ITALY'S TERMS FOR DISCUSSING PEACE

NEGOTIATION AS BETWEEN VICTOR AND VANQUISHED

Outside the League

ABYSSINIA UNHESITANTLY REJECTS THE PROPOSAL

Two small hope of success attending the proposal for peace talks between Italy and Abyssinia.

The suggestion is negotiations outside the League between Italy and Abyssinia on the basis of victor and vanquished.

Abyssinia has rejected the proposal and says that fellow members of the League should effectively come to her aid against the aggressor.

As is likely, the attempt at conciliation fails, it will be necessary to summon the Committee of Eighteen, the body which deals with sanctions.

The Next Step

BRITISH DEFENCE ACT, 1935.

Madagascar and M. Aristedo, in conversation with Harry Hopkins, "Report from London," say:

It is understood that Britain has decided to take up its responsibilities on account of the fact that the negotiations were never on direct terms between the two countries and that the League of Nations should not be asked to intervene.

The Committee of Thirteen will be faced with a difficult task if the League's intervention had said and this would likely to involve the convening of the Committee of Eighteen.

Yesterday's Meeting.

ROBINSON CRUSOE DEAD

CASTAWAYS IN REAL LIFE

"STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.

London. Andrew Birkin, old seaman, and real-life Robinson Crusoe, died in the Sennar in Upper Egypt, following an operation. He was about 67. While working as a sail-maker in a sailing ship bound from Hellespont to Alexandria, the ship took fire, and Birkin, who had been adrift for 10 months, was picked up by a steamer which had drifted out of her course. They rowed it in, and were able to obtain both a boat and a sail, and Birkin continued his life as a castaway.

Eventually he was rescued by a ship which had drifted out of her course. The man who found him was a sailor in the Royal Navy, about 10 years ago. He was a survivor of the First World War, about till they were rescued.

MOMENTOUS LEAGUE MEETING TO-DAY

FAILURE OF CONCILIATION EFFORTS

Advance on Addis Ababa

RUOMRS OF ABDICATION AND DEATH OF EMPEROR DENIED

Particular importance will attach to the meeting to-day of the League Council in view of the fact that the Committee of Thirteen that the efforts to bring about a conciliation between Italy and Abyssinia have failed.

Abyssinia has rejected Italy's modified conditions and continues to insist that negotiations must be within the framework of the League and the spirit of the Covenant.

Meanwhile a report from Desio suggests that the Italian forces will start their advance on Addis Ababa almost immediately and it is predicted that the capital will be reached three days after the advance is begun.

Britain's Protest

(British and British Official Wireless Service)

London, April 17.—Bacon's correspondence with Addis Ababa, which he expected Italy's modified conditions to be accepted, was sent to the Foreign Office to show that negotiations must be made within the framework of the League and the spirit of the Covenant.

The French Government, which Italy had declared to be in a position to accept, has taken a more positive posture of goodwill, even though only for a few days, than any other European government.

Bacon is understood to have told the Foreign Office of his opinion of the situation, as important strategic movements were developing, but agreed to refer to either to Signor Mussolini.

Likely Procedure

Rome, April 18.—The report regarding the results of the League's Conference of Ministers and Abyssinians together with a statement of the way will be made before the Committee of Thirteen. The League's resolution to approve this afternoon, and a Monday morning will be submitted to the Council of the League.

To Sanctions Committee of the League is entirely independent of the League's Conference, and it should be summoned by the Secretary General.

The opinion in Geneva is that, though its experts will supervise their work of preparation, the League's Conference will meet on May 11, when the League's Conference will be held. By then the clearest signal will be given, and the League may have clearer.

Fresh Comment

London Press comment on the League's Conference shows that the critical moment has apparently arrived. The "Times" says that at the moment when Abyssinia appears to be won over, it is for the committee to decide whether it is important to hold fast, or to let the League's Conference have a respite.

French and British representatives will be present at the final meeting of the Conference, but the fulfillment of the League's resolution, that the League's Conference will be held, is still to be decided.

The British Foreign Office has issued a circular to all British diplomatic missions in Europe, asking them to consider the possibility of sending delegations to the League's Conference.

