### HISTORY AND BUSINESS:

In order to understand fully the history of B.A.T. Kenya Limited it is necessary to sketch in outline the history of its predecessors and component parts in East Africa.

British-American Tobacco Company Limited (hereinafter called "B.A.T.") first entered East Africa in 1907 where it registered as a foreign company importing, marketing and eventually manufacturing cigarettes and other tobacco products.

East African Tobacco Company Limited (hereinafter called "the old E.A.T.") was formed in 1932 and traded in East Africa in cigarettes and other tobacco goods until 1949 when it was acquired by B.A.T. and on the 23rd November 1949 a new company called East African Tobacco Company Limited (hereinafter called "E.A.T.") was formed within the B.A.T. Group which took over the interests of both B.A.T. in East Africa and the old E.A.T.

In May 1950 a small company, Kenya Tobacco Company Limited, was formed and traded until 1956 when it sold its business to B.A.T., together with the right to use its name. E.A.T. then formed a new company, Kenya Tobacco Company (1961) Limited, the name of which was subsequently changed to East African Tobacco Company (Kenya) Limited.

On the 29th April, 1952, Rift Valley Cigarette Company Limited was incorporated, but this company failed to obtain a significant share of the market. In 1952 the company was acquired by E.A.T. and its name was subsequently changed to B.A.T. Kenya Limited in 1963 when it acquired the Kenya assets of E.A.T.

On 1st February, 1965 as part of a general reorganisation within the B.A.T. Group in East Africa, E.A.T. was reconstructed as a result of which there emerged three companies, namely B.A.T. Kenya Limited, B.A.T. Uganda Limited and B.A.T. Tanzania Limited to which were transferred the assets and liabilities of E.A.T. in Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania respectively. E.A.T. then went into voluntary liquidation.

In July 1966 Rothmans of Pall Mall (Kenya) Limited (hereinafter called "Rothmans") was formed and after a period of competition an approach was made to the E.A.T. Group as a result of which B.A.T. Kenya Limited acquired the entire capital of the Company in November 1967. The name of the Company was subsequently changed to Kenya Tobacco Company Limited. Rothmans had a subsidiary company previously called the African Cigarette Company and now called African Cigarette Company (Overseas) Limited.

Kenya Limited has inherited a distinguished market leadership. From modest beginnings manufactured by B.A.T., E.A.T. and now B.A.T. Kenya Limited has increased steadily over the years replacing almost entirely cigarettes and other tobacco products previously imported.

# to urged to use dependence on Pact call

Foreign Ministers, Rogers apparently argued against immediate opening of negotiations on a "block-bloc" level on the ground that it might nip in the bud any real hope for concrete progress.

One of the most obvious stumbling blocks would almost certainly be the German question and the status of Berlin. There seemed to be a strong chance that premature negotiations would break down on this and other related questions.

The Nato communiqué leaves the door open to contact between individual alliance members and Soviet "bloc" countries, which will, hopefully, lay the groundwork for a future full-scale East-West conference.

Contacts between Nato and Warsaw Pact members should at least give the council some idea of possible areas of agreement. At their next meeting, scheduled for December in Brussels, the Foreign Ministers are to study a list of specific subjects on which negotiations could profitably begin.

The communiqué is far from being a simple rejection of the Budget proposal. It is in fact more in the order of "make haste slowly".

The communiqué said that "during an era of globalisation the defence posture of the alliance should not be related and premature expectations of solutions to joint defence questions should not be generated."

"The maintenance of effective defence forces is an essential and necessary condition for effective defence."

Alliance members reaffirmed "their continuing determination to make appropriate contributions to joint efforts for defence and deterrence at all levels, both nuclear and conventional."

The "necessary military posture of the alliance consists of the strategic nuclear deterrent force, the presence of sufficient substantial and effective North American and European conventional forces and an adequate supporting tactical nuclear force in the European theatre."

The Ministers have reviewed the situation in Berlin, and they have "observed that there has been no such 'obstructions' to the city, nor any such 'obstructions' to the city."

