I not only agree with all they have said with regard to the "Round Table Conference" and the suggested "Indians-only" meeting, but I would like to express my surprise and not a little indignation at your editorial and unfair conclusions in your editorial of yesterday.

His brothers got rather the supple and the advice promised. Lawrence was then 28, making plans in Cairo and turning a secret Arab newspaper. He was in a list of Arab rebels in serious difficulty...

Meeting with Feisal. In his book 'Revolts in the Desert' Lawrence describes his meeting with Feisal after he had looked in vain for the power he had been promised...

Meeting with Albany. Eventually he returned to Cairo still wearing his Arab clothing. Here he reported a successful raid made on the Turkish camp at Akaba. It was the only time that Egypt with the phrase which means 'engaged' and 'not to be taken' was used...

Printing the Enemy. Lawrence returned to Arabia and began the campaign of printing the enemy. He had to revive the old idea of making a train and under his leadership he was often his own hands he succeeded in wrecking the Turkish lines...

The Howaita Adventure. Lawrence had however arranged as far as possible for support from the British Army and military police for gold, rifles, mules and heavy artillery to be sent to Akaba...

At length after the war had been successfully conducted and Lawrence had returned to England with the British Army he brought his Antiquarian interest in Damascus. He had the idea that there was a low way of out after two years he contacted with them in their triumph.

Church Chaplaincies in Kenya

Bishop of Mombasa on an Urgent Need

SPEECH IN LONDON

Tribute to Residents of Kakamega Area

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]

The Bishop of Mombasa, on May 4, announced the adoption of the report of the annual meeting of the central Church Society at the Central Hall, Westminster. The Chairman of the Society, the Rev. G. F. Irvine presided. The Society's activities cover Canada, Australia, New Zealand, Africa, India and the Continent.

The following extract from the report, 1931/32, is of interest to East Africa.

Africa, as the rest of the world, is taking time to recover from a decline in the price of all commodities. The difficulties thus caused have been added to by others, due to climate or to plagues of locusts. It ought not to be a matter for surprise that progress is not so rapid as had been anticipated.

Kenya has been one of the worst of the areas. In parts the planters and settlers have been compelled to economize. In many parts locusts have completely destroyed the crops. While it is a pity that the number of European settlers is inadequate, and especially entirely unreserved, provide the cost of additional assistance. Outstanding among the problems that call for attention is that of ministering to the numerous white people who have been attracted to the Kakamega area. At present only occasional services are given by Archdeacon Low, whose field covers more than the whole of the Nyanza Province. Efforts are being made locally to supply part of the stipend of an additional chaplain, but some help must be forthcoming from elsewhere if this necessary chaplaincy is to be established.

The Rev. F. Bate, in giving a resume of the activities of the year welcomed the Bishop of Mombasa as an old friend. He said, he might not tell them about an African need, but it was a great one. They had heard a great deal about the difficulties of Kakamega and the surrounding areas. They had heard some things true and some grossly exaggerated. There was one thing about which there could be no manner of doubt, and that was the need to provide for the spiritual maintenance of the rather more than 1,000 extra white people attracted to that area. At the present moment whatever has been done was being done on a voluntary basis. There were no charges of the whole of the Nyanza Province. The Society were only providing services consisting of the one in three weeks. Locally in the local Christian district Commissioner they were making enormous efforts to raise the funds to establish regular services and the ministrations which were so essential. They would not be able to do it all, and they were asking us to help.

A Church School

The Bishop of Mombasa, in seconding the resolution, explained why he had come home for two years running. He said that a critical situation had arisen over the work in East Africa for the white people and his Secretary sent a cable in January which brought him hurriedly home for a short time, so he hoped they would forgive him for being on the platform for two years running.

With reference to the job which brought him home, he thought last year when he left the platform, he had told them how tremendously they laid the need for a school for the English children which would be one where the religious atmosphere was constantly kept in mind, and where the best education possible, both mental, physical and moral, but really was to run a school where the children might learn from Jesus Christ was really in their lives, not only when they were at school but later on when they went out into the world.

During the past year they had passed through a financial crisis. Friends at home who supported the school met with unexpected difficulties, and only this year they found that unless they could raise the necessary funds the school would have to be abandoned.

The Bishop said he was not on the platform to beg for the school, but to thank God for the wonderful work in which He had helped during the past two months, and he said that their Secretary had been one of those who had been "steadfastly helped." He believed that so far as he could see he would be going out to Kenya next week with the knowledge that God had saved the school for them. After that

he would come to the Colonial and Continental Society for help and develop the school and make it more useful in the years to come.

