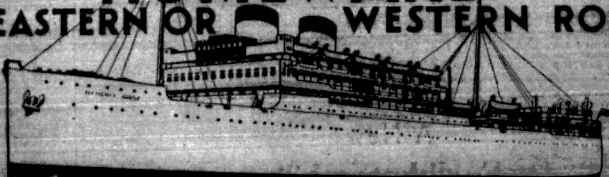

Situation in Manchuria Again Becomes Critical.

JAPANESE THREAT TO INVADE JEHOL.

China to Resist by Force.

BOTH GOVERNMENTS CLAIM AREA AS PART OF THEIR TERRITORY.

While the Committee of the League of Nations is still busy with the details of the Manchurian dispute, the situation on the spot is gradually becoming critical. The Government of Manchuria, backed by Japan, has threatened to take steps against disruptive elements in the Jehol area, which it is claimed is part of Manchuria.

China, on the other hand, regards Jehol as part of her territory, and it is announced that any attack on the area concerned will be resisted by force.

Discussions at Geneva.

The recognition of Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria was the central point in the discussion by the Committee of the League of Nations this morning, when dealing with the latest Japanese proposals. It is believed that the Government of Manchuria does not agree with the Committee's decision as to whether the would unacceptably accept the position that the existing regime of Manchuria does not come under a solution of the problem. The threatened operations at Jehol were also largely discussed.

League to Take a Strong Line.

The determination of the League to adopt a strong attitude in dealing with the Manchurian dispute is indicated in a recommendation by the drafting sub-committee which after several days' work has been submitted to the Assembly. The recommendation is that the League should take a strong line against any Japanese action which might be tantamount to an invasion of Jehol.

Japan to Leave League?

An invitation has been despatched to the States which have respectively abstained from voting on the resolution, to serve on the negotiating committee. Russia and the United States will be invited until the report is adopted by the Assembly.

Indian's Role.

Geneva, February 9. The recognition of Chinese sovereignty in Manchuria was the central point in the discussion by the Committee of the League of Nations, when dealing with the latest Japanese proposals. The Committee, however, was unable to agree as to whether the Japanese should be allowed to maintain their operations at Jehol, or as to whether the Government of Manchuria should be permitted to take steps to suppress them. The Committee also considered the possibility of a solution of the dispute by the Japanese Government, but this was also rejected.

GASOMETER IN SAAR BASIN BLOWS UP.

Heavy Casualty List.

FLAMES SEEN IN TOWNS THIRTY MILES AWAY FROM CATASTROPHE.

The explosion of the largest gasometer in the Saar Basin yesterday has caused heavy loss of life and enormous injuries. The catastrophe occurred at Neuenkirchen. The flames were seen in towns 30 miles away, while the noise of the explosion was heard as far away as Basel on the Swiss border. The heavy iron cover of the gasometer was hurled for 2,500 yards.

In addition to the gasometer, an adjacent petrol store blew up, causing further damage. Fifty houses in a nearby street were demolished, while houses in neighbouring villages were damaged.

Owing to the danger of gas poisoning parts of the area concerned are being evacuated, and terrified women and children are leaving their homes and taking refuge in schools and other buildings.

Rescue Work Proceeding.

Reception of British Proposals.

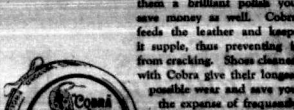

Mr. Roger Gibb does not think that although the Railway rates paid by natives may have increased in the recent past the case for relief to them is of a kind which requires a temporary abandonment of the principle that railway rates should be supported by railway revenues.

Rather than wait for something to turn up in the way of the fact that while railway receipts are decreasing costs are increasing—Mr. Gibb suggests that the railways should experiment with fairly substantial changes in their ordinary rates.

When reductions in charges are possible his proposal is that the selection should be made by railway officials and be based upon market elasticity. He urges that when selecting enterprises on which to experiment, the railways should experiment with rates which will reduce rates to their native customers. The possibility of native development needs special attention by railway officials.

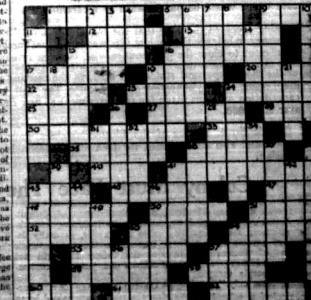

Major Grogan, who paid a tribute to the sympathetic and well informed consideration of the Delegation's case received from the Permanent Officials at the Colonial Office, declared that his visit Home had completely disabused his mind of the "hulious belief" that there was some malignant and diabolic intention on the part of the Home Government to paralyse white settlement in these territories.

