SURPRISE IN THE NEW LIST OF CABINET POSTS

Mr. Malcolm Macdonald

LIKELY TO BE SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLONIES

Mr. Ramsay Macdonald is expected to resign to-morrow after the House rises at 4 p.m. for the Whitehouse recess.

Immediately afterwards Mr. Stanley Baldwin will be summoned to Buckingham Palace and will hand to the King his list of Ministers.

Mr. Baldwin's list is expected to be as follows, but entire accuracy cannot be guaranteed—

Secretary for India - The Marquess of Zetland. Secretary for the Colonies - Mr. J. H. Thomas. Secretary of State for Air - Mr. Malcolm Macdonald. Minister for Health - Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister. President of the Board of Education - Mr. Oliver Stanley. Minister for Agriculture and Fisheries - Mr. Walter Elliott. Minister for Labour - Mr. Ernest Brown. Lord Privy Seal - Marquis of Londonderry. Minister without Portfolio - Mr. Anthony Eden.

It is understood that Sir Philip Cunliffe-Lister may receive a peerage.

Mr. Anthony Eden, it is stated, will continue his work at the Foreign Office, while holding his position as Minister without Portfolio.

Mr. R. A. Butler, the Under Secretary for India will remain in his present post and be the sole representative of the India Office in the House of Commons.

RIGHT OF DOMINIONS TO DECIDE

Important Judgments

FREE AND EQUAL PARTNERS IN THE BRITISH COMMONWEALTH

[BY WIRELESS.]

Rugby, June 7. Two cases in which judgments were given, one from Canada and one from the Irish Free State, confirmed the legal rights of two Dominions to prohibit appeals to the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council from the Dominions.

These judgments give final authority to the effectiveness of the Statute of Westminster of 1931, which was to remove every vestige of restriction on the legislative powers of the Dominions. They make it clear that the Dominions are in fact free and equal partners in the British Commonwealth of Nations, and that their Governments and Parliaments have the legal right to enact what legislation they choose without any control from the Government and Parliament of Great Britain.

"The Times" says: "So far as appeals to the King-in-Council are concerned it is safe to say that the right, regarded in most of the Dominions as a valuable safeguard, is now in less danger of being curtailed by Dominion legislation than it was before these judgments recognised the legal competence of the Dominions to restrict or abolish it as they think fit."—British Official Wireless Service.

"There is another matter to which we desire to refer," they concluded. "It appears that the submission made by the advocate for the appellant had no case had been made out against him, if the evidence had been taken in the manner in which it was taken."

"In our opinion this is a private matter before him whether or not, the accused is guilty of the charge, and he is not entitled to have another judge upon the trial of a different case, which, if they are unfavorable to the accused, most injuriously affect the mind of the Magistrate to his detriment."

Immunary Secretary to the Board of Education.

Mr. Oliver Stanley the second son of the Earl of Derby has been Conservative M.P. for Westmoreland since 1924. He was a lecturer on the formation of the National Government he was appointed Under Secretary for Home Affairs and later became Minister for Transport. Last year he entered the Cabinet as Minister for Labour. He is 59 years of age.

Mr. Ernest Brown has represented Leeds as a Liberal since 1927 and is now a member of the Simon Group of the party. He formerly sat for Rugby from 1923-24. Mr. Brown served in the Somerset's Battalion during the War and was awarded the M.C. On the formation of the National Government he was appointed Parliamentary Secretary to the Ministry of Health and in 1932 became Secretary for Mines and was responsible for averting a miners' strike in 1934.

**The Marquis of Londonderry** who now becomes Lord Privy Seal has been Secretary of State for Ireland since 1931. Previously he was Under Secretary for Air, 1929 and 1931. First Commissioner of Works from 1929-30 and again for three months in 1931. He was Minister for Education in the Northern Ireland Government from 1921-26. As Viscount Castlerough he sat in the House of Commons for Madingley as Conservative from 1906 to 1915.

**MUNICIPAL RATES**  
**A First Charge on Rateable Property**

For some time past the Nairobi Municipal Council has urged upon the Government that the Local Government (Rating) Ordinance, 1928, should be amended so as to provide that rates payable to a local authority shall be a first charge upon rateable property. It is now proposed, in a Bill to amend the 1928 Ordinance, to make them a first charge, subject to the rights of the Crown, for 12 years.

