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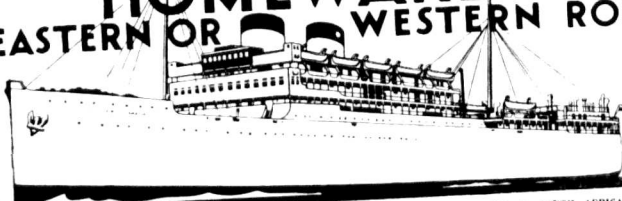

LARGE CURRENCY ISSUE AND REDUCTION OF DOLLAR GOLD CONTENT.

It is reported from Washington that an agreement has been reached between President Roosevelt and the Congress leaders under which legislation will be introduced empowering the President to issue currency and to reduce the gold content of the dollar.

The aim of American policy appears to be controlled inflation with prohibition of gold export except for a few special purposes.

Balanced Budget in Spite of Depression.

PURCHASING AND SAVING POWER MAINTAINED.

No Reduction of Income Tax.

BUT A PENNY PER PINT OFF BEER WITH IMPROVED QUALITY.

The British Budget for the year was introduced into the House of Commons on Tuesday by Mr. Neville Chamberlain, the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

The following were the outstanding changes in taxation announced by the Chancellor: Reduction in rate on beer, equivalent to one penny per pint, with an improvement in quality.

Reversion to half-yearly equal payments of income tax, but no reduction in rate.

Reduction in Company Tax. Increase in duty on heavy oils. Duty on imported matches and mechanical lighters to be increased.

Increase in taxation on heavy motor vehicles. The question of protection duties on artificial silks will be considered.

During the past year £29,000,000 had been paid to the United States on account of war debts...

The Debts Problem.

(Speaker and British Official Wireless Service.)

London, April 28. Mr. Neville Chamberlain, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, presented his second Budget to the House of Commons today. The House was crowded and ex-

DEBT PAYMENTS.

Large Sums to America Last Year.

The estimated revenue for the year was £708,700,000, and expenditure £692,000,000, thus leaving a surplus of £16,700,000. The estimated expenditure last year was £710,000,000 and revenue was £700,000,000, leaving a deficit of £10,000,000 which would be borne by Government.

But for the war debts payment of £900,000 to the United States, for which no provision had been made in this Budget, the surplus would have been £2,800,000.

Also £11,600,000 had been paid to the Banking Fund and the New Redemption Fund during the year, and approximately £11,000,000. Excluding the American debts there was a net surplus of about £11,000,000.

Britain's Debts.

Regarding war debts, the Chancellor said in the year 1927 the United States £51,000,000. Against this they would have to pay £12,000,000 and war debts £64,000,000.

SUGGESTED ALTERATION IN POLICE METHODS OF PROCEDURE.

One of the most interesting witnesses before the Justice Commission was Mr. Oswald Bentley, formerly an administrator in the Sudan and now a settler in Kenya. Mr. Bentley was prominently concerned with the famous Wagatu murder case as a result of his intervention in which four natives were found to be guilty of having been unjustly convicted.

Mr. Bentley criticised police methods of taking statements from natives in criminal cases and said that instead of dictating information by question and answer, natives should be allowed to make unbroken statements, since unintentional questions often suggested the answers that were required.

He considered that instead of natives being taken before a District Court they should come before a judicial panel composed of a Provincial Commissioner and two administrative officers, who, having a wider knowledge than the judges of native law, custom and mentality, would be better able to appreciate the facts.

AMERICA'S DECLINING SHARE OF KENYA AND UGANDA IMPORT TRAFFIC.

Compared with the year 1929 the total trade of Kenya and Uganda has decreased in value by nearly three and a half million pounds. This is one of the facts revealed by the 1932 Trade Report which has just been issued.

The Commissioner of Customs describes last year from the trading point of view as a period of "unsettling anxiety, large deferred."

Kenya and Uganda lived on a hand to mouth basis and it is the official view of the Commissioner that some degree recovery cannot be expected until the price of primary products is upon which the prosperity of the territories ultimately depends; again reach an economic level.

The Commissioner of Customs has issued a printed form annual trade report for Kenya and Uganda for 1932.

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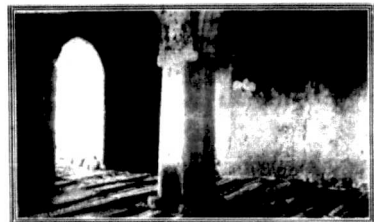
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TACTICS IN GOLF.

Contrasts in Playing Styles.
Lessons of the Easter Tournament.

YOUNG PLAYERS WHO WILL MAKE THEIR MARK.



A WEEK or two ago I wrote on the subject of contrasts in style, and pointed out how different play can achieve satisfactory results with their varying methods. I gave an example of three variations in style as forthcoming at the recent Easter tournament, and was an interested spectator at the event and I was struck by the vast difference in style. Some players looked awkward, as if they would never be able to get the ball away from the tee, while others took their strokes and immediately the impression was conveyed that the ball would go sailing down the centre almost out of sight.

Perhaps it would not be out of place to discuss some of the methods employed, and the styles of several at least of the players. First of all, take the case of W. G. Gurney, a polished and very fine golfer. He was trouble all right throughout the tournament with his tee shots. He could never get them away smoothly but the accuracy and precision of his strokes through the green, disconcertingly took the case from the tee. His short game was deadly in its accuracy. The golfers who were devoted to the length of the tee as a matter of fact, played his strokes hard, and he did not touch round the tee as a matter of fact. His partner Claude Wright was another who played as a short golfer. A frequent flyer, he kept well in the centre and a mark of the fact that he was like a stone in the short game is very true.

