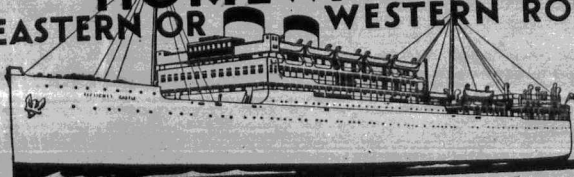

REORGANISATION OF NATIONAL RECOVERY ADMINISTRATION

Two Committees Appointed

PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT'S PROVISIO CONCERNING FUTURE POLICY

Following the resignation of General Hugh Johnson as administrator of the National Recovery Act, the President has announced the appointment of two boards to take over the work of the Administration.

Below will be found a summary of the work accomplished by the Administration while under the control of General Johnson; but in spite of the credit which is his work, criticism was not lacking and this led indirectly to his resignation.

The National Recovery Act was signed on June 16, 1933, to be effective for two years unless the President by proclamation, or the Congress by joint resolution, declared the emergency to be an end.

"The Law I have just signed," said the President at that time, "was passed to put people to work—to let them buy more of the products of farms and factories and start our business at a living rate again."

U.S.A. Economic Conditions

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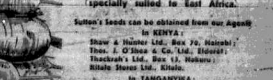

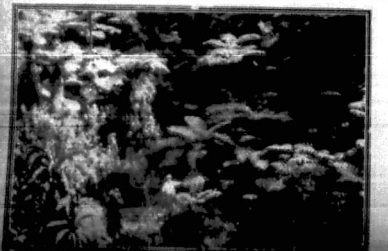

END OF THE FOOTBALL SEASON

League Winners vs. The Rest

A DRAWN ENCOUNTER

The curtain was drawn down on the Association football season on Saturday afternoon, when the Railway, winners of the Public League, drew with the Rest, representing the "Rest"—1-1. It was one of the best games seen during the latter part of this season, which, on the whole has been rather disappointing. The "Rest," however, held the man short.

During the first half Railway had most of the game, but the second half was more even, and if anything, the "Rest" had the best of it. Railway's chief weakness lay in both the outside forwards, who were inclined to kick wildly, when their opponents' goal, and in this way they lost several possible points. The remainder, however, played excellently. Goodridge and Brierley were the outstanding players, and they were well backed up by the other members of the team.

Of the opposing side, B. Marsh played his usual steady game, and Barrett at centre half was a hard worker, as were also Davison on the wing and Young at back. The "Rest's" defence was splendid, and was mainly responsible for Railway's failure to score more often. Both keepers did all that was required of them.

The game was played on the Railway ground, but there was only a moderate attendance of spectators.

Railway kicking off, play was taken down the field immediately, but they could not penetrate the defence, and after a fruitless attack the "Rest" warded them off and the ball went to the other end. Throughout, the game was of an open character. The first attempt at goal shooting was made by Davison, who sent in a hard shot, which was only saved by Stannah halting out from an awkward position. This saw the commencement of a counter attack, and slowly play reached the "Rest's" end, where Brierley made a splendid solo run, and looked very much like scoring. He was hotly pursued by Young, however, who succeeded in tapping the ball back to Scott for the latter to clear. A similar attack was made a moment later by Randall, but Brierley shied too hard. Scott effected an easy clearance.

It was not long before the Railway had chalked up their first point. Securing a pass from S. Bywater, Randall dribbled past the "Rest's" only back and brought a hard shot into the net, which beat the keeper all in one way. There was no further score before the interval.

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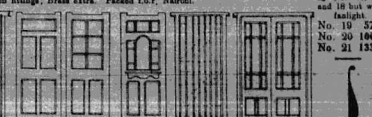

Queen Marie's Tragic Journey Across Europe

The world has been shocked, and all the capitals of Europe thrown into turmoil, by the assassination at Marseilles on Tuesday afternoon of King Alexander of Yugo-Slavia, and M. Louis Barthou, Foreign Minister of France.

