DILEMMA OF COMMITTEE ON NON-INTERVENTION

By July 9. The Non-Intervention Committee assembled in full at the Foreign Office this morning for the first time since June 28. Members have before them the two sets of proposals—the British and French schemes proposed by the Committee and the Franco-German scheme proposed by Franco and Salazar—which have been before the Committee's Sub-Committee.

It is known that neither has any intention of putting forward any fresh proposals, but all four nations' powers have declared their desire that the principle of non-intervention should be maintained and improved, and therefore, although a breakdown is not an impossibility, the general impression is that efforts will be made to continue the search for an agreement acceptable in principle.

BRITAIN'S NEW TASK AS MEDIATOR

TO SEEK NON-INTERVENTION DEADLOCK SOLUTION

Committee's Unanimous Wish

LORD PLYMOUTH REFUTES ALLEGATIONS OF PARTIALITY

Lord Plymouth has accepted the task, proposed by the Dutch representatives and supported by all the members of the Non-Intervention Committee, of seeking a way out of the present deadlock.

Shortly before accepting the responsibility on behalf of His Majesty's Government, Lord Plymouth, chairman of the Committee, strongly refuted criticisms of Britain's conduct during the Spanish war. If other powers had acted similarly, the position in Spain would be far different, he said.

LABOUR PROBLEM IN EAST AFRICA

Discussion by the London Chamber

A DOMESTIC SPEECH

["(FRANK) COMMUNIST."] London.

One of the most interesting matters raised at the last meeting of the London Chamber of Commerce was in connection with the alleged shortage of labour in East Africa.

A copy of an extract from a speech made by Mr. de Rothschild in the House of Commons on June 26, 1929, was attached to the agenda and had been circulated to members.

Lord Cromwell, after the Chairman explained that there had been a number of complaints made that labour was becoming rather difficult to get in East Africa, stated that the speech of Mr. de Rothschild was laid on the table.

He thought it was a most interesting speech and one which was well timed and one which was highly pertinent to the labour problem in East Africa.

Lord Cromwell thought that had been destroyed when the Zambesi Commission on East Africa set it up. It was put forward to be and it was destroyed by every body on the Committee who said that the development of East Africa must go on for the benefit of the inhabitants of the country and not for the benefit of the European people.

Introduction of Machinery

With regard to the question of labour shortage he ventured to say that in the past three or four years the right people to look after them. The question of labour shortage by the introduction of machinery had during the last thirty years.

He thought the Chamber should be very much interested in the question of machinery and the conduct of affairs with regard to labour shortage.

Relation with South Africa

The Chairman said he was glad the points had been raised. With regard to South Africa nothing should be done to upset the most friendly relations existing between East and South Africa, and nothing should be done which could harm in the least interest, but he would round up so as to give the impression that South Africa was not in any way a competitor.

MOORISH TO HAVE PUSHED BACK REBELS FROM MADRID

Heavy Casualties MOORISH LEGIONARIES RUSHED FROM MEILLIA TO HELP INSURGENTS

The Spanish Government attack on the Madrid front has resulted in a considerable advance, claimed to be of ten miles on a ten mile front.

Insurgents reply to these claims by asserting that Government pressure is now weakening, and that the Madrid forces have lost 10,000 killed and wounded.

Reports from Gibraltar confirm that the Government attack is meeting with considerable success, for Moorish reinforcements are being rushed from Meillia to the Madrid front.

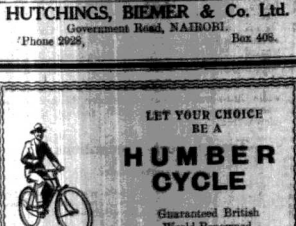
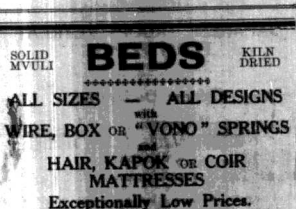

NAIVASHA YACHT CLUB

Splendid Conditions for Sunday's Race
NAIVASHA AND CORNERACK WIN

[From a correspondent.]
Nairobi, July 12.

There was a very big attendance at the Yacht Club, Island No. 2 last Sunday, July 11, and a full turn out of boats. The weather could not have been better, sun and a soft S.W. breeze which blew steadily throughout the race, and kept the boats going at their best speed, and making a delightful sight for the on-lookers.

The course was the same as last month, namely—"B" Course. Start from the Island, round No. 2 buoy to starboard, Naivasha buoy to starboard, the club buoy to starboard, the line and return for the second round. "A" Course the same, except that instead of making for No. 2 buoy they went further down the lake to the Hat buoy which they passed to starboard, making a longer course. The wind, blowing from S.W. made it a run to Hippo point, a broad reach to Tin Hat and No. 2 buoy, a reach with the wind abeam to Naivasha buoy and a long beat back to the on-lookers.

"B" Course started at ten past one o'clock, "Wisp" skippered by E. H. Broadwell, being first over the line, followed one second later by "Gipsy" skippered by A. O. Dickinson, being first over the line, followed one second later by "Jip" skippered by J. P. Cooper, who was sailing a boat for the first time in a race.

All four boats ran before the wind to Hippo point, and then the broad reach to No. 2 buoy. The first to reach it was "Marinka" followed by "Lotus" and "Gipsy." "Wisp" coming a good deal up abreast before the wind blew a small breeze.

Reaching the Naivasha buoy the boats lay in the wind. "Marinka" was first, followed by "Lotus," "Gipsy" did not seem to want to go home, so it displayed her spinnaker, she too took her main sheet and dived somewhat in error. On the last home "Wisp" was first, she then going to starboard and she did not need to reef her lee skipper. She was stuck "Gipsy" and "Lotus" and passed and was repassed by "Marinka" who reached the home buoy first, followed two minutes later by "Wisp." "Lotus" was the next to arrive, got in on the buoy and was neatly removed.

The "A" class started at ten past one o'clock, "Cornerack" sailed by Dr. Hamilton, was over the line first, followed by "Tern" sailed by L. H. Barrell, "Cornerack" sailed by Commander Stewart, and "Kestrel" sailed by O. H. L. Burton. "Tern" and "Kestrel" and all boats ran before the wind to Hippo point and broad reach to Tin Hat. "Cornerack" got there first, followed by "Kestrel," "Cornerack" and "Tern." From there the boats ran before the wind to Naivasha, and on the beat to windward to the club buoy. "Wisp" was first, followed by "Gipsy" and "Tern" in that order. "Wisp" took the pole first "Tern" as it stood before.

The same order was preserved on the second round, but "Naivasha" buoy was windward and "Cornerack" leading the western shore for a while kept up and finished second, twenty-eight seconds behind "Cornerack." "Kestrel" using club and "Tern" and the on-lookers with "Wisp" coming in last.

It really was a remarkably even race, and also an extremely exciting one.

On Wednesday, July 7, the first of the Springbok football in local history on the Toowoomba town. They won by 50 points to nothing.

Sheriff's injury leaves only ten Springbok forwards available, but Fante Lewis is almost ready to take the field again.

The 40-0 goal of the Springboks is still unbroken. Here is the best on record in fact, against a team which played against Toowoomba's forwards in the international contest as a final.

There were 4,000 people present to watch the game—a local Rugby record—attended to the increase of interest in the game which was only revived here in 1928.
