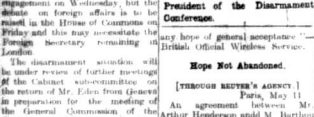

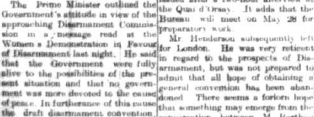

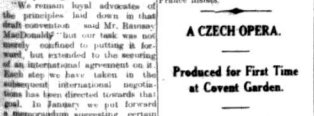

EDUCATION—HOTELS FOR HOLIDAYS

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir.—None time ago a letter appeared from the Hon. Mr. Shimoni, M.P., in connection with the accommodation—or rather lack of it—for Indian students during the holidays. I have, unfortunately, mislaid the letter, and can only quote from memory, but the gist of it, so far as I can recollect, was as follows—

I. That certain students, who were unable to return to their homes in India, and 1,000, were refused accommodation in the boarding-houses attached to the Indian Government School.

What was the duty of the Director of Education, and of the Principal of the School, to provide such accommodation.

2. That during the holidays, the boarding-house staff should be obliged to remain on duty—incidentally, one presumes the Principal as well—in order to carry on the routine as in term time.

It is not from lack of sympathy that I have to acknowledge that we are unable to see where these students had a grievance.

In the first place, I do not know any educational establishment in the world where it is regarded as the duty of members of the staff to make arrangements for the board and lodging of stray pupils out of term. Surely that is a matter for the parent or guardian.

In the second place, whatever might be said on behalf of Kenya students—and I personally think there is nothing to support this—there is no responsibility whatever for those who come from other territories. Government schools are maintained by the taxation of the people of Kenya and they are under no obligation to admit outsiders, except as a matter of courtesy.

We further know that, even

after paying the fees demanded, many are urging that education should be refused to these pupils, because the community can only bear a certain amount of expenditure. Unless referred to agree to pay the fees, or to leave Government boarding-houses with the additional cost which the community in Kenya has to meet by special taxation, it comes to this that part of the sums are used to educate persons for whom the school has no responsibility whatsoever.

Should, after going on for as long as Kenya staffs and buildings should be at the disposal of Government students, merely because their parents refuse to pay or to contribute towards the cost of their education, it is not surprising that the Government should be unable to do so. I am sure that the Government should be able to do so, but it is not surprising that the Government should be unable to do so.

I frankly cannot see what justification there is for Kenya to ask the Government of India to pay for the education of persons from other Colonies and Protectorates, but I am quite sure that any scheme of the nature I suggest would receive the support of the Director of Education and of the Principal and his staff at the Indian Government School.

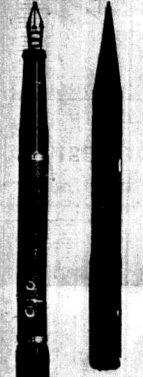

NAIROBI WATER SUPPLY FROM RUIRI.

Criticism of Municipality by Local Association.

ALLEGED DELAY

Mayor Requested to Convene Public Meeting.

Strong criticism of the Municipal Council of Nairobi was voiced by several speakers at the monthly meeting of the Nairobi Association on Wednesday evening, when the subject of the Ruiru water supply scheme was debated. It was finally decided to ask His Worship the Mayor (Councilor J. Mortimer) to call a public meeting at which the matter could be thrashed out.

In initiating the discussion, Mr. H. P. Bergman mentioned that he had been received from the Mayor stating that in view of the debate that had taken place at the last meeting of the Association on the same subject and in view of an informative letter by Councilor J. Johnson that had appeared in the East African Standard, he considered that no good purpose would be served by having the subject on the agenda for Wednesday's meeting. He asked, on these grounds, to be excused for withdrawing his promise to speak at that meeting. He added that if, on some other occasion, the committee would care to invite him to speak on municipal matters, he would be quite willing to do so.

Information Withheld.

The Association committee, Mr. Bergman continued, had addressed a letter to the Town Clerk pointing out that in view of what he, the Town Clerk had stated that the Council was not in a position to supply information asked for by the Association, was considered most satisfactory by his committee, who took a grave view of the matter. His committee, he added, held the view that the pub-

lic was entitled to the fullest information on the scheme, in which a large expenditure of public money was involved.
He could not credit it for a moment that the people who they treated to look after the affairs of the town should have allowed a consultant engineer to come out from England on speculation and without any agreement having been entered into. Nor could he imagine any engineer leaving England to come here without first knowing what remuneration he would receive.

The Works Committee of the Council on the 12th inst. had called on Mr. G. Guinness-Bonpas, said, proposed to make public at an early date an official statement of the position. There were certain particulars which made it imperative for the statement to be published immediately.

Mr. Bergman held that there was no reason whatever why the information asked for by the Association should not have been supplied.
The scheme was imperative if the health of the inhabitants of the town was to be given proper consideration. Although the cost of the plant had been estimated at Kikuyu, from where the town at present received its water supply, it was so placed that it could not treat directly above one-third of the water delivered to Nairobi, and therefore the expenditure on the plant had yielded no benefit up to date. It was entirely inadequate for the needs of the town.