Position at Kakamega

Continuing, the Bishop said that Dr. Bate had suggested that he would not want to say very much about Kakamega, but still he felt he would like to say a few words about it. It was one of the great areas where the gold mining had started. He would like to call attention to believe that the gold miners in Kenya were not the worst people that some said they were. A great many of them were splendid men and women and they wanted to keep them that way. He would like to say that many of them were unacquainted with the ministrations of the Gospel. Many of them were good individuals. It was very easy to become indifferent if it was not to be understood in some way or other. He was holding a service in Kakamega in a place called "The Golden Hut" just before he left, and these services were being continued. In the absence of a chaplain, the missionary of the Church Missionary Society was holding the services and many gatherings were being held around for the worship of God, but they must have somebody there who could live and work among the people and for their help and help, because the gold mining area was in an area which, up to now, had been an active reserve and practically entirely reserved for the Africans.

The finding of gold had made a great difference because all sorts of people had come to get this gold. From the financial point of view, it was a great thing, but it was a great help to the country, because it was a great help to the Africans themselves, because they were able to sell their produce as they never did before. As one went through the district one saw them busy and happy. There was really a great change when there were two different chaplains, one living in close proximity to this way.

He did not know whether it all remains that in the Highlands of Kenya where the Europeans live that 35 years ago there was nothing but a regular bushman and savagery. In the midst of all these ignorant and ignorant people a body of white men with all their ideas and motor cars and machinery and airplanes, and the African suddenly found himself in the midst of a completely new set of circumstances, and it was wonderful why they were not more angry that they were; but there was a tremendous danger for both parties in the close contact of the two.

What they needed was a man of God, not only to hold a service on Sunday, but who would be a friend and helper, showing that the power of Christ ought to be in daily life, and helping people to go forward and serve Him.

In Kenya they owed to the Colonial and Continental Society the starting off of the work in Nairobi, which was done by the fine Cathedral and congregation entirely supporting their own work. They had to thank the Colonial Society for helping them to start the work in Nairobi, where the people were quietly supporting the work themselves and extending it. The Colonial Society at the present time helped them in two Chaplaincies, but the grants were steadily diminishing and he knew the people out there anxious to hasten the day when they would stop depending on the help of their own responsibility, which they were doing and managing their own work themselves.

They were very grateful for the help they had been getting from work from this Society, and it was in view of the terrible depression of recent years that they had been enabled to keep the work going.

Tribute to Settlers

He would like to close with an illustration which showed something of what their former brethren in Kenya often had to suffer. He went one Sunday about 60 miles

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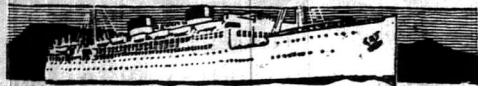

GERMANY'S FOREIGN POLICY

Remarkable Speech by Herr Hitler

REITERATED DESIRE FOR EUROPEAN PEACE

No Wish for Domination

NON-AGGRESSION PACTS WITH ALL EXCEPT LITHUANIA

In a two and a half hours' speech to the Reichstag on Tuesday night Herr Hitler outlined his country's foreign policy.

The German leader reiterated his demand for complete equality as a condition precedent to Germany's return to the League of Nations and expressed willingness to conclude non-aggression pacts with any other nation with the sole exception of Lithuania.

Herr Hitler recognized Britain's claim based on the terms of the Empire Sea Convention and said Germany would be content with a fleet of a total tonnage equal to 35 per cent. of that of Britain.

Germany was prepared to negotiate with a view to entering an Air Convention such as had been proposed by Britain and France and was willing to agree to any limitation of armaments leading to the abolition of heavy artillery, tanks and submarines.

The Sanctity of Treaties

Herr Hitler in a two and a half hours' speech to the Reichstag on Tuesday night... He reiterated his demand for complete equality as a condition precedent to Germany's return to the League of Nations and expressed willingness to conclude non-aggression pacts with any other nation with the sole exception of Lithuania.

No Sea Rivalry

Herr Hitler emphasized that Germany had no intention of entering into rivalry on the sea. It recognized the absolute and vital necessity and justification of Britain's dominating position for the protection of the British Empire, but the German Government was determined to protect its own continental existence.

Non-Aggression Pacts

Germany was ready on principle to conclude non-aggression pacts with individual neighbours and to supplement them by any stipulations which might be necessary in case of war and in involving the use of force.