They considered that the "achievement of a peaceful European settlement is a matter of high priority and progress towards settling existing sources of tension in the centre of Europe."

Concrete measures aimed at improving the situation in Berlin, safeguarding for access to the city, and removing restrictions on the movement of people and goods towards the objectives of the communiqué are being pursued.

Defence Ministers would consider problems related to arms production and standardisation at their next meeting, scheduled for May.

The communiqué said that the "Nato Ministers and representatives of the member States, the Netherlands and Canada, along with interested observers, met in Brussels in December to discuss the arms production and standardisation of the Atlantic Force gave their demonstration against similar sea and underwater attacks, a Nato representative in the air, carrier of the 700,000-ton aircraft carrier, pledged to remain loyal to the state."

## ANNOUNCED IN U.S. BUDGET

Nixon announced a cut of \$1,400,000,000 from the budget for the fiscal year 1969.

The budgetary surplus which Mr. Johnson had estimated at about \$1,100,000,000 will exceed the highest figure for 18 years.

Mr. Nixon said "in surplus of this magnitude will break leaders in the world that the United States is determined to bring a halt to the inflationary spiral which has seriously affected."

He added "The administration will never turn its back upon the growing needs of the American people. We have come into office convinced that there are better ways than the old way to solve new problems and we intend to explore these more fully."

Several weeks ago President Nixon announced that a reduction in Federal expenses would be the centre of his strategy against inflation. He felt that the restriction in credit imposed by degrees since the beginning of the year had not been as effective as hoped.

Mr. Robert M. La Follette, Director of the Bureau of Budget, confirmed that the rate of expansion of the American economy had slowed down since the start of the year. The Government had decided to impose supplementary restrictions on the budget, where returns exceeded spending.

## President Nyerere praises China's great progress

President Nyerere has praised China for making "tremendous progress in the field of human development" in a message to the current ninth congress of the Chinese Communist Party in China.

The Agency reported.

Extending the "warmest greetings of the Tanzanian people to the Government, the ruling Tanganyika African National Union, and the Afro-Shirazi Party, to the congress," he said the change process in China "scored unprecedented victories over the forces of the old and the forces of the cultural revolution."

Another message, Mr. I. B. Makiyeva, president of the United Republic of South Africa, said he was pleased that the cultural revolution would be an "operation to all the people of the world and that the 'wisdom, clear thought and leadership' of Chairman Mao Tse-tung would be a beacon to guide and enlighten the people of the world, and the exploited masses of Latin America, Asia and Africa."

The agency also published the text of a message to the Congress from the Government of the United Republic of South Africa, which said "the imperialists and their allies would like to minimise the revolutionary significance of the Congress, but they will fail."

It said that the "great success" of the cultural revolution "explains why the imperialists and their revisionist accomplices are making every effort to foil the progress of the cultural revolution."

Four thousand political prisoners who were involved in the 1965 abortive coup are to be sent to the Samaria villages to do productive work, it was officially announced.

Major-General Dikara, the South Sumatra military commander, said this was possible because the security situation in his area was "favourable". Nevertheless, those released would be "properly controlled."

Some 100 political prisoners were released recently at a ceremony at Legal, Central Java, the Antara news agency reported. They belonged to the category — those considered least deeply indoctrinated. They pledged to remain loyal to the state.

## Czechoslovakia gives pressure on Warsaw Pact

The Executive Committee of the Czechoslovak Communist Party said that "certain institutions were bringing improper pressure to bear before next week's plenary session of the Central Committee."

The names of the institutions concerned were not mentioned.

The executive committee, presided over by the First Secretary, Mr. Alexander Dubcek, denounced demonstrations being planned by the institutions in connection with the meeting on Thursday.

The Czech News Agency quoted the committee as saying "We do not tolerate such an imposition of pressure from the Central Committee being held under the effects of such disturbances."

The First Secretary of the Slovak Communist Party, Mr. Gustav Husak, went on record as saying that the press and radio had too much power to make or break political decisions.

