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**COFFEE BOARD'S POLICY EXPLAINED**

**Chairman's Address to London Chamber**

**PRODUCERS AND MERCHANTS**

**A Sincere Desire for Co-operation**

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.]

London, April 17.

(By Air Mail.)

At the commencement of the month's meeting of the East Africa Section of the London Chamber of Commerce the Chairman, Sir Humphrey Leggett, said he was privileged to welcome Mr. Wolke, the Chairman of the Kenya Coffee Board. It was a privilege to meet distinguished men from East Africa, heads of various trading and other interests. He would like them to know that the Section's object—although they were the London end of the matter and London merchants, also concerned, made by the membership—was to help not only the interests of export merchants from this country to East Africa but also to help the producing end. The Section had on long ago Mr. Wolke was in England they would have the pleasure of seeing him at the meetings. Sir Humphrey also welcomed Mr. Hales the late Director of Agriculture in Kenya who had attended before as a visitor, he was now there by invitation and he hoped he would come permanently. People in East Africa would value the help he could give. Sir Humphrey also gave a warm welcome to Mr. Schutte and he thanked him very much for his past spirit in helping East African interests in the way he had by lectures, photographs etc. Sir Humphrey hoped he would often attend the Section's meetings.

Mr. Page of Messrs. Sparrow was then invited by the Chairman to make the point about which he had written to the Section in regard to the Kenya Coffee Board. The Chairman thought it would be better for Mr. Page to speak first and then Mr. Wolke might like to answer him and any other members who asked questions on the matter. Sir Humphrey said that the Section had received a letter from Messrs. Sparrow claiming that the Board was having the effect of eliminating the present methods and setting itself up as a new system. They also said that the present system was more economical than the system of an Coffee Board.

**Criticisms of the Board**

Mr. Page pointed out that at the last meeting there was a discussion in connection with the 'Cachere' (Civics) Growers' Association, and Mr. Cuddihoe complained that they were not getting shipments and were doing all the profit through an Agent to the detriment of the farmers and merchant etc. In connection with that the Section asked Mr. Bull to make a statement of the policy of the Coffee Board and he made a statement which was well received, mainly that the old London marketing organisation should function unhindered. He also made use of the words 'Exporting in bulk.' Mr. Page said he wrote to Mr. Bull and asked him exactly what he meant and how had would affect those who were importing coffee, and their own property but coffee on which they had made an advance and were interested in and the loss of it home. Mr. Page thought that an answer from Mr. Bull which said that Mr. Page's understanding of the Board had not intended to remove would the imposition of any restriction on regular price or date of export. They appreciated the importance of the present system of selling coffee through brokers in the marketing. Some nations had needed that such method of selling should be fostered and encouraged. The Board was of the opinion that the present method whereby the individual planters shipped their coffee to export agents and received finance from such agents was not in the best interests of the industry as a whole. It created an internal competition among planters to the detriment of the industry generally and a free and open market with competition among the buyers to sell the crop. His final point would continue to be made under the present method, namely such coffee could be sold together if necessary to suit the buyers' requirements. He added that the proposals were tentative and nothing would be done unless they were well received as the Chairman had had an opportunity of discussing the matter with the fresh interests in England and reporting to the Board on his return in May. Mr. Page thought the meeting was that it seemed the Board's intention to shut the London merchants out of the trade altogether.

Continuing Mr. Page said that the various interests here had been assured that nothing would be done to interfere with the present state of things and that the activities of the Board would be confined locally to improving the crop and doing everything they could to foster things out there and nothing would be done to interfere with the people handling the crop over here. That had been repeated several times and was clear that Mr. Bull believed. It seemed to Mr. Page, however, from Mr. Bull's letter quite a different policy was contemplated and he thought it well to draw the attention of the Section to it especially as they had the privilege of having Mr. Wolke with them who might be able to clear matters up.

**Clear Co-operation Desired**

Mr. Wolke warmly thanked the Chairman for the welcome given him. He would like to accept the Section that the producer in Kenya was at the present time very much alive to the need for the closest possible co-operation between the producer and the trade interests who disposed of his produce.

A few months ago he submitted in broad outline, certain suggestions to the Coffee Trade in London. He was in London to deal completely upon minded with the object of obtaining 'over his Board and for the producer in East Africa a clearer view as to the proposals for his Board for what they believed the better organization for the marketing of crop in London.

