**Reconstruction of Government?**  
**PREMIER AND MR. BALDWIN MAY CHANGE PLACES**  
**Dissolution Rumours**  
**GENERAL ELECTION MAY BE HELD IN OCTOBER**

[THOROUGH BROTHER'S AGENCY] London, May 15.  
 Talk of the reconstruction of the Government and even of a General Election in the autumn has been revived now at the end of the Government of India Bill is in sight.

Reconstruction has been expected for some time, partly because of the excessive strain of the Premiership on Mr. Ramsay MacDonald who carries out a prodigious amount of work despite his frailties, and partly because of the normal opportunities for a rearrangement which occur during the long life of any Government.

Rumour was extremely busy last night. The likeliest story circulating in the lobby is that Mr. MacDonald and Mr. Stanley Baldwin will change places during the White House recess.

**OBSTACLES**  
 The election rumour is natural because with the passage of the Government of India Bill by the beginning of August, the only definite obstacle to an early election is removed. With other legislation completed, the Government may prorogue the session in August instead of adjourning it, thus enabling the Election to take place during the recess if desired.

Many Government supporters believe that an election in October would be more favourable to the Government than in the Spring or late 1936.

**GOVERNMENT STOCK HIGH**  
 There is no doubt that the Government's stock at present is very high as was evidenced by the result of the West Edinburgh by-election. This is believed in some circles to be due partly to the serious European situation in connection with which in the recent foreign affairs debate even the Labour Opposition more or less approved Government's policy and is also partly due to the fact that trade has been considerably falling during the last two years.

**FRANCE AND RUSSIA**  
**Visit of M. Laval to Moscow**

 The joint communiqué issued in connection with the result of the Laval-Litvinov conversation indicates that both France and Russia are striving for the same end—the maintenance of peace through the organization of general security.

**IRISH FREE STATE FINANCES**  
**Improvement in Budget Position**  
**DEFICIT REDUCED**  
**Surplus Predicted for Next Year**

 An encouraging financial position was disclosed by Mr. Sean McMeolin, Minister for Finance, when introducing the Irish Free State Budget in the Dail to-day. Whereas he had budgeted for a deficit of £2,718,000 last year, to be provided by borrowing.

**"LAWRENCE OF ARABIA"**  
**Brighter Hopes for Recovery**

[THOROUGH BROTHER'S AGENCY] London, May 15.  
 Mr. T. E. Shaw (Lawrence of Arabia) is still optimistic and his condition is unchanged, but it is stated that the hopes of ultimate recovery are slightly improved.

The actual deficit was only £2,425,000. A substantial increase in export tonnage and subsidies would, he said, all be provided from taxation. **FRENCH SEAMEN ON STRIKE**  
**Crew of 1,200 Leave the "Normandie"**  
**10,000 Workers Idle**  
**OWNERS ALLEGED FAILURE TO CARRY OUT PROMISES**

[THOROUGH BROTHER'S AGENCY] Havre, May 15.  
 Twelve hundred men, the crew of the new giant liner, "Normandie" walked off the ship to-day in a protest against the alleged failure of the owners of the French line to agree to certain working conditions which the men claim they were promised.

They were joined by 200 men from the line "Champion" which was due to leave for America this afternoon and 300 men from the "Lafayette".

In consequence 320 passengers from the "Champion" have had to seek hotel accommodation here. The men's leaders have gone to Paris to interview the Minister of Mercantile Marine.

It is hoped that the dispute will be settled tomorrow.

**Men's Demands**  
 Representatives of the Seaman's Union claim that 10,000 workers altogether are idle, although an estimate has been called offical.

The men are asking 15 days' holiday, a year with pay, old age pensions and monthly payment instead of time spent in harbour.

It is not thought that the union version of the "Normandie" will be delayed by the trouble.

**SUCCESS OF JUBILEE IN NAIROBI**  
**Letter of Thanks to the Mayor**  
**FOR 5,000 CHILDREN**  
**Plans Carried Out Without Any Hitch**

His Worship the Mayor of Nairobi, Councillor G. G. Mwaniki, has received the following letter of appreciation from the Education Department for the arrangements made for school children to take part in the Jubilee celebration.