He told a meeting of farmers at Nitra that "the Press, radio and mass propaganda created 'idols'. They only just failed to 'fall' on their faces to reach the images of certain people," he said.

He said those persons who at the moment were being discredited by the spoken word had such power

that they could "eliminate from the more serious mistakes could be made by the Press."

Mr. Husak stressed the need to criticise those in high places because the higher the official the more serious his mistakes could be for the face of the nation. He emphasised the need to strengthen party discipline.

Mr. Husak's speech was briefly reported in the press, but fuller extracts were carried by political journals.

The trade union organ *Pravda* said that repression being considered against the Press was not to be carried out on March 28 and 29 should not be allowed as "those who are not guilty" of those disturbances.

The newspaper said union representatives in the Press had adopted a joint statement condemning "provocative" and "denigrating" "provocative" and "denigrating" "provocative" to back up "criticism and accusation."

Healthy nations ignore hunger coin

By PAUL COOPER

In a message to highlight world food problems the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization has launched an international coin series—the first in monetary history.

So far more than 20 countries have agreed to take part, and already some of the coins, carrying slogans such as "Produce More Food" and "War Against Hunger," and "Let There Be Bread" have gone into circulation.

The designs vary from country to country. The new 20 franc piece from South Vietnam shows a farm girl harvesting rice. Uganda, anxious to increase livestock production, has on the reverse of its new 5 franc a long-horned Ankole cow standing in a field.

The Syrian pound, worth about 20 Sterling, has five stars of oak with the word "Peace" written in Arabic, and the Vatican iron sheet Christ of the 1950s. The 1000s of Madagascars of the Harvest, and a 2000s of the Sun.

Some coins have been issued in small quantities and are designed primarily for collectors and souvenir hunters. Only 60,000 Jordanian coins are being issued, and the Vatican ones, also limited in small quantities, were sold out in under a month.

The primary purpose of the coin plan is educational, and most of the coins will become a normal part of national currency. Syria, Egypt and Ceylon are minting 500000 "hunger" coins, India and Burma 2,000,000.

By the next 20 years and more, coins in five continents will be carrying an international message. Nearly all signs have a face value higher than their metal content and the profit arising from the coins is being used for famine relief.

India, which has issued the most coins, has also issued the most famine relief stamps. The stamps are being changed to carry international famine relief messages.

Famine relief is especially important in the case of the new Vespa 180 Rally. So far two Vespa Rally coins have been issued. The first is a 1000s of the Vespa Rally, and the second is a 2000s of the Vespa Rally. The Vespa Rally coins are donating 20,000 coins of each being in a good cause. The prisoners, locked up for the past year, are Haitians dedicated to overthrowing the regime of President Francois Duvalier. They were jailed for unlawful military drilling on the tiny island of Cap-Haitien, Cayenne, with a recommendation for early deportation.

But where should they be deported? That is the question that has baffled the Bahamas Government to such an extent that they decided to call in the United Nations Commission for Refugees.

Mr. John Kelly, a United Nations official, visited the Bahamas for talks with the Prime Minister, Mr. Lynden Pindling, the Home Affairs Minister, Mr. Arthur Hanna, and other top Government members.

The object: To decide the future of men who were anxiously for a country to which the Bahamas will consent to admit them.

Costs that mean

For the past year, 44 would-be liberators of Haiti have been locked up in Nassau Prison after being arrested on a tiny Bahamian island. Their plight is simple and tragic — no country will accept them.

The Bahamas Government made its clear immediately after their arrest last March that in no circumstances would the men be deported to Haiti, where they would most certainly face the firing squad.

At the same time, to free them would jeopardize the cordial relations which exist between the Bahamian and Haitian Governments.

In Britain the introduction of decimal coinage has provided a great opportunity for new designs, but it appears that the new money will not carry any of the old world heraldic devices — lions, roses and the Madonnas of the harvest, and so on.

It is too early to say whether the F.A.O. coin plan, like the U.N. Capital Development Fund, will show the developed and the developing countries of the world lined up in different camps.

Several developed countries are developing the scheme with favour, but the United States and Britain are not.

and it is possible that if one set two decide to join in, others will follow suit.