**One Economic Unit**

Some months ago they put forward in broad outline certain suggestions to the London Coffee Trade which he still believed were believed would be an assistance both to the trader and producer. The basis of these suggestions was that the coffee crop of Kenya should be handled as one economic unit, in order that every buyer, importer and dealer would have the fullest possible opportunity of supplying requirements and would not have to draw upon the whole crop and would be assured of continuity of supply for so long as he was able to offer and pay competitive price.

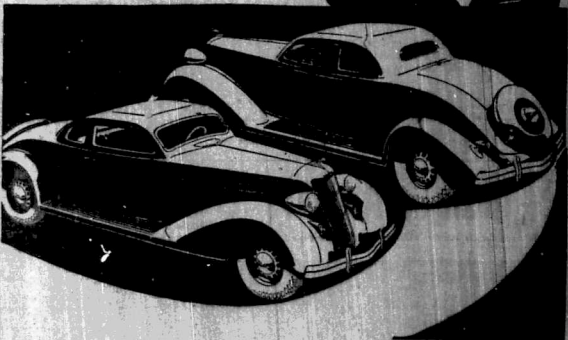
At the first step towards this objective they suggested that their coffee should be handled by one Central Agency and have the same facilities that the Board had never been contemplated either by the Board in Kenya or the representative in London that they should form a central agency or that London representatives should handle the sale or take any part in the handling of the crop. It never had been contemplated and in his opinion never would. They had recognised the fact that the present method of marketing in Kenya had to a large extent been responsible for the development of their industry and they suggested that the firm now operating in Kenya should in some way combine in order to handle the crop as one unit. It had been a 'little' defect and they had been a 'little' defect and they were represented that it was only by some such method whereby they could obtain best advice as to the best means of disposing of their crop. It had further been their assertion that this economy in handling could be obtained by treatment of the crop as one unit.

Referring to Mr. Page's remarks in regard to 'Exporting in bulk' he thought there had been a certain confusion as to what the actual intention of that might be by 'Exporting in bulk' he thought they would be discussing that point.

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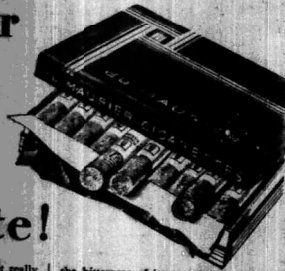

# Steady Fall in Railway Passenger Traffic

## 700,000 FEWER TRAVELLERS THAN FIVE YEARS AGO

### Branch Lines

General Manager's Tribute to Their Development Importance

The General Manager of Railways recognises in his annual report from which several excerpts appear below the importance to the country of existing branch lines. Since 1927, just under a million tons of traffic have passed over these lines. The proportion of branch line tonnage to main line tonnage last year was 14 per cent.

The number of passengers using the Railway has shown a steady decline in the last five years. The total of all classes in 1934 was 454,138, compared with 1,108,106 in 1930.

The engineering and operating figures of the Railway consequent upon concentration on supervision and improved methods of repair and maintenance are reported to be very satisfactory.

### Satisfactory Operating Record

An interesting statement by Sir Malcolm Watson, General Manager of Railways, is contained in his annual report. He states that the railway has worked well in the last five years. The total tonnage carried in 1934 was 1,108,106 tons, compared with 1,108,106 tons in 1930. The number of passengers carried in 1934 was 454,138, compared with 1,108,106 in 1930.

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### Empty Wagon

One of the figures which give the general manager's satisfaction is the reduction in the number of empty wagons. In 1934, the number of empty wagons was 10,000, compared with 15,000 in 1930. This represents a saving of 33 per cent.

### Training the Youth

In a note on the training of staff it is remarked that this has achieved the most satisfactory results during the year. In 1934, 10,000 young men were trained in railway work, compared with 15,000 in 1930.

# ANTI-MALARIA EXPERT IN NAIROBI

## Greatest Living Authority on Subject

SIR MALCOLM WATSON

Sir Malcolm Watson, Kt., M.D., F.R.S., Director of the Department of Tropical Hygiene of the Royal Victoria Hospital, is visiting Nairobi on Sunday evening from London. During the past few weeks he has been investigating the malarial virus carried on the mosquito which is common in the lowlands of the Nairobi District.

Sir Malcolm is regarded as the greatest living authority on malaria and was knighted 11 years ago for his services in this connection. He has been engaged in an original research for nearly 30 years, his first work being done in the tropics of the principal towns of the Federated Malay States. Some years later his activities were extended to the rural areas of Malaya.

