Italy Falls into Line. No Arms for War in Gran Chaco.

British Officers Did Not Wear Uniform. Turkish Eskozets.

Britain Suggests General Embargo. International Effort to Prevent War.

Following on the announcement by Sir John Simon yesterday, which was received with general satisfaction, that the Italian Government would meet the necessary measures to prevent a shipment to be sent to Portugal and Bolivia from Russia, the United Kingdom Government, who have suspended all licences since May 9, have sent a telegram to the Secretary General of the League of Nations.

It is they say that they are now prepared to enforce the complete embargo.

POLAND DEVASTATED BY FLOODS. Thousands Homeless; Warsaw in Danger.

WARSAW, July 23. Four hundred thousand people are already homeless near Sandomierz, south of Warsaw, owing to the floods, and many may be in danger in Warsaw itself.

Eighty thousand soldiers and members of land are under water to the top of the city, and one-third of the centre of the country is devastated. Already carrying torrents of water from four swollen rivers, the Vistula is being reinforced to night by further rain.

Inspection of all exports of arms and war materials, including components for such licences were suspended before May 9. Before taking this action, however, they suggest that a telegram be dispatched to all interested governments requesting if they will now put an embargo into force, without restriction, if possible before the end of this month.

Britain's Initiative. The 'Times' in a leading article says the addition of Italy to the embargo is a necessary initiative of Great Britain in May to prevent the export of arms to the belligerents.

Over 150 People Attend Successful Function. 'Planters' Week' Ball at Kampala.

KAMPALA, July 23. The twenty-third conference of the Uganda Planters' Association, known as 'Planters' Week', came to a close on Saturday evening when the annual ball was held at the Kampala Club. His Excellency the Acting Governor and Mrs. Scott were present, and about 120 planters and friends from all over Uganda attended.

The evening was most successful and dancing continued till about 1 p.m. A feature of the dance was the decorative effect achieved by the planters, being fitted up as a typical Uganda planter's shanty. The result was original and highly creditable.

Austria Thrown into State of Tension.

SOCIALIST PLOT AGAINST GOVERNMENT. Over Thousand Arrests.

ACTS OF TERRORISM STATED TO HAVE BEEN INSPIRED FROM GERMANY.

Austria has again been thrown into a state of tension as a result of the discovery of a Socialist plot against the Government. Over a thousand Socialists have been arrested, and in consequence of the overcrowding of the prisons a concentration camp has been established.

In an official statement the Austrian Secretary of State for Security declares that there was evidence of the Socialists and Communists having combined under orders from the Nazi organization and of their having been morally and materially inspired in acts of terrorism by Reich and German circles in Munich.

Concentration Camp Established. (TROTSKY BROTHER'S AGENCY.) Vienna, July 23. Government has been discovered, and during the past 48 hours over a thousand socialists have been arrested. The participants in which are likely to be summarily tried to-day.

# NOTES FOR WIRELESS FANS

## The Condenser • Capacity or Capacitance

ONE or several metal plates in the diaphragm to the strain in separated by a thin layer of insulating material. Condensers have different dielectric constants so that all other things being equal, a condenser with a high dielectric constant would have a greater capacity than one using air for this purpose. If for no other reason than that they can pass alternating current through some circuit or portion of a circuit, condensers of the type I.e. of non-variable capacity, are met with very frequently in receivers.

**Capacity.**  
The actual quantity of electricity which will be stored up in a condenser under such conditions depends on the voltage applied to it and on its "Capacity." If the charging voltage is removed and the two elements of the condenser joined together by a conductor, a flow of current will take place until the charge is exhausted. The capacity or capacitance depends on the number of plates in each element, the area of these plates, the distance by which they are separated, and on the nature of the dielectric.

**An Illustration.**  
The action can be illustrated by an hydraulic analogy if a circular closed pipe filled with water in the form of a diaphragm is divided into two parts there are placed a plunger or piston and a rubber diaphragm representing capacity. If condensed. If a force is applied to the pipe a flow of water will occur until the diaphragm will be displaced up to the point where the diaphragm balances the force applied, after which the flow will cease. When the force originally applied to the diaphragm is removed, there will again be a flow in the opposite direction until both diaphragm and piston have returned to their first position.

Direct voltage applied to a condenser therefore cannot cause a continuous flow of current—merely a sudden charging current. An alternating voltage on the other hand will first charge the condenser in one direction and then in the other causing what is effect is an alternating current flow through it. Reverting to the analogy, but this time with alternating current. A force (voltage) set in one direction and then in the other would be applied to the piston causing an alternating flow of water (current). The dimensions and the material of which the diaphragm was made would then correspond to the capacity and the dielectric produced

### Notes of the Week.

ON SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

A Very Profitable Daylight Search.

"STATIC" in the evening has been heavy on wavelengths above about 25 metres and reception considerably interfered with. Most of my listening was done during the latter part of the week and for reception of the Zone 4 Empire transmission the best plan then appeared to be to utilize the lower wavelength for the first hour and a half or so by which time atmospheric on the higher and superior signal was available.

I THOROUGHLY enjoyed the Variety on Thursday night especially the Humming Commentaries on the 4th Test Match (to read the next day) by General Howard Bolslein (?) during which

the bowlers appeared to spend a considerable portion of their time running round the gamometer in the intense heat prevailing.

If Saturday afternoon is a fair sample of conditions prevailing at that time of the day they must have improved since last I listened. P.H.I. (Holland) was in its usual form giving an exceedingly strong and steady signal which rubber overmodulated its next neighbour G.S.I. The twin Empire transmitters G.S.I. (I.B.F. metres), however, made up for this being almost the equal of P.H.I. Later during the course of transmission 3. G.S.G. had improved somewhat though it could not be compared with the Dutch Station and the 19 metre Empire transmitter was completely swamped by T.V.J. (Vatican City) which until it closed down at about 5.45 came over at tremendous strength. As data below 30 metres is negligible during the day it is rather interesting to try these wavelengths occasionally and to compare reception with that available after dark. The limiting factor or the strength with which such transmissions can be received appears to be only the sensitivity of the receiver and the amount of "noise" introduced with the great amplification.

