A New League.

DECORATION BY HIGH COURT BOUGHT.

A sensation was caused to-day by the announcement by General O'Duffy that the Blue Shirts organisation had been dissolved and a new League of Youth formed to take over the organisation of the Blue Shirts.

General O'Duffy has served the Attorney General with a writ asking for a decision by the High Court that the new League is a legal body.







same day he started back on the **blondies**. On his way he passed the house of a woman named Wandui, where he saw a young girl sitting outside. She gave him a potato asking them to look after them for him. It was then about 10 p.m. On his return he passed through the wattle plantation of "Bwana Kibaki," on the hillside above Nairobia. He had been living, arriving there at 5 p.m. and finding her son the boy of his acquaintance. He asked her who she had gone and she told him that all was well, a drinking bout at Mangu house. He then went to the hut, but found that his host had passed on his way. The builder told him that his host had gone the previous day (Saturday) at about two o'clock, and had slept over at the house of a friend. He then found her very drunk, and after a while requested her to go home with him but she replied that she would not go home so late at night and would spend the Sunday night there. He, however, said that he must go home, and said she must go back to look after her children.

The builder just about to leave her, but one, Wansana, requested him to take the woman away because he heard Wansana say this. She ran and caught hold of a pole. Later he was informed that he had to go with him. He took off his car ornaments and threw them down saying "I am not going." After returning home he found Nairobia lost on crying out "You dragged me away from the dress room. You took my clothes and my perfume which had been brought me." Shortly afterwards he made a noise which sounded like a gun but his son Wansana succeeded in wresting the gun from his hands. At last he left home, and the following night he slept at a friend's house.

On Thursday he left to return to the **blondies** and found that his host had been found dead. It was informed that Mr. John Beyers was looking for him, as were also the police who had taken his revolver. He was last seen in Nairobi by Europeans in Rumaka, and Bwana Karanjah (Mr. John Beyers) had given him a revolver and some money. Assured, however, and he had not been willing to go to Karanjah, but he had been asked to go either Nairobi or Kyambura and asked if Europe was wanted. He was asked to take him into Nairobi.

CONTENTIOUS BILL TO BE INTRODUCED.

By Marquis of Salisbury.

GOVERNMENT WATCHING TREND OF OPINION.

A subject which has been the cause of considerable controversy for very many years, namely the constitution of the House of Lords, will be debated by the Upper House on a Bill to be introduced by the Marquis of Salisbury.

It is expected that the first reading of the measure will be discussed on the broad principle and not on questions of detail, as the mover is anxious to sound opinion on the matter.

The Bill it is understood provides that the membership of the House of Lords shall be reduced from slightly over 700 to 300 in addition to the Royal Princes, the Law Lords and some of the Bishops.

The Government is closely following the position, as it is felt in Ministerial circles that the reform of the House of Lords should be carried out during the life of the present Parliament.

Tentative Proposals.

THE INDUSTRY—THE BREED QUESTION.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard": Sir—It does not pay that your correspondence column indulges in the kind of talk that this ridiculous question deserves, will get down to a point, and that is that you should drop into a modicum for breed improvement, and give an inflow of new mothers. I should think that nothing would make me more angry than to be told that the country is to be blamed for the fact that there are twenty years of seed available for the country. The editor of the "Kenya Standard" in his correspondence on the subject of suitable breeds for Kenya, quotes the following: "In the fact that the stock is well under the frightful adverse circumstances to which they are subjected."

Actually any authority on the subject of stock breeding and raising, in discussing various breeds refers to their suitability to certain soils, climate, availability of food, water, and type of soil or climate it is pretty obvious that the country could not afford to import any other breed or other so that this everlasting discussion is irrelevant while its open discussion is also quite a lot of bore.

Undoubtedly we are suffering from the circumstances with the present drought therefore those breeds of cattle which are suitable to our country are not available now, notwithstanding it is not because they are more available in some parts of the country than in others. Inasmuch as owners of other better breeds are not yet farming cattle that should be doing and so as to afford maximum return, it is hard to maintain their dual purpose cattle in the condition they were in before the drought. They are shooting about strength with a rainfall of over thirty inches and a rainfall of less than ten inches, and that the cultivation and pasturing has not been good. The fat and docile pastures we should have had, the world had been given a break in the world's production year by the average wet country.

It is very probable that some startling facts are going to come to light in the near future, and under the new system, the Hope I believe it is called, of raising a better breed for our country's future. A neighbor showed me an article on one case in Australia where two cattle were expected to be the last to prove to be a very high milk producing cattle. In America they are going to try and produce a special breed to meet the demand for a better breed and ignore colour points.

Thus brings us back to the most famous cow for Kenya and she is here as elsewhere the best milk and fattest producer and I suspect that she is much often grown, but not only because she is more than just a first rate animal, but because of her colour. In Kenya I should imagine in contrast that there would be no difficulty to get a good cow.

RUBBER ROADS.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard": Sir—The experiments on the use of rubber road making in East Africa have been of great interest to East Africa, especially to the East African Municipalities. The roads in Nairobi are made of a enormous stocks of this material, if the use of rubber for road making becomes general, it will also provide her with an excellent advertisement for her product.

Roads in Kenya during a rubber producing country, might advantageously make use of that experience. It is estimated that the two main East African provinces are suffering heavily from the effects of the drought. In East Africa take the northern areas and lay at least the main arteries of the provinces with roads of rubber instead of tar. Most of the rubber plantations in East Africa are now in full production, the value would be turned automatically to paving concrete.

As far as the practicability of road-covered roofs for ships which have been found reliable for Singapore, which town is in the tropics, we can see no doubt that they will be reliable as well in East Africa. Although the initial cost of these roads is higher than tared roads, there are distinct advantages because per cent. of the time per year they would require comparatively small expense for maintenance, and they will be cleaner than tared roads and devoid of dust. They will be a valuable asset to the port of Nairobi, which handles 100,000 tons of rubber to cover one mile of road 40 feet wide.

Distribution Rates on the Railway.

CONDITIONS GOVERNING RE-INTRODUCTION.

Protection from Road Competition.

GENERAL MANAGER ON DISADVANTAGES OF SYSTEM.

The General Manager of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours is prepared to recommend the re-introduction of distribution rates on the railway, providing that the railway is provided with sufficient protection from motor competition.

This statement was made by the General Manager in Legislative Council yesterday during the debate on a motion for the continuation of the Carriage of Goods by Motor (Prohibition) Ordinance. He added that railway revenue was not affected by the re-introduction or otherwise of these rates.

We pointed out, however, that distribution rates had certain disadvantages for those who used them, and that there might be other ways of dealing with the problem.

It would be quite wrong, continued General Rhodes, to re-introduce the distribution rate system if the protection of road competition would only last for a year or two. The railway must have a greater degree of protection than the present temporary form of continuing the Ordinance from year to year.

The Real Solution.

An important consideration of the General Manager was the question of the relationship between the Railways and the roads. He said that the Ordinance was a temporary measure to meet the existing circumstances of the time, and that it would not last for a year or two. He also said that it was necessary to have a more permanent solution to the problem. He suggested that the Government should consider the possibility of introducing a road transport tax, which would help to protect the railway.

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As Adjournment.

In view of these remarks, Capt. H. J. E. Schwartz (National Socialist) asked that the debate should be adjourned. He wanted to decide whether it was proposed to accept an amendment on the lines suggested by the General Manager, and he wanted to know if that type of protection could be given.

Speaking at once, the General Manager said that he did not believe that distribution rates could be granted so long as road transport remained the chief competitor. He said that some new measures of protection were needed, whether by road or rail.