In 1963, 150 states participated in F.A.O.'s stamp campaign, but the coin plan cannot hope for temporary support. The attitude of the richer nations to the proposal of the Third World has changed since then.

The proposition of G.N.P. in development aid has sunk in the last five years, and the creation of progressive tariff associations like the Common Market has done nothing to improve the trading position of the developing countries, who have also failed to benefit from the Kennedy Round tariff cuts.

The nations for the Kennedy Round Tariff cuts are another straw in the wind. It was anticipated to reach 30,000 by 1970, but for the last five years it has remained static around the 11,000 mark.

The unwillingness of most European and North American governments to advertise world food problems through their postage is just one more example of the retrogression in international politics.

Plight of would-be liberators

Representatives of the United Nations, the United States and France are giving close attention to the plight of 44 desperate men detained in Nassau's Fort Barrington.

The prisoners, locked up for the past year, are Haitian and Bahamian. They are being held for military offences on the tiny Bahama island of Barrow's Cay with a recommendation for early deportation.

But where should they be deported? That is the question that has bedeviled the Bahamian Government to such an extent that they decided to call in the United Nations Committee for Refugees.

Mr. John Kirby, a United Nations official, has been in Nassau for talks with the Prime Minister, Mr. Lynden Pindling, the Home Affairs Minister, Mr. Arthur Hanna, and other top Government members.

The subject: To decide the fate of men who are considered for a country outside the Bahamas willing to admit them.

On the past year, 44 would-be liberators of Haiti have been locked up in Nassau's Fort Barrington. Their plight is thought and would — no country would accept them.

The Bahamian Government made it clear immediately after their arrest last March that in no circumstances would the men be deported to Haiti, where they would almost certainly face the firing squad.

At the same time, to free them would jeopardise the cordial relations which exist between the Bahamian and Haitian Governments.

The problem has been solved to some extent by the efforts of American consular representatives in Nassau. Of the original 11 strong group arrested, 11 have been given a 10-day reprieve to enter the United States.

But it seems that only another one of the remaining 44 possess the skills which would qualify them for consideration by immigration authorities.

They will lie at the mercy of United Nations and the French immigration authorities.

Mr. J. Coody, the American consular officer, said that he has arranged to take about half of the prisoners to New York and the rest to Washington.

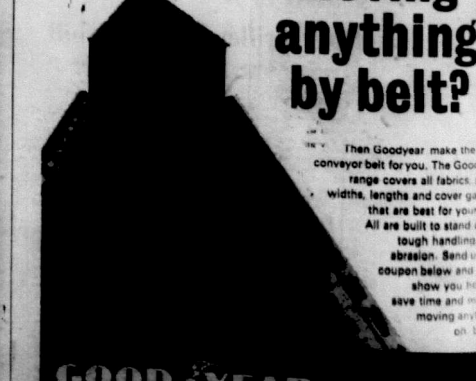

# FORGOTTEN FIGHT SMITH'S CALL IN RHODESIA

Rhodesia's Centre Party yesterday prepared to launch an initiative to return the country away from what it regards as its current political dead-end. It has a long-term aim of now beginning to limber up to contest the next general election, due by 1971.

Its chances of making a single seat off Mr. Smith's party now would be probably nil, but party officials expect that by the time the election came around they would be strong enough to take a few seats in what could be marginal areas.

Another more immediate challenge the party is to throw out the Rhodesian Front as over the question of the referendum due within a month or two on the Constitution newly drafted by the Government providing for a separate voters' roll, and racially separated provincial assemblies under a multi-racial national parliament.

Mr. Bashford told reporters after the conference that the party was going to fight the Constitution tooth and nail, even if the party is defeated.

"It will come on fighting until the conditions which we in Rhodesia prevail," he said.

Branding the Front's constitution as racist and bound to bring future suffering to the country, the Centre Party on Sunday drew up the broad outlines of its own constitution plan.

At a meeting a "secure framework for the peaceful development of all Rhodesia's people", the Constitution would ensure Rhodesia a continued loyalty to the British Crown, with Queen Elizabeth II as Head of State.

