Shining Screen Lights in Nairobi This Week

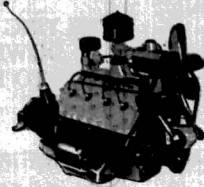

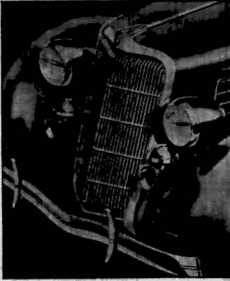

Coffee Prices

LOCAL PREPARATION AS ALTERNATIVE TO LONDON SALES

To the Editor, "E.A. Standard," Sir—From the reported proceedings of the meeting of the East African Section of the London Chamber of Commerce, when Mr. Wollen, the Chairman of the Kenya Coffee Board, was given such a cordial and enthusiastic welcome, it would appear that Mr. Wollen's primary object was to ensure the success of the coffee which would be confined locally to improve the crop and ensuring that they do not suffer in Kenya and nothing would be done to interfere with the people handling the crop in London.

Such a procedure only benefits the so-called "Trade" or middle men and certainly not the Coffee Planter, as the following figures clearly prove. The average price of East African coffee in the London market is not more than 600 per ton which, when roasted and ground, is retailed at around 2/6 per lb. 112 lbs. of dried coffee, when roasted and ground ready for use, weigh 94 lbs.; therefore 94 lbs. at 2/6 will multiply by 2/6 equals £235. That is 600 to the producer, out of which has to be deducted all working expenses, including the cost, transport, wharfage and handling charges, etc., and £175 is the middleman.

It is significant that the price of East African coffee to the consumer remains the same whether the price to the producer is 600 or £120 per ton.

No wonder Sir Humphry Leggett, the Chairman of the East African Section of the London Chamber of Commerce, considered Mr. Wollen, and that there was general applause at the assurance of co-operation with the "Trade". Criticism leads nowhere unless it is of a beneficial and constructive nature, so the point is: Is there any means of altering this deplorable, very unfair, and very unsatisfactory state of affairs from the point of view of the East African coffee planter? Certainly there is, and that is for the East African coffee planter to manufacture his own coffee and sell it through his own Distributing Agent.

The following steps are essential for the assured success of such an undertaking:

- (1) It must be a co-operative enterprise on the part of the East African European coffee growers, for it must be borne in mind that Native coffee is a bulked article and should be marketed as such. Each consignment represents coffee from hundreds of producers from various soils and altitudes, and the quantity marketed today side by side with European grown coffee with its distinctive plantation mark has decidedly been detrimental to East African coffee on the whole.
- (2) All coffee must be kept in parchment, and must only be

deaned, roasted and ground when ordered.

(3) Every tin must be hermetically sealed with a rubber cover, so as to ensure that, and between the two covers there must be full instructions for making coffee, and the date the contents of the tin were prepared.

(4) And last, but not least, the services of a Distributing and Advertising Agent of experience and capacity must be procured, for this undoubtedly is the key to the success of the whole scheme.

The producer has nothing but hard knocks to expect from the "Trade", who are all out to get as much as they possibly can out of the coffee growers, the banks and the merchant bankers who are now financing the industry for the benefit of the so-called "Trade".

The East African coffee grows for some years past has no idea if his coffee is going to sell for an average price of 600 or £100 when it leaves the country. In spite of the fact that there are as good buyers and judges of coffee in East Africa as there are in London. Especially the local export's colonies on two examples I reviewed in London.

Then again, how can one account for the difference in price of 600 per ton for coffee from the same estate which was milled and bagged separately under two different marks, and which was sold in London on the same day? One lot sold for an average price of 600 per ton, and the other for £100 per ton.

The fact of the matter is, that the East African coffee planter, not to say very little faith in the London market and that is why so many are willing to accept a very low local cash price in preference to trusting to the chance of sending their coffee to London.

From the foregoing, it is clear that the only means that will bring the profits attached to coffee growing into the pockets of the planters themselves, is for them to manufacture their own coffee on the spot where there can be no doubt of its being pure East African coffee. Any other market, being achieved is only a means of bringing the greater part of the profits into the hands of the middlemen.