 On behalf of the children of Nairobi I have the honour to convey to you the keen appreciation and hearty thanks of all who took part in the Jubilee Celebrations arranged by your Committee.

More than five thousand children of all races responded to your invitation, attended an afternoon entertainment and were presented with a Jubilee Medal. The cinema shows provided at the four theatres in the town were visited with great enthusiasm.

Throughout the week children living at a distance from the place of any entertainment were conveyed by bus as arranged by your Committee. These arrangements were carried out most efficiently and carefully by the Kenya Bus Company, children invariably arrived in time and no accidents occurred. A notable feat was the conveyance of over 1,400 children by bus to see the parade on May 6. In spite of the extraordinary volume of traffic on the roads that morning all the children arrived punctually, to occupy the places allotted to them in Government House grounds.

Thirty silver Jubilee portraits of the King and a similar number of the Queen have been distributed to the larger schools as permanent mementos of the occasion and also a number of silver Jubilee medals were presented to pupils of schools and African localities. These presents were much appreciated.

The two special performances of "King Lear" given by the "Building" Players met with an enthusiastic response from the major pupils of the European and Indian Schools.

**THE GOVERNMENT OF INDIA BILL**  
**Record for Parliamentary Progress**  
**ENORMOUS BILL**  
**Over 2,000 Speeches and Numerous Divisions**

[THOROUGH BROTHER'S AGENCY] London, May 16.  
 Parliament closed a record by the completion last night, in 30 Parliamentary days, of the committee stage of the huge Government of India Bill. The Bill originally consisted of 450 clauses and 15 schedules, but is now even bulkier.

One and a half million words were spoken in the course of over 2,000 speeches, and Members spent eighteen hours in transposing the division lobbies. An average of seventy speeches was made daily. Mr. R. A. Disher, Under-Secretary of State for India led with 200; Sir Samuel Hoare, Secretary of State, prior to his absence owing to illness, having made 160; His General Sir Henry Page-Croft, one of the leading Conservative opponents of the Bill over 150; Sir Thomas Inskip (Attorney-General) and Mr. Winston Churchill each 100.

Moreover, the voluntary arrangements that had been agreed upon by all sections of the House for the allocation of time, worked most smoothly and in a businesslike manner that satisfied all Parties and avoided the use of the "guillotine". Six days have still to be devoted to the report stage, and the third reading before the Bill goes to the House of Lords.

**Closer Co-operation Between Fighting Services**  
**PROPOSAL DEBATED IN HOUSE OF LORDS**  
**Under Control of One Minister**  
**SECRETARY FOR WAR EXPLAINS PRESENT POSITION**

In the House of Lords on Thursday, Lord Mottistone, better known as Major-General J. F. B. Seely, who is an ex-Secretary for War, moved that it was desirable that one Minister should be appointed to direct the policy and method of supply of the Navy, the Army and the Air Force.

Viccount Halifax, the present Secretary for War, opposed the motion and explained that the only body to control policy was the Cabinet. He outlined the existing system of co-operation between the respective departments.

**Cabinet Pre-rogatives**  
 [BY WIRELESS.] Rugby, May 16.  
 The need of closer co-operation between the Navy, the Army and the Air Force, both as regards general direction and supply, was urged by Lord Mottistone (better known as General J. F. B. Seely) who moved in the House of Lords last night that it was desirable that a Minister should be appointed to direct the policy and method of supply of the three services.

Viccount Halifax, the Secretary of State for War, replying for the Government, resisted the motion, declaring that the only body to control the policy was the Cabinet. If there was a dispute between the services the Cabinet must decide. In regard to coordination, he added, much has already been done. The Committee of Imperial Defence was better organized. The Committee of the Chiefs of Staff of the three services was an integral part of its machinery, and had recently given its imprimatur. Chiefs of Staff made a joint report on every strategic question.

