# Slashing Attack on Kenya's Critics.

## SECRETARY OF STATE DEFENDS COLONY'S INTEREST IN AFRICANS.

### A Promise to the Country.

Sir P. Caniff-Lester made a slashing attack on critics of the Government of Kenya in asking the House of Commons to support the motion debated recently approving the policy adopted in Kenya to deal with the Kakamega goldfields problem and to repudiate one of the least founded charges ever made, namely the charge of breach of faith.

"I do not mind how much I am criticised in this country," he said, "but do not make unduly difficult the lot of administrators in the provinces of your Empire, who are actuated by the most disinterested motives."

Again, he declared that the Governor and the Chief Native Commissioner of Kenya "are really as good judges as to what is keeping faith with the native as any of us."

Dealing with the critics, he said it would be wiser if they sought information from the Colonial Office before making statements publicly.

While there were critics generally anxious to see native interests fully safeguarded, he said, he advised that there were others who sought an occasion of this kind to attack the Government of Kenya and the Government at home "and who are not slow to try to stir up trouble between the natives and the white men."

Paying a tribute to the progress that he said the relation ship at Kakamega was a case of the things of which we might very well be proud.

"I want to say in this House," Sir Philip declared, "that I wish the people out there, not only the Government but the white settlers, to be assured that the House of Commons is not going to see them traduced, without some protest."

### The Kakamega Controversy.

## ELECTED MEMBERS' LEADER AT NAIVASHA.

### Rift Valley Vacancy.

#### LORD FRANCIS SCOTT GOING HOME FOR REASONS OF HEALTH.

A large public meeting held in Naivasha on Friday night determined opposition to the principle of Income Tax as an unworkable, unworkable and detrimental to the interests of Kenya.

One speaker, referring to the promise that other forms of taxation would be reduced, said: "It is always the same—jam yesterday and jam to-morrow, but never jam to-day." The settlers wanted jam now—in the form of greater control over their own affairs.

Lord Francis Scott announced that on medical grounds he would be going home in April or May and he asked his constituents to consider the name of some one to take his place on Legislative Council.

### "Never Jam To-day."

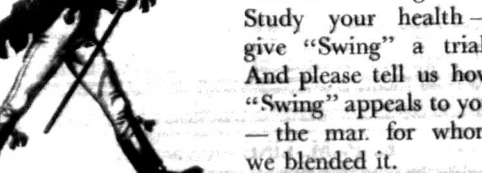

### CRITICISMS OF THE CONVENTION.

#### Delay in Constitutional Reform.

##### A SHELVED MOTION.

Nyong Association Not Satisfied.

"Since we lost our good leader, the late Lord Delabon, what has happened? Everything is bottled." This indignation was voiced by Major J. Hiddell, speaking at the annual general meeting of the Nyong Association, which was held at the New Stanley Hotel, Nairobi, on Friday in discussing the delay which had occurred in the submission of a scheme for constitutional reform in Kenya.

When the Convention of Associations last met, it passed the following resolution: "That the time having arrived when a constitutional advance is considered to be overdue, this Convention urges upon His Majesty's Government that it is necessary that the constitution of Kenya be so altered as to provide for an unofficial majority in the Legislative Council and that it be an instruction to the Executive, in conjunction with the Elected Members, to work out the details of a scheme of Unofficial representation for submission to His Majesty's Government on a basis which would be acceptable to the Colony and to respect." This was labelled "Motion No. 10."

But, in the opinion of the Nyong Association, although that resolution was passed by the Convention nothing has been done since, and the matter has been shelved.

Hence the Association passed unanimously on Friday the following motion of censure: "In view of the Motion No. 10 passed at the meeting of Convention, this Association registers its disappointment that no scheme has been received nor any other communication which might suggest that this resolution has received the attention that it deserves. Four months have passed by and this Association therefore considers itself justified in registering an emphatic protest against the apparent shelving of such an important matter, and we call upon the Leader of the Elected Members and the Chairman of the Convention to explain their apparent failure to take action as instructed by the Convention."

#### Nothing Done.

In introducing the motion, Major C. Maude (Chairman) said: "The sub-committee had originally been appointed to deal with the matter consisting of C. E. A. Amber (Chairman of the Convention), Sir Robert Gray (The 'Pioneer'), Mr. W. Macdonald Wilson (Kisumu), Lord Francis Scott (Leader of the Elected Members) and one or two other Elected Members."

"But we have heard nothing from them at all," Major Maude declared. He had asked the members of the Executive, but he had received an extremely unsatisfactory reply. Intentionally little had happened. No reason had been given by the Executive except that the time was not fit to discuss, so that delegates to the Convention would have to consider the matter before the Convention meeting, and after some difficulty had been agreed upon, but after that, no communication whatever had been received."

#### Master of Urgency.

Captain F. H. Brown, recalled the Convention of Associations. A resolution had been passed, which had been accepted by an overwhelming majority. Lord Francis Scott, whose own words in talking the matter and agreeing the resolution had been in the Convention of Associations last met, it passed the following resolution: "That the time having arrived when a constitutional advance is considered to be overdue, this Convention urges upon His Majesty's Government that it is necessary that the constitution of Kenya be so altered as to provide for an unofficial majority in the Legislative Council and that it be an instruction to the Executive, in conjunction with the Elected Members, to work out the details of a scheme of Unofficial representation for submission to His Majesty's Government on a basis which would be acceptable to the Colony and to respect."