The position at present is that rates are partially secured by a section of the Local Government (Municipalities) Ordinance, 1928, which forbids the registration of any transfer of property unless rates for the preceding three years have been paid. This form of security is only completely effective if local authorities possess adequate means of enforcing payment before the expiration of the period of three years. Such enforcement is not always possible, as, for example, where property is subject to a mortgage and its value is less than the amount of the mortgage, or where the mortgagor has been allowed The Council has represented that a considerable sum of money has been lost on account of rates which could not be recovered under the present system of enforcement.

In addition to this first charge, now made, the amending Ordinance must provide that every reasonable effort has been made to obtain the amount due from the owner or mortgagee of the land before it makes any order for attachment and sale.

These provisions are not to have retrospective effect.

The Amending Ordinance also makes clear the position of land reserved for such purposes as hospitals, schools, and other public works, and other public purposes.

It was the intention that the Governor in Council should have power to exempt such land from the operation of the Rating Ordinance, but doubts have arisen whether the original Ordinance intended conveyed such powers. The granting of powers is now made clear.

**IMPROVEMENT IN BRITAIN'S HEALTH**  
**Physically Fitter Than 25 Years Ago**

**CHIEF CAUSES**

London, May 29. [STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.] In spite of the age and the subsequent industrial depression, it is one of the most striking facts of King George V's reign that we witness a remarkable all-round increase in the nation's health. This is not only manifested in the comparative longer expectation of life that insurance and other statistics have shown to be the case, but in the gradual disappearance of diseases that were common from 25 to 50 years ago.

The amelioration of other diseases by medical research and discovery and the comparatively much better physique in terms of height and weight of the modern boy and girl so compared with their predecessors a generation ago are other notable advances. The occurrence of young girls is now hardly to be met with, and the modern medical student finds that his training without having seen an example of a stout, middle-aged and elderly as evidenced in chalky knuckles and varicose legs has also become so rare as almost to be a curiosity, and the concomitant of some of the old-fashioned and middle-aged men and women so frequently to be met with.

Pulmonary tuberculosis and tuberculosis of joints and other organs have also shown a steady decrease in incidence, and the same may be said of rickets.

**Importance of Diet**

Many causes have contributed to this beneficial result. A higher standard of living and a more instructed knowledge of diet and the importance of its vitamins, content have been largely responsible. Better clothes and housing conditions, the use of sunlight, exercise, fresh air, sensible clothing and the early attention to teeth, tonsils and nasal defects in children have also borne fruit.

COMMISSIONER'S REVIEW OF 1934 ACTIVITIES

In a preface to his annual report on the work of His Majesty's Eastern African Dependencies' Trade and Information Office, London, from January 1 to December 31 last year, the Commissioner, Major C. H. Dale, O.B.E., gives a short review of the progress of the work and co-ordination which has taken place recently in East Africa from the agricultural, production and marketing points of view.

"The necessity for the closest possible co-ordination and co-operation among the various Government departments of the three northern administrations in Eastern Africa is now generally recognized both by officials and officials," he states. "Practical results have been attained in co-ordination of customs, post, office, research, and other services, and the Conference of Eastern African Governors affords standing proof that co-operation is no mere phase."

Coffee Problems

"I do not think, however," adds Major Dale, "that the general public is aware of the very large areas which have been planted during the last few years, and the fact that, during the last year, only one-third of the crop was marketed in this country, but for co-operation and for the benefit of the countries concerned, it is a territory with the appropriate assistance in a neighbouring territory. "This is in question of the law applicable here as the Indian Contract Act, the English decisions do apply, and that, by Section 19 of the Act, a contract procured by misrepresentation is not void but only voidable, and is not voidable when the party alleging that it was misled had the means of discovering the truth by ordinary diligence..."

"In my judgment this case is governed by the decision in Dawson v. Boinin I would respectfully adopt, with a slight but very material variation the concluding words of Lord Wrenbury's speech..."

"I cannot agree that this case is governed by Section 19 of the Indian Contract Act; that would be so if there were no express provision in the contract itself. By the proposal the plaintiff stated, 'I hereby warrant that the above statements and particulars are true and that I have not suppressed, misrepresented or misstated any material fact...'"