From that time onwards his research has been concentrated on malaria and its prevention. He has written extensively on malaria, and his work has been the basis of the malarial measures adopted in this country.

His visit to Nairobi is in connection with the malarial measures being taken in this city. He will be staying at the Nairobi Hotel, and will be giving lectures on malaria to the members of the Nairobi Club.

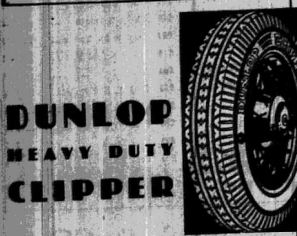

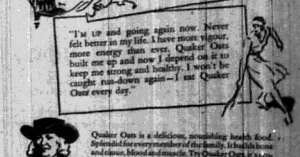

Years I have been associated with him in railway service in East Africa. The best wishes of the Administration go with him to his well earned retirement.

RESULTS OF ECONOMY

Reading with economy, the General Manager says that the same careful watch over expenditure was maintained last year as in 1929 and the working cost of the Railway, including depreciation, has, for the second year running, been kept below one million pounds. Prior to 1929, the highest this was achieved was in 1924 when it stood at the million, but since that date the mileage operated has increased by 75 per cent. while the ton mileage, representing the work done, has risen more than doubled. In 1929 the Railway earnings amounted to £2,316,000, slightly more than in 1928, but working expenditure last year was £229,400 less than in 1928. In 1930 railway earnings were £2,220,000, less than 1929, but the latter year working expenditure was £440,000 less than in 1929. These figures, he adds, clearly show that an equivalent result has been obtained at a very much lower cost than formerly and this fact accounts in full for the surplus in 1929 and 1930. The position is further illustrated by the fact that the ratio of the operating ratio and by the unit cost figures. REINDEER HERD'S LONG TREK

Five Years Across "Roof of World"

TRAVELER'S SERVICE

Ottawa, Canada (by wire)—A herd of nearly five years across the "roof of the world" from Alaska, north of the Rocky Mountains, across the great delta of the Yukon River, a herd of 150 reindeer have finally been delivered to the Canadian Government.

They were purchased from Alaska in 1925 and have since been driven over 1,000 miles of the most difficult country in the world within the Arctic Circle, in which the temperature is 60 degrees below zero.

Word received here from the Far North indicates that despite all the hardships, most of the herd has been successfully brought to the destination on the edge of the Arctic prairie.

Reason for Experiment

The reason for this vast experiment in the movement of domesticated reindeer is a most interesting one. The Canadian Government realized some time ago that the reindeer, which was once an Eskimo territory, supplying him with modern weapons and modern clothing, was a valuable asset. It is made it necessary to bring new resources to the East African country. In Alaska the original herd numbered 1,200 reindeer imported from Siberia in 1901-02. The herd has since numbered about 700,000, of which the native population counts more than two-thirds.

If the experiment succeeds in supplying the same material in northern Canada, it will not be long before the Canadian Eskimo herds of food and raw material for clothing and bedding—and the aspects of periodic famines will have passed.

**KENYA.**  
His Excellency the Acting Governor of Kenya, Mr. A. de V. Wade, O.B.E.:

On the twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Accession of King George VI, the people of Kenya of whatever race and whatever creed unite in offering to Almighty God their heartfelt thanks for the blessings of His Majesty's reign and their humble prayers that he, together with Her Gracious Majesty Queen Mary, may be spared to watch and protect the interests of his subjects.

**UGANDA.**  
His Excellency the Governor of Uganda, Sir Bernard Bourdillon, K.C.M.G., K.B.E.:

British protection during the twenty-five years of His Majesty's reign has effected remarkable changes in the political and social life and outlook of Uganda's indigenous races—in fact it may be questioned whether, as a part of the Empire, the changes effected during this period have been so fundamental and significant.