Resolution of Protest.
He then made the following proposal, pointing out that its object was to induce the Government to invade the Council in the interests of the town.
This meeting views with grave mistrust the attitude adopted by the Municipal Council of Nairobi in declining the request of the Nairobi Association for information as to the scope of the work in connection with the acquisition of the rights of the Ruiru water scheme which consulting engineers have been engaged to undertake; the ex-

penditure involved in the engagement of their services; and the estimated total cost incident to the preparation of the scheme, reckoning in the value of the services rendered by the Council's staff, permanent and otherwise.
In view of the circumstances, and the delay in the provision of a (an adequate water supply for Nairobi, this meeting deems it desirable that Government be requested to exercise the powers conferred reserved under section 118 (1) of the Municipalities Ordinance (1925) for the purpose of ensuring an adequate and satisfactory water supply for the town as immediately.

Dudson reviewed the history of the scheme at length, and forwarded arguments to show why it was desirable that the Association should appoint a staff in the judicial and civil affairs of the town, and of Kenya. The Governor, he said, should use his prerogative to disband the Council, and should appoint a Commissioner to manage the affairs of the town.
Mr. J. Eddell declared that the Governor had all along been willing that the Council should get on with the project.

The Council's Position.
Councilor Bonpas told the meeting that the Council had for a long time been unable to get a definite reply from the Government as to whether they would be allowed to extract as much water from the Ruiru as would be required to meet the demands of the town.
It was impossible to state what fee was to be paid the consulting engineer until it was known for how long he was likely to be employed here, and to what extent he and the municipal staff would be able to collaborate.
Dealing with a suggestion by Mr. Bergman that the Council should be empowered to employ a staff of the Council's own making, he stated that everything that happened in committee meetings was private until it was dealt

Proposals for a Final Settlement of Land Disputes.

2,629 SQUARE MILES TO BE ADDED TO NATIVE LANDS. The White Highlands. TO BE RESERVED AND SECURED TO EUROPEAN SETTLEMENT. "Highlands" Increased by 200 Sq. Miles.

The Report of the Carter Land Commission was issued in Nairobi yesterday morning...

For the purposes of its investigation, the Commission divided the country into a series of new land classifications...

The present area of Native Reserves is given as 49,496 square miles. The Commission propose that there be added: In satisfaction of historical claims, 1,474 sq. miles...

These additions amount to 2,629 square miles and bring the total area of the Native lands, permanent and provisional, to 52,125 square miles.

The Commission further propose that special leasehold areas be set aside for the exclusive use of detached natives...

The White Highlands are reserved in principle for the European community. The effect of the recommendations is to exclude from the area described geographically as "European Highlands" a total area of 715 square miles...

As against these exclusions, however, there are large additions to the geographical area of the Highlands, mainly 870 square miles of Mount Kenya and Mount Elgon Forests...

The result is that the geographical area of White Highlands is increased from its present approximate total of 16,500 square miles to 16,790 square miles.

To provide complete security for white settlement, the Report proposes that a special Order in Council be issued defining the status of the European Highlands.

The whole of the remainder of the country, to be known as Class D land, is then to be thrown open to land-holding on a non-racial basis...

It is proposed that to establish the confidence of the Natives and to obtain freedom from a local political atmosphere, the Land Trust Board (which will hold the Native Lands, no longer to be called Crown Lands, in trust) should sit in London.

Unable to find other suitable areas for the Samburu, and convinced by special surveys and reports that the tribe could not accommodate its stock and satisfy its legitimate needs in its own area...

Another important excision from the area claimed for white settlement is the Cephalungu forest which is to be added to the Lumba Reserve in satisfaction of losses through alienation of the Sotik area.

Urgent Problem of Regeneration of Reserves. Great stress is laid by the Commission on the urgent need for regeneration of the Reserves, particularly those occupied by pastoral tribes...

Native cattle, now numbered at six million, have doubled in twelve years and the Commission believes a quarter of a million would be to be slaughtered every year.

A sum of £56,000 is owing by the War Office to native carriers of the Military Labor Corps who died or disappeared during the war and whose wages were never paid.

The Commission consider that retention of this "debt of honour" by the Imperial Government is a "much more serious violation of the principle of trusteeship to the natives than any of the injuries which the natives have suffered by the alienation of their land."

Finally the Report proposes that all Native land claims outside the Reserve be extinguished including those protected by law, which existed on alienated land and threatened the validity of many titles.

The Report of the Kenya Land Commission was issued in Nairobi and simultaneously in London yesterday. It comprises five volumes (1) The Report (2) Documents relating to the Kikuyu Provinces (3) Evidence relating to the Mau Mau Uprising...

The first volume, which contains the recommendations, is of 718 pages with 32 appendices, and index and many maps.

"We considered that by such an arrangement we should be able to provide for the needs of natives, both detached and individual, and to provide safeguards...

"Claims of Right." The Commission first addressed themselves to the trial aspect of the matter, and confined themselves principally to the task of dealing with (a) What land the several tribes claim on historical grounds...

"In so far as tribal claims are concerned, the Commission took a broad and liberal view in each case and have made recommendations on page 3."