Capt. Kirton said that the problem of the existing and increasing number of planters' debts was only too well known in the District. They all knew their creditors also knew that unless there was a series of good seasons and a return to former price levels there was very little if any hope of ever paying off the existing debt.

Capt. Malins Smith proposed that the Coffee Board be urged to advertise the sale of honger coffee. He said that he had received information from London that many people had been unable to purchase the product because the retailers had no knowledge of its existence...

Capt. Kirton proposed: That the Conference while welcoming the fact that Government is affording a certain measure of relief to agriculture by the application of the Agricultural Mortgage Relief Bill during the past 12 months, believes that the bill is far too limited in its operation and offers protection only against vultures foreclosing whereas the circumstances of emergency existing to day are such that the Government should be given wider powers to refuse foreclosure orders.

Over 504 entries were made in the employment register. No accurate record was possible under this heading, but in spite of the bad times newspapers still continued to come out to East Africa to take up definite posts. These included 35 men, women and dependants to Kenya; 52 men to Northern Rhodesia; one man to Nyasaland; nine men to Tanganyika; and seven men to Uganda.

The Railway

Included in the publication is a special report on the working of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Section of His Majesty's Eastern African Dependencies' Trade and Information Office, the London Representative (Mr. W. 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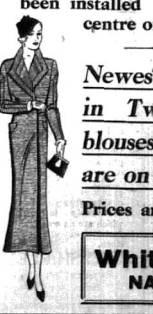

Noel Coward is the most brilliant of all our young ones of the theatre. He has that useful kind of genius that allows him to make a success of almost anything he does everything he touches. It was a foregone conclusion that, deciding by way of a change to be a film star, he should justify in every way his ambition. "The Snows" at the Plaza is not a great picture, since many sets seem indifferent, but Coward is altogether good in it. The main merit of the film is its unusually clever, if ultra-sophisticated and cynical, dialogue. It is made in the manner of a lot of Coward's own writings. Small wonder he speaks with such consummate ease and naturalness. Proving opposite him is a remarkably beautiful little artist named Julie Haydon. I shall look forward to seeing her again.

In "Passport to Fama" (Empire) Edward G. Robinson is in a role which packs laughs. The idea is the same as the film at the Empire recently—a simple little clerk being mistaken for a public enemy, with resulting comedy and a spice of melodrama. Joan Arthur is the girl. The film moves rapidly—and keeps you laughing. Ideal stuff for a bright evening.

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# The Coffee Industry in Tanganyika

## PROPOSED FORMATION OF GROWERS' ASSOCIATION

### Advisory Board's Manifesto

#### REPRESENTATIVE ORGANISATION RECOMMENDED FOR WHOLE COUNTRY

As a meeting of the Tanganyika Coffee Advisory Board held at Moshi, it has been decided that the Board had now fulfilled its functions and that an extension of its activities was unnecessary. In its place it was suggested that a Coffee Association, representative of growers, be formed.

A manifesto has been circulated setting out the recommendations as to the basis upon which the Association should be formed.

It was suggested that branches be formed with a central office. It was also suggested that every effort be made to present to the Government the "Ordinance for the Advancement and Control of the Coffee Industry."

### An Organising Committee

Progress towards the formation of a territorial Coffee Growers' Association for Tanganyika was given a fresh impetus at the last (and final) meeting of the Coffee Advisory Board held in Moshi, under the Chairmanship of the Director of Agriculture, Mr. E. H. Harrison.

The members of the Coffee Advisory Board, after having been informed of the difficulties which stood in the way of incorporating the Tanganyika coffee industry in a combined body with the western African growers in other areas of Tanganyika, accepted a proposal that the Board should after a lengthy discussion recommend to the coffee industry of the territory a scheme for the establishment of a territorial body, representative of coffee growers.

### ELGON BUFFALO Unexpected Visitors to a Farm

The following is the text of the manifesto which has now been issued:

(1) The Board considers that as an Advisory Board it has already fulfilled its functions and that an extension of its activities was unnecessary. What is required now is a Coffee Board established under statute for the whole Territory except Italo.

(2) The Board recommends to the coffee industry that every effort should be made to implement the recommendations given in the report of the Coffee Advisory Board and to the maintenance of the Board and its relations with the industry.

