COTTON POSITION IN UGANDA.

Estimates for First Six Months of 1934.

AGRICULTURE DEPARTMENT.

The crop position report of the Agriculture Department on the 1934/35 crop has been issued and shows that in the Eastern Province the estimated averages planted to the end of June totalled 102,773 as against 97,997 for the same period last year.

In Busoga District the total rainfall during June was somewhat lower than in the previous year and of uneven distribution. Germination in most cases has been good. In Toro district the weather has been dry and in Kumi and in parts of Nyeri planting has been delayed.

In Uganda Province the weather was experienced but satisfactory rains fell during the latter half of the month.

Buganda Province.

In the Buganda District weather conditions during June were moderately favourable to planting. In Buganda Province it is estimated that 70,419 acres were planted to the end of June. The weather was exceptionally dry throughout the Province and many of the prepared plots could not be planted. Early plantings have suffered from drought and considerable weeding will be necessary.

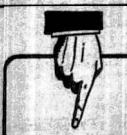
The Northern Province is estimated to have planted 12,000 acres, as against 20,052 last year. In the Lango and Banyoro Districts dry weather has delayed planting. No planting took place during June owing to the prevailing dry conditions. It is anticipated, however, that, taking into account the plots prepared for planting, last year's acreage will be exceeded.

Advisory Committee's Report.

The Local Advisory Committee's report for the second quarter of this year gives interesting figures in regard to the cotton crops for the past two years. It is estimated that in 1933 170,552 tons of seed cotton were bought and the price paid to the growers amounted to £1,976,567. In 1934 162,250 tons were bought, and no less than £1,942,720 paid to the growers.

The number of bales despatched this year to date is 248,100 and some 17,000 tons of cotton seed have been looked for export.

A remarkable record for successful seed sowing continues to be established by the Oxford University Air Squadron, which is now temporarily attached to the Royal Air Force at Eastchurch. In eight years the squadron has trained about 240 pilots, and completed 15,000 flying hours without any serious injury resulting to a single pupil.

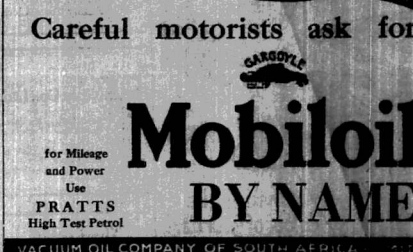

COTTON POSITION IN UGANDA.
Estimates for First Six Months of 1934.

UGANDA PROVINCE.
The first cotton report from the Agricultural Department on the 1934 crop has been issued and shows that in the Eastern Province the estimated acreage planted to the end of June totalled 155,775 as against 97,087 for the same period last year.

In Western District the total sown fallowing June was somewhat lower than in the previous year and of uneven distribution. Germination in most cases has been good. In Fosa District the weather has been dry and in Kumi and in parts of Ngora District has been delayed. In Bugwere dry weather was experienced but satisfactory rains fell during the latter half of the month.

In the Budaka District weather conditions during June were moderately favourable to planting. In Buganda Province it is estimated that 70,319 acres were planted to the end of June. The weather was exceptionally dry throughout the Province and many of the prepared plots could not be sown. Early plantings have suffered from drought and considerable weeding will be necessary.

The Northern Province is estimated to have planted 18,840 acres, as against 20,002 last year. In the Luoga and Buvoro Districts dry weather has delayed planting. No planting took place during June owing to the prevailing dry conditions. It is anticipated, however, that rains into account the plots prepared for planting, last year's acreage will be exceeded.

Advisory Committee's Report.
The Local Advisory Committee's report for the second quarter of this year gives interesting figures in regard to the cotton crops for the past two years. It is estimated that in 1933 170,552 tons of seed cotton were bought and the price paid to the growers amounted to £1,075,000. In 1934 169,200 tons were bought, and no less than £1,842,720 paid to the grower.

The number of bales despatched this year to date is 248,000 and some 17,000 of cotton seed have been booked for export.

A remarkable record for successful and safe firing training has been established by the Oxford University Air Squadron, which is now temporarily attached to the Royal Air Force at Eastchurch. In eight years the squadron has trained about 240 pilots, and completed 15,000 firing hours without permanent injury resulting to a single pupil.