### Queries from Listeners.

J. T. W., Korohu, in the course of a letter dated July 6, very kindly sends in a report on reception during June and the first few days of July. He comments on the fact that wireless at the time of writing is very unreliable, es-

pecially from T.L.O. the speech from which station is difficult to follow. His report takes the form of a comparison between reception from London and Nairobi.

The Nairobi transmission is described as poor or worse on 16 occasions and good or better on six. The remaining reports are of an intermediate character in showing variations such as very good up to a certain time followed by deterioration or complete fade out or poor on starting up with a subsequent improvement.

London is reported poor on six occasions but is much set often used for T.L.O. on 15 and 16 good on 10. On one occasion there was a deterioration from good to poor in the course of the evening.

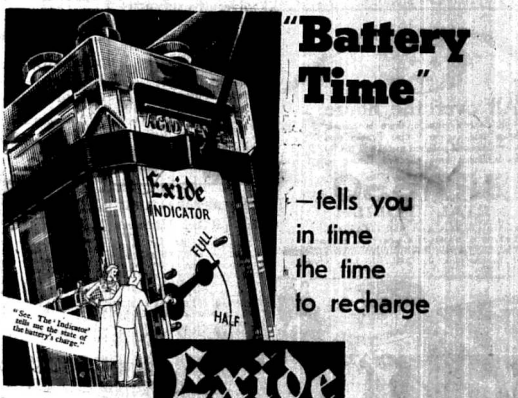

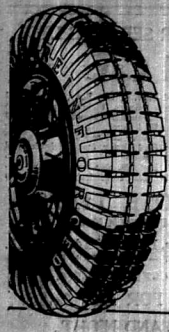

Mining Leases in Native Reserves.

RECOMMENDATION BY KENYA LAND COMMISSION.

Debate in Legislative Council.

AMENDING LANDS TRUST BILL REFERRED TO SELECT COMMITTEE.

The first of the recommendations of the Kenya Land Commission yesterday, the subject taking the form of a Bill to amend the Native Lands Trust Ordinance of 1930 with a view to providing for security of tenure of mining leases in Native reserves.

The Bill was accepted by the House in principle, but it was decided to refer it to a select committee on points of detail. Emphasis was laid on the generous provision for compensation to Natives disturbed by the taking of their lands for the development of the mineral resources of the Colony.

Later, when the Report of the Commission has been discussed in full, the amending Bill will be incorporated in a new Ordinance.

Native Interests Thoroughly Safeguarded.

The Bill amending the Native Lands Ordinance, which provides for a temporary measure giving effect to a recommendation of the Kenya Land Commission, was introduced in the Legislative Council by the Kenya Legislative Council.

The Commission now recommended a third method which for the purpose of the market had called the "settling-up" method, that where a mining lease in a native reserve, the surface area of the necessary land would be set apart, and the lease would be granted over the same.

The Attorney-General went on to explain the system under which the necessary land would be set apart, and to the Provincial Commissioner who explained the details of the Bill.

Describing the Bill as the first of the Kenya Land Commission Report, which in principle at least had been accepted by the Government of Great Britain and Kenya respectively, he pointed out that the details of the matter—the Attorney-General, moving the Bill, was supported by the Government.

The Bill for the purpose of enabling the natives concerned to give their views on the Bill to the Provincial Commissioner was satisfied the land should be set apart, they had to agree to an area not exceeding 30 acres by notice to the Governor, subject of course to the approval of the Provincial Commissioner.

Compensation Clause. IMPERIAL PREFERENCE.

Experimental Commitments of Gibe.

During yesterday's session of the Legislative Council the Hon. J. E. Pankaj asked: "Will Government state the steps so far taken, and proposed to be taken, to establish a market in India for some of the perishable commodities produced in Kenya which are finding their way to India in increasing quantities?"

The Hon. the Director of Agriculture, in reply said: "From time to time investigations have been made by the Agricultural Department as to the possibility of export of perishable commodities to India. Such investigations are being extended to other products from time to time."

Arrangements are being made at the present time for experimental commitments of goods to be forwarded through the shipping agents with a view to testing the markets in India, within a month.

Representations were made through the Secretary of State at the Imperial Conference in Ottawa for a measure of imperial preference for Kenya produce in India. As a result preference was secured on a variety of commodities, including a number of other fresh and preserved vegetables and fruit."

There would be an increase of 20 per cent in the rent. The speaker was opposing an amendment under which provision would be made for the temporary exclusion of land from these reserves as envisaged in the Report, although it was not thought that power would be used very often.  
Concluding, he thought the House would agree that the native lands were being properly treated in this matter, and that the mining companies would have no difficulty in satisfying any compensation demanded of them by the Bill.

**Official View.**  
The debate from the unofficial side was opened by the Hon. Conroy Harvey (Nyanza), who told Government that it was high-spirited and somewhat hasty legislation would ever have been necessary, had the advice of the Hon. members of the Executive Council been accepted. The Government refused to accept the advice of the Hon. Secretary of State was advanced in his rejection of that advice. To spite of the fact that European elected Members supported the main principles of the Bill, starting the desire of the Land Commission to secure the confidence of the natives to the fullest degree and to secure to the native land owner the full and unfettered enjoyment of his tribal land.  
At the same time Mr. Harvey on behalf of his colleagues, asked Government to send the Bill to select committee for examination of some points of difference. The list of those was the composition of the Local Boards which, as proposed, were to consist of the District Commissioner as chairman and four members of the Local Native Council. Mr. Harvey asked that the Bill should be allowed to proceed as being, because of their knowledge of Kenya and native conditions, highly qualified to assist in this very important work of settlement and valuation. With all respect, Mr. Harvey suggested, administrative officers were not monopolists of all wisdom—anybody could be a good administrator if they reached the rank of Provincial Commissioner. Otherwise, it was a complete negation of the principle laid down in the Report. He suggested that the Bill should be sent to a select committee, but that the Bill should be sent to a select committee which has so much about it from time to time.

