Abyssinia's Plans For War
MOBILISATION OF WOMEN AND SLAVES

Italian Press Allegations
GERMANY SAID TO BE SUPPLYING MYSTERIOUS CHEMICALS

An authoritative Italian newspaper describes the intensive warlike preparations which, it says, are being made in Abyssinia.

Troops are being concentrated on the Somaliland and Eritrea frontiers and it is stated that women and slaves have been mobilised.

The allegation is made that Germany is supplying Abyssinia with large quantities of war material.

Meanwhile the British and French Governments are in consultation with a view to hastening the establishment of the Italo-Abyssinian Conciliation Commission.

Anglo-French Peace Efforts

[THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.]
 Rome, May 11.—The Ethiopian military operations are described in today's "Giornale d'Italia," which states that troops are concentrated on the frontiers facing the Italian Somaliland and Eritrea frontiers and that these forces are being rapidly increased by a twenty-day mobilisation.

It is stated that women and slaves are among those mobilised and that rifles and ammunition have already been distributed and the routes for concentration points issued.

The construction of landing grounds for aircraft, near the Assiaba frontier, is being pushed forward and new wireless stations and telegraph communications are being installed.

Germany's Aid?

The "Giornale d'Italia" also states that Germany has furnished large numbers of rifles, machine guns, anti-aircraft guns, aeroplanes and other aircraft. It says that these imported munitions have been distributed over nine miles and to be used by Abyssinian experts operating coffee.

A dollar war tax has been imposed on all the inhabitants of Abyssinia.

Special apprehension is said to be felt in Italy regarding the sending of troops on the long Italo-Abyssinian frontier between British Somaliland and Eritrea.

THE LATE MR. WALTER GARTH STANLEY

Early Official Survey Work in Kenya

A POPULAR FIGURE

By the death, from blackwater fever, of Mr. Walter Garth Stanley, in his 42nd year, Kenya loses a well-known resident who was a popular and familiar figure in the Colony for close upon a quarter of a century. The late Mr. Stanley, one of the original members of the firm of Cowdell and Partners, had been in charge of the firm's Kakamega branch since its inception in 1930 and on Monday last was, apparently, at good health. He was admitted to hospital at Kakamega on Tuesday morning from blackwater fever (third bout) and passed away on the morning of Friday last.

Born in South Africa on December 17, 1892, the son of Dr. Stanley Johnstone, the late Mr. Stanley was educated in the Union and passed his surveys' examinations after studying at the South African College, Capetown. From 1912 to 1916 he was employed in the Survey Department of the Union Government, joining the well-known firm of mining surveys, Messrs. Ekstein and Company of Johannesburg, in the latter year. In 1917 he commenced private practice in Johannesburg, continuing in the until his departure for British East Africa in 1912, where he joined the Survey Department of the Protectorate Government in March of the latter year.

DUKE SENT TO PRISON

Got £650 by False Pretences

Pawnbroker Defrauded

[THROUGH BRITISH AGENCY.]
 London, May 10.—At the old Bailey today the Duke of Manchester was sentenced by the Recorder of London to nine months imprisonment on charges of obtaining by false pretences a sum of £650 from a pawnbroker named Burton, on jewellery belonging to the trustee under his late mother's will.

The defence of the Duke of Manchester was that he intended to return the jewellery and had paid the interest on the money advanced and taken out an insurance policy on the jewellery.

It was stated that the Duke of Manchester had received a sum of £5,000 from the trustees of his mother's estate during the year June 1952 to June 1953, on the course of which the pledge transaction took place.

It is generally understood that when the Laval expressed some difficulty in explaining the Franco-Soviet alliance, and despite the more friendly atmosphere, independent observers think that the Eastern Pact is dead as far as Poland is concerned.

Stringent provisions are being taken by the Polish Police, who have been warned by the French Secret Service that an attempt is likely to be made on M. Laval's life.

70,000 Children See the King and Queen

LAST DAY OF MEMORABLE WEEK OF REJOICING

Saturday Night Scenes

Many thousands of children went to London on Saturday to see the King and Queen and by His Majesty's command special accommodation had been reserved for them.

The crowds gathered in the neighbourhood of Buckingham Palace on Saturday night were bigger than ever and a great volume of cheering rose when Their Majesties appeared for the last time on the balcony.

