Fusion of Political Parties in South Africa.

EFFECT OF AGREEMENT BY THE LEADERS.

Basis of New Organisation.

INAUGURAL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD IN DECEMBER.

Following on the announcement published last week that an agreement had been signed providing for the fusion of the major political parties in the Union of South Africa...

In the meantime, the provincial and federal congresses of the existing parties will take place, when those meetings will be requested to endorse the basis of the new party.

The attitude towards fusion of Dr. D. F. Malan, the leader of the C. N. P., lists and of the extreme wing of that party, has been announced.

The present agreement makes no reference to certain controversial issues regarding the Union in the Empire, and leaves these subjects to be dealt with by the congress in December.

The Position of Dr. Malan.

A cable message from Pretoria on Monday afternoon stated that Dr. Malan had been signed by General J. M. Hertzog, the Premier and leader of the National Party...

Commenting on the present political situation in the Union, the Johannesburg "Sunday Times" states that fusion will be an accomplished fact before the end of this year.

According to the arrangements made in Cape Town at the conference of the new party will be held during the summer months, but before the Provincial and Federal Congresses of the South African Party...

The National Party Congress will also be held as soon as possible after the adjournment, and when the new party has been formally dissolved, membership lists will be operated for the first time.

New members will be formed in the districts in readiness for the inaugural conference in December.

Outline of Programme. The broad lines of the programme to be followed during the next few months is as follows:—The basis of the new party will be published to the leaders within a day or two of the end of the year.

The basis is not a programme of policy, but a statement of the seven points of the Coalition agreement, and is intended as a starting point for the final battle between the two wings of the Coalition seven points will be called together at the same time—probably on June 20.

Provincial Congresses. Immediately afterwards the provincial congresses will be called to meet, the programme being the basis and recommending the dissolution of the existing parties.

The Federal Congress of the new party will be held in December, and will be the final meeting of the existing parties.

## An Infant Roller Skater

Scientific Experiments with Twins

A MEDICAL correspondent to a London newspaper describes a remarkable story of an experiment upon twin boys which was recently carried out in America. The experiment shows the effects of early training on the infant upon the behaviour and physical characteristics of the growing child.

The weaker twin, selected as the experimental baby, shortly after birth, was subjected to daily exercise for five days the week from the time he was twenty days old. The stronger brother was brought up on a regular programme, with a minimum of handling or contact with others.

### Learning to Swim.

The records of the growth and development of the two babies during the first years show no remarkable similarities and equally remarkable differences. The ordinary "milestones" of infantile development, such as holding up the head, sitting alone, walking upright, were for the most part reached at the same time.

On the other hand, the experimental baby, after the regular training he had received, could when less than a year old, crawl up an inclined plane placed at an angle of sixty-one degrees, move about with balance and place complete control on roller-skates, swim under water, and make the initial movements towards diving into a pool.

Even greater differences were to be found in the attitude of the twins when faced with various experimental situations. The experimental twin was stated to be fearless and willing to attack any difficult situation, while his "ordinary" brother was cautious and obviously insecure when placed in the same situations, being more inclined to cry and call on adults for help.

### How Acrobats Begin

It is stated that the study is as yet incomplete, and further observations are in progress. It is astonishing that training in

early infancy can produce effects not only in striking contrast to the development of the untrained twin, but exceeding that of any other baby on record.

Tamara Seroffsky and her twin sister, who are now ten years old, were born in the Bronx, New York, and were brought up in a home where they had the opportunity to test this in the form of a scientific experiment. The twins were available, and after three years, the use of twins in this respect represents the perfect scientific material.

## Uncommon Uses for the Common Orange

IT is not generally known that a great salad can be improved by the addition of an orange. Here is a recipe for a salad to serve with cold meat that will make even a cold shoulder look palatable.