MONEY FACTORY IN DEPRESSION

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir—May I ask the hospitality of your paper once again to make a few comments on the letter sent in reply to mine?

Mr. Sheldrick points out one of the factors which greatly help to disturb economic equilibrium between—referring to my example—affirms that "if 400,000, . . . produce all the requirements of the 1,000,000, there would be no need for the 600,000 to produce anything." Given that the cost of consumption is determined, for each individual, by his contribution to production, there would be a large part of the population unable to consume, and another part unable to dispose of its products; in other words a very serious crisis. But I do not understand how monetary manipulations can remedy such a situation: the only remedy, from any point of view, would be to increase the number of those who are busy in production, by subdividing the means of production (capital, land, and all it contains,

and labour). It may be observed, that in civilized countries something like this has been done to increase the number of workers, especially by reducing working hours; while the general tendency, difficult to check, is a capital and labour to be concentrated in a more and more restricted number of hands.

Mr. Sheldrick asks that "a lot of experts be called to solve the financial problem"; but I doubt that any expert or group of experts would be able to accomplish this work. My own judgment may seem rather paradoxical, but I think it is based on actuality. Society, and all phenomena relative to it, belong to a category that no human brain or group of brains is able to understand the real essence of economic or of political facts; we are always obliged to proceed by way of experiments; therefore the opinion of so-called experts has a very limited value.

The fact is that it is not to accuse the Central Bank of ignorance or forgetfulness; I only meant that that he had not mentioned the velocity of circulation of money, which makes the amount in circulation relatively unimportant.

Here I should like to make a remark on the subject of inflation, which seems to be favoured by your other correspondents. Inflation can be useful only if it gives purchasing power to people who did not have it before, by participating in production, and if the new products or services which come into being are the counterpart of the new issue of money. In such case credit is more appropriate than inflation. But if inflation just has the effect of proportionally increasing the cash belonging to each individual, the only result, which can also be said to be the result of inflation, is that each individual will profit, as the real value of their debts will diminish. It is true that if one has more money, one spends more, but one does not necessarily buy more. If all things being equal, an individual increases his income because he has increased his contribution to total production, undoubtably he will be able to buy more. But if such increase depends on a general increase in the quantity of money in circulation, his contribution to production remains the same, he will not be able to buy more.

The letter to which "Svxy" replied, has proved a misunderstanding. My example was not meant to demonstrate that the price of money must go down to two-thirds, but that in order to buy a bigger quantity of produce at the same price as before, it was necessary to increase the share in production of the consumers, a thing which, in that particular case, could be obtained only by an increase in money. We analyse what has happened in the last decades, we see that the possessors of means of production other than labour (those whose income is represented by wages and salaries) have increased their income in proportion to production. Therefore consumption could not keep pace with production and surplus was bound to occur. It is right to produce millions of millions, millions of bags of cereals, millions of yards of textiles. But

when production reaches such a point, it is impossible to think of the purchasing power of the hundreds of millions of wage-earners without whose labour it is impossible to market the goods; and to increase the purchasing power of these hundreds of millions, their share in production must be increased. This can be achieved in only one way: by diminishing that share of the total income which goes to profits and interest and by increasing the share for wages and salaries. I think it is correct to say that if those who live on profits and interest want to maintain high profits and high interest, it will be necessary for them to limit their numbers and to restrict production.

My critics will remark that I have not yet mentioned the financial policy of the banking system. I do not think that they would go so far as to propose a situation which in the end damages them. The wise policy of English banks has prevented their being affected heavily from the present crisis, but it would be very interesting to know how many banks and bankers on the Continent and in the U.S.A. have lost since 1929.

We feel the effect of the monetary system in so far as it is one of the determining factors in influencing prices (and the most undeliable). Inflation, in its definition, can sometimes have good effects, but it is not the long run they are pernicious. In order to minimize the rapid changes, and to make prices respond more to the real conditions of supply (production) and demand (consumption) by eliminating the monetary factor as much as possible, two systems, in my opinion, could be adopted. Either a system of constant price, or to have a currency backed up by gold, or to have a currency backed up by means, increases part passes with the goods. In my opinion, the latter system is doubtless the best but there are other reasons which cannot discuss now. It would involve, for one thing, the leaving of the gold standard, a measure which would not be received favourably at Kalamungu and by the people. "Svxy" among them, who still hope that Kalamungu will solve the economic problem of Kenya. The former measure would imply the re-establishment of the gold standard all over the world.