Members and Terms of Reference.

The personnel of the Commission were: Mr. MORRIS CARTER, C.B.E. (Chairman). Mr. W. H. HEMSTED, O.B.E. Capt. F. O. B. WILSON, D.S.O. Mr. S. H. FAZAN, O.B.E. (Secretary). The Commission were appointed by the Secretary of State for the Colonies in April 1932 and the Report is addressed to him. The terms of reference were:

(1) To consider the needs of the native population, present and prospective, with respect to land, whether to be held on tribal or on individual tenure.

(2) To consider the desirability and practicality of setting aside further areas of land for the present or future occupancy of (a) communities, bodies or individual natives of recognised tribes, and (b) detached natives, that is natives who belong to no tribe or who have severed connection with the tribe to which they once belonged.

(3) To determine the nature and extent of claims asserted by natives over land alienated to non-natives and to make recommendations for the adequate settlement of such claims whether by legislation or otherwise.

(4) To examine claims asserted by natives over land not yet alienated and to make recommendations for the adequate settlement of such claims within the White Paper 1932.

(5) To consider the nature and extent of the rights held by Natives under section 4 of the Crown Lands Ordinance (Chapter 148 of the Revised Edition), and whether better means could be adopted for dealing with such rights in respect of (a) land already alienated, and (b) land alienated in the future.

(6) To define the area generally known as the Highlands, within which persons of European descent are to have a privileged position in accordance with the White Paper 1932.

(7) To review the working of the Native Lands Trust Ordinance, 1930, and to consider how any administrative difficulties that may already have arisen can best be met whether by supplemental legislation or otherwise without involving any departure from the principles of the said Ordinance.

THE CARTER COMMISSION REPORT.
 (Continued from page 1.)

intentionally "for a final settlement."
 "The total additions which we tried territory in addition to such claim amount on balance, after allowing for exchanges of approximately 1,874 square miles, per cent of the present total area of the native reserves."

Future Needs.
 "In order to form an estimate of the needs of the various peoples of the land, the Commission has examined the quality of the land at the disposal of each tribe and regarding the habits and needs, taken as a whole, that may be able to support the total population, which lives in the square mile. But taking as a very narrow distribution."

Kikuyu Commission.
 "The Commission found that in three Kikuyu districts some form of general congestion exists, it could be a large reserve to be reserved by the practice of better methods of agriculture and stock raising, and by modification of the system of land tenure designed to promote a greater equality of distribution, but that the learning of those lessons would take a long time, and that it was not possible to reduce the present number of population on the land until such time as the Kikuyu should have attained greater skill in agriculture and the control of their social life, such as would render the land capable of supporting a larger population in a more advanced degree of material comfort. We have therefore recommended a substantial addition to the Kikuyu reserves."

"The case of the Tavela is somewhat similar, and for them also we have recommended an extension on economic grounds. But among the agricultural tribes generally, and especially the Kavirato, we found that the land is being used unskillfully and that even a moderately extended programme of education in agriculture and pastoral life should suffice to raise the standard of life progressively for many years, even though the population is increasing."

Claims for Pasture Land.

"Claims for extension of territory were advanced by most tribes on the ground that they have not enough pasture land for their cattle. In some cases, for instance, those of the Tavala and the Kavirato and to a less extent the Kamba of Mombasa district, we have found the claims to be justified in the sense that the land which the tribe has at its disposal is not sufficient, unless a general improvement in methods of stock-raising takes place, to enable it to keep the number of cattle which it may reasonably be thought to require. In such cases we have recommended additions of land on economic grounds. "But in most cases—of late years, those of the Buk and the Kavirato—truth of the matter is that the congestion is by want of accumulation of immovable property in the hands of its needs has produced such devaluation by overstocking that, unless conditions are drastically changed, the reduction of these herds is in sight. In such cases the only real remedy is to strike at the root of the evil and reduce the number of live stock."
 "The Commission has advised a special chapter dealing their remedy and in the confidence that their advice will be taken, they have recommended certain additions of grazing lands in order that they may be used as riding grounds in connection with an organized plan of reorganizing the reserves."

The Total Additions.

Summarizing the effect of the proposals the Report states that the total of the additions we have recommended to be made on grounds of economic need are:
 Class B 11-286 square miles.
 Class B 2-289 square miles.
 "The total additions which we recommend to be made to native areas, whether in Class A, B, or C, are 1,874 square miles, or an increase of 1.4 per cent of the present total area of the native reserves."

THE KIKUYU.

A Problem of Congestion.
 Therefore the Report proposes to summarize briefly the recommendations made for the various tribes.
 The first is the Kikuyu. The report.
 "Most of the allegations of which complaint is made by the Kikuyu take place in or on

border of what is now the Kikuyu lands. Our examination of the facts has justified the conclusion that this district was only sparsely occupied at that time, and as any viable occupation was concentrated in the area which that Government should have seen the view that there was much waste land which could be alienated without detriment to the Kikuyu reserves."
 "But the allegations regarding the density of the native population in the Kikuyu reserves, not only by restricting the area, but also in other ways. They were part of the policy of white settlement which resulted in the establishment of the Kikuyu land market at Nairobi, which has drawn population in that direction. The result is that the areas arising in the reserves which threaten to become acute in the next generation."

