GOVERNMENT'S REPLY TO GERMAN REARMAMENT

Premier's Undertaking STEPS ALREADY TAKEN TO ACCELERATE BRITISH AIR FORCE EXPANSION

The eagerly awaited debate on foreign affairs took place in the House of Commons on Thursday evening when the Prime Minister declared that Germany's rearmament plans had profoundly disturbed the whole of Europe.

Mr. Ramsay MacDonald made it clear that Britain would not accept a position of inferiority in the air to Germany and that already steps had been taken to accelerate the expansion of the British Air Force.

The Leader of the Opposition said no-one could palliate Germany's action in connection with rearmament. He said that Britain was determined to stand by its word and that it was imperative required to meet the German challenge.

Serious Effect of U.S.A. Silver Policy

At the annual meeting of Imperial Chemical Industries yesterday, Sir Harry McGowan, the chairman, referred to the situation in China, where, owing to the devaluation of silver policy, prices were falling badly, affecting business, and in particular causing increasing difficulty financial conditions. (3) Whether a certain mortgage (particulars of the Evans mortgage are then quoted) as security for a loan of £5,000, was a charge on the same per cent per annum as the other fund was in fact appropriated by the plaintiff (shortly paid for a time to the said Charles Sydney Pitt, in the event that he had happened not entitled to be paid a sum of £5,000 out of the residuary estate.)

Mr. G. M. Burgess, of Messrs. Baines and Kaplan is appearing for the plaintiff and Mr. H. E. Schwartz, of Messrs. Stanley, Schwartz and Barrett, for the defendant. Charles Sydney Pitt and Mrs. Mary Matthews; and Mr. H. Sheldrick, of Messrs. Hamilton, Harrison and Mathews, for the two infant defendants, instructed by Mr. Gillian Bernard Matthews. Mr. Schwartz informed the court that he had been instructed by Mrs. Matthews to say that she did not object to her husband's will as Charles Sydney Pitt of the £5,000.

Conna's Arguments Mr. Schwartz, in his argument, which was concluded on Thursday, the 14th inst., contended that the construction of the will, that trustees were to pay to Charles Sydney Pitt the sum of £5,000, or to transfer to him the investments from which he had been benefited, was in fact a gift to him, and that they were therefore prohibited from appropriating any investments towards the discharge of the legacy until the time arrived.

He further argued that, being a contingent legacy, and moreover (in view of the direction of the trustees alleged) the legatee not being entitled to have the court and ask for appropriation, the trustee could not owe any power to appropriate. Mr. Burgess was taken from Mr. Kaplan (one of the trustees) on the question of what had been the intention of the trustee; and on the basis of this evidence and on the correspondence and estate accounts, Mr. Schwartz argued that there had never in fact been any appropriation by the trustee, even if such had been authorized by the will.

As to question (4), it was agreed by counsel for all parties that, if a valid appropriation had been made, any loss due to depreciation of the investment appropriated must fall upon Charles Sydney Pitt.

Mr. Sheldrick argued that in view of the direction for immediate investment, coupled with the power to postpone the date of realization of securities, there was an implied direction to appropriate (in the event of the trustee exercising their power to postpone sale); and that this was not affected by the subsequent writing of the disposition, which did not operate to confer any such direction on the trustee as Mr. Schwartz alleged, but merely related to the capital or investments appropriated.

It was further argued by Mr. Sheldrick that, under the terms of the will and particularly in view of the direction to pay interest-free in respect of any gift over in consequence of the same fund, this sum of £5,000 was a settled fund. (Continued in previous column.)

Queen's Surprise Drive

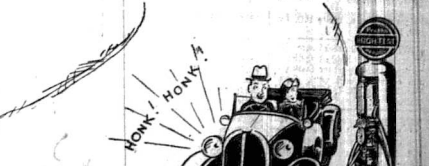

# Looking After the Weather

### Vital East African Service

#### Year's Work

#### GROWING IMPORTANCE TO AIR TRANSPORT

Unless the Conference of East African Governors reminds a decision taken last year, when it was resolved that the Government concerned could not be committed to contributions to the British East African Meteorological Service after the present five-year period had expired, the activities of the Service will be severely handicapped.

This statement is made by the Director of the Service, Mr. A. Walter, in his annual report for 1938. Recalling the Government Conference held in April, 1934, he states that the future of the Service was considered, and it was decided that as the Conference was not prepared to guarantee contributions to the Service for longer than the present five-year period it could not be placed on permanent basis.

