TWO ROADS TO NYERU

Claims of Old Route
Through the Reserve.

[FROM A CORRESPONDENT.]

As announced by Mr. Galton-Fruin, Hon. Secretary of the E.A.A.A., the Karatina-Sigoma route to Nyeru is again in bad condition, and some motorists reported it recently as being impassable. It is stated, however, that the old "Banyo Road" route is again passable, in spite of the surface being in need of repair for a year or more. The road between Nairobi and Fort Hall is in excellent order from Fort Hall, the old route to Nyeru, via Maitani is followed until the Gira River has been crossed, eleven miles short of Nyeru. One mile over the Gira bridge the road forks: the right hand route is impossible on account of ruts; the left hand, or "Old Reserve Road Route" is said to be quite passable, although not in good condition.

A Bad Road.

The new Karatina road is five miles longer than the old road, and has fifteen to twenty miles of black cotton soil, which could be made "all weather" only at great cost, and it is unlikely that the money will be forthcoming for some years. The old route on the other hand is entirely through red earth, has nearly all permanent bridges, and long stretches of ill have been hard-surfaced during recent years.

Although the new road is better adapted for high speed travelling during the dry weather, the old route is probably the more practicable, and no doubt the local road authorities in the Kenya Highlands Valley will soon be reconsidering the very important question of their communications with the capital. In view of the experience gained during the recent rains, it is likely that they may go into the question of severing to the older and shorter route with a view to diverting upon it as the permanent line of the main road to Nyeru instead of the new but unsatisfactory Karatina alternative.

SIR E. GRIGG WRITES IN "THE SEAGUER."

"Democracy and the Colonial Empire."

All who are interested in the sea will appreciate the Spring Number of "The Seaguer" which has been published recently. It is a most excellently produced Quarterly with illustrations extolled both in number and quality. Sir Edward Grigg has contributed an article on "Democracy and the Colonial Empire," in which he writes as follows:—"I say this without hesitation, that our Parliamentary system is, in its present form, ill adapted to a sound, far-seeing and continuous discharge of our Imperial responsibilities. It has little time to devote to the serious discussion of Colonial policy, and it is true that Colonial questions receive much less attention than a thousand lesser questions of purely domestic or even provincial importance. The real trouble is that our treatment of Colonial questions is necessarily superficial and spasmodic, and that our most effective Parliamentary speakers are not, by the most part, men who have made it their business to know what they are talking about in the Colonial sphere."

Corporations.

"My main idea is that the Crown Colony system might be modified by the establishment of corporations representing the economic life of the territory concerned and engaged dealing with the main activities of its government. These corporations would be open to men of all races and such corporations would form its own representative Board. The members of the other Boards would be chosen by the Governor, with the assistance of a panel submitted by the corporations. The relationship of the Boards to the Legislative Council, which would exercise its legislative functions, would be reserved for future discussion."

The new Chamber No. 534 is to be called Britannia. The name is the choice of the Queen. She is to go with the King to Cyprusbank on September 20 and will perform the launching ceremony.

THE COLOMBIAN NAVY.

British Officers and Men Enroll.

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.]

London, May 22. (By a mail.) Sir Bolton Eyre-Mansell, First Lord of the Admiralty, finished his anger in the House of Commons because Mr. C. Mander (Lib., Wolverhampton E.) described as "intentionally" too reckless officers and men of the British Navy, including a number of reservists, who recently left for Colombia to man two destroyers bought by the Colombian Government. Mr. Mander asked the First Lord of the Admiralty if in view of the terms of the Foreign Enlistment Act he has any statement to make with reference to the circumstances in which a hundred ex-officers and ratings of the British Navy left for Colombia to man two destroyers recently bought by the Colombian Government, having signed on for two years; and if he has any information to show if these men are to take part in the hostilities between Colombia and Peru? Sir Bolton Eyre-Mansell said:—"The provisions of the Foreign Enlistment Act have no bearing on the engagement by the Colombian Government of certain ex-naval officers and ratings, as Colombia is not at war. The last part of the question, therefore, does not arise."