A strongly worded appeal was made to the meeting that nothing should be done in this case which would embarrass the Secretary of State in his consideration of the matter which would put forward in a carefully drawn petition.

The meeting accepted the view that the community must be prepared to make sacrifices necessary to balance the Budget if it was found that further measures and expenditures insufficient to close the gap now exist between revenue and expenditure.

One of the most important statements made to the meeting was the fact that an immediate result of the publication of the Income Tax Bill had been the suspension of consideration of plans made for the investment of new capital in Kenya amounting to over £150,000.

Sir Francis Scott, leader of the Elected Members, gave his personal support to the motion and also strengthened the plea for a reasonable public opinion on the whole question.

Sir,—Is there any explanation of the fact that while a mail for Kenya leaves England weekly, there are fourteen to fifteen days between arrivals in Nairobi? I am waiting for a letter posted in London on January 5. It was advised by air mail if the despatch but the letter itself was rather weighty and the fee asked is a real extortionate.

And again, such is the organization of the Post Office that the mail will arrive in Nairobi on Sunday from a foreign boat and is again postponed by being compelled to spend money on port charges in order to collect of which the mail is sorted (which is not too probably) or wait yet another day.

One supposes that the postal authorities have some other explanation than a desire to make business through the mail utterly impossible, but it is very difficult for the men in the street to imagine what other idea they can have.

[The position is as follows: The regular mail for East Africa leaves London every Thursday evening and is packed up at Marseilles by the weekly F. and O. steamer which carries it to Aden. In addition to the F. and O. sailing, there is the direct fortnightly mail to Mombasa by the French steamer. For these latter sailings representative East African trade shows in London every Monday. When mails reach Aden by the F. and O. service, they are placed on board the first steamer (which has regular mail) of course passing Aden for Mombasa. There is no mail contract and mails are not so bound by suitable steamer offering without regard to nationality. The responsibility for our General Post Office in London, although the Kenya Uganda postal authorities naturally keep a close eye on mail transport. At the present time the mails are carried in accordance with an international scale of rates, which are not so high as contracted charges but do not, of course, guarantee regularity. If the British line were the weekly mail trader, all they have to do is to arrange their schedule so that their steamer leaves Aden on Monday afternoon. At the present time the British line leaves Aden steamer leaves Aden every Friday and the Union Castle ships do not leave Aden until Tuesday. In the interim the foreign steamer sailing to Aden get the trade. It should be noted that the foreign line steamer does not connect with regard to the Kenya mail.

DAIRY COW RECORDS.

Sir,—We have just made out the records of our Ayrshire herd for the past year and find that the average per cow on 6.50 lbs. of milk. This result may be of interest to other Dairy Farmers. The herd includes one pure bred and five high grades. The remainder are half and three-quarter breeds from the Native cow.

The longest lactation was 300 days and the highest a really remarkable three-quarter year, gave 7,720 lbs.

The average butter fat of this milk is 4.1 to 4.2. We grow considerable quantities of green food and roots and give a certain amount of concentrate but nothing excessive.

It would be interesting to know how these records compare with those from other districts. They certainly seem to show that the Ayrshire is proving itself well adapted to the country and to grading up from the Native, also that Kenya can help in the future, with scientific breeding and management, to compete successfully with the other dairy countries in milk production.

I should add that all our records are taken in decimals by us personally twice daily and that the best milk has been mixed. We guarantee our figures and our record sheets are open to inspection by anyone interested.

Man Who Tried to Murder Mr. Roosevelt.

AN ITALIAN WITH HATRED OF RICH PEOPLE.

Woman's Prompt Action.

WOUNDED IN DIVERTING SHOT FROM PRESIDENT ELEGANT.

The Italian who attempted to shoot the President-elect of the United States and who shot the Mayor of Chicago, succeeded in wounding also five other people, including a five-year-old boy. Only two people are in a critical condition.

In the course of a statement to the police the assailant said he had always had an intense hatred of rich people and that when he got a pain in his stomach he was filled with a desire to kill "these Presidents."

The would-be assassin of Mr. Roosevelt has been sentenced to 20 years imprisonment on each of the four counts. He stoutly defied the judge.

Sentenced to 80 Years.

The assailant of Mr. Franklin Roosevelt, in a mad attempt to assassinate a wealthy Italian hotelkeeper aged 69 who originally came from Italy.

