THE MONETARY FACTOR IN DEPRESSION: "NATIONAL DIVIDEND"

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir—I am sure many of your readers, who are interested in this vital question will appreciate the efforts to find a remedy. The enormous purchasing power of the hundreds of millions, he suggests "Disinflationary" would be the total income which goes as profits and interest and by increasing the share of wages and salaries. I see no difference in this than taxing the rich to benefit the poor.

There, as a matter of fact, three or four suggestions before the world to day, which I dare say have their merits and demerits. It is not for anyone to deride these without first of all serious and unbiased investigation. That the world will demand such investigation, in spite of Chancellors and Bankers is only a question of time.

Amongst the remedies, there is one, in my humble opinion, that may be of interest to your readers to study. If they have not already heard of it, my rate M.W.S. appears not to have been so widely known as it should be. The proposal is National Dividend, combined with its twin brother National Discount. It is of course, impossible to give details of such a comprehensive scheme, providing as it does for all the intricacies of finance, but under it we are assured that there would be no question of inflation or deflation; in short, just sufficient money is always available to enable the goods produced to be consumed, and if there is a surplus over production in any line, the indicator of the system will inform the world, thereby referring true facts.

While there would still be a certain fluctuation of prices it would never go below cost of production. There would be security for everybody and the natural inclination of man to create, produce, make money and so on will not be interfered with. The sponsors of the scheme maintain that not only will there be more scope for man's ambition, but there would be absolute freedom for everybody to work out their own destiny and work would become a pleasure—a privilege rather than a grind. All duties and old age pensions would be abolished. Prof. salaries, pensions for services etc, would remain over and above the National Dividend. In such the same way as the world goes on to day, except that insecurity would be a thing of the past. Banks would still function, only in a different way, being limited in their action. The creation and destruction of more money would be worked out by a central body who in turn would be governed by the law of supply and demand and the nation's productive wealth. In other words the system is automatic throughout, which eventually a machine may be able to operate. It is worth it to an absurd conclusion, when a nation fails to produce goods the direct cause.

Sequel to Protest Against Death Sentence

["STANDARD" CORRESPONDENT.]
London, June 12. (By Air Mail.)
Robert Charles Adams, of Queens-road, South Norwood, was summoned at Westminster Police Court yesterday for "interfering with highway" at King's-road, Chelsea, on April 15.

Mrs. Violet Van Der Elst, of Adlam-road, Kensington, was similarly summoned and further for "causing vehicles to be driven in a scheduled thoroughfare within three miles of Charing Cross—Adlam-road, Kensington, and the Victoria Embankment."

The hearing vehicle was driven by Adams. From the witness box three more names of hymn tunes from loud-speakers, and puns by Mrs. Adams were heard—also through loud-speakers—in support of the movement for the abolition of capital punishment.

Faith Proceedings

After hearing public witnesses, the magistrate said he thought the proceedings had been taken under a wrong section, and he did not think there were any grounds on which he could possibly find Adams guilty of misbehaviour. No case was presented from passing.

He dismissed the summons.

Mr. A. H. Mathew (for Adams) said the police authorities take serious view, and it is clear they have asked their brains to know what sort of an offence they can charge these people for. As they have chosen the wrong section, I ask you to allow some costs.

The magistrate declined.

Mr. Parkes—I take it that you are prepared to state a case?

The magistrate—certainly.

With regard to the summons against Mr. Van der Elst, Mr. O'Malley (defending) said she was in a nursing home following an operation.

In her case the magistrate said it seemed to him that there could not be a charge of advertising, but it was obviously not for the purpose of gain. He thought she had been misled, and that in the circumstances he could dismiss the summons under the Probation Act on payment of 5s. costs.

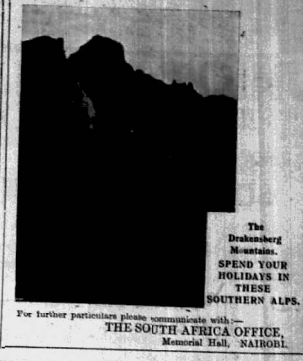
Some of the rats are even fat and long. Dogs, traps and even gun have been brought into use, but the rats continue to increase.

Plant for Profit or Pleasure!

PASTURES FOR PROFITS.
One of the greatest difficulties about farming at present, declared Mr. Fisher, principal of the School of Agriculture, Godara, was that people attempted farming on too big a scale.

Mr. Fisher explained that if $\frac{1}{4}$ a year were spent on fertilizing each acre of grass, the value of that acre would be raised to anything between £20 and £100. The yield of milk from an acre of ordinary unimproved poor soil was about 100 gallons, but at Godara 1,200 gallons of milk had been obtained from an acre of improved and fertilized Kikuyu, and this yield was likely to be exceeded this year.

They had already shown that it was possible to do much better with a small farm property run than with a large one that was left more or less as it was found.

Although it cost annually to fertilize and improve one acre of Kikuyu grass, such an acre when improved was worth "anything up to £100." Calculating the price of milk at the low figure of 6s. a gallon, this yield gave milk of the value of £20, and if the farmer's total costs were £10 an acre, he still had a profit of £10 an acre.

On fertilized land Mr. Fisher said that he had succeeded in obtaining 502 lb. of butter from three Jerseys on one acre of grass in one year, which represented a revenue of £20 2s., as well as the value of 1,100 gallons of separated milk. The cows also gained weight on that acre.