ARABS AND JEWS CLASH AT JAFFA

NINE REPORTED KILLED AND THIRTY-NINE INJURED

Situation in Hand

ENGLISH FAMILY STONED AND SLIGHTLY HURT: HAIFA DISTURBANCES

Following on clashes between the Arabs and Jews a serious situation developed at Jaffa, but the Government declared that the situation is still in hand. Battalion charges by the Police were necessary to restore order.

Two people are reported to have been killed in the disturbances. An English business man and his wife and child were stoned and all three slightly injured. In clashes at Haifa a British officer was seriously injured.

Military Standing By

General Service's Annex 2 London, April 19. A serious situation has developed at Jaffa, where clashes between the Arabs and Jews have been reported. The British military authorities charged by the Police were necessary to restore order.

It is reported that some shots were exchanged, resulting in several injuries. The military have been called in.

Emergency Regulations

Jerusalem, April 20. An Order-in-Council has been issued by the High Commissioner regarding the emergency regulations.

An English business man and his wife and child were stoned at Jaffa and all three slightly injured.

Paris, April 19.

It is reported from Cairo that nine people were killed and a score more wounded in the disturbances and 300 arrested. The telegrams to Jaffa are in the hands of the Government's transport to Jaffa and Haifa.

The average price of a very wide range of commodities in Mombasa are 12 per cent cheaper than those in Nairobi. In the figures just issued by Government statisticians showing the average prices of 100 articles of蒙巴萨 in February the index figures for all classes of goods are as follows:—

Foodstuffs, 10.5; clothing,

household goods, 10.5;

drugs, 10.5; motor vehicles,

etc., 10.5; total, 10.5.

The following table gives the index numbers of articles compared with Nairobi represented by an index figure of 100.

Unification in East Africa**A TANGANYIKA REPLY TO UGANDA**

To the Editor: "Sir E. Standard," Sir — Mr. D. N. Stoffell, your subject of "Unification" has covered most of the ground in this column. However, I would like to say that there are some statements in Mr. Stoffell's letter that call for amendment or refutation.

In the first place when conferences have been held on Unification, Uganda has been unrepresented. This is because Uganda and Tanganyika in instances when they have been invited to attend the annual meetings of the Associated Chambers of Commerce, the whole number of them, have been unable to attend. Uganda through some parochial quarrel between the Chambers of Commerce of the two countries. In instances where conferences have been held only Uganda has been unrepresented by local chambers of commerce, independent of any commercial, political or economic body. Uganda has been unrepresented and I have extended to her no co-operation.

I think that I am right in saying that in a number of instances in which Unification has been discussed, an influential body, usually Chambers of Commerce, has been unrepresented.

For instance, Uganda has not attended all minibus and proposals passed at conferences with the view to uniting such a body as the Tanganyika Chamber of Commerce at the same time. Unity is Strength.

KENYA: CONTRASTS AND PROBLEMS — A CRITIQUE

Britain's Budget Proposals Future of the Mandates

INCREASED TAXATION TO PAY FOR DEFENCE

THREEPENCE ON STANDARD INCOME TAX RATE

Bigger Tea Duty

LAST YEAR'S EMERGENCY DEMANDS MET FROM REVENUE

Introducing his fifth Budget in the House of Commons on Tuesday afternoon, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Neville Chamberlain, and his difficulties were unprecedented except for the war period.

He thought, however, that the country could congratulate the new and unexpected demands on its resources. This, he said, was a wonderful demonstration of buoyancy.

The estimated expenditure for the current year is £7,972,907,000 and the revenue on the existing basis of taxation is nearly £776,000,000, leaving a prospective deficit of over £21,000,000.

He hoped to meet the deficit and provide for a surplus of half a million pounds the following steps will be taken:

Standard rate of Income Tax to be increased by three pence in the pound.

Tax duty to be increased by twopence a pound.

Road Fund to be raised to the extent of £5,250,000.

Small amendments to the law are designed to deal with tax evasion.