The only main bill was whether there should be a whole time Chairman of the Committee of Imperial Defence. In practice the Prime Minister almost always presided at its meetings, and the Lord President of the Council, Mr. Stanley Baldwin, was always present. These "big" bills to which did not think a permanent chair was worth an improvement.

# MOTURING TOPICS

## Art of Coach Building

### THE BOX-BODY CAR

#### Departure from the Conventional

#### STREAM LINE EFFECT ACHIEVED

#### WORK OF FISHER, SIMMONS & RODWAY

The art of the coach-builder in Kenya has come on by leaps and bounds in recent years. In East Africa the box-body car has come to be looked upon as an essential, not only among the agricultural community, but even in the case of the private individual in town, especially if he is undertaking frequent safaris. It is natural, that such a year should mark another step in the progress of the body-builder.

Hitherto, the design has followed along what one might term conventional lines, and little departure has been made from these in recent days. There have been slight variations in it, but nothing really very different from the accepted principle has yet been evolved.

Today a new departure has been witnessed in the design, and it follows the general trend of the manufacturer-stream-line effect. It has been achieved by Messrs. Fisher, Simmons and Rodway, the well-known firm of motor-enthusiasts.

With a view to giving the public of Kenya and Nairobi a taste of the progress they have made in regard to this design, they have built on an ordinary 25 H.P. Dodge frame, a streamlined box-body. It was built and erected in the workshop of the firm in Victoria Street, Nairobi, and made its first public appearance in the increased motor car procession held under the auspices of the E.A.A.A., last week in connection with the Silver Jubilee celebrations.

The car, which develops 100

D.H.P., is fitted with six wheels. In all there are six metal artillery tyre wheels, the two squares being fitted with metal covers.

The front is completely enclosed following along the lines of the motor, but giving a coupe effect. "No draft" ventilation windows form part of the scheme, the partition behind the driving seat, which can be raised and lowered in a matter of a few seconds, giving the coupe effect to the front compartment.

#### Entirely New Design

A completely new departure has been introduced with regard to the stream line effect for the body. A departure which completely differs from accepted procedure to date in so far as the engine, blenders and hoses with the rest of the car.

The top down back instead of having the old rear type curtain, fitted with mesh window, is replaced by a window which can be opened and closed by means of a lever on the exterior, and is on principle as the carriage window of a railway train.

#### Colour Scheme

So far as the colour scheme is concerned this shows the lines of the car to full advantage. The upholstery is "Bevis", and very attractive, chosen to harmonize with the general scheme of things. The interior of the box body is finished with a new preparation of stainless and varnish which brings

up the grain of the wood to perfection.

#### Public Commentations

It is an exceedingly well finished work throughout, and members of the public who have been permitted to view the model, have each and all expressed their complete satisfaction. Indeed, so well has it been commended that orders have already been placed for three models of a similar design.

A progressive firm, this further product but proves that Messrs. Fisher, Simmons and Rodway are out to serve the public to the best advantage, and that their body building workshops are on a scale capable of carrying out the designs to suit the most ostentatious.

### MORE PEDESTRIAN BARRIERS

#### Protection from Perils of the Road

[STANDARD] CORRESPONDENT, London, April 26. (By Air Mail.)

More barriers set to be put up in London to protect the pedestrians from the perils of the road. The Minister of Transport has completed arrangements with the local authorities for their erection at Hammarstead Broadway, Marston Green, New Cross and Streatham Hill Station. They will consist of posts and rails on the edge of the pavement and are to be expected to be in position by May.

At Hammarstead Broadway the barriers will form a fence completely enclosing the junction. Gaps will be made opposite the local pedestrian crossing places. At Streatham Hill Station, the converging point of six roads, the barriers will guide pedestrians to the crossing places. At the Manxup of Grays, New Cross, barriers will be erected on both sides of New Cross Road and for a short distance along Lewisham High Road.

