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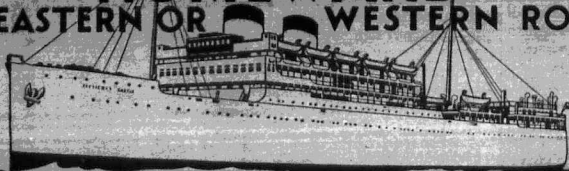

France Shocked by Bonds Fraud. One of Worst Scandals in History. Public Men Involved.

MAYOR OF BAYONNE IN PRISON ON SERIES OF CHARGES.

The revelation of the fraudulent issue of municipal bonds has profoundly shocked French public opinion and already the affair is regarded as one of the worst public scandals in the country's history.

Political Reproachments.

The issue of 24,000,000 francs of municipal bonds on behalf of the Bayonne Municipal Pawnbroking establishment is having a political repercussion. M. Chautemps, the Prime Minister, conferred to-day for an hour and a half with M. Dalimier, the Minister of Commerce who is reported to have encouraged the placing of the bonds, in a letter to M. Tassin, Director of the Bayonne Credit Municipal. The latter has now been arrested.

The police are anxious to trace the financier, M. Alex. de Stavisky, who is reported to have fled to London.

The present Ministry contains several ministers who were in the Cabinet when the bonds were issued.

There were amazing scenes after the arrest, crowds of inquiring inquisitors being present. "Garak is in prison," chanted.

Stavisky shot himself at 2.30 p.m. in the Hotel de Ville where he was staying, when police arrived to arrest him.

Minister Recaptured. The Cabinet today unanimously requested M. Dalimier, Minister for the Colonies, send to enter the Chamber a bill for the Bayonne bonds affair.

Having dropped M. Dalimier, the Government is asking the Opposition group by the immediate dissolution of the Bill prohibiting persons convicted of dishonesty from holding any office in the Government.

DETAILS OF PRESIDENT'S FINANCIAL PROPOSALS.

No New Taxes.

INCREASED APPROPRIATIONS FOR THE FIGHTING FORCES.

President Roosevelt has announced that during the next two years the United States will have a deficit of nine hundred million dollars. This plans that during the next period will be it, it should fall a record figure of 32,834 million dollars.

In order to meet this deficiency, the Government intends to borrow a sum of ten thousand million dollars. The President expects to reduce the debt progressively.

During the course of a message to Congress, President Roosevelt spoke optimistically of the future and indicated that the worst period of the depression had passed. As a result of the recovery programme there had been an increase in employment, a reorganization of reasonable profits in industry and better labour conditions.

Foreign Policy.

(FRANCOIS SMYTH'S AGENCY.)

Washington, Jan. 9. "We ploughed a furrow and sowed good seeds many months ago," declared President Roosevelt in addressing Congress previously for the first time in a message which ranged over a wide field.

The President naturally dealt largely with the foreign policy programme during the last six months and announced that he believed it would be "the most brilliant day in the United States by far since the war."

Referring to the post-war programme he said he had a budget to be adopted annually the strengthening of the world generally as an exchange for the firm of a less fluctuating character. 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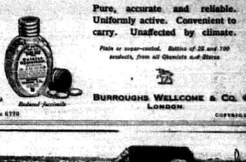

From time to time reports have been made to the P.W.D. officer in charge of the Ruira area of the fact that work will shortly be commenced pending the completion of the roads. Recent murders by Samburu in the Laikipia and Nanyuki areas, and the growing belief that Mr. Theodore Forzy was killed by Samburu, are causing perturbation and anxiety among the settled population.

THE WORLD WOOL SITUATION.

Wool production in the three continents of Australia, New Zealand and New South Wales is reported to show a reduction of nearly 500 million lbs (grey basis) of 12 per cent over the previous relative decrease occurring in South Africa. On the other hand, production in Argentina and Uruguay is likely to show an increase of 10 per cent, while slight increases are in prospect in the United States and the United Kingdom.

The aggregate production of the world's output of wool is estimated to be 2,500 million lbs, or 25 per cent, which almost all is in the hands of the United Kingdom in the Southern Hemisphere countries where, on a comparative estimate, 100 million lbs lower than at the end of the 1931-32 season, and this will further reduce the supplies available during the present season.