### Problem of Titles of Former Ruler Properties

During the last session of the Convention of Associations held at Moshi the problem of some of the relief for Tanganyika farmers, on the model of the Kenya Agricultural Advances Relief Ordinance was advocated by a special delegate.

The Chinese Government complains that it has complied with the demands of the Japanese government, but it is understood that, contrary to hope, the Japanese military authorities at Nanking regard the Chinese measures as unsatisfactory.

It is believed that the departure of the Japanese garrison from Tientsin, due to relief by new forces, has been postponed. Thus the strength of the Japanese forces in North China has been doubled.

China has already yielded to the Japanese demand for the removal of General Hasegawa, Governor of Chihli, who has been transferred to the province of Szechwan.

A recent General Notice in the Gazette states that no further extension of time after 1930 will be granted for exercising the option to freshen up the land.

The much-needed native dispensary was again discussed, and it is hoped that the authorities will see their way to providing it.

The question of most inspection was also discussed. Mr. Helien was asked to the Township Committee.

The Jubilee commemorative medals unfortunately arrived too late for distribution on Jubilee Day, but were presented on June 10.

## The Monetary Factor in Depression

### IN DEFENCE OF THE BANKS

To the Editor "E.A. Standard,"  
Sir,—I have read with interest the correspondence which has appeared in your columns regarding the monetary factor in depression. Your contribution expresses a diversity of opinions, but none for the most part to be agreed that the Banks are the villains of the piece. Most of the arguments put forward against the present banking system are more forcible than accurate, and a careful perusal of one or more of the following would help towards clearer thinking and a more realistic appreciation of the intricacies of the economic structure which is making and credit play so important a part.

"Principles of Economics" (Marshall).

"Banking" (Walter Leaf).  
These are only a few of the immense number of standard works on the subject, but they will help to put the intelligent enquirer on the road to a proper understanding which he is not likely to obtain by the reading of such various effusions as appeared in your issue under the heading of "The Monetary Factor" and "The Banks' Role."

I do not propose to deal with all that falls in the way of the subject, but two statements cannot remain unchallenged.  
(1) He says, inter alia, "The Bank of England restricts the money supply by raising the Bank Rate. The million counters of main find they have only enough wages (once the raised Bank Rate has produced its effect) to buy 1,000,000 bags of maize (instead of 2,000,000 bags)."  
Apart from the crude illustration given, the underlying principle gives a distorted view of the working of the Bank Rate, and wholly ignores the essential theory of value which determines the price of commodities from the side of demand as well as of supply. The raising or lowering of the Bank Rate, prior to the War, operated mainly to protect a country's gold reserves, at a time when most industrial countries were on the gold standard and there was equilibrium of internal price levels. To-day, admittedly, with changed conditions, the Bank Rate has lost some of its significance which makes it even more incomprehensible why it influences fluctuations in wage levels. A rise in the Bank Rate still operates to encourage depositors and discourage borrowers, and a fall in the Bank Rate has the contrary effect, but the Rate has remained at an unprecedentedly low level for some years, and industry generally has been unable to utilize the plentiful supply of cheap money which has been available.

(2) Further in his letter "Pyrgyz" draws a remarkable picture of the conditions of poverty existing immediately after the War, and presumably we are about this condition which would have continued had not the arch villains of the Cunliffe Committee



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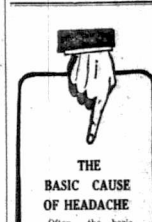

The Testator's Intention "But the question for me is not what was the opinion of the trustees as to the meaning of the will, but what was the testator's intention as expressed or implied..."

A Contingent Legacy "In the first place it is, I think, clear that the legacy bequeathed by C. S. Pitt is a contingent legacy because payable to him only in the event of his living for two years after he had been admitted to practice as a doctor of medicine of Ontario..."

"In the present case we have a contingent legacy to C. S. Pitt, the income from which is to go to him pending the happening of the contingency, and therefore on the authority of the law it should be inferred, but the argument is that this inference is negated by the words of the will and that the provision that, when the contingency happens, the trustees are to pay the capital or to hand over the investments' assets to a positive direction to them not to appropriate..."

