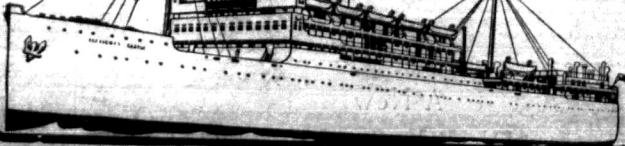

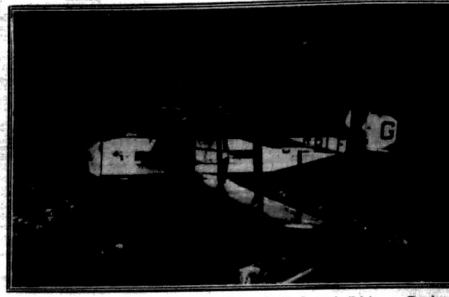

Jewish Boycott of German Goods.

PROTEST AGAINST ALLEGED EXCESSES.

Poland Joins Movement.

ANTI-SEMITIC ORDER BY BAVARIAN GOVERNMENT.

The movement to protest a boycott by Jews of German goods, as a protest against the alleged anti-semitic policy of the Nazis, is spreading. Jews in Poland have now joined the boycott. A Jewish world organization in London also supports the movement, but another body representing Jews in the British Empire has decided not to extend its support.

It is stated in Prussia that discrimination against Jews has ceased, but on the other hand it is also announced that in Bavaria Jews have been forbidden to hold judicial office.

Position in Prussia.

[REUTERS BRUSSELS' AGENCY.] London, March 24. A campaign for the boycott of German goods is afoot in several countries, notably in America as a protest against the treatment of Jews in Germany by the Nazis. The thousands of Jewish ex-servicemen marched to the Reichstag in New York to urge a protest.

Meeting in London.

[REUTERS.] London, March 27. The Jewish Board of Deputies met for three hours in private in London yesterday discussing the situation in Germany, and steps to be taken to help their co-religionists in that country. Many leading members of the Board of Deputies and other Jewish organizations were present.

A World Movement.

London, March 28. As a protest against alleged anti-Jewish excesses in Germany, the World Alliance for Peace and Democracy has announced a boycott of German goods, including German restaurants and cinemas, in both German cities and abroad.

CONTRADICTIONARY STATEMENT.

Berlin, March 28. Captain Goering, the Prussian Minister for the Interior, assured foreign press representatives that he would not attempt to discriminate against Jews, but to interfere with their liberty. The Government was doing its utmost to prevent unauthorized acts by individuals. The Prussian Minister for Justice, however, has prohibited Jewish lawyers from practicing their profession in Prussia, and Jewish public prosecutors from acting on behalf of the State.

NO BOYCOTT IN BRITAIN.

London, March 28. A meeting in London of the Jewish Board of Deputies, presided over by the Jews of the British Empire has decided in support of the Jewish Board of Deputies to refuse to take any part in the proposed boycott of German goods as a protest against the treatment of Jews in Germany. The boycott movement will remain a purely Jewish movement.

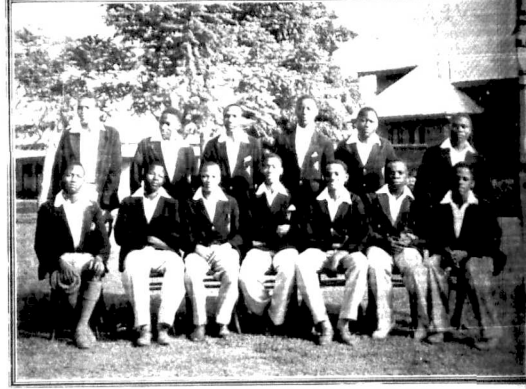

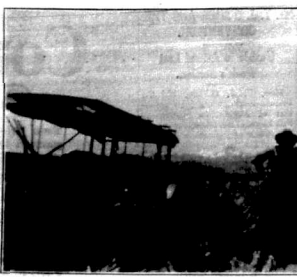

New Attraction For Tourists.

[From a Correspondent.] Nanyuki, March 14. An attempt was recently made by two Nanyuki residents to reach the glaciers of Mt. Kenya from Nanyuki by rail. Two horses of a well-known make were used, one a four cylinder four speed, driven by Mr. A. F. Bartlett, D.P.C., and the other a six cylinder four speed safari model driven by Commander Hook.

Three Kikuyu and six Meru completed the party and both trucks commenced the climb at 4 p.m. on February 22. AIRSHIP DISASTER IN AMERICA.

Disaster Overtakes American "AKRON."

FEARED DEATH OF 71 OFFICERS AND MEN.

Thunderstorm Horror.

VESSEL FORCED DOWN BY TERRIFIC STORM.

The world's largest airship, the giant American Naval Dirigible, "Akron," has been wrecked in a storm disaster which promises to eclipse even the horrors of the destruction of the British R.101.

It is stated that this disaster means the death blow to airship construction in the United States, as it is the second big airship to be lost, the first being the "Shenandoah" in 1923. The whole country is appalled by the catastrophe.

One of the survivors is the second-in-command of the vessel, and in his account he states that the "Akron" was surrounded by lightning for three hours. In spite of all efforts, she steadily lost height and finally struck the water stern downwards and was completely destroyed.

A statement issued by the Navy Department says that the airship was probably struck by lightning and caught fire and then sank.

America Appalled.

The "Akron" had, two weeks and the radio man are reported saved. There is a possibility that the "Akron" had a gas capsule aboard with 5,000,000 cubic feet of the British airship R.100 and 2,000,000 of the American dirigible "Los Angeles." British Official Wireless Service.