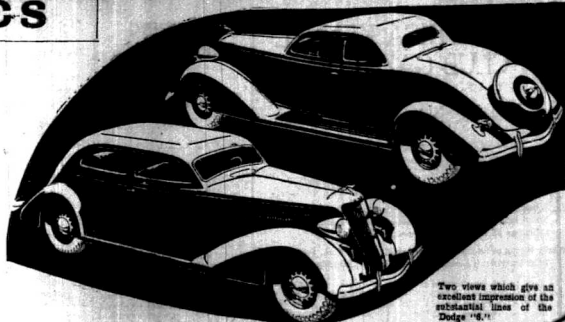

## NEW OIL REFINING PROCESS

### Result of Over Two Years of Experiment

#### THREE NEW PLANTS ERECTED

#### Eliminating Necessity for Filtration Through Clay

For over two years the Yatum Oil Company have been engaged in developing an entirely new process of oil refining. Even in the best oil, refined from the best crude oil, certain low-grade impurities are retained, and it is these which help to cause such effects as excessive carbon deposits, sludge formation, sticky deposits on valves and stems, and thickening of the oil so that starting becomes difficult in cold weather. It is claimed for the new process that the "Gutman"—called the Cleaned Solvent Extraction Process—that it entirely eliminates these impurities.

In conventional refining processes impurities are removed after distillation and blending by the use of sulphuric acid, or by filtration through clay, or by both. Filtration, however, only partially fulfils the object, and the acid treatment, if carried far enough to eliminate all impurities, might also affect the lubricating value of the finished oil. The new Cleaned Process does away with the acid treatment and practically eliminates the necessity for the filter action of the oil through clay.

When oil comes from the well it is first purified by distillation and then blended. This stock has then to be further purified or refined. With the Cleaned Process, after distillation the oil is taken to a mixing tank, where it is mixed with two solvents, one of the "paraffin" group and the other of the "kerosene" group.

#### Double Action

The desirable materials of oil are dissolved in the first solvent and the undesirable materials in the other. Although the two solvents are used simultaneously they do not affect one another, and the result is that all that is desirable in the mixture remains at the top

of the extracting or settling tank into which the liquid passes from the mixing tank, and the undesirable constituents sink to the bottom. They are then separated.

The further separation of the first solvent from the oil is simple, since it can be evaporated off as a gas. The first solvent is, in fact, propane gas, which at a pressure of 200 lb. per sq. in., or so becomes a liquid. This, however, means that for the refining process the entire plant has to work at a pressure in excess of 200 lb. per sq. in., and in consequence expensive equipment has been necessary. But in order to separate off the propane gas all that is necessary is to expose the mixture to atmospheric pressure. The second solvent can also be removed from the undesirable impurities, leaving a thick and tarry residue, and both solvents are then used over and over again. Three new plants have been erected.

## VAGABONDS OF THE SEA

Increase in Numbers of Stowaways on Ships

### THE LURE OF ADVENTURE

There are more stowaways today than there have ever been before. So says the official of a steamship line who estimated that stowaways had cost his company hundreds of pounds in food during the last year or so. There is always a halo of romance surrounding a stowaway, a bit in the style of the law of a stowaway is not a romantic vagabond at all. He—or she—is a criminal liable to a sentence of imprisonment.

Yet romance does sometimes creep in. A pretty young Russian girl stowed herself away in a Cardiff steamer a little while ago. She was discovered long before the voyage was over, and deportation and imprisonment threatened her future at the end of the journey.

### A Love Affair

Instead, Cupid stepped in. The ship's cook fell in love with her on sight. He proposed to her there and then, and persuaded the ship's captain to carry him before they reached Cardiff.

Romance came this way, also, to a young Polish girl who stowed away. When they reached England, she was handed over to the police. But imprisonment was not her lot. One of the ship's crew, an Italian, fell in love for her through an interpreter, and said he was willing to marry her and be responsible for her. The magistrate gave his consent, and not knowing a word of each other's language.

### Stowaway Prostitution

But romance fought a losing battle another time, when an English girl stowed away in America. She finished her trip minus several teeth, they were frost-bitten. Even so, romance tried to step in. For the girl received several offers of marriage from Americans who admired her pluck and wished to save her from deportation back to her own country without success.

Tragically, not romance, is more often the lot of the stowaway. Many of these adventures have ended themselves in places which have not been opened until the end of the trip, and they have started to die.