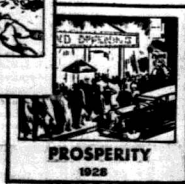

enquiries were for the whole of East Africa, but a large proportion of them concerned Kenya. During the year a programme of advertising was carried out, and a considerable portion of the funds allotted for the purpose was devoted to the production and circulation of two brochures—one on travel and sport and one on settlements. These brochures were furnished to the best firms in advertisement, having regard to the limited funds available.

The settlement brochure, Col. Keage states, "is being read at a very opportune moment, in respect of the offers about to be introduced owing to the War Block." Up to the end of last year 27,000 copies of the travel brochure had been distributed from his office. (The settlement brochure was reissued early this year.) East Africa Annals were distributed to various London clubs and suitable waiting rooms.

A Warning. Early in August, Col. Keage visited his head. ere to show our leader to them. They would starve. In addition to that, it is important to remember that the tribes living in the Protectorates are situated to follow living within our borders and both the Protectorates natives are unable to understand the arbitrary boundaries which separate metropolises of the same tribe. I can say that the Union stands to gain very little materially from incorporating the Protectorates and as a matter of fact it is far cheaper than strongly opposed to incorporation. It argues that in the Protectorates land is cheaper than in the Union and should the Protectorates be embodied in the Union on an equal footing, it would mean that our cattle farmers would be put in competition with cheap livestock across the borders of the Protectorates. It is, therefore, that there is a strong objection to incorporation from sections of our own people.

British Opinion. "In spite of this, however, it is the opinion of those who are in the best position to be taken. One realizes, of course, that the position is not fully understood yet by the general public and in my personal opinion the matter should not be unduly pressed until such time as we have been able to put the case clearly before the British people. There is an idea across the water that we will treat the natives, just as in the Great War, the opinion of the British people thought that the German soldier by preference who was sent to a Belgian colony settled on his land, but the natives being ill-treated, they took to the mountains, and the trouble is kept there. It comes not only from the Protectorates, but from Portuguese territory, and even from Southern Rhodesia because of the good conditions and good wages obtaining in the Union. If they were habitually ill-treated in South Africa, they would hardly come to us in such numbers. We have an average 15,000 prohibited immigrants per annum within our borders, consisting of natives who are so eager to come and work inside the Union that they make their way through the most complicated and costly machinery. It seems to me that this is a complete reply to the charge of ill usage of natives in South Africa. I repeat that the Protectorates are not completely independent upon economically that if we did not allow them to come in and send our machines to them they would starve. The position in fact is that we allow Protectorates to come to us, and Africa where they compete with our own natives and if we were to

He also raised the question as to whether people in that district would come to them, and then the place to which they preferred to go in the event of the hotel selling liquor. He referred to Major Biddell.

Major Biddell contended that the question he was to be decided in relation to the provisions of the new liquor laws. He contended that a special regard being there to the clause requiring that there should be a real need for the sale of liquor in a particular locality.

He produced his books to show the extent of his liquor trade during the past few years, claiming that his sales were covered the cost of his licence. He said that he had received £40, while last year he paid £25. On the occasion of the meeting, he had catered for as many as 200 people a day as regards tea. He said that his business with great success for the past four years. There was no demand for drink in the locality.

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir.—To one Englishman, at least, the strictures of yourself and your correspondent with the old signature in your issue of April 1935 on the alleged misuse of the forbidden words "English" and "English" seem singularly ill-founded.

The terrible words "British" and "British" to which our English have little historical claim, are much disliked by them and only used out of, as I think, an altogether too deferential servility to the dominant nation; but if they still sometimes dare to talk about a King of England, the words are only used—a little, wisely perhaps—to recall happier days of independence, when there was such a King and when they had the free use of their own language. It is surely a venial indulgence if I do not think an Englishman would grade a corresponding one to others, were their positions reversed—and most of them know their place too well now ever to dream of calling a Scotch- or Welsh-man an Englishman, or of making any special claim as the King.

The use of one of the prohibited words is not, as you have noted in your column, but before insult to his creed, and the curious reference by two leading "Sceptator" to "their" King, would not be of course have to be altered to "Great Britain" elsewhere. The Irish, with their usual good sense and independence, have always refused to be included in the latter-also mongrel title "British".  
I am glad to see, in another place, that you still use the word Persian and Persia in spite of recent orders to change them to Iranian and Iran; but I believe you are Scotch, and so doubtless do not feel that respectful readiness to mutate ever languages at the orders of anybody, which my own countrymen so regretfully show.