THE ABYSSINIAN DISPUTE

Italy Continues to be Firm

But Would Welcome Any Concrete Proposal

TERRITORIAL CONCESSIONS SUGGESTED

A Firm Attitude

The firm attitude adopted by Italy in regard to Abyssinia is reflected in a statement by a Foreign Office spokesman, who expressed the opinion that Mr. Anthony Eden is not likely to make satisfactory proposals, even if the subject were brought up.

The spokesman rejected the idea of territorial and commercial concessions, for "Italy cannot and will not withdraw the troops from her colonies until something is done to ensure that Abyssinia would not continue to be a menace to Italy."

The spokesman made it clear that the Indo-Abyssinian Conciliation Commission which is meeting at Hague to-morrow is not empowered to settle the main differences between the two countries.

ASSURANCES GIVEN BY THE COLONIAL OFFICE.

It is stated that the Government of India is not content to leave matters where they now are, but intends to visit the situation carefully to see whether further representations in regard both to past legislation in Tanganyika and Uganda and present legislation in Kenya are desirable.

of fact for most important things to do. We have to try and sort out bread and butter and I think it is probably one of the chief functions of any Government as to see how it can arrange its future course so that every citizen who is born in the country should not be a slave to a regime that is of the nature of a decent living (appliance). That is so far as the importance of these rather high sounding but highly political of splitting the Kingdom.

"I believe the time has come when the country to which I belong and the country to which most of you belong are at some time belatedly will one day form a portion of a great federal scheme (deers) and there is no question that this federation will be under the British Crown and furthermore I believe that there will have to be a certain number of Local Councils dealing with the more practical affairs. The people in this country with their massive millions tumbling over one another and looking for all every corner do not know what is so to have a Government with which they are in contact. Now as in the Crown Colonies and countries with responsible Government they are in contact with the Government which is quite approachable to everybody and I believe that we must have that approach for something distant which is unapproachable, to take charge of the affairs of the country. For that reason I do not see any difficulty in Federation because it is possible to be left to Local Councils.

"There was a time when in my ignorance I believed that the Government to which I belong was quite incapable of handling all the affairs of the country. For that period, at the time of the Independence, I voted for the Union on the grounds of Government do have the men or woman really to run our own country. Well I have learnt a lot since that time and I do believe that that is one of the most wonderful things about the British nation and that is if there are only two or three British people in a territory they can evolve some system of governing themselves decently if they are only left alone to do so (applause). The great thing is to give responsibility and give it before it has been asked for so long that it is feeling has attem (hear, hear), I feel confident that so long as you are dealing with a really British community, however small, it may be left to form a Government to be a credit to the rest of the Empire.

"It is proving today that this system is most unworkable and that is one of the things for the new Colonial Secretary, who as a young man, is to get on and evolve a better. The Crown Colonies and Protectorates are federated in the new Secretary in his jurisdiction in the British Commonwealth Office, and I feel certain that in the Mr. Malcolm MacDonald the Colonies have got a man who will take the very greatest interest in the work he has to do, and I do not think that he will be down and asked a position where responsibility is possible to be taken.

"Now in Southern Rhodesia we have the system of Government which the British people have adopted virtually throughout the world and I would like to say I do not think that any very large changes will be expected from merely a change of ministers. In my own small and limited experience I have come to the conclusion that a really good British Civil Servant is created by the ability to see that they are not so where they may have been trained during an Election man really make any radical change. (Laughter).

Great Potential Wealth
"There is one thing that struck me during my visit home last time and that is a good deal of time has been made about the Dominion and self-governing places and so forth, but they have never really ever. In this country contemplated all the enormous potential wealth of the Crown Colonies and Protectorates. There seems to have been no organized attempt to take an economic survey of these vast territories scattered throughout the world and see how they can be a combined system be used for the benefit of the Empire as a whole. The Treaties in existence today at you know which are kept by the British people and not kept by other parties to the Agreement which definitely interfere with trade within the Empire countries. All these sort of things require looking to and they have got to be got rid of. England has done that sort of thing in the past and she has got to do it again. She is really an Empire within an Empire if you remove the self-governing Colonies and the Dominions from the picture and I do know the old country in the future will look into this question. It is perfectly ridiculous to my mind that you can have a different system of tariffs and so forth in different Crown Colonies which are really under one supreme permanent head in Whitehall.

Tanganyika
"The other subject which interests Southern Rhodesia as much as it does East Africa is the future of Tanganyika Territory (deers). I believe with the possible exception of Abyssinia if Africa were only left alone and the ownership under the Mandates remains as they are, it is the one Continent where there need never be a

war again, but if you are going to stretch other elements of the making for trouble in the future, in Africa and I do not think we deserve it.

"From Southern Rhodesia's point of view the protection and ownership of the air route by the British Empire is essential and I receive every reason to suppose my speech made by responsible statesmen there is no question of any change so far as the territorial ownership in that part of Africa is concerned (applause). "I think very much for asking me here tonight and I would like to say before I get down as I said last year that if the experience we have had of running our own show is of any use to the East African Council I shall be willing to attend any Conference or send a reputable representative." (Applause).

Sir William Furne
Sir William Furne who proposed the toast to the President, gave an interesting and somewhat recent tour in East Africa. He said: "We enjoyed every single day of that holiday and more than that the few months that we were allowed to spend in Kenya. We went to Kenya because our school boy has a farm there, a very little one up in the Molo district, and we had never during those two or three weeks just after the war—had the pleasure of seeing him in his own country. He would not change that country for any other if you offered him a chance to go elsewhere. (applause) and I believe that that is the feeling of all the splendid fellows. British men and women, that we met all over Kenya. And when I say that please do not misunderstand me I am referring not only to the settlers of all sorts and kinds but to the Government servants. I trust any amount of them myself. I met nothing but hospitality and the greatest courtesy and kindness and readiness to show me every thing from one end of the country to the other. And I only hope and pray that some day I may return to that part of East Africa."