**Native Interest.**  
Hon. R. W. Hainsdale—who was a member of the Kenya Land Commission—said that one of the two members representing native interests on the Commission stated that the Bill followed closely the recommendations of his Commission.  
Beyond asking a question as to the position of land partly subject to rights holding and partly not, Mr. Hainsdale contented himself with the comment that, in the interests of the natives, had been fully safeguarded. Cauton the Hon. G. Burns, his colleague on the Council, asked that Government should allow two members of the Local Native Council rather than that the Provincial Commissioner should nominate three of the four. He also paid a tribute to the generous way in which the question of compensation had been dealt with, and hoped the same would be as wide as each as possible.  
No Safeguard Omitted.  
No safeguard had been omitted, contended the Acting Chief Native Commissioner, to safeguard native interests, and he spoke as one associated with the work incidentally to the introduction of the Bill. He replied to the criticism of the personal of the Local Board, he held that the recommendations of the Land Commission in this matter should be carried out, addition that there were other persons, such as agricultural officers, equally qualified as the soldiers to give advice. As to the three methods of dealing with the land, the majority of natives would prefer the "setting apart" method, in that they retained the right to return to their land in the future, however remote that right be, rather than surrender forever their right.

**The Indian View.**  
At this stage the House was told by the Hon. J. B. Dutt that on the day previous, two representatives of the natives had come to him and asked him to help in getting the Bill delayed for three or four months and to refrain from implementing the recommendations of the Commission, until they had

had time to digest the Report. Also, the Bill was designed to give security for foreign loans, the speaker raised the question of similar provision for those who had invested large capital in the mines in the reserves.  
The Hon. J. B. Dutt stated that the Indian-Indo Member Organization had decided generally not to speak on matters where the interests of the country were involved, unless such matters were very important indeed. Ordinarily therefore he would have kept silent on this Bill, except that he wanted to bring up one or two main points about which he felt doubtful. One was the composition of Local Boards, which the speaker felt should represent the interests of all people who were invested capital in the reserves. He also criticized the fact that the Commissioner's report was in itself a deal with personal interest of a whole, a practice that he hoped would not be continued, and reminded Council that only three years ago measure had been passed and the same recommendation that was made in the last session on which their land would be transferred with the Provincial Commissioner for Nyanza having approved of the proposed composition of the Local Boards, the Attorney General made a brief reply to one or two criticisms, stating that the remaining points would be reserved for the select committee to which the Government had referred. The second reading was then agreed to, and the Bill referred to the select committee named above.

**EAST AFRICAN BAR GOLD STOLEN.**  
(Continued from page 1).  
The stolen gold comes from East Africa—the bulk of it from the Lupia Gold Mines. This information was given a representative of the "East African Standard" yesterday by Mr. J. W. S. Branker, Area Manager in Central Africa for Imperial Airways.  
The consignment of 25 kilograms, he stated, was made up of approximately 15 kilos from Mweya (eight kilos from Kinuani, and about two kilos from Nairobi and Kampala). The loading at Mweya was supplied by the Lupia gold field and that at Kinuani by the Kakamega mines.  
Precautions Taken.  
Referring to the precautions taken by Imperial Airways to prevent theft or loss of gold and other goods consigned by its users, Mr. Branker explained that there is an elaborate system of signature-checking in force.  
"Normally," he said, "everybody who handles the gold has to give a signature to the person from whom he receives it."  
"For instance, if a pilot takes on gold here he has to give the station superintendent a signature for the amount loaded, and has, in turn, to receive a signature for it before he hands it over to anyone else."  
Special Looker.  
"We take every possible precaution to safeguard it and the gold is kept in a special locker on board the aircraft."  
"People are not allowed to export gold from Kenya, so that all gold passing through the country not only has to be handled carefully for fear of loss, but it also has to be shown to the Customs authorities and has to be Customs sealed and custom controlled on its way through Egypt."  
"Every conceivable thing will be done to recover the stolen gold."

of the district commissioners and Government officials on the spot. I think everybody will agree that these few hundred men would be quietly provided for in the old Land Trust Ordinance. The result has been that of absolutely fully so, I have never heard more serious talked about any subject than about what is going on in the mining areas. I have heard some good things—Mandara in the House who recalled that—people who certainly had not been to Kenya, and if they had they would not have had an extraordinary imagination of how we were going to create a second Kenya, and great areas of desolation from which natives were being driven, or expelled. Not a single native has been turned in one of them, and what surprises me about the whole matter is not the amount of the disturbances, but the amount of it.

Unconstitutional.

Now I come to one matter on which a recommendation was made by the Commission with which the Government here are in agreement. They recommended that there should be substituted for a local board a minor board. We have given consideration to this matter, and the Cabinet have arrived at a very definite conclusion, and that is that that proposal would be constitutionally unsound and practically unworkable. It must have been considered by me in the House, and I have no doubt they felt, as we in the Government have felt, that the constitutional side of the recommendation was made under a complete misapprehension of the functions of the Privy Council. The suggestion is that the local board should be responsible to the Privy Council. Such a thing is not possible, and the Cabinet have no right that the ultimate responsibility must rest with the Secretary of State responsible to the House? It is quite uncontrollable that this House should either the Secretary of State or itself, which is much more important, of the power to exercise that responsibility. It is essential that on any question of administration or policy this House should have the right to hold the Government to their responsibility. If that is once laid down, then the idea that a board should be established in London, independent of the Secretary of State or the House of Commons, is absolutely unconstitutional and impracticable. Mr. Graham White (Lab. Birmingham E.): Will the right hon. gentleman explain how the procedure set forth in the recommendations would ultimately differ from the existing arrangement?

