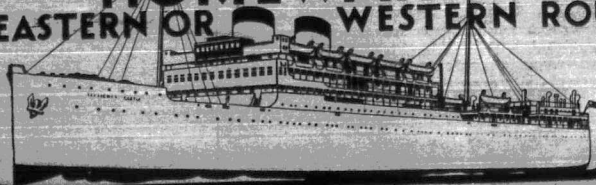

CONTEMPT OF COURT.

**Ex-Magistrate
Fined £100.**

JUDGE CRITICISED.

**"Most Scurrilous and
Disgraceful Letter."**

"I find my blood boil to hear a Supreme Court Judge declare, in a considered judgment, that, whilst not accepting the evidence of the plaintiff in fact, or words to that effect, he did believe the evidence of three uneducated natives, since the evidence of the latter on oath was as worthy of credence as any other."

This statement was made by Mr. L. B. Goad, who, stating that he had held 22 years' judicial and police experience in India, having been a Magistrate with first class powers, and head of the C.I.D. in the Administrations, was charged by the Senior Resident Magistrate at Court, Nairobi, on Friday, with contempt of court, contrary to Section 106 (d) of the Penal Code.

The motion reads: "Any person who, while a judicial proceeding is pending, makes use of any speech, or writing, representing such proceeding, or capable of prejudicing any person in favour of or against any matter in such proceeding, or calculated to lower the authority of any person before whom such proceeding is being held, or taking in public of an offence, and is liable to imprisonment for three months."

Mr. Goad was sentenced to pay a fine of £100, or, in default, to three months' imprisonment.

When charged, accused desired to make a statement, but the Magistrate, Mr. S. H. Carmichael, informed him that he must plead first. A document was then produced.

Authorship Admitted.

"I have no intention, Sir, of denying the authorship of this letter," Mr. Goad replied. He added: "Section 106 (d) lays down the question of pending cases. My letter was written after the cases to which it referred had been decided—on June 30 and August 23 last."

Superintendent Neil Stewart, of the Criminal Investigation Department, replied that there had been another case, referring to the Banfield case, still pending. The letter was received on September 24, and judgment still had to be given in one of the Banfield cases. He submitted that the letter could very easily have reached the mind of the judge. Judgment had been given on September 28.

"I look the step which I did with my eyes open," Mr. Goad said, "in order to draw the attention of the Chief Justice to one of the worst cases of miscarriage of justice which I have ever had the misfortune to witness, having for over 22 years had judicial and police experience in India." He stated that he had been in India a magistrate holding first class powers, and the head of the Criminal Investigation Department in two Administrations.

*Soup Manufactured
from Locusts.*

A French technical journal, says the Algerian correspondent of "The Times," announces that soup can be made from locusts, which are one of the plagues of North Africa. The locusts are dried in the sun and then treated with certain biocides or ethylchloride, according to the degree of dryness. The oil thus obtained is purified by steam and used for making soap. It looks as if the locusts may yet prove a blessing, and factories for making soap from locusts be established all along the Trans-Saharan Railway.

LOCUSTS AT NAKURU.

**Swarm in Direction
of Solai.**

A big swarm was visible in the direction of Solai on Sunday, flying up the hills. Another interesting fact, noted on Sunday, was that the farmhouses were absent from the lake.

Withholding Wages.

In the District Commissioner's Court, Nairobi, Bhagat Singh, an Indian contractor, was charged with withholding the wages of his native servants. Mr. P. de V. Allen, Labour Officer of the Native Affairs Department, prosecuted, and Mr. Dave represented the accused. After hearing extending over some days, Bhagat Singh was found guilty and was sentenced to a fine of Shs. 100/- or in default of one month's imprisonment and ordered to pay costs of the prosecution and to pay the native wages. The fine, wages and costs were all paid into Court.

In sentencing the accused, His Honour said: "I think this is the most scurrilous and disgraceful letter anyone could have written, especially anyone of your experience. I suggest you apologise by the next you refer to his letter. That is a matter for you to consider."

His Honour then sentenced accused as stated.

Increase in Breeding Cattle in Kenya.

81.1 PER CENT IN QUANTITY OF DAIRY PRODUCTS.

Comparison with 1930.

EXPERIMENTAL WORK IN ANIMAL HUSBANDRY AT NAIVASHA.