Killing Work.

The questions continued as follows:—

Mr. Mander: Can the First Lord say whether these men are reservists?

Sir B. Eyre-Mansell: Yes, Sir, some of them are reservists, but none of them are active reservists.

Mr. Mander: Will the First Lord say whether he considers it decent that British subjects are to be sent out as mercenaries to see B. Eyre-Mansell: These men are not sent out as mercenaries. They were applied for by the Colombian Government. The Admiralty have to give their permission. If I had withheld that permission, I should have been depriving a lot of men of work."

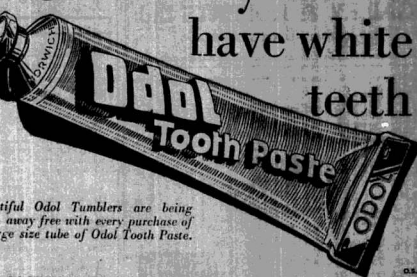

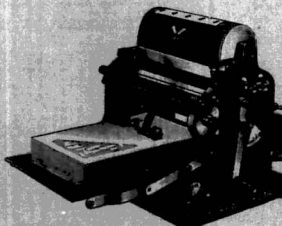

DRAINAGE PROPOSALS IN KAMPALA.

Certain Differences of Opinion.
 ON PRIMARY NEEDS.
 Between Engineers and Local Authorities.

The "East African Standard" has received from the Chief Secretary, Uganda, the following memorandum on surface and sewerage drainage in Kampala:-

In a recent communication to the Uganda Legislative Council it was indicated that renewed consideration was being given to the possibility of improving the sanitary conditions of Kampala by means of a surface drainage and road scheme with or without a water-borne sewerage scheme. The proposals suggested by the Consulting Engineers and the Town Agents of the Colony, after a special investigation in 1930, envisaged the following programme of expenditure:-

Reformation and reconstruction of roads, 187,792; surface water drainage, 4,811,282; sewerage, 1,129,424 (total, 6,728,558).

It was obviously impracticable to proceed with projects of this magnitude during a period of serious financial stringency not only owing to the difficulties in obtaining the necessary finance for these undertakings, but on the grounds that it would be desirable to add to the burdens of property owners by an increase in the municipal rates. It was, therefore, suggested that the Town Agents should, during this period, make a study of the various improvements (even partially) during a time of unprosperous conditions.

Formidable Commitments.
 The importance of providing suitable sanitation for Kampala made it imperative, however, to study the situation as soon as general conditions improved and the Government's initial step in this direction was to explore, in consultation with the Local Sanitary Board, the possibility of making such a far as possible, within practicable limits the rather formidable commitments recommended by the expert advisers. The Local Sanitary Board considered the following unanimous conclusions as under:-

"While this Board considers that water-borne sewerage is desirable in Kampala, it also realizes that, in view of the expense incurred by the scheme and also the probable necessity of increasing the water supply, the rate would have to be raised which would be too heavy to be borne by the public at the present time. It thoroughly upholds the report of the Sub-Committee, and supports its suggestions of substituting the comprehensive surface drainage and road surface scheme instead."

Stormwater Drainage.
 As this suggestion ran counter to the concerted advice of the Consulting Engineers and the Local Medical authorities to the effect that sewerage was far more important than adequate stormwater drainage and that currying off liquid effluents in open drains was particularly undesirable, a discussion was arranged between representatives of the Government and of the Local Sanitary Board in an endeavour to reach a compromise. The majority of the Board remained unconvinced - and confirmed views previously expressed - that well constructed stormwater drainage combined with re-temperatures of roads and their treatment with water-proof material, was of less importance to Kampala than the need for sewers. The Government has, in consequence, in consultation with its advisers, to the matter in

 scheme whereby the financial burden consequent upon a period of sickness may be shouldered by the entire community.