Receipts of new clip wool at Australian selling centres between 1st July and 31st October were 140 million lbs. (9 per cent) in the same months of last season, and on account of heavier rains the stock on hand at 31st October was 100 million lbs. less than a year ago. But the movement has slowed down since the high season, and the present selling season is expected to be shorter than last year.

The drought continued in the world wool prices, which has had the effect of reducing the demand and external prices. Reported wool consumption in the first four months of the present season is 100 million lbs. or 10 per cent, which is 10 per cent higher than the first four months of last year. In South Africa some heavy fall draughting of pasture, and a reduction of about 15 per cent as compared with June, 1932, is reported to have taken place.

Stocks at Australian selling centres at 31st October were 275 million lbs. of wool of the current clip and 2 million lbs. of wool of the previous clip. In the last year the figures were 262 million lbs. in Australia and 2 million lbs. in South Africa, plus the stock on hand at 31st October, which was 22 million lbs. on the same date last year.

New Zealand wool production this season is estimated at 300 million lbs. (grey), and will show a smaller decrease than in Australia or South Africa. Spring lambing in New Zealand is now taking place and is reported to be proceeding favourably. Prices continue to advance in the hands of the wool buyers of the principal countries. As the sale held at London on 11th November, 1932, prices were 18 to 15 per cent higher than at the previous sale, and that centre on 15th October, 1932, at 517 million lbs. (grey) basis, the highest price recorded since the outbreak of the war.

Western Australia, final estimates of the wool production of Western Australia for the season ending 30th June 1932, are 1,000 million lbs. in 1931-32 season, and 1,200 million lbs. in 1932-33 season, an increase of 15 to 20 per cent. The increase is due to the fact that the wool production in the West Indian colonies during the same period has been shown to have increased by 100 million lbs. to 1,000 million lbs. in 1932-33 season, as compared with 900 million lbs. in 1931-32 season.

Employment in the wool industry is reported to have increased in Great Britain over the period to improve during October, 1932, and to be 10 per cent higher than in the same month of last year. It is largely responsible for the 375 million lbs. of wool which was produced in the British Isles last year, and which was 10 per cent higher than in the same month of last year.

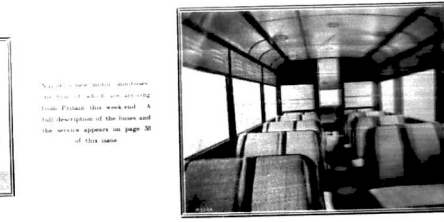

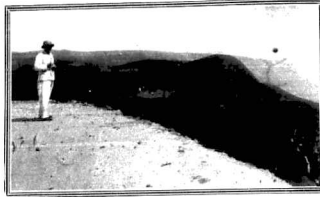

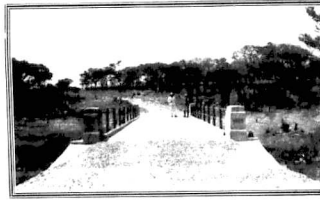

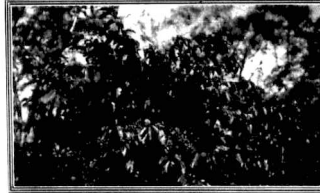

The whole difficulty position of the agricultural industry in Kenya will be placed before the Secretary of State for the Colonies by a deputation of the Agricultural Union of Kenya. Agricultural finance represented one of the most important issues discussed by the special committee.

It will be invited to carry out an early and all-inclusive enquiry into the needs of the industry on the financial side; it will also be asked to make early steps to protect people on the land against foreclosures in respect of mortgages.

A further request is that the promised Economic Development Committee be appointed without delay.

Several proposals for the relief of agriculture were made during the discussion. They included the raising of a large loan to support farm debts; the issue of Land Bank bonds in lieu of mortgages; and the taking over by the State of agricultural burdens.

The Development Committee.

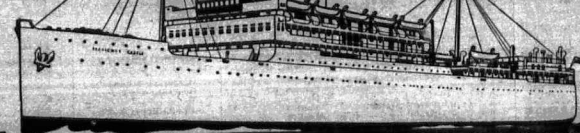

He aims at restoring the dollar to a level which will enable it to be repaid with a coin of the same value as that at the time they were contracted.

