Good Characterisation

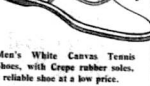

by J. Miller, who portrays expertly well the character.



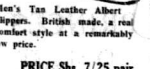

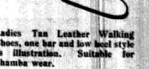

A Pointer to Prosperity? INCREASED IMMIGRATION LAST YEAR

LOWEST POINT IN DEPRESSION SAID TO BE SEPTEMBER, 1931

That there are few better indices of the increasing prosperity in Kenya, following the long depression, than the return in increasing numbers of the people who were driven out by the depression, is the opinion expressed by the Statistician in his Annual Report on immigration for 1934.

The report provides data in support of the belief that the lowest point in the depression was September, 1931 and that improvement, gradual at first, but later more pronounced, dates from that time.

Among the interesting facts disclosed by the report is that for the past eleven years the number of visitors to the Colony has been increasing steadily and that last year they numbered 3,159, of whom by far the largest proportion were Europeans. 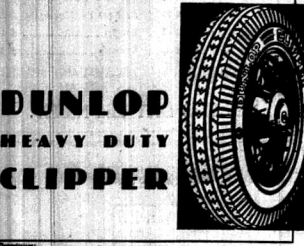

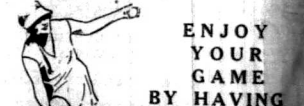

GERMAN AND GREEK VIEWS

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard,"
Sir—I take this opportunity to
thank you for the ready hospitality
extended to me in the columns of
your most valuable paper, a hospi-
tality and indulgence to foreign
opinion true to one of the finest
traits in British character. It is
traps on your kindness when I
ask leave to reply "British" to
through the same medium? If
I should not have responded to
his letter, for, I believe, a reply
is not really necessary, were it not
for the acknowledgment that
"Jotwika" is a Greek. Not that
I am any way in a hurry to admit
to a member of the most honor-
able white nation, but I do not
like the idea that I should have
given rise to suppositions by
"British" of a nationality I do not
belong to. I feel sorry that I
I beg to apologise herewith to the
Greek incidentally, are quite capable
to voice their own opinion on the
matter under review, and they
will do it when they choose.

"British" does not mean the
absence of my letter to say extent.
His reply is more an appeal to
thankfulness to a superior bene-
ficer of British race, than anything
else. He does wrong, rather than
right, and that, not because, as
to speak, personal, embarrassing
to the Greek, but that he has
not derived from the war what
he only took natural advantage
of conditions created by the
war, but among other European
nations. The picture he presents
of present Tanganyika is distorted,
besides, it has nothing to do with
the actual achievements effected
by the Germans in this colony
during their comparatively short
rule, achievements which are ad-
mirable and which still form the
backbone of the country.

Given vent to my feelings as re-
gards the future of Tanganyika in
my letter to you of May 1, I was
thinking from a purely East African
point of view, irrespective of na-
tionality or national preference,
the point at issue being Tan-
ganyika before all.

If I were to speak as a German,
which I am, I could advance so
many more very good and excel-
lent reasons why Germany should
and most probably will get back
Tanganyika. Apart from the
soundness of her claim on this
country, I believe in British fair-
ness and love of justice. Reading
history, I find that the British
patricians and technicians as they
are, have always ceded to a real case
a case with a basis of justice. Well,
here is a case, so good and true
as can be. Germany was deprived
of her colonies not because, to
remember well, the Allies had won
the war, but because the war
psychology which is responsible
for a great part of the Peace
Treaty, would have it that she
was not able to colonise a ground
which has been found untenable
since the world has come on its
feet again. She was not con-
sidered dignified to take part
in the education and the civilising
of backward races—a nation de-
scribed in English press books on
geography as "one of the most
educated nations in the world."

This stigma has to be removed
before she can set down again in
the council of nations.
"The thought of being such a

fine piece of country as Tan-
ganyika must always be con-
sidered to the patriotic British, but
his innate sense of justice and his
will to conquer it in the end
is yours etc."

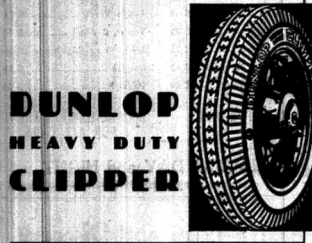

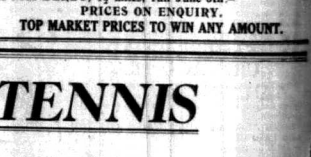

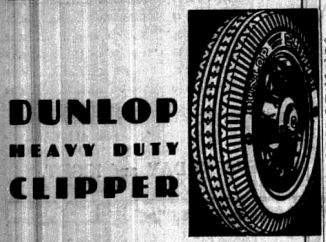