After alleging that some years ago he attempted to kill the King of Italy, Zingales stated in prison: "I am sorry I did not kill Roosevelt. I am not a monster of the kind you suppose. I have done my own thinking and realized the decision myself."

Zingales said that when he was a little boy at school he had been violently hit by his school teacher. As he grew older he hated of the rich because they were interfering with his freedom.

Another Italian, Adolfo Valenti, who also attempted to shoot Mr. Zingales, has been sentenced to 10 years imprisonment for his part in the shooting.

The Injured People.

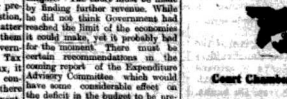

LONG TERM CREDIT FOR AGRICULTURE

INDUSTRY'S DEBT NOW BETWEEN £4,000,000, & £5,000,000.

Historical Survey.

EVIL EFFECTS OF EASY MONEY POLICY PRIOR TO THE DEPRESSION.

A comprehensive survey of the steps already taken in Kenya to provide credit for agriculture is contained in the recent report by the special Committee of the Board of Agriculture appointed to investigate the whole question of the provision of long term credit. One of the most interesting figures quoted is that the total agricultural debt carried by the holders of the European settlers in Kenya is between £4,000,000 and £5,000,000, of which approximately half represents advances from the banks.

The report traces some of the effects of the policy of providing cheap and plentiful supplies of money and credit from 1920 to 1929 and the agricultural expansion which was fostered by protective duties and favourable rail rates.

The Committee says of the credit structure prior to the depression that the accommodation was too liberal, was not discriminating and became steadily inflated as the value of the land.

The inquiry has not yet proceeded in the opinion of the Committee from the shock of the currency change in 1931.

The story of the depression and its effect upon credit is told in detail together with the steps taken by Government to offset the shock and to keep farmers on the land.

Kenya Crop Estimates for January.

HARVESTING PRACTICALLY COMPLETED.

Good Maize Yield Reported.

FURTHER INCREASE IN CORN OVER PREVIOUS FIGURES.

The crop report for the month of January issued by the Kenya Department of Agriculture states that harvesting operations for the season are nearing completion and have actually been completed in some districts. It is added that generally previous estimates of yields will be fully realised.

It is expected that 1,863,215 bags of maize will be obtained from European farms which is equivalent to an average of 8.90 bags per acre. Of this number 800,000 will be available for export.

The coffee crop is also encouraging, and the picking to date indicates a further increase on previous estimates. There is a probability that 14,500 tons will be exported during the current season.

Wheat has shown a slight decline on previous estimates, chiefly due to damage by locusts. There is no change in the steel position.

Favourable Weather.

The following is the Kenya crop report for the month of January, issued by the Department of Agriculture.

The estimates of production given in this report show a slight change as compared with the December estimates. Harvesting operations which are nearly completed in most districts throughout the Colony indicate that the previous estimates of yields will be fully realised.

Maize: The maize crop is now estimated at 1,863,215 bags, a slight increase of 1,070 bags on the December estimate. This total is equivalent to an average yield of 8.90 bags per acre.

Wheat: A slight decline of 1,140 bags is shown in the wheat yield as compared with the December estimate. The total yield is now estimated at 55,000 bags, equivalent to an average yield of 5.6 bags per acre.

Coffee: An increase in the cultivated coffee crop over previous estimates is again recorded. The total yield is now given at 206,145 cwt., an increase of 4,975 cwt. as compared with the previous monthly estimate.

Cocoa: Weather conditions generally have continued to be favourable for the harvesting of crops.

Summary of Crop Reports.

The following is the summary of crops in the European areas: Harvesting of maize has been completed in a number of estates, resulting in a marked increase in yield over previous estimates being realised. A slight increase in the estimated total yield is recorded.

Wheat (East Hill): The yielding of the winter crop has exceeded previous estimates. A slight increase in the estimated total yield is recorded. The yield is estimated at 55,000 bags.

RABIES MENACE IN KENYA.

Native Woman Bitten by Jackal. Raising Curmuses. HEAVY MORTALITY OF STRAY DOGS.

The following report on the progress of the campaign against rabies in Kenya has been issued dated February 21, by the Division of Animal Industry, Department of Agriculture.

Since the last report a case of rabies in a jackal has come to notice and has been confirmed by the Rabies Laboratory. The jackal was taken from a European farm in the Lumwa area.

Further reports from this area state that previous to this incident a jackal bit a native hunter and the animal escaped, later a European-owned dog was bitten inside the house of his owner by a jackal, the dog was destroyed and again the jackal escaped.