Mr. Roosevelt's recommendation to Congress is a minimum cut of 40 per cent in the dollar's gold content and a maximum of 60 per cent.

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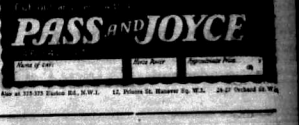

Facilitating Tours from Other Countries.

"Bully," who is responsible for the Hockey News on this page, writes as follows: "It may be that many will think this suggestion premature, but it has occurred to me that a Combined Sports Association in Kenya will be a great help to the organization of sports and games generally, and more particularly in the matter of touring teams from other countries. It would, of course, be necessary to have a central ground where representative matches could be played and the Comtee of such an Association would be drawn from the respective Sports Associations and would control and arbitrate on matters affecting visiting teams etc. The support of the Rugby Association, Cricket, and Hockey Associations would be necessary to ensure success, and this matter has already been discussed in Hockey circles."

This idea is not a new one but this is probably the first occasion on which it has been publicly put forward. The Hockey Association is the junior of the Sports Associations but nevertheless one of the more virile and flourishing and many will welcome this idea which is being sponsored by them. This month of such an Association is now proposed as unimpeachable. As "Bully" points out, one of the chief duties would be to arrange the details of tours from other countries, it is very much more satisfactory, providing details can be arranged, for a team to visit Kenya to be qualified and of sufficient size to play more than one game.

There are many local difficulties which would be considerably eased by such a body, the vast question that is always cropping up of dates that clash, the fixing of the seasons, during which matches should be played and finally the control of a central Sports Association with a running track and other necessary amenities. As was pointed out in this paper yesterday, amongst the members of particular Club or Society it is to be depressed, and there would be the opportunity of co-ordinating the good work done by various Clubs and Associations throughout the Colony.

Such an Association is bound to be formed in course of time, but with the rapid growth of sporting activities, amongst the members, its formation should not be regarded as premature. Records of all games and athletic events should be kept by them and if possible a yearly handbook published which should be a complete guide to fixtures, records and sporting activities in the Colony. If such an Association could be formed among the Europeans in the Colony, the African community would, it is to be hoped, be benefited in return. The three Associations could then have one central executive, the matter is one that might well be discussed.

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The Menace of the Red Locust.

TANGANYIKA EXPECTS SERIOUS INFESTATION.

The latest report from the Government of Tanganyika on the locust situation—which covers the period up to the end of a somewhat week in the month—suggests the possibility of the first serious development of the locust infestation.

Although anti-hopper campaigns will take place they will coincide with the planting season and unfortunately the African is afraid of the red locust and inclined to be fatalistic.

It may be anticipated, by reports which in April will afford the infestation by flying locusts in Tanganyika will be a very serious one.

Laying in Inaccessible Areas.

The official report is as follows: In the Western and Eastern provinces of Tanganyika the locusts have crossed the Central Line since the date of the last report—namely in the area from Kilimo to Dar-es-Salaam. The invasion of the Central Line in the North-East. These serious swarms crossed into the Hamud District where they are reported as covering a 30 mile front.

Reports have crossed the Central Line in the vicinity of Mwanza where they are reported from the Ngora District. Flying swarms will cross to the south of the Central Line, notably in Tunduru where they are now taking place.

Flying locusts may be expected to reach the Ruvuma river very shortly, if they have not already arrived there.

Laying. It may be taken for granted that laying has taken place on a fairly large scale in the area to the south of the Tertiary and Quaternary which would be expected. BRITISH SHIPBUILDING IN 1933.

Marked Improvement Over Other Countries.

By Reuters, Jan. 31. A gradual improvement in British shipbuilding conditions is shown by the quarterly report of Lloyd's Register, which at the end of the year shows under construction in Great Britain 2,616,000 tons, 100 merchant vessels of 32,541 ton gross. This was an increase of 27,718 tons on the figures for the previous quarter, and an increase of 106,841 tons on the figures for the whole of 1932. There had been a steady increase in shipping under construction during the year as though the recovery was well advanced in all the three of the production period.

In Other Countries.

In other countries merchant shipbuilding conditions are shown by the following figures for the year 1932: The United States, 1,253,795 tons and was less by 200,000 tons than that in the first half of the production period.

The five leading countries after Great Britain were: Japan with 682,700 tons under construction.