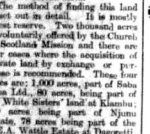
"In all the circumstances we decided that it would be just settlement with the Kikuyu tribes if we should first make an assessment of the land "profit and loss" account, showing the extent of their true basis of territory and give a "Native Reserve" in addition of an equivalent area so great as to "level up" the account, and should then add another area to "Native Reserves," Class B, of 2,570 square miles."
 "For the purpose of striking the balance we assumed that the following areas had already been added to the reserve:
 The Mera area—307 square miles the addition of which had already been approved by the Governor in Council in 1929 and which had been used as native reserves, though not so gazetted.
 10,440—0.62 square miles which had been used by native reserves with the permission of Government in 1929.
 10,398 1/2—0.62 square miles surrendered by the African Inland Mission at Kisumu in 1930 to satisfy native claims.
 21,000 Acres Extra.

In making a figure in respect of the Kikuyu, the Commission first put a condition on the position of the old Kikuyu boundaries in 1905 to the extent of the area "satisfactorily acquired" before that date, and finally concluded that a further balance of 10,220 acres was required for the Kikuyu tribes to be added as "Native Lands." They then added 2,000 acres "as a general compensation for disturbance; a further 1,000 acres in connection with the addition to the reserve of certain Tavala now residing in a forest reserve; and a further 1,222 acres as a provision for two re-occupations, Sibirioni and Tigani. In round figures the Commission made the result 21,000 acres."

"The method of fixing this land is set out in detail. It is mostly virgin forest. Two thousand acres are voluntarily offered by the Church of Scotland Mission and there are four more areas where the acquisition of private land by exchange or purchase is recommended. These four areas are 1,000 acres, part of Bahi Salai, 500 acres, being part of the Kikuyu's land at Kikuyu, and 250 acres being part of Njuru Salai, 75 acres being part of the E. W. White Estate at Dagoretti. It is further proposed that the Dagoretti Township reserve, 20 acres, should be added to the Kikuyu. This part to be set aside for a social and trading centre. There is also a small area of 945 acres, known as "Buk," which has been sold as a part of land in the middle of the Limuru section. The Commission agrees that this is undesirable and suggests various methods by which an area to be acquired from forest land on favourable terms."

to more land on the ground of economic needs, the Commission recommended that 385 square miles of the northern part of the Yatta be added to the Kikuyu tribal area as Native Reserve, Class B1.

The point arose as to whether settlement of tribal claims as a whole could capitally be held in complete settlement with every member of the tribe, or whether the division would still be able to claim rights outside the tribal boundaries on the strength of pitaka rights. The Commission has recommended that in consideration of the general settlement of a sum of £2,000 to be paid to the Local Native Council for compensation for persons affected by the acquisition of the land and of 2,000 acres in general compensation to districts, and in consideration of the general settlement with the tribe, both in respect of the rights and its economic aspect, all private rights of Kikuyu to land outside the Native Reserve should be extinguished as from the date of the settlement, unless such rights as may have been acquired in another Native reserve, e.g. as tenants.

THE MERA.

Reversion to Old Boundaries.
 Now as to the Mera. The Commission points out that the proposed boundaries were gazetted for the Mera in 1925 but different boundaries which excluded 620 square miles. A revision to the 1925 boundaries was approved in 1928 but has not been carried out. The Commission recommends that the addition of the 620 square miles to the new Mera, and that the Government buy the land and maintenance charges of the farm water supply on the Mombasa river.

It is further recommended that the Mera be allowed to be let to the purchaser of an alienated farm, when they want, if the lessee will sell. Further recommendations affecting the Mera are that the Somalis should renounce the land they now occupy in the Mera, that the boundary of the native forest reserve be re-considered and that the K.A.F. should pay rent for the land they occupy in the Mera reserve.

THE MASAI.

The "Mile Zone" to be European.
 The Masai. The Masai claim the area, which is within the north side of the railway

from Athi river township to Sultan Hamud and the fringe, between Ogaya, the Kikuyu River and Sultan Hamud. These areas are known as the "Mile Zone" and "Chyohi" Triangle. The Commission dismisses both claims, and suggest that the Masai should take over annual leases, subject to the usual stipulations, any provision which could be made with the Masai. The Masai Zone should an European Highland.

On the other hand the Commission recommends that another area being a quarter of a mile on both sides from the centre of the Magdali railway line, which was acquired in 1929 and its return recommended by the Masai, should be given to the Masai. The Commission recommends that the Masai Local Native Council should receive the amount paid to Government as purchase price.

A Man Exchange.

The Report further recommends that the Masai receive an area of 14,000 acres, part of which is valuable grazing land, and the southern extremity of the Eastern Masai Forest Reserve, an area of 15,245 acres of forest which would become forest reserve. It is further recommended that the gift to the Masai of 118 acres in the Kikuyu Valley in return for the Kikuyu circumstances, be repurchased by its addition to the Masai Reserve.