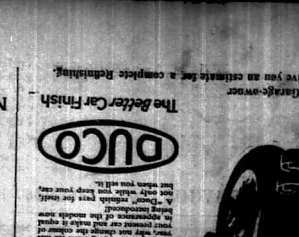

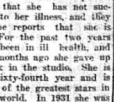
Films from Uganda.

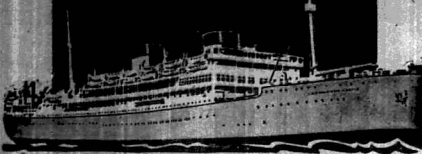

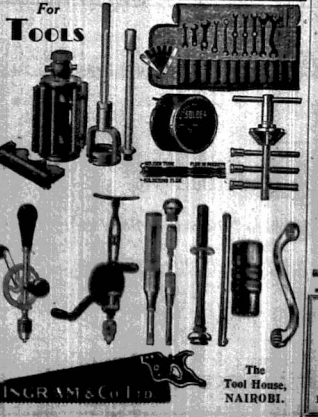

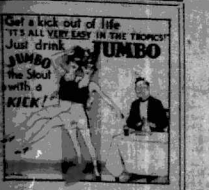

Forbidden Statement Now Published in London.

"A DEFEAT IMPORTANT AS IT IS WELCOME."

New Cabinet Formed.

DR. SCHUSCHNIG AS CHANCELLOR BUT HEIMWEHR IN THE MAJORITY.

A new Cabinet has now been formed in Austria. The new Chancellor is Dr. Kurt Schuschnigg, who will continue to retain the Portfolio for Education and in addition will be Minister for Defence. Prince Starhemberg will be Vice-Chancellor and also Minister of Public Security.

In this new Cabinet the Heimwehr are definitely predominant, although the Chancellor himself is a Christian Socialist. It is, in the main, a "Cabinet of Compromise" and admittedly is not regarded as permanent.

Perhaps the truest picture of the spirit underlying the recent revolt is contained in a statement, originating from a German news agency, and published yesterday by "The Times." This report was published immediately it was issued.

This statement outlines in unmistakable language the Nazi revolts and openly exalts the supposed overthrow of the Dollfus regime. The concluding words are "This new Government which opposes the peoples' will has been overthrown by the German people in Austria; a defeat as important as it is welcome."

Restricted Terms of Reference. The Attorney-General pointed out that it was not the intention of the Government to restrict the terms of reference, but to give the Committee a general review of the provisions of the Liquor Ordinance, and to make recommendations as to what amendments were necessary, due regard being had to the need for safeguarding revenue.

Words of Drinking. It had been necessary, eventually, to make it clear that the Committee had only to restrict the law as it stood at present, and was not there to pass judgment on whether there was a good or bad thing for individuals generally, or whether the Continental system, where one could drink any hour of the day or night was preferable to the one in vogue in this Colony. Moreover the concluding part of the committee's terms of reference had been forgotten by many people.

A Commons' Question.

THE HOUSE OF COMMONS was held by Austria's people this morning after the personnel taken as a guarantee that the Dollfus policy will be carried out without any faltering.

As Minister for Public Security, Prince Starhemberg will be responsible for the Department and its activities.

Temporary Peace.

THE FORMATION of the new Cabinet in Vienna, has "brought a fresh crisis and brought a temporary peace in Vienna," while the appointment of Dr. Schuschnigg as Chancellor would seem to be the Catholic for it counterbalances the fact that the four most important posts are now held by the Heimwehr Party whose resignation of office in the Chamberlain's statement was not unconditional. Dr. Schuschnigg is not considered permanent.

The resignation of Major Fey from the Cabinet has provided some surprise as Christian Socialists usually stand apart from their present aversion to Major Fey whose appointment to this post is a concession to the Heimwehr to defend his rights.

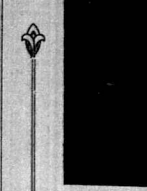

DETAILED HISTORY OF THE CLAN.

Crime Amongst the Lumwa.

An exceptionally interesting debate took place in Legislative Council yesterday on the second reading of the Lumwa Removal Bill.

THE EAST AFRICAN SELLING.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard."
Sir—Your correspondence, I refer to in reply to "An Ignorant Debtor" in the issue of East African Times. This must be a very serious matter. One would think that the first country in the world to devalue, we are actually one of the last. What we are talking for is a devaluation for economic purposes to give us an export price level sufficient to enable our producers to continue to produce and discharge their duties as citizens. It is in vain that I point out in letter after letter that in Australia after devaluation the cost of production only rose one-third, the premium on the exchange, and the price of raw materials fell. Professor Campbell of Australia and the World Bank, an authority consulted in Melbourne University, declared it is anybody's business to publish the accurate facts. He has been on the spot throughout the entire process.