Out of Public Funds.
 "No one is 50 years chronic. Illness is a misfortune which may happen to any of us, and so many of the people in Nairobi who are struggling for a bare living, find that the period of illness - for eight or ten weeks, necessitating hospital treatment, deprives them of what they have been able to save, or, worse still, leads them to a measure of debt from the struggle to extricate themselves, so great that they give up, in despair."

"I have been wondering whether it would not be possible for the Municipal Council to devise some scheme, whereby hospital treatment could be provided out of public funds raised, for example, by means of a poll tax, or, if that expression is inadvisable, a tax so much per annum on each adult member of the community, to be paid by a grant-in-aid from the Government, who are under an obligation to provide medical attendance and treatment for their officers and servants."

A Sub-Committee.
 "The Council also had before it a summary of conversations which took place between it and the Government on the same subject. The General Purposes Committee had appointed a sub-committee consisting of Mr. Mervyn Deane, Deputy Mayor, Councillors D. Newmark, Saleh Mohamed and the Municipal Engineer, to consider the Town Clerk's memorandum and the report of the Non-Official European Hospital Committee and the Government Sub-Committee relative to the existing European Hospital."

At a meeting of the sub-committee, on March 15, the Town Clerk drew attention to the figure of £2,000 referred to in the light of these discussions and has reached the conclusion that, while sewerage is not essential in the least congested residential areas, the provision of a water-borne sewerage scheme must go hand in hand with surface drainage and road reconstruction in the congested or Bazaar area. It has been represented in this connection that in this area new water would probably be required to keep the surface drains sweet and healthy if there was no sewerage system, and the question of the extension of the existing water supply is obviously a paramount consideration which must be satisfactorily established before a water-borne sewerage or stormwater drainage scheme is proceeded with.

Technical Questions.
 As a result of further examination it is clear that a revision of certain important features of the original scheme submitted by the Consulting Engineers is desirable. Before any final decision is reached, various technical questions such as the size of the drains, the sufficiency of the present water supply for purposes of water-borne sewerage and the desirability of substituting cloth dressing for the far more costly tarred paper for road surfacing will require submission to the Consulting Engineers who would be asked to scrutinize the respective schemes in the light of developments since the original investigation.

In this connection information has been received that Mr. C. L. Howard Humphreys, who visited Uganda in 1930, is now conducting an investigation to reach a decision as to whether it is proposed to invite him to visit Uganda in the near future, with a view to discussing the difficulties on the spot. The result of this visit will be of great value to public bodies and interested members of the public who have an opportunity of talking to him regarding his report and the views of Howard Humphreys during his visit.

Government Views.
 A meeting was held at the Secretariat on April 20, 1934, to discuss the Colonial Secretary, the Hon. Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlement, the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services, the Mayor, Councillors D. Newmark, Saleh Mohamed, the Town Clerk, Mr. H. L. Curney and Mr. H. L. Curney. The Colonial Secretary stated that Government was sympathetic towards the offer of the Council to assist in the solution of hospital problems, and it had been expected that when new European and Asian hospital accommodation could be afforded, it would be provided in the form of a group hospital. When built, this group hospital would be primarily a colonial hospital. He suggested that the Council's object would be achieved by some arrangement whereby the Council could secure for Nairobi residents rights and privileges within the colonial hospital which would not affect its colonial status.

He added that if it were suggested that the Council might provide the hospital accommodation for the Colony as a whole, and maintained that the capital expenditure required for the hospital accommodation for the inhabitants of Nairobi only, would be appreciably less. After considerable discussion at which the matter was expressed that the Council should provide sufficient hospital accommodation for the European and Asiatic within the municipal area, and that if it were desired to make provision for patients outside the municipal area, the Council should be recommended to provide such additional accommodation, additional satisfactory arrangements, being made with Government as to the cost, both in terms of capital outlay, and maintenance; and that Government would be approached with a view to ascertaining to what extent they would be prepared to provide financial aid in respect of the scheme of this kind, and what conditions, if any, they would desire to impose.