Mr. Sims thanked them very warmly for having drunk his health and also for the very kind things he said about him. He was rather relieved because Sir William Furne said he did not know much about him. He more than enjoyed the remarks he had made about Kenya. He was 29 years in that country and if he had to have his life again he would choose in the same way. Before sitting down he proposed the health of Major Corbett Ward, the Secretary, Local officers followed him, and all the company sang "For his a jolly good fellow."

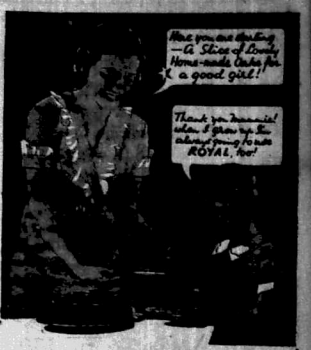

British do stand for the interests of all the inhabitants of territories under their rule, whether they be negroes, though without the intention of being ruled by non-Whites. AERODROME ROAD: GOVERNMENT OPPOSITION

To the Editor "E.A. Standard," Sir.—Government, on the recommendation of its Central Roads Board, has turned down the suggestion of another road to the Aerodrome.

Many months ago, representatives of the Municipal and District Councils, the Director of Public Works and put up a suggestion for a new road.

The District Council offered to make and maintain their portion of the road free of toll to the Aerodrome. The Municipal representative offered to reconstruct the Aerodrome.

The offer was not accepted. It was considered by the Municipal and District Councils that the proposed road was essential—and was as much a main trunk road as any in the Colony; therefore, they maintained that Government should be asked to contribute 50 per cent of the cost (this agreement obtains as regards Trunk Roads). The answer is as I have quoted.

I beg to submit my views and hope there are others who will support me.

The present road in Kenya, from the bottom of Secretariat Hill it is nothing but a succession of hills, "S" bends and blind corners. Below Secretariat Hill four roads converge. If a bus is traversing the hill it is hardly possible to get past with ease. At Nairobi, Trunk corners three and

four roads converge. Gymkhana Hill is a veritable death trap (especially when it rains). "Johns" of both sexes imagine that the slope will fall if they cannot beat the Air Mail to the Aerodrome to mothers and nurses with children who take advantage of the steady walk in the early evenings. Leaving Gymkhana Road, you get a beautiful right-hand bend in the K.A.R. lines with poor visibility. Finally a bridge that cannot stand up to very heavy traffic (the District Council had to turn down an application from the Bus Company as it considered that the narrow road and the bridge would be a danger to the travelling public).

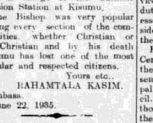
The portion of the road which concerns the District Council is to be kept in condition with less money available than five years ago and now the traffic is ten times greater.

A few reasons in support of the suggested Route: It would connect up with Sixth Avenue some fifty yards from the Post Office. Except for one good dual bend it would be practically a straight road, with full visibility throughout the whole way, no hills and plenty of stone and other material at hand.

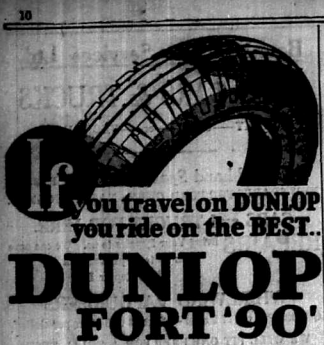

an revenue of about £78,000 and an increase in expenditure of about £7,000. On this basis of comparison the position over the first four months of this year is some £88,000 better than it was over the first four months of 1934.

Two Main Sources

The increase in revenue is mainly attributable to Customs and Native Hut and Poll Tax collections. The improvement in the Customs Revenue which was so marked in December of last year has mainly been maintained at least up to the end of May. Month by month the receipts have been higher than in the corresponding months of 1934. Up to the end of April, Customs revenue was about £27,000 greater than in 1934 and the Commissioner of Customs estimates that by the end of May this income amounted to £50,000. In the light of these returns it is reasonable to expect that the seasonal Estimate for Customs Revenue, that is to say, £600,000, will fully materialize and it is not widely extravagant to hope that there may be a net inconsiderable surplus.

Native Hut and Poll Tax collections up to the end of April exceeded those for the corresponding period of 1934 by about £31,000.

Unrelenting Economy

These favourable revenue returns lend stability to the 1935 revenue position. It is Government policy to recognize that the same rigid control over expenditure as has been exercised in the past must be unrelentingly maintained. The additional provision for expenditure for which sanction will be sought at this Session of Council as shown in the Schedule to the Address in Proclamation No. 1 of 1935 which will be laid on the table, totals £21,121, but of this sum over £2,000 represents additional provision covered by savings, and nearly £20,000 represents additional provision covered by reimbursement to revenue from the Colonial Development Fund and other sources. The schedule will be referred to the Finance Committee in accordance with the usual procedure.

Increased Export Total

The value of Kenya exports for the first four months of 1935 shows an increase of about a quarter of a million pounds over the value of exports for the corresponding period of 1934. The general increase which the Director of Agriculture draws from a study of the export figures to date and the agricultural prospects generally is that the value of agricultural exports during 1935 is likely to reach two million pounds, the sum which is desired by the Standing Finance Committee as a reasonable estimate. The increase over the figure for the first four months of 1934 is due mainly to the increased quantities of Coffee and Maize exported and to some extent to the higher values placed on coffee. The increase in the quantity of coffee shipped is due to the harvest of the 1934-1935 crop. Whereas in preceding years half or more of the crop has been exported before the end of the year, less than one-third of the 1934-1935 crop was exported in 1934.