While this inability on the part of the East African Governments to recognize the permanent status of the Service is unfortunate in many ways, primarily because it leads to considerable difficulty in regard to staffing, states Mr. Walter, "it is evident that full recognition as a permanent and official establishment in each of the territories will be granted here long as its activities are making them more self-reliant in meteorological administration and research work at present being carried out.

#### Necessary for Air Services

"Civil aviation is increasing very rapidly and this necessitates an efficient service of meteorological information so that whether the permanence of the department is recognized by the Governments or not, it must continue to function so long as the air services are maintained. Although the progress made during the five years which have elapsed since the inauguration of the Service has been considerable it is not possible, with the present facilities at our disposal, adequately to meet the growing demand for information.

"Not only has the development of civil aviation on East and Central Africa been phenomenal, and the demand for meteorological information consequent on this development immense, but there has been a general weakening throughout all sections of the continent to the fact that most of the problems which present themselves for solution in tropical Africa are affected by climatic conditions and demand accurate and detailed records of meteorological factors.

"The rapid growth of the Service and the mass of data now accumulating in the Central Office has made it difficult to maintain the records in such a manner as to permit a ready answer to the various queries which have been presented in for advice, and much time is spent in carrying out tabulations and computations in advance of the routine work to comply with urgent demands for information.

#### Considerable Progress

"The progress made by the Service during the year under review has been considerable. It is deemed, brought to a close, the work of substituting African and Native labour for the more experienced and trained staff in order to attempt to keep the cost of the Service within the limits of the votes granted.

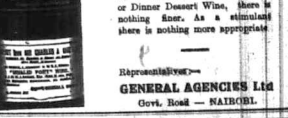

**KNEW 54 LANGUAGES**

And Preferred Cockney English

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT]

London, April 25.

(By air mail)

An Englishman who knew 54 languages but had been only once out of his country in the 77 years of his lifetime, has just died in London. He was Father William Kent, a London Catholic priest who for nearly 54 years had been attached to the Church of St. Mary of the Angels, Westminster Road, Bowmaker. He was a Londoner by birth, and the only foreign country he ever visited was Belgium, 787 men to-day could equal his record of languages, most of which he spoke fluently.

An early passion for comparative philology—the science of the human language in all its branches—led Father Kent to study Biblical and Talmudic origins, and from them he built up his enormous repository of dead and living tongues. He was always willing to help the thousands of people from famous scientists and antiquarians to induce court officials, who sought his aid in unravelling language problems. At the age of 75 he remarked: "There are thousands of languages, and I know only 54 of them."

Father Kent was fond of maintaining that Cockney English was often better than the more educated type, saying that in every language in the world except English the word sound "ai" was pronounced "ai."

**SUIT ARISING FROM A WILL**

Question of Contingent Legacy

JUDGMENT RESERVED

Further argument in the case concerning the will of the late Major Bernard Pitt, who died on June 24, 1922, was heard before His Honour Mr. Justice Webb in the Supreme Court on Friday morning.

The facts of the case had been explained at that time by Mr. G. M. Burgess, of Messrs. Ralston and Kaplan, who explained that, in view of the considerable legal difficulties involved, he had advised the executors to apply to the court by these proceedings before making the payment of £5,000 for which Charles Sydney Pitt, the legatee, had now asked.

Following him Mr. H. H. Schwartz, of Messrs. Stanley Schwartz and Barret, had completed his address on behalf of Charles Sydney Pitt, and Mr. H. Stide, of Messrs. Hamilton, Harris and Mathew, had announced his address on behalf of the two infant defendants, who are residuary legatees.

At the resumed hearing on Friday Mr. Stide summarized his previous arguments on the legal aspects of the case and then dealt with the question as to whether or not, assuming a direction or power to appropriate, there had been an appropriation in fact.

He argued that appropriation is a question of fact and not one of intention; and that Mr. Kaplan's evidence, so far as it was evidence of his intention at the time, was consequently irrelevant. He further argued that, neither under the terms of the will nor otherwise, could the income of an investment be appropriated without a simultaneous appropriation of the investment as a whole.

Mr. Kaplan had admitted the appropriation of the income and he had also made certain other admissions as to what would have been the position in the event of a sum of £5,000 being realized from the estate and re-invested, and the income from that investment being paid to the legatee.

