BILLS IN LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

Passing Of Second Readings

At Thursday's sitting of the Kenya Legislative Council, a number of Bills were introduced. The Attorney-General proposed that the Criminal Procedure Code (Amendment) Bill, 1941, should be read a second time. He explained that the Bill would increase the maximum period of imprisonment which could be awarded by a first class Magistrate from two to three years. It had been for some quarters that the existing Ordinance was being amended.

Another Bill to pass its second reading was the Local Government (Rating) Bill, Mr. C. E. Martin, Commissioner for Local Government, explained that it was introduced specifically to meet the case of Kisumu which had recently been proclaimed as a Grade "A" township. Ordinarily a local authority must make a valuation of all rateable property to be made not less than once every five years. Kisumu's last valuation was made three years ago and under the proposed Bill it would be put on the same footing as other townships.

Southern Rhodesia At War

It is some three or four years since Sir Godfrey (then Mr.) Huggins, Prime Minister of Southern Rhodesia, told London, during that "Britain's wars are our wars." How fully Rhodesians have lived up to that promise is a matter of record since September 1939 has justified that claim. The people of Kenya were given an opportunity to judge on Tuesday evening when the S. Rhodesia Information Officer broadcast an interesting review of the many phases of this effort. It is not to say that throughout Africa it is recognized that, in relation to its natural and human resources, Southern Rhodesia's contribution to the Empire cause stands comparison with that of any other British country. This war has not come so close to Southern Rhodesia's borders as did the last, but the same spirit of anxiety to do everything to help has been manifest since the earliest days of the war. To see effort, there is no doubt, in proper perspective it is necessary to set it against the situation in which a community of 60,000 Europeans and about a million and a quarter natives is only at the beginning of the country's greatest progress. In almost every direction, industrial, commercial, mining, agricultural, political, social, the country is still developing. The golden jubilee of the arrival at Salisbury of the Pioneer Column under Sir Frank Johnston, was celebrated last year, but the first 50 years of its existence were by no means a period of untroubled advancement. The Mashona, Bechuanaland, and the first decade, the South African War (at the opening of the second) is at Great Zimbabwe during nearly half of the third ten years of the Colony's existence, all returned or even completely halved progress. It was not, in fact, till the grant of responsible

government in 1923 that Southern Rhodesians feel secure in their principality. They were principally economic, but they had weathered these successive crises and were able to realize many of the hopes of its founders when this war came.

As was pointed out by the Information Officer, Southern Rhodesia was the first Empire country to send troops before its borders after the outbreak of war. They went to a number of African territories, including an air squadron which came to Kenya. The men sent away from the Colony in the first months of war did a splendid work in providing officers and N.C.O.s for African units. Further detachments went to the Middle East and there are today on full time service an appreciable proportion of the 14,000 men of the Rhodesian Air Rifles, is in training at Salisbury. These are achievements which are most significant that the number of men represented for the Rhodesians sent elsewhere for service have proved themselves good leaders and as such have had a large share in the successes of the Empire's African troops whom they command. The work of the various technical services, too, supplied wholly or in part by Southern Rhodesia, such as the No. 2 Military Hospital and the E.A. Survey Unit, has been invaluable. Judged by these contributions alone Rhodesia could have been regarded as pulling her full weight but, in a long-range war, her share in the Empire Air Scheme is of far greater importance. She has provided, or is providing, ten air training schools with an eventual output of more than 4,000 aircrew a year. The British Government supplies the instructors and equipment, but Rhodesia contributes £200,000 a year to the running expenses. Already many R.A.F. pilots who were trained in Southern Rhodesia are in action in all the theatres of war.

The military and air establishments are doing so well that a taxpayer a good deal but the cost is cheerfully borne. What criticism there has been of the Government has been that it has not gone far enough, never that it was doing more than should be. But not only is it necessary to keep the economic life of the country at the highest possible pitch to make it possible to bear the expense of the war, but Southern Rhodesia's primary products are of the greatest value to Britain. Of these two chief items are gold and tobacco, both of which are now being produced in quantities in or near record volume. The need to supply Britain's demands inside the Empire was early realized and within a few months conscription had to be introduced as the most effective means of solving the balance factor between the military and economic sides of the national effort. Without regulation of this nature it is likely that vital economic activities would have been starved of labour. As it is today, a shortage of skilled labour and every possible device for maintaining production and services is being employed in spite of the demands of the armed forces for men. The huge building programme for the Air Scheme, probably the biggest in the country's history, is being completed in record time and the growing secondary industries are producing more and more supplies for the forces.

All this varied and valuable activity in the cause of freedom is an expression of the will of the people of Southern Rhodesia. A Colony in name it is all but independent in fact—the reservations in the Constitution only make a mockery of the Dominions Office necessary to any differential legislation in regard to war responsibility and initiative, but in the fullest cooperation with Great Britain, in the people's own hands, it have set an inspiring example.