A Free Basis.
 The proposal which the sub-committee had before it was considered, was for the provision of hospital accommodation for the purpose of such an "Free basis, that is to say, that instead of charging the patients receiving treatment in the hospital, with the cost thereof, the cost of providing the community at large, should be defrayed by means of a municipal tax, charged in respect of each adult resident in the municipal area. In favour of the proposal it was stated that the hospital was a communal service, the cost of which should be borne by the community at large, and not devolve entirely upon the individual patient."

The feeling of the meeting was definitely in favour of providing hospital accommodation for the Municipal Council as the public health authority, for the benefit of the inhabitants of the municipal area, but the sub-committee was wholly in favour of treatment in hospital being entirely free, but that a charge should be made commensurate with the patient's ability to pay. The decision was arrived at on this question, as it was considered there would be ample time to go more fully into this aspect of the proposal, later, and that the efforts of the sub-committee should be concentrated in ascertaining whether Government would be prepared to sanction the scheme, and to what extent they would be prepared to assist the proposal financially.

With this object in view it was decided that the Mayor, Councillors Newmark and Saleh Mohamed together with the Town Clerk, should seek an interview with the Colonial Secretary, the Director of Medical Services, and the Commissioner for Local Government, Lands, Settlement and Mines.

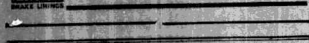

All test matches, with the exception of the fifth, will be over four days, and the last will be played to a finish unless the rubber has been decided before hand.

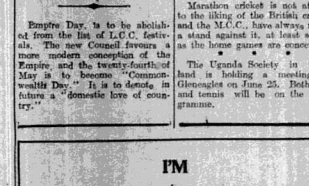
Marathon cricket is not at all to the liking of the British cricketers, and the M.C.C. have always made a stand against it, at least so far as the home games are concerned.



TACTICS IN GOLF.

The Rules of the Game.

Two Incidents.

WHEN MAY A BALL BE LIFTED?

ONCE again the Rules of Golf are cropping up, and it is worth our while to run through some of the running complications of the game.

I do not think I am doing any harm in citing two incidents which began in a major tournament recently. It might prove of assistance to the player.

A and B are playing partners in a stroke competition. A plays from the tee, and his ball lodges on the face of the bank, at the back of the green. A immediately asks whether that is part of the bank, and whether he is allowed to lift the ball, and put.

DO YOU KNOW?

The first English railway took place on the Thames off Hungerford Gardens in 1775. It was called the Maidenhead Railway, and was the first of its kind in the world.

The hall must be played from where it lies. That is, that a ball which is on the green, and is not in the hole, must be played from where it lies. The putting surface is that portion of the green from which the natural surface has been removed and another substituted.

The penalty for a breach of this rule is distinguished from that of an infraction of a rule, inasmuch as the latter is a full knowledge of them, and also the fact that the player who plays the wrong ball is not aware of the fact.

IN THE COLONIES.

Amendments in Anti-Sedition Legislation.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT].

In the House of Commons recently Mr. F. L. Methallen (Coburn Valley) asked the Secretary of State for the Colonies in how many territories under the Colonial Office amendments have recently been placed on the statute book designed to make more severe the sedition clauses of existing legislation, and in what territories it is proposed to take such action?

Sir F. Cunliffe-Lister: In one colony, where no such legislation previously existed, a Bill has recently been introduced to prevent the importation of seditious literature. There has been other Colonial legislation on the subject of sedition during the past three years, but its general object has been to clarify the existing law, not to increase its severity.

Right of Search.

Mr. Methallen: Can the right hon. gentleman inform the House whether in that particular instance there is a right of search similar to that proposed in the present Government Bill in this country dealing with sedition?

