'DICK TURPINISM' OF KENYA TAX SYSTEM

High level criticised by new president

An attack on Kenya's high level of taxation was made by Mr. P. J. Rogers, the newly elected president of the Nairobi Chamber of Commerce, at the chamber's first annual dinner on Tuesday night.

Mr. Rogers decried the "national tendency" towards the taxation of capital assets, saying that he had seen nothing more than his neighbours. It was "obviously just that it should be taken from him." He said: "I seem to remember that the Queen has a right to receive the services of her subjects in defence of her activities. Our Income Tax Commission operates on the same principle, and the result is distressingly similar."

"The longer that he who will be taxed is removed from the rest of society, the greater will be the political differences, which will be reflected in the tax rates allowed to ensure the fact that he will not be taxed, but, to their material benefit, a pensioner even though he is not in service."

It would be very wrong that a man in Kenya could pay more tax than his counterpart in Britain, said Mr. Rogers, who added that the tax rate in Kenya was more than was paid in the U.S.A. It was often made clear that Britain, but the difference between the two countries was that people supported Socialism and the majority supported Capitalism.

The speaker was asked whether he was proposing the total abolition of "Kerrua," said for the last time, "not for the moment, but it was also for development, it was also for the future."

As far as was practicable and possible, the speaker said, it was better to rely more on its own resources than to depend on foreign investment.

Apart from the actual amount of taxation, there was a question of quality in having a more progressive taxation system.

The time has come when the speaker said, when a deeper thought and re-examination of the way in which civilization beyond the mere creation of money for the wants of the world is needed.

Against thefts

Before the days of executive chairman, a man knew that the best way to protect his property was to have it safe in his safe, and the Government was well aware of the need to do this.

Mr. Rogers proposed that the Government should be directed towards the encouragement of self-help and self-reliance. Only by the continued existence of the free market and the attraction of new investment could the economy be progressively assured and social services provided.

Moral judgment

The proposal was supported by Mr. M. C. G. H. Gay, who said a friend of his, a retired naval officer, had written to him, saying that the Government was well aware of the need to do this.

BRITAIN STILL GREAT

U.S. urged to act with speed in Middle East

PROMPT action by the United States to end the serious threat to peace in the Middle East was demanded yesterday by the former commander of the Atlantic Fleet, General George E. Gruber.

The general, who was testifying before the House Foreign Affairs Committee in Washington, said that unless action was taken, the present situation would become uncontrollable.

It was up to the United States to take the lead in making up in the area. Otherwise, he said, Britain and the whole Commonwealth world would be non-committed.

Gen. Gruber, a distinguished participant in World War II, told the committee that Britain must be prepared to act with great speed if there were any further provocation.

With the provision for even more rapid deployment of British forces, he said, the programme would fall into place.

Gen. Gruber said that President Dwight D. Eisenhower would have to decide whether to interpret the facts as justifying military intervention in the Middle East. There was no alternative, he said, to accepting the situation.

LOAN TO JORDAN

The British Government has loaned £1 million to Jordan in American as the second instalment of the Jordan Development Fund for 1957. A Jordan statement said:

THE Prime Minister, Mr. Macmillan, said in a television broadcast on Thursday night that he believed history would justify Britain's action in Suez.

O.E.E.C. TALKS SOON

A PROPOSAL for closer links between Britain and Europe in a free trade area was announced in speeches at the weekend by the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Mr. Peter Thorneycroft, and the Foreign Secretary, Mr. Selwyn Lloyd.



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

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

Spearhead against rule by force

PRESIDENT'S SPEECH

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER said the United States was ready to pay the "full price" of a peace based on justice and law, when he gave his inaugural address after being sworn in for a second four-year term.

He said his country would respond when, in time of want or peril, nations that were or could be friend asked for help. He laid down three general principles which the United States would follow:

To counter the threat of those who sought to rule by force.

To insist that it must pay the costs of its own military defense.

It must use its skills and knowledge to help others.

"To help others rise from misery, however far the sea separates us from their shores."

It recognised and accepted its own responsibility in the world.

Promised to stand by the authority of the United Nations.

The President said the United States recognised the aspirations of nations like Hungary, Poland and Rumania for freedom, and it honoured the people of the Soviet Union, "not because we like them, rather do we welcome their progress in education and industry."

Things may come to pass,

he said, when the coming of the day when the peoples may freely meet in international councils.

The President said the dead were born in the turmoil of the world, and the power it contained, and the power it contained, was "dark in purpose, was dark in intent, was dark in method." It had been shaken by a fierce storm, and it had been shaken by a fierce storm, of men, who loved freedom.



MOVE TO STAMP OUT SLOW-MOTION TENNIS

Annoyance at 'delaying tactics'

SPECTATORS and officials at British lawn tennis meetings have become so annoyed at deliberate 'delaying tactics' that the English Lawn Tennis Association has asked referees and umpires to stamp out the slow-motion habit, writes Ralph Daly. Mr. Daly said one rule had been too often broken last season.

A statement in London from Mr. J. A. T. T. Smith, president of the English Lawn Tennis Association, said: "The slow-motion habit, which is really bad sportsmanship, must be stamped out, and without the play from the first service, the ball must be served up immediately."

Spectators have complained that the up-and-coming pairs have too long been allowed to take their time in getting ready for the serve, and that those who fall into this habit should be penalized.

Mr. Daly's final warning: "We hope you will give attention to the observance of this rule."