A Jubilee Drive

 Rugby, May 11.—The last day of a memorable week that by no means ends the jubilation connected with the Royal Jubilee, was marked by notable festivities in London, Edinburgh, Belfast and Cardiff. Their Majesties were in the provincial capitals—the Prince of Wales to Cardiff, the Duke of York accompanied by the Duchess to Edinburgh, and the Duke of Gloucester to Belfast.

There were in all these cities most effective displays and exuberant demonstrations of loyalty and affection to the King and the Royal Family.

London last night was again the scene of demonstrative jubilation. The King and Queen were applauded in the balcony of the Royal Opera House and came out to respond to the cheers of the vast crowds who remained there for hours. As Their Majesties left the balcony the crowd sang the National Anthem.

Young Visitors

This morning London was invaded by armies of happy and excited children. They came in contingents of many thousands from all the outlying districts of the metropolitan area. Carefully sheltered by special stands and their teachers they inched to stands on Constitution Hill and Mall while at the King's park, had been reserved for them so that they might see Their Majesties in the best possible circumstances.

The children were entertained by bands of the British and Polish and by British Broadcasting Corporation programmes which broadcast the music from loud speakers behind the stands.

I admit the difficulties are great and perhaps unworkable.

There are three different European Powers connected to be considered and these the historic and acquiescence of the preponderance and divergent native interests to be obtained. The trouble between North and South in America was quite on different lines and, when finally settled, Amerasia was easily accomplished.

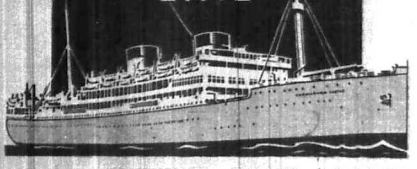

Tanganyika Plans for Prosperity

OUTLINES OF £250,000 DEVELOPMENT SCHEME

Governor's Despatch

"IT IS OUR DUTY TO MAKE PROVISION FOR BETTER DAYS."

The Government of Tanganyika has submitted to the Secretary of State for the Colonies a programme for the expenditure of £250,000 which is intended to provide for the rehabilitation of the Territory following the long depression.

The Governor, Sir Harold MacMichael, in the course of a despatch declares that at the present time the country ought not and cannot afford to subsist on vague hopes for its salvation and that he has come to the conclusion that certain capital works are highly desirable on the grounds that they will be remunerative, will result in increased trade with British markets and, in any event, are long overdue.

His Excellency's proposals include a number of new feeder roads to bring more traffic to the railways, the extension and topographical facilities, water boring, a geographical and topographical survey of the Territory, an irrigation investigation, and the provision on the Serengeti Plains of rest camps for tourists.

Programme of Rehabilitation

(BY WIRELESS.)

By Sir Saham (by mail). It will be recalled that the Government of Tanganyika at a time when we sought and cannot afford to subsist on vague hopes for its salvation and that he has come to the conclusion that certain capital works are highly desirable on the grounds that they will be remunerative, will result in increased trade with British markets and, in any event, are long overdue.

This is the description by His Excellency of a comprehensive development scheme for the Territory in a despatch to the Secretary of State for the Colonies prepared for approval of the programme of expenditure of £250,000 in the course of a number of months of economic development.

The scheme has been approved by His Majesty's Government in addition grants made from the Colonial Development Fund towards £77,000 for a combined roads and topographical survey of the major roads of the Territory. The following is the full text of the despatch (which is dated November 12, 1951 and was published in the "Herald") to Sir Philip Currie, latter.

The result of eight months' residence in this Territory, such as I report in touring the Province, has convinced me that the material and the unofficial economies have been in constant and rapid growth. The work of capital development is highly desirable on the ground that it will be remunerative and result in increased trade with British markets and, in any event, are long overdue.

Self-Support. Our budget for 1953, with the assistance afforded us in respect of the interest on our local debt, presents a true balance, but by most clearly sum it is

greater measure of self-support in the future. For this purpose, the first and most necessary step is in my view and that of my advisers that we pay the way by providing access to areas which are potentially rich, but still unexplored, in order that the increased production, stimulated by irrigation and the localisation of methods of cultivation, may find an easy outlet and earn the money needed on the one hand for the payment of the interest on the other for the purchase of imported goods.

Equally, important desiderata are:— (a) that provision should be made by means of geological and topographical surveys aimed mainly to explore vast areas of the country which are still scarcely known in order that their potential value may be ascertained and their physical features recorded; (b) that steps be taken for the better conservation and distribution of existing water supplies or the provision of additional sources of supply of water for the irrigation of arable land or works of a similar nature.