**INDIANS IN KENYA: THE HIGHLANDS**

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir.—The question has more than once been asked: "What is the proportion of the products of the Colony produced by the European and those produced by the Indian?"  
The asking of this question is tantamount to asking the Indian community why the latter, the question that should be asked is "Why do the Indians not produce as much of the products of the Colony as they are capable of?"  
Taking agricultural products, the Indians have been engaged in agricultural pursuits produce more than the European and the small number of Indians engaged in land and Indian farmers, and comparing their ratio of the area developed with that of European land and landowner, it will be found that while Indians have developed their land to about full extent, the white settlers have left 80 per cent. of land in their possession entirely uncultivated. The unscientific handling of this vast area in European hands is one of the main factors in the present high plight of the Colony.  
Kenya is an agricultural country that is so; its productive capacity of land. An unscrupulous and a facile amateur have deprived the Indian community of the freedom to own and develop this vast wealth, which consists of the extensive Highlands area. 70% of its good and fertile area has been used in inefficient and penurious fashion. The Indians could naturally contribute anything towards the production of its wealth. The contribution towards the production of the surplus which the Indian community is therefore still in the womb of the future, still has great possibilities. The Indian has shown his capacity, and a wise administration will take measures to free that capacity into wealth. But produced wealth must be gathered together and marketed. For years together his work was done by the Indians. To-day, of course, with increased facilities and power the service rendered by Indians in this work is being made light of and co-operative agencies are being given birth to; but the pioneer work of the Indian community has created a vested right which cannot be ignored.  
The Indians and households of Kenya are very largely Indian, there are open to the Indians,

But those are neither capital nor wealth in their present condition. Besides the policy of the non-official European community and the Government does not encourage Indian capital to be invested in Kenya. In fact there is no security that the investment in India will be properly applied to Kenya. They are certainly not being safeguarded properly to-day. Unfortunately the substitution of Kenya in encouraging Indian and African production and it must wait till the present position changes.

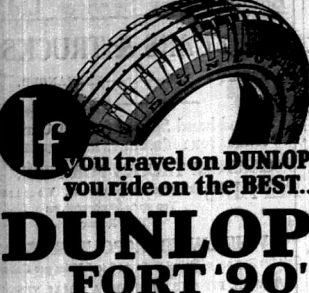

## CHINA CAPTIVES TO JAPAN

### A Stern Decree

Nanking, June 10. The implicit suspension of the anti-Japanese boycott throughout China has been decreed by the Central Government following the acceptance of the Japanese demands.

The decree requires the people not to take action, and to express no opinion tending to provoke ill-feeling with foreign nations. They are also forbidden to form organizations with objects prejudicial to China's international relations.

"It is especially important that we should be friendly toward our neighbors," adds the decree, which threatens severe punishment for any violation of the orders.

### INDIAN RUNS AMOK

Exciting Time at Kampala

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT.]  
Kampala, June 10.

It is not often that Kampala has a little battle all of its own but this happened on Saturday morning when an Indian ran amok. About half past seven he apparently went down to his office and built a barricade of packing cases and shop fittings around his door. By eight o'clock he had completed this and was making about inside with a rifle looking for trouble. The first unfortunate victim was a fawn who came within and was immediately "potted" with a shot through the neck, bringing him to the ground. After that the street emptied in a miraculously short space of time and the unfortunate fawn could not be seen as when anyone showed himself a bullet drove him back to shelter.

### Pelico Fired at

Capt. Roberts, Superintendent of Police arrived on the scene in the police car which no sooner came into sight than the excited rifleman fired at his occupants. His aim was rather wild but it was too much for the native driver who jumped out of the car, leaving Capt. Roberts to bring it to a standstill. The Indian seemed to be in an inexpressible position and for some time held everyone at bay.

Eventually by a skillful manoeuvre Capt. Roberts approached him from behind the building and fired with a revolver wounding him in the arm. The man's military shock put him off his guard and immediately afterwards he fell on his back and he was brought to the ground. He was then rushed and overpowered and taken to hospital.