The Lockheed naval station at Annapolis, Md., has been notified of the disaster. The crew of the "Akron" are supposed to be in possession of a life-saving apparatus on the 800 ft. coil and led visibility.

RACING TO RESCUE.

Airship Reported Still Afloat.

New York, April 4. The Coast Guard vessel, a motor destroyer and all the other vessels are racing to the assistance of the "Akron."

The last wireless communication received from the "Akron" was a check light which stated when the transmitter interfered with the receiver.

BRITAIN SHOCKED.

Conflicting News of Officers and Men.

It is generally understood that the "Akron" disaster is the death blow to American airship construction. The country is appalled by the catastrophe resulting in 71 deaths, the body of one of the crew, a lieutenant, having been found up missing five miles away.

The first official survivor's account is given by Commander Wray, the second-in-command of the vessel, who describes the vessel being surrounded by lightning for three hours and possibly being hoisted despite the blowing out of ballast. RAID ON BERLIN LAW COURTS AND BANK.

Preparations are complete throughout Germany for the boycott of Jews. The organisation of the campaign has been particularly thorough, and it includes the demand for the dismissal of all Jewish employees of German businesses, and also efforts to ensure that no German employees are dismissed by Jewish firms.

Although the boycott was fixed to commence at 10 a.m. on Saturday, it was subsequently decided that it should be called off later in the day in order to give an opportunity for the anti-German campaign alone to cease. If the anti-German campaign would be put into effect on April 5, it is stated, however, that a communique is unlikely.

Meanwhile, the Nazis have already commenced anti-Semitic demonstrations and members of the "Storm Troops" raided the Berlin Law Courts and expelled the Chief Justice, and also all Jewish judges and attorneys. Nazis also raided a bank in Berlin and confiscated the entire deposit of Professor Einstein.

At Kiel, the son of a Jewish shop proprietor, who injured a Nazi picket, was arrested by "Storm Troops" and was taken to the police station, where he was shot dead by persons whom the police allowed to enter the cell.

In other countries in Europe the anti-German movement is proceeding. A meeting of protest was held in London at which a resolution was passed appealing to the British Government to grant right of asylum to victims of the German campaign. An organised boycott of German goods has been arranged in France.

A Breathing Space.

It is reported that the British Government has granted a breathing space to the German Government, which has been asked to suspend the boycott for a period of 24 hours.

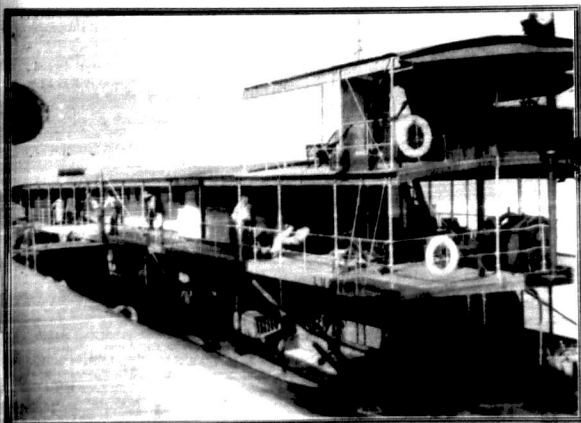

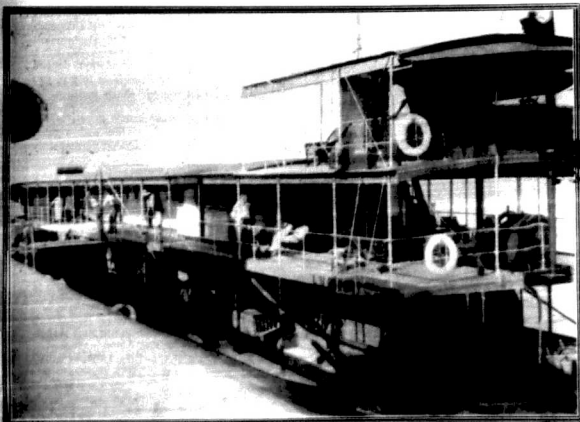

Government Believes in Settlement.

In the Legislative Council yesterday, the Kenya Government stated its belief in the value of white settlement in the progress of East Africa. But it does not propose to subsidize fresh settlements until such settlement can be economically justified.

The explanation given by the "East African Standard" of Colonial Albany's recent Convention "bombshell" was officially confirmed.

In Council yesterday the Hon. George Harvey (Labour) asked Government: (a) Has the staff of the Government been drawn to a statement by one of the Delegates to the Convention of Association in the 29th March that he had intended to state the effect that the Government would not subsidize fresh settlements until such settlement can be economically justified?

The Colonial Secretary replied: "The answer is in the affirmative. The official document in question was a dispatch published last year as part of the White Paper known as 'Correspondence (1931-1932) arising from the Report of the Joint Select Committee on Colonial Policy in East Africa.' It has since been printed out in its full form. From that the delegate in question may have been labouring under a misapprehension in putting the question he did upon the passage above.

White Settlement.—The answer is in the affirmative. It is an important element in the progress of East Africa, and the policy of this Government, as outlined by the Economic Committee in the House yesterday, is to subsidize fresh settlements until such settlement can be economically justified.

Settlements are economically justified only when the Government is satisfied that the settlement can be maintained on a self-sufficient basis.

During the sitting of the Land Inquiry Commission the statement that the Government would not subsidize fresh settlements until such settlement can be economically justified was not made.

Mr. Harvey followed up at first by asking whether Government was making any special attempt to secure new residential areas.

He must be aware, replied the Colonial Secretary, that the Government had adopted in connection with the Kenya Government that it had expressed its support of the aims and objects that the Association is in view.