The Report proposes that Government reserves be lease or exchange from the Masai an area of 90 square miles in the neighbourhood of the Kierani and Magdali Rivers, adjoining Nairobi, consisting of and within ten miles of the Masai, as a C area where urban natives could establish themselves in small holdings. Generally, the Commission feels that the Masai had ample land and some of the small areas should be leased, if possible, to other tribes such as the Kikuyu.

THE KAMBA.

To Get Half of Yatta Plateau.
 So far as the Kamba are concerned the Commission recommends (1) the addition of 200 square miles of the Yatta Plateau to the reserve and the advantageous exchange of the Kumbukunda location of 500 square miles with the Masai. (Continued on page 8.)

A Forceful Document.

OTHER NATIONS BLAMED FOR SUPPLYING ARMAMENTS.

If other nations stopped supplying arms to the belligerents, the war in South America between Paraguay and Bolivia would cease immediately.

The above suggestion appears in the report of the League of Nations Commission appointed to investigate the dispute. The report is stated to be one of the most forceful documents ever issued by the League.

The Commission alleges that American and European countries are supplying the most up to date armaments to both disputants, who do not produce armaments of any quantity themselves.

The war is described as "singularly pitiless and horrible." Youths of both nations are being wiped out, and owing to wounded soldiers, the whole area is being infected with malaria.

"A Veritable Catastrophe."

London, May 15. (STANDARD'S AGENCY.) An indirect suggestion that the Guabian War between Paraguay and Bolivia would cease immediately if other nations stopped supplying arms to the belligerents is made in a report by the League of Nations appointed to investigate the dispute in the British territory of the Rio de la Plata, which is being brigaded-General Alexander B. Robertson. of the railway and receive an area of approximately 100 square miles east of Embai should remain as the disposal of the Government, it may be required in connection with the establishment of a blood and bone fertilizer factory.

NORTHERN FRONTIER.
Not Reserves, But Prior Native Interests.

In regard to the Northern Frontier for the Commission proposes that except for the West Suk and North Pokomo Reserves, there should be no native reserves in the Northern Frontier and Turboga Provinces. The land, except in those two reserves, should not be used as wholly devoted to native purposes; but it should be recognized as land in which natives have prior interest and hence to non-natives should be reserved to such an extent as to justify the apprehension that the natives might not have sufficient land remaining for their use.

LEROKI PLATEAU.
To Remain in Samburu Hands.

The above recommendation of what is known as the "Codge Lane" by which three square miles and several acres of land have been returned to native use. A recommendation is added that when the Government have been thus afforded the unalienated land made available for settlement to Europeans.

An El Gonyi Reserve.

For the El Gonyi people it is recommended that an alienated farms, compensation paid and all other areas of the reserved area of Moina El Gonyi in the Kipkaren reserve and set aside for the El Gonyi who should have their own.

THE KAVIROUNO.
No Major Additions.

Dealing with the Kavirouno, the Commission proposes a proposal to Government to add 1,300 acres of part of Kismu township to the reserve, that 900 acres at Masego bought by Government from a missionary group in 1920 and used as a social centre be added to the reserve and its use for six present purposes continued, and that if Mr. James Maxwell's farm, proposed to be leased to the B.E.A. Corporation in 1907 for cotton planting, come into the market the Kavirouno be allowed to bid for it.

THE LUMBWA.
To Have Major Part of Chepalungu Forest.

For the Lumbwa, the Report proposes that the 120 square miles of the area known as Chepalungu be added to the Reserve, as Class II land with the condition that portions be provided in the Turboga Province. Certain salt lick rights are also proposed and that an area of two square miles be reserved for the Lumbwa.

The Dorocho.

In regard to the Dorocho, the Commission recommends that they be moved into the reserves if those tribes wish, but they have the most affinity but that the Masai section be given the choice of the Lamboi Reserve or another reserve.

THE NANDI.
Compensation for Kipkaren and Kaimosi.

In regard to the Nandi, the Commission recommends a payment of £20,000 as an estimated capital cost of the low land sustained by them by means of compensation connected with the alienation of the Kipkaren and Kaimosi farms, particularly in connection with the awarding of staminal farms. There is also recommended a modification of what is known as the "Codge Lane" by which three square miles and several acres of land have been returned to native use. Turning now to the Coast Province, the Report emphasizes the responsibility of manufacturing industries of miles of the Tana River banks to the East. The Commission also proposes that an area be set apart in the Tana region for development without racial distinction, i.e. D. area. The Mombasa reserve is regarded as adequate. The claimant's father was deposed by a rival but Mohammed Shoo claims to be the true heir. The Commission, while admitting the possibility, was of the opinion that the story should ever have been put forward seriously.

One Coast Reserve.

Generally the Commission recommends that all the native reserves of the Coast Province, with the exception of North Pokomo, be proclaimed collectively as one reserve to be known as the Coast Province Native Reserve, to facilitate inter-tribal relations and permit more freedom of movement according to economic advantage.

PRIVATE TENURE.
The Aim at the Coast.