In order to apply either of the two systems it would be necessary to take away from governments and banks the power of manipulating the quantity of money in circulation at their pleasure. A very serious obstacle; however, opposes the application of either measure.

If the State can by law take away from banks the power of issuing money, or strictly limit their power, how is it possible to take from Governments of their most important prerogatives, that of issuing money? As long as governments, whose monetary policy is not always determined by economic reasons, have the right of issuing money, producers and consumers will have to be satisfied with those rapid fluctuations in prices which make economic life so unstable.

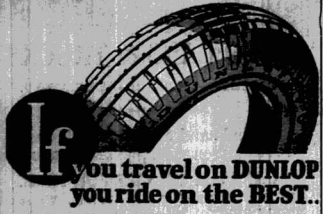

"MILE OF THE CENTURY" Lovelock's Great Race at Princeton Bat No Record Broken WON BY TEN YARDS [TROTTER BROTHERS' AGENCY.] London, June 16. During the course of the International Meeting, held at Princeton, U.S.A., Lovelock (the New Zealand and Oxford runner) won the mile from Bonthron and Cunningham in the fine time of 4 minutes 11 1/4 seconds. He won by ten yards, half a yard separating Bonthron and Cunningham. The race was described as the "mile of the century" and a crowd of 40,000 were assembled on a sizzling hot day, tempered by a brisk breeze, to watch the event. It was one of the most thrilling races ever seen and the title "the mile of the century" truly described it, although no record was broken. From the starting gun the American, Marston, holder of the three-quarter mile record, shot into the lead, with Lovelock fourth. Halfway round on the first lap Lovelock went on to first place, Cunningham having taken the lead from Marston meanwhile, and before the end of the first lap Lovelock had having dropped back Lovelock kept in second place running in a fine style right on to Cunningham's heels, while Bonthron was third. This order was maintained throughout the race. At the start of the third lap Bonthron appeared to fire and the crowd roared at Lovelock who was still second behind Cunningham. Suddenly, as if by magic, the lead came to the New Zealand darter, Cunningham, on the right side and left ten yards, while Bonthron, making a gallant last stand, pushed into second place. Judgment with Costs for a Patient

GOOD PENMANSHIP

Its Importance for Bank Clerks

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT]. London, June 8. (By Mail.) Bank clerks whose handwriting, indifferent spelling, and lack of literary style had been criticised by examiners, were reminded by Mr. John T. Leggat, general manager of the National Bank of Scotland, that these were factors which would hamper success in professional life. The Institute was to be congratulated, Mr. Leggat wrote, on the success of its advocacy, over many years, of the importance to bank men of qualifying themselves for their professional duties by passing the examinations prescribed for membership of the Institute. The examinations were reported by many, it was said, to be the most exacting as an annual invariable condition of retention in their service.

LOST OPPORTUNITY IN KENYA

Lord Cranworth on an Early Mistake

Lord Cranworth addressed the Overseas League recently on the "lost opportunity" in Kenya in leaving things as they were in 1910, he said: "We did not know then that we were exploiting the natives. That wonderful political phrase had not been invented. We did not know of those great masses of the three great pigments. Bantail was regarded as a great colony. The second plague was named was locusts. The third great plague that was avoided was Parliamentary Commissioners. The one thing that does not change in Kenya is the opposition of those set in authority over us. Having formed our Parliament, we thought we could run Kenya and it faced, East Africa. Our aim was to make Kenya a great colony. We envisaged it with a white settlement as its basis. We made one error—we did not appreciate the limited amount of white territory. Had we realised that, we would have pressed for the restriction of the Kikuyu and other tribes of East Africa who had given us greater control over their own lands. If we had, the Spring Kenyas would now be rich and prosperous, and I am sure it would be self-governing. To me, it is the greatest thing that that opportunity was allowed to slide."