Quite Impossible.

Mr. P. Cluff-Lester: I think it will differ entirely, because it would not seem to the Privy Council itself to have any direct relation to the Secretary of State or to this House at all. But let me make the practical side of this matter. How on earth could a board in London do the job which the Commission recommended that this board should do? It is in no way in constant touch with the officers and the Government and the Chief Native Commissioner, it has got to be able to sit in the House, it has got to be able to consult with the local advisory councils and so on, and I simply do not understand how the board could possibly function. I know that of two things would happen. Either it would be absolutely impotent, or you would have the most interminable delays. It attempted to change its functions as it should do, it would find within a very few weeks that it was not good sitting in London and it would have to transfer its sittings to Kenya. I discussed this matter with the Government in Kenya before I came home, and I think it is indeed a very important question, but I am bound to say—and I am stating here the carefully considered judgment of the Government—that we believe that not only would such a proposal be constitutionally inconvenient in respect to this House, but that it would be practically quite impossible, and we are satisfied that the board should be based in Kenya. I would observe on the question of security, on which there was a great deal of talk, that the fact that the greatest element of security is going to be provided by the increase of the reserves being defined by the

Order in Council, which the Board cannot touch at all.

Kisumu.

Let me add a word about the mining areas. As an association fully so, I have never heard more serious talked about any subject than about what is going on in the mining areas. I have heard some good things—Mandara in the House who recalled that—people who certainly had not been to Kenya, and if they had they would not have had an extraordinary imagination of how we were going to create a second Kenya, and great areas of desolation from which natives were being driven, or expelled. Not a single native has been turned in one of them, and what surprises me about the whole matter is not the amount of the disturbances, but the amount of it.

The Church has taken an interest in the matter. I am sure the House will give it a true account. But first should be thought to be a blind or prejudiced witness let me read the opinion of the Bishop. Some things express opinions on Kenya without knowing it, but the Bishop, the Bishop of Capetown, says Kenya is the greatest of all the African States. At the end of his remarks, "Times," dated 10th May, he says:

I would like, if I may, to make two further observations based on my own experience on the spot. One is that up to the present time the Government have been forced to discontinue an account of his and his, and at any rate pay for his plantation, have remained in the country. The other and more serious to make is that if it is right as far as I personally am concerned, since the earth, even though the surface is native owned, then everything that is done to ensure that the original native owners are those that native interests in the whole area shall not suffer."

Goldfield Future.

Looking to the future as far as one can tell, I am not going to advise as to whether there is or is not gold in the country. You have not here a territory with a vast area of gold running continuously. You have a surface of narrow veins at a considerable distance from one another, some apparently very rich. It is most probable that in the development you will have what I predicted more than a year ago. It may be one of the most fortunate developments in mining that have ever taken place, a development and the Chief Native Commissioner, to native labour but employ it on the ground, creating the employment and increasing the market for what they produce. That seems to be the only happy outcome. Kenya has its fair share of problems and they are not less serious in the past. So long as the criticism is constructive and based on knowledge nobody objects to it. It will always be welcome. But criticism which, if I may respectfully say so, is based by prejudice and ignorance, and which, if anybody need pay an undue regard, I would appeal to all those who are interested in this matter to realize that above all those who people in that country are anxious to obtain is the certainty that breeds a sense of security, confidence and co-operation.

Empire Theatre.

There must be thousands of people in the world who have seen "East Lynne." As an association of tragedy it made no emphasis. This talking version of what was a great stage play and silent picture is acted by Ann Harding who plays Lady, Olive Brock as Lawson, and Conrad Nagel and Richard Dix as David and Susan who left her child and husband to search for a better life, but find failure, bitterness and heartache. Ann Harding has a character that suits her better than anything she has played before. Her first return to East Lynne after her absence of this genre of Paris gives her scope for her own excellent talent and also as a tragic figure, as in her blind, she leaves her child and home and returns to her death. The picture moves through scenes of the society splendour of mid-Victoria days, to the embers and war in Paris. "East Lynne" is one of the few strongly emotional pictures that has sufficient dramatic characteristics to ensure its success.

Capitol Theatre.

The names of San Francisco's Chinatown, the plot, intrigue, and torture of a struggle between opium and revolution form the background of a romantic story "Bon-Daughter," showing at the Capitol Theatre. Helen Hayes is a beautiful Chinese girl who sells her soul to the opium king, but she never forgets her father, although she marries a man named Lee (Benson). There is an Oriental charm about this film. Helen Hayes is as exquisite as a pear blossom, her old father (Lewis Stone) is a cultured Chinese gentleman, and Wang (Oland) is extremely villainous. The original and setting are so spectacular, especially in the scene of the great feast and the March of the Chinese. Despite all essentially a romance, the picture has dramatic moments, of for instance when a prisoner is about to be tortured and poison himself, rather than risk betrayal of his country. "Bon-Daughter" is a full of Chinese mystery and intrigue as the scenery of Hollywood can make it.

Princes Theatre.

"Madness in Uniform," the play written by Christa Winsloe, was the talk of the dramatic world in London last year. It is a psychological study of a sensitive girl who is thrown into the hard, military regime of a girls' school in Prussia—a school "for the naughty, delicate, who will also be the mothers of soldiers." It is a gloomy, bare institution, run by a handful of nuns. The girls, in their adolescent emotionalism, all yearn for freedom. The original, Christa Winsloe, is a Frenchwoman. This silent adaptation combined with the hardness of the school, the nuns, and especially Madeline, into a state of hysteria. It is an interesting and unusual theme, and the playing of Dorothea Wisniewski as the mad girl, and the playing of the un-entranced of the school life to tragedy, but in the film this is avoided, although in some other detail the picture keeps closely to the original. It is full of atmosphere, the very buildings being typically Prussian. As a film "Madness in Uniform" is most unusual. It gives food for thought, and an extraordinary insight into the emotional upheavals of the schoolgirl. It is remarkably well acted.