Divide an orange and remove the skin. Squeeze a little lemon juice over it, add some pineapple and a sliced tomato, sprinkle with an egg-powder of castor sugar and a pinch of salt and leave for a short time. Place the fruit made the heart of a fresh lettuce, and pour over a dressing of fresh cream seasoned with pepper, salt and a little soured and onion juice. Serve cold.

Oranges as Grapefruit. If grapefruit are obtainable, use large seeded oranges as a breakfast dish instead. Cut them in half, remove the centre with a sharp knife or grapefruit cutter, and loosen the pulp from the sides. Sprinkle with a few drops of orange or mandarin liquor and sugar to taste. Place a spraincho cherry in the centre and serve on ice.

He added, "that a man does feel the temptation to drink in the Tropics, but I do." That replied the chairman, was a view that had been expressed before.

Mr. Hopley also complained that the licensing committee of the person of the Welfare Association, although he imagined it a body of highly respectable people who objected to drinking.

An entire misapprehension, as claimed Mr. Or, Mr. Hopley persisted that nothing was known of the membership of the committee, of the principle, and he concluded by putting in a signed petition in support of his licence. Mr. Or described this as a false argument.

The Chairman read a minute of the Association meeting held on May 11 under the chairmanship of Casey Wingfield Dwyer, at which Mr. Or and Mr. Mortimer were mentioned to represent that body as the licensing committee and Mr. Hopley that during the sitting of the select committee appointed to inquire into the licensing laws details were published of the organization, membership, etc. Mr. Hopley, however, still wanted to know what proportion, so far as numbers went, of the community that the Association represented, the numbers in good standing, and how many resided in this particular area.

According to the Acting Town Clerk, Mr. W. W. Wade, the Municipal Council a few years ago were very keen to give a trading licence, and it was granted subject to the conditions that there should be no licence and no bar; but no licence was taken out until this year.

Both Mr. Or and Mr. Mortimer strongly supported the Council's objection on the ground of necessity, and the application was refused.

in 1933. Of the 298 African were imprisoned in terms of the new law, and were transferred to Kibee, one including four short-term sentences of imprisonment and 216 ordinary sentences of three and five years, but only five of the total were previously convicted. The other 293 were sentenced to terms of imprisonment ranging from one to five years, and 232 to short terms of imprisonment not exceeding one year. Of the total, 100 had been previously convicted.

There was an increase in recidivism from 1932 to 1933. In 1932, 102 of the 242 convicts were re-arrested, as against the highest 147 of the 202 convicts were re-arrested in the town.

**DELINQS.**  
Arising out of this analysis, two points of the report are interesting.

The first relates to debtors, and says—  
"During the year a rule was introduced under the Prison Rules abolishing the practice according to which civil debtors were allowed to receive daily earnings for the work they did in prison, thus bringing the local practice into conformity with that existing in England. That this rule has had an excellent effect upon certain classes of prisoners who apparently preferred a few weeks civil imprisonment annually to paying their taxes is evident from the following report from the Superintendent of Lenau Prison—  
"It has been customary for civil prisoners merely to be confined in prison, all sweeping, cleaning and water drawing being done by detainees and convicted prisoners. As a result it has become almost a habit of mind to undergo six weeks civil imprisonment, and to make no attempt to pay any part of the tax. At the moment there are over thirty civil prisoners in the goal, and there is reason to believe that that number will be more than doubled in the near future. During the previous year I have quoted and much to their advantage, these civil prisoners are now being made to make their beds, sweep their cells, wash their plates, and draw their own water, in addition to sewing, mending clothes, which is the only work of an industrial nature for which material can be provided without cost to Government."

the conservation of water, (2) consider the possibilities of bore holes near Nairobi, (3) to take all possible steps to hasten the new supply.