A terrible fate overtook seven young stowaways who hid themselves in the hold of an American steamship. Two of them, a boy and two girls, they tried to attract attention but failed. And they still failed to attract attention when the hold came to be fumigated during the voyage. All seven were suffocated to death.

### Terrible Experiences

Others have had hair-raising experiences which they are not likely to forget to the end of their days. One boy narrowly escaped death when he stowed himself away in a lifeboat on the Cunard liner bound from Liverpool to New York. It was a wintry trip, and the boy tried to remain undisturbed in preference to leaving himself to the mercy of the captain.

His efforts had serious results. Painful cries were heard from the lifeboat one day, and it was searched. He was found almost frozen to death. His feet were terribly frost-bitten, and seven of his toes had to be amputated. He was in a ghastly plight.

Another recent stowaway had an experience which sounds more like a scene from a film comedy. The stowaway concerned hid upon the bright side of hiding himself in a packing case. His scheme might have succeeded except for one thing.

When the case was taken aboard the ship it was turned upside down, and the fellow inside it found him-

self with his feet above his head. He was so cramped that he couldn't move.

—Was impossible to step in the position, even for a short time with one's long companions. His real trouble, and he soon gave up all hopes of remaining there long enough to get the law of the sea far from him to be returned to land. He had to reveal himself as a stowaway call for help at the top of his voice.

His sufferings were heard. He was taken on stern beams when the ship left port.

### In Polar Regions

Some adventures are amazingly present. Admiral Byrd told us the story of a boy who gave him particular trouble. That was the boy, the Eleanore Bolling was bound for the polar regions.

A careful search for any likely stowaways was made before they sailed, and on the first search the boy was found in hiding. He was taken off the boat.

A little later, out of the camp came across him again, trying to make a "hand" of his own. He increased up more—but he started up for a third time, and was captured.

They thought they had got rid of him this time. But when the Eleanore Bolling set out on the adventurous expedition, the boy was discovered again—and again he accompanied Byrd to the polar regions.

They had had several experiences of stowaways. No explorer has a more romantic report than the intrepid traveller and snow guard has always to be kept to see that no unwelcome youths join him—and a guard which does not always succeed.

### An Old Offender

A young man was recently sentenced to 28 days' imprisonment for stowing away on a steamer. And it was not his first offence in this direction. The last time, the steaming company concerned had had to carry him for 15 months.

He started in Brazil, where he stowed away with the intention of coming to England. He was found. When asked what his nationality was he said he was Latin. When they reached England, the authorities refused permission for him to land. As he couldn't be thrown out of the steaming company had to carry him about, feeding him the whole time, until he could be got ashore.

The boat was returning to Brazil started. But the authorities refused to let him land. So the stowaway company had to travel to carry him for 15 months—until they could land him in Africa.

## NO EARLY PROSPECT OF RATES REDUCTION

### Wants £1,000,000 Reserve

#### PROVISION OF ROAD AND AIR PASSENGER SERVICES UNDER CONSIDERATION

The General Manager of Railways and Harbours has some candid things to say to the people of Kenya and Uganda in the final chapter of his 1934 report for which extracts are published below.

He lays great stress on the importance of building up a large reserve in order to be prepared for the next period of depression and aims at a minimum figure of £1,000,000. Nothing else, he says, should be allowed to interfere with this policy.

Apart from minor alterations in rates he sees no probability of any extensive relief from the present tariff until a reserve is accumulated or until the present policy of high rates on imports and low rates on bulk exports is changed.

**Exports and Imports of Kenya and Uganda**  
**FURTHER ANALYSIS OF LAST YEAR'S FIGURES**  
**Territorial Distribution**  
 UNITED KINGDOM STILL THE LARGEST PURCHASER FROM KENYA  
 Uganda's share of the exports from the territories was nearly twice that of Kenya during the year 1934, states the report of the Commissioner of Customs. This is a reversal of the position in the years 1930, 1931 and 1932 when Kenya exports exceeded those of Uganda.  
 The United Kingdom was the largest purchaser of domestic exports from Kenya, but India again headed the list of exports from Uganda, with Japan second.  
 Cotton exports from both Kenya and Uganda showed a big increase during the year as compared with the two previous years. Exports of Kenya coffee and maize declined.