Paris-Brindisi Link.

Mr. O. R. Simmonds (U. Birmingham Duddeston) asked the Under-Secretary of State for Air if he will state the reasons why the railway journey from Paris to Brindisi is still a link in our Empire's air services. Sir P. Seaman: Negotiations with a view to making the whole journey by air are in progress with the French authorities. Mr. Simmonds: Can you say whether the Hon. Friend say whether he has any hopes of an early result from these negotiations? Sir P. Seaman: Yes, I have great hopes.

Air Mail Stamp.

Mr. D. G. Somerville (U. Willingdon East) asked the Secretary of State for the Colonies which of the British or mandated territories have introduced the use of special air mail stamps or have introduced them. He has been any developments in this respect by any of the Colonies or mandated territories during or since 1933?

The Secretary of State for the Colonies (Sir Philip Gaultier-Latour): The use of special stamps for the collection of air mails is a matter for consideration by the local postal authorities. I am not aware of any developments in this respect during or since 1933. As regards the use of air mail stamps, I have nothing to add to the reply which I gave on the 6th of June, 1933, to the hon. and gallant Member for Birm. Duddeston (Mr. Simmonds), showing at the (Kin-Edwards), which I am sending you my friend. A Captain (Lester): The use of special stamps is important in encouraging Imperial air routes, will my right hon. Friend look into the matter and see if anything can be done? Mr. P. Seaman: I have looked into the matter, but there is no prospect in having a special air postage stamp, and I am in my previous answer, that would merely add to the postal cost. All air mail letters carry a blue air mail stamp under the Convention.

## EUROPE ON BRINK OF CRISIS.

### Attempted Coup by Austrian Nazis. CHANCELLOR DR. DOLFUSS TAKEN PRISONER AND SHOT.

#### Siege of Government Offices.

ITALY STAGGERED BY EVENTS. WATCHING ANXIOUSLY.

A critical situation has arisen in Europe as a result of an attempted coup on the part of Austrian Nazis to seize power in Austria. The coup failed but Dr. Dollfuss, Chancellor of Austria, has been murdered.

An astonishing story is told in messages from Vienna of a rescue attempt. A false message announcing the resignation of the Government was first broadcast from the Vienna radio station after the supervisor had been threatened with death by eight Nazis who broke in and compelled him to read the announcement.

#### CHANCELLOR INVADDED.

Later, 150 Nazis dressed in police uniforms invaded the Chancellor where a Cabinet meeting was in progress, shot Dr. Dollfuss, imprisoned several Ministers, and held out for a number of hours against batons of troops and police who invaded the building.

Although Vienna after one of the most eventful days in its history is now quiet under martial law, the events of Wednesday have startled and alarmed all Europe.

There is no proof that the attempted coup was instigated by Germany, indeed the Nazi Government denies connection with it, but it is felt that the German attitude to Austria at least gave encouragement to the revolt.

#### ITALY'S ATTITUDE.

Italy particularly, guarantor of Austria's independence, is watching anxiously the developments in the situation, but is unlikely to take extreme action without consultation with France and Great Britain.

In the meantime the Government of Austria has regained complete control and Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, formerly Minister of Education, 39 years of age, a staunch Catholic, and an ardent monarchist, has succeeded Dr. Dollfuss as Chancellor.

#### Germany Denies Responsibility.

Vienna, July 27. A serious situation developed in Austria today. At the present time the position is somewhat obscure but the essential factor appears to be an attempted coup by Austrian Nazis. Dr. Dollfuss, Chancellor, has been shot and several Ministers have been killed. The first indication of the state of affairs was the publication of a decree proclaiming a state of emergency. This was issued the afternoon following a broadcast announcement that the Dollfuss Cabinet had resigned. The subsequent news of the shooting and the mobilisation of the army of the Heimewehr, who, with food supplies and moving stores, surrounded the Vienna broadcasting station and isolated the Minister of the city from the rest of the capital by strong cordons.

#### Prime of Starbarnberg. Chief of the Heimewehr.

A sequence of a threat made by the Nazis to blow up the famous cathedral at St. Stephen's. If this Nazis awaiting trial on a charge of sabotage were sentenced to death. The threat hinged upon the fact that Herr Gerl, a prominent member of the Socialist Party was tried by a special tribunal and hanged yesterday. The trial of the two Nazis was to have been held today but the tribunal is not sitting until tomorrow morning, therefore after yesterday's trial. In the meantime the Government has de-announced that the accused Nazis will receive as little mercy as die Gerl.

#### Police Report Broadcast.

It was learned later that Nazi terrorists broke into the studio of the broadcasting station and beat up the supervisor. The supervisor of the station immediately arrested the intruders and isolated the Minister of the city from the rest of the capital by strong cordons.

#### Establishments of armed machine guns.

Establishments of armed machine guns were set up in Vienna buildings and everything appeared to be quiet in Vienna. It was reported that large numbers of Nazis were gathering in the city and other officials were being held in the city.

### The Pocket Chancellor.

agreed to any successor appointed by the President if bloodshed could be avoided.

President Miklas, however, refused to judge with the rebels, and ordered Dr. Schuschnigg, with full powers, to flee the country.

Martial law has been proclaimed throughout the whole of Austria. Vienna itself is strictly held by the Army.

Cabinet Meeting Rushed. The story of the attempted Nazi coup is now becoming more complete. The first move was made at 11.30 a.m., during a meeting of the Cabinet. One hundred and fifty Nazis in police uniforms who had been meeting at an address close to the Chancellor and arrested Major Fey and Karwenky.

Dr. Dollfuss had already left the room but had been shot almost immediately as Major Fey was at once contacted by the Nazis at another room in the building where he found Dr. Dollfuss lying upon a sofa in a dying condition, shot through the throat.