As the Royal visitor was entering the Place de la Bourne shots were fired from the crowd, and a man afterwards identified as a Yugo-Slav, jumped on the running board of the Royal car and fired three shots at King Alexander. The assassin was later killed by a member of the crowd while under arrest.

A POLITICAL MISSION.

King Alexander was on a political mission to France, intending, with the help of M. Barthou, to restore good relations between his country and Italy as a step in the direction of Franco-Italian friendship.

The Crown Prince, who is only 11 years, is attending a preparatory school in Surrey, and has since been declared King of Yugo-Slavia.

Queen Marie, widow of King Alexander, was travelling overland to join her husband in Paris, and the news of the assassination reached her in Switzerland.

For the past 130 years the history of the kings of Serbia and Yugo-Slavia is an unbroken story of violent death and political exile.

The communique continued that the heir to the throne, the 11-year-old Crown Prince Peter, would be proclaimed King but as he is a minor a Regency would be constituted consisting of men named by the King in his last will.

It now appears that before leaving Belgrade on his visit to France King Alexander visited the Royal powers in his country of Ministers.

A further official communique issued in Belgrade states that the Government was everywhere were across struck but calm. 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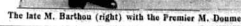

SUGAR AGENCY TO CONTROL ALL DELIVERIES

Millers to Benefit

RESTRICTION OF TEA PRODUCTION AS MEANS OF RAISING PRICES

During its forthcoming session the Kenya Legislative Council will be required to consider a bill which aims at assuring to every sugar miller in the Colony a share of the East African sugar market based on a reasonable economic output.

The Bill proposes the constitution of a board—to be known as the "Agency"—which will regulate the sale and the distribution of all sugar in Kenya. As far as is practicable it will work in conjunction with sugar millers in the neighbouring territories.

Another Bill to be dealt with by Council is designed to restrict the production of tea in the Colony to accord with the requirements of an International Restriction Scheme embracing all the larger and most of the smaller tea-producing countries of the world. The object is the raising of the price of tea.

East African Sugar Market

The Kenya Official Gazette for September 25 contains the text of a bill which has been introduced by His Excellency the Governor to the Council.

It is designed to regulate the sale and distribution of sugar in the Colony and to provide for the constitution of a board to be known as the "Agency" which will regulate the sale and distribution of sugar in the Colony.

The Governor in Council will be required to make a quota based on a percentage of all sugar sales in East Africa.

Any miller may appeal to the Governor against a decision of the Agency.

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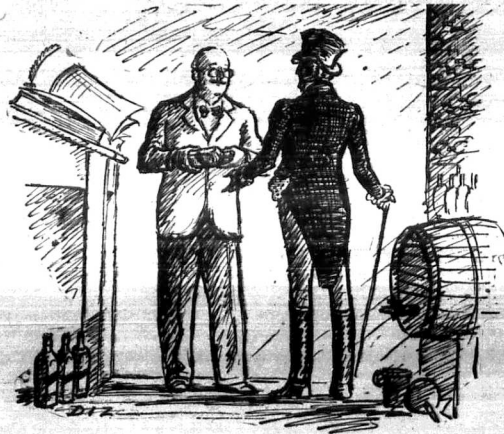

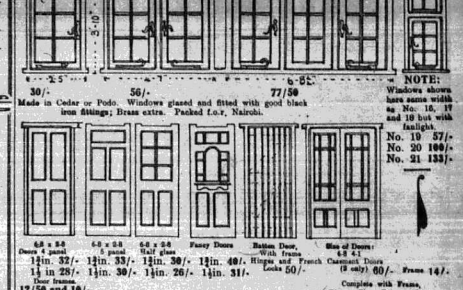

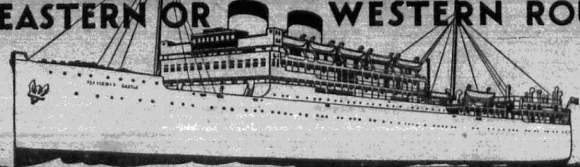