The Report of the Kenya Department of Agriculture for 1933 shows that there was an increase of all classes of breeding cattle in comparison with the previous year. In spite of this, dairy products as a whole show a decrease. This is ascribed largely to the widespread destruction of grazing of locusts at one of the most critical periods of the year.

Useful contributions have been made to the knowledge of animal husbandry in the Colony by the experimental and investigational work conducted in collaboration with the Rowett Research Institute at the Naivasha Farm.

Locust Damage to Grazing.

The total number of cattle in the possession of Europeans as at February 29, 1933, was 248,579, an increase of 11,984, or 4.9 per cent over the figure for the previous year. The Report of the Department of Agriculture for 1933 shows the increase extended to all classes of breeding cattle; working cows, on the other hand, again showed a slight decrease: from 69,768 to 69,035 in the present year; not so great as might have been expected, having regard to the reduction in the area of land under cultivation, but the change back from a record year to a drought year has influenced the position materially.

Wool-bearing sheep decreased by 7.5 per cent during the year and the number is now returned at 392,456. Native sheep on European farms were increased by 181 per cent to 59,751.

The number of pigs further decreased to 25,790, a drop of 1,470 from the previous year's figure. Slight increases in the number of horses and mules were recorded, the number of donkeys also increased.

The poultry industry has continued to expand. An increase of 27.5 per cent in the number of birds in the year under review followed one of 3.7 per cent in 1930-31 and 23.2 per cent in 1929-30. The total number now stands at 62,629.

The total number of purchased stock shows a decline on the year, but this decline was not of any real significance, since it was entirely accounted for by a decrease in the number of bull calves. Purchased cows and heifers over one year and purchased bulks showed a combined increase of 23 per cent.

The total stocks of live stock from all sources were as follows: cattle, 18,870; horses, 242; sheep, 392,768; pigs, 1,244; G.O. cattle, 68 in cattle. East Coast Fever is said to account for 14.3 per cent. Hindcalf for 3.4 per cent, and other causes 82.1 per cent.

Slaughtering of cattle at £0.119 show a decrease of 21 per cent from the figures of the previous year. Sheep at £7,365 showed similar percentage decrease. Pigs on the other hand, increased by 18 per cent, to 9,377.

While the amount of butterfat shows an increase over the preceding year, the production of milk, cream, butter, cheese and wool has declined. Dairy products as a whole show a decrease, in spite of the increase in numbers of dairy cattle which has occurred. This may be ascribed in large part to the widespread destruction of grazing by locusts which occurred, particularly during that period of the year when milk production should be at its maximum. The production of wool amounted to 513,622 lb., an increase of 24.2 per cent over the previous year.

Statistics of dairy commodities produced by local creameries during the year were called for and the following are the quantities returned as received or manufactured:

Naivasha Farm.

Investigational and experimental work conducted in collaboration with the Rowett Research Institute, connected with animal husbandry was continued at the Naivasha Farm, and useful contributions were made to the knowledge of this branch of farming in the Colony. The most important investigations undertaken may be summarized as follows: (a) Calf's Feeding Trials in Connection with milk production; Milk yield maintenance trial; Feeding curves during pregnancy when grazing is scarce; Trial of rations of sheep milk and breast feed in July several months before lambing.

FAILURE TO ATTEND PARADES.

The Defence Force Ordinance.

SIX CASES.

One Delinquent Fined the Maximum Under the Ordinance.

Six cases under the Kenya Defence Force Ordinance, 1928, are brought before the Senior District Magistrate's Court, Nairobi, on Tuesday.

Only one of the accused pleaded the maximum fine of Shs. 100, and in the majority of cases the charges were withdrawn or a caution administered.

Mr. W. E. H. Bird, the first accused, pleaded guilty to a charge of failing to comply with Section 22 of the Ordinance by not attending on August 5, 1932, and on other dates, for the purpose of undergoing the prescribed course of training as duly notified under Section 21 of the Ordinance, being between the ages of 18 and 30 years, and ordinarily resident in the Colony.

Mr. Bird, having pleaded guilty, Inspector Stewart (Court Director) said he understood there were extenuating circumstances in the case, and Colonel T. O. Fitzgerald (Chief Officer, K.D.F.), agreeing, said he believed accused was employed by Mr. Gethin by whom he occasionally sent out of Nairobi.