The German Government under circumstances would depart from the programme for a year or more, but it was not to be taken as a precedent for any other nation but was made at any time to limit its own activities on the sea.

Air Convention

The German Government was ready to participate in a system of limitation on armaments, but in addition to the Locarno pact it was in favour of an Air Convention which would be signed by all nations and which would be binding on all nations.

She was willing to enter into non-aggression pacts with all countries except Lithuania. He criticized the Franco-Soviet alliance and asked for an authentic interpretation of it as Germany considered military alliances incompatible with the spirit and letter of the Statute of the League of Nations.

Austrian Relations

He added: "Germany has neither the desire nor wish to mix with Austrian internal affairs, to annex Austria or for an Anschluss with Austria." He regretted the tension which Austria particularly as it had disturbed relations with Italy with whom Germany had no conflict.

Sea and Air Fleets

The verbatim report of the speech shows that Hitler asked for Germany a fleet 35 per cent. of the British total tonnage which he pointed out would leave the German fleet 10 per cent. less than the fleet of the French fleet. He also asked for parity in the field with Warsaw powers, thereby excluding Russia.

He declared Germany was willing to agree to any limitation of armaments leading to the abolition of heavy artillery, tanks and submarines and the international limitation of the tonnage of warships.

British Press Comment

The Times says that Herr Hitler's speech called for a complete settlement with Germany. It is unlikely, however, that the speech will have had any bearing on the proposals for strengthening the nation's air defences which were formulated after lengthy and detailed consideration of all the relevant factors.

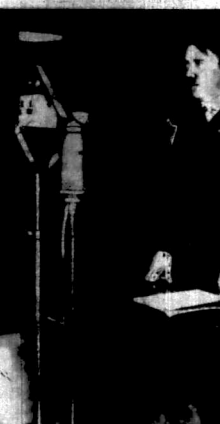

Land Trust Bill

The second Bill called the Native Trusts and Land Act creates a South African Native Trusts which will be merged the present Natal and Zululand Native Trusts...

It is recognized that the natives of South Africa have been handicapped for many years by the lack of sufficient land and the object of this Bill is to set aside certain areas where natives can maintain a reasonable standard of life and develop native institutions.

The policy of the Government separating land held by natives and European was recognised in the Native Land Act of 1913 and by this Act certain areas were scheduled as native areas.

The largest section was in the Cape Province, and land was also set aside in Natal, the Orange Free State and Transvaal. The total scheduled areas included all the existing native reserves and locations in the Union and land privately owned by natives for tribal purposes.

Under the Act however a commission, called the Beasom Commission, enquired what further areas could be set apart for native occupation, and its report in 1916 recommended the addition of a further 8,365,744 morgen—nearly 17,000,000 acres.

It was found, however, that when these proposals were referred to Parliament, and the Select Committee had taken a great deal of evidence, the Commission's recommendation could not be accepted in a whole, and various local committees were appointed throughout the Union to revise the Beasom Report. These local committees reported in 1918, and recommended that the additional land for natives should be only 7,521,226 morgen. Increases were proposed in the Cape and Transvaal, but in the province in Natal was reduced.

Increases were proposed in the province in Natal was reduced. The Bill was not proceeded with, but the situation was reconsidered by the Government in 1922, when it was agreed that pending further legislation the land recommended by these local committees should be held in trust for the natives who may be lease.

Further Land Granted

The present Bill follows generally the recommendations of the local committees, but proposes to add further areas of ground known as "released areas." It is hoped that this additional land amounting to 7,621,000 morgen, principally in the Transvaal and the Cape will make possible requirements and carry forward the development of natives and

Europeans on separate lines. It is also hoped that the addition to land reserved for natives will decrease points of contact and friction between the African and the European.

Changes which the Bill proposes will be introduced gradually over a period of years. The Trust which the Bill creates on behalf of the natives of South Africa, and in which will be vested all land set aside for natives will be administered by the Governor-General of the Union as Trustee for the benefit of the natives.

The Trust will also administer a fund to be called the South African Native Trust Fund, the income of which will be derived from such money as Parliament provides, and from rents and other profits accruing from native land. The fund is to be used for the purchase and development of native land for agricultural and pastoral improvement for the provision of advances to natives to develop their holdings and generally for the welfare of the African people.