#### Petition Against Income Tax.

In reply to a question by Capt. J. J. Deane, at the Nairobi Association's meeting on Friday, Capt. the Hon. H. E. Scherzer, M.C., for Nairobi South, said that a committee had been appointed some time ago of representatives of the Convention of Associations, Chamber of Commerce, and Elected Members, for the purpose of watching income tax developments.

From this a sub-committee was appointed consisting of Mr. W. F. Stapley, Major F. Cavanish, Beninich which was now drafting a petition. This petition was in draft, and was in process of being polished up. It was said to be necessary to have it ready for the petition to be very fully and vigorously prepared and approved, and that they took a little time. It was hoped that by Monday or so the petition would be printed for circulation, for signatures throughout the country.

#### POLICE PROMOTION.

##### Capt. Pritchard Brown an Assistant Commissioner.

Captain Pritchard Brown has been promoted to the post of Assistant Commissioner of Police in the Kenya Force with effect from January 1st.

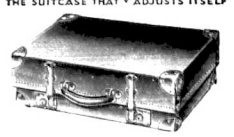

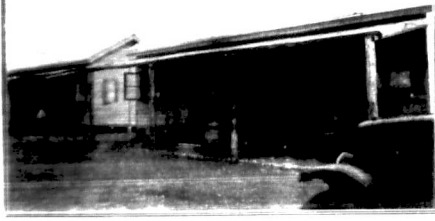

GOVERNMENT'S ERRORS OF THE PAST.

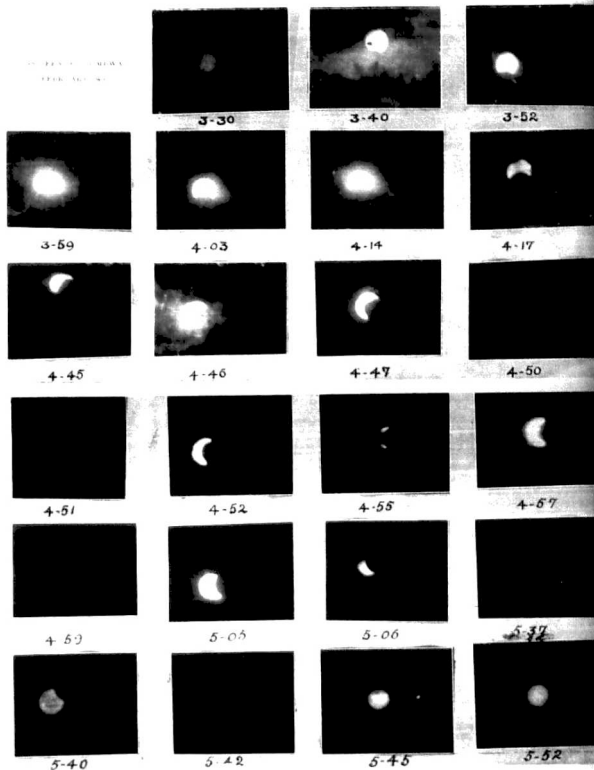

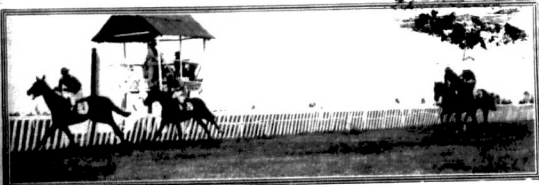

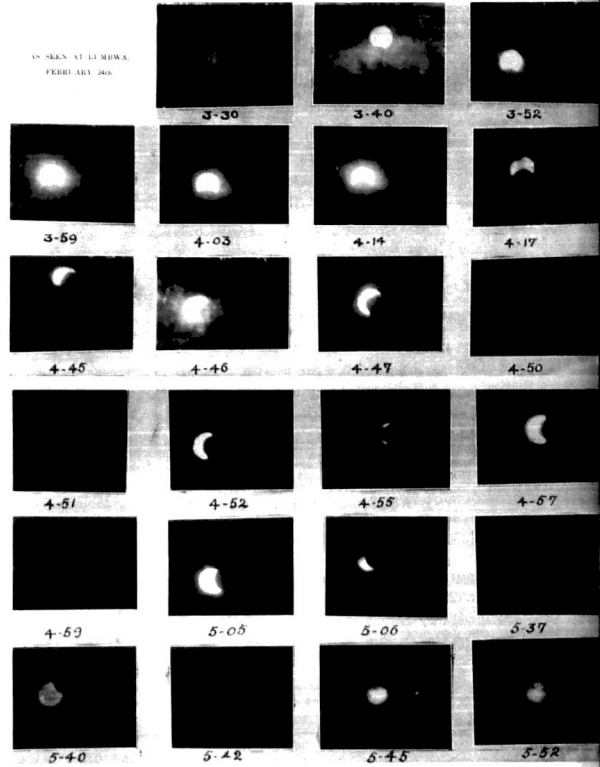

## Four Expeditions to Ruwenzori.

EXCELLENT WORK BY A  
BRITISH SCIENTIST.

Thrilling Discoveries.

CONFIRMATION OF STORIES HANDED  
DOWN BY PORTUGUESE TIMES.

The four expeditions made into the Ruwenzori Mountains last year by Dr. Noel Humphreys were recently described by him in a lecture before the Royal Geographical Society.

Apart from very interesting exploration work, Dr. Humphreys collected seeds and plants a great many varieties of which were sent by air to Britain.

The expeditions confirmed stories handed down for over two thousand years regarding the source of a river (then believed to be the Nile) between two snow peaks and an apparently bottomless lake mentioned by Herodotus.