# Anguilla envoy's future in doubt

The future of the British Commissioner in Anguilla, Mr. Anthony Stewart, appeared in some doubt yesterday after apparently contradictory announcements over the island.

Foreign Secretary, Mr. James Callaghan, announced that Mr. Stewart would be going back to the Caribbean island after a long holiday. But Mr. Stewart did not specify in what capacity Mr. Lee would replace him.

It is perplexed observers believe a Foreign Office spokesman announced on Saturday that Mr. Lee was being replaced by Mr. John Cumber, who went to Anguilla with Lord Caradon, Britain's permanent representative at the United Nations.

Lord Caradon confirmed in a communication to Mr. Cumber that Mr. Stewart was being replaced by Mr. Lee. Confusion increased when it was learned that Mr. Lee had only discovered that same day that he would be returning to Anguilla after his holiday. The Commissioner, according to those reports, said he expected to remain on the island until the beginning of May.

British officials, however, authoritative sources maintained that they had been "no lack of co-ordination in policy concerning Mr. Lee's position."

Observers speculated that Mr. Stewart's statement concerning Mr. Lee could be a warning to Anguilla's self-styled president, Mr. Robert Webster, who had called for the present High Commissioner to be withdrawn from the island when the British landing force arrived on March 19, as a condition for opening negotiations with Britain.

Authoritative sources commented that Mr. Webster's increasing opposition to everything that Britain is doing to try to establish law and order has been noted in London more in sorrow than anger and with a feeling that he would be well advised to drop his more extreme advisers."

# CALM AFTER SONS RIOT

Prisoners yesterday at a committee, which was claiming new prison regulations and a new code of penal procedure.

Some 2,000 police and carabinieri were on the spot yesterday. Several police were in hospital suffering from the effects of tear gas.

Trouble started at the prison when 1,000 convicts, mounted on Saturday. Police got them under control, but a new riot broke out when the men learned that the usual weekly visiting day had been cancelled because of the mutiny.

The prisoners agreed to go back to their cells but later broke out again.

Prisoners smashed down the wall dividing the cells and one large group worked systematically through the wall separating them from the women's prison.

The women prisoners were streaming.

One sign that the mutinous convicts were successfully stepping up pressure was the departure of a car from the prison, carrying a nun and five children. Women prisoners with very young infants were normally permitted to keep them in the building.

A group of 30 inmates of Genoa Prison followed the example of Turin and refused to re-enter their cells until the public prosecutor had heard their demands for prison reform.

Prison authorities put through a telephone call to the prosecutor and he promised to visit the prisoners. The men then went back to their cells.

# Moscow wants European conference

Russia is expected to exert pressure on East and West European nations for a pan-European conference on European security, following the N.A.T.O. ministerial conference that has just ended in Washington.

A habitual stumbling block to calling such a conference are the Soviet-led intervention in Czechoslovakia, sources said in Moscow.

Since no collective agreement on the issue emerged at the N.A.T.O. conference, Moscow was expected to reach bilateral agreements with the countries concerned.

Kremlin it was felt, would support its objective.

First, relaxation of tension in Europe would be presented not as a problem for N.A.T.O. but as the task of each separate European Government.

Second, instead of waiting for a settlement of the German problem before calling the conference, the conference would be one of speeding up such a settlement.

Third, Soviet intervention in Czechoslovakia would be defended as a family affair, whereby, one of the conditions for a pan-European negotiation, that of maintaining the status quo, was preserved.

It was not yet clear whether the U.S.S.R. would, as in the past, use Soviet embassies abroad as the

A split has developed in the South Vietnamese pro-Government National Alliance for Social Revolution political groups.