It also appears that the official announcement at the broadcasting station had a revolver placed to his head and a paper was put before his eyes. This was ordered to (Continued on page 5.)

Dollfuss a Prisoner. It is confirmed that Dr. Dollfuss is a prisoner in the own office while the insurgents, etc., also holding Major Fey and Karwenky the Under-Secretary for Defence.

The authorities had more success at the broadcasting station where they succeeded in arresting all the eight men who had broken in and broadcast the first false report. The station resumed normal working at 2.45 p.m.

#### Communications Suspended.

London, Later. All telephone communication between Austria and the outside world has been suspended.

Christians Socialists. Dr. Hittelner is a member of the Austrian Socialist Party which represents the Right, and is largely conservative with a definite Roman Catholic influence. One section of the Party is monarchist and another seeks to unite with the many, but owing to this division of opinion it is highly confused, it is unlikely that the effect of Dr. Dollfuss recently belongs to the main Party.

A prompt official denial was issued in reply to the report of the Government's resignation. Although confirmation of earlier reports from the broadcasting station was not received, it later became clear that an exciting struggle was proceeding and this gave colour to the stories of the revolt.

#### Fighting Starts.

Sounds of rifle fire were heard coming from the windows of the Langasse Street, which are all military movements were pursued with energy in the street.

#### Manufacturers of Munitions.

Austria during his two years' regime.  
**A Right Wing Party.**  
The party in power represents the Right Wing in Austrian politics. There is a definitely Roman Catholic clerical influence both in its policies and in its educational policy. The party was divided on two issues—the reorganisation of the monarchy and union with Germany, but after approval of the new status quo in the interests of Austrian independence. Since the collapse of the monarchy in 1918 Austria has been a source of anxiety to the rest of Europe. The country was largely destroyed, a temporary status being imposed by the Peace Treaty.

**“Fatherland Front.”**  
The reply of Dollfus was to create an organisation called the “Fatherland Front,” a patriotic body above all parties. He selected as the inauguration date the 20th anniversary of the delivery of Vienna from the Turks, gained widespread public support, practically killed the old party system, and promulgated a new constitution for Austria, bearing some resemblance to the Italian model. He did not want to be a dictator, but the weakness of the party system forced power upon him, and he was eventually driven by an intense patriotism to prove to the world that an independent Austria could stand alone.  
**Courage Admired.**  
In any case the loss of Austria independence would have been a grave embarrassment to the rest of Europe, and accordingly all powers outside Germany have given open encouragement and support to his policy, not only because they admired his courage, but because they knew that his fight was a test case of the whole Peace Treaty structure.

**Frax Dollfus.**  
treaty and the new state included elements lacking in a positive national sentiment. Many Austrians felt themselves to be a part of the German Reich and considered the independence of Austria a betrayal, guaranteed by the treaty of St. Germain, to be purely a temporary status before merging with Germany.  
**An Apt Pupil.**  
The late Austrian Chancellor, Dr. Ignaz Seipel, one of the most prominent politicians of his country in the post war years, set out to make independent Austria really capable of standing on its own feet, as an economic unit. He was not, however, an economist, and did not complete his task. He had, however, an apt pupil in Dr. Dollfus who, in the two years of his regime, had greatly strengthened the economic structure of Austria, reduced unemployment, partially restored the adverse trade balance, and carried on the work of the League of Nations in the rehabilitation of his country's finances.  
He also carried through an important Austro-Italo-Hungarian economic consultative pact signed in Rome intended on the principle of bilateral trade agreement to improve Austria's trade position in Central Europe.  
**Fight for Independence.**  
Politically, however, Dr. Dollfus had had to wage a constant fight for the independence of Austria against the Nazi movement which obtained constant encouragement from German sources. For a time the Nazi leaders in Germany made boasts of their intention to compel the incorporation of Austria in Germany by terroristic methods, and it is only a few weeks ago that Herr Hitler found it necessary to promise Signor Mussolini that he would in future keep his hands off Austria. This promise was exacted from Hitler by the Italian dictator as a condition of renewed Italo-German friendship.  
Dr. Dollfus also carried out, last year, a trade agreement with Poland which further solidified his position.  
**Napoleonic Little Chancellor.**  
Europe first heard of this Napoleonic little Chancellor in 1933, when he crossed over with Franco and Britain over an affair of the importation of arms. The two powers asked for a more solemn statement that the arms had crossed the Austrian frontier, but Dollfus signified the refusal as an

insult to the honour of a sovereign nation.  
The rapid rise of Dr. Dollfus to prominence was due in no small measure to Hitler, who, together with his party, favoured the anti-German policy which was weakened so long as seven million Austrians-Germans continued to reject the swastika.  
**Real Threat to Austria.**  
The attention of European powers was drawn to the Nazi threat to Austrian independence by his long campaign of terrorism and violence, instigated from Germany, during the spring and summer of last year. Shootings, bombings, intimidations and so on, only had the effect, however, of awaking Austrian patriotism, ralling a large number of the population round Dollfus, and obtaining, eventually, Italian French and British recognition of Austria's status.  
The German Nazis invaded Austria by air, dropped propaganda leaflets, and in Munich a wireless station was clandestinely employed in broadcasting anti-Austrian speeches. European tension grew daily until the powers threatened and serious negotiations ceased.

## EUROPEAN SITUATION UNSTABLE.

### Echoes of Nazi Revolt in Austria.

#### VIENNA QUIET BUT FIGHTING CONTINUES IN DISTRICTS.

#### International Repercussions.

BRITAIN AND ITALY TO UPHOLD INDEPENDENCE PRINCIPLE.

Although the position in Vienna, following on the revolt of the Austrian Nazis and the murder of the Chancellor, Dr. Engelbert Dollfuss, is superficially quiet, the fires of revolution are still smoldering in the provincial districts.