A. K. C. asserts that if we devalue, after an interval for economic purposes, our export price level will increase precisely by the amount we devalue. A. K. C. knows the mathematical formulae of the law of supply and demand! M.V.P. P.T. is the total money in circulation. V is its velocity of circulation. P is the Price Level; and T is the total Turnover. Devaluation would increase M, so that the M.V. side of the equation would increase. Therefore, the P.T. side must increase equally. What A.K.C. asserts is that P will increase as M increases. This is the total Turnover would increase as well as P. Therefore, P would not need to do all the increasing.

This mathematical proof is only convincing to economists, but a practical case is convincing to everybody. Take the most common case to our hand—the price of oranges in Nairobi. Oranges are selling wholesale in Nairobi at 2/- per 100-lb. But I know orange orchards within 20 miles of Nairobi where the oranges hang thick and ripe on the trees. For every orange on the market three fall on the ground, wasted. Beyond the 20 miles radius are more orchards with the oranges entirely wasted, not paying to pick and transport at 2/- per 100.

Suppose now the total money in Nairobi rises. The first thing the clever orchardist does is that he can dispose of more of his fruit. (T rises.) If they try to raise the price, they are backed into a corner. They are forced to lower their price, but the price cannot rise much. It is T, the total consumption of oranges, which rises. The price of oranges has nothing to do with the cost of production for export, but the marketing surplus with equal weight to the price of labour.

It seems as a surprise even to persons understanding the mathematics of the subject, that in South Africa after devaluation none of the local products in everyday use—

ordinarily declined in price. Having used it, the ex-impore of the local products to waste good human food. A.K.C. makes a gross half-brother about the price of motor cars, clothing, etc., but he does not mention that since no farmer to-day can afford to buy a motor car, or a plough, even if you had the price of these articles, it does not matter whether the price of these articles so far as the farmer is concerned. What he wants is to make a profit and then he can buy more of the things he needs. The price of the things he needs is what matters. The fact that the price of the things he needs has increased since last year by nearly 50% does not matter. The things he needs have devalued in the same way as the things he sells. In New Zealand, Canada and South Africa—for I can guarantee the sales of these in East Africa—we are the only countries of the world that have increased their prices. To any body in the motor car trade in East Africa I would put the case in devaluation. If you had the price of your motor car one at £200, or nine cars at £2000 apiece, I would put the case in devaluation. 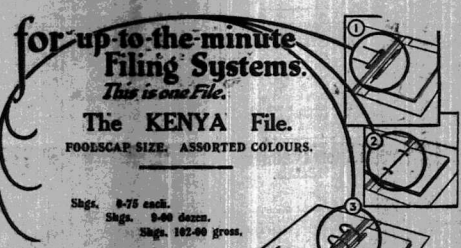

REPORT OF LIQUOR LICENSING COMMITTEE.

The Committee were briefly commended by the Attorney-General. With regard to the sherry question of clubs, he said the committee had been satisfied that only on a very few occasions could he be said that any clubs in Nairobi were evading their responsibilities.

Native Barmen. As to the employment of Native barmen, they were convinced that the time had arrived when there was no logical reason why they should not be permitted to work in licensed houses, or why there should be any discrimination between the latter and clubs.

Major the Hon. G. H. Hiddell (Kiambu) reported the report on two grounds. The first of those was that the terms of reference had been so restricted that the Council could not get a true picture of the situation in the Colony. Secondly, no effort had been made to assist in the development of the liquor trade of the Colony by reducing the license fees in order to encourage the erection of small hotels all over the country.

Major Hiddell pointed out that the actual revenue from licenses in 1933 was £10,725 but that of 1934 was £10,500. He said that in 1934, an apparent shortfall this year of £2,000.

In fact, however, they had not saved the Native Licenses and the minimum of the 1934 and 1935 instalments of the Committee were implemented there would be an increase of £225 in revenue from licenses.

BOUNDARIES CONFUSED.
 Of the Sub-Districts in Kiambu.

