Amazing Stories From Prison.

WHITE PAPER REVEALS DETAILS OF SOVIET SYSTEM.

The Accused Engineers.

ALLEGED CONFESSIONS USED TO TRAP AND INTIMIDATE BRITISH ENGINEERS.

An amazing story of experiences of British engineers in Russian hands is revealed in a White Paper issued by the British Government.

Details are given of alleged confessions made by the accused men and charges levelled against their colleagues by them—with all of which the arrested men have been confronted in long and trying cross-examinations by the Secret Police.

One Russian woman is described as trying off accusations mechanically in an unnatural voice as if by habit.

Mr. John Cushey, the Kenya engineer was approached by Russian agents who asked to examine a number of charts which he refused to provide.

Later a woman was sent for by the authorities and instructed to persuade Metropolitan Vickers' manager in Russia to do the same work.

One of the engineers, William Henry Theobald, chief assistant to the manager, who has been under constant interrogation—during which serious accusations were made against him by his colleagues and by many Russian—was described as being in a state of terror.

Offer to Kenya Man.

Amazing Development in Twenty Years. (REUTERS WIRELESS SERVICE.) Gardone, April 10. A claim has been made by the Italian airman, Warrant Officer Angelo that he has broken the British air speed record of 407 1/2 miles an hour set up by Flight-Lieut. G. H. Stainforth in the Schneider Trophy machine in 1931, by covering a measured course at the rate of 437 1/2 miles an hour.

An official communication issued by the Air Ministry in Rome later confirms Warrant Officer Angelo's claim and states that he broke the air speed record by flying five times over a measured straight course at an average speed of 682.40 kilometres an hour.

The speed attained on one of the flights reached 692.525 kilometres an hour.

It is of interest to note that in 20 years the speed of aircraft has been multiplied nearly 10 times. In 1913 the first scheduled Trophy winner Mr. Prevost Farman at Meaux was equipped with a speed of 45.75 miles an hour.

IRISH RAIL STRIKE.

WARM SUNNY WEATHER IN ENGLAND.

KENYA CHIEF JUSTICE DISAGREES WITH IMPRISONMENT.

Special Appeal Courts.

REVISION WORK DUE MAINLY TO LACK OF LEGALLY TRAINED OFFICERS.

The Chief Justice of Kenya holds several views on the question of procedure in Native cases opposed to those of many witnesses who have so far appeared before the Justice Commission.

For example, he considers the Revision System absolutely necessary—although he agrees that under the present system irregularities might pass unnoticed if they are in a difficult position in the Courts through ignorance of procedure, he does not think an African Legal Adviser would be of much use and he is satisfied with the quality of the Assessors.

His Honour disagrees, also, with the view that there should be any alternative to the death penalty for murder.

His view is that although Administrative Officers do their work very well, the need for revision and confirmation of cases from subordinate courts would disappear if the judicial work carried out by the District Officers was done by lawyers.

The Chief Justice agreed that special Appeal Courts could be arranged in Kenya and would help in reducing the present delay.

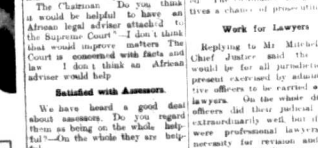

Mr. Justice Keir, in his judgment, regarded the proposed income tax as the fairest and most equitable alternative to the existing system. He rejected the alternatives of a poll tax and a tax on land, as being more objectionable to the Native mind.

The resolution was passed in favour of the proposed income tax. The tax will be levied on the total income of the taxpayer, and will be payable in four instalments during the year.

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Kenya's Interest in Rome Conversations.

QUESTIONS IN THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

Cession Rumour.

FRENCH SUSPICIOUS REGARDING PEACE TREATY REVISION.

Details of the circumstances which led to questions in the House of Commons regarding proposed references during the recent Rome conversations to the possibility of cessions of East African territory are given by the London Correspondent of the East African Standard.

French newspapers suggested that a further rectification of the frontier of Italian Somaliland had been suggested and that the possibility of returning some of the ex-German colonies to Germany had been mooted.

Whilst the Prime Minister gave the House of Commons an assurance that Tanganyika was not mentioned during the Rome conversations, the London Correspondent advises that if there is to be a revision of the Peace Treaty, East Africa should be on the alert.

REDUCTION IN THE SCALE OF CHARGES.

Select Committee's Proposals.