Administration of Trust Fund

The Trust will also administer a fund to be called the South African Native Trust Fund, the income of which will be derived from such money as Parliament provides, and from rents and other profits accruing from native land. The fund is to be used for the purchase and development of native land for agricultural and pastoral improvement for the provision of advances to natives to develop their holdings and generally for the welfare of the African people.

Within the schedule or released areas this trust will have power to acquire land for native settlement to a total of 7,250,000 morgen or about 15,000,000 acres. The Government realizes that the rights of European owners in the schedule or released areas may be prejudiced, so the Bill provides that the owner of such land may call upon the Trust to buy it if he can prove that it cannot be sold at a reasonable price as it has become surrounded by native land.

The object of this is to enable the Trust gradually to buy up land in the areas and thereby secure a measure of separation of European and African.

It is to be a principle of the scheme that native settlement should be promoted on the land so acquired and that the European should confine himself to his own area. The limitations hitherto imposed on the purchase of land by natives will cease to exist in these areas.

The two bills arise out of investigations by a Joint Select Committee of Parliament on the native problem which was introduced by General Hertzog ten years ago but never applied.

Typical Requirements

The following are a few practical illustrations of the classes of enquiry handled at the Institute: The United Kingdom market prospects for semi silk cocoons were reported to the Director of Industries, Madras. By cooperation with the Calcutta universities and with the Imperial College of Science and Technology, South Kensington, semi silk from India has been established in the Gold Coast as a local industry.

Grading rules for standard sizes of Empire tin hardwoods have been drawn up and circulated with a view to developing the export of these timbers to the United Kingdom. The final form of the rules is now under consideration. In continuation of the Imperial Institute investigation of Empire fibres for marine cordage, the suitability of Empire seal for tarred rope manufacture has been reported on favourably by the Admiralty and the report, which was published by the Institute, points to the possible substitution of tarred seal rope for tarred rope of foreign hemp. New Zealand phosphorus fibre and Indian sun hemp were also the subject of enquiries and investigations.

Tung Oil

The question of the most suitable plant and process for obtaining tung oil from the seed of the tung tree, now being grown experimentally in many parts of the Empire, is under examination and some satisfactory results have been secured. Essential oils from the Sesquidilla and Kenya greaves in successful competition with foreign supplies. An Indian chemist is working in the Imperial Institute Laboratory on technical problems relating to shale. A report was issued during the year on the best method of preventing "blister" in East African hides, and a report was also issued on the spraying of East Indian hides with Kanex to prevent the Caneid hide leather from Somalia and is being tried out. Any Indian and Uganda hides likely to give equally good commercial results if treated by chemical process; and, if the answer is in the affirmative, this process is likely to give the best results. Any products of the Colonial Empire, at present regarded merely as waste vegetable matter, likely to prove useful as material for paper-making? Beans and beans, spines, olives and their oils, gums and resins, drugs, tanning materials and insecticides, all are grist to the Imperial Institute mill and all are the subject of events of steadily increasing encouragement either to scientific departments, primary producers or shippers of the Empire overseas, or to importers, merchants and manufacturers of the United Kingdom.

Minerals

Minerals are also well represented in this report. The Chemical and Metallurgical laboratories include sections for conducting assays for gold, etc., also look, tile and pottery investigations and cement-testing. Analytical, technical trials and commercial valuations are carried out on samples received from many parts of the Empire. Nineteen and seventeen samples of wall waters for analysis at the Institute during 1934 in order to ascertain the nature and amount of their mineral constituents. Crudeum from Tanganyika would be suitable for the United Kingdom market if carefully washed and graded. British Sengalium seed samples of ginseng and phosphoric rocks for analysis and report. Opium from Cyrena was examined and reported upon as being of good quality and suitable for commercial purposes. Tantalite specimens from Uganda and columbite from Nigeria were examined and reported on to the local Geological Survey Departments. The Gold Coast authorities received reports on various minerals including dyes, gold-bearing quartz and diamond-bearing gravels.

On the Intelligence side, the prospects of the ferro-chrome market were examined; and, in cooperation with the Forest Products Research Laboratory at Pinetown, Durban, a report was prepared on the preparation of charcoal as a fuel for portable gas producers in Southern Rhodesia. Australian gossanite suitable for commercial use as a water softener was looked into with a view to winning the market. Cinnamon felpax is in demand for the manufacture of artificial teeth. The offer in charge of mineral development in the Department of Mines of the Union Government of South Africa made tentative use of the Intelligence Section of the Imperial Institute during his visit to the United Kingdom last year. It is not yet fully realized in this country how varied and extensive are the different kinds of base minerals produced in the Union—the list includes manganese, asbestos, talc, mica, magnesite, corundum, mineral pigments and ores of iron, tungsten, chromium, vanadium and bismuth.