Sir F. Cunliffe-Lister: No, Sir, not without notice, but if a question is put on the Paper, I will try to answer it.

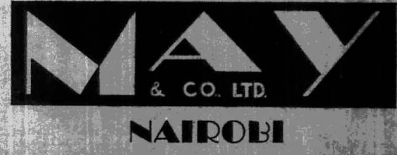

as a consolidation of the crises and most inevitably provoke further murders on the one hand and consequent reprisals in the form of direct action by ourselves on the other.

We call upon the Europeans of Kenya, whether torsempic pastoralists, planters or agriculturalists to put up a solid front in resisting by every possible means that attempt to deprive the younger generation of colonists of their inheritance.

SQUATTER STOCK

After a discussion on the abolition of squatter stock, the meeting passed unanimously the following resolution: "That this public meeting is in favour of the total prohibition of native owned stock in the area as represented at this meeting."

A further resolution was passed in the following terms:

"This public meeting is in favour of local option with reference to native owned stock being introduced as an integral part of the new Squatter Ordinance. They are further of opinion that the Ordinance should make the extent of native owned stock in the Highlands illegal under any circumstances. It has further expressed its favour of keeping local option in favour of squatter stock."

FARM FINANCE

By unanimous consent the meeting expressed the following view on the urgent problem of agricultural finance:

"This public meeting strenuously affirms its desire to see some satisfactory steps taken to prevent foreclosure on farmers for debts contracted before the present fall in commodity prices, a course which has been taken in the agricultural communities of the Mombasa taken in Foreign Commerce Commission, (vide "The Debtors' ref. U.S.A. Economic Bibliography No. 2, Washington, D.C., March 1933, Agricultural Department Library.) It also urges the implementation of the minority report of the Mortgage Advisory Committee with this end in view."

This latter resolution has been sent to the Economic Development Committee, the Elected Members organization and the member for the district, the Hon. Mr. E. H. Wright who incidentally attended the meeting for the discussion of the Carter Report.

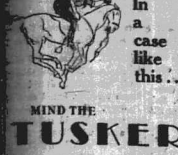

pastoral semi-nomadic, semi-nomadic tribes which had committed a series of murders, including possibly that of a European.

Native Stock Problem. Taking the points in order, the merits of the grant of a million shillings to a tribe which made no economic use of the land which it administered, he reminded the meeting that a few years ago the country had received the economic recommendations of an Agricultural Commission which sat under the chairmanship of Sir Daniel Hall, a chairman of world repute. That Commission, amongst other things, recommended the restriction and reduction of native stock in the reserves. Had any step been taken to give effect to that recommendation? None whatever. They were to look forward, therefore, to a gradual increase, except as nature intervened, and the whole of the Africa was filled with stock in the type for which the million shillings was now being provided. As regarded any historical claim in support of the Sanbaris, even the Commission admitted that it was hazy, that there was little support for it, but although they hoped that the report will settle all land questions for ever, they invited the question for reply.

It had been impressed by the statement made by Mr. Kerr regarding the conflict of opinion between the officers who had tendered evidence on that particular question. He would welcome statements from those in residence in the neighbouring area.

Blasted Members Attitude. In reply to a series of questions from the public, Mr. Wright said that in his opinion the withholding of the recommended grant would not be sufficient punishment for the murders which had been committed.

As regards action on the part of the Elected Members, Mr. Wright announced that Lord Francis Scott had asked for the suspension of the action recommended by the report, until the subject and the report had been discussed by the Legislative Council of Kenya. It was known that the Secretary of State for the Colonies had, however, given the instructions for the recommendations of the report to be given effect and that raised the constitutional position.

He did not consider that the best procedure would be to take a leaf out of the Sanbaris book and deny the country, as they had done. Either he thought that they should put forward their case to the Elected Members of Council and the people of the country and work for their reformed support.