The fawn was also rescued and taken to hospital and is seriously, though not dangerously wounded.

The assailant is a well-known Indian who has been in Uganda for many years. He has been in poor health for some time. He served in the Forces during the War and was always to be seen on parade with the old soldiers on Armistice Day.

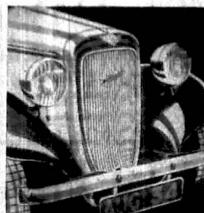

SIXTEEN YEARS OF CIVIL AVIATION

Longer Routes: Higher Speeds: Cheaper Fares

REVIEW OF PROGRESS

It was in May 1919 that civil flying in Great Britain received official permission from the Air Ministry to start operations, and immediately a series of demonstration flights was organised, culminating a few months later in the establishment of a daily service for passengers and freight between London and Paris. From that pioneer service the European airway system has grown from year to year until today there are over 60,000 miles of routes, with this summer more than 150 cities and towns on the Continent are connected with London by regular high-speed flying routes.

Modern progress, on the main Continental air routes, is illustrated by two new services now operated by Imperial Airways. One brings Budapest within a day's flying to London. The other, operating through Vienna and Rome, makes it possible to fly from London to Rome and Brindisi in less than six days. Switzerland, by air, is now only a little over three hours from London, and Berlin not much more than four hours, while Prague has been reached in less than six hours and Vienna in 7 1/2 hours.

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The British Legion

BOOKS BY THE THOUSAND Royal Empire Society's Busy Year

STANDARD CORRESPONDENT

London (By Mail). That the year 1934 was a highly important one in the annals of the Royal Empire Society was abundantly proved in the Council's report presented at the annual meeting. In the early part of the year it was decided to proceed with the rebuilding of the London headquarters in the temporary quarters at 37, Carlton House Terrace, and the negotiations connected with demolition and building contracts meant extremely hard work for the whole of the staff. Some idea of the work involved in transferring the contents of the library alone may be gathered from the fact that it now contains 214,675 books and pamphlets. These transfer to new premises involved little more than work in the new building before being ready for removal. In all some 210 bundles of books were prepared and these were removed in 27 large motor-cars to the new premises at 37, Carlton House Terrace.

The Travelling Commissioner's tour through the Sudan, East Africa, the Rhodesias and the Union of South Africa resulted in an addition of over 500 new members to the Society. The Chairman, Sir Archibald Waigall and Lord Sempill, deputy-chairmen, and various other members who had been invited to the tour and made useful contacts with the young and representative of the Society.

On May 1 Mr. E.H. Bailey, C.B.E., took up his duties as the newly appointed Secretary of the Society. Mr. Bailey was for 20 years in the Sudan Postal Service and was Governor of Kasesa, Province 1929-32. The King's Gold Medal was awarded by the Council this year to Sir William Grenfell, in recognition of his services to the Empire and of the excellence of his book "The Romance of Labrador."

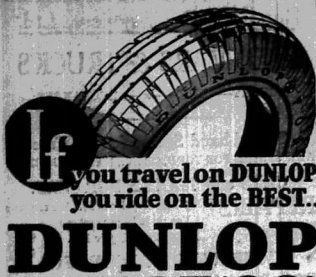

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THE POSTAL UNION OF EAST AFRICA

(Continued from page 1).

19,371,811, being 68,082 more than last year. Of this total Kenya dealt with 12,740,362; Tanganyika 4,280,973 and Uganda, 2,341,246. The number of parcels dealt with, exclusive of air mail parcels, for 1935 was as follows (1935 figures in brackets): Kenya, 154,975 (120,774); Tanganyika, 67,808 (52,296); Uganda, 37,327 (34,750). The cash-on-delivery parcels posted increased by 12 per cent, in number and 22 per cent in value and incoming parcels by 12 per cent. in number and 14 per cent. in value. There was little change in the number of registered articles handled.

The Returned Letter Office dealt with 71,130 articles of which 42,565 were to Kenya and Uganda and 28,477 in Tanganyika. Property valued at £500 was found in the articles dealt with of which £275 was returned to senders, the balance being held in deposit pending receipt of claims.