A fine of Shs. 20, was imposed. A charge against Mr. J. Ward was withdrawn.

Maximum Fine.

The man who was fined the maximum was Mr. A. M. Wylie, of Nairobi, who pleaded guilty to a similar charge by letter.

Inspector Stewart I understood there was an extenuating circumstance in this case, Your Worship.

A similar charge, preferred against Mr. K. Wilkinson, was withdrawn. The Staff Officer stating that Mr. Wilkinson had left Nairobi and was fulfilling his leave at Nyeri.

A Caution.

The Magistrate cautioned Mr. O. H. Tomson, of Nairobi, who was similarly charged.

In admitting the offence, Mr. Proctor said: "I was under the impression that if you obtained, as I did, the permission of one's company commander, then it was in order. I wrote to him when my leave went wrong and in the letter I think I said I would go back on parole when the finger was right which I did about a month ago."

The staff officer said he did not know of any provision having been granted by the accused to any of the accused.

INCREASING KENYA PUBLICITY.

EAST INDIA ASSOCIATION OF KENYA.

Work Since Inception.

At a meeting of the East India Association of Kenya, held recently in Nairobi, the work which was done under the leadership of the body was outlined by the chairman, Mr. F. E. Biss.

In the course of his remarks, Mr. Biss said—

As a result of preliminary meetings taken by and on the initiative of Mr. G. R. Mansfield, late of the Indian Police, a public meeting was held on March 29 of this year to consider what could be done to bring the advantages of Kenya as a place of retirement to the notice of Europeans leaving India. It was hoped to attract those who had been engaged in commerce as well as officers of the services, civil and military.

At that meeting it was decided to form an association of people from India who are already in Kenya to make Kenya known as a place for settling, permanent residence, sport and general vacation.

Executive Committee.

An executive committee was elected consisting of Colonel Keogh, Colonel Walter, Major Stratton, Captain Hutchinson, Captain Mac, Dr. Violet Clarke, Mr. Stomach, Mr. Mansfield, Mr. Barnard (Hon. Secretary), Miss Watson co-opted as Hon. Assistant Secretary, and Mrs. Miss Watson co-opted as Honorary Assistant Secretary. On the invitation of the committee, Mr. H. C. Lee, Francis Scott, D.S.O. became the President of the Association. The committee feels that the time has now come when it should appeal to the interested public on account of its activities in the six months that have elapsed since its formation.

Nine meetings of the committee have been held and the attendance has been so regular and full that it has been made clear that there has been no slackening of interest in the proper publicity which Kenya should enjoy. The response of former residents in India has perhaps not been so great as might have been hoped. It is not too late to invite those who are interested to send to their names and addresses to the Hon. Secretary of the East India Association of Kenya, at P.O. Box No. 26, Nairobi. It would also be useful if all would send to the Hon. Secretary the names and addresses of friends in India who would be interested to receive information about Kenya.

A Brochure.

A brochure, with a foreword by Lord Francis Scott, has been prepared and printed by the committee with the assistance of the Government of Kenya, and His Majesty's Trade Commissioner. In the preparation of this brochure and in all else that is done, the assistance of the Government has also been a great encouragement.

The brochure has recently been widely distributed in India, and are included in the contemporary press work in India of Sir Reginald Spence, who is in India, and Mr. Swaine, C.I.E., who is in Kenya. Owing to these two agencies and to private correspondents, which is the principal method on which our work depends, a stream of enquiries has already begun. This is a welcome beginning, and we are all concerned except possibly to our credit, to see Mr. Barnard and Miss Watson on whom has fallen the somewhat heavy burden of the early life of the Association.

Road Transport Control Board.

A FURTHER MEETING UNLIKELY.

Impending Legislation.

There will be no more meetings of the Road Transport Control Board, it is officially intimated.

The Board have declared their intention, that they will not grant any more licences which would expire later than February, 1933, thus leaving only six months, for which the Board would, however, demand the full year's licence fee. In consequence of this the Board have received no further applications for fresh licences.

At a meeting of the Board held on August 25, the Attorney General announced that during the next session of the Kenya Legislative Council, a Bill would be introduced providing for the prohibition of the carriage by motor vehicles of goods for reward; the prohibition, he explained, would apply to any section of the road between Mombasa and Nakuru, with a proviso permitting the carriage of goods over certain sections of the road in order to save places 25 miles from Nakuru, which would be exempt.