Major Edwards hoped that the Hon. Member had appreciated the deep feeling of the public present at the meeting and had realized that they desired plain and definite action by Blasted Members. He considered the members of the audience were standing at the head of the parade.

The Hon. E. H. Wright said he considered the attitude of those present who had spoken was both reasonable and respectable. The resolution, having been again read, was put to the vote and carried unanimously. The Chairman conveyed the appreciation of those attending the meeting to Mr. Wright for his presence.

The O.B.E. has been conferred upon Dr. Maclean of Tanganyika; and on Mr. C. N. Lewis of Nairobi.

The M.B.E. has been conferred upon Messrs. A. J. Field and T. S. Stone, of the Kenya Service; Messrs. J. R. Dyer and J. E. S. Griffiths of the Tanganyika Service; and a well known Indian business man of Uganda.

The Imperial Service Order has been conferred on Mr. C. F. Bristow, late of the Kenya Police and Mr. J. F. Fernandes of Uganda, while two African ex-members of the Kenya Police received the Imperial Service Medal.

BRITISH ISRAEL NOTES.

Britain, the Earliest Christian Nation.

At the Congress of Pisa (1499), Cosimo de' Medici (1489), Simon (1424) and Banks (1444), the British title to priority was established beyond dispute, the claim being maintained that the Church in Britain had been founded by Joseph of Arimathea, thus immediately after the passion of Christ.

The statement made by the British historian, Gibbon, to the effect that Christianity was introduced into Britain "in the latter part of the reign of Claudius Caesar," fits in well with the findings of these famous Councils, the Joseph arrived in Britain *several* post passion Councils.

Caesar, a Roman, the famous Valerius Licinian, quotes a Valerius MS. under the year A.D. 30, stating that Joseph and his companions landed at Marseilles and proceeded to Britain, where, after preaching the Gospel, Joseph died.

A quaint account of the meeting of Joseph with the King of the Britons, is given in the *Golden Legend*.

One century later, Britain became the first of all nations to adopt Christianity as a national religion. It was during the reign of good King Lucius (circa A.D. 170) that the great King of the Britons, King Vortigern, was converted to Christianity and thus was the first of the British Kings to be baptized. King Vortigern was also the first Christian King in Britain.

"Our Most Religious King," King Henry II, is a remarkable fact that the first Christian Church in Rome was equally linked to the British Empire as a whole, official by the Church of St. Peter (circa A.D. 320). There was no doubt that the British King, King Titulus—otherwise known as the Hospitalier of Rhodes or Palestine.

This wonderful coincidence was the home of Rufus Paganus, who was the first Bishop of the infant Church in Britain. 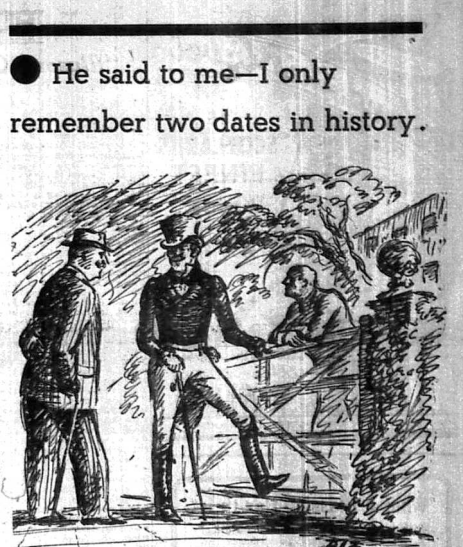

Fort Smith During the Raucous.

PIONEER'S RECOLLECTION.

Party Traveled to Uganda by
 Bulchawa.

Dr. H. A. Bookler gave the first instalment of his series of lectures on "Early Days in East Africa" at the McMillan Memorial Library, Nairobi, last Thursday evening. The lecture was well attended.

