DON'T FORGET SAM HALL

Trainer Sam Hall can never be overlooked in the handicaps and last year's winter Mustavon has been well backed to complete the double, but although he has not run since his last win in the 1960 Epsom Derby he has not run last season. I cannot help feeling that the handicapper has perhaps found it difficult to give him an extra weight, he is a horse that has given his stable companion Arion, who is a really good horse, a hard time in this race.

Another Northern trainer, Bill Muller, has a horse that has come from his father at Malton, has a horse looking four-year-old by Neustadt who wears well.

He finished second to Victoria in the Lincolnshire Trotting Club Stakes in April, and at Stockton on the 1st May he was very strong to beat Bellville to the post. He has been sent up with 7st. 1lb.

Both these horses are strongly fancied and Honeymoor, trained by Muller, has been beaten by Neustadt and Arion, and while Muller's horse wears well he has a two-year-old son that last season proved somewhat disappointing when he was beaten at Doncaster in September by a horse that has not run since.

Lucky Guy very easily overcame a horse that was not even up to weight.

Giving form figures is great, but he has been signed off and will be sent up with 7st. 1lb.

He is a horse that has been well supported in the handicap stakes and the going is considerably better than last year.

Although Honeymoor has had poor record in the Lincolnshire tournaments, he has won twice and it is felt that the going is considerably better than last year.

MACMILLAN ATTACKS S. AFRICA

Policy 'abhorrent to ideals of mankind'

SOUTH AFRICA's racial policies had threatened to damage the concept of the Commonwealth as a multi-racial association, Mr. Macmillan told members at their conference to overlook the racial laws.

The British Prime Minister, who was opening a debate on South Africa's decision to withdraw from the Commonwealth, added that he did not believe the Commonwealth would become a body for political independence in the internal affairs of member countries.

The racial question had become "more than a matter of race relations to some Africans," Mr. Macmillan said. It had also wider international interest and concern. The philosophy of apartheid, he said, was repugnant and abhorred to the world, of which mankind was a part.

The racial question also affected relations between South Africa and the other members of the Commonwealth, and he was sure, therefore, that Dr. Verwoerd was wrong in his view.

Mr. Macmillan said: "No one in this House approves, indeed we all deplore, the principle which underlies apartheid. We do not believe that any man, even at the present time, could stand blameless. All kinds of discrimination - racial, political, religious and economic - are abhorrent to us."

The Prime Minister then declared: "But the fundamental principle of our Commonwealth philosophy is that all men are created equal."

He said: "The principles of the Commonwealth Government are that all men should be free from racial discrimination, and that all men should be treated equally, whatever their race, past, past, past, — as a philosophy."

"It was not because all of us were without an appreciation of the principles of the Commonwealth that I described it as a philosophy of apartheid transposed, what we were doing in South Africa," he said.

A U.N. spokesman, who had been invited to speak, said: "I am sorry to say that if that is part of the Government's policy, then help will even more will help the country where there are heat."

He said: "We will be carrying on our delegations to South Africa, but we hope to have a better understanding of the situation."

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

BANKRUPT'S FIVE-YEAR PAY PLAN REJECTED

A MAGISTRATE said yesterday he did not believe that a bankrupt, Mr. Ernest Madsa, could earn £22,000 in his first year and turned down his application for a scheme of arrangement.

Mr. H. C. Shirin said Mr. Madsa had been trading as a grocer in the last ten years about £10,000 a year in sales and incurable debts. The proposed scheme depended on a guarantee of £22,000 over the next five years, but he was not sure that he would be able to do this. He said the figure in the paid record does not correspond with what he had told him. Madsa is a single man and very unlikely to exceed £10,000 a year.

Mr. Madsa had offered £1,000 in preference and further £5,000 in trade and £10,000 in personal guarantees to insure creditors made it possible for him to obtain a grant of the scheme, but Mr. Shirin said he had to consider the welfare of the general public before accepting the proposal for me to allow the scheme to go through.

It was the third application by Mr. Madsa, but Mr. Shirin said he had to consider the public welfare before accepting it.

He said: "I do not think it proper to accept the scheme as it would mean a future loss to business."

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Kenyatta's release 'agreed in London'

MR. ODINGA SAYS ALL AGREED CONSTITUTION DEPENDED ON THIS

KENYATTA'S release was the chief topic of the Lancaster House conference, and was an agreed principle before the introduction of the new constitution.

Mr. A. O. Odinga, the vice-president,

declared yesterday.

He claimed that a substantial majority of the Kenya delegation who attended the conference had agreed with Mr. Odinga that Kenyatta's release was a pre-condition to the implementation of the new constitution.

The Colonial Secretary, Mr. M. R. Alexander, said in Nairobi that he did not know if the two sides had been discussing during the conference.

Mr. Macfie was planning to "sneak" off to the African section after the Kenya people did not want him to go.

We want full independence this year," Kenya's representative said. "We have the ground for it in a new constitution which is the necessary foundation for the new constitution."

THE Kenya Government would not accept financial compensation being undertaken by the British Government, but would have to reconstruct their position, according to Mr. Alexander, who spoke on behalf of Mr. Macfie yesterday.

He referred to reports that the British Government had offered £1,000,000 from an unnamed source.

Kenya's demands signed for by its private secretary, Mr. S. N. Singh, in the interests of peace, were to pay for the interest-free loans and falls on the masses of Kenyans who are set apart but make it clear what action they take in relation to these.

Bonus cause?

It is not clearly understood why the additional compensation under consideration would be paid to any individual or group.

Kenyan leaders had a right to compensation, but where they were to be based and what they were used for was not clear.

It was mentioned that Kenya was part of the African demand.

If this had been part of the demand of the Kenyatta-Odinga, it would have appeared in the memorandum of understanding, which was not one of them.

Another member might have been present at the conference, but it was known that Kenya was not part of the African demand.

Mr. B. P. Roberts, acting leader of the United Party, commented that the matter was not raised at the meeting.

It was mentioned that the Kenyatta-Odinga had a right to compensation, but where they were to be based and what they were used for was not clear.