This in turn led to a comprehensive report by a Mr. A. H. W. Thompson, an authority on water boring, on the question of drilling for water at points within easy reach of the main Kikuyu pipe-line, and one bore was put into operation. Meanwhile the Ruiru scheme continued under examination, and the statement says—  
"Finally in December 1933 the Council reviewed the whole problem as presented in the reports of the investigation and having considered a variety of criticisms and points of view from the various organizations interested in the scheme, they forwarded a report on the scheme to Government in January 1934. A further report, prepared with a view to enabling the Council to submit a formal application to Government for sanction to borrow the necessary loans for the scheme, was dispatched to Government on 19th July, 1934."

**CONSTITUTIONAL ENGINEER.**

Two months later, the P.W.D. granted the water permit, and Council had decided to proceed with the preparation of a detailed scheme when Government again requested the appointment of a consulting engineer. Mr. Humphreys accordingly arrived in the Colony on May 14 of this year for the purpose.

The statement next proceeds to review "facts concerning the proposal" by the Municipal Council of Nairobi to improve the town's Kikuyu supply. From these it learns that the Council installed a little more than nine miles of piping, with a total cost of £13,000, which considerably improved the supply, while in 1932 a chlorinating plant for water purification was put in.

As a summary of eight years' experience with the Council's statement will not doubt give an answer to the Aga Khan's policy.

## THE FIRST TEST MATCH.

### A Draw Expected at Trent Bridge.

#### AUSTRALIANS DECLARE SHORTLY BEFORE LUNCH.

#### England 379 Runs Behind.

Partnership by Hendren and Geary followed by collapse of the tail.

Can England save off defeat in the first Test Match at Trent Bridge, Nottingham? With all their wickets in hand and a full afternoon's cricket ahead of them, they are 379 runs behind.

Yesterday, after ninety minutes' play, Australia declared their second innings closed after losing eight of their wickets for 273 runs. The best that the old country can hope for is a draw which it will have to fight hard to get it.

McCabe, the Australian middle batsman, was again a thorn in the side of England, and he and Brown played a wonderful innings for Australia. Two early disasters, the dismissal of Woodfull for 2, and then Ponsford before he had reached double figures, were followed by Bradman going for 25, four less than his total in the first innings.

### McCabe in Form Again.

Standard Correspondent and Bester's

England has her back to the wall in the first test match against Australia. The early disasters which attended her first innings, was followed by a complete collapse on the part of the tail. Three wickets fell for the addition of only two runs. Hendren and Geary made 100, but with the dismissal of Woodfull at the end of the first day there was no one to hold the fort.

But whatever the disasters that may have attended the home innings, there was to attend the visit of the tourists, who were led by Woodfull and Ponsford with only 52 on the board. Bradman once again proved that he does not play fast bowling too well, and fell a victim to the Essex attack.

The second break produced four runs for the loss of three wickets. It would now appear to dislodge itself into a question of expediency. What Woodfull's attitude will be to-morrow remains to be seen. If it comes once quickly, then it is possible on the board that he will declare just before lunch, in which case, the English skipper may respond by putting in "the tail" at the same time, to avoid the loss of valuable wickets. The state of the wicket must decide.

It remains without doubt that Australia are in the stronger position, and England will have to fight hard to avoid a defeat in the event of a declaration to-morrow before lunch. Whether or not it will be a case of "falling on the sword" will be decided following Woodfull's tactics.

### To Have the Follow-on.

One of the most pleasant surprises that has been the result of Hendren, in partnership with Geary. Their stand was a remarkable one, and proved the way towards England avoiding defeat. At the same time, the form of Ponsford has been all to the good, and had he had another fast bowler to aid him, there it might have been that a difference, say, would have come into play, which had always the case—what might have been.

#### Special Mission to Britain.

King Leopold III.

["BY WIRELESS."] Rugby, June 12. Le Duc Duxel, and members of a Special Mission to announce the accession of King Leopold III of Belgium will arrive in London this afternoon, and will be received in audience by the King to-morrow. The King and Queen will entertain the Mission at luncheon at Buckingham Palace on Thursday evening. The dinner will be given by the Foreign Secretary on behalf of the Government. On Friday evening the Mission will give a dinner at Hyde Park Hotel, and they will depart for Belgium on Saturday. — British Official Wireless Service.