Severe fighting between Government forces and Nazis has taken place in Styria and Carinthia, and there were thirty fatalities in a clash at the steel-manufacturing centre of Leoben. Up to the present nine hundred Nazis have been imprisoned in Styria alone.

#### BRITISH AND ITALIAN ATTITUDE

Both Britain and Italy have officially declared that they will continue to uphold the principle of Austrian independence in Europe. France is also stated to be sympathetic to the Austrian cause.

In consequence of the known attitude of these powers, and the uncertainty that exists regarding the part that Germany will play in any future developments in Austria, the political situation in Europe has become even more critical than it has been during the past fortnight.

#### PUBLIC OPINION INCENSED.

Public opinion has been greatly incensed by apparently authentic accounts of the brutal treatment accorded to Dr. Dollfuss after he had been twice shot at close quarters by rebels who invaded the Chancellor's. Medical and spiritual aid were refused him as he lay dying.

Speculation is rife as to who will succeed him as Chancellor. Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, the Minister for Justice, has been mentioned as the most likely candidate, but there has been an unconfirmed report that Prince von Starbemberg, the Vice-Chancellor, has been appointed to the post.

#### HITLER'S PROPOSAL.

Herr Hitler, who declares he is anxious to re-establish Austro-German friendship, proposes to appoint the Reich Vice-Chancellor, Herr von Papen as German Minister in Vienna.

#### Cruel Death of Murdered Chancellor.

VIENNA LETTERS.

It is learned in well-informed circles that no change will be made in the Chancellor's funeral arrangements before the body of the murdered Chancellor, Dr. Engelbert Dollfuss, in the name of President Miklas and Prince Starbemberg, the Vice-Chancellor, returned to the capital this morning.

The fact that Dr. Dollfuss was refused not only medical aid but also the ministrations of a priest during his last moments, was revealed yesterday evening in a broadcast by Federal Commissioner Adam, who declared that the Chancellor had died alone among enemies.

#### Place of Criminal Violence.

It is added that the disastrous events of the day could not be regarded as a revolt on a grand scale, but just as a piece of criminal violence, which was carefully planned but nevertheless failed in its nature early this morning. President Miklas immediately proceeded to the Chancellery to assume his respects to the body of the Chancellor.

#### Rebels Still Active.

It is officially announced that the rebels have been suppressed in all but not dangerously. He was re-

#### Militant Vienna.

Schelling from which artillery fire by the Government's troops failed to dislodge them.

Dr. Rimoldi's son-in-law, who is a lawyer at Graz, has been arrested and white 100 alleged Nazis were arrested in Vienna during the day.

Among them was Remser, the first post-war Chancellor in Austria. Up to the present 900 Nazis have been imprisoned in Styria.

#### Severe Fighting.

Severe fighting continues in Upper Styria, where over 20 Hitlerites have been killed. Nazi forces are believed to be even greater. Austrian Army reinforcements from Lower Austria have been rushed to the scene.

Order appears to have been fully restored at Graz, the capital of Styria. Nazis attempted to capture the concentration camp near there with the object of freeing the prisoners, but the Heitnauer intervened, shot three rebels and arrested 26 others.

#### Many Nazis Arrested.

The capital is full of armed men. The public buildings and many shops are displaying black flags, and church bells are tolling. Many Nazis have been arrested.

It is generally thought that President Miklas will endeavor to form a new Government on a broader basis. An election may be held as it is unlikely that it will be possible to form a stable Government unless supported by the majority of the people.

#### Candidates for Chancellorship.

According to the chief press department, Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, the Minister for Justice, is the most likely candidate for the Chancellorship, but there has been an unconfirmed report that Prince von Starbemberg has been appointed Chancellor.

The late Chancellor's funeral will take place at 4 p.m. on Saturday. Thousands lined the streets when the body was taken in a funeral coach from the Chancellery to the City Hall where it will lie in state until Friday.

Pran Dollfuss has arrived and is watching her husband's body.

#### Further Killings.

Vienna, July 27.

Fierce fighting between Nazis and the executive forces was renewed in Styria and part of Carinthia last night, no quarter being given by either side. It is officially stated that a major and five soldiers were killed, and a colonel seriously injured.

The clash occurred at the Pöchlarn connecting Upper Austria and Styria. The paper was taken from the rebels by the executive forces.

#### Fighting in Carinthia.

Anasberg Hill, in Carinthia, was also captured from the Nazis by the executive forces after grim fighting in which nine Nazis were killed. The battlefield was littered with the remains of tanks and hundreds of rifles.

Thirty were killed as a result of the day's fighting, at the steel-manufacturing centre, Leoben, where the fighting has been going on since an armistice until dawn.

The rebels are also strongly entrenched in the hill country. There is no confirmation here-

#### Statement by Sir John Simon.

London, July 28.

Political circles here are horrified at the murder of Dr. Dollfuss and place the responsibility for it on the openly avowed policy of the Nazi leadership in Munich in trying to dictate internal events in Austria by subverted terrorism.

It is believed that conversations have already been initiated with Paris and Rome over the maintenance of Austrian independence, and that British, French and Italy are agreed.

#### In the course of a statement.

in the events in Austria, given in the House of Commons last night, Sir John Simon, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, said that although Dr. Dollfuss had lived for a considerable time after he had been shot, he was not allowed to bleed to death, being rescued medical and spiritual aid.

He added that safe conduct had been promised to the insurgents provided that the three Ministers, whom they had captured, were released unharmed. Three requests were later made in prisoners, the promise of safe-conduct having lapsed on the death of Dr. Dollfuss. The identity of the Chancellor's assailants was known.

#### Independence to be Upheld.

He declared that the British would be upholding Austrian independence in accordance with the treaties, was unchanged.

Members of the House punctuated his recital of the events connected with the murder of Dr. Dollfuss with exclamations of horror.

His Majesty the King has telegraphed his condoleances to the Austrian Government.