The Commission develops a special chapter to the "Ten Miles Strip" and says that, fortunately, they have not to deal with all this land problem of the Coast belt. They emphasize that after providing for native needs in the country and for the European inhabitants, they proposed to be done with the settlement by providing that in such areas there be no racial restrictions at all. By the most important areas to which this provision for the residue would apply is the Coast. The Commission briefly analyzes the position and finds areas which have special conditions—some native, some alien, some others Arab and Swahili professions and areas with exclusively native interests such as the Lamoni and other communities. In most of these small reserves the Commission recommends the issue of private leasehold titles to the occupants and the gradual extinction of such communities as the Wabwari Arab and African communities, allowing in private processes of time these communities to pass into existing ones.

ship without distinction of tribe or race. Considering generally, the Commission says that since the advent of racial privilege exists in these areas and since they propose no immediate and drastic reversal of policy, it follows that our general recommendation that there should be no racial discrimination on the Coast is repeated with the same force as in the previous report. The transfer of land must be qualified to a certain degree. These areas are so small in comparison to the whole Coast that they would not affect the stability as a general principle.

Arab Claims Denied.

The Commission goes on to say that there are however a few claims which, if admitted, would modify the situation previously stated. These are such comparatively small areas as those of the two tribes and of the Lantia Arabs. The Commission points out that under their laws they do not lodge their present claim to large areas of the mainland in 1914 nor do they assert any claim to land in the interior. The Commission does not see any reason why they should be re-opened.

Somewhat the Commission cannot find any grounds for recommending that the application of the three Arab claims which they claim 275 square miles in the Sultanate should be entertained.

Land Titles Problem.

The Land Titles Commission in a section of the Report and the Commission remarks that we are so much impressed with the fact of finding out one and the same land in two different titles in the possession of the Crown and that the work of adjudication should proceed unexceptionally. Communal claims should not be admitted for adjudication out of time in areas where adjudication of claims has already been completed, but should be admissible on equal footing with private claims in areas where they are not admitted. The best way to assist the large number of distributed national titles on the Coast in the opinion of the Commission is not to create more reserves but to adapt their position as tenants and simplify the cost of acquiring a small holding.

On the Coast generally the Commission considers the aim should be the removal of the unsatisfactory though not elaborate system of private tenure either on individual or group titles, but with a clear method of succession.

We are satisfied that the perpetuation of tribal conditions in the Coast is undesirable and would be detrimental to progress. The work of adjudication of private claims should be pushed forward and the Commission leaves it to the Coast Land Titles Commission now sitting to decide whether the present procedure should be amended or not. The Commission points out that the machinery to govern all these questions of title to small and sometimes remote areas is very expensive and suggests that after a period of preliminary work, negotiations should be made and effected.

SECURITY FOR TENANTS.

A Special Problem of Mombasa.

After detailing the peculiar position of the house-owner and the land-owner at the Coast under the Indian law, the Commission states that in all the circumstances the arrangement made for the housing of the native population at Mombasa is unsatisfactory at present. NATIVE LAND. Abolition of Phrase "Crown Land."

Returning to the general Report, the Commission declares that it thinks that the Land Trust Ordinance, by removing the phrase "Crown Land" from the title, is a step in the right direction for the use and benefit of the native. The Commission recommends that the Native Lands as a whole in future should cease to be known as Crown Lands but as Native Land, but vested in a Trust and subject to the sovereignty of the Crown and its general powers of control. They consider that the transfer of land to the Native Lands should be on the basis of the protection of the Land Trust Board and could not be diminished or taken away without the consent of the Board, excepting that an appeal should lie to the Secretary of State.

LAND TRUST BOARD. Should be Established in London.

The Commission reflects that occasions may arise in which the native reserves may have to be protected against the Government of Kenya and, in the opinion of the official who is also a trustee in connection, the Commission strongly favours an independent Land Trust Board in all matters relating to the protection of the native reserves.

"We believe that public confidence in the Board will be greater if the members have no direct connection with the political life of the Colony. But it would be difficult to find in Kenya men of eminence and distinction who are not already involved in some way or other in the political life, in so much a community, are almost a part of daily life."

Native Ownership.

The Report goes on to explain that as an Order in Council is proposed relating to native lands, the members of the Board would be in a position to give effect to the recommendations of the Privy Council and would in certain cases be able to impose a veto on orders or licences which the Government of Kenya had recommended. If the members of such a Board were residents in Kenya the position would be embarrassing for Government and difficult for the natives

Check On Policy.

In order to meet the objection that members in England would not be aware of the conditions of the reserves, the Commission further advises that the Board should receive periodic reports from the Government on any matter affecting the reserves, so that it would be able to appoint representatives to inspect and report directly. Having in mind the fact that many reports must pass before a resolution is passed, it is suggested that the Commission should be invited to send a Board in England to see the reserves and also to receive the views of the public on the proposed recommendation.

In regard to the system of land tenure in the reserves, the Commission suggests that alterations should be made by Government Bill, after full consultation with the natives, but generally favour ultimate private and individual tenure.

A wide range is devoted to the conditions on which land can be used for railways, trading, industrial or other purposes in the reserves and the Commission found it impossible to summarize these views at this point.

No Claims Outside.