### END OF LONG DISTANCE FLIGHT.

#### American Airmen at Rome.

["THROUGH BETTER'S AGENCY."] Rome, June 11. The American trans-Atlantic airman, Captain Ford and Lt. Sabelli landed here to-day after flying from London.

### Political Prisoners Rounded Up.

["THROUGH BETTER'S AGENCY."] Madrid, June 11. The authorities have closed the strike of field workers at Madrid has ended. Many police reinforcements were drafted to Madrid from various provinces.

### Seven Thousand Arrests.

["THROUGH BETTER'S AGENCY."] Madrid, June 11. According to reports received here, 700 Spanish political prisoners were rounded up during the last few days, and will be sent to concentration camps in the Canary Islands.

### A Serious Clash.

Madrid, June 11. Despite an official statement that all is quiet, the rumour persists of a serious clash in the South of Spain, where a strike of police, when several persons were killed. Military have been dispatched to the Badajoz province to do the investigating, while the local military hospital has been opened as a result of the strike. A bomb was thrown during the night into the Spanish Government in Ciudad Real and another in the small group of workers outside a garden party at Madrid home and fractured the skull of the small daughter of the householder, who is not expected to recover.

#### Currency Rumour from Paris.

#### Berlin Statement.

#### Reduction to Paper Dollar Rate.

#### EQUIVALENT TO FALL OF 40 PER CENT.

["THROUGH BETTER'S AGENCY."] Paris, June 11. Private advices from Berlin credit the German Government with the intention of devaluing her currency in July, on the present paper dollar rate, which is equivalent to a 40 per cent devaluation.

### RAILCARS IN ENGLAND.

#### Experiment by the Great Western.

["BY WIRELESS."] Rugby, June 12. The Great Western Railway will introduce a new experiment in railway transport next month, when express stream-lined railcars carrying 40 passengers will run on the Birmingham-Corfeist route. The cars will carry 120 tons of cargo, running on heavy oil will be capable of a maximum speed of 75 to 80 miles per hour, accomplishing the 117 1/2 mile journey at 40 to 50 miles per hour, including two stops.—British Official Wireless Service.

### SERIOUS HURRICANE IN CENTRAL AMERICA.

#### Township Completely Wiped Out.

["THROUGH BETTER'S AGENCY."] There were over 2,500 casualties in the recent hurricane in San Salvador, El Salvador, according to messages from various points. The township of Ocotepique in Honduras was wiped out, and 600 people were drowned. An aeroplane, after flying over the district, reported that a section from Laiburto to Launion is suffering from serious avalanches from the sides of the volcano.

### ALLEGED BREACH OF PRIVILEGE.

#### Committee Presents Its Report.

["BY WIRELESS."] Rugby, June 12. A motion making the House of Commons for the approval of the report of the Committee of Privileges was laid in by the Prime Minister last night and will be debated to-morrow. The newspaper state that the Government will request the publication of the evidence and documents laid before the Committee.—British Official Wireless Service.

### THE DISTURBANCES AT OLYMPIA.

#### Repetition Not to be Tolerated.

#### OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

#### Government's Responsibility for Maintenance of Order.

["THROUGH BETTER'S AGENCY."] London, June 11. The Home Secretary was today questioned in the House of Commons in regard to the Fascist meeting at Olympia after which he made a statement to the effect that a repetition of disorderly scenes on the scale recently witnessed "would not be tolerated, and if continued, the executive authorities might have to be armed with further powers to preserve public order."

### Economic Recovery in Britain.

#### FOREIGN TRADE OUTLOOK STILL UNCERTAIN.

#### Equilibrium Not Yet Reached.

Although a large part of salvage work in Britain has been accomplished and the recovery programme is under way, equilibrium has not been reached in various factors which are vital to stability of the new order. This statement was made at Derby by Sir Josiah Stamp, the well-known economist.