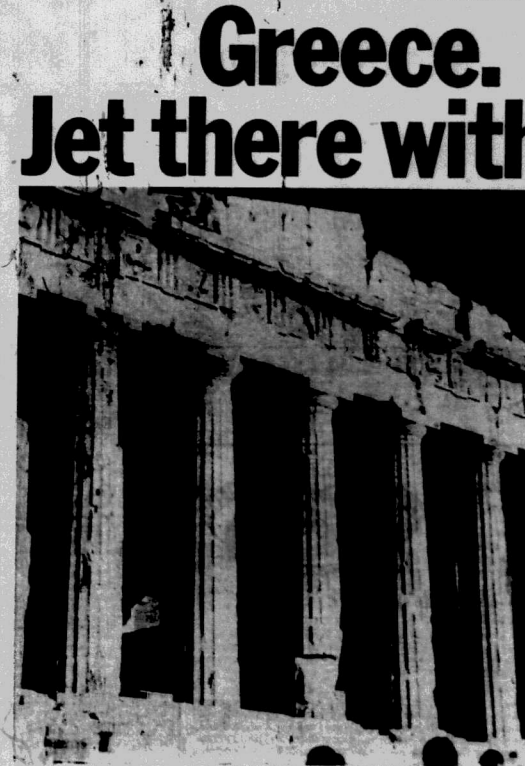

**More babies on the doorstep**

It is not unknown for people to find babies on their doorsteps, and it happens from time to time in every part of the world. But, in Kenya, the number of abandoned babies has increased alarmingly and one home which literally finds itself with bits of little babies on its doorstep is Dr. Barnardo's Home.

As it is the only home in Kenya that accepts abandoned babies from birth the cases brought to its attention exceed by far the number of beds and space available and many have to be turned away to await a place in the home.

Many of the young babies are found abandoned in bushes by social workers and this is usually the result of the mother dying in childbirth, and leaving the father to cope with too large a family.

The poor newly-born is thus cast out and is brought to the home. If the case is really desperate the home will somehow manage to fit it in among its other babies. Otherwise the baby is given a temporary home in a hospital or with a voluntary organisation until provision can be made for it at Dr. Barnardo's.

The nursery section of the home too small to take in any more than the 21 babies already accommodated and so plans to extend the nursery are under way. Attached to the nursery are staff rooms and a flat, and the position of the nursery just in front of a building makes any further City Council regulations very reasonable about this, but we do try to stick to the regulations as far as possible.

The home trains nursery nurses for the nursery. This will cost the home about £100 and the training course is 18 months. Dr. Barnardo's was the first home in Kenya to start training nursery nurses to standards recognised both in England and Kenya by the Ministry of Health.

"One has to consider the training costs as well as the actual bedding funds," Mr. Farrell, who is in charge of the Kenya home, pointed out. "According to the figures of last year it costs about 6.65 to maintain one child per day, though a total cost, including salaries, transport, water, electricity etc. would be 17.33 cts per child per day. These costs may have gone up in the last six months," commented Mr. Farrell. Total running costs of the home, including the other children, amount to about £18,000 in 12 months. Last year 55 per cent of the cost was paid for by donations, and 49 per cent from the U.K. organisation.

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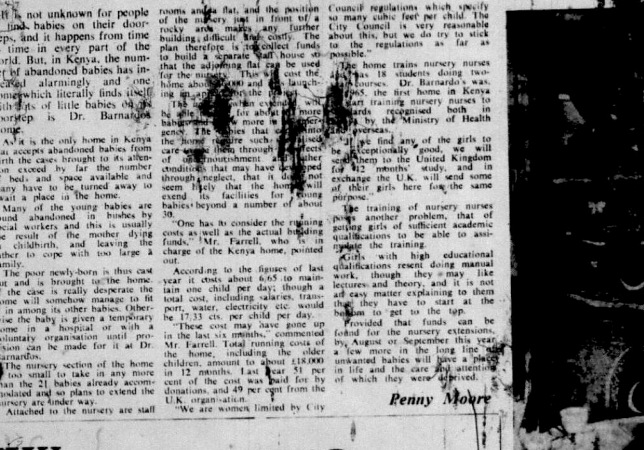

**LIFE IN THE CITY NOT EASY FOR A NEWCOMER**



The problems of women in rural areas were much the same as the problems of women in urban areas, Mrs. Jael Mbogo told members of the Kenya Association of University Women at a luncheon held at the City Hall last week.