LOOPHOLE FOUND BY WHICH OWNERS OF SHIPPING MAY ESCAPE.

The Report of the Select Committee on the Income Tax Bill was presented to the Kenya Legislative Council on Monday.

The Committee do not propose any increase in the personal allowances.

The main recommendation is a reduction in the rate of tax whereby the first £350 of chargeable income shall be taxed at 1/6 in the £ instead of 1/5 as at first proposed. The other rates remain much as at first proposed.

The Committee has discovered a somewhat serious situation in regard to the taxation of shipping companies. It is pointed out that unless an Income Tax Bill is introduced simultaneously in Tanganyika, non-resident shipowners may escape the tax by diverting traffic to Tanganyika ports or by offering more attractive freight rates for the ports in the Mandated Territory.

The Report makes provision for the doubling of the Non-native Poll Tax, to which objection is taken by one of the Indian members.

Generally the Committee are of the opinion that if any further relief can be given should take the form of a reduction in rates rather than by providing more generous allowances.

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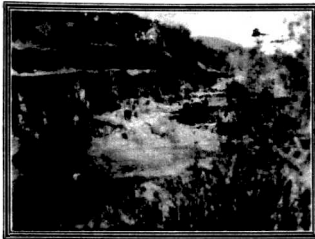
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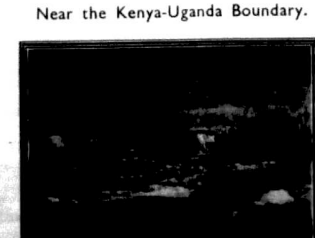

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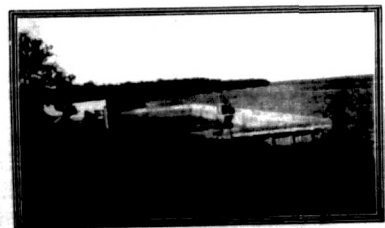

GOVERNMENT DECLINES TO ACCEPT HIS MAIN AMENDMENTS.

The report of the Select Committee on the Income Tax Bill was adopted by Legislative Council on Wednesday and was considered by the Committee of the whole House by the European, Elected Members. The next resolution passed was as follows: "In order to safeguard the interests of the growers, the Kenya Pyrethrum Growers' Association should be empowered to acquire a good name from the Government and keep it. With this object in view a letter had been written to the Agricultural Department requesting them to ascertain the requirements of different markets in respect of grades with a view to grading and inspecting for market. As the first memorandum on this subject received from the Agricultural Department only contained general marketing information the committee was instructed to write to the Department stressing the importance of obtaining as much information as possible about the required grades and suggesting that this information might be obtained from the British Council at Tokyo."

Sentences Passed On British Engineers.

TWO TO SERVE TERMS OF IMPRISONMENT.

Three Deported: One Acquitted.

STRANGE EARLY MORNING SCENES WHILE MEN AWAIT THEIR FATE.

At five minutes to one on Wednesday morning in the midst of a death-like silence the President of the Moscow Court passed sentence upon British and Russian accused at the close of the most sensational trial of modern times.

The sentences on the English engineers were—
THORNTON: Three years.
MACDONALD: Two years.
MUNKHOUSE: Expulsion.
CUSHNY: Expulsion.
NORDWELL: Expulsion.
GREGORY: Acquitted.

Sentences ranging from 10 years to 18 months were passed on the Russian prisoners only one of whom was acquitted.

Judge's Contention.

The President of the Court maintained that Thornton was the chief instigator of the crimes and that Monkhouse was concerned with him.

London spent an anxious night awaiting the result. At the Foreign Office high officials kept a direct telephone open to Moscow and the evening newspapers made special arrangements to issue extra editions after the normal publication hours.

A statement has been issued by Metropolitan Vickers reaffirming complete confidence in the members of the company's staff who have been the victims of this travesty of justice. It also promises a detailed announcement as soon as legal advisers return from Moscow.

Privy Council Meets.

An announcement was made at an early hour on Wednesday that the Privy Council would meet later in the forenoon at Windsor Castle to authorise a Proclamation under the recent Act of Parliament intended to empower Government to prohibit or regulate importation of goods from Russia.

No Death Penalty.

Moscow April 23.
This trial of the British engineers and 13 Russian accomplices of the same company opened today in the Hall of the Trades Union in the Kremlin. The chairman of the trial was the Blue Room of the Nomenklat's Club, is now under the changed name of a meeting place set aside for workers.