Commenting on the situation, the "Economist" states that a revival of foreign trade must be looked for to a further advance in trade activity.

### Railway Traffic.

["BY WIRELESS."] Rugby, June 12. Sir Josiah Stamp, the well-known economist, in a speech at Derby said that in Britain a good part of the salvage work of recovery programme was under way but no one could say there was yet a clear prospect for regained equilibrium between home and foreign trade, between spending and saving, between divisions of resources, between sending and receiving, between home and foreign and foreign investments, all of which were vital to the stability of the new order.

**KENNEL NOTES**  
by Margaret Collyer

Mrs Collyer, Gilgil, to whom correspondence in connection with "Kennel Notes" should be addressed, does not hold herself responsible for accuracy of statements made by her which are, in the main, based on information supplied by her correspondents.

Just a moment, before we pass on to the last couple of breeds relative to the Samoyede family, I mentioned in my last article that the show was originally a cross between the Eskimo and Tibetan mastiff. This made him a foreign breed; therefore, "not pure" and not being "pure" he had to be made profitable. He was made up of many ways. In the Yin Dynasty, four officials were a pair of sable tails round their necks. Some many officials were appointed by the Court, there were not enough males to supply tails for all of them, so they had to use dog's tails instead.

The Tibetan mastiff was introduced into China as early as 1121 B.C. The people of an area in the West of China sent to the Emperor Wu Wang, a dog, 7 1/2 feet high and was trained for man-hunting". There is substantial evidence to prove that dogs, so savage as to be hunted by tigers, were used as guards at the doors of the halls of singing girls, to allow only men to pass in who were regular customers. Mung Ts'ung, on his visit to China, found there very large dogs of this type.

The Iron Claw like the untractable blood head and intense frown of his Tibetan ancestor. There are some others that have the Samoyede head, and who hardly appear to be Chows at all. Although China is still rich in dog-flesh, unfortunately the Bozer revolution accumulated literature of great authority. The colour of dogs was of much importance and indicated all sorts of strange things. A note from the Chinese Materia Medica of 1260 B.C. says, "Disease comes out of the ear. A dog may be used for the weight to keep the disease in."

We are still learning, and now having so dismissed from my mind the work of modern German veterinarians, and searched deeply into the Archives dealing from B.C. I can tell you, if I receive details of colour of the dog that tell you, what coloured dog, or dogs (possibly) to get to bite you as an antidote.

Here we will pass on to the Schipperke, another variety of the Samoyede family. For years the Schipperke was supposed to be a terrier. A tallish breed, at least at first thought so by those outside the "know".

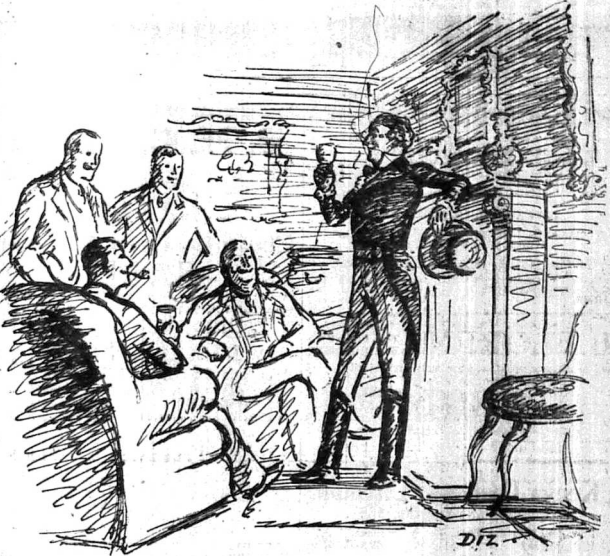
The loss of stern is, however, a matter of opinion. The tail was removed not to improve the dog's appearance but to prevent the little barge whisking valuable off the narrow deck of his vessel into the canal.