PENSIONS SCHEME

£1 a Week for Women at 55

[STANDARD CORRESPONDENT]. London, June 17. (By Mail.) Pension for men employed as sixty-five and women as fifty-five are to be provided by Lloyd's, the dominion, lock at the company's factory in Nottingham, and at their retail shops throughout the country. Lord Trent, presiding at the annual meeting of the company in Nottingham said that the company's pension fund now stands at more than £450,000, and explained the details of the scheme. Altogether about 15,000 people are affected.

How It Will Work

For men the pensions will be on a contributory basis, scale of pension being determined by the man's earnings.

Women are to receive £1 a week when they reach fifty-five, contributed entirely by the company. When a pensioner becomes eligible for the State old age pension she will retain half the company's pension.

The properties of woman workers who will qualify for pension is small, for Lord Trent made the interesting disclosure that 65 per cent of the company's women workers leave to get married before they are thirty-five.

The company have found a five-day working week each seven that it is to be continued indefinitely. It is the result of an experiment. The problem of increasing the paid holidays of the 12,000 members of the retail staff is being considered.

GLIDING NOT SUITED TO EAST AFRICA?

attended with more serious results than sprains and bruises, are definitely unsuited for this altitude and, in fact, the "cutting" of many of these craft is little, if any, greater than the ground altitude at Nairobi. Even such craft as these would have to be overhauled and replaced and repairs would be much more costly than in England. A secondary glider or fully-fledged sail-plane might cost anything up to, or even over £500 and their control is not a matter to be undertaken by novices.

The impression that a glider is any easier to fly because of the absence of a power unit is entirely false and the facts of such experts as Herr Robert Kronfeldt or the late Mr. Levee Wilde, cast a Campbell Black, be duped into buying the ordinary holder of an "A" license. In short, gliding, like a host of other aeronautical sports, is very much more difficult of accomplishment than it appears to be and the fact that a gliding section of the Aero Club of East Africa has not yet been formed is not due to any lack of enthusiasm among the members. Flying today is still in the same relative position as was motoring, twenty-five years ago—rather popular for a man of some means—and even in Germany and England, where gliding has become so popular, its growth has only been made possible by the facilities for cheap manufacture of the craft and the great numbers of both active and "sleeping" members of the various clubs.

Power Gliders

As to power-gliders, the craft in use in Europe to-day would, it is considered, be unable to take off at all at 5,000 to 6,000 feet, with the 5 h.p. motor with which they are powered. One of the most popular of these machines is sold at £775 and is said to be capable of a maximum speed of 100 m.p.h. with a fuel consumption of 20 m.p.g. At the moment, however, pilots possessing only a glider licence are not allowed to fly these machines and several "A" licence aeroplane pilots are not permitted, in England, to fly further afield with these small machines than three miles from an aerodrome. Herr Kronfeldt recently flew one of these machines from London to Paris, but as has already been pointed out this Australian, almost a probably the most expert sailplane pilot in the world and his feat ranks with that of Blériot in 1900.

Specimens of high standard were found, too, among the carnations, though one exhibitor bemoaned the fact that his prize carnations had suffered, not from the weather, but from the services of two Alsatians which had clasped a fight in the arms of his beds. The bloom which earned the award for the best carnation in the show was a fine specimen of "Bapture", well formed and fully petalled.

Cut Flowers

Collections of cut flowers were very strong in quality and there was keen competition. The open class for flower collections was won by an exhibit—some of Mr. Graham Bell's—which Lady Muret described as "Very good". Similar praise was given by the President's expert judgment to the winner of the smaller collection class.

Table Decorations

There were some beautiful examples, while the winning collection of cut flowers was a magnificent array of blooms. Some highly attractive and original ideas for table decorations were seen in the appropriate class. A most artistic combination of nasturtiums, heart and matching mat caught the eye. As did Lady Muret's own collection, a magnificent lot of moss thickly studded with tiny flowers of every brilliant hue.

As usual, the foliage classes provided distinctive exhibits, and the base of color that was the Barberton daisy section could not be overlooked. Another outstanding section was that devoted to bulbous rooted flowers, and there were some charming and stately forms.

Fruit

The feature of the section for fruit, apart from the exhibit which gained a general award for Mr. Graham Bell, was Count Wingfield Digby's contributions, two magnificent water melons, one of which earned from a most experienced judge the very highest praise. Though the berry

Plant for Profit or Pleasure!