Whereas women in the rural areas did not make use of health and other facilities available to them because they did not know about them, women in the urban areas often could not make use of the facilities either, because of lack of money.

Mrs. Mbogo hopes to stand now for a vacant seat in Parliament and if she succeeds will become Kenya's only woman M.P. She holds strong views on social problems in Kenya and spoke with emphasis and candour at the luncheon.

Eighty per cent of Government effort, she said, was directed at rural areas, "but it is here in the city that the problems are often worse than in the rural areas".

It is difficult for urban women to adjust themselves to their new lives away from home; they are no longer part of a large community that will gather round and help

one of its members if she is in need. They have to face problems of accommodation and employment and there is no larger free and easy community to turn to for help.

Each individual has to look after his own interests in urban areas, nobody has the time to listen to the problems of others.

In fact, in many ways women were better equipped to deal with these problems than men. "Problems of unemployment are here in Nairobi, but people needing education and care are here in Nairobi."

It would be a long time before women in Kenya had such of their rural homes and families have been in Nairobi for 10 years but every so often when they have a holiday I must go back home in Kisumu and see my mother again. Their joys and problems are important to me. I cannot get them.

Let us not lose contact with rural life. For their problems our problems are the same.

Fifteen police and an unknown number of prisoners were injured in six hours of rioting in the cells of the Ser Valere Prison, which ended yesterday in the defeat of the prisoners. The riot broke out on Monday.

In Milan the 1,300 prisoners succeeded after several hundred police and Carabinieri had surrounded the prison for a foot against a hail of iron bars, tiles, stones, and other missiles.

The police, protected by helmets and shields, aimed the prisoners, who were surrounded in the corridors, with tear gas. Some shots were fired into the air. Outside, groups of young demonstrators urged the prison demonstrators to strike.

Police and Carabinieri had clung between during the night and succeeded in capturing the rioters. Some of the prisoners had barricaded themselves in wings of the prison, surrendering after tear gas charges and the arrival of reinforcements.

Electricity in the prison was cut off and flames were seen at the windows of the wings. From which a hail of bricks and stones fell on to the police in the courtyard.

On Monday night the prisoners had seized seven guards as hostages.

The revolt started when the prisoners, refusing to go back to their cells, broke through the jail smashing windows and breaking down doors, using mallets, iron bars and other tools from the prison workshop. A police spokesman said everything in the prison had been destroyed.

In all three cities the prisoners are demanding reform of the prison system, better conditions and long-term suspension of the administration of the law to cut the present long term prison sentences before trial.

# Referendum fight starts in France

The French Premier, M. Maurice Couve de Murville, fired the Gaullist party's official campaign for the forthcoming April 27 referendum on Senate and regional administration reform.

In a three attack on opponents of President de Gaulle's proposed reforms, he said their real wish was to "take a position against De Gaulle and, if possible, to overthrow him to take his place."

Special security precautions had been taken in the Northern France mining town of Lille - the birthplace of President de Gaulle - for the visit of the French Premier.

The safeguards followed demonstrations by small shopkeepers earlier in the day, protesting at Government taxation policies and "unfair" competition from supermarkets.

The French Premier carefully avoided taking to task by the leader of the group of Gaullist Independents, Republican, Mr. Valéry Giscard d'Estaing, who withdrew the rift between himself and orthodox Gaullists by announcing his personal opposition to the referendum.

But he made what observers saw as an indirect allusion to him when he spoke of "self-styled moderates who have no other programme, except their always disappointed hope for" the Head of State's departure.

He noted that in the event of a "yes" by the nation the referendum would introduce a new regionalisation in France, reform the Senate and also modify constitutional ruling on the office of interim Head of State - which would devolve on the Prime Minister and not, as hitherto, on the President of the Senate.

Mr. Giscard d'Estaing, a former Finance Minister who leads the group in the National Assembly, told a political meeting in Paris that a referendum was not the right way in which to decide France's future.