The Coffee Outlook

After promising rains in the main coffee areas in February there were until recently only local and sporadic rains, with the result that the coffee situated in the drier areas suffered severely. Thus, while the trees were in excellent condition early in the year, a record crop in 1933-34, I am informed that only a good average crop may now be expected. The uncertainty as to Brazil's future policy in regard to the control of coffee exports has retarded adversely on the demand for the lower qualities of Kenya coffee.

but it is hoped that demands for the better grades will not be seriously affected. The production of Siim is steadily increasing in value and continues low. The recent heavy purchases by America, however, have considerably strengthened the demand for this commodity in the immediate future, and it is expected that this will be increasing prices. A research scheme with the object of finding new uses for Siim has been inaugurated at Lushay in Northern Rhodesia under the control of the Board of Trustees appointed by the Siim Industry Committees of Kenya and Tanganyika.

The Dairy Industry

The Animal and Dairy industries are making steady progress despite the difficulties of the past few years. The importation of purchased cattle in the Colony last year exceeded that for the previous year and the importations for the first four months of this year are only a few animals less than the total number for last year. Better machinery has recently been ordered, equipped and is now operating. At Eldoret, where more than 500,000 gallons of milk are produced in the chain of factories controlled by the Kenya Co-operative Creamery Limited, the value of butter exported last year was £41,268 as compared with £11,229 for the previous year.

Native Agriculture

In Native agriculture rapid progress has been made. The increased production is recorded in Maize, Cotton and Wattle Bark. The increase is particularly noteworthy in view of the drought conditions which have obtained most recently. The cotton from Nyansa Province has increased from about a million pounds of seed cotton in 1930-1931 to nearly eight million pounds and cotton is now being grown in practically all the Central Province, while its cultivation at the Coast is extending.

It is significant of the times that even the Masai are showing a tendency to engage in agriculture and maize plantations, cultivated by young warriors, are becoming an increasing feature in the Reserve. The general enthusiasm for agriculture and for the economic development of their lands is probably responsible to a great extent for the diminution of political agitation among the native peoples. As among the native peoples, it may well be said to be able to report an atmosphere of harmony and goodwill and an increasing desire to cooperate loyally in the common welfare. This is very apparent during the recent Jubilee Celebrations throughout the Colony and Protectorate.

The Agricultural Show

The Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society's Show last December was a decided success. It is particularly gratifying to be able to state that, as I am informed, the entries for the Society's Show to be held in Nairobi this next week constitute a record. The Colony is much indebted to the Society for its admirable work for the benefit of agriculture and it takes this opportunity of wishing the forthcoming Show the triumph and success which its promoters deserve.

Mining Progress

I am glad to be able to report that the Mining Industry continues to progress satisfactorily. The most important development is the commencement of activities in the Siacetti Goldfields at Gert River and Logorua. A year ago the outlook there was not very encouraging, but although there have been no

new finds of first-class importance, the introduction of fresh and adequate finance and re-organization have entirely changed the situation. At Kakamega the leading Companies are preparing for large scale production towards the end of the year and two of them expect to be treating an aggregate of over ten thousand tons per month by this time. Developments in Northern Rhodesia are similar to those in the Kakamega Goldfield. Companies of standing are examining prospects and taking options to an increasing extent, but there is still much prospecting to be done.

Public Health

On the subject of Public Health I have little to say except that the position seems to be satisfactory. The small epidemic, which was still present when Council last year closed, has now been completely eliminated for the year for some hundreds of deaths in the Northern Rhodesia and the Coast Province, has subsided and, so far as is possible, has been eliminated from the disease. In the course of the preventive campaign over 100,000 vaccinations were performed.

The fears that the prolonged drought followed by irregular rains might result in severe outbreaks of malaria have fortunately not materialized to any great extent. In Nairobi and in the Masai Reserve the malarial areas. I understand there has been no notable increase in the incidence of malarial fever in the districts to which I recently referred. It is a pleasure to visit this in its no small measure due to the active interest shown by the Government in the prevention of malarial fever. The outbreak in Nairobi has been limited to those areas which have been under the supervision of the Director of Medical Services and has not been serious in the course of this season, as also on the necessity for the provision of additional funds for the safeguarding of the public health.

Exit the Witchdoctor

The phenomenal increase in the numbers of Africans who now come to hospitals and dispensaries for medical or surgical treatment is one of the most emphatic signs of progress among our African peoples. It means that the power of the witchdoctor is justly becoming a thing of the past. A few years ago it was difficult to induce a native to take in a hospital provided treatment for over a million natives and in our native hospitals between five and six thousand operations were performed under anaesthetics. It is this result this Home may well be proud to have accomplished and may congratulate itself on the success of a policy which it has so consistently supported.

Economy Committee

The Select Committee on Economy have now concluded their deliberations and their report will be laid on the table during the course of the present Session. Changes in the personnel of the Committee owing to departures from the Colony, and sickness have delayed the preparation of the report which at the moment is being with the printer, and I and of course the Committee's recommendations will receive the most careful consideration.

THE MERCHANT'S FEARS

held on the table this morning. It is now some months since it was published and during the interval the recommendations embodied in the Report have been thoroughly examined. In order that the attitude of Government to the Report may be generally known, a paper setting out the views of Government will be laid on the table. Two of the major recommendations of the Committee are for the appointment of a Standing Board of Economic Development and for an increase in the capital of the Land Bank. Hon. Members will observe that Government endorses both these recommendations.