#### Hitler Condemned.

Berlin, July 28.

Herr Hitler, who has arrived in Munich, is believed to be concerned over the possible repercussions abroad of the revolts in Austria.

The Nazi papers express frank satisfaction with the results of the events, their attitude contrasting with Baron von Neurath's telegram of condolence. This suggests a conflict of opinion in official Nazi circles.

The German leader of the Austrian Nazis, Herr Halbach, has been dismissed from his post as Provincial Inspector of the Austrian Nazis. He was responsible for the anti-Dollfuss broadcasts from Munich a few months ago.

The Austro-German frontier, which was closed yesterday, has been reopened to traffic.

#### Dramatic Move by Hitler.

Berlin, July 27.

Herr Hitler has made a dramatic gesture of conciliation towards the rebels of the European situation. He has asked Herr von Papen to go to Vienna immediately as temporary German Minister there directly under Herr Hitler's orders.

The request, which is indicative of a volte face in the German attitude to Austria, is contained in a letter to Herr von Papen, whom Herr Hitler pays high tribute to for his services to the cause of the resurrection of Germany and expression of the faithfulness of his people.

In the letter Herr Hitler regrets the effect that the murder of Dr. Dollfuss has had on the already unstable European political position, and his desire to contribute to the relief of the situ-

**"F.L.V.":** This is putting the screw on with a vengeance! Ten months' phase.

**W. R. M. Fowler:** On first looking at the problem I thought the Knight must get on to the Bishop's diagonal, but I couldn't see to get up the position to having that I missed none of the excellent variations.

**K. R. Goodale:** Certainly a stiff one: the first variation took me a long time. Wonder if it knoels out any of the "cracks".

**Sant Singh:** A fine masterpiece! It nearly caught me. Surely it will play another master in the list. The purpose of White Pawn at a4 is only seen after the brave sacrifice of the Queen in reply to 1...K-R3.

**Hassanali:** The move fine variations make this very hard

to solve. Took me good many hours.

**G. Tanner:** I think there ought to be a law prohibiting the use of more than one Knight in problems. Thanks to the Post I spotted the key before I was in the prize, but it took me two nights to discover the Q sacrifice in reply to 1...K-R3, and how to deal with 1...K-R4 took a lot of flogging. A really wonderful piece of work, but I sincerely trust you haven't any more like it.

**H. J. S. Palmer** says he has to "admit defeat with "L" though there are some good tries with the Knight on c5. He hopes the others also had trouble with it.

## PREVENTING SOIL EROSION.

### Agricultural Department's Second Notice.

The Kenya Department of Agriculture is issuing a series of Press notices on the subject of soil erosion. This is the second.

The first appeared last week: "Not only is arable land in danger of severe depreciation in basal value, due to the loss of its surface soil by erosion, but also in pastoral land. Stock tracks provide nice little channels down which surface water can run off, and also provide perfect foci for the development of ganges."

"Overstocking and grass fires deplete the surface cover, raise beds directly on the soil, making muddy water, which chills the absorbing channels in the soil. Less water enters the soil and more runs off, carrying in suspension some of the very valuable surface soil."

"Each rain, unless the yield is allowed to recover, makes matters worse. Less and less water is absorbed, more and more runs off and the vegetation deteriorates rapidly."

#### Kanama Country.

"The semi-final stage is the condition of the Kanama country, completely bare, having all at the rate of many inches annually gullied down to bare rock."

"And these conditions water is unable to percolate into the sub-soil. Springs dry up, and rivers previously permanent become channels down which water rushes during the rains carrying away fertile surface soil. The final stage is desert."

"It is most essential to avoid overgrazing and grass fires which remove the carpet of vegetation and provide ideal conditions for soil erosion and loss of soil fertility."

"Nowhere is the old adage 'a stitch in time saves nine' more applicable."

## DOUBLE INOCULATION.

### Request by Ravine Farmers' Association.

[STANDARD'S CORRESPONDENT.] Eldama Ravine, July 21.

At the last meeting of the Ravine Farmers' Association letters were read from the Veterinary Department in connection with the request for double inoculation against rinderpest of the cattle in this District. The Chief Veterinary Officer was aware of the necessity for branded A.M. cattle for the purposes of transport and had requested the necessity for double inoculation to make the necessary arrangements.

The Veterinary Department is at present unable to consider the suggestion that a brand be given for cattle vaccinated against rinderpest.

It was suggested that the cattle to be double inoculated should be sent to Timbora. In previous years cattle have been double inoculated at Ravine, by the Veterinary Officer Nakuru and a crush was specially erected by the Farmers Association for the purpose. Timbora is about 25 miles from Ravine, each stock owner would have to send a number of natives to herd his own cattle, both on the road and during supervision. This has been pointed out to the Veterinary Department and it is hoped to be able to carry out the double inoculation at Ravine as in former years.

#### Movement of Swine.

The Veterinary Department was not able to accede to the request for the abolition of permits for the movement of swine. While supporting the Department in its efforts to prevent the spread of disease, pigs are not examined before they are moved and in the event of an outbreak of swine fever all movements of pigs in that area would presumably be stopped so the spread of disease would be amply safeguarded.

#### Traffic Check.

A traffic check was conducted in Nairobi on Thursday, and the police traps posted in the various parts of the town caught quite a considerable number of offenders without the necessary licences.

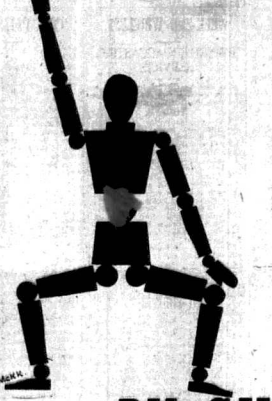

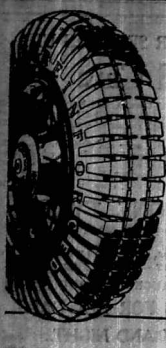