BRITAIN'S AIR DEFENCE PLANS

Important Statements in Parliament

FORCES TO BE DOUBLED IN TWO YEARS

New Types of Aircraft

FAR SUPERIOR TO ANY POSSESSED BY OTHER POWERS

While welcoming Herr Hitler's statement on foreign policy, Britain will continue with her plans for a greatly increased Air Force to reach parity with France which Germany says is her aim.

This is the substance of statements made in the House of Commons by Mr. Stanley Baldwin and Sir Philip Sassoon and in the House of Lords by the Air Minister, Lord Londonderry.

In two years' time Britain's Home Air Force will be practically double what it is at present and thousands of extra men will be employed. New types of aircraft are speedily being produced and it is claimed that they will be far superior to aircraft possessed by any other Power.

Mr. Baldwin made a plea for greater frankness regarding armaments between the Powers.

Thousands More Personnel

Lord Londonderry said that there were over 2,700 fully trained pilots on the active list, a further 400 in training and 1,200 on the Reserve. With regard to aircraft, Britain had new types already in an advanced stage which would be produced during the expansion of the Royal Air Force. By March 31, 1937, the strength of the Home Air Force would be 1,500 first-line machines as compared with the 850 at present. Additional pilots to the number of 2,500 would be required over 2,500 extra ground personnel.

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New Training Centres

Dealing with the training of personnel, he said that it had been decided to create six new Air Force training centres and to provide still further expansion of the civil aviation industry whereby the civil aviation industry would be used for the training of pilots. It was proposed to create in 1935-1936, seventy-one new squadrons instead of the twenty-five under the existing proposals. The cost would be formidable and a substantial supplement to the estimate would be necessary. He added that the Government now had in production a type of heavy bomber which they considered superior to any bomber owned by any other Power. The situation in regard to other types was satisfactory. He mentioned that Britain could expect within the next few weeks the delivery of new types of fighters which would show a remarkable advance on the performance of any fighters used elsewhere.

Approved

The House confirmed the Government's estimate by a vote of 340 to 20. The House also approved the Government's plan to create six new Air Force training centres and to provide still further expansion of the civil aviation industry whereby the civil aviation industry would be used for the training of pilots.

Opposition's View

Mr. C. B. Atlee (Labour) Deputy Leader of the Opposition, expressed the Labour Party's dissatisfaction with the Government's proposals which, he said, were not based upon a policy of disarmament and not rearmament. He argued that the Government's proposals should meet immediately to consider Herr Hitler's proposals. Sir Archibald Sinclair, for the Liberal Party, urged the Government to proceed with the Air Force which should include personnel having eventually to be trained to operate an International Air Force.

"The people of the British Empire, when celebrating Empire Day this year, will naturally have specially in mind the fact that their Majesty has reigned for 25 years."

Julius rearing will be general throughout the Empire and thoughts will turn to the numerous events which have marked these 25 years. First and foremost will be the realization of the fact that the different portions of our Empire, scattered all the world over and comprising many races, are bound together in the persons of Their Majesty and the Royal Family, so many members of which have visited all parts of the Empire during the last 25 years and have been welcomed everywhere with enthusiastic loyalty. The proofs of Unity of Empire so unmistakably manifested during the Great War, and followed up in peace time by such events as Imperial Conferences and the Ottawa Conference, will be in mind."

The courageous manner in which the Empire faced such difficult years of depression will be recalled with pride and satisfaction.

The wonderful results achieved by the conquest of the air during His Majesty's reign will be in our minds as well as the fact that the different parts of the Empire into infinitely close communication both for passengers and mails, while the advance of science in regard to aviation and telephony has made actual speech possible in every corner of the Empire. The natural effect of all this strengthened unity and closer feeling of comradeship, in a world-wide meeting in this specially significant year. I pray that the difficulties which still confront us may be met more bravely and that the standing together in strength and sympathy, we may keep the Empire that outstanding influence for peace and security that it has been in the past.

MUSOMA DISTRICT OF TANGANYIKA

Government Survey of Geological Features

POPULATION AND CLIMATE

AN interesting and comprehensive survey of the geology of the Musoma District is given in Bulletin No. 7 of the Tanganyika Geological Survey Department which has just been issued.