Loan Works

Government has recently been reconsidering the allocation of the balance of money still available under loan, and after full consideration has come to the conclusion that it is desirable to suspend temporarily work on the Central Offices, the construction of which had been approved. Hon. Members are aware of the present state of housing accommodation at the European Girls' Secondary School and of the Native Hospital in Nairobi. The necessity for the erection of suitable buildings to replace these inadequate, insanitary and time-expired structures is so urgent that Government has decided to give them priority over the Central Offices. Accordingly, with the approval of the Secretary of State, a financial resolution will be submitted to this Council during the present Session seeking sanction for the allocation of loan funds for the construction of new boarding accommodation for the European Girls' Secondary School, Nairobi, a grouped hospital in Nairobi, an extension which is badly needed to the Mathari Mental Hospital, and the reconstruction of the market at Kisumu which had to be demolished. In passing I should like to pay a tribute to the magnificent work that is being done at Mathari Mental Hospital, and to assure hon. Members that the plain evidence of progress will repay a visit to that Institution which owes so much to the energy, foresight and wisdom of one of our own citizens, Dr. Gordon. It is recalled that Central Offices are definitely required on the grounds of efficiency and economy, but

Government feels that the buildings which I have mentioned are more urgently necessary, and unfortunately there are not at present sufficient funds for both in our Loan Balances.

A New Loan

While on the subject of Loan Balances, I may mention that correspondence is proceeding with the Secretary of State as to the possibility of raising additional loan funds for the proposed increase in the capital of the Land Bank and for a new water supply scheme for Nairobi estimated to cost £112,000. Hon. Members will have seen from announcements in the Press that we have been granted two loans from the Colonial Development Fund, one of 951,000 for road development in the mining areas and another of £25,000 for the construction of an all-weather road from Kericho to Lumuria. Both these loans are free of interest for five years, thereafter bearing interest at 4 1/2 per cent.

The programme of construction is at present under detailed consideration by the Central Roads and Traffic Board. The Imperial Grant of £20,000 given in connection with the Land Commission Report was received in March and is being held in deposits in London. Proposals for expenditure against this Grant will be placed before Council in due course.

Railway Finance

Hon. Members have already received the Annual Report for 1934 of the Honourable the General Manager of the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours. This Report discloses the fact that the finances of the Administration have been fully restored and that it was found possible to eliminate completely the deficit of £217,746, leaving a small balance of £26,708 with which to reopen the Reserve Account. Hon. Members will agree with me that this is most satisfactory, particularly as it has been brought about largely by a reduction in working costs. To the end of April this year Railway revenue returns show a surplus over estimates of some £105,000. This is due largely to the fact that the Railway has been able to move the export traffic this year more rapidly than in previous years and the resulting revenue has been collected rather

promptly than usual. There is reason to believe, however, that this favourable position will not determine unambiguously the retention of the year.

Rate Reductions

Should this prove to be the case it will be clear that some permanent improvement will have taken place, and on this assumption the General Manager has already prepared a case for consideration by the Railway Advisory Council at their next meeting for granting relief to Railway users by means of rate reduction to operate from the beginning of 1935. A final decision on this point cannot of course be taken until later in the year, but it may be some satisfaction to hon. Members to know that prospects here so improved as to make it possible to consider such proposals, and I understand that there is a reasonable hope of relief being afforded which may amount to some £100,000. The realisation of this hope will of course depend on the Railway receipts for the second half of the year falling appreciably below present anticipations.

I am glad to be able to state that the Railway Council at its recent meeting unanimously recommended that the levy on the salaries of Railway servants should cease on the 1st July, 1935, that I have accepted that advice, and that the Secretary of State has concurred.

New Legislation

The programme before Council at this Session appears to be somewhat formidable. There are no less than thirty Bills to consider. I trust, however, that it will be found that the greater number of these are non-contentious in character. Among the more important are the Native Marketing Bill, the Legislative Council Bill, the Bills to amend the Criminal Procedure and Penal Codes, and the Sale of Pyrethrum Bill. As hon. Members know, the Native Marketing Bill has been under consideration for some time and has been the subject of much thoughtful work. With the amendments which Government proposes, if you agree, to introduce during Committee stage, I trust that the measure will prove acceptable to all sections of the community. I am confident that it is calculated to confer great

benefits on the native producers of this Colony.

Legislative Council

The Legislative Council Bill is an attempt to consolidate the legislation dealing with the election of Members of this House and arose from the appointment of a Select Committee last year whose Report will be laid on the table this morning. One of the recommendations of that Committee was that the life of the Council should be increased from three years to four years, and I am happy to say that the Secretary of State has been pleased to accept that recommendation, and the necessary amendments to the Bill will be moved in the Committee stage.

The Bill also provides for the division of the Indian electoral areas into three areas. Hitherto the area has consisted of the whole of the Colony and Provinces, and the question of elections in consequence proved exceedingly difficult for all concerned. The Bill before hon. Members proposes to rectify the position by a division of the area into three—East, West and Central—returning a total of five members on as present.

The Bills to amend the Penal and Criminal Procedure Codes are primarily for the purpose of giving effect to the recommendations of the Royal Commission of Enquiry into the operations of the Kenya Police and the administration of justice. The Sale of Pyrethrum Bill provides for the establishment of an agency similar to the Wheat Agency with the object of controlling the marketing of pyrethrum and maintaining high quality of exports by uniform grading and packing.