It now seems that certain proposals were submitted by my predecessor and that it was considered by the Lords Committee of the Treasury at that time that the financial position of the Territory did not justify further capital expenditure. Subsequently, however, it has been decided that the roads and bridge construction and water supply schemes were approved and are now being carried out.

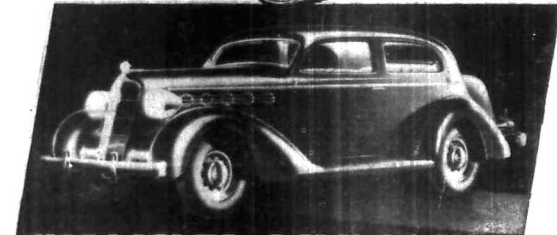
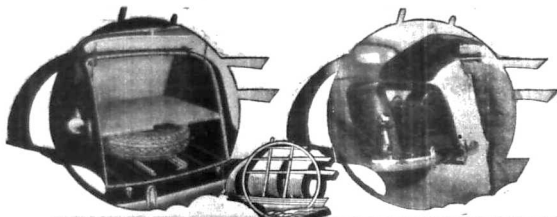



Mr. G. H. W. Ansell, Land Assistant, Nairobi, conducted the auction among those present were Mr. C. O. Gilbert, the Surveyor-General, and Mr. A. L. Badger, Acting Land Secretary of the Office of the Commissioner for Local Government Lands and Settlement.

Over 20 persons attended the auction.

Tennant, but the upset price he invited to enable Government to give the amount of the demand for the property.

The only bid was one of Shs. 10,000, by Mr. Stanley. The upset price of the plot in question was Shs. 28,880.

WHEN THE LIGHTS FAIL

Consumers Advised What to Do

In response to a request from the President of Nairobi the East African Standard yesterday made inquiries at the office of the East African Electricity Board, which is in the process of installing a 14d to ascertain the cause of interruptions in the supply of electricity to consumers in the town. An explanation of the position was given by Mr. G. Reed, the secretary of the company, who at the outset stated that interruptions in the electricity supply were not too serious. He said that an interruption caused through the company disconnecting the supply in any particular area, either for the purpose of carrying out repairs to the system or making extensions.

If such interruptions are of any length, consumers will be advised to be warned so that consumers may be advised but in any case these interruptions would occur during daylight hours. Where a consumer has actually been affected by a failure of an interruption and finds that the electricity supply to his premises has failed, he should telephone the company's service department on No. 2555 when the matter will be given attention.

Beyond Control

The other type of breakdown in the supply occurs through circumstances which it is entirely beyond the control of the electricity supply authority. On Friday night for instance, there was an interruption of the electricity supply to the Hill area as a result of a hard driving which caused a breakdown in the short circuit. This was actually seen to happen by a consumer during the late afternoon. However, the fact was not reported until dark when a resident discovered that the lights in his house would not burn.

In the interests of residents generally the company requests that consumers of notice in its system, or equipment failure in its system, should be notified without delay to the company's service department. This may be done at any hour of the day or night. Before telephoning, however, consumers should take the precaution of ascertaining whether their lines are in order and whether the lights in the streets and neighbouring houses are burning.

By advising the company immediately of faults and interruptions, people may save themselves and better consumers the annoyance and inconvenience of being without lights in their homes. If, in the event of a breakdown, the company would only be one system of a failure in the supply system if it affected one of the main lines leading out of the Parklands distributing station or if there was a breakdown in the supply to one of the big consumers such as the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours. If immediately notified of a breakdown would only be to the best interests of the company. It is important that the company's service department be notified of a breakdown as soon as possible. The company would do well to communicate again with the company's service department, as a further, unexpected fault may be present in the supply system.

THE MONETARY FACTOR IN DEPRESSION

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir.—Mr. Dykes letter appearing in today's "East African Standard" strikes to saddle me with a stick of soap to which I have never subscribed. I never attempted so formidable a task as the complete vindication of every aspect of the Commercial Bank's past and present policy. I merely stated that although they are undoubtedly made mistakes they are not guilty of the particular error ascribed to them by Mr. Dykes. The extent to which the Commercial Bank influenced currency policy is not a matter of mere trivia, and what there is of good reason for saying that in their appreciation of the standard policy they were no worse than the great mass of public opinion, it is understood that the Government acting on the advice of the Bank of England is responsible for currency and the Commercial Bank for credit, and that the principles applied to the management of British credit have been more intelligent, far more progressive and far more scientific than those applied to the currency.

