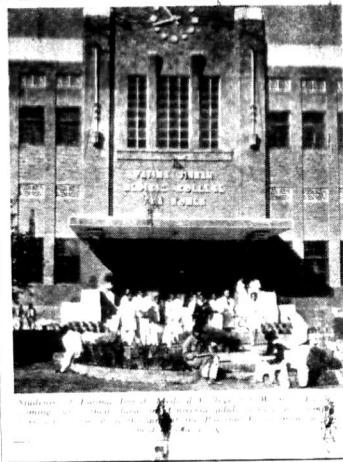
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