Justice

I would conclude by referring to the outstanding event, or rather series of events, which has taken place since we adjourned last December. That is, the celebration of His Majesty the King's Silver Jubilee. Telegrams and loyal messages and addresses were sent to His Majesty by the Colony and by many bodies, Associations and communities within the Colony. The loyal celebrations were worthy of the occasion and it is a matter for universal gratification that all these, most commendable, and I trust were in complete unity and unanimity in giving expression to their hearty and loyal loyalty to His Majesty's Person and Throne. (Applause).

ASSISTANT BUILDING INSPECTORS

Two to be Retained by Municipality

Whether or not Nairobi requires two assistant building inspectors was discussed at length at Tuesday's meeting of the Municipal Council of Nairobi.

It arose out of a recommendation by the Finance Committee to adhere to their previous decision that only one such inspector should be employed, and to give notice to one of the staff in view of the impending return from leave of Mr. Pritchard.

A letter from the Municipal Engineer was minuted in which it was pointed out, inter alia, that one assistant building inspector was insufficient for the efficient conduct of all necessary inspections and that the appointment was not experienced enough to deputise. It would also be unfair to the apprentices and would restrict the scope of their training to be then to one form of work.

Opening the discussion, Councillor T. A. Wood pointed out that the recommendation was not approved by the entire committee and that the question was worthy of reconsideration.

Councillor Davidson asked how many buildings had been inspected and was informed that there were one clerk and two assistant inspectors in reply. He pointed out that the senior was employed in town planning for practically his entire time and that instead of there being three inspectors, two only were available.

At this juncture the Town Clerk read a letter from Mr. Pritchard, still on leave, stating that the letter was unable to return to the City and tendering his resignation.

Councillor Tyson said that this did not affect the principle. The Council ought to be guided by the opinion of the Municipal Engineer, who had stated with one assistant inspector only, work could not be undertaken efficiently.

Economy Question. Councillor Thakoe made reference to a previous resolution of the Council regarding the need for economy and suggested that in the circumstances one assistant building inspector was sufficient for the time being. If the Council altered their decision short from time to time they would make themselves a laughing stock. Very few plans were being taken up at the moment, and in view of the necessity for rigid economy, he proposed adhering to the original recommendation.

Councillor Allen pointed out that 140 building inspections had been carried out during the last month. The uniformity of interfering with the training of apprentices was obvious and to employ one man only to carry out that number of inspections was false economy.

In reply to Councillor Davidson the Town Clerk, while agreeing that the designation of one building inspector was a misnomer, pointed out that the Municipal Engineer was also the Town Planning Engineer and that no other officer could be so styled. The proper designation of the officer at present functioning as Town Planning Engineer could be decided by the next meeting of the Finance Committee.

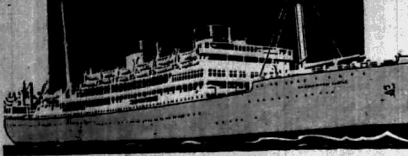

PASTURES FOR PROFITS.

One of the greatest difficulties about farming at present, declared Mr. Fisher, principal of the School of Agriculture, Cedars, was that people attempted farming on too big a scale.
Mr. Fisher explained that if 20 a year were spent on fertilizing each acre of grass, the value of that acre would be raised to anything between £20 and £100. The yield of milk from an acre of ordinary unimproved poor soil was about 100 gallons, but at Cedars 1,200 gallons of milk had been obtained from an acre of improved and fertilized Kikuyu, and this yield was likely to be exceeded this year. They had already shown that it was possible to do much better with a small farm property than with a large one that was left more or less as it was found.

Although it cost £4 annually to fertilize and improve one acre of Kikuyu grass, such an acre when improved was worth "anything up to £100." Calculating the price of milk at the low figure of 4d. a gallon, this yield gave milk of the value of £20, and if the farmer's total costs were £10 an acre, he still had a profit of £10 per acre.
On fertilized land Mr. Fisher said that he had succeeded in obtaining 202 lb. of butter from three Jersey cows on one acre of grass in one year, which represented a revenue of £20 2s., as well as the value of 1,100 gallons of separated milk. The cows also gained weight on that acre.

A SECOND JACK JOHNSON

Negro Who Smashed Carnera Italian a Pitiabile Sight Referee Stops Fight IN THE SIXTH ROUND

[STANDARD] BRITISH ASSOCIATION. New York, June 25. Primo Carnera, the giant Italian, suffered one of the heaviest defeats of his career to-night when Joe Louis, the negro boxer, gained a second-round knockout over him in the sixth round. Louis is billed as a second Jack Johnson and certainly to-night gives further evidence of his ability. After being battered for five rounds Carnera went down four times in the sixth, when he looked utterly towards the referee as though he wanted the fight stopped. This referee did. Carnera

was a pitiful sight long before the end came. His face and chest were smeared with blood from a cut on the corner of his mouth. Louis opened with a murderous attack upon the Italian. He started with a half a dozen stinging lefts and rights to the jaw almost without respite. Carnera appeared to be nervous. At the beginning of the second the Italian landed with left and a right to the head, but the negro got under his guard and sent a series of hard blows to the body. Louis struck his man on the ropes in the third round landing to the face and the body after Carnera had stopped many punches with his arms. Just before the end of the round Louis sent a series of soft jabs followed by three stinging blows to the stomach.

Carnera Shaken

Carnera appeared to regain his confidence at the commencement of the fourth round and looked Louis on to the ropes where he twice landed to the head, and then secured with a series of soft jabs followed with a right to the head. But Louis retaliated with a couple of lefts and a right to the jaw which shook the Italian. Louis then hit his man at the start of the fifth round, and Carnera took a tremendous lull of punishment. The negro went in a series of swift lefts and rights to the head and body, then was staggered by a right hook. The Italian looked ready to drop at any moment but the referee stepped in to reserve him for a second round.