The area of land which the Commission proposes should be set aside for leasing by native outside the reserves is 500 square miles. It is mainly in the Northern Frontier Province.

Generally it is proposed that if the native reserves are accepted and compensation paid as provided in this report to land outside their reserves and adjacent areas should be distinguished except in the Coast area, where special conditions prevail.

THE WHITE HIGHLANDS. To be Retained for Europeans.

The Commission supports the principle that the Highlands be retained for European settlement and detests the boundaries. The effect of the proposal on the area is to deduct 75 square miles from the original geographical definition of the "White Highlands" to be added to native reserves. The deduction of native land is estimated to be 200 square miles. The total reserve area on the Highlands as thus defined is 2,500 square miles. The Commission regards all forest area in the Highlands as being potentially subject to European protection. It is a point of local politics. It is a point of local politics.

SECURITY FOR SETTLERS. To be Given by Order in Council.

As the recommendations may perhaps give rise to a natural objection among Europeans, that the extent of the Highlands may be again diminished, the Commission adds: "One of the main objects of our Report has been to remove recommendations which would result in a feeling of insecurity in the minds of the natives in regard to their lands. If in doing so we had only transferred the feeling of insecurity from the natives to the Europeans, we could not feel that we had succeeded in our object. We therefore recommend that the boundaries of the European Highlands should be safeguarded by an Order in Council, so that the European community may have the same sense of security in regard to their lands as we have recommended for the natives."

MINING LEASES. No Need to Excise Land from Reserves.

On the subject of mining leases the Commission is of opinion that the definite restriction of land from the native reserves and suggestion of alternative methods of leasing or leasing under the native title, which would still retain them in the hands of the natives.

With reference to the area required for the purpose of the mining lease, the Commission suggests that the Imperial Government should be asked to pay for this purpose the sum of £2,000,000 due to native persons who died or disappeared during the war and whose claims to arrears of pay were not then posted by the War Office.

Game Parks.

Proposals are also made for the creation of National Game Parks, one of which is the area known as the Nairobi Game Reserve. The Game Warden suggests another game park near Mount Kenia and the Commission agrees, provided the animals are limited in number to a point where there is no danger of their causing impairment to the land.

The Coast.

The Commission themselves estimate the total direct expenditure arising out of their recommendations at £20,000,000, with an annual capital charge of £1,500,000. This does not include the cost of the Commission, placed at £50,000 exclusive of printing cost.

AMERICAN INTIMATION TO BRITAIN.

Effect on Next Instalment.

NOT LIKELY TO BE PAID UNDER PRESENT CIRCUMSTANCES.

In spite of a statement made last year by President Roosevelt that he did not regard Britain as in default, to America, intimation has been received by Britain, along with other countries, that token payments of war debts to the United States will be accepted, but would not save the payer from the status of a defaulter.

The British Ambassador at Washington has been instructed to obtain confirmation of this intimation, as the majority of Cabinet Ministers consider that a token payment is still a default, then no payment at all should be made on June 15 next.

CATTLE IN TOWNSHIPS.

Question of Reappointing Committee of Enquiry.

The Committee appointed by Government in 1920 to enquire into the question of cattle in townships has not met since July of that year, but if there is a demand the Government will consider its re-appointment.

In Legislative Council on Friday the Hon. Comr. Harvey (Dnyms) asked "What progress has been made by the Committee which Government appointed to enquire into the matter of Bovine in Townships?"

The Colonial Secretary replied that the Committee for a variety of reasons has not met since July of that year. If the Government is satisfied that it is a well directed body the Committee will be considered for re-appointing the Committee will be considered.

Arising out of this reply, Mr. Justice Harvey asked what would be required in accordance with the wishes already expressed in this House.

To this the Colonial Secretary replied that the Government required a more general report from the Committee that the report was still required. This report was added, really some on an ad hoc arrangement, and he agreed with Mr. Justice Harvey that there was probably a good deal to be said for reconstituting the body.

The committee, however, had died a natural death, and Government wanted to be sure before they decided that there was reason for doing so.

AFRICAN BEAGONS

From Various Tribes of Kenya.

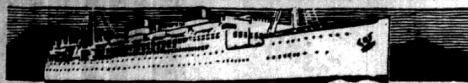

NOTES FOR WIRELESS FANS

This page, devoted to the interests of Wireless, is conducted by "Aerial," a licensed experimenter with a wide knowledge of East African conditions.

Eliminating Interference

A definition of true selectivity has been given last week in which it was shown that it depends entirely on the type and amount of filter circuits provided by the aerial valve. Although selectivity is influenced by a number of factors and may be defined as the actual audible response to wanted signals as compared to unwanted signals as a result of the action of the aerial valve but only on the true selectivity, but also on the relative strength of the mutually interfering stations, the amount of interference is controlled in the receiver and the strength at which the loud speaker is worked.