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

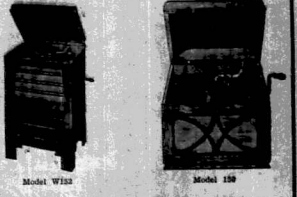

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TAKING NAZI WAR MACHINE APART
R.A.F.'s Planned Attack
More Devastating Than Scatter-Bombing

According to an article by Peter de Maessfeld (Technical Editor of the Aeroplane) something like this is expected to be the whole course of the German raids on Britain during the past weeks. The German raiders, severely hit on their own deposits by the raids of the R.A.F., embarrassed already by planes and 5,000 men in attacks on Britain, and apprehensive of the course of the war against their brother Italian partners, have found their air force into considerable "moral" raids in the vain hope of undermining the unshakable morale of the British people. They are seeking to demoralize the fortitude of the "man in the street" in Great Britain. Perhaps they base their hopes on the known reaction of the German people to bombing.

Devastation by R.A.F. For several weeks reports have filtered in from Germany that all important targets in Germany were hit in the most effective manner. They tell of shattered factories, wrecked railways, burnt-out oil plants, blasted harbours, and the like. They tell too of the people many of whom are being and will be, in the future, in a state of terror by the victims of last night. No British bomber was shot down over the Reich and are now literally demoralized.

There is even definite evidence that in Germany the workers have refused to go on duty and that the German people are so demoralized that the effect of the explosion of bombs is so great that it is more destructive than the burst of a bomb of equal weight. 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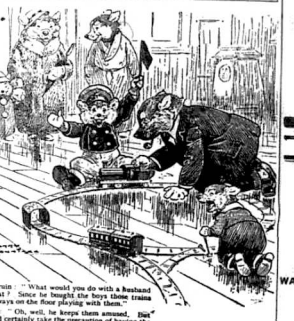

Singapore. Key to the East

ISLAND FORTRESS AT EMPIRE'S FOCAL POINT

SINGAPORE, "City of the Lion" to the ancients, appears now as approaching the destiny for which Britain has been preparing it for seventeen years. As Japan makes new moves in the Asian continent, Singapore's strategic importance to the British Empire is becoming more and more obvious.

Singapore is an oval island, 21 miles long and 10 miles wide. It is only 100 miles from the equator and its land area is 1,400 acres. The island is surrounded by water on all sides and is one of the most important ports in the world.

The city of Singapore, on the southern shore of the island, has a population of about 700,000 and is one of the most important ports in the world. It is a free port and a center of international trade.

It is the epitome of an Imperial outpost, one of the most important and outstandingly successful cities of the world. Besides being the administrative center of a rich, fertile and populous area, it is the hub of the Orient's trade routes.

The naval base lying along the island's north shore, facing the mainland, is its keystone. It is fifty square miles of protected anchorage, sufficient to shelter the combined fleets of Great Britain and the United States.

This north end of the island is linked to the mainland by a broad causeway which, however, is mined and can be destroyed by the mere pressure of a thought on any one of several boats.

The surrounding waters are mined in twelve miles or more, are waiting for their employment on small islands commanding all approaches. For protection from the air, searchlights are based in strategically placed fields.

Seventeen years ago this end of the island was a jungle of swamps, jungle and neglected plantations. It now has some 200,000 acres of land and still more millions for land.

The base is linked to the city by an excellent road and two concrete highways, and the city itself is protected by three lines of concrete defenses, including island emplacements. Not a ship can approach the island without being surveyed far out at sea by British or Australian aircraft, who maintain a wide dawn-to-dusk patrol that even an enemy steaming at top speed could not secretly approach within attacking distance overnight.

Growing Tension Tension at Singapore did not arise overnight. It was already evident weeks ago, though the casual visitor felt rather than saw the magnitude of the preparations for defense.

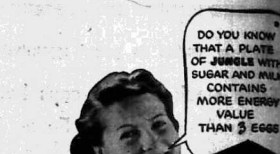

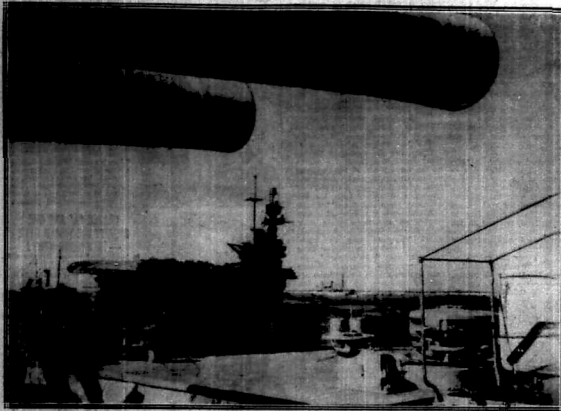