The census of 1921 revealed a native population of 149,200. The census of 1926 revealed a population of 160,000. The census of 1930 revealed a population of 170,000.

The geological mapping is the result of a number of years' work, and is particularly all-embracing in the Musoma District. The Musoma District is bounded on the north by the Italian and German frontiers, on the east by the Indian Ocean, on the south by the Tanganyika Territory, and on the west by the German frontiers.

The average yearly rainfall for 16 years for Musoma Town is 48.48 inches. The altitude of the district varies from 228 feet at lake level to 6,007 feet on Mt. Kenia. The district is generally a plateau with a considerable variation in rainfall.

The Musoma District is well populated by natives in the central and western parts, especially in the Musoma District. The eastern districts are almost uninhabited.

NEW UGANDA MINING LAW

PREVENTING SPECULATION: COMPENSATION FOR INJURY: LEASES: LAND RIGHTS

THE Bill for the Uganda Mining Ordinance, 1925, which repeals the 1923 Ordinance and the Amending Ordinances of 1922 and 1924, has been introduced into the Uganda Legislative Council.

Pressure is rising steadily over the whole of East Africa and the northeast trades continue moderate in strength. The cold zone which extended to the Government yesterday has receded to the Kenya area again and the sudden cold showers which occurred yesterday afternoon are not likely to be repeated.

The week's review: The weakening of pressure over the Indian Ocean, referred to in last week's report, continued between Wednesday, May 15, and Sunday, May 17. Westerly winds set in over the whole of East and Central Africa on Friday afternoon and heavy thunder showers occurred over the whole of the country...

The weather in the Highlands: The weather in the Highlands is generally similar to that in the Kenya area. Heavy rains continued until Sunday, May 19, when the south-east trades again freshened up with a general weakening of rain in the Highlands. These conditions are expected to continue until the end of the month.

It is probable that the south-east trades will again weaken on Sunday, May 19, when the beginning of next if, it is, the rain will diminish, but the westerly currents, which accompanied the present fast week, will set in again with consequent increase of instability over the Lake area and the Highlands of Kenya.

The distribution of rain in Kenya is indicated in the bulletin published in this issue. It will be noticed that the heaviest rainfall was in the mountain regions at Mombasa where 6 in. was recorded. Other heavy rainfalls were recorded in the Highlands. Thomson's Falls 4.74 in., Soroti 3.48 in., Eldoret 2.96 in., Lamuru 2.86 in. Along the Coast the heaviest rainfall was recorded at Malindi 3.39 in. and Mombasa 2.20 in.

In the coffee growing areas Mombasa recorded 1.74 in. Nyeri 1.15 in., Boma 1.22 in., Kisumu 1.14 in. and Thika 0.68 in.

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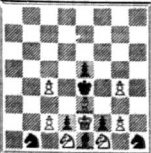

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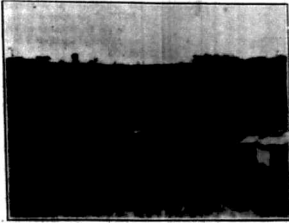

north-west of the town and slopes towards the south-east from this reservoir there are numerous small streams, and Nairobi should obtain its water supply from one of these, for these streams all rise at heights which would enable their water to gravitate to the town. They therefore constitute the natural source of supply for Nairobi.

The obstacles being that the catchment areas are native reserves and the riparian rights had to be conserved, these however have now been overcome to the satisfaction of all concerned and compensation water will be provided as and when required.

We have now arrived at the point that a decision having been come to as to the best method of supply it was necessary to obtain the Government's approval of the scheme and

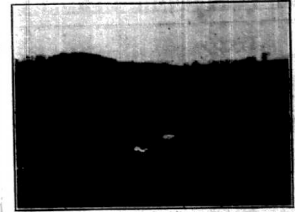
allow the Council to make substantial profits on the sale of water to them. Therefore, at the end of 1935 there will be an amount of about £20,000 in a special water reserve fund which will be used to defray a portion of the capital cost of the new undertaking.

Many if not all these difficulties have now been overcome, and the final report issued by the Council based on the recommendations of Messrs. Howard Humphreys and Son who paid a high tribute to the Council's consultants and Municipal Engineers whose report dated June 13, 1934, is being translated into action.

The new source of supply will be constructed as before mentioned, from the Ruiru River at a point of intake just below the confluence of the Ruiru and the Kamati.