The H. F. Stage.
It is at first difficult to realize how the addition of low frequency amplification can affect the selectivity of a set but when it is appreciated that an extra stage will increase the strength of both wanted and unwanted stations in the same degree, it becomes clear that in a well designed set, the amount of interference is practically inaudible to the listener. It, therefore, becomes a question of how much greater attention must be paid to the design of the H. F. stage. The addition of a single stage of H. F. amplification, particularly if it is heavily loaded will increase the true selectivity of a set, but will have little effect on the apparent selectivity in that the additional amplification obtained will make that offset the gain in the amplification and selectivity is increased to about the same degree, the apparent selectivity remains unaltered.

The Reaction Control.
It is not always realized that correct use of the reaction control is an important factor in eliminating interference between stations. By the proper use of reaction, the strength of the wanted signal may be considerably increased while the strength of the interfering station increases only slightly or not at all. If reactions are being heard simultaneously, the volume level may be increased so as to eliminate one of them by means of—let us say—any aerial input volume control and reaction then applied to bring to the strength of the wanted station to the normal level. Naturally, this process cannot be carried as far as there are limits to

"Blind Spots" and Echoes.

Notes of the Week.
FOLLOW a variety of reasons I am unable to give my usual opinion on reception conditions this week but reports from friends indicate that the conditions are not so good and that there has been no marked change, my own brief observations confirming this.

Kenya Problem.
J. W. T. Karibu, very kindly sends me a report of reception from both sides of the border during the first three weeks in April. Both sides of the border were constant only well received. London, however, after having suffered loss from static interference and an occasional one-way station, was experienced. The reception was unaltered on one night (the 4th) and on the 29th, apparently suffered badly from interference though the strength was good as was otherwise put down as constant "good" and on the 30th as "very good indeed" as was "TLO, London." Very many thanks for your report which is appreciated and shows for the benefit of listeners in general.
D. O. L. Kaburet, lives on the edge of a forest, and is concerned about its possible effect on reception. He also wants to know the correct length of aerial for reception of Nairobi and London.
Answer—Dense forests have absorption effects but the aerial can be suspended above by means of insulator lines when the latter effects will be experienced.
When you have decided the type of receiver to use it will be well to consider for me to advise you on the subject of aerial length but in any case this should be worked out first. The other matter is receiving station.
C. M. T. Thika. This matter is well outside my province but I will give my best for you in due course.

Echos.
A WORLD-wide wireless experiment in which the most untechnical of listeners are taking part is in progress. It is concerned with the "echo effects" experienced in wireless, the first to say a given signal may be heard several times over with decreasing strength, indicating that it has been reflected from some point or points in space. These known layers effect which reflect short waves attempting to escape into outer space, but some waves penetrate these and are reflected by unknown media at colossal distances. This is proved by the fact that reflected signals have been heard after 25 miles, which appears to imply that they are situated at a distance of some two and one half million miles from earth, the highest of the known layers being a mere 150 miles up. The object of this experiment is to endeavor by means of simultaneous observations throughout the

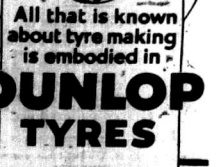

He emphasized that the Bill was the work of the entire Commonwealth Cabinet which had been unanimously endorsed by the Cabinet.

It is not surprising either on overvalued or inflated property, or on a working capital of 100,000,000, to find a 75 per cent. loss on the trading account, and when the cost of living is considerably higher than it was in 1913, and when the value of the pound is steadily falling, it is not surprising that the determination of the farmers, to the detriment of the State, is to reduce the rate of the levy from 10 to 5 per cent. The rate on H.M. the King is a household word to £500,000 per annum, and judges of the High Court in Great Britain accept from the Government of £1,000 per annum from their salaries.

General Manager's Report.

The General Manager's Report on the working, during the year 1933, of the services under the control of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration, has now been published.



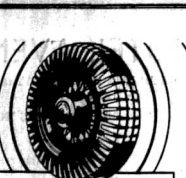

TACTICS IN GOLF. Strict Enforcement of Rules.

Duty of Every Player. KNOW THE LAWS AND AVOID TROUBLE.

ONE of the most important things for every player to be possessed of is a knowledge of the rules.

With the recent alterations to the rules which have been made, it is the duty of every player to make himself well acquainted with the new regulations. It is not sufficient to know that there are two much latitude afforded to players these days, and it would be for the good of the game if clubs would take firm steps to see that breaches of the laws of golf are rigidly punished.

What is the good of making rules if the same are not to be observed and also to be enforced? I agree that the interpretation on many cases is given by the spirit of the game. But Rule 1, which says that players should not agree to condone infractions, is a rule not to waive any penalty incurred. I think it is well to bear in mind that the same rule would be read thus:

It is most important that a player in an area competition should be careful to announce to the opponent the number of strokes incurred in penalty, and also, for the opponent to acknowledge it. If ever a player is in doubt as to a question of the law, he should consult the referee, but neither player taking part. A penalty not stated or claimed, is surely against the spirit of the game, and also a breach of faith as far as the other player is concerned.

As a player with Committee records, I have seen many instances where players have failed to do this, and it is a pity to see such a breach of faith.

THE NEW RULES. In view of the Open Stroke Competition, which is being held at the Matangi Golf Club on Empire Road, it is suggested that every player should be careful to offer a few words of advice to those who are competing.