LONDON STILL GROWING.

Further Extension to the Underground.

People are now saying that London is getting too big. However, Greater London continues to grow, and the engineer following the builder maintains lines of communications between Central London and the outer suburbs.

North London has long suffered from a lack of swift train transport, but on Monday last the public was able to travel on the first section of the Southgate extension of the "Pancake" Railway from Finchbury Park to Arnes Grove. This section includes intermediate stations at Manor House, Turpin Lane, Wood Green, and Round Green. The new line is part of a scheme that provides for the extension of the Piccadilly Railway from its northern terminus at Finchbury Park to Cockfosters (Hadley Wood) and from its western terminus at Hammersmith to Acton Town and South Tarr and to Northfields and Hounslow West. The remainder of the northern extension, with stations at Southgate, Wood Green, and Cockfosters, will be opened during the first half of next year, when the distance covered between Cockfosters and South Tarr and Hounslow respectively will be 25 miles in each case. The trains between Arnes Grove and South Tarr will make the longest run of any of the trains, 22 1/2 miles.

The cost of the extension to Cockfosters (not including new rolling-stock) is £4,500,000. Thus London's underground is stretching further and further and in time the suburbs, as we now know them, will probably become part of London itself. It shows us what is going on the outskirts and what were a year ago country districts are now suburbs.

bodies all filled with the desire to make known to the world the great qualities of the Colony of which we are so justly proud. "I must not detain you further, I trust you will recognize that the East India Association of Kenya has made a sound start, and that all will co-operate in increasing it to the benefit of our own and contributing to its success.

"In conclusion I am sure you will wish me to express to His Worship the Mayor and the Municipality your thanks for their kindness in allowing us to meet first in their old buildings and now first to those to which they have first moved."

AIR TAXIS TO SEASIDE.

Inauguration of New Service.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.] London, September 20. (By Air Mail.) I understand that a London motor coach owner, who a few weeks ago inaugurated an air service between Bromford and Clacton, has already had to trouble his feet of aircraft to cope with the public demand. Now he has just ordered six more machines of a new type specially designed for short distance air services. The new machines are to maintain air lines with comfortable cabin accommodation for six passengers, a pilot, and a steward. They are fitted with twin engines, each of 100 h.p., and will be able to cruise at a speed of 100 m.p.h.

Two services a day in each direction are run between Bromford and Clacton, but it is hoped, with the new machines, to send more services. Eventually, I believe, it is hoped to have the equivalent of a fast aerial coach running to the East Coast at prices competitive with sea transport. Already the cost has been reduced to 5d. per mile, or less than a London taxi.

England has always felt that its internal air transport has not been sufficiently developed, and that anything like the lines of the other countries of Europe, and, I believe, there is a big opening for such an enterprise.

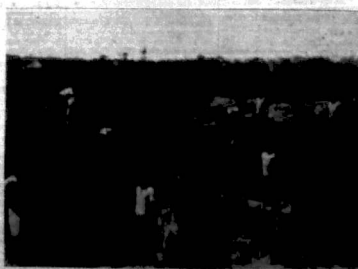

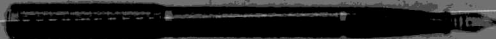

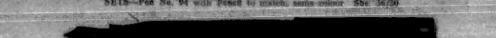

CRISIS IN AFRICA YET OVER.

Mr. Baldwin's Warning to Conservatives.

INTERNATIONAL SITUATION FAR FROM SATISFACTORY.

But Signs of Hope.

BIG IMPROVEMENT IN FINANCIAL POSITION.

At the Conservative Conference at Blackpool, Mr. Neville Chamberlain, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, while supporting, as a taxpayer, a resolution deploring the present burden of taxation, declined, as Chancellor, to anticipate the future.

Mr. Stanley Baldwin warned the Conference that while there were signs of hope in the course of events in Britain, the crisis of last year was not yet over. The international situation, he said, was far from satisfactory.

The general financial position had improved beyond all belief, but conditions were still a matter for anxiety. The industrial position was hopeful, particularly in the textile trades, although very few groups of the large industries had improved their position.

He added that the international outlook was not bright, in spite of efforts by succeeding British Governments to bring about a better understanding in Europe. Europe had come to the parting of the ways.

