Asian candidates resign

LEGAL LOOPOH FOUND FOR NEW ELECTION

THE seven candidates in the Non-Muslim Central Constituency in the Kenya General Election yesterday took what was described as "an impressive demonstration of voting honesty" when, after announcing that the election was being held in a fair manner, they handed their resignations to the Chief Secretary, Mr. Peter, and requested that they take effect from the time of nomination.

The action followed some hours at the Indian Primary School, Nairobi, where voting was taking place.

About 60 police, assisted by two companies of Boy Scouts and others, were required to control the thousands of people who came to the school and who, on arrival, burst through police cordons and created scenes of wild disorder.

Test match:

ENGLAND WINS WITH WICKETS TO SPARE

Another two-man innings for India

England's first Test in the present series was won by India, who were beaten in the second and third Tests.

Though England won quite comfortably in the end the match was not without its moments of drama. Most striking of these was the manner in which, in each innings, India had to leave the field from disaster by two batsmen.

The captain, Hazare, and his vice-captain, Hutton, took the score from 42 to 264 for the fourth wicket in the first innings, and again, and Pataudi, in the second, who stopped the rot after four Indians were back in the field without a having been scored.

THIS time one of us
wondered what greater
skill there is than that
of the Russian *Zemmer*
men who are very
dextrous in their work.
Mr. Paul Zimmerman, the
Kenya taxidermist who, with his African
assistants, gives African game a new
existence.

But nothing but the best
is good enough for a man who
has spent 40 years in the profession
and who lives only for his work.
His skill in his art, however, is such
that he means would have
been lost if he had not been there.
Mr. Zimmerman preferred the
Kenya bush to the city for more
than a year, and paid
a heavy price for his choice
of existence.

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African helpers

OF 15 Africans who work with
him, 12 are taxidermists, and three
are assistants. All are professionals
and most of them have been
trained by Mr. Zimmerman himself.

Mr. Zimmerman is inundated
with requests from tourists and
taxidermists, which he even
finds difficult to cope with. He
spends three to four years to complete
the professional orders, which

now number 100.

works from 6 a.m. until midnight
every night and has not had a
vacation since he began his work.


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THE INSTITUTE FOR THE BLIND AT THIKA

The Kenya Appeal for the Blind, launched by the Committee of the Kenya Legation, has asked the Royal Empire Society for the Blind in part of the effort to set up the Commonwealth to attack one of the major Colonial social problems. It is not generally appreciated that blindness and eye diseases that lead to it, constitutes one of the gravest of social problems in the Colonies. The Royal Empire Society for the Blind, as well as blindness, is believed to be right.

There is, unfortunately, as yet no precise information about the range of causes of blindness, nor is there any exact knowledge of how many cases there are. There is, however, a practical step to alleviate the situation, by financing a mobile clinic equipped not only to treat eye diseases and advise and help clinics and dispensaries out in the frontier areas, but also to conduct surveys.

Such a survey would, of course, make available the much needed information about the size and type of problem with which Kenya is faced; so that plans may be made to meet and solve the problem.

Another object of the appeal is to provide for the blind at Thiaka, a school for the blind, to be established outside Nairobi, to provide for the blind at Nairobi, to provide for the blind at Mombasa, and to provide for the blind at Kisumu.

These pictures illustrate some of the aspects of life at the Institute. The photographs were taken by a staff photographer; they show a typical day at the Institute, the physical, medical, and moral help given to the blind, the work done by the students, and the self-supporting and useful methods adopted by the students.

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Unfortunately even such a programme, though sound and practical as it is, touches only the fringe of the problem of blindness in Kenya. At present there is reason to believe that there are no women or girls. It is well known that blindness is not an affliction, but a fragment of the whole. The blind are not only physically handicapped, but are also economically and socially dependent on the charity of their relatives.

It is an object of the Kenya Committee's appeal to make possible an extension of this work, enabled by the failure of Nairobi to find the money to pay for the blind to live in ordinary workday life and receive the same opportunities as other citizens.

Work such as this is destined to help those who are physically handicapped, but are not terminally disabled, which can restore sight. The preventive field of work is able to attack the physical causes of eye diseases—on the spot.

A promise has been given, which it is hoped the Government will be able to fulfil, that the funds required for this purpose will be followed up by the Government by an extension of skilled work through existing

at home, where required. Every day many thousands of cases of eye disease are treated each year in clinics, dispensaries and hospitals. Many inpatients are given free treatment and treatment is given free of charge to all patients. The Colonial Medical Services fails to encompass more than a portion of all those people in the Colony who are visually handicapped. The result is that finally, notwithstanding a new life as a trained blind person, the individual is often left with a sense of isolation and depression. The new programme throughout the Colonial Empire is a crusade to overcome this. The need is urgent, but the task is difficult, and the results are slow. The problem is more serious than is realized, brought with so much preventable human suffering which is, in itself, a challenge to the conscience of man.