It was pointed out that since the change in the administrative services, the old boundaries that were commonly accepted by Government as long created and that residents who were included in Kiambu are in Kiambu since it is years that the word boundaries of the Nairobi District Council, Settled Area, Police, and Administration office and therefore much confusion of thought exists as to where some of the Plantations in the southern part of the district are included. Several plantations now situated in Kiambu use Ruiri Post office and are served by Ruiri Station and telephone exchange.

 Another aspect of the matter is revealed when it is shown that all coffee is grown in the Kiambu District whereas it is known that the production of Ruiri exceeds that of Kiambu. It is considered possible for the Agricultural Department to separate the Kiambu area into all the old sub-districts of Kiambu such as Ruiri, Kabete, Limuru, etc. A small department consisting of Messrs. Gahley and Capt. Kirton was appointed to interview the Director of Agriculture in order to ascertain if anything can be done in the matter.

PURCHASE OF FAT.
 Recommendation to Municipal Council.

The "East African Standard" recently published an article drawing attention to the solicitude of farmers regarding the sale of Nairobi Municipality of fat derived from carcasses passed through the by-products plant at the abattoir. Their criticism was based on the fact that they received no remuneration for any animal consumed, but that the fat was sold in competition with their products.

In the report of the Market and Abattoir sub-committee, to be presented to the Council tomorrow, appears the following minute:—
 "A letter was read from Messrs. the Butcherers Co-operative Society, Ltd., in connection with an advertisement calling for tenders for the purchase of fat produced at the Council's by-products plant, and protesting against the sale of this commodity by the Council. Resolved that having regard to all the circumstances no tender be accepted for the purchase of fat produced at the by-products plant, and that instructions be given for the present method of disposing of this product to be continued."

DOMINION PRIME MINISTERS TO JOIN LONDON CELEBRATIONS.

Mr. Baldwin announced in the House of Commons on Monday that the King had approved the Prime Minister's recommendation that the 25th anniversary of His Majesty's accession, which falls on May 6, 1935, should be fittingly celebrated as his Silver Jubilee.

The King expressly desired that the celebrations should be as simple as possible, avoiding all undue expenditure. The official celebrations in London will extend from May 6 to May 18, Accession Day being a Bank Holiday and a Public Holiday throughout the United Kingdom.

The suggestions have already been warmly received by the Prime Ministers of the Dominions and of certain Colonies. Ireland however, will not be represented at the Celebrations. The opportunity afforded by the presence of the Dominion Premiers in London, will be taken to have personal discussions on matters of outstanding importance.

In addition to the special Service at St. Paul's, His Majesty will inspect all his fighting Forces. There will be celebrations at Buckingham Palace and possibly special Jubilee Honours will be conferred.

A Public Holiday.

FULL SHARE OF QUOTAS.

(By WIRELESS.)

Rugby, July 31. As it has not been found possible at present to conclude a full commercial agreement between the United Kingdom and the Netherlands Government, negotiations have been terminated by the exchange of Notes issued last week. Coffee Research in Kenya.

Agricultural Department's Services.

STATEMENT BY DIRECTOR.

Joint Consultative Committee Progress.

At the meeting on Friday afternoon of the conference convened by the Coffee Board of Kenya, an interesting statement was made by the Director of Agriculture.

Both he and the Deputy Director of Plant Services, Mr. H. Wolfe, he said, had examined very recently the services the Department gave, and had found that a large number of officers were engaged on coffee research, although only for part of their time. This was due to the fact that the Department was a small one.

He believed that the administrative services devoted to coffee, and every other plant service cost £24,000 a year. About two-fifths of this amount was devoted to coffee. For example, the senior entomologist devoted about one-third of his time to coffee, while the rest of his time was taken up by other services. The position was a difficult one, but whichever way he looked at it he could find no reason for the services being organized for the plant industry division.

Sacrifice of General Efficiency.

One proposal that had been put forward was that two-fifths of the total services should be under the whole-time director of coffee services, but after going into the matter very carefully, he had come to the conclusion that it would not be possible to organize the Department in that way without sacrificing its general efficiency.

On the other hand, the Department was anxious to collaborate with the Coffee Board in securing a full-time chief on coffee research work, and he also hoped to have a suitable station for research work.

He had therefore made certain proposals, but could not say yet whether they would come into operation or not. He hoped, however, that the Department would be able to have certain men who could devote the whole of their time to coffee, rather than to work both on coffee and all the other plant subjects the Department had to deal with.