Medical Progress in East Africa.

COMPARISONS WITH THIRTY YEARS AGO.

Remarkable Achievements.

SIR ALBERT COOK RECALLS THE TIME WHEN NAIROBI DID NOT EXIST.

Sir Albert R. Cook, the well-known Uganda physician, gave a most interesting review of the history of medical progress in East Africa since 1896, when he first arrived in the country, at the centenary meeting yesterday of the East African Branches of the British Medical Association.

He described conditions in the country when his party first passed through on foot on their way to Uganda. No single house then existed in the area where Nairobi now stands. There were only five doctors in the whole of the country, including Mombasa and Zanzibar.

Sir Albert Cook paid a glowing tribute to the work of the Kenya Medical Association, and to the profession in general for the progress achieved up to the present time, particularly in its work on behalf of the African population. He also said that there had been much improved and a little spiritual criticism against Kenya, with which he strongly disagreed.

Abreast of the Times.

A man who walked from the Coast to Kampala in 1896, who recalled that no motor was then in the country, was part of the Uganda, took part in the day morning meeting of the East African Branches of the British Medical Association at Nairobi. Britain's Decision on Five-Power Meeting.

CONSULTATIONS BEING CONTINUED.

Project Not Abandoned.

TENTATIVE DATE FOUND TO BE UNSUITABLE.

The proposed Five-Power Conference between Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy and the United States of America on the subject of disarmament has been postponed since the and grave doubts are said to exist as to whether it will ever be held.

At the same time consultations are being continued between the British Government and the other countries and it is stated that the Conference has not been abandoned. An effort is being made about making a meeting if it is in any way possible, at a date which will be convenient to all the Powers concerned.

Exchange of Views Welcomed.

London, October 6. A hint in the Five-Power Conference communiqué is regarded by a communications which states that Lord Tyrrell has informed Mr. Herriot that British Government is prepared to postpone the proposed date of the Conference.

Grave Doubts.
The postponement of the Conference mentioned in the message from Paris is understood to be due to grave doubts exist as to whether the Conference will ever be held.

Consultations Continuing.
London, October 6. Herriot leaves in London that the British Government was previously hoping that it would be possible to hold the Conference next week.

The ostensible reason for the postponement is the time taken in view to communicate with the other Powers.

The British Government is continuing the consultations with other Powers with the belief that it is in any way possible.—(Reuter).

Not Abandoned.
Exchanges regarding the proposed Five-Power Conference in London to discuss the difficulties arising from Germany's withdrawal from the Disarmament Conference are still continuing and, contrary to certain reports which have been circulated, the project has not been abandoned.

The date originally suggested by the British Government, namely, October 11, was purely tentative and as it is now clear that this will in any case be too early to suit any of the Governments concerned a short postponement to meet the convenience has now been suggested.

The Other Powers.
As already stated, Italy, which has continued to share the idea of such an exchange of views, the German Cabinet will discuss it at their meeting to-day and the "Qual d'Oreux" communiqué last night stated that the question continues the subject of friendly consultation between London and Paris.

Press messages from Washington state that while the United States Government has not definitely indicated its views directly in the attempts to solve the Franco-German deadlock, they are most concerned to see the continuance of a crisis which might cause the collapse of the hopes of world disarmament.—British Official Wireless Service.

Speech by the Prince.

"ECONOMIC NATIONALISM OF LITTLE HELP."
Rugby, October 8. Speaking at an Anglo-Swedish gathering at Stockholm yesterday, the Prince of Wales expressed the value of personal contact between the different nationalities which modern developments facilitated.

"Nowadays we are growing nearer to each other in spite," he marked, "it seems ridiculous that nations should shut themselves up in watertight compartments. Economic nationalism is of little help in this time when co-operation between nations is so essential."—British Official Wireless Service.

A FARWELL SPOECH.

Rugby, October 11. The Prince of Wales and Princess Olga concluded their visit to Sweden to-day, and on the eve of his departure, the Prince of Wales broadcast a special message in which he expressed to the people of Sweden his warm thanks for the friendly reception they had given him and his family. He said he had been much impressed by all he had seen by the beauty of Sweden's scenery and the fact and by these aspects of industrial life, which he had had time to inspect.