Credit rests on currency mainly because all Banks find it necessary to preserve a certain ratio between their main assets and their total liabilities; and no Bank is limited in their lending operations by the amount of their customers' deposits. Mr. Dykes appears to be under the impression that Mr. McKenna's proposition "every advance is a deposit" is so absurd that it is not worth bothering to appreciate that no such authority in practice, one must carefully distinguish between the two categories of deposits, between those which arise when a customer leaves with a Bank a sum of money in return for the Bank's promise to repay it at a later date and those which arise when the Bank grants an overdraft, i.e., creates a deposit in the customer's account, in return for the latter's promise to repay the amount at a later date. One cannot help feeling that the latter class of "deposits" in the second sense is open to objection, but it rests on the highest authority and on general custom and it was to deposits in this sense that Mr. McKenna made reference when using the phrase I have mentioned. It is from the necessity of maintaining a certain ratio between cash assets and total liabilities that the amount of deposits so created by the Bank is necessarily limited by the amount of their cash holdings, which can only come from their own subscribed capital (which in banking practice is of negligible amount) and the first category of deposits.

In English banking practice it is not uncommon to find in liquid cash approximately 10 to 15 per cent of the amount of money necessary to buy the goods produced in a country. It implies that the amount of disposable money in a country or market is determined not only by its quantity but also by the rate of its circulation, i.e., there are 1,000,000 monetary units which change hands 100 times during the course of a year. The amount of money in the hands of the public will be 100,000,000 monetary units; if instead the same amount changes hands 1,000 times the public will dispose of 10,000,000,000 monetary units. In theory and in practice the quantity of money in circulation has very little importance in determining the quantity of goods or services at the disposal of the public, and if with 1,000,000 monetary units 25 per cent of the goods remain unsold, the remaining 75 per cent of units there will be no increase in the purchase of goods; the velocity with which the money changes hands will simply diminish. In the long run inflation does not bring any change inside a market. Inflation can be useful only if, by altering the rate of exchange, exports can be increased. But in this case the other countries increase their duties and so after a short time the situation is as before.

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard." Sir.—"Social Credit's" letter in your issue of May 10 calls for few reflections. From what he says one gathers that the price of production is determined by the cost of production; but this is correct only in part. If in certain branch of production the output is suddenly doubled there will be such a supply of goods that the need for them will be greatly diminished in intensity and the price offered by the consumer will be determined not by the cost of production but by the degree of intensity of his needs. If, for example, the consumer requires three loaves of wheat per annum and the producer can offer only two, which have cost him 15/- each, the consumer will probably offer considerably more than 15/-, but if the producer requires four loaves which have cost him 12/-, the consumer, being in great need of such a quantity, will perhaps offer more than 12/-. So if the producer wants to get rid of all his output, he will have to sustain a loss.

When "Social Credit" speaks of the amount of money necessary to buy the goods produced in a country, he implies that the amount of disposable money in a country or market is determined not only by its quantity but also by the rate of its circulation, i.e., there are 1,000,000 monetary units which change hands 100 times during the course of a year. amount but cannot alter it fundamentally. So, for example, the present contract between administrators of goods and general money—as outlined by Mr. Sheldrick in your issue of the same date—is not so much the necessary factor as to another case, directly faced in our own organization; that is, the lack of balance between producers and consumers.

When a very good service or service must give an exchange money, the intrinsic value of which is often small, and which only represents other goods and services, then to say that a consumer is only to be satisfied in so far as he is a producer. In our own case the various goods which are produced in every country is divided to meet the requirements of the total production. While a small number of people having at their disposal goods have a very large share in the total production, the great majority produce little or nothing and are not able to buy what the former have produced. To give an example in a closed market 1,000,000 people are able to produce goods to the value of £1,000,000 and the total production is £2,000,000,000 (a tenth of 1) and the other 999,000 people are only able to produce goods to the value of £200,000,000 (two hundredths of 1) and the former will have to produce goods to the value of £1,800,000,000 (over the top) and unless they wish to give away this surplus and subsequently reduce their production. Of course another method would be applied to maintain the balance, i.e., to produce £1,800,000,000 people diminishing their production to the £200,000,000,000 to increase their output in other branches of production, or to establish them for what the £2,000,000,000 have produced.