Witnesses worked on October 1941. Five of the accused surrendered to the British courts but had been freed by the end of the war. They were later jailed by the British courts. The others were given permission to sit down.

THE CHARGES.

He had put metal in the machinery at Zlatoust and the Macdonald had suggested to him.

That Is True

Macdonald was given control and he admitted that he gave Thornton 3,000 roubles. He tried to show down Gregory at Zlatoust to sabotage Metropolitan Vickers' engine. The Court then declared that all the acts of sabotage were directed against the interests of the Soviet Army. He added that when he was at the front with the British workers to get in touch with Macdonald was the man from whom they could get information.

During this part of the evidence Thornton furnished eagerly with his copy of the indictment. He said that when Macdonald left Zlatoust and exchanged letters signed with the name of Macdonald, he also told the Metropolitan Vickers staff of the instructions to Gusev under the name of Macdonald.

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THE MAIZE INDUSTRY IN KENYA.

SPECIAL INVESTIGATION INTO SITUATION.

Debate in Council.

DETERMINING FACTOR IN WEALTH OF THE COLONY.

Government has agreed to institute special investigations into the maize industry of Kenya with a view to alleviating the present serious situation which farmers are faced owing to low prices. These investigations will be carried out by a special committee of the Board of Agriculture.

This information was given in the Legislative Council last week by the Director of Agriculture, in reply to a motion moved by Mr. E. H. Wright (Hilt Valley) urging the immediate appointment of a committee to consider and report forthwith on measures necessary to preserve the industry.

During the course of his maiden speech in Council in introducing the motion, Mr. Wright pointed out the difficult times through which the maize farmers were passing, owing to low prices, heavy transport rates, etc. He emphasized, however, that the industry was still a determining economic factor in the wealth of the Colony and should be given a reasonable chance to recover.

A Matter of Urgency.

The Hon. E. H. Wright, the Acting Member for Hilt Valley in the Kenya Legislative Council, made his maiden speech on Wednesday, when he proposed the following motion—

That the Council, recognizing the urgent necessity for taking steps to preserve the maize industry of Kenya, and the immediate appointment of a special committee to consider and report forthwith on the measures necessary to ensure that industry...

Mr. Wright said that if it were possible to increase the maize crop in Kenya, it would be well worth the effort to do so. He pointed out that the maize crop in Kenya was worth about 100,000 tons, and that it was the main source of food for the people of the Colony, and would also be a valuable export commodity.

Striving to do more for the realm of Mr. Roger Gibb, the member for the constituency of the Board of Agriculture, has been the subject of a special investigation into the situation of the maize industry in Kenya.

Internal Rates. Mr. Harvey said unhesitatingly that if the maize industry were to be treated as a whole, as it should be, and the high rates charged for internal movement taken into consideration, it would be found that the industry played an important part in the economic and financial life of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours. At last 30 per cent of the total traffic handled at Kilindi, in 1931 is 20 per cent, so that if production were increased there must be serious repercussions on the port finance, the money being made in the internal movement.

Evidence Dismissed. Moscow, Tuesday. Today's morning session of the Court at the Moscow trial was opened by the speech of Thornton's Counsel, M. Brandt, who began by stating that Thornton had denied all the charges against him except that of obtaining confidential information from the Russian Government.

M. Brandt then took objection to the evidence of other accused persons. Thornton pointed out that "reckless" is not a new crime in Russia, and it was unnecessary, therefore, to assume that the Russian jury of certain cases would be prejudiced by the fact that the accused was a member of the Russian Government.

In conclusion, he asked the Court to acquit Thornton during the trial. Thornton's Counsel stated that the Court should acquit Thornton on all charges except that of obtaining confidential information from the Russian Government.

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NEW MINING CHARGES.

To Meet Expenses of Gold Fields.

A Kenya Bill.

Prospecting, Mineral and Concession Fees.

A Bill published "for general information with a view to introduction into the Legislative Council."

"The object of this Bill is to provide additional revenue in view of the additional expenditure that will be incurred in connection with the development of the mineral resources of the Colony."

Consent to operation by proclamation, the Ordinance shall apply to each area of the Colony as the Governor by proclamation may declare to be required for the purpose of this Ordinance."

Clause 9 says: "Notwithstanding anything contained in any Mining Ordinance, 1921, or any Ordinance amending the same, no holder of a prospecting right shall be entitled to prospect within a proclaimed area unless he has paid to the Commissioner of Mines...