At the conclusion of his last talk Dr. Bookler had mentioned that towards the end of 1897 the general outlook of affairs in East Africa had been greatly disturbed by various events, followed by a period of trouble, hardship and suffering. It had arisen primarily in Uganda where constant trouble prevailed among the people controlled by Mwanga and Kabunga, which necessitated the Military forces being actively engaged in punitive measures against the unruly tribes in Uganda. In Kenya, on the other hand, conditions were far more peaceful in every way.

During the early months of 1897 Fort Smith had been invaded by many marauding parties of their way, and both Mr. Hall and Mr. Lane had had to provide unbounded hospitality to every party. On one occasion a large party consisting of three hundred and nine men belonging to the C.M.S. arrived with a curious and strange train of camels, which the speaker believed was the first to be seen on the roads of this Colony, while they also had with them a number of horsetoefters.

Among other visitors were Herr Schilling, who had travelled up from German East Africa; Dr. Max Schuller and Herr Kaiser, who were accompanied by an escort of regular German native troops, who were serving in British Territory.

The Diamond Jubilee.

On June 22, 1897, the Diamond Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Victoria was celebrated in splendid fashion, and a programme had been arranged by Mr. Hall for the enjoyment of all. Included was the "Agenda" item for the natives, which the speaker believed was the first of its kind to take place at Fort Smith, while in the afternoon a shooting match was held between the Europeans, and as a special favour Sudd bin Sulaiman, an old slave trader, had been invited to take part in this. The land for the contest consisted of some fully wooded area, and played by the late Capt. Dugmore, who, at the time, was C.O. Troops Agency, was two victims

played by the Goan clerics at Fort Smith.
 The Jubilee celebration at Machelo was inaugurated the first race meeting held in the Highlands, and it was a great success. Mr. Hall's "Temporary" was winning the cup presented by Col. Ainsworth.

Other visitors passing on their way home were Dr. Mackintosh and Capt. Madock of the Uganda Rifles. On August 5 a remarkable caravan arrived from Eldama Rauru, which was the first of camels carrying loads of game trophies. The leaders were Messrs. Cavandish and Andrew, who had travelled right through from Tabora in British Somaliland. While passing Lake Rudolf they had seen the volcano by the lake-shore, which was at the time very active.

The First Ox Wagon.

In October the outstanding event was the arrival of Mr. Fellbam with two Oxpe waggons loaded up with trade goods and provisions on behalf of Messrs. Smith Mackintosh and Company. They were the first waggons to come up from South Africa and were landed at Machelo.

Mr. Fellbam also brought with him an excellent lot of Cape Bay Sheep from South Africa who were experienced in the running of waggons as well as in the tending of huge teams of oxen. They only just managed to get beyond the Kikuyu Railway Station, where a rider-pole broke out among the oxen, and Mr. E. J. Shelly, who became C.V.O. in Kenya in later years, strongly recommended that the whole herd of about 80 bullocks should be destroyed to prevent the infection from spreading.

The Uganda Mutiny.

The month of November might be regarded as the beginning of all our troubles in East Africa, though the speaker, as it was during that month that the Uganda Mutiny broke out, and the big fight took place at Fort Lumbwa between the masters of the Uganda Rifles and the Government forces. It happened shortly after the arrival of the late Sir Arthur Hardinge, K.C.M.G., who was then British Consul-General for East Africa, on his first official tour.

The rebellion, although short-lived, was hot and fierce, resulting in a large number of casualties on either side.
 On November 12, Major H. R. Thurston, the Officer Commanding the Troops in Uganda, Mr. Wilson, the District Officer in charge of Fort Lumbwa, who was the only hold prisoner for some time, and Mr. Scott, an engineer employed by the Uganda Government were all killed and shot down with

Martini rifles by the order of the late Bihl Grenfell, who was the notorious ringleader of the four companies of the Uganda Rifles that had mutinied together. The fight that followed at Fort Lumbwa, several other European officers were killed, and the late Sir Frederick Jackson was shot through the lungs with a bullet. His life was saved by Dr. Mackintosh, who rushed in to the firing zone despite a wound in his leg. For this act of bravery Dr. Mackintosh was rewarded with the decoration of the Order of the C.M.G.