Mr. Schwartz, interposing, stated that he did not accept that Mr. Kaplan had made any such admission.

the testator's death. Mr. Stide contended, as was the only way in which the executors, having exercised their power to postpone realization of the trust, could give effect to the terms of the instrument, and they had in fact done everything that was necessary to carry out the trust, for the purpose of effecting and realising the appropriation of the sum in question.

Question of Consent

How could a declaration by one of the executors made eight years before the testator's death at that time be accepted as a complete acquiescence in that time? Mr. Stide then dealt with the question of whether assuming a power of appropriation to vest the consent of both legatees was necessary for its valid exercise. It was not admitted that an assent was required in this case as the legacy was a settled legacy and, that being so, the only consent that could be required was that of the trustee of the settled legacy.

Mr. Stide submitted that even if the consent of Charles Sydney Pitt was required, such consent had been given by his guardian who he was still under age, and after attaining his majority he had continued to accept the income from this particular investment and had afterwards clearly acquiesced in the appropriation of the income.

Mr. Schwartz replied briefly to the effect that no reference of the disposition could not be construed as giving the executor the discretion suggested by him in his opening address.

Apart from that this was a contingent legacy, and no appropriation could be made until the contingency arose. It was not an appropriation could be valid without the consent of Charles Sydney Pitt, which had not been obtained.

Mr. Burgess, in evidence as to the intention of the executors at the material time must be accepted as the only criterion as to whether there had ever been an appropriation or not.

Mr. Burgess then addressed the court on the question as to whether the costs of those proceedings should be borne by the legatee on the one hand or by the residuary estate on the other hand submitted.

**ABYSSINIA'S TRADE OFFER TO CANADA**

Help Needed to Develop the Country

GOLD RESERVATION

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT]

London, April 24.

Empress Haile Selassie of Abyssinia, with a view to developing his country's natural resources has invited two Canadian experts—Professor Mercet, of the University of Toronto, and Mr. James H. Mason, a Toronto metallurgical engineer—to negotiate a trade agreement with the Ethiopian Government (which the Montreal Correspondent of the "Daily Mail").

On receiving the invitation Mr. Mason conferred with Mr. E. H. Hudson (K.C.), Minister for Trade and Commerce, who told him that the Canadian Government was prepared to cooperate in furthering commercial intercourse with Abyssinia.

Mr. Mason also saw Mr. I. A. Macdonald, Premier of Quebec, to secure the help of Quebec Canadian businessmen, explaining that French is widely spoken by the

Rich Province.

The Emperor has expressed a wish that the Dominion Government should establish a Canadian House at Addis Ababa, as a centre for Canadian activities.

Engineering opportunities offered in addition to mining, gold, coal, and other minerals are the building of bridges, highways, water-works, irrigation works, and commercial buildings and the erection of telephone lines and telegraph lines.

It is stated that Canada could sell to Ethiopia manufactured goods and machinery, coffee, spices, tropical fruits, skins, wax, gums, plumes, and cotton.

Professor Mercet, who is at present in Austria, and Mr. Mason will meet soon in London for a conference. Professor Mercet will then go on to Addis Ababa.

Malaria Expert's Talk on His Work

DISEASE WHICH CAN BE CONTROLLED

Encouraging Examples

HINT TO GENERAL MANAGER OF RAILWAYS AND DIRECTOR OF PUBLIC WORKS

"Malaria is a disease which can be controlled if you go the right way about it."

This was an encouraging phrase from an address delivered in Nairobi on Friday by one of the greatest authorities in the world—Sir Malcolm Watson, LL.D., M.D., C.M., D.P.H., F.R.F.P.S., Director of the Ross Institute of Tropical Hygiene.

In a reference to Kenya conditions he stated that the General Manager of Railways and the Director of Public Works were partly responsible for the incidence of malaria and suggested they should pay attention to the filling in of borrow pits.

Swamps Not Necessarily Bad

"My first practical acquaintance was in the year 1901 when I went to Malaya," said Sir Malcolm. "I found myself in a town where the death rate for the year was 100 per cent."

In Malaya

Sir Malcolm made clear the success of the anti-malaria work in Malaya by stating that in 1901, a newly opened port, Port Swettenham was ordered to be closed, two and a half months before it had opened through malaria.

Man-Made Malaria

"So much of malaria is man-made," went on Sir Malcolm. "Malaria has now become a pest of the world, and the population 6,000 with 600,000 more in the air."