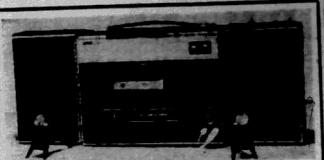

The congress also approved a political report submitted by Lin-piao, and a communique said that both the report and the party constitution were adopted unanimously at a plenary session chaired by Chairman Mao.

The communique said that "Marxism, Leninism and Mao Tse-tung's thought was the theoretical basis of the party's leading thinking."

Chairman Mao, who is 75, has been head of the Chinese Communist Party for 34 years. The congress has now dealt with the first two items on its agenda and its only remaining task is to elect a new central committee.

The official New China News Agency said the election of the committee was due to begin yesterday.

**Shots and gas end jail riot**

Violent police and an unknown number of prisoners were injured in six hours of fighting in the upper wings of the prison, which ended yesterday in the deaths of 300 prisoners, which broke out on Monday.

The revolt at Turin and demonstration in Genoa were also virtually quelled.

In Milan, the 1,500 prisoners surrendered after several hours of police and Carabinieri forces fought their way through the prison by foot against a hail of iron bolts and steel, stones, Molotov cocktails and flames, mistreated.

The police, protected by helmets and shields, attacked the prisoners and carried in the corridors, and barged into the air. Outside, groups of young demonstrators tried to force the prison gates.

Police and Carabinieri had entered the prison during the night and succeeded in capturing the prisoners after a violent battle. Some of the prisoners barricaded themselves in wings of the prison, surrendering after tear-gas charges and the arrival of the police in the courtyard.

The riot started when the prisoners, refusing to go back to their cells, ran through the jail smashing windows and breaking down doors and other tools from the prison workshop in wings of the prison which were being destroyed.

In all three cities the prisoners are demanding reform of the prison system, better conditions, and a prompt speed-up of the admission of long term terms spent in prison before trial.

After refusing to return to their cells the Milan mutineers seized hammers, iron bars and other weapons from the prison workshop and rampaged through the corridors, smashing windows and breaking down doors.

They set fire to mattresses and newspapers, burned up to the roof of the jail and began hurling files and stones at police and carabinieri, freeing 300 prisoners. Communist, freedom, Workers' Communist, framing, Workers' Communist, framing, application of the code.

The French Premier, M. Maurice Couve de Murville, fired the first shot on Monday in the Gaullist party's official campaign for the referendum on April 27 referendum on Senate and regional administration reforms.

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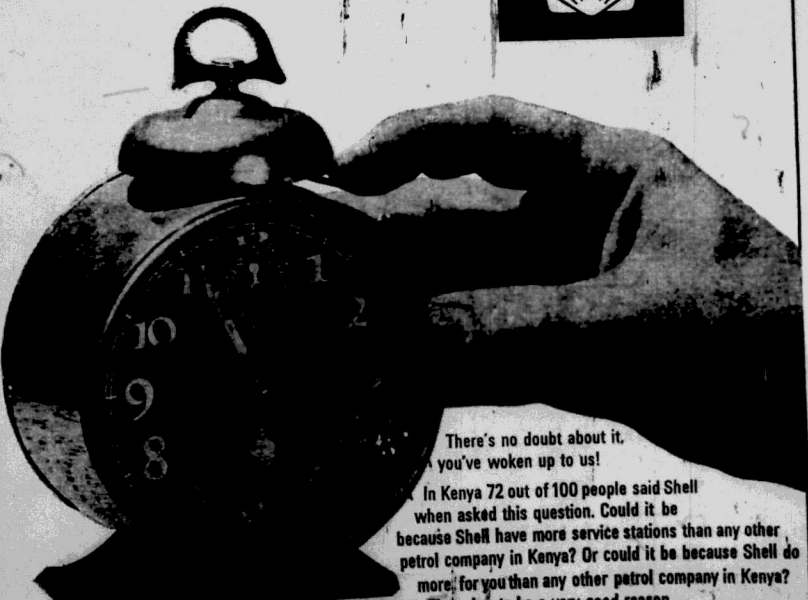
