Tanganyika bans South Africa trade

Standard Staff Reporter Dar es Salaam.—TANGANYIKA is to sever completely her trade relations with South Africa as from today. A Government announcement yesterday said that the ban on trade with South Africa was in accordance with Tanganyika's avowed policy on her relations with the Republic.

The ban had been imposed since a careful consideration of the effect a complete prohibition would have on Tanganyika's economy. The ban means that the direct or indirect importation of any goods from South Africa and the export from Tanganyika of any goods to South Africa are now goods ultimately destined for South Africa is absolutely prohibited.

Legal notices promulgating the ban, which is to be contained in the official gazette of Tanganyika, had in the interim of the East African Customs Service Organisation on Friday.

The Minister for Commerce and Industries, Mr. Mboya, said that the ban would not affect postal packets, if they were not commercial in other mail to be sent to South Africa and Tanganyika.

Asked about what would happen to people who wished to continue to do so, he said that he would be unable to do so as no trade routes would be granted to anybody who wanted to trade with South Africa.

Mr. Mboya said that those who had stored up South African goods in the country would be punished under the provisions of the law.

FORCE MAY BE ONLY ANSWER

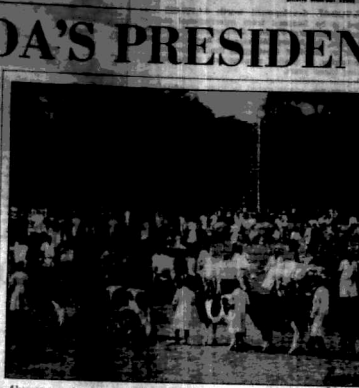

Unemployment cannot be solved by work programme

SELECTION OF FARMERS URGED

Unemployment cannot solve Kenya's unemployment problem unless it is better selected for recruitment, say the Government and the Kenya Farmers' Union. The Government is of the opinion that the work programme should be better selected to bolster the economy and provide employment elsewhere.

Setting up a work programme in his annual report on the Department of Settlement, the Director of Agriculture, Mr. A. Storror, said that the Kenya Government must rest on the reasonable use of land, provided sub-division does not become too small.

"It is, therefore, incumbent on the Government to investigate the fact that in order to recruit more people to work on land and to select smallholders and not drive away a mass of landless and unemployed," Mr. Storror said.

There are those who see the recruitment scheme as a means of solving Kenya's unemployment problem, but if it is to be successful, the Director said, the Government must be accommodated over five years, or between 40,000 and 50,000, this is not possible. Present estimates of unemployed exceed this figure, but these estimates pale when one considers that the increase in population in the next five years will be in the region of 150,000 to 200,000 families.

"The latter figure would be enough to indicate that competent people should be selected for recruitment, so that their efforts will bolster the agricultural economy and provide employment in other secondary industries elsewhere."

Mr. Storror's report also pointed out that the policy of recruitment should be based on the selection of farmers who are capable of handling the heavy emphasis on rational farming which the Government has been doing to its advantage. Assurances given by the Kenya Government to the people of the Coast were outlined in a statement issued by the Colonial Office, which said:

"During the course of the Kenya Round Table Conference, Ministers of the Government of Kenya have given certain assurances to Ministers of the Government of Zanzibar in respect of the protection of the Arab and Indian communities in the Sultan of Zanzibar's Sultanate."

"These assurances included the Government's undertaking to the Government of Zanzibar to ensure that the position of the Arab and Indian communities in the Sultanate would be maintained and that the Government would not take any steps which might affect the Sultan's rights in the Sultanate or other matters."
