# REPUBLIC ISSUE FOR VOTERS

## Undertaking by Dr. Malan

The Prime Minister of South Africa, Dr. Malan, told the Transvaal Congress of the National Party at Pretoria yesterday that he had undertaken to establish a republic in the direction of a republic. He said it would be established democratically by the majority of voters, in a special referendum.

Dr. Malan said it if was to be a strong and stable republic, it had to be the wish of a broad majority. It must be a republic which the rights of all sections of the population could be guaranteed.

"The four of the English section that a republic will bring more rights and opportunity for the Afrikaner," Dr. Malan continued. "It must be made clear that the Afrikaner must be maintained, and that the Afrikaner must be home under a republic."



firstly we investigated the theory that there was no such animal. A large beast had been getting reports from the natives about a large animal which had been seen from our boat.

On the 12th, on crocodiles were a daily occurrence on our river, we saw a crocodile 13 feet long.

We came across 15 or 20 at a time, some swimming in the water and seemingly swimming upstream against ripples which kill 20 per cent of all cattle in the country.

### SUPPORT PROMISED FOR BRITISH PROPOSALS

A **more acceptable substitute** for the European Defence Community had not been developed fully, Mr. Dulles, the U.S. Secretary of State, disclosed at his arrival at New York on Sunday from the British Foreign Secretary, in London.

Adopting a cautious attitude, he had hoped something to "justify a proposal which was to be dispatched during the week." Before leaving, he had endorsed, in broad outline, Britain's plan within the Atlantic Treaty Organization.

Mr. Dulles talked with the British Foreign Office communiqué said, "for nearly six hours" they were "highly successful" with the results of the talks.

In his statement in New York, Mr. Dulles said he felt confident that the West could rely on the Federal Republic of Germany to carry out policies which would, perhaps, be unacceptable to the rest of Europe.

He added: "I am satisfied that a German contribution to the European Defence Community is necessary to serve the interests of democratic governments in Europe."

Mr. Dulles, the State Department said, had told the United States that he would be ready to renounce this, Mr. Dulles' speech, however, gave no indication of what he had in mind.

"I informed the Chinese that my views were fully supported by the Foreign Minister, Mr. Rocard, by Congress and by the people generally," he concluded.