PASTURES FOR PROFITS. One of the greatest difficulties about farming at present, declared Mr. Fisher, principal of the School of Agriculture, Colorado, was that people attempted farming on too big a scale. Mr. Fisher explained that if 84 a year were spent on fertilizing each acre of grass, the yield of milk from an acre of ordinary unimproved soil was about 100 gallons, but with Oxdena 1,200 gallons of milk had been obtained from an acre of improved and fertilized Kikuyu, and this yield was likely to be exceeded this year. They had already shown that it was possible to do much better with a small farm property run than with a large one that was left more or less as it was found.

Although it cost 84 annually to fertilize and improve one acre of Kikuyu grass, such an acre when improved was worth "anything up to 2100." Calculating the price of milk at the low figure of 8d a gallon, this yield gave milk of the value of 828, and if the farmer's total costs were 810 an acre, he still had a profit of 80 per acre. On fertilized land Mr. Fisher said that he had succeeded in obtaining 222 lb. of butter from three Jerseys on one acre of grass in one year, which represented a revenue of 229 sh. as well as the value of 1,100 gallons of separated milk. The cows also gained weight on that acre.

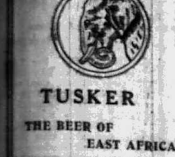

First Cricket Test Match at Nottingham

SOUTH AFRICANS FORCED TO FOLLOW ON

Dismissed for 220 on Monday

NO PLAY YESTERDAY MORNING OWING TO SATURATED WICKET

While England established herself in a strong position by declaring on Monday morning, and then forcing the South Africans to follow on, the outlook was not so bright yesterday, no play being possible before lunch owing to a saturated pitch.

Nichols was the hero of Monday's play, when he took six wickets for 55 runs and played a big part in obtaining the advantage for England. It was an auspicious first test match debut on the part of the Essex man, who was deadily after the tea interval on Monday.

Siedle and Cameron were the big men in the Springboks batting, each topping the half century. The latter, when the wicket started to favour Robins, knocking the Middlesex man completely off his length, so that Wyatt had to take him off.

Nichols' Fine Bowling

England pleased herself in a strong position this morning when she followed her innings closed in the Saturday evening's total of 201 for the loss of seven wickets. South Africa were all out for 220, leaving them 184 runs behind, so that they had to follow on, and lost one wicket for 17 runs, when stumps were drawn for the day.

There were some eight to ten thousand spectators present when play was resumed on Tuesday night this morning. Following the eight-run, conditions broke night and misty till 10.30. Nichols and Bowen opened for the South Africans' innings, and they had reached the half century before the former was dismissed by the Essex batsman. Nichols led the pitch at a great pace, and was making the ball kick up a bit. With the score just above of the hundred Bowen followed his batsman mate back to the pavilion. He was caught close up at the wicket by Ames when attempting to run a single out of the hands of Robins, the Middlesex captain.

Nichols had only a very short spell at the wicket. He sent 100 after two and a half hours, when he drove a ball from Robins into the line of boundary, and then caught of Verity. The Yorkshire batsman was making a fine start, but he got Nourse completely upset with the result that he got a "dud" out to Hammond at second slip.

Three Wickets Down

Three wickets were down for Essex on a hundred so that England's position was made more precarious. It was pointed by his captain, but with the score heard reading 120, Ames came in to bat, and he led Verity to log was bowled with his total one short of the fifty. He was also the first batsman to be struck for 50. He gave a 60-run innings without the dismissal of a batsman, his principal hits being six fours. Altogether he was 45 on theicket for just under three hours.

The Springboks' skipper was the 184 man out, and he went out in a glorious catch on the part of Nichols in the slip, the Essex batsman the last batsman from the ground.

He had exercised the greatest patience in gathering his 18. He was at the wicket for an hour and three minutes.

Anglo-German Naval Agreement

SATISFACTORY RESULT OF NEGOTIATIONS

Permanent Pact
FACILITATING CONCLUSION OF A WORLD UNDERSTANDING

A naval pact which may lead to an agreement between all the Naval Powers has been agreed upon by Britain and Germany.