On returning on the steamer knowledge of the English language amongst all classes in Sweden which had impressed him, the Prince expressed the opinion that the Swedish people were wise to learn English because it was becoming one of the best and easiest means of intercourse between nations. It was a great satisfaction to him to observe the growing tendency to encourage the personal and cultural relations with Britain, which he assured the Swedish nation he had endeavoured to foster fully and warmly.—British Official Wireless Service.

THE RETURS JOURNEY.

Rugby, October 18. Returns for Month of September.

CONVERSION OFFER.

Cash Application List Closes.

London, October 10. The Treasury is meeting one hundred and fifty millions of Treasury Bonds as per resolution in 1921-1922 with interest at two per cent. Holders of the 4 1/2 per cent Treasury Bonds, the redemption of which was being suspended, may surrender their holdings to exchange for the new stock. The lists of cash applications will be closed on or before October 12 and the date of conversion applications will be closed on October 17.

A Popular Move.

London, October 11. Again the Government's financing plans have caused astonishment and admiration in financial circles, which are of the opinion that the new two per cent issue will economize readily demanded, as the supply of short dated issues is otherwise slender. Nevertheless, similarly profitable borrowing has not been experienced since the nineties.

Its immediate object is the refinancing of the £140,000,000 four and a half per cent Treasury Bonds, the holders of which can convert at par and receive a cash payment of 10/6.

Cash Lists Close.

London, October 11. The Treasury cash application lists for the new Treasury Bonds, 2 1/2 per cent, will close at seven o'clock to-day and the list for cash applications, instead of remaining open until next morning, was closed immediately.

While cash applications were invited however, the issue really represents a conversion operation, preference being given to applications from holders of 4 1/2 per cent Treasury Bonds at £140,000,000 due for repayment on December 1. Such holders exercising the right to exchange into new two per cent Bonds will receive an equal amount of the latter plus a cash payment of ten shillings per cent. The prospectus provides for conversion applications to be received up to Monday next.

Effect on Stock Exchange.

The announcement of the new conversion issue caused a sharp rise in British funds. War Loan (assented) opening at 10 1/4 and later rising to 10 1/2. The market reflected the terms of the new issue to mean that in the official view money is likely to remain cheap for some time to come. The Government has decided to provide £150,000,000 for repayment of the unconverted five per cent War Loan, £140,000,000 for redemption of 4 1/2 per cent Treasury Bonds and £10,000,000 for the remaining balance of the 4 1/2 per cent War Loan. It is assumed that the Government has plans other than the issue of short term bonds in view for dealing with the balance of approximately £150,000,000. This sum remains of this total of £150,000,000. — British Official Wireless Service.

Instantaneous Success.

London, October 11. The astuteness of Treasury officials in taking advantage of monetary conditions in consequence of the stagnation in trade is shown by the instantaneous success of the issue of two per cent Treasury Bonds. The list of cash applications closed almost as soon as they were opened. The success of the new issue gave impetus to Government securities, all rising by a fraction. The money market was surprised by the terms of the issue, especially the final redemption.

TUBERCULOSIS IN EAST AFRICA.

"A Most Serious Disease Among Natives."

DOCTOR'S OPINIONS.

Suggested Method of Attack.

Should well be held before consumption? Members of the African Branch of the British Medical Association, at one of the centenary meetings held in Nairobi last week differed sharply on this point. Another difference of opinion was the duration of life of a person suffering from advanced tuberculosis. Dr. A. J. Blake of Nairobi, put it at three and a half years. "I was diagnosed as a tuberculosis case 45 years ago," reported Dr. Gordon, also of Nairobi, said laughingly, "and I'm still alive. I have kept to touch with some of the people who were in the sanatorium when we were married and saw perfectly well now."

Practically all those who took part in the discussion agreed that tuberculous was comparatively rare in the territories of Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda. One of the meetings was devoted to papers on tuberculosis, and it was on those that the opinions were forthcoming.

Clinical Work.

The views were expressed by Dr. C. Wilcocks, of Tanganyika whose paper more particularly dealt with the clinical side of the work. Most of his investigations had been made in the Kilimanjaro area and were still in the experimental stage. He emphasized, however, the difficulties of arriving at true diagnoses, which led Dr. Jax Blake to wonder whether the conditions under which Dr. Wilcocks made his examinations were satisfactory. It was later admitted they were not. Into that category there also came, Dr. Lehmann, of Dar es Salaam, Dr. Dodson, Leprosy, which was much more general in Tanganyika than was supposed.