A Valuable Pamphlet

Sir Malcolm then went on to discuss the pamphlet on the prevention of malaria by Dr. A. R. Paterson, Director of Medical Services.

In Africa

The next example Sir Malcolm gave was in Africa. He was appointed by a Government mining company in 1902, who said they were having a bad time on the Murrumbidgee river.

Perhaps in no part of the Empire was Jubilee Day celebrated with greater zest than throughout East Africa.

The scenes in the Capital of Kenya were typical. There was a great holiday spirit abroad and with fine weather Nairobi has never had a hotter day in its short history. Bats fell heavily at Mombasa and in Kampala but had no appreciable effect on the jubilee spirit of the two principal cities.

Everywhere programmes were carried out according to plan. In Nairobi the ceremonials and functions were remarkable for their adherence to a pre-arranged time-table and for the noteworthy precision and orderliness which marked the various acts in the various events. As usual the traffic arrangements were carried out by the Police without a hitch.

### Thousands Hear King's Speech

Kenya's capital, in common with the remainder of the Empire, celebrated the King's Jubilee with an enthusiasm and loyalty that was unquestioned of the highest. There was deep regard in which His Majesty is held in every portion of the widespread dominions.

The Nairobi celebrations commenced with an Invitational and a service of prayer, which was followed by the Troping of the Colour, in the presence of the Governor, Mr. A. de V. Wade, presenting some of the members of the Royal Salute.

The parade ground, to the east and west of the cathedral, had been specially prepared. In front of the building were stands for the members of the public, and the cathedral was situated on the right of the parade ground.

The troops arrived in formation "at six" and the parade commenced. The King's Salute was given by the band, and the troops then proceeded to the parade ground.

The final march-past was carried out to the notes of a tune which the men of the regiment who fought the Battle of Mons.

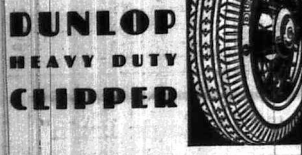

Opening of Kenya's New Law Courts

A BUILDING WORTHY OF ITS PURPOSE

\$120,000 Plan Completed

SIMPLE AND DIGNIFIED CEREMONY CARRIED OUT YESTERDAY

The magnificent new Law Courts of Kenya built at a cost of £120,000 were formally opened yesterday by His Excellency the Acting Governor, Mr. A. de V. Wade, G.B.E., before a large gathering of all races in the Colony.

"Honourable," he said, "the paramount importance of the orderly and dignified administration of our laws will be properly emphasized and nobly expressed in a building worthy of the purpose for which it was designed and a credit to all responsible for its construction."

Commemoration Trees

Yesterday, the opening ceremony of the new Law Courts was performed by His Excellency the Acting Governor, Mr. A. de V. Wade, G.B.E. In the presence of the Judiciary, heads of departments, civic officials, (including His Worship the Mayor) and a large gathering of the general public...

At 10.35 a.m. promptly to take table, His Honour the Chief Justice, Sir Joseph Sheridan, accompanied by Resident Magistrate, the Attorney-General and other members of the Bench of the Supreme Court, His Worship the Mayor, the Acting Colonial Secretary, the Director of Public Works, and others and awaited the arrival of His Excellency at the foot of the steps leading to the main entrance porch.

His Excellency, the Acting Governor, arrived at 10.40 a.m. and, after the Royal Salute had been rendered the Guard of Honour presentation were then made to him by the Chief Justice, of members of the judiciary, the architect, Builder and others connected with the construction of the building, etc.

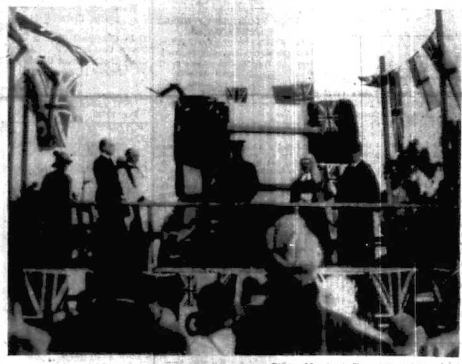

OFFENDING BANNER TORN IN SURREY

[REUTERS' AGENCY.]

London, May 6. A deplorable piece of Communist propaganda was erected in Fleet Street just outside Cannon during the Royal Procession to St. Paul's. A banner erected across the road, bearing the inscription "Long may They Reign" suddenly changed its character. Their Majesties were passing. It is later reported that ambulance men dealt in all with seven thousand cases of collapse during the Royal procession.