One of its most important points is an undertaking that Germany's naval strength will not exceed 35 per cent of Britain's effective naval tonnage.

The agreement is permanent and will become effective at once.

In Force Immediately

[REUTERS SERVICE'S AGENCY.]
London, June 19.—It is learned officially that an Anglo-German naval agreement was reached this afternoon. The points which have been discussed up to the present, has increased the understanding that in no case shall German naval strength exceed 35 per cent of British effective tonnage.

The agreement is detailed in correspondence exchanged between the British and German Governments.

The British Government regards the agreement as of the greatest importance to the maintenance of world peace as it will facilitate the conclusion of a general agreement among all the naval Powers of the world. The German ratio of 35 per cent of the aggregate British tonnage is a permanent and will not be affected by the construction of other Powers.

In the event of a violent outbreak of existing international equilibrium, Germany will invite Britain to re-examine the new situation.

Submarines

Germany claims the right to mine the sea to a depth of 100 fathoms but will not exceed 45 per cent, even in exceptional circumstances, it is stated in the agreement. The agreement also covers the use of submarines among various categories may be a matter of discussion between the two Governments in the event of any change in the future international naval situation.

Mission to France

Mr. Anthony Eden will go to Paris on Friday to start a series of high level conversations with the French Government covering naval questions, the general European situation, the "Daily Telegraph" says.

The most apparent danger to the agreement is the German undertaking not to exceed a fixed percentage of the British strength at sea. Only to the extent in which the British are prepared to limit with the German Navy, under the terms of this pact, become a force for the maintenance of world peace.

TEA FROM TANGANYIKA

Seed to be Exported to Kenya and Uganda

Kenya and Uganda are directly affected by one of the Bills to be introduced in the Tanganyika Legislative Council. The bill is the Indian Ordinance to amend the Native Authority Ordinance, the Interpretation and General Clause Ordinance, the Ports (Public Works) Ordinance, the Arms and Ammunition Ordinance, and the Indian Ordinance, and the expenditure of £27,357 of public money for 1934, beyond the amounts authorized by the 1934 Appropriation Ordinance.

The amendment to the Ten Ordinance affects Kenya and Uganda as its object is to permit the exportation of tea seed to those territories to which it is prohibited at present. The amendment is stated to be desirable to enable those countries which contribute to the maintenance of the East African Agricultural Research Station at Arusi, to obtain tea seed produced there.

Prison Sentence for German Settler

£500 Bail Pending an Appeal

Moshi (by mail).

A charge involving assault and causing actual bodily hurt to a native, brought against Baron Mushi von Balinghosen of the Moshi Estate, Ngara Nairobi, was tried in the District Officer's Court at Moshi. A native head, man of the accused, named Shaban, was also charged, jointly with aiding and abetting the offence. Assistant Inspector D. H. J. Harris prosecuted.

The complainant, Juma, employed by Baron von Balinghosen as a cook, stated in evidence that he had been tied up by the orders of his master. For several hours at a time he had, he was continuously and scorchingly heated in a room on the farm belonging to the accused. Juma also deposed to having been repeatedly beaten by Shaban the head man, and also to having been struck with a keregheby by his master.

These beatings and interrogations occurred in the evening and the complainant stated he was kept in custody for several days.

WOMAN'S DIFFICULT POSITION

Before the Acting Resident Magistrate (Mr. J. L. Woodhouse) at Moshi, Brno Oros, a former of Ngara Nairobi, was charged with the theft of six cows and pigs from the farm of Prince Ibrahim.

Evidence was given by the prosecution to the effect that the accused had been employed by the Prince's estate as a servant. After the departure of the latter with the Grand Duke of Mecklenburg's suite to Kenya, and thence to Germany, at which date Oros was on a shooting trip—the latter had returned to the farm, Mrs. W. Davidson, who was the owner of the shooting trip, informed Oros that she had been left in charge of the Prince's interests during his absence in Kenya. Thereupon, it was alleged, Oros ordered natives to drive off several cows, and the accused was charged with the theft of six cows and pigs from the farm, he was entitled to a share of the assets purchased with his money.

