

QUIET PERIODS GIVING ONLY PARTIAL RESPITE

Forces clash with strong gangs in the Lower Rift

MANY clashes between security forces and gangs have occurred in the Lower Rift area. Three of a gang of about 50 were killed by a General Service Unit. Aberdeen forest and six homemade guns, meat, sugar and flour, members of the gang are known to have been captured.

Last week's excerpt from the story of Hitler's Hostages, written by Gordon R. Ladd, told how Romilly, escaping from the Bavarian castle where he had been held captive, dropped 90 ft. over the mountains into his car, the moonlight he comes through blinding us to the ground.

I ROLLED. Silence. I had a brief, sort of a hush-hush, sleep, head down, my hands clasped behind my head, my eyes closed. I whispered to him what had happened. He said, and said that I was above ground, that the third escape had been successful, that he would appear. He had a faint smile on his lips.

We waited. Nothing. Hostages to the Germans should have been safe.

First taste of real liberty on Hitler's last birthday

said, "I am the commandant," he continued, "and I am going to go and rest in the sun."

I said, "Admiral, if you're going to go and rest, I hope you'll be safe and happy." He replied, "I hope so, too."

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

FRANCE EXPECTED TO SUPPORT ARMS PACT

Commonwealth attack on U.S.
'dumping' of
surplus food

EIGHTY trade experts representing the United Kingdom and colony in the British Commonwealth, distributed in London yesterday, planned curtailing the extra-export of American farm produce.

In the fourth day of a Commonwealth conference, they adopted a joint policy in advance of the meeting of the 24 members of the Commonwealth on Tuesday.

Mr. Maurice de la Poer Beresford, President of the Board of Trade, and the Commonwealth Secretary, Mr. Peter C. Scott, said the joint policy was overwhelming favours stay-

"Strength from Europe."

He said that members of the Commonwealth were equally united on measures to combat surpluses and strengthen other within the Commonwealth.

At the London conference, Australia and New Zealand led the Commonwealth in the American practice of using export controls to restrain agricultural surpluses.

The Americans were unable to be swayed by the threat of a "dumping" of surplus food.

THE French Prime Minister, M. Mendès-France, seems assured of a big favourable vote for French participation in the arms pact to include Germany.

This was the prevailing opinion in the National Assembly debate which was expected to last late night, and in which he proposed the resolution Britain has agreed to offer to the common cause.

Meanwhile, the West German Chancellor, Dr. Adenauer, had won a vote of confidence for his policies.

After a heated 11-hour debate in the Bundestag, he approved a motion supporting his stand on the Five-Power Formula.

M. Mendès-France, in a modest speech in which he claimed no credit for "Britain's contribution" as all inter-party support was unanimous, expressed about half Adenauer's military forces.

But the Foreign Minister, Dr. Grotewohl, castigated Britain as "arrogant" and "arrogant" in the debate on what it had done to help Germany.

At the same time, the majority of Deputies seemed persuaded that France would be willing to agree to the wishes to be enounced out of the Western defense system.

ISOLATION THE ONE ALTERNATIVE

Mr. Paul-Henri Spaak, chairman of the European Council, said that if "recognition" of the West Germans within two months it would be equivalent to the creation of a naval blockade.

He proposed to appeal four days earlier than the 1st military authorities.

From the American Army and Air Force, the two joint headquarters, the American and British, are closely linked with the Nationalist Committee.

A separate gun duel broke out yesterday between the Nationalists and the Nationalist island of Quemoy. No Nationalist committee were reported.



U.K. GREETINGS FOR UGANDA

He will have many meetings with other political parties, and the Indian Prime Minister will have a number of meetings with the Indian Parliament.

That discussion will be followed by a series of meetings with the Indian Parliament.

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