A New Reservoir

An imposing reservoir will be constructed at the point of intake and the water conveyed through 15 miles of nine inch piping to service reservoirs situated at the Hill and the Scott Laboratory, having first passed through a water purification treatment, and then distributed to consumers. The capacity of the imposing reservoir

It is interesting to know that the latest analysis of the treated water is entirely satisfactory and the town can be assured of a pure water supply.

In the final recommendations of the consultant engineers a twelve inch pipe was recommended, but the Municipal Engineer suggested that for the present a nine inch pipe would be sufficient for the demands of the next 15 years, and when that period had expired it would be simple and inexpensive to install in the same trenches a considerable amount of purchasing ability.

It is hoped that no further delay will occur in carrying out the scheme which has had the consideration of experts from 1920 and which in all respects is now highly desirable of immediate completion. The construction of the necessary works will give employment to many and will distribute in Kenya a considerable amount of purchasing ability. It must be of considerable satisfaction to all those who have been intimately acquainted with the development of the scheme to realize now that at no distant date the accomplishment of their labours will be achieved.

MANY DIFFICULTIES NOW OVERCOME

It always seems to be a peculiar incidence of public thought that matters of vital interest to the community do not receive the consideration they deserve. Water supply, which is one of the essentials of life force, is accepted as an everyday occurrence in comparison with the vital amenities of our surroundings. It therefore may be of interest to delve into the history of the Nairobi water supply, and ascertain what steps have been taken during the existence of the town to prepare for the requirements of the population for water, wholesome and sufficient supply of the main item in their subsistence.

They laid a pipe line and brought the water to tanks built on Nairobi Hill, which is now known as waterworks reserve, and distributed the supply throughout the town area of Nairobi. This reserve of over 100 million gallons was used by the Nairobi Corporation for the same purpose upon which they have built a million gallon steel tank.

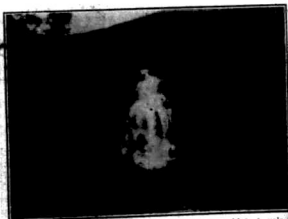

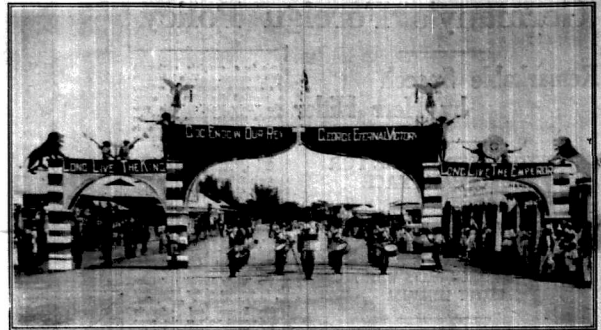

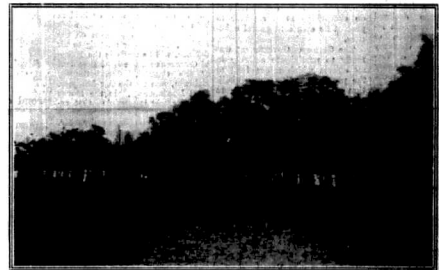

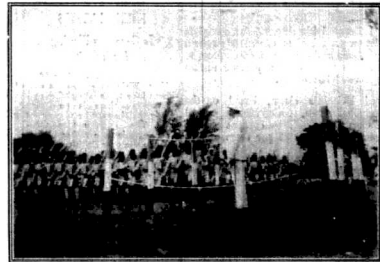

Germany's Foreign Policy

Remarkable Speech by Herr Hitler

REITERATED DESIRE FOR EUROPEAN PEACE

No Wish for Domination

NON-AGGRESSION PACTS WITH ALL EXCEPT LITHUANIA

In a two and a half hours' speech to the Reichstag on Tuesday night Herr Hitler outlined his country's foreign policy.

The German leader reiterated his demand for complete equality as a condition precedent to Germany's return to the League of Nations and expressed his desire to conclude non-aggression pacts with any other nation with the sole exception of Lithuania.

Herr Hitler recognized Britain's claim, based on the latter's Imperial responsibilities, to a dominating naval position and said Germany would be content with a fleet of a total tonnage equal to 35 per cent. of that of Britain.

Germany was prepared to negotiate with a view to entering an Air Convention as has been proposed by Britain and France and was willing to agree to any limitation of armaments leading to the abolition of heavy artillery, tanks and submarines.