According to Dr. Vint, the Government bacteriologist in Kenya, tuberculosis was the most serious afflicting the natives around Nairobi, and he spoke from a long experience of post-mortem work. It was not, however, the epidemic disease one got at Nairobi, but rather a low form of septicaemia. Dr. Gordon, having proclaimed himself as completely cured, pointed out the danger of trying to use European standards in clinical diagnosis. Dr. Procter, of Mombasa, showed what just did played in the development of the disease.

In Zanibar.

Tuberculosis was, according to Dr. R. Spearman, of Zanzibar, who reviewed one of the most serious diseases among natives in tropical Africa, and one of the most difficult of problems. Once established itself in a native it progresses with extraordinary rapidity. He gave the average duration of life as 183 days, from the month of the symptoms beginning.

Dr. Spearman, who is President of the Zanzibar branch, followed with the second paper, in which he described the work of his department in trying to prevent the disease. With the introduction of the amenities of civilization, it began to spread through the country. The opening up of roads, for instance, made travel easier, and was an aid to its propagation. Yet natives still lived in the same type of hilly, remote, houses, scattered together, which made Dr. Spearman describe it as an outdoor disease. Such, however, because little death traps. Further west, where natives used to grow their own food, they now grow it for the market, and because the old days' mode of

Tuberculosis had been found for the last 70 years, and was a menace that showed few signs of decreasing.

Need For Isolation.

The three methods of fighting the disease that he recommended were: segregation, hospitalization, and some method of isolating the more serious infective cases unsuitable for the indoor method.

Uganda Natives.

The third paper was read by Dr. R. Yelverton Stokes of the C.M.S. Uganda, and dealt with a scheme for reducing the incidence of tuberculosis among the natives of Uganda. He gave the average duration as 10 months and said the pulmonary form was the commonest. His scheme, briefly, was village settlement, on the lines of the Deywets, and a Sanatorium, together with the three methods suggested by Dr. Spearman.

Nothing short of the segregation of the general population was going to be any good in the long run, agreed Dr. Jax Blake, and while giving it his sympathy, Dr. Spearman, of Dar es Salaam, thought it would be heating the air. A decrease in the modernized of England followed an improvement in the general sanitation. What they had to do was at home was to improve the conditions of life among the natives, and to teach them to live in a sanitary way. It would not be long, he said, and we will then see the menace of tuberculosis would be lifted.

Purdah System.

In the course of his paper, Dr. Spearman had mentioned that a great deal of tuberculosis existed among the women of a wealthy Indian sect in Zanzibar. Dr. Gilks wondered why, and the opinion of the former was that it was due to the system of purdah. The women were kept in confinement all day, and when they were allowed out, their faces were covered, and that they kept breathing their own breath and not fresh air.

"Purdah is one of the most vicious things I have ever seen, and should be stopped," declared Dr. Spearman.

In reply to a request to Sir John Sandeman Allen for his views on the recent report on Hemp Fibres by the Imperial Economic Committee, he sends the following views—

"I have studied the Imperial Economic Committee's Report on Hemp Fibres with much interest, especially in connection with its bearing on East African sisal. The advantage of the use of sisal for ships' ropes and marine cordage generally has, in my opinion, been considerably advanced by this Report, and it is very important that this field should be developed particularly in view of the probable reduction in the use of binder twine in the future, owing to the increased use of the combined harrow-tresher.

Overhead Charges.

"There is no doubt that for some little time to come the sisal industry will have to face difficult times and must set itself to reduce the proportion of some of its overhead charges, and all things there has been a rise in world prices recently it will be some time yet before the price rises to an economic level.

The Report is valuable in many ways as giving in a clear and compressed form the main issues connected with this important industry. The three points which seem to me to be of the most importance in the recommendations of the Committee are (1) the need for closer contact between growers and users; (2) the appointment of inspectors by an outside body and the use of sample bases for arbitration; and (3) what is most important and without which East African Sisal can never expect to take its proper place, and that is the necessity for adopting a proper system of standardised grading for export. The experience in other products is such as to make it rather surprising that sisal growers in East Africa have not as a body appreciated the importance of this point, although I fully realise that some individual firms have."