Profranchise Government was fortunate in having to deal from the outset with a native population, a large section of whom were organized by tradition into tribes each owing loyalty and allegiance to its hereditary paramount chief. British policy from the earliest days of administration has been directed, on the one hand, to maintaining and strengthening tribal loyalty and allegiance to a common head at the foundation stone for a more enlightened political and social organization and, on the other hand, to extending by analogy to the tribes which previously possessed no paramount chiefs a similar sense of tribal unity and loyalty. In this and the concept of a wider loyalty to the Emperor and to His Gracious Sovereign has taken root not only and patiently, and to-day it can be truly said that the more advanced tribes of the Protectorate and even the progressive elements of the more primitive tribes have a clear appreciation of the benefits of His Majesty's rule and are inspired with feelings of personal loyalty to His Majesty the King-Emperor. It is thus my happy privilege to speak not only for Uganda's non-African population but also for the African population when pointing in an expression of loyalty and devotion to His Majesty the King and Queen from the East African Dependencies. We look back on 25 years' achievement with thankfulness and are inspired with a clear consciousness of how much yet remains to be done, and we pray for many years of prosperous reign under His Majesty's rule in which we may continue the task of advancing Uganda further up the scale of progress and civilization.

His Excellency the Governor of Tanganyika, Sir Harold MacMichael, K.C.M.G., D.S.O.:

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Bonfire Sites Ready

PREVIOUSLY ARRIVED IN London, May 1. The King has approved of the final military arrangements for Jubilee Day whereby 14,000 men of the Navy, Army and Air Force will line the streets for the Royal procession and 12,000 police will also be on duty in Central London. The Metropolitan and City Police forces are being augmented by contingents from Birmingham and the Home Counties.

If the weather is wet on Monday, the procession will be held in the streets in which the King and his family will travel.

The arrangements for the double lighting of flags buildings are now complete and the sites for 1,750 bonfires throughout the country have been selected. The Royal address to be presented to His Majesty by members of the London-to-night having been carried by relays of runners by day and night from John O'Grady, Londonderry, Penzance, North and Lewis, as many as 2,100 flags participated and entered the total distance of 2,300 miles.

A Jubilee Forest in the planning of a forest in the High of Nazareth in Palestine to be known as "King George V. Jubilee Forest" as a token of British love and devotion and loyalty, and commemoration of the Silver Jubilee.

Land of 15,000 acres will be planted, and the carrying out of the scheme will involve an expenditure of approximately £100,000. The new forest will be the most outstanding gift hitherto made to the nation by the profession of the Holy Land.

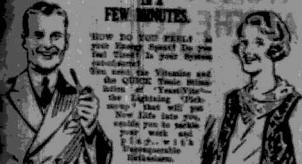

Light or dark buff, however, only 18 inches are filled with concrete, there is an additional 18 inches incorporated in the concrete dealing with public walkways.

The Law Library

Probably the most interesting feature in the Law Library, occupies an area some 1,000 square feet. It is 20 feet wide and 74 feet long and at the end is a lecture hall.

There are four rows of bookshelves in the library, occupying the entire length of the building. The books are arranged in alphabetical order.

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of the outer super-structure is composed of synthetic buff sandstone. In this instance also the use of a similar concrete mixture covered with half an inch of waterproof cement rendering and an outer coating of quarter inch of tiled cement (cream-tint) was used. It was found that this was a suitable material for the steps and the podium was accordingly made by the contractor (Mr. G. H. Brown), who discovered that the use of a half-inch of buff sandstone was not sufficient for the work. Library benches were numbered and their position preserved, since 2,000 volumes being held. Both the exterior and interior enrichment and decorative work made locally from designs by Messrs. Atkinson of London. The concrete and plaster work of the Royal Arms, walling, etc., is in the Gallery by the principal contractor, Mr. G. H. Brown. The architect was surprised that this would not be done in Kenya, but the result justified the prophetic prediction to be a strongly far local executive and craftsmanship. The stone relief of the Royal Arms over each main entrance portion, for instance, was in fact in the region of 10,000 lbs. For the purpose of casting the concrete, a special mould had to be made. In the case of the fibrous plaster ceiling, etc., the contractor of Paris casts were taken and moulds made from these casts. The carrying out of this work, as well as the carrying of the acoustic plaster, was the special training of local architects.

In the making of the monumental limestone pillars, another new process was evolved, involving the moulding of the whole concrete pillar with a central form pin at either end. These pins were used as "centres" for the finishing work. A tiled cement had been applied to enable true and uniform castings to be obtained by a turn-jap process.