Kenya and Uganda Trade in 1934

EL0,000,000 BETTER THAN IN PRECEDING YEAR

Kenya Exports Decline

15 PER CENT. FALL TO BELOW A TOTAL OF £2,000,000

The 1934 Trade Report for Kenya and Uganda, recently issued, shows that the total trade of the two countries... improvement of £1,800,000 over the total for 1933, but still £1,800,000 below the total in 1930.

The two territories exported produce to the value of £2,884,000, about the same as in 1933 but 26 per cent. greater than 1932.

Kenya's exports fell to below £2,000,000 and showed a decline of 15 per cent. over 1933.

However, there has been a marked expansion of transit and transhipment trade.

Kenya has again recorded an advance and now supplies 64 per cent. of the cotton piece goods. Her total share of the whole import trade is 15 per cent.

Japan Forging Ahead

Mr. G. D. Kinross has handed in his final Report as the Commissioner of Customs for Kenya and Uganda.

The trade statistics for 1934, he says, show some improvement over the preceding year and reflect a substantial measure of recovery since 1931-32.

The value of the domestic exports of the two territories amounted to £1,744,000 and remained at the same level as in 1933. The total value is an increase of 20 1/2 per cent. over 1932.

The re-export trade showed a further expansion. Merchandise re-exported reached to total of £1,027,000 being an increase of 11 1/2 per cent. over 1933 and £1,038,000 below the peak period of 1932. The total value of the year including re-exports was £2,771,000 an increase of 1 1/2 per cent. over 1933 and 22 1/2 per cent. over 1932.

On the import side the total was £5,813,000. This was an increase of rather more than 15 per cent. over 1933 and 1932 and is a sign of the Commission of Customs B. indicates a gain in trading confidence and a steadier demand for the port of commerce in general.

Uganda's Share

Uganda where the increase of commercial activity was chiefly in the form of shipments, was 17 1/2 per cent. of the total of the combined domestic exports and valued at £304,000.

The improvement in import prices was the main factor leading support to Uganda exports. The total value of exports to Uganda, which returned also showed a notable increase in the volume of domestic exports of coffee and tobacco. The figure of exports of coffee was £1,000,000, an increase of 15 per cent. over 1933 and 154,000 cwt. valued at £750,000. Uganda's share was 154,000 cwt. valued at £280,000. This was an increase of 17 1/2 per cent. over 1933 and 17 1/2 per cent. over 1932.

Kenya's Handicap

So far as Kenya is concerned the Commissioner points out that the situation under which the two territories trade in the Colony has been placed during recent years—depression, drought and—has not helped in the improvement of the value of domestic exports. The figure for 1934 was only £1,910,000 representing an increase of 10 1/2 per cent. over 1933 and 10 1/2 per cent. over 1932.

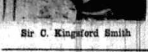

HOW LAIKIPA CELEBRATED THE JUBILEE:
A Strenuous and Successful Day

Laikipia, May 10. The District Commissioner, Mr. Sharpe, assisted by a small committee from Thomson's Falls and Rumuruti arranged a very complete programme for Laikipia on the occasion of His Majesty's Silver Jubilee. Letters were provided for the transport from Thomson's Falls to Rumuruti and back, of all those who had no cars. The proceedings commenced at 10 o'clock at Thomson's Falls where people from the surrounding district met, and after a short speech from the District Commissioner a number of commemorative trees were planted in the public gardens by him and also some of the residents of the neighbourhood.

The scene of activities was then transferred to Rumuruti where a large number of people of all races collected at the flagpole. At noon the District Commissioner arrived, accompanied by Capt. T. Dodd, M.C., Staff Officer, Messrs. Mr. Forrester, Bill Valley, The Guard of Honour, under the command of Lieut. F. H. Trent, was accompanied by a section of the Kenya Defence Force and the usual smart military band. Mr. Slater, together with Es-Service-Major Major W. G. Edwards, M.C.

After the inspection of the Guard of Honour by the District Commissioner, there was a short service followed by the National Anthem and the part of the ceremony concluded with a march past of the Kenya Defence Force, Es-Service, and Police.

Trees were then planted round the Government office and after this everyone went off to lunch. Large numbers to the club and many parties penning under the trees.