It is suggested, however, that in each instance the same jackal was concerned, and it is fortunate that the animal has been shot and is now confined to a cage.

It has also come to notice that a native child was bitten in the Lamwa district in Tanganyika by a jackal. The mother of the child was taken to Nairobi for treatment.

MAIZE REPORT. The following is the estimated surplus of certain produce available in the Colony for a review.

Maize: No circumstances have been noted to indicate any change in the previous estimate of 800,000 bags of maize available for export.

Wheat: Little change in the wheat situation has occurred and it is probable that the total production for the month of February will be estimated at about 60,000 bags.

Coffee: The increase in the total yield indicates the probability of a bumper year for coffee in the Colony.

Other Products: Copra production is native resources are almost entirely exhausted and no considerable surplus should be produced.

A First Shipment From Mombasa. INTERESTED FOR BOOB.

Evidence by Major Grogan in the Commission.

MORE SUBSTANCE TAKEN OUT OF SOIL THAN RETURNED.

During the course of his evidence to the Kenya Land Commission on Monday, Major E. S. Grogan gave his views on the relationship of the African native with the land. He said that unless the natives were placed under the control of other people, they took more from the land than they put back, whereas there should be a proper balance. With the continuance of their present methods, he prophesied that in 20 years time all native land would be exhausted of its constituents.

Disposition of Tribes.

In 1905 or 1906, while exploring the best routes to the Ripley country, Major E. S. Grogan was pasty. 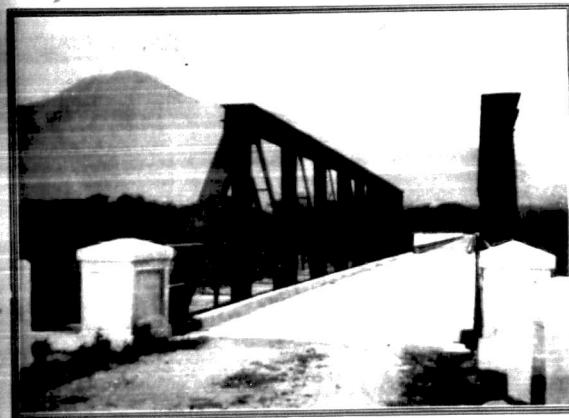

Prospects of Cereal Growing in Kenya.

Progress Retarded.

COLONEL GRIFFITHS GIVES A REVIEW OF PRESENT SITUATION.

An interesting and valuable address on the cereal growing prospects in Kenya for 1933, and the general relationship of Agriculture to the future of the Colony, was given by Colonel C. G. Griffiths on Saturday last at a meeting of the Njoro Settlers' Association.

Col. Griffiths expressed the opinion that despite the many disabilities under which the maize industry had suffered and was suffering, it would progress and surmount all its difficulties.

The Colony had in the past recovered in a marvellous manner from a series of shocks and it was little doubt that the first of the primary products to benefit should be maize. There were few countries which gave the return per acre as that obtainable in Kenya.

Colonel Griffiths strongly criticised the policy of the railways in increasing the transport charges and in restricting production as a time when greater adversity was needed to meet the heavy Budget expenditure.

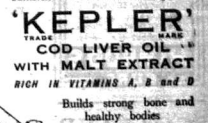

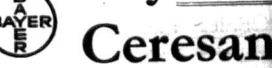

Centres Hope on Native Produce.

**SUGGESTS SCRAPPING 400 MILES OF THE
 TANGA RAILWAY TO KILIMANJARO.**

Mr. Roger Gibb in his recent report on railway finances does not recommend the amalgamation of the East African railway systems.

In his view the limited economies would be outweighed by the political disadvantages as it would impede the entirely to stimulate a more favoured treatment.

Discussing the problem of Tanganyika Central Railway, robbed of Congo copper traffic which will not return, Mr. Gibb looks to the encouragement of native production as the main source of improved revenue.

As an example of how the native should be encouraged to plant larger crops, Mr. Gibb insists the use of the pedal bicycle which should not be penalised by heavy railway rates.

He severely criticises a proposal to establish a Railway Advisory Council in Tanganyika.

His solution of the Tanga line problem is the tearing up of 100 miles of the Tanga line between Kabo and Bulko. 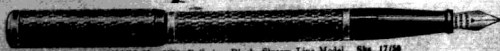

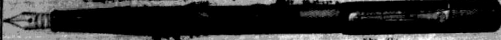

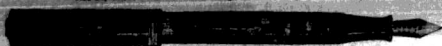