In sentencing Oros to six months rigorous imprisonment, the Magistrate, after delivering judgment, stated that he had to take into consideration the difficult and delicate position of a white woman, alone, in the absence of her husband, on a isolated farm, among African natives.

An appeal had been entered and bail fixed at shillings 5,000—pending hearing at the next session of the Northern Province circuit of the High Court.

Water Ordinance in Force Next Month

RIGHTS AND OBLIGATIONS OF USERS OUTLINED

Important Changes

BOARD'S POWER TO ISSUE DOCUMENTS GRANTING SECURITY OF TITLE

By proclamation dated May 21, the Water Ordinance, 1920 will be brought into force on July 1, 1925.

In view of the long time since the enactment of this Ordinance, it has been thought desirable to publish a statement of its objects and the principal obligations which it imposes on present and prospective users of the water of public streams and other public bodies of water.

A Gradual Process

The main principles of the Ordinance may be stated as follows:—

The rights of the Water Board on behalf of Government in relation to the water of the Colony are twofold: firstly, the conservation of the water resources of the Colony; and secondly, the promotion of the most advantageous use of the water, including the prevention of waste and pollution, and the control of the water of public streams and other public bodies of water.

It is to be noted that the Ordinance does not confer any new rights on the Water Board, but merely defines the rights which it has already in its possession. ECONOMIC PROBLEM OF KENYA

2. THE MONETARY AUTHORITY IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSIBILITY

In the second of the series of special articles on the economic problem of Kenya, Major Grogan deals with the Monetary Authority.

He points out that the final and inescapable responsibility for policy rests upon the Imperial Government.

(By Major E. S. Grogan, D.S.O.)

WE have, I trust, made it clear that a money unit (be it the English £, the Australian £, the mark, the franc or the East African shilling) is no longer a self-contained physical entity. It is an abstraction being made of platinum and every ounce weight being made of aluminium. We have found that "value" can be just as effectively measured by intrinsically valueless bits of paper and base metal (e.g. East African shilling) as by pure gold. The shilling is strictly confined to Government, as by pure discs of gold. Legislative enactment to the effect that they are good tender in the ratio in which the unit will exchange for other things—or in other words the "price-level."

The Monetary Authority which regulates the supply of English sterling, and the same body, as the British Public, a Chancellor of the Exchequer, controlling (or being controlled by) a Treasury Department, and the same body, as the Governor of the Central Bank, known as the Bank of England. There is at any given moment the same amount of currency in circulation in Kenya as in the United Kingdom, in the form of legal tender notes and coins, and the same amount of actual "gold backing" without further reference to Parliament. In practice this limitation has little meaning since currency notes are not convertible into gold, and the same amount of actual "gold backing" is not held in the Treasury. The vast bulk of all financial transactions are conducted solely by book entry and without involving any use of physical money.

THE "CASH BASIS"

The elaboration of the credit structure is only restricted by what is technically possible. "Cash" is not a physical entity, but an abstraction which can extend ten times that cash basis—but it is entirely fallacious to imagine that this "cash" is a physical entity. The important point to remember is that the control of the credit structure is not a matter of mere technical possibility, but a matter of policy. THE CUNLIFE COMMITTEE

The final responsibility for post-war monetary chaos lies with Mr. Lloyd George's Government in the appointment (1919) of the Cunliffe Committee. The Committee consisted of eleven distinguished Bankers, one Professor of Economics and the Secretary to the Treasury. They did not report until 1921, and stated "it is probable that after the war period will stand for many years, if not permanently, at a greatly enhanced level."

Capital Works
On capital works, a sum of £71,955 was expended, of which £61,263 was obtained from the State. This total was allocated as follows: Buildings, £23,857; Water and Drainage, £1,146; Roads and Bridges, £2,627; Miscellaneous, £2,451; Communications, £700. The completion of the Mombasa Water Scheme, construction of the new Law Courts, Nairobi, the preparation of the Shimoni Aerodrome at Mombasa and a number of native works, including the Mathari Mental Hospital, Native Industrial Training Depot, etc., accounted for a great deal of the capital expenditure involved and much work of a quasi-capital nature in connection with roads and bridges, irrigation, etc. Of the native reserves was carried out by the Administration with the aid of Local Native Council funds.

