League of Nations Must Continue

DESPITE ITS FAILURE IN THE RECENT WAR

BRITAIN TO SET ABOUT TASK OF REORGANISATION

FUTURE OF SANCTIONS

CONTINUANCE FUTILE AND DANGEROUS
SAYS SIR A. CHAMBERLAIN

ADMITTED failure of the League of Nations to prevent war and the need for the reorganisation of the structure were points in the important debate on foreign affairs in the House of Commons on Wednesday afternoon.

Replying to Labour criticisms of the Government's policy in regard to the Italo-Abyssinian war, Mr. Anthony Eden said the only immediately effective sanction would have been the closing of the Suez Canal against Italy, an action which inevitably would have led to a European war.

The British Government, he added, would engage at once with the Dominion Governments in consideration of the problem of reforming the League.

The debate was notable for a fierce attack by Mr. Churchill on the Prime Minister who, he said was not facing the realities of the situation.

Sir Austen Chamberlain advocated the abandonment of sanctions and declared that their continuance would constitute a policy of equal danger and futility.

Attack on the Premier

(British and British Official Wireless Press)

London, May 6.—The debate on the League of Nations was continued yesterday in the House of Commons from which the Labour members, except Hon. Herbert Morrison, Bishop Auckland, who charged the Government with the responsibility for the military dimensions of League of Nations and the whole idea of collective security, abstained.

The Foreign Secretary, Mr. Anthony Eden, intervened early in the debate and opened with reference to the representation of the last few days in Addis Ababa.

Italian Governors

London, May 6.—Head of Foreign missions at Addis Ababa have issued a note of protest to the League of Nations in behalf of Marshal Badoglio, announcing that the League has assumed all civil and military functions in the name of the King of Italy, and appointed military and civil Governors of Addis Ababa, which is now the capital of the Italian colony, and military commander.

An interesting situation with reference to the maize position in the Colony has been created by an increase in the pig population this year, and from the present export to off-shore a considerable amount of their surplus maize has been required to meet the quantity of maize finds its way to the United States. This has caused a great demand for maize, which has driven the price on the European market, and should remain high for some time.

The latest African figures to hand indicate the growing export will be more than sufficient to meet the present requirements, but the export surplus will be.







THE EMPEROR FLIES TO DJIBOUTI

Wild Scenes in Addis Ababa

Several Europeans Killed During Looting

EMPEROR'S REQUEST TO BRITAIN

The End of Organised Resistance

May 2. **THE Emperor has fled with his family to Djibouti, the government has left for the West and the Italian outposts are within sight of Addis Ababa, which is in the hands of a mob who are shooting, burning and pillaging without restraint.**

In Addis Ababa there is terror, in Gondar consternation. In Paris there is a feeling that France's "Hot Show" policy has been justified, and in Rome the flight of the Negus is regarded as relatively unimportant.

The news is regarded most gravely in London, where it is felt that the Emperor's departure means the end of organised resistance.

In spite of landslides and thunderstorms the Italian march is pressing on to Addis Ababa while General Sadoghi prepares for a triumphal entry.

Mountain passes and bad roads are the only opposition the Italians have between them and the capital, as was no response to a last minute appeal by the Emperor on Friday to all able bodied men to stem the advance.

On the contrary, a number of chieftains are reported to have submitted to the Italians.

May 3.

The Emperor of Abyssinia has asked that the British Government should send a warship to take him, and his family from Djibouti and it is believed two vessels are on the way from Aden in answer to the request.

Several Europeans were killed as a result of the wide spread disorders in Addis Ababa which followed immediately on the departure of the Negus and continued throughout the week-end and the British Legation accordingly issued some suitable rescripts.

The looting had commenced by yesterday morning but details of dispersals were reported to the remaining city of the last directions given to the Emperor and that the public were to be allowed to take anything they liked from it. They did so.

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UNDER ITALIAN RULE IN ADDIS ABABA

Orderly Conditions Being Restored

POPULATION DISARMED

Following are extracts from the Italian Official Wireless Press from Addis Ababa, Tuesday night:

ADDIS ABABA: As soon as the Italian troops had entered the city, the population's morale was restored and a quiet return to normality started. The High Command announced for the second time that the Italian police employing the local militia forces with Italian elements of the Legions, the "Carabinieri" and other Italian forces. The safety of the town has been round about down to date.

Following the above expression of the Legions, Italian and American Italian instruments are guarding them.

The situation had become more normal since the 11th hour before the Italian entry that the Legions of France, where ever they were, had taken advantage of a cessation of hostilities to send up from Dixie Dawa. After the arrival of the Legions, the Italian forces have arranged that those troops be returned to Dixie Dawa as they arrive at Addis Ababa.

The relations between the military authorities and the Legions of France are very good.

At present the Italian forces are still in Addis Ababa, but it is estimated that within 15 days they will be withdrawn.

The Italian Legions are now in the process of re-arranging the conditions of the French Legions that have been sent.

WASHINGTON: According to the United States Vice Consul at Addis Ababa, the Legions of France and the Foreign Department think that the soldiers sent by Marshal Badoglio to protect the Italian Legions have done their duty and that there was no longer any need for them.