These little dogs are the guardians of the Belgian barges; little "skippers" in fact. Their work in life is to run up and down the boat from stern to stern, to see that nothing is stolen as it glides slowly past the banks of the canal.

There is really excessively little known as to the origin of the Schipperke; at all; it is only suggested that he is a short-coated Spitz, and he certainly owns the double-coat of the family. He carries a mass of harsh hair that starts from behind the ears and ends a little below the shoulders; the males showing more mate than the females; he also owns high breeding, or ruffles as it is usually called. "Drake" was the name of the first of the breed brought to England. Then Mr. Joachim imported two, "Fritz of Spa" and "Shroton" in 1860. In 1880 the Schipperke club was formed.

Last, of this group, but not least, comes the Alsatian. I have had no experience of this breed,

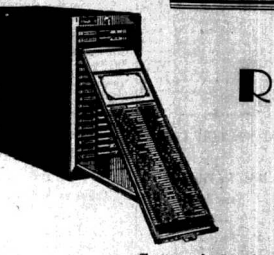

AUSTRALIA WINS FIRST TEST.

England Out for 141 in Second Innings.

LAST WICKET FALLS WITHIN TEN MINUTES OF TIME.

A Crumbling Wicket.

RADICAL CHANGES ANTICIPATED FOR NEXT MATCH.

A sensational collapse on the part of England in their second innings gave Australia victory in the first Test match at Nottingham, which concluded on Tuesday. The home country's "tail" made a dismal show, and ten minutes from time Woodfull and his men won.

And so it falls to Australia to strike the first blow towards regaining the "Ashes," which they lost to Jardine and his men just over a year ago. Drastic changes are anticipated in the English side for the second game at Lord's a fortnight hence.

To O'Reilly and Grimmett must go the credit for bringing about the collapse on the part of England. The latter's analyses are little short of the phenomenal. McCabe has been the outstanding batsman of the Australian side, whose folding has been commended upon as being infinitely better than that of the Englishmen.

A Larwood Rumour.

(Standard Correspondent and Bester's).

London, June 11. Australia has held the first blow towards the regaining of the "Ashes." The representative scored a splendid win over England today, when they dismissed the home country for the second time in 141.

The pitch was hard and dry when play was resumed this morning, and McCabe and Brown immediately started for the wicket with a view to gathering runs as quickly as possible in permit of an early declaration. Ninety minutes before lunch Woodfull declared, thinking that whatever happened Australia would be in a safe position for a draw at least. McCabe was anxiously taking in the slips with the total at 181. He had batted resolutely, gathering his runs in just over an hour and a half, his main scoring strokes being one 6, and three 4's. It was in complete contrast to the painstaking effort of his partner, Brown. Darling came out with the intention of going for everything, but was taken at his first shot. He was dismissed by Walters, who had dropped the ball. It was an error of judgment, and came off very nicely. The ball was in the air for a few minutes, and like the previous batsman, got out in attempting to clear the ball from the bowler.

A Remarkable Catch. With the total at 214 Brown went on to amass catch behind the wicket on the part of Ames. The batsman had been playing well, and was hitting out at everything which came his way. Ames appeared to drop the ball, but he was not. He had been at the wicket for about half an hour, and hit only three 4's in his 73. He then was taken at backward point, from a very fine delivery. With himself and Grimmett together the innings was declared closed at 278. The home side's little prospect of a win for England then. The best they could do hope for was a draw, but whatever their prospects in this regard they were doomed to disappointment. Walters opened with Studdiffe again. Both batsmen played with an almost certain eye for the wicket. With three to his credit the Yorkshire batsman had a very fine innings, and was hit by the fast bowler—Wall,

and immediately after was struck on the knee, this time in the ribs. This led to a mild piece of "barrack," on the part of a section of the twelve thousand present. Runs came slowly, but both were very steady, and taking few chances or risks. Studdiffe was the first to go falling to a wonderful catch in the slips, where Clippell, field took the ball with both hands two inches from the bat. The ball had spun off the bat straight to first slip. With his captain he was ordered to add just over the half hundred—a fair start under the circumstances. Hammond had a brief stay going after he had scored 16, Grimmett tempting him out of his crease, and Oldfield smartly stumped him. Walters was next to go, at 91, completely missing a ball which came in from the off to hit the wicket. A pallid knock, he had made a fine effort to hold the fort for England.