In Nyanza Province, which is rapidly growing in importance, considerable Public Works activity took place. Several important permanent bridges were either under construction or completed, including the Yala River Bridge, 75 feet lattice girder type, Mgori River Bridge, Sio River Bridge and the Mombasa Bridge. In the Eldoret Division the new Kavangari River Bridge, with a 50 feet span and completed out of military funds. During a flood in the early part of the year this bridge was submerged to a depth of nearly four feet but stood firm.

Revenue from Water
On maintenance works, other than roads and bridges, the following sums were expended:—Buildings, £14,694; Public Works, £19,171. Revenue from the Water Department, however, amounted to £48,255, being £2,848 more than the previous year. The income number of 5,144 vouchers during the year and the total expenditure amounted to £28,810, being £2,124 less than last year.

Approximately 800 miles of survey or reconnaissance for alignments or realignments of roads were carried out in addition to surveys and investigations regarding new bridge sites, aerodromes, etc., while a number of investigations and reconnaissance surveys in connection with water supplies in the native reserves were carried out and reports made to the Administration.

Architectural design is included in the Head Office drawing office and during the year working drawings for a number of undertakings, including the new Law Courts, were got out. In all 680 drawings were made, including architectural, engineering, etc., while over 11,000 drawings are in the course of the year. The high cost of transport, the expense of fuel and the cost of the main plant and equipment are the principal items of expenditure. The revenue during the year from this source was £118. The Department assumed responsibility for the maintenance of the Government-owned hand-drilled at Government expense in the Native reserves. A policy of gradual improvement and modification of the pumping plants is being pursued. The administration of the existing Water Ordinance proved to be very difficult and involved a great number of amendments. It is recommended that the Water Ordinance, 1929, should be brought into operation as soon as possible. During the year, 10.9 per cent. more than in the previous year. Two regular water pumping stations were erected and manholes were obtained from 86 other regular stations in the Colony, as well as from 169 miscellaneous pumpings.

The time of the Quantity Surveyor was fully occupied in the preparation of bills of quantities, etc., for the many works in hand and he also functioned as Inspector under the Architects and Quantity Surveyors' Contract. In the laboratory, tests on the concrete, brick, sand, cement and steel, etc., in connection with Government work in progress. The Central workshops manufactured apparatus for attachment to the H. H. O'Brien Tensile Testing Machine for testing timber in static loading stresses etc., and specimens of ten species of Kenya timbers were tested.

New Aerodromes
In addition to the construction of the new aerodrome at Shimoni (Mombasa) the Nyeri aerodrome was completed, construction commenced at Isodi and landing facilities were also provided at Mambila, Bumaruti and Nanyuki. The cost of the upkeep of the thirteen aerodromes and landing grounds for which the Department is responsible amounted to £207. The total turnover in cash and stores, during the year, amounted to £208,549 and expenditure dealt with by the accounts section to £282,375. The Department also procured contracts for the following:—buildings, 12; roads, 20; materials and transport, 25; miscellaneous, 8.

Transport Work
A certain amount of Government transport work was carried out, chiefly in the vicinity of Nairobi. There were six effective motor lorries in the fleet on December 31, 1934 and the total mileage covered was 44,374 miles, 8,467 miles less than in the previous year.

Best and house allowance claims were considered in the preparation of 5,144 vouchers during the year and the total expenditure amounted to £28,810, being £2,124 less than last year.

Approximately 800 miles of survey or reconnaissance for alignments or realignments of roads were carried out in addition to surveys and investigations regarding new bridge sites, aerodromes, etc., while a number of investigations and reconnaissance surveys in connection with water supplies in the native reserves were carried out and reports made to the Administration.

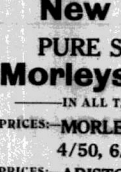

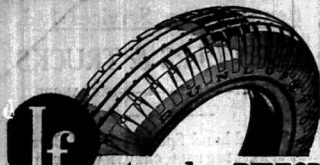

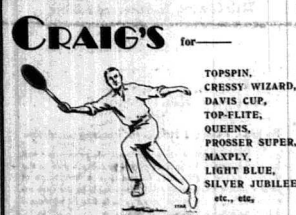