Money Orders

Some decrease in the Money Order business occurred in Kenya and Uganda, but a noticeable increase in Tanganyika, owing to the reduction in 1935 of commensurate rates was recorded.

In the competition for pictorial stamp designs some of the local designs were adopted and were incorporated in the new issues. Stamps and stationery to a total value of £285,383 were sold at various Post Offices of which Kenya and Uganda accounted for stamps to the value of £207,456 and Tanganyika, £133,915. From the sale of quinine Kenya Post Office derived £1,081 and £134 from Tanga, Lamoni, while Tanganyika Post Office sold quinine to the value of £2,061.

Mails

During the year under review, 65 sea mails were despatched from Kenya and Uganda and 61 received, the average time between Mombasa and London being 19 days. From Tanganyika, 100 sea mails were despatched and 61 received, the average time between Dar-es-Salaam and London being 20 days. Air mails were maintained on a regular weekly schedule, later increased to bi-weekly and the time between London and Nairobi was reduced from seven to six days. The extension of the India-Malaya service to Australia also benefited correspondents in this Colony. Internal air mail feeder services to the Coast areas and Tanganyika were well maintained, and were of great benefit to users in outlying areas.

The growing popularity of the air mail is indicated by the figures given. Of the total overseas mail received from Kenya, 25.5 per cent was carried by air; from Tanganyika 29.9 per cent, and from Uganda, 22.0 per cent. The numbers and weight of air mail letters carried from Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda, respectively during the year amounted to 486,072, weighing 12,000 lbs.; 240,844, weighing 6,010 lbs., and 61,192, weighing 2,280 lbs. The numbers received for delivery in Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda respectively, amounted to:—406,778, weighing 11,700 lbs.; 150,493, weighing 4,000 lbs.; and 44,259, weighing 1,840 lbs.

More Telegrams

Both inland and foreign telegrams, numbering 370,511 and 150,901 respectively, increased by 11 per cent in the first instance, and 3 per cent in the latter. Both the Kilindi-Zanzibar and Dar es Salaam-Zanzibar cables were interrupted during the year, though no public inconvenience was caused. The special reduc-

tion in charges for Christmas greetings, for conveyance by cable, resulting in 4,434 messages being transmitted during the period. Wireless services were satisfactorily maintained and broadcasting services were provided without cost to the Colony. Licensed listeners at the end of the year had increased to 1,102, compared with 591 in the previous year and fees amounting to £2,907 were collected.

The use of telephones in all three territories increased during the year and on the Nairobi Exchange the number of lines rented increased by 33 to a total of 632, while increases in the number of subscribers in Tanganyika and Uganda were also recorded. Trunk services were maintained satisfactorily and rural lines were extended, and overheads and maintenance of existing trunk and local lines were carried out. Theoretical and technical training was given to both European and African telegraphic staffs and African who are sent abroad to serve outside their country of domicile, were recruited in such territory according to the needs and facilities being experienced in obtaining suitable recruits. An apprenticeship scheme for African telegraphists was introduced with success, at the Makerere Training School during the year and satisfactory training progress in other directions has also been made.

Staff distribution in Kenya, Tanganyika and Uganda, at the end of the year, was as follows: Europeans: male, 350; female, 30; Asians and Africans: 293; Mauritians and Seychellians, 17; total, 482. In addition 878 non-European telegraphists, of whom 208 were Africans; 26 postmen, 8 being Africans; 1,141 messengers, mail runners, motor drivers, etc., were employed. The health of the staff during the year was fairly satisfactory.

In the report the Postmaster-General places on record his sincere appreciation of the good work done during the year by all sections of the staff, particularly in view of the fact that owing to the need for economy the services have had to be continued with depleted numbers. The manner in which the additional work and responsibility has been carried out calls, he says, for special commendation.

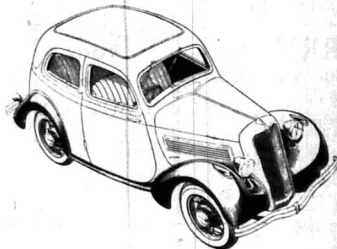

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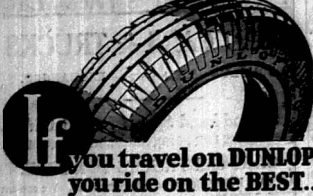