Acoustically Perfect The building is unique in Kenya in the design and attainment of its peculiar acoustic properties. It is absolutely free from any position of the walls of the various Courts a normally modulated voice, speaking in conversational tones, is audible everywhere in that particular Court. This is the result of two factors: expert design and

Fire Fighting

Precautions against the spread of fire are ample. Three fire hydrants (with hoses) are situated in the areas at the north-west, north-east and south-east corners of the quadrangle, respectively, in close juxtaposition to the Courts. At the head of all stairways (on each floor) further hoseings (in glass cases) are installed and the sections of hose on each floor join with those below and above. It is thus possible to take three lines of hose from any one stair joint with these in addition to this there are four chemical fire extinguishers to each floor (situated in the corridors) as well as sand buckets and buckets for water. Fire-fighting boxes, buckets and all leaders to the hydrants in the areas are painted fire-engine red. The hoisting is by fire-engine reel. The hoisting is by fire-engine reel. The East African Power and Lighting Company carried out the lighting installation. In a building presenting so many different architectural features, from the quiet dignity of the Courts and the Law Library, and the privacy of Judge's Chambers, to the hurried bustle of public corridors, the problem of artistically harmonious fittings was not easy of solution. The whole of the installation, the layout of switches and the careful planning of light provision reflects great credit to the Kenya Company. The electric wiring system constitutes a new departure for the Colony. The conductors were fitted during the course of construction, but the wiring itself was carried out after the super-structure had been completed. Alongside each corridor a hand of black marble-wood, similar to the skirting which it adorns, is laid down to protect the conductors. As convenient intervals removable panels give access to the wiring, which can be inspected, repaired, or replaced as required, while a "rod-valve" under the roof gives access to leads, etc. The leads to the various floors are carried within the ligatures and pavilions. The

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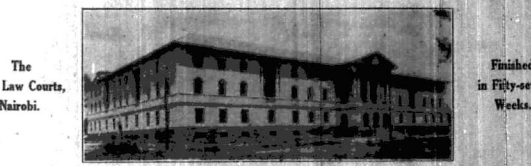
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the internal corridor walls. Up-keep and service are thus considerably facilitated. In similar fashion the wires for telephones and electric bells are carried inside, the rooms behind the electric boards and removable panels give access to the junction boxes and inter-connections. The telephone system, incidentally, is an automatic one whereby any office dial number either within the building, or an outside subscriber, direct, incoming calls, however, have to be distributed by the operator in the exchange room on the ground floor.

During the course of the construction of the superstructure an scaffolding system was used by the contractor, thus affording a saving of some thousands of pounds starting. Very careful handling of the synthetic stones was necessary and in order to prevent damage, special travelling gantry cranes were designed by Mr. G. H. Jones and constructed in Scotland, especially for the work there was of Dismantling rail track were laid on the outside of the wall site. The cranes, two in number, were each capable of taking a load of 2½ tons and were some 50 feet in height. The cranes were constructed of steel girders, suitably reinforced and each weighed some twenty tons. It is probable that these cranes, which with their special features in operation constitute a innovation in building practice, may be used extensively on large work in future, not only in Kenya but overseas.

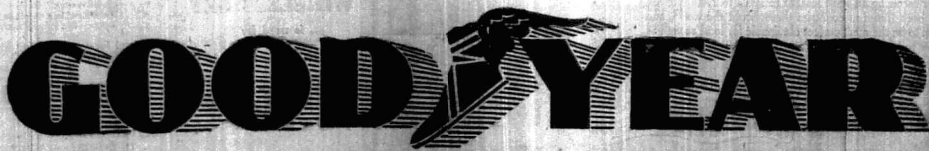

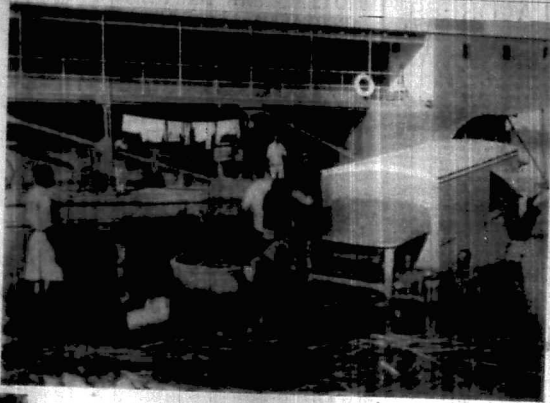

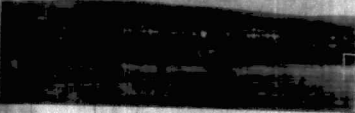