Joint Consultative Committee.

The Department would welcome the assistance of the Coffee Board in reviewing the coffee research work of the Department, and he had already suggested that the Board might consider whether a joint consultative committee could be formed to determine from time to time the research to be undertaken. His Excellency had already mentioned the appointment of Dr. Martin Case as chairman to the Coffee Board, and the Director assumed that the Board would be formed to work as a man with any of the scientific officers appointed by the Board.

Mr. Thompson, of Nairobi, on the other hand, had been appointed, however, that the coffee workers in the Department desired to work as a man with any of the scientific officers appointed by the Board.

Research Hoped for.

He argued that conditions in the western area were totally different from those in the eastern area, and that research there had been neglected, although the acreage was two-fifths of the total in the Colony, and the number of growers over 500 out of a total of 940 in Kenya.

Native Cases in Appeal Court.

His successor was Mr. Turton of Nairobi, who also stated that there was a definite feeling among the western area planters that they had been neglected. They had certain problems which could be ameliorated only if attention were paid to them. They seldom saw a coffee officer, and his visits were always very brief. Mr. Turton suggested the establishment of centres in the area for experimental work.

Only Three Officers Available.

In reply, Mr. Wolfe stated that at the present time there were three specialist officers in the Agricultural Department, two of whom were stationed in the western district. Research work was being conducted at South. There were problems on Mount Elgon coffee plantations which required immediate research, and it was proposed to send the entomologist as soon as he returned from leave, taking him away from central districts for the purpose. Other than these three, there were no officers to spare, and if more investigation work was to be undertaken in the western district it would mean the employment of extra staff.

Needs of Western Area.

Mr. C. K. Archer pointed out that the western area was represented on the Coffee Board equally with the eastern area.

No appeal added Mr. Wolfe, had been made for investigation work into berry fall in the western area.

Mr. G. Glasford, Embu, suggested that the Department should send over to the Coffee Board £10,000 and allow the latter to carry on the necessary research work.

The Department, in conjunction with the Coffee Board, be asked to inquire into the need for further research work in the western area.

This was accepted by Mr. Thompson, and agreed to by the Conference Delegation.

Government's Advisory Services.

In reply to Mr. Glasford, the Director of Agriculture said the Government services included not only research work, but were also advisory on the whole subject of plant production.

In no case could Government lend over to another body its advisory services, or enforcement of the law. Nor could Government hand over its responsibility in the matter of research. Both the Board and the Department, he thought, would be well advised to work for a coffee research institute, the contributions from the two parties to be on an equal basis.

Several appeals from Natives were heard by the Acting Chief Justice, Mr. Llewellyn-Jones, and Mr. Justice Horne, in the Supreme Court, Nairobi, yesterday.


Miraro wa Gogobu, who was sentenced last month to 12 months hard labour for theft of clothing, was sentenced on the same date to six months hard labour for assaulting a native police officer. It was ordered that the sentences should run consecutively. Miraro appealed against the second sentence, submitting that he did not assault the police officer.

After reviewing the case, their Honours varied the sentence and an order was made for the second sentence to run concurrently with the 12 months' hard labour given for the theft of clothing.

Gachina wa Kangethe and Gichara wa Mwakira, two Kikuyu, each appealed against the sentences of four months hard labour and fine of Shs. 600, or, in default, another month's hard labour that had been given them. They had originally been charged with the theft of a cow from near the Native Market, Nairobi. Their Honours dismissed the appeal, holding that the evidence led for the prosecution at the magisterial hearing supported the conviction.

A Native named Kitondia, a Kerekehe appealed against the sentence of his certificate of competency. He had been found guilty by the Resident Magistrate, Nairobi, of being driving, and was sentenced to a fine of Shs. 250/-, or, in default, two months' hard labour, with a certificate of competency was suspended for 18 months, failing into account the fact that Kitondia had gained his certificate in 1922. Their Honours reduced the term of suspension to three months.

"Impedance" Mismatching and Quality

It is not here intended to go into the theory of alternating currents, but the writer is very desirous to point out the reasons why it is so important to have the impedance of a receiver matched to the impedance of the speaker...

There is perhaps one more term which may be mentioned, and that is "impedance." This is the sum total of all resistive, inductive and capacitive resistances, and is expressed in ohms. In the various stages of a receiver the various sources of voltage and impedance are in series, and each must be "matched" to the next for greatest efficiency.