Long Hitters.
Three exceptional long hitters were in the tournament in Peter (Nairobi), England (Mombasa), and Clennell (Kisumu). The Muthiga man preferred positions of driving against Nairobi's fine couple. He hit tremendous balls off the tee at times but not always accurately. Fine had, however, in possession of an amazing ability to recover from trouble. When he appears well off the line he always impresses me as sure to be rebuked with one of his shots from the rough were masterly.

A third one who gets nowhere.

Hughes of Kisumu was a striking example of the golfer who lets his arms go through after the club has struck the ball, in a fine style and follows well through after striking.

Promising Material.
Among the promising players who took part in the tournament were C. C. Hadfield, of Mombasa, Paterson of the Nairobi club, A. B. Tannahill (Nairobi) and B. Dunlop of the Ballway. These four players, I feel sure, will make their mark in the game in Kenya. Mentoring them require plenty of competitive golf, being the best out of them. Experience is a great teacher and the more he get they get the better it will be for them. — S.T.A.N.

Kenya's heavy share in the joint business of the Kenya and Uganda Post Office Department is one of the features of the 1932 Report just issued.

A Cambridge Conference.

MODERN TYPE CARRIED BACK TO LOWER PLEISTOCENE AGE.

An important conference of scientists held at Cambridge subjected the evidence provided by Dr. L. S. B. Leakey to a serious archaeological work in East Africa to a series of expert committees who dissected the evidence very carefully and reported.

THE FINAL FOR THE F.A. CUP.

Everton Captures Trophy. Three Clear Goals. Manchester City Outplayed.

MATCH ATTENDED BY OVER 50,000 SPECTATORS.

The final for the Football Association Cup between Everton and Manchester City was played at Wembley Stadium on Saturday, and resulted in a victory for Everton by three goals to nil.

Seventy special trains arrived in London daily from the north of England crowded with ecclesiastics.

The weather was perfect, although the ground was slightly slippery.

Jovial Crowd.

The official record of the attendance was 53,590, and the receipts were £24,851. The crowd was jovial but orderly and the general impression was that the people were ready and anxious for excitement, which, however, was not forthcoming.

The game was not exciting and the players were slightly anxious, but were not worked up. Apart from the goals there was no thrills and both sides missed chances through misjudging the ball.

There were no actual scenes when the Duke of York presented the Cup to the winning team. There was committal singing and notes of carillon and bells.

The traffic was held up before the match, but it was well organized afterwards.

Numbered Players.

There was an innovation in the players wearing numbered jerseys, which is a great help to spectators and it is to be hoped that

this will be continued.

It was an easy match to referee, since there was no difficult points to decide and it was a clean game, though there was one foul on Brock, who when running for a clear goal was tripped by Cook and turned two metres to the loss of the work.

The game started with pretty dribbling by Manchester City, especially Busby and Toxland. Dean made a bad mistake when a centre from Stein and completely missed his kick when scoring an easy goal 37 minutes.

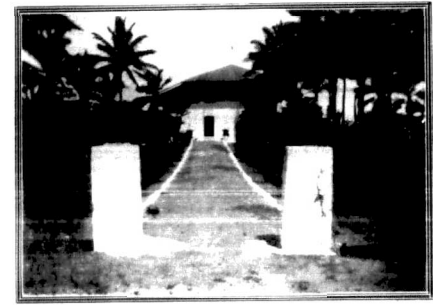
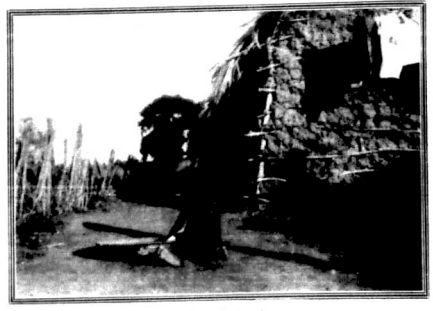

Brighter Outlook for Maize.

No Exports from U.S.A.

WHEAT PRICES ADVANCE STEADILY.

A very much brighter outlook for West African maize is indicated in the weekly market report, dated May 4 issued by the Kenya Farmers' Association (Kenya).

The following is the report: Maize.

It is too early to say what effect the abandonment of gold standard by America will have upon grain prices, but there is a very nervous feeling on the part of both buyers and sellers and trading is consequently limited.

The Argentine having been linked to the franc, Britain is still possible without a great deal of speculation. The price of wheat has advanced between Great Britain and France, having been an erratic price here hitherto and it has been what might be described as an exchange market rather than one governed by laws of supply and demand.

New crop Plate maize is valued at about 1/10d. to 1/12d. Bannana is worth about 15/6d. With the decline in the price of the dollar it was thought at one time that America would enjoy the maize market again, but this possibility was soon dispelled by the sharp rise in all commodity prices in the States and with corn now standing at the 40 cent per bushel level, there is no question of America exporting to Kenya.

In South Africa the total crop will only amount to about 10 1/2 million bags, so that South Africa can be relied on as a seller of maize for export for some considerable time. In Rhodesia the crop is not expected to be as large as the previous one; in fact, it will be below average.

As far as East African maize is concerned, there is a feeling throughout the world that one of the first things to be done, and to be done quickly, is the raising of commodity prices, so that the outlook for the future for white or from the growers' point of view, than it has been for a considerable time.

Wheat. The demand has brightened considerably and a consistent trade has been done in Australia wheat, substantial quantities having changed hands at steadily advancing prices. Manitoba and Plateau have also advanced sharply and are subject to somewhat violent fluctuations under the influence of foreign exchange.