The Sanctity of Treaties

Herr Hitler in a momentous speech in the Reichstag tonight... He reiterated his demand for complete equality as a condition precedent to Germany's return to the League of Nations and expressed his desire to conclude non-aggression pacts with any other nation with the sole exception of Lithuania.

Non-Aggression Pacts

Germany was ready on principle to conclude non-aggression pacts with individual neighbours and to supplement them by any stipulations aiming at isolating those engaged in war and in inciting them to war.

Desire for Peace

Herr Hitler spoke for 145 minutes. He stressed Germany's desire for peace and said Germany believed first of all in the gradual abolition of military armaments and methods of warfare which were contrary to the Red Cross.

Austrian Relations

He criticized the Franco-Soviet alliance and said that the interpretation of it as Germany considered military alliances incompatible with the spirit and letter of the Statute of the League of Nations.

Air Convention

The German Government was ready to participate in a treaty of collective-operation which was an addition to the League pact signed in an Air Convention which had entered into negotiations with that end in view.

Sea and Air Fleets

The verbatim report of the speech shows that Hitler asked Germany to be a first step of the British total tonnage which he pointed out, would leave the German fleet at 35 per cent. below the tonnage of the French fleet.

No Sea Entry

Herr Hitler emphasized that Germany had no intention of entering into rivalry on the sea as it regarded the absolute basis for a complete settlement with Germany.

FRENCH VIEWS Is Germany Playing for Time?

Paris, May 22. Herr Hitler's speech was considered here to be remarkably conciliatory but there is an opinion prevailing that he is playing for time. The Parisian newspapers are generally sceptical and especially Britain must reply in the same spirit. The speech must be the starting point of a reasonable discussion.

CABINET CONSIDERATION Air Defence Plans to Go Forward

London, May 22. The Cabinet has considered the text of Herr Hitler's speech and it is understood that the full text of the speech was considered and discussed at the Cabinet held at Downing Street this morning. This afternoon important decisions on defence will be held in both House of Commons and the House of Lords.

ROYAL DRIVE IN SOUTH LONDON Intense Loyal Enthusiasm

London, May 18. South London was "on fire" to-day on the occasion of Their Majesties making the second of their four Jubilee drives in the different Metropolitan areas. The nine mile route was profusely decorated and Their Majesties were accorded a full-throated welcome from the assembled thousands of people.

SPECIAL CEREMONY AT CAMBERWELL GREEN Devaluation Not Regarded as a Solution

London, May 17. A warning that Germany's "positive working-out policy will have to come to an end very soon" was given today in a speech by Count Schwerin von Krosigk, the Minister for Finance, who has just returned to duty after a nervous breakdown.

WAR MINISTER Supreme Command of Armed Forces

Berlin, May 21. A new law which is signed by Herr Hitler, General von Blomberg and Dr. Frick, Minister of the Interior, the main features of which are the creation of a War Minister with supreme command of the armed forces, second only to Herr Hitler, the chief of the period of military service of the conscripts, and the principle that women conscripts will be obliged to serve the Patriotic League for a time, and the exclusion of persons from the army.

London, May 22. The King and Queen will go to the City of London to-night to attend the Jubilee Ball which the Lord Mayor and the Corporation are giving in their honour. Ten thousand guests will be invited. The Royal Family will be present.

JUBILEE TRUST FUND Subscribers Reach Total of £750,000

London, May 18. Subscribers to the King George Jubilee Trust Fund for the assistance of the youth organisations now amount to about £750,000. British Official Wireless Service.

Conscription of Financial Resources

DRASTIC STEP BY ITALIAN GOVERNMENT

To Meet Expenditure SEVERE PENALTIES FOR BREACHES OF NEW LAW

Rome, May 21. A Decree is published to-day conscripting all the country's financial resources to meet Government expenditure.

It especially refers to Italian citizens and provides that within twenty days all foreign stocks belonging to individuals must be handed to the banks for the account of the National Institute of Foreign Exchanges.

In the case of stock deposited with banks abroad it is understood the banks will be asked to substitute the name of the Banca d'Italia for the name of the holders except in the case of collateral securities required for trade or to guarantee bank overdrafts.

Penalties for infringement of the law will be the forfeiture of bonds and imprisonment up to a year.

SILVER COINS WITHDRAWN

All silver coins will be withdrawn from circulation in Italy and replaced by coins made of cheap white metal, according to a decree to be published shortly, the object of which is to enable the Government to take advantage of the high price of silver and obtaining larger reserves of foreign currencies.