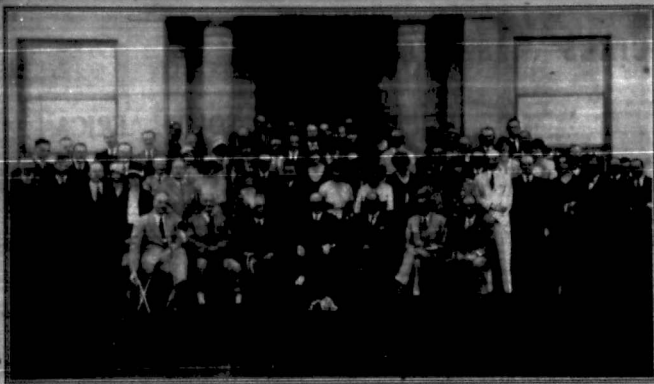

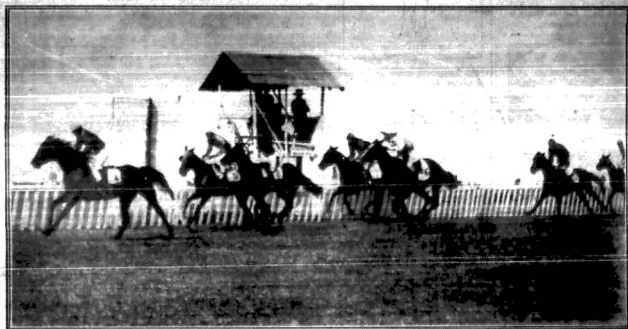

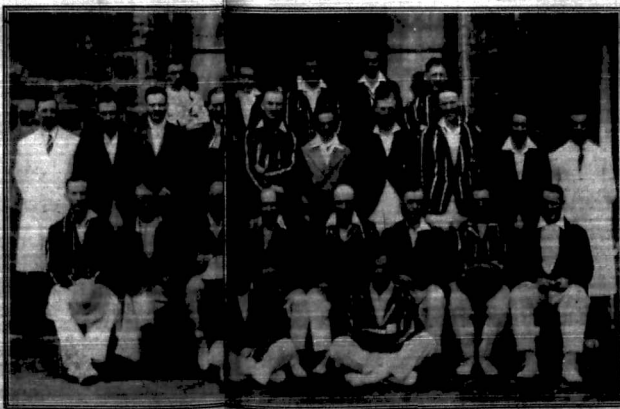

Sequel to a Night Motor Trip.

GIRL FOUND DEAD IN THE BUSH.

Youth in Custody.

SEARCH STILL PROCEEDING FOR THIRD MEMBER OF PARTY.

Stark tragedy, wrapped in mystery, followed the disappearance of three Nakuru people on Thursday evening of last week.

One of the two European girls has been found dead, shot in the back of the head.

The second has disappeared and at the time of going to press members of the K.D.F., native trackers, and police were still searching for her.

The young man has given himself up to the police, and is in custody. He says he remembers nothing of what has happened.

Abandoned Car.

The trio were Mr. W. R. Ross, the manager of M. M. Stewart & Co. at Nakuru, and son of a farmer (Mrs. Warren, Major Ross, who died five years ago). Miss Winifred Stevenson, employed at Messrs. Dalery and Co. Nakuru, daughter of Mr. Stevenson, of 1401 Avenue Road, Nairobi, and Miss Keppie who worked at the Nakuru Hotel and Messrs. Hogg and McGeorge, chemists.

On Thursday evening all three went off in a car, necessarily to go to the cinema and that was the last heard of them until Saturday. Then a telephone message was received by the police that the car was lying on its side up the Eldama Ravine road, and there they found it. The car was badly damaged and had apparently been driven on emergency from the bush.

The Search. Immediately a search party was set together under the D.C. Mr. Hogg and Miss Keppie, the police patrol, and a search party to search the area, and about six o'clock the young man was seen about 12 miles from the scene of the accident at Nariva.

He had met his brother and was returning to his home leaving their meeting over to the police, to be searched for any evidence of anything of the past 48 hours.

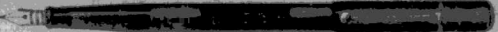

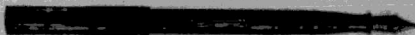