The Bot Starts. From this point onwards a "ret" was in. Peatnick picked out the wrong end, and was taken at deep mid-off when he asked the ball from the off, edging at a faster line from O'Reilly. Five wickets were down for 110. Things looked bleak for the northern country, but were soon yet for hold. Ten was taken with the total at 115.

In the 100 hours battling Leyland, for once adopting defensive tactics, was a wonderful patient and perseverant. Ames was bowled playing back to the spinner. Like the previous batsman, the Kent man showed the greatest patience, and was at the wicket for over an hour for his twelve runs. From now on it was nothing more than a slow procession with ten minutes to spare Australia won the first Test match. The atmosphere at the hands of the clock moved round, and Ames could be said to owe his win to the wonderful bowling of Grimmett and Walters, who also to the poor crease of the home team, particularly on the part of O'Reilly, who kept an amazingly accurate length, and got a tremendous amount of gain (Continued on page 3.)

Troops are confined to barracks and public buildings are guarded by "shock troops" owing to the grave situation caused by the dispute with the Central Government over the new Catalan Land Law. The only topic of discussion is the possibility of the proclamation of the Catalan Republic.

A huge crowd gathered outside the parliament buildings and shouted "Long Live the Republic and Death to Traitors," while the Spanish flag was removed from the President's motor car and the parliament buildings. In order to calm the passions of the crowd the Catalan Premier declared that the Central Government would have to use force to prevent the enforcement of the Land Law.

The Land Law was passed by the Catalan Parliament and nullified by the Central Government, whereby farmers undertake to pay land taxes and other dues. The law was referred to a Central Government Tribunal which declared that the measure was null and void, whereupon 36 deputies including Catalan Federates, Socialists, and Basque Nationalists walked out of the Cortes, declaring they would not return unless the Government modified its attitude.

A Separate Kenya Mines Department.

MR. E. B. HOSKING SECONDED AS COMMISSIONER.

Result of Industry's Progress.

The Government of Kenya has decided to separate the Mining and Geological Department from that of the Local Government, Lands and Settlement, in view of the important developments in the industry.

Government Decision.

Mr. E. B. Hosking, O.B.E., having been seconded with effect from June 11 to the Mining and Geological Department as Commissioner of Mines.

Mr. Hosking has already been connected with the goldfields since 1920, for in that year he went from Mombasa to Kakamega to open the administrative station. On his return from leave in 1932 he was again stationed at Kakamega as Manager of Mines, until June, when he was transferred to the Secretary as principal assistant to the Commissioner for Local Government, Lands and Settlement for the purpose of dealing with mines matters. By then, the opening up of the Kakamega gold fields had begun to assume importance.

In January of the year following Mr. Hosking, while still principal assistant to the Commissioner, was appointed Acting Commissioner of Mines.

The Commissioner of Local Government, Lands and Settlement—whose title was subsequently increased by the addition of the word "Mines"—went on long leave in November of last year, and Mr. Hosking was appointed to the acting position. On the former's return this month, with the re-constituted of the Kenya Local Government, the separation of the Mines from the Department became desirable. Hence the appointment to which Mr. Hosking has now been gazetted.

It will also be recalled, that the mining industry has pressed for some time for a separate department and although Government kept an open mind on the subject at the time, the recent extensive developments in the Department—became desirable in the interest of the higher companies, have together made changes in the situation sufficiently important and promising to warrant a decision being taken now to establish a separate department.

### Newspaper Criticism.

ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY. CONVERSATIONS AT VENICE.

Facing the Problem of Its Survival. NEW MEMBERS NEEDED.