Scale of Fees.

The next clause forbids the granting of an exclusive prospecting licence over land within a proclaimed area unless a fee, additional to the registration and conveyancing fee, has been paid, the scale being: for the first 92 square miles, 45 per centum; for the next 92 square miles, 42 per centum; for the next 200 square miles, 41 per centum; for the next 300 square miles, 41 per centum; for each additional mile in excess of 600 square miles, the 10 per centum. Where alluvial mining is allowed a holder of an exclusive prospecting licence, a fee may be demanded by the Commissioner of Mines not exceeding 500 per centum of the value of the licence. The Finance Minister states that any amendments thereto will apply to mining in a proclaimed area.

PETROL TO BE CHEAPER.

Reduction in Force Next Week.

A Cash Policy.

Kerosene Also to Cost Less.

From Wednesday next, April 26, an important reduction will be made in the wholesale and retail prices of kerosene and petrol throughout East Africa.

The decrease will be 3/ per eight gallons of kerosene (power and illuminating) and slightly below 2/ per eight gallons, petrol. These are the average reductions.

In Nairobi this is equal to a decrease as follows:- Petrol-about 20 cents per gallon Kerosene-7 cents per gallon. The following statement was issued to the "East African Standard" by the Oil Companies on Thursday afternoon:-

"It is the intention of the Oil Companies to sell petrol and kerosene for cash only as from the morning of the 26th instant."

"Prices will be reduced simultaneously and the public are warned that they will be expected by the dealers to pay cash for their supplies as from that date."

Abolishing Bad Deals. For some time the Oil Companies have been gradually reducing credit terms throughout the East African market but have found that despite a general average of 30 to 35 per cent cash basis gave a lead in the further restriction and improvement of credit conditions at the present times of depression have not encouraged expansion in the use of oil products.

It has therefore been decided to put the business on a cash basis. Dealers will be expected to pay cash for their petrol supplies and it will remain with them to decide whether they will make their customers to follow suit.

The reductions now reported are for cash only. The Oil Companies to place the value of an essential commodity of such basic value as a lead in the further restriction and improvement of credit conditions at the present times of depression have not encouraged expansion in the use of oil products.

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DROUGHT ANXIETY IN TRANS NZOIA.

Coffee Plantations Being Affected Seriously.

SCARCITY OF GRAZING.

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.] Kinnisai, April 17. Hot and dry weather still continues throughout the greater part of the Trans Nzoia. This is the most prolonged drought experienced here for a number of years. A few farmers in the South East of the district had withered early planted maize; planting in other parts has been a total failure and all further planting has been abandoned pending signs of rain.

In the year 1925 portions of the Trans Nzoia were drought-stricken till the first week in May. This year, however, the coffee plantations are being seriously affected. The loss to coffee growers has already assumed large proportions and many plantations will take at least a year to recover.

The severity of grazing is also very acute and oxen are required just every station and hand-feeding to pull them through. In the meantime news of the monsoon storms reaching the Coast are still anxiously awaited. It is now generally recognized that the commencement of the rainy season in the Trans Nzoia can be dated from the last week of the month of November at least.

It was reported that a plant of this capacity could be put into operation at a cost of £1,500. This would admit of enlarging in the future. The necessary buildings with an adequate supply of water could be ready in a few weeks.

A Manager. The committee considered some difficulty might be encountered in procuring an experienced manager to take charge of the factory. Communications with the Fruit and Vegetable Preservation Research Station, Camden, Gloucestershire, the information however, that the difficulty could be overcome by someone on leave in England from the district putting in a month at the Research Station.

The canning of fruit salads was emphasized as likely to be of considerable advantage to fruit growers. The fruits most suitable for this are amongst the easiest to grow in this part of the Colony while their sugar is a limited one in other parts of the world.

Members of the committee having expressed the opinion that success might reasonably be expected, the raising of capital was considered. Only about half the amount has been promised to date. On a suggestion by Mr. Major Dwyer, canvassing of the district was undertaken by a large and representative committee.

Each of these will approach their neighbours individually as a final endeavor to finance the scheme and get potential customers interested.

The committee received a hearty and well earned vote of thanks for the amount of time and pains spent in their business.

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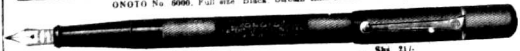

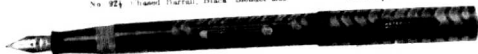
