













COMPREHENSIVE SCHEME FOR ARMAMENTS

900 New Contracts

FIRMS TO BUILD NEW PREMISES AT GOVERNMENT EXPENSE

BRITAIN is planning her armaments programme in such a way as to be ready, if need arises, to go to war at 24 hours.

The revelation was made by the newly appointed Minister of Defence in an important speech in the House of Commons on Thursday.

Thomas Inskip stated that the Government was ready to allocate contracts to 900 recognised firms and a detailed survey of the industrial resources of the land had been made.

More firms would be asked to build additional accommodation at Government expense for the construction of warships.

BIG LONDON DOCKS SCHEME

Expenditure of Almost £12,000,000

To Begin This Year

DUE TO PHENOMENAL TRADE INCREASE

Rugby, May 22.—A credit scheme for the reconstruction and development of London's docks, estimated to cost nearly £12,000,000, is an important part of the Government's programme. It is to be put into hand this year, and carried out in stages in as short a time as possible.

It provides for new docks and basins, and accommodation for larger craft, vessels, new warehouses and sheds, and the reconstruction of existing quay equipment.