An Appeal to Kenya to Save an Essential Organisation.

The Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya is in grave difficulty. The margin of time now available in which it can be saved from extinction is very limited.

The most important fact in the situation is that the Society must have an assured revenue if it is to survive and carry on the services given by it to the country since its inception.

No less important is the acceptance of responsibility by all communities in the Colony to see that the Society is raised to a position which such an organization should and must occupy in an agricultural country.

Two things are wanted—member and donations. Of these, members are the most important and it is the purpose of this campaign to appeal to the communities in Kenya to give the necessary support, encouragement and strength to the Society which membership alone can provide.

The membership figures are not a credit to the country. They comprise: 210 Full Members, 81 Nairabi Members, 22 Nakuru Members, 19 Uasin Gishu and Trans Nzoia Members.

The total membership of the Society of all classes, last year was, therefore, only 372. This figure discloses the real position and it is to be regretted that the people of Kenya do not see that it is not by the only real solution—more, and still more, members. Although the agricultural industry of the Colony is passing through the most difficult period in its history, it cannot be sufficiently emphasized and realized that the progress of the main industry of the country centres around this Society and its functions and consequently essential that the organization should be preserved.

An Honourable Position. It is a 'Royal' Society. There are very few Agricultural Societies in the British Empire which have that honourable distinction, especially in so young a country as Kenya, and it would be a great discredit to the Colony and a blot on its reputation if a Society on its reputation is allowed to disappear.

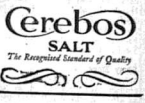

### GRASS FOR LANDING GROUNDS.

Reducing Maintenance Costs.

### VARIOUS EXPERIMENTS.

Experiments are at present being made at the Nairobi aerodrome and on the landing ground at Kakamega with a view to finding a suitable type of low-lying grass that will stand up well and give the ultimate object being to use the most suitable grass for grassing the principal landing areas in Kenya. In this way it is hoped to reduce maintenance costs in respect of grass cutting.

An acre of ground on the Nairobi aerodrome has been planted with assorted grass, but the experiments are mainly concerned with grasses called "Diboo" or Poona grass and Kakamega there is a local type of grass which has so far shown excellent promise, but tests are also being made on bare patches with Kibuyu grass.

It is believed in some quarters that the Poona grass will prove to be the most satisfactory, however, for it is stated that it becomes so thoroughly matted that it completely prevents the growth of other grasses, whereas the improved locally, where the black rock soil is of a more friable nature, is different from those in most other areas.

The "Diboo" or Poona grass originates from India, and has been used with success on sports grounds and golf courses at Mombasa. It has been shown excellent promise under trial grass, whereas it still remains to be seen how it will stand the effects of the dry season.

It is a very grass, whereas the Kibuyu type is bushy. Generally speaking Kibuyu grass has done well in the Highlands.

### To Bind the Sill.

As black cotton soil cracks badly in the dry weather it is hoped to find a grass which, in addition to being a good pasture grass, could, if and necessary, will tend to bind the ground firmly so as to provide a smooth, landing surface for aircraft. The main consideration in the experiments, which are being carried out by the Public Works Department, however, is the reduction of maintenance charges.

Another factor that is receiving attention is the prevention of scouring by storm water action on the landing grounds. To date the Poona grass has shown the best promise of the different varieties being tested, but it would be premature to form any definite conclusion at this early stage in the experiments, there has only been one main season so far to add the observations.

In this particular case, the problem which has to be solved is that of a regular and dependable income and the only proper solution is to insure the life of the people of the Colony. It is hoped that in the course of the next few weeks approval will be forthcoming of the determination of the people of Kenya to keep alive and vigorous a body which performs so many useful and essential services and that the results of approval will be the growth of the Society will be very largely and permanently increased. This is the real aim.

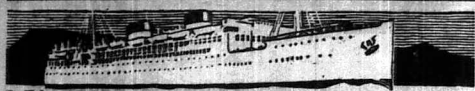
