U.S. POLICY IN THE CONGO

WHAT should be the next stage in the efforts of the OAU and its members to bring about tranquility in the Congo and a reconciliation between neighbouring countries?

Mr. K. M. Morris, a lawyer who has returned lately to Nairobi after serving as a legal advisor to the OAU in Washington, in view of his contacts there, has indicated, will be "invited" to speak at the Conference.

The Conference, which will be held in Nairobi on October 10, will be opened by Mr. J. G. M. Gammie, Minister of State for External Affairs, and will be presided over by Mr. D. S. N. M. Mwanga, Minister of State for Foreign Affairs.

In Washington, there will then be a full account of what transpired at the Conference, and the U.S. Government and the OAU Commission, in which the two sides will be represented by Mr. John E. Buckley, the U.S. Ambassador to Kenya, and Mr. M. M. Morris, the Kenyan Minister of State for External Affairs.

The meeting will be followed by a press conference at which Mr. Buckley will be invited to speak on behalf of the American delegation.

How one firm is solving the secretarial shortfall

ALL over the world there is a growing and increasing demand for secretaries each year, the demand exceeding the supply. The business world, the "right-hand girl" of the office, exceeds the supply.

An increasing number and variety of secretarial courses are the other large numbers in East Africa.

This creates a real problem of supply and demand.

Mrs. Marlene Martin, founder of Lenthalic London-Paris School of Secretarial Studies, based in Nairobi, has been training secretaries at her school since 1970.

The company has now expanded its training over the country through the Labour Exchange. They have been involved in training secretaries for the company as a part-time clerical staff.

She has heard about the school when she was part-time. After the course, she joined the company's school of trainees.

It is expected that after the students have completed their training, they will have achieved the required standard and will be able to take up work with the company.

Her son has been at the school for the past three years, and she is very pleased with his progress.

There were no secretaries at the time when she started the company, so it had to import secretarial training from abroad.

In the beginning, Mrs. Martin had to teach the girls herself, as there was no one else available.

The company itself has now expanded to have School Certificate, GCE O Level, English, French, Knowledge of Computers, Business Statistics, and assistance.

She has also trained a certain number of students, and they have been successful in achieving the required standard.

Her Lydie Masse has been four months at the oil company's secretarial school in Nairobi.

She has now gone to another school for further training.

They will be returning to the school on completion of their secretarial training, and can also be employed by the company.

The course is intended for both men and women, and consists of all work and play, and in their free time the students enjoy sports such as tennis, badminton, chess, and other sports.

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
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

NGO FREES ARAB ENVOYS

Tshombe held as stage in Cairo

Congress yesterday agreed to end its "blockade" of the Algerian embassies in Leopoldville which it imposed in the treatment of the Congo Prime Minister, Mr. Tshombe.

This was learned after a 21-hour meeting at the Egyptian embassy between Congolese officials and the Egyptian and Algerian Ambassadors, whose guards were placed round the embassies on Tuesday.

In Cairo, Alfonso and Abu Hamed of State met privately to discuss the holding of the Congo's Prime Minister, Mr. Tshombe, as a hostage by the United Arab Emirates and their military forces in Cairo and in Leopoldville.

When news of the end of the Leopoldville blockade reached Cairo yesterday afternoon, the two men were given visas by the Egyptian authorities.

The meeting was called after the influential Egyptian newspaper, Al-Ahram, said that President Nasser's Government had told Mr. Tshombe that he would be held in the heavily guarded Al Qasr hotel until the "siege" of the U.A.R. embassy in Leopoldville was lifted.

Egypt "deeply concerned"

Al Ahram said President Nasser's African adviser, Mr. Mohamed Farayed, had informed him he would "travel to Cairo for anywhere" when the Egyptian and Algerian embassy staff and their families were allowed to cross Egyptian borders. As far as African delegations were concerned, they were reluctant to comment on the private dispute between the two countries.

Mr. Tshombe has been held in Leopoldville since August 21, when a Cairo jeweller, the former Mr. Norman Hartman — also known as Mr. Shabot — was shot dead in a Cairo hotel. The United Arab Emirates have refused to accept responsibility for his death.

The fate of Mr. Tshombe, who was held under martial law, was reported yesterday as being in the hands of the players.

The Arab and African airports were preparing to attack the police who were sent to quell the rioters when the police said some time afterwards and no actual hostilities took place.

Mr. Farayed said: "My life has been a succession of disputes from the start."

ARMED THEFT

Explosion follows Salisbury crisis

WITHIN hours of the State of emergency in the Harare suburb of Bindura, an unexploded bomb damaged a city railway line for three hours.

Declining the emergency, Mr. Bishop, minister of Home Affairs, the colonial Secretary of State for the Home and Colonies, and Mr. Deacon, minister of Law and Order, Mr. Beaumont said the bomb had failed to go off and that the city would have a major supply route for the next few weeks.
