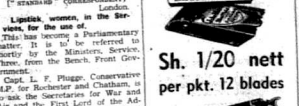

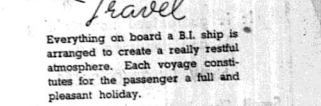

BRITAIN VELOCITIES NEW MAN-POWER DEMANDS Lease & Lend Act A Turning-Point In War

AXIS TACTICS CHECKED

BRITISH NEWSPAPERS this morning give a great deal of space to the several important messages made during the weekend and it is generally agreed that they have made considerable headway with the dictators.

Coming within hours of each other President Roosevelt's historic broadcast and the British Ministry of Labour and the Lord Privy Seal emphasized the fact that democracies are marshalling their forces to overcome the Axis.

The Lord Privy Seal, Mr. Attlee, in his speech drew particular attention to the help Britain is getting from the Empire and said that he had estimated that more than 100,000 Britishers from the Empire were pouring into Britain, of whom 50,000 were free will to fight for a Great Britain.

Mr. Devlin, the Minister for Labour, announced the new drive for man and woman-power in British industry. He said there was an immediate call on man-power and such recruitment would be necessary.

The Navy, the Army and the Air Force would be bringing in new services would be brought in to strength and modernize war industry must be met.

More Registrations

Several steps were being taken. Men between 41 and 45 will be required to register and women between 21 and 45 will be required to register. The schedule of reserved occupations was again being revised. The demand by the dictators for more men is necessary to call on women to help in running the home machine.

Mr. Attlee promised that special attention would be paid to the welfare of women workers and the question of halting, transport and the care of children.

Mr. Attlee pointed out this morning that this new plan is being carried out in a most efficient manner and will be accepted with enthusiasm.

One commentator says that the only criticism that Mr. Devlin's announcement has evoked is that his scheme does not go far enough or fast enough.

Today, little more than 24 hours after Mr. Devlin's speech, men started to register in Britain under the Industrial Call-up.

The President's Speech

Views on Mr. Roosevelt's broadcast were not only of the highest order but also of the most significant of the war. A typical example of this was the address by the Secretary of State, Mr. Cordell Hull, who declared that it was a political act of the first magnitude and that it had opened a new chapter in the history of the United States and Germany's new order.

The President's speech was broadcast in 14 languages from America and the B.B.C. put it into English and other languages.

Reaction in the United States is reflected in the statement by a New York Industrial unit that it was "moving along like a well-oiled machine. At present, it is operating at maximum speed and holding fast."

In Britain the Times says it is bound to give new hope and confidence to all lovers of freedom through the effect of the Congress of the Americas is becoming known.

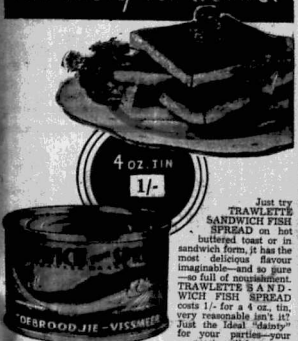

MANY NEW SHIPS HAVE JOINED THE BRITISH NAVY

Twelve Cruisers And Twenty Destroyers

AMERICAN AID WILL ARRIVE

The new issue of the Navy's Fighting Ships, the famous naval review, contains interesting information which has never been made public.

Twenty new cruisers were completed for the British Navy during 1933. Sixteen of them are of the Dana class, each carrying 11 anti-aircraft guns, and the other four are of the new type of 5,500 tons, which some reports say will be built in America.

It is also known that a group of new destroyers have been added to the fleet since the war began. By remarkable industry they were completed within 18 months. Two of these, the *Dunmore* and the *Hodder*, were recently mentioned by the Admiralty as being equipped in the floating docks of enemy aircraft.

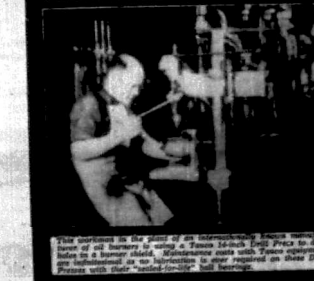

GOVERNMENT BANS OSSEWA BRANDWAG

The newspaper complains that the Government is acting against its own action and says that "relative activities" if there were proof of such activities, however, it would have been easy for the Government to take steps to remove the responsible officers of the Ossewa Brandwag.

The natural sequel to this Government ban is that the larger municipalities should advise the advisability of following suit. This is a strong movement to make it compulsory for municipal servants who resign from the organization.