The Chancellor announced that he had decided to set aside further £200,000,000 this year for supplementary defence for, in addition to the provision already announced.

Measures Against Evasion

(Reuter's Agency and British Official Wireless Press)

The Chancellor initiated raising the standard rate of Income Tax to three pence, an increase of one-tenth of a penny, and transfer from the unremunerated Strategic Gold Fund to the Diplomatic Gallery of the Bank of England. These were full measures, the visitors reported, of the Dominions.

Mr. Chamberlain opened his speech amid cheers at the beginning and again the last night, and was received with a standing ovation.

On the first night the Chancellor gave a review of the past year, and was given a standing ovation. That was followed by the estimate of £7,972,907,000. That was the estimate of the Chancellor, and it was present it had been made in the same way as the new and revised demands on the new financial year.

Record Death Duties

would be required for the Air Force to stand what would be wanted for Army and Navy, though together these two probably need rather more than the present amount available in the Air Force. This provision will add to the mandates budget the total for the Air Force, and with £22,000,000 more for change, and £11,300,000 for other estimated future services, for the current year to the total of £7,972,907,000.

From "Bitter" to "Bitter" also came a substantial increase—£10,000,000 from income tax, and £3,000,000 from stamp duty, which would add to a "year long" of the important part of the last few years' trade deficit.

He put down £50,000,000 as the yield from death duties.

An estimated revenue of over £100 million was expected from loss, tobacco, exports and Ottawa duties.

Taxes Against Evasion

The Chancellor introduced legal changes to prevent tax evasion, dealing particularly with foreign companies, and retaining control of those still remaining in Britain while those living in Britain were given a choice.

As a result of this legislation, the law was expected to bring in over £100 million this year and four million next year.

So-called educational taxes were well made but similarly were wholly created by the Chancellor.

The new crusade for tax evasion is an effort for children of men who are most anxious to be taxed.

General Duties has told us that he intended to have Empress's army on April 5, but the Chancery departmentalized him by attacking him.

RED RUBBER DAY

In Eastern and Central Africa

The years 1897 and 1898 formed the basis for the Belgian Congo and North-West Rhodesia (as it was then known) to become independent. The Belgians were given a mandate by the League of Nations to administer the territories, which had been turned over to them by the British Government.

With Rhodesia, Norton was working with the Belgians in the Belgian Congo, in the "Red Rubber Days."

The two men were amongst the "tribesmen" who had been turned out from their homes around them, and the Congo was seeking in rebellion against the Belgians.

They were not allowed to rubber, fangs natives, but only rubber, fangs natives.

Norton went north to Loanda, where Dan Crawford, Plymouth Brother and reformer, was then Minister.

Rabson went to the British side of Lake Niassa, where he sought refuge.

Micky Norton then sent word that he had permission to go to Rhodesia.

The effect was almost miraculous.

Within 24 hours, Micky had joined his compatriot in his camp. It had only cost him about 44 pounds.

Following his return to the African Lakes Corporation for Shs. 51— to Shs. 5700 a pound.

Thousands of naked natives in the Congo were now encountered, and Norton and Rabson gained considerable influence over them.

They were granted a concession by the Belgian Government.

Following their training, Rabson and Norton had parted followed the rivers to the south, and took to shooting elephants and killing Kafirs in their hunting areas.

Norton then sold trade goods and recruited labour.

He was soon promoted to the Bosse Way in 1902.

He served with the Cape Mounted Police.

During 1903 he was appointed to the Royal Engineers.

After the war in South Africa, Norton was promoted to Captain and visited Etosha, Lake Albert and Bulawayo. He arrived in Dar es Salaam in 1905, during the Maji-Maji rebellion of the Susan and other tribes.

There followed the "Adventure in Dar es Salaam" for which Norton was praised in a short article in the "Daily Mail" for his work in a difficult situation.

Norton could not get permission to leave Dar es Salaam, but he rounded up 20 donkeys, and set off across country with gunny-sacks containing what he had been able to find in the market place.

The Germans then sent an army to expel him, but he was unharmed.

They met Micky Norton on the road and asked for his name, and he told them that he was a doctor.

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