Lord Delamere.

About Christmas time the late Lord Delamere passed by Fort Smith on his first trip to East Africa. He had started from Berbera in British Somaliland and had travelled towards the Abyssinian border. While on his way he had his own medical attendant, Dr. Atkinson, and Mr. Giles who was an expert photographer.

On Christmas Day Mr. Hall received a large party of Europeans in the evening and on Boxing Day news came in that a big herd of elephants was entering the native abomas on the Kiambo and had killed a native. A shooting party was organized and altogether 19 elephants were killed, and eventually the remainder of the herd moved off towards the Lamuru Forest.

Masi-Kikuyu Squabble.

The year 1898 started off with a very serious quarrel between the Masi and the Kikuyu of the Daggetti District, resulting in a big fight among the Moran of both tribes. The cause was attributed to the insolent behaviour of some young Masi youths in a squabble among the women of both tribes hartering goods to each other. In these days the slightest provocation immediately raised a terrific row among the women. This had a shrill piercing note that echoed far and wide, and within an unbelievable short time the whole countryside was swarming with fighting men armed with spears, shields and swords, running towards where the war was being raised.

During the early part of 1898 a constant stream of Indian troops passed through Fort Smith. Obviously the Foreign Office had expelled reinforcements from India on the outbreak of the Uganda Mutiny, and during the March the first contingent of the 21st Bombay Infantry Regiment arrived at Fort Smith under the command of Captain Scoble, and in the month of May, Colonel Hevone turned up with the rest of the battalion under his command. In April 1908, Mr. Hall went on leave and his place was taken for the time being by the late Mr. Wise, who had had a most interesting and remarkable career in

East Africa. He knew Mr. Stokes intimately, who had been hanged by the Belgian authorities in the Congo, and the speaker believed they were in partnership together while trading for ivory in G. E. A. before Mr. Wise had joined the Company in 1894.

Railway Officer Murdered.

In the month of June, Dr. and Mrs. Bookler had gone on safari to Chief Wangwani's village, about 15 miles from Fort Smith, and it was during that time that they heard of the brutal murder of Capt. Haslam of the Uganda Railway Staff by a little section of the Wakhuyu living beyond the Ruaha River. Captain Haslam was very keen to see native cattle, and had tried to explain this to the natives. As they rushed forward, however, he unfortunately fired his revolver over their heads, thinking that it would frighten them, but he was horribly speared to death and both his Indian who accompanied him were also murdered.

Some time later the news reached Mr. Wise, and Captain George of the Uganda Rifles, who was sent out to see the murderers, which he did very severely. The decomposed and mutilated body of Captain Haslam was placed in a coffin and carried to Fort Smith and buried in the little graveyard. This concluded the third instalment of the recollections of early days in East Africa and it is hoped that Dr. Bookler will, at some future date, be able to continue with his most interesting narrative.

POST OFFICE GUIDE.

Amalgamation of Post Office Services.

Quite recently the postal services of both Uganda, and Tanganyika were amalgamated into one unit, and there has just been published the 1934 Post Office Guide which gives full information concerning the whole. The combined services are now under the control of the Postmaster General, who has just been appointed to Nairobi, but for the purposes of administration each territory is under separate control, as follows: Kenya, Deputy Postmaster General, Nairobi; Uganda, Assistant Postmaster General, Kampala; Tanganyika, Deputy Postmaster General, Dar es Salaam. The 1934 Guide comprises 250 pages exclusive of a very full index, and the matter is divided into appropriate chapters, from the sale of stamps to wireless licences and broadcasting regulations. Amendments are issued from time to time in the form of supplements at appropriate prices.

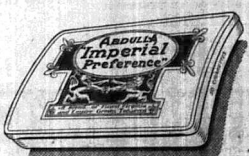