**Exchange of Local Produce**  
 An exhaustive analysis of the export trade and inter-territorial trade of Kenya and Uganda is given in the 1934-35. Articles wholly or mainly manufactured for local animals and for food (14,000). Kenya's share of last year's domestic exports amounted to £1,070,000 as compared with Uganda's share of £5,774,130, the proportion of value put between the two territories being determined by shippers' deductions at the time and place of export. Kenya's share exceeded that of Uganda, the respective figures being £3,423,000 and £2,000,000 in 1934, £2,844,000 and £1,976,000 in 1933, and £2,215,000 and £2,225,000 in 1932. In 1933 the Kenya total was £2,247,000 and that of Uganda £3,495,000. (Continued on page 8).

transfers maintained for revenue allocation purposes. Similarly, shipment of raw materials of origin permits an assessment of the value of Uganda exports i.o.b. at the final port of exportation.

Allocation of Trade

Subjects for the foregoing review, from 1952 to 1954, indicate the inter-territorial allocation of trade during last year. The total trade imports for the two territories in 1954 were valued at £5,610,181. Kenya's allocation being £2,947,280 and Uganda's £2,662,901. From the last two years the following data are given in respect of re-exports have to be made: Kenya £1,475,738 and Uganda £207,557. The goods retained in Kenya therefore were valued at £2,471,500 and those retained in Uganda at £1,010,494.

In addition to the foreign trade of Uganda specified in the report, practically the whole of its exports pass via Kenya either in transit to or from Mombasa and through the intermediary markets of Kenya, a considerable trans-shipment of Kenyan domestic produce exists.

During 1954 the value of local produce imported into Kenya amounted to £1,151,628 and exports to £1,211,291 in 1953 and £1,414,979 in 1952. Uganda produce went to Kenya for the local market amounting to £38,000 in 1954, as against £74,072 in 1953 and £88,000 in 1952.

The most important articles involved last year were wheat meal and flour, common soap, tea, and tinned milk. The net home consumption in February 1954 is estimated to be £288,287 as against £274,287 in the month in 1953. The respective figures for the first two months of each year are 1953: £286,300, 1954: £270,948.

The United Kingdom provided 96 per cent of the month's export for this year, amounting in value to £135,723. Although the value is increased on last year, which was £291,716, Britain's quota is three per cent less than in 1953, when it was 89 per cent.

The next highest contributor during the period under review is Japan with imports valued at £172,228 as 29 per cent of the total. Last year Japan had £140,714 which is 19 per cent of the whole. 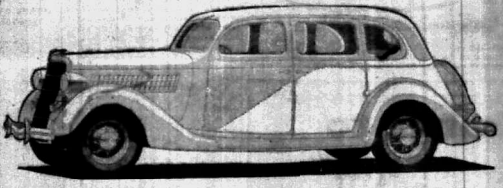

The following yachts took part:—"Opsey" (Dyer); "Kestrel" (Stuart-Pringle); "Blue Bird" (Gibbs); "Blue Tit" (Gibbs); "Opsey" (McKenzie); "Hal-lucian" (Richardson); "Mig" (Wyn Harris); "May" is another welcome addition, and is a display of progress. Multinational Yacht Club.

"Opsey" got the lead at the start but all yachts made slow progress owing to the lack of wind. "Opsey" and "Kestrel" sailed close together, until rounding the second mark, when "Opsey" showed a change in the wind and lost her good position. "Beard" overhauled "Opsey" and then all boats became becalmed. "Blue Bird" and "Mig" kept a steady position throughout the race, but with no wind while wings were of little value and the Committee boat "Tew" put out as 5 clock proved to be all boats in it. 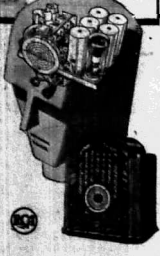
