SIXTEEN VIOLENT SHOCKS ON PACIFIC COAST.

Heavy Death Roll.

FIRES AND TIDAL WAVE FOLLOW UPEVAAL.

A terrific earthquake on the Southern coast of California has caused enormous destruction and heavy loss of life. Some towns in the Los Angeles district have been completely destroyed.

During the late afternoon and night of Friday, sixteen violent shocks occurred over a very wide area. Long Beach was the centre of the tremors and became a scene of horror and devastation.

Serious estimates of loss in various quarters including the disasters of the earthquake, adding to the disasters of the Los Angeles.

Sixteen shocks have up to the present been reported. As many as 82,000 houses have been wrecked at Long Beach alone, while structures in Los Angeles and elsewhere have collapsed.

Departmental Retrenchments.

PROPOSALS BY EXPENDITURE ADVISORY COMMITTEE TO SOLVE EDUCATION FINANCE.

Considerable changes in the Education Department necessitated by the need for economy are recommended by the Kenya Expenditure Advisory Committee of which the Director of Education was a member.

The principal changes include a reduction in salaries of primary school teachers in European and Indian Schools, transfer of stores department to the P.W.D., and reduction of clerical staff by half.

It is contemplated that in a full year all the recommendations of the Committee would reduce the present cost of the Department by £20,000 without interfering with the vote for African education.

The Committee were satisfied that more revenue must be found from the two non-native communities for educational purposes. It is therefore proposed that the fees for European secondary education should be increased to £15 a year and there should be a 25 per cent. increase in the fees and education tax paid by Indians.

It is also suggested that the Geom community should now be called upon to pay Education Tax.

There has been a reduction in the per capita cost of education in the Colony but the Committee believe that an enquiry into boarding costs is necessary.

Enquiry into Boarding Costs.

One of the main services expensed by the Education Department is the boarding of non-native students. The Kenya Expenditure Advisory Committee views "report on the progress of Kenya was issued recently by Mr. Edmondson.

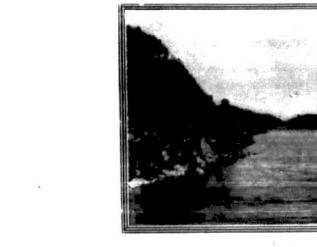

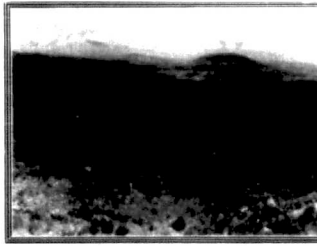

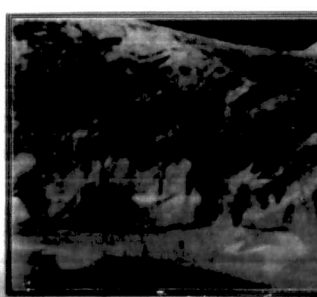

Department of Agriculture Top-Heavy.

REORGANISATION WITH VIEW TO ECONOMY.

Proposed Staff Reduction.

EXPENDITURE ADVISORY COMMITTEE CONSIDER CUSTOMS COLLECTION COSTS TOO HIGH.

The Expenditure Advisory Committee consider that the Department of Agriculture requires reorganisation as it is at present top-heavy.

In addition to savings already effected the Committee recommend staff reductions of officers and clerks totaling 15.

It is also proposed that the post of Agricultural Economist be abolished at the end of the tour of the present officer.

Although limited by their terms of reference the Committee ventured to suggest to Government that the Native Betterment Fund contribution for agricultural and veterinary services could be spent to the greater benefit of the African.

For example, they condemned as unsound the policy of spending large sums on veterinary services directed to increasing the number of valuable stock.

The cost of the audit in Kenya is still regarded as too heavy.

A minor source of new revenue proposed is the charging of small fees to officials for the services rendered to them and their families by the Coast Agent.

Fees for Coast Agency Services.

Although the Expenditure Advisory Committee had to keep in mind the importance of encouraging the production of goods for the Agricultural Department (in its relation to non-native services) but all other departments had to be brought under review.

The Report states that the original draft estimates for 1932 for this Department amounted to £42,411. These estimates were submitted after the Committee's first interviews with the Director. Purely as a result of suggestions made to the Director at his first interview it is proposed that a full-time agricultural officer should be employed as editor of the proposed Agricultural Journal and as lecturer on agriculture. They consider that the office of editor should be discharged by one of the officers of the Department in addition to his normal duties.

Reorganisation.

All these recommendations deal with the Department as it is at present organised. The Committee, however, saw unanimously of the opinion that the present organisation is top-heavy. They recommended that the senior posts in the Department should be as follows:

- 1. Director of Agriculture.
- 2. One officer to take the place of both the present Director of Agriculture and the Assistant to the Director.
- 3. One officer to take the place of the present Deputy Director (Agriculture) and the Assistant Chief Veterinary Officer or the Chief Veterinary Branch Officer.

Acceptance of all the recommendations of the Department is to be reduced to £22,367—a further saving of £20,000. The Committee recommended that the provision be reduced to that sum.

Administrative and General Staff—by 1 officer superintending and 4 clerks.

The Division of Plant Industry—by 1 laboratory assistant, Division of Animal Industry—by 2 senior veterinary officers, 1 animal veterinary officer, 3 laboratory assistants, 1 yard fencer, and 1 stock clerk.

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MOMBASA STRONGLY OPPOSES INCOME TAX.

COAST TOWN JOINS WITH REST OF KENYA.

A Unanimous Resolution.

LARGELY ATTENDED MEETING REGISTERS ITS OPINION ON THE MEASURE.