A Sports Meeting
Immediately after lunch the Sports began in a field adjacent to the Laikipia Gymkhana Club. The weather and conditions were perfect, and nothing could have provided a better setting than the lovely park-like grounds of the Club and its surroundings. The committee are indebted to Mr. Hulme for preparing the Sports ground and to the District Commissioner for valuable assistance. The Sports were carried out under the competent direction of Major Edwards and his helpers Messrs. Slater, Hulme, Skye, P. Ker and Warwick. They provided a lot of exercise for the energetic and good entertainment for all.

The open events were a donkey race, which caused much amusement and not a few small disasters, and a relay race. A sack race, 100 yards, was also arranged and spear-throwing competitors drew large numbers from the African. A handball race for Asian children, one for European boys (won by Master John Bamberg) and another for girls supplied fun and interest for the younger generation.

The most strenuous event of the afternoon was a cross-country two-mile race for Europeans. This was won in the style by Mr. Kenneth Cunningham in a field of twelve entrants. A Tug-of-War between Thomson's Falls and Rumuruti ended in a victory for

for the latter, while Marahot won the inter-police tug-of-war from Rumuruti.

Children's Tea
The sports were finished about four o'clock and the children were then invited to tea and games by Mr. Sharpe in his garden on the banks of the Narak River, where the lawn is so green and smooth, and the flowers as beautiful as anything could be in the Old Country.

The Gymkhana Club was "At Home" for tea to all visitors and Capt. Richardson, the Honorary Secretary, and Mrs. Richardson, are to be congratulated on the arrangements made for such numbers. Nor was the African "inter-mix" neglected and they were regaled with their own given by Messrs. Wallace, Pusey, Tomlinson and Ker.

All the children's party, Mr. Sharpe's private guests and their parents and friends were being entertained by Turkish and Danish bands whose music gave realistic pictures of elephant, rhinoceros and buffalo hunting and of native warfare. While this was going on, a football match, between two teams from Thomson's Falls and Rumuruti, being won by the latter by two goals to nil. This was followed by another match between European teams from the Falls and Rumuruti in which the latter were the winners by two goals to nil. Another match was being played in the Laikipia Athletic Sports Club (Rumuruti) competing with an African team from Thomson's Falls at Volley Ball for a cup presented by Major Edwards. This was won by Rumuruti by 55 points to 40. The winning team was composed of Messrs. H. C. Gupta, Bohan Din, Niaz Mohammed, Gureshan Singh, Chah Mohan and C. B. D. Gupta. Led de Souza, Rameshchandra Mowari and Manji Ram.

"Living Dangerously"
After a short interval, about six o'clock, for unobserved refreshment everyone went to see the fire bonfire prepared by Mr. Leakey of the Forest Department, and a fireworks display. Some of the fireworks gave unexpected and surprising performance, and rather justified an African's comment that they must surely have been designed especially "Kuchama wain". Certainly, however, was responsible for letting them off lived up to the modern slogan "Live dangerously." This brought the daylight festivities to an end and all those who could do so hurried off to prepare for the evening's programme.

The scene of events reverted to Thomson's Falls where between nine and ten o'clock about seventy guests sat down in a field of excellent dinner at Barry's Hotel in the large new hall just erected and used for the first time on this occasion. During the dinner the King's speech was heard on the radio. The dinner was followed by a dance for which an excellent band provided the music. Sports was followed by a very clever and witty cabaret show introduced by Messrs. Muckelhopf, Hart, Byers and Hartley.

At midnight there was another bonfire, for there is no shortage of firewood in these parts, and many fireworks.

Half past five in the morning of Tuesday the evening brought a close to a most enjoyable day which though had not been a dull moment.

In the track events at Moshi some very good times were accomplished by youthful competitors, including the better school state of the ground, e.g. 21 sec. for the 220 yards Open (winner 10) by Johnson of Patrick's School, Munga (Chi), and 41.7 sec. by Fabin (winner) of the Arusha European School in the 100 yards while in the Relay Race (600 yards) the time taken 10 min. 50 sec. was also outstandingly good.

The sun shone all day, and though towards evening the onset of rain succeeded somewhat hurried lighting of the bonfire and the fireworks, the celebrations were most successful and enjoyable. A Dance at the Maweni Hotel, the guests of the evening for the native formed a pleasant climax to a well-remembered day.

Enjoyable Time Despite Rain



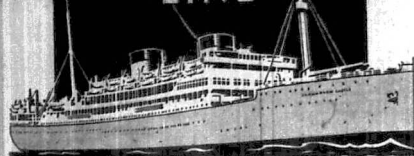