Italian Downed Four Times

The next round, the sixth, was to prove to be the last. Louis floored Carnera with a stinging right hook to the jaw which sent him down for a count of three. He went down again following a left and a right to the head, then three more from left hooks to the head. Carnera rose in a dazed condition, and the referee stopped the fight at the count of four. Louis received a tremendous ovation from the crowd of over 20,000 who witnessed the fight, having been a Jack Johnson's successor.

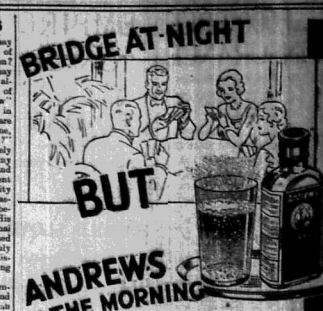

Excelsior Entreats

SOMETHING FOR EVERYBODY AT KIBETA NEXT WEEK

Encouraging, informative, instructive, exciting, amusing—all the qualities which, combined, go to make up an supreme degree of interest, are forecast for the Nairobi Show of the Royal Agricultural and Horticultural Society of Kenya, to be held on Thursday and Friday of next week.

The exhibits, competitive, official, and trade, and all the divisions of the show, on stand, bench, in pen, ring and track, have been well patronised, and it seems assured in advance, that the Show, always among the most important events of the Colony's calendar, will this year attain heights of interest and importance never before reached.

A Jubilee Effort

On the competitive side of the show there has been a particular emphasis on the early satisfactory entry in the livestock categories. There will be over 140 horses, 130 equines, 60 sheep, 60 pigs, 180 poultry and 170 dogs on show, and special entries have had to be made for the wide accreditation for the annual show which is being held in the Jubilee centenary year. The dairy produce section is another department in which entries will be in advance of the previous years while 200 entries in the "home industries" and almost 12,000 from children in the Juvenile classes make it clear that all sections of Kenya's agricultural community take an interest in the show.

Gymkhana Events

The children's equestrian events are expected to prove an attraction and the riding and jumping events for adults are very well fitted, while the gymkhana side of the show, regarded by the public as the most interesting, will take place on each afternoon of the show.

While the lighter side of the show programme is being mentioned, the display by the King of African Rifles and Police mounted on the parade will not be overlooked. The K.A.R. will give a spectacular exhibition while recruits of the Police Department will give a display of show drill.

Turning to the non-competitive side of the show, it will be found that Government Departments have co-operated very largely, and a number of full-time officials of public utility which show provide, are also present.

The checking of soil erosion provides the chief subject of the Planting Day which will be held on the 27th of June. Models, to be made of an inch to a foot, have been prepared showing the effects of erosion on forest and grass lands.

Bills Passed Yesterday

ADJUSTMENTS TO MEET LOSS IN REVENUE

The second reading of various bills occupied yesterday's session of Legislative Council, held in the Memorial Hall, Nairobi.

Standing Orders were suspended so that two bills, amending the Customs Tariff Ordinance, 1953 and the Excise Duties Ordinance, 1951, could be passed, as they were referred to the committee for their second reading, were referred to select committees. Five smaller amending bills passed their second reading without discussion.

The two bills which passed all their stages have the effect of increasing the excise duty on locally produced tobacco and cigarettes from 20 cents and 75 cents per pound, respectively, to a flat rate of the 1/20 per pound. The customs duty is increased to shs. 2/60 per pound, the excise duty on foreign cigars, to remain as at present.

Measures Opposed

The measures were opposed by Lord Francis Scott (Edin. Univ.) who said that the proposed increase in tobacco and cigarette duties was a step towards increasing consumption of local products and that the proposed measures were being enacted simultaneously in Uganda and Tanganyika.

Among the bills referred to select committees were the Cite Industry Bill, and the Sale of Goods Bill. The first is designed to give protection to the production of cork products and the second to give protection to the production of cork products.

WHY KENYA IS THE MAIN BATTLEGROUND

In the following article Major Morgan explains the difference between the "Black States" and Kenya in the national depression and returns to the bosom of his family—but for European settlement the present policy, Major Morgan contends, is a game of "general post" resulting in the dismantling of the present market and the disappearance of production until new-countries arrive to take over the neglected assets at any price.

(By Major E. S. Morgan, D.S.O.)

WE have now traced the evolution of the stupendous tragedy in which the Indian Empire and India have been involved, without internal powers of resistance such as are enjoyed by self-governing countries controlling their own resources.

It is necessary to explain why Kenya has become the main battleground of the issue involved. In principle, the distinction between Kenya and other units of the Colonial Empire. In fact the fall in prices-level of the main West Coast products has been even more catastrophic than that of the main East Coast products with Kenya, in that their economies depend mainly upon a European-controlled industry (sugar) and a more widely controlled industry (tea).

THE KENYA DIFFERENCE

The fundamental sociological difference between Kenya and most of the other units of the Colonial Empire is the fact that the whole economic structure of Kenya is based on a large scale, European-controlled, primary industry and the economic structure of those other units is based on a small scale, African-controlled, primary industry.

THE "BLACK STATES"

In the present stage of the depression the administrative machinery of the Civil Service stands pat on its money-made-up claim upon the shrunken gross proceeds of local production, and by withdrawing the normal margin of profit, Kenya (and other units) are left in the lap of the antediluvian peasant.