A very largely attended meeting of residents of Mombasa was held in the grounds of the Manor Hotel on Tuesday last, when a resolution was unanimously adopted expressing strong opposition to the imposition of Income Tax in Kenya.

The meeting was presided over by Mr. K. H. Rodwell and the resolution was moved by Hon. H. E. Schwartz, the Elected Member for Nairobi North, and seconded by Hon. F. Arthur Bemmister, the Member for Mombasa.

Hon. H. E. Schwartz reviewed at length the numerous arguments against the imposition of the tax, particularly in regard to its effect on production and on the influx of new capital into the country.

THE PETITION.

['STANDARD']

Mombasa (By Mail). There was a very large attendance at the meeting of the Mombasa Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday evening for the meeting to prepare the introduction of the Income Tax in Kenya. Mr. K. H. Rodwell presided. Following the meeting, the members of the Chamber of Commerce, including Hon. H. E. Schwartz and Hon. F. Arthur Bemmister, the following resolution was passed unanimously:

Effect on Farmers.

In regard to the effect of the Bill on farmers, Captain Schwartz drew attention to the fact that the increase in stock would be regarded as a means of subject to taxation, irrespective of losses which were made. He asked how it would be possible to assess the increase in stock so far as the Mombasa was concerned. He had heard it suggested that their cattle were common stock and that the Government would not be able to assess the individual was liable.

There was no doubt that when the Bill comes up for the annual meeting on March 21, some explanation will be given by the Government. It is believed that the Government will be able to give a satisfactory answer to the questions raised by the members of the Chamber of Commerce.

Alternatives.

Captain Schwartz said that he did not propose to go into the matter of alternative forms of taxation, but that he had already been put up to Government by the Chamber of Commerce and would have to refer to the subject to the Select Committee of the Legislative Council or by a special Commission appointed by Government.

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Neglect of Productive Development.

UNBALANCED EXPENDITURE OF KENYA'S PAST LOANS.

Need For Stimulating Exports.

OF GREATER IMPORTANCE TO COLONY THAN ERECTION OF ELABORATE BUILDINGS.

The Expenditure Advisory Committee is strongly of the opinion that when Kenya raises new loans the money should be used in the direction of stimulating exports rather than for the erection of elaborate buildings.

"It is only by adopting this course," the Report remarks, "that an addition to the Colony's expenditure on loan charges can be justified."

The Committee felt that too small a proportion of borrowed money has been used in the past to promote productive development.

It is proposed that Government should review the present arrangement with the Railway regarding the continued use of the Financing Fund. The Committee believed that the Railway is not now making a fair contribution to the cost and suggest a minimum annual guarantee.

Magistrates are criticised for increasing the prison population of the Colony through not making sufficient use of the alternative of a fine.

Education Problems.

The Secretary has made it his business to study funds for various purposes both within the Colony and outside. He has reported to the Expenditure Advisory Committee at an early stage in their investigations that the Government should be prepared to estimate what provision should be made for the year 1960 and for the year 1961. The Committee has agreed to consider the proposals of the Secretary in the light of the information available.

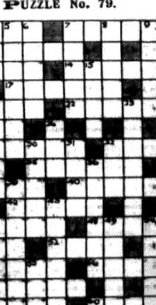

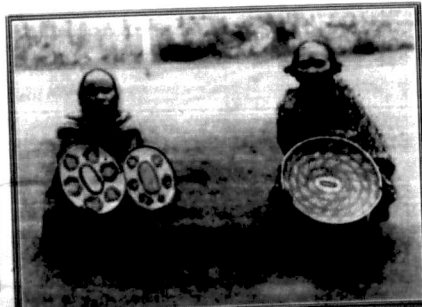

CRITICISM OF ATTITUDE OF THE JOINT EAST AFRICAN BOARD.

The Kenya Convention of Associations began its session at Nairobi on Thursday when the Chairman, Mr. C. Kenneth Archer reviewed some of the major problems now before the Colony.

In a reference to the Secretary of State's Tax instructions, the Chairman declared that if these were intended to be a relief, they would fall signally in their purpose and would merely exasperate the country.

Discussing Lord Francis Scott's visit to London, he suggested that it served a very useful purpose in demonstrating the ease and speed with which a representative of Kenya could attend at headquarters.

In regard to the Joint East African Board, Mr. Archer remarked that he never intended that the Board should be at liberty as the indirect representative of Convention to put forward without prior discussion or intimation any proposals which would be complete variance with those held by the Colony.

Three Important Reports.

Mr. C. Kenneth Archer, Chairman of the Convention of Associations, presiding at the opening session in the Memorial Hall, Nairobi on Thursday, reviewed some of the more important public events which had occurred since his session six months ago. In doing so he expressed the opinion that if the announcement made by the Secretary of State and published in the "East African Standard" yesterday, in connection with the subject of procedure in regard to the Income Tax Bill, was intended to be a relief, it would exasperate public opinion still further.

Continuing the speaker said he had no doubt that a few sensible people, if there were any in the Colony, who were guided by a sense of fairness at the expense of their own interests, would have opposed the tax. The opposition was the outcome of an initiative brought generally from the ranks of the Government, which had been previously dismissed as a mere party matter.

Mr. Archer welcomed the views of the Hon. F. E. S. Jones, M.P., and Major G. E. Jones, M.P., who had been invited to the Convention to give their views on the desirability of the tax. He pointed out that the tax was not intended to be a relief, but a means of raising revenue for the Government.

Mr. Archer expressed his regret that the Convention was meeting at a time when the country was in a state of depression, and that the tax would be a further burden on the people.

THE CONVENTION IN SESSION. Native Registration.