In the capital of Abyssinia the population has been dispersed in the Legions district the situation has returned to normal.

Future of Sanctuaries

LONDON: Mr Austin Chamberlain said yesterday in the Chamber of Commons that the restoration of sanctuaries was not a priority of the League of Nations and one which would not bring any change in the atmosphere of Europe.

He said: "I am not in a position to judge the situation of Europe and of the League of Nations."

Mr Chamberlain said that he understood that the League would make Mussolini disavow his policy which moved him to withdraw Italy from the part of the whole mass of the Italian people. One of the difficulties of the League is that in spite of all the attempts made by the League, Mussolini has decided that Italy must remain in Abyssinia and that by Italy's desire to continue in future co-operation with other members of the League, who would advocate the continuation of sanctuaries should therefore take account of the price which would be paid.

While the debate in the House

of Commons was going on, Sir H. H. Harmsworth, a speaker for the Conservative party, on the Radio Ethiopian station in the course of which he said: "It is not necessary for them away from the League of Nations to see that the new Italy of today is stronger than the old Italy and that she is determined to give her country a free and independent existence. 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

ETHIOPIA PART OF ITALIAN EMPIRE

DRAMATIC ANNOUNCEMENT BY MUSSOLINI

King Emmanuel as Emperor

ANNEXATION TO BE DEFENDED IF NECESSARY BY ARMS

AMIDST scenes of the wildest enthusiasm Signor Mussolini announced to an immense crowd in Rome on Saturday Italy's annexation of Abyssinia.

The King of Italy has assumed the title of Emperor of Abyssinia and the country will be ruled by a Governor General with the title of Viceroy. Marshal Badoglio has been appointed the first Viceroy.

Early reports indicate that world opinion is very disturbed by this latest development of the Abyssinian situation.

The First Viceroy

[THROUGH REUTER'S AGENCEY] Rome, May 10.—A formal ceremony was held yesterday at the Quirinal Palace, Rome, to confer upon King Emmanuel the title of Emperor of Abyssinia. The King, dressed in his ceremonial robes, was received by Marshal Badoglio, who had come from Genoa to witness the ceremony.

The buildings in the city were lit up with torches and hundreds of electric bulbs, and the streets were blocked with the dense traffic.

The garrison of Rome was drawn out to mark the entry of the Emperor into the city.

It was the third of the Unknown Soldier that was paraded before the King.

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The First Viceroy, King Emmanuel, was to be said, would assume the title of Emperor of Abyssinia. It was also stated that Abyssinia would be ruled by a Governor-General with the title of Viceroy and that the new ruler would be Viceroy of Abyssinia.

Marshal Badoglio will be Viceroy of Abyssinia.

Duce's Speech

In the course of his speech Signor Mussolini said that Italy had given her Emperor to the Free Empire, and that the indefatigable signs of the determination and power of the Roman people to defend their country were, because they wanted peace for themselves and all. "But we have given our Emperor to Abyssinia," against anyone who opposes us, with arms.

This Emperor, he added, for four years, the experts of the Italian army, the young generation of Italy have disciplined; this is the truth. Marshal Badoglio, the conqueror associated the defeat of Abyssinia with her destiny; this conqueror, together with his troops, another with an imminent march towards the possibility of the conquest of Egypt.

"Will you be worthy of that?" the Duce asked, and there was a roar of approval from the crowd. Signor Mussolini added: "This is like a great oath which we have taken red and in blood, to death."

Signor Mussolini's last speech showed such contempt for the League of Nations that he was barely able to make one without the interruption of tumultuous applause.

ROME DOMINATES LEAGUE COUNCIL DEBATE

LAST NIGHT'S IMPORTANT SESSION

French Government Change

MAY CAUSE ADJOURNMENT, WITH SANCTIONS STILL IN OPERATION

ALTHOUGH there are nineteen items on the Agenda, including the Iraq dispute, the settlement of the Assyrians, and the Locarno question, the session of the League Council which opened yesterday evening, Mr. Anthony Eden, was expected to be dominated by the Italian Abyssinia conflict, which entered upon a new phase during the weekend, by the declaration of Signor Mussolini in Rome of the annexation of Abyssinia, and the assumption of the title of "Emperor of Abyssinia"¹² by the King of Italy.

Messages from Geneva and Paris suggest that on the ground of the imminent change of Government in France, the League Council will adjourn the Abyssinian decision until the next meeting of the Council on June 15, meanwhile leaving the present sanctions against Italy in operation.

Rome, May 11.—The Foreign Minister of India, Mr. J. M. Mehta, stated that he had been informed by a gesture from Rome that the Italian Ambassador had withdrawn his note of protest against the settlement of the Abyssinia conflict.

The Daily Telegraph quotes Mr. Mehta as saying that every Government, on behalf of the League, must confide in the League, as the best instrument for settling its disputes, except for it to be known, and in the same extent, as such a policy was pursued collectively.



Egyptian Pact Composition

"STANDARD" composition—

London, May 1.
(By Air Mail.)

The House of Commons is shortly to receive a statement from a proposal to this effect will be made at the meeting on May 18.