Optimum Load. Very often the optimum load and the impedance for an output valve is specified, in which case the impedance of the speaker should be the same as the optimum load.


On account of the varying frequencies, instead of the value of impedance being the same as the value, it should be about double. If it is not, it should be made so.

Preserving the Native Reserves. In the Legislative Council this week one of the Indian Deputy Members invited Government to make any machinery for carrying out an economic survey of the Native areas. The answer was in the affirmative. It will be recalled that the 'More Crops' campaign was instituted by His Excellency the Governor two years ago through the Agricultural Department in co-operation with the Administration, undertaken a survey on a ranging system intended to collect information on the soil, water and to discover the crops best suited for development. The Department may be at fault in not equipping the public from time to time with the progress made, but the fact remains that we appreciate that an economic survey of this kind, where no foundation statistics exist, must take a considerable time and with restricted staff, it is only possible to complete when opportunity offers. It is the only initiative the Colony can afford at the moment for a more exhaustive examination of the potentialities of the Reserves and, adequately carried out, will form a very valuable foundation for better planning of agricultural development. Spurred by the question, the Government has been asked to seek an early opportunity of proving that the past two years have not been in vain. That question offers, an extension for directing the attention of the country to a letter from Nakuru African published yesterday. He apparently read the voluminous Carter Commission Report that is the skeleton of the Government here and in Britain to take some steps to reduce the number of unemployed which are destroying us so rapidly we are grasping for any lifeline. Increase in Britain's Military Air Strength.

HOUSE OF COMMONS APPROVE GOVERNMENT PROPOSALS.

Labour Vote of Censure.

The House of Commons has endorsed the British Government's conditional programme for increasing Britain's military air strength by the construction over the next five years of 461 more squadrons, and rejected by 461 votes to 60 a Labour motion of censure on the Government's air policy.

Sir John Simon, the Foreign Secretary, denied that the proposal had been offered or actuated in any way by considerations of other powers, and added that he had unfortunately never found that Britain's unilateral disarmament had helped disarmament at Geneva.

He also made significant reference to Germany's "very marked air development" and to the strikingly large sums being spent by that country under the proclaimed heading of "civil aviation."

Obligations Under Collective Peace System.

The Government's programme of adding to the British air divisions by the construction over the next five years of 461 more squadrons, secured the approval of the House of Commons last night by 461 votes to 60.

A speech of considerable importance was made by Sir John Simon, at the close of the debate. He emphasized that the Government was pushing forward this programme, because it was flexible, and could be altered by their duty to their country and also by their desire to effect a more complete change over to the collective peace system.

Mr. Stanley Baldwin.

Strong Moral Position.

"No doubt it has given us a very strong moral position," remarked Sir John, "but a sense of rectitude is not always the result of a military victory or a repent." However, it would be very difficult to say that the limitation of armaments in Britain disarmed Germany through any other means.

Mr. Baldwin, replying, said that the Imperial defence and disarmament bill had been under consideration for many years, but that a survey had been conducted during the past year. The barometer of military activity in Europe which he pointed out was that Germany was increasing her armaments, and that the large sums spent on the production of heavy armaments were very striking.

Advocate Military Air Force.

The purpose of those proposals was to secure the most effective means for the defence of the British Empire, and to do so in the most economical way possible.

In the course of the next few days he became weaker and started discharging pus from the wound on the 21st day. On June 25 at 5.30 p.m. he became exhausted and died.

By Crown Counsel: What did he die from?—Exhaustion caused by several factors such as extensive quinine, penicillin and excessive supporting discharge.

By Crown Counsel: Was the result of the operation?—Yes.

Continuing the witness and I stated Dr. Cowen to perform the post-mortem on June 26, 1936, at 10 p.m. He did so and I am digging it up. While looking for it and digging it up the average man consumes an average amount of food.

Alleged Cause of Death.
Dr. Cowen L.E.P. L.E.S. District Surgeon, in charge of Kitale Native Hospital, commented on these parts of the Sub-Assistant Surgeon's evidence of what he had seen and heard. He stated that the area between the patient's stomach and the back of the thigh.

In answer to a further question by Crown Counsel Dr. Cowen said: "I consider the stop a most human weapon, owing to the blood at the end and its tested condition. It is also heavy."