THE "BLACK STATES"

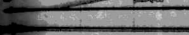

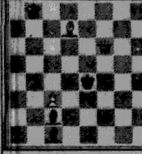

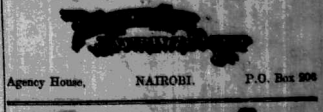

HUGE CONCENTRATION OF WAR MATERIAL

RECENTLY I sailed on an Italian liner from Memba...

of the fine liner. Some 150 troops embarked. The officers were...

three hours or so. The salt works at Massaua are well worth a visit by the tourist.

The steamer sent to ours was unshipped miles. These...

The bay presented a scene of great military activity. Fifteen other steamers, mostly all flying the Italian flag, were landing...

Talking to the soldiers, one gained the impression that they were glad to turn their backs on Italian Somaliland. Several Italian casualties, too weak to walk...

Ships arriving after us had to anchor outside the harbour, awaiting their turn to enter as soon as more berths became available. One of these was a 22,000 tons luxury liner...

We made up an English party and went ashore. A few odd, prehistoric-looking dishes had made their way to the quay...

Incidentally, by way of diversion, a motor launch was caught on a line by the crew of a cargo boat anchored 'near to us'.

After twenty-four hours we weighed anchor. At Massaua, a pleasant four days at sea...

The harbour was piled high with stacks of war material. There was timber for barracks, ready made iron sections for seating, screw pickets and hook-up material for a light...

A point of interest that impressed all was the great number of motor-bikes dashed in and out of the endless stream of traffic, where kerbs had to cravelling at the head pace of the carned-down vehicles.

The harbour police banded our liner, and those wishing to go ashore had to obtain an official permit. Many thousands of troops were camped under canvas on the left bank of Mogadiscio under the pitiless sun. It would be difficult to imagine a more bare-looking place than this part of the world.

An English journalist with a friend and travelling companion booked their passage here. Their story was that they had been sent out by a home party to report on the Italian Abyssinian activities. He wrote from England, they had obtained letters of introduction from men of note in Rome, but even with those they were not granted any facilities by authorities in Mogadiscio and their work's stay had to be as one could perhaps best distinctly unfruitful.

When we had returned to the boat we amused ourselves by throwing coils to small naked native divers. I did not see a single coil missed, which was thrown into the sea within reasonable reach of these children. On re-appearing on the surface they would hold up the retrieved coil and then stow it away in their mouths. When these were filled to capacity, they clambered into their canoes and paddled off to the next liner.

Many more Italian came on board, including a large number of deck passengers—were over-crowded. Soldiers and labourers made up their sleeping quarters in the passages of the war.

Eventually, we made fast to the quay. Stockpiles of every description, arms and munitions, vast quantities of road material, cement and tar, corrugated iron, ambulances, motor lorries, and a hundred other accoutrements of war.

"SEE it for yourself" has been a convincing sales argument since the days of barter and is as true to-day as when the cave men exchanged flint axes and spear heads for skins, salt and dried meat. This universal triumph of salesmanship was the primary cause that underlay the employment of mannequins by fashionable modistes.

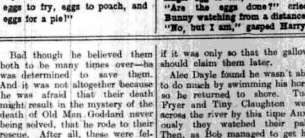

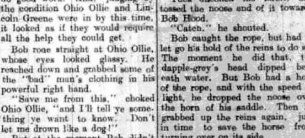

Rhodesian Trial Shipment

ENCOURAGING REPORTS FROM SMITHFIELD

BASIS FOR A POLICY OF EXPANSION

In view of the many references which have recently been made in these columns to the Export of Frozen Porkers, we publish herewith a Report on the first trial shipment sent from Rhodesia early in 1934.

The first assignment of frozen pork from Southern Rhodesia was despatched to the United Kingdom in February of 1934.

The object of this experimental shipment was to determine whether the better type of pork raised in this Colony would be suitable for the English frozen pork trade.

Some few facts commonly available in this Colony would present a convincing case for the export of such a product.

The Pigs Selected. Approximately 300 pigs were selected from the herds of eight different farmers.

After slaughter each pig was separately numbered, measured and described.

Grading and Shipment. The description of each sale lot is given in a subsequent section of the report.

No difficulties were experienced in the transport and marketing of the pigs.

Reports on the pigs were obtained from the Stock Brokers' Meat Co., Ltd., and the London office of the Imperial Storage Co., Limited.

The following is a brief summary of the results of the trial shipment.

The pigs were of a type which is very suitable for the United Kingdom trade and would compare most favorably with New Zealand and Australian pigs.

A few carcasses were scratched with red wax mark, this was appreciated by the buyers.

There were also some redlich piglets which were very healthy and no doubt this would also be of value.

Regarding the black pig, the white pig naturally looks a better finished article and has a better appearance.

The hardness of the fat of the back of the various lots and the New Zealand pigs referred to in the report is of importance.

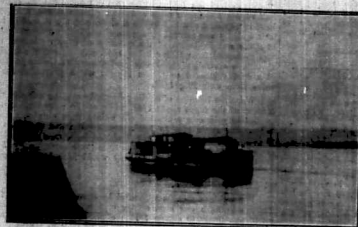
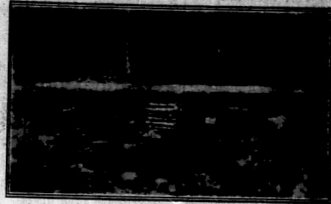

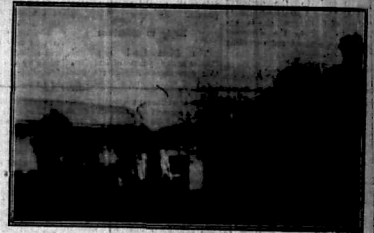
