Postal strike in Kenya banned OTHERS STILL ON

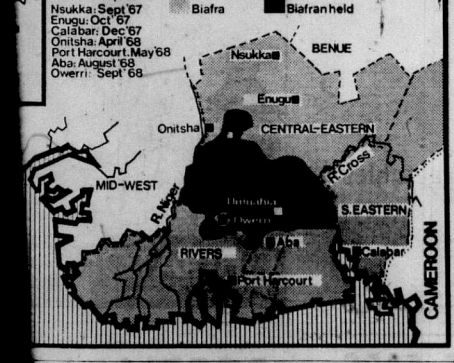

The threatened strike of 8,000 postal workers is off in Kenya but still on in Uganda and Tanzania. Kenya yesterday banned the strike and warned union leaders that any stoppage would contravene the Essential Services Act. Neither were there any indications in Dar es Salaam that the strike would be called off in Tanzania. A statement issued by the Kenya Ministry of Labour in Nairobi yesterday declared that a strike would be illegal and declared that the issues in dispute between the Union of Posts and Telecommunications Employees (Kenya), the Union of Posts and Telecommunications Employees (Uganda) and the East African Postal and Telecommunications Corporation on the one hand and the East African Industrial Court on the other had been submitted to the arbitration of the Ministry of Labour. The statement said that attention had been drawn to the various statements currently appearing in the Press regarding a trade dispute between postal unions in East Africa and the Posts and Telecommunications Corporation. The Minister for Labour, who has followed attempts to settle the dispute very closely, has already submitted the dispute to the East African Industrial Court for adjudication. "In the circumstances there is no reason for the unions to threaten strike action. If they continue with their present attitude they must realize they are contravening the essential services section of the Trade Disputes Act, and as such it would be illegal dealt with firmly by the Government." On Monday, three union leaders, Mr. Adonjo, Mr. Ombaka and Mr. J. D. Ombaka (Uganda) and Mr. J. D. Ombaka (Tanzania), who were in Nairobi that they would call out their members on strike on April 30, causing a total shut-down of telephone, telegram and delivery services. They also threatened a go-slow before a total stoppage after securing the consent of their members. The unions are fighting for a salary review for their members - comprising middle and lower grade workers - better housing conditions and leave, an improved pension scheme, and other matters including overtime rates. The corporation has said that annual demands would cost £200,000 a year and that this money was earmarked for capital expenditure including the cost of moving the P and T headquarters to Nairobi. Later the Union of Posts and Telecommunications (Kenya) signed the form referring the dispute to the Industrial Court. This brought a statement from Cote's secretary-general, Mr. J. D. 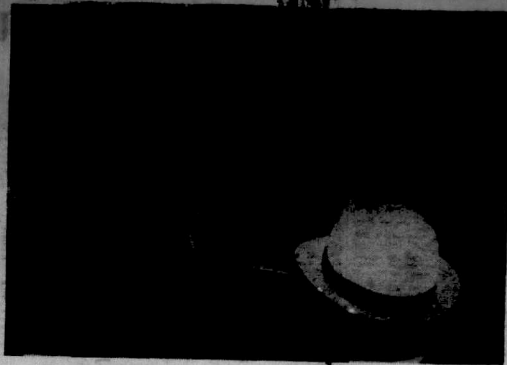

Kenya and Expo 70

Kenya, which took an imposing pavilion at Expo 69 in Montreal, is not expected to have representation at Expo 70 next year in Osaka. The Japan World Exposition, as Expo 70 is otherwise known, will be the first world trade fair to be staged in Asia, running for six months, and a number of African countries will participate.

Tanzania is organising an ambitious display. Already its Ministry for Commerce and Industry is busy with publicity and arranging to collect suitable exhibits. The Kenya Export Promotion Council says several trade exhibitions are planned for this and next year to popularise Kenyan commodities overseas, but there is no present intention to take part in Expo 70.

Perhaps the cost has been a decisive factor, but one reason is understood. It is the imbalance of trade between the two countries. This has been a sore point for some years.

Kenya's imports from Japan, valued at £7,857,000 in 1968, fell steeply to £2,695,000 after the Government imposed strict licensing restrictions. By 1967, their value had recovered to £5,827,000 and were running at £3,645,000 for the first half of last year.

Set against these totals, Kenya's exports to Japan were worth £1,666,000 in 1963, remaining fairly steady through the years, with the highest at £1,792,000 in 1966 and stood at £794,000 for the first half of 1968. Because of their keenly competitive prices, Japanese goods have proved particularly attractive in Africa, in particular, a big African market has been exploited for motor cars. The necessity to increase recip-

cal trade has often been urged on Japan.

Severe controls imposed in 1966 on account of Kenya's trade deficit have gradually been relaxed. Last year, a statement from the Department of Trade and Supplies said import licences for Japanese goods would be issued freely for items other than those restricted to local industries. Although restrictions were eased, it remained necessary to obtain licences before placing orders for goods of Japanese origin.

On their part, the Japanese have entered textile and other manufacturing in Kenya, to help the internal economy and provide work. Only last week, the Japanese Ambassador said in Mombasa that two of his country's companies owned an factory there by the end of the year. He told the Mayor the Japco Fishing Company is planning a large refrigerating plant and the Nippon Cashew Nuts Company a cashew nut factory. A national level, Japan's leading banking and trading concerns have been asked to participate in an investment corporation for Africa, known as the Multinational Investment Corporation for Africa, which is sponsored by the Standard Bank of London and is intended to attract Japanese, European, American and Japanese money for long-term investment.

If the trade deficit is Kenya's worry, surely that is a sound reason to take the opportunity to work for Africa at Expo 70? The Export Promotion Council and other bodies are constantly being exhorted to find new markets which supplement the traditional Japanese goods.

Vast markets certainly exist in Asia and the Expo 70 display window is expected to attract an average of 7,000 people an hour.



What should the role of the National Theatre be? This has been a controversial subject for a long time and many people have expressed their opinions in the daily Press.

Mr. Adagala feels the theatre should incorporate the spirit of the people. To be truly national, it should not only portray people as they are physically, but also what they feel.

The Kenya National Theatre was initiated in 1952. At that time it was difficult to find any African interest in the theatre. There was greater European participation in its development. Europeans were more experienced in and about the theatre and therefore needed it most. They could also afford it. African participation, therefore, was not a hindrance to the development of the theatre.

More than 100 years, the British Government authorised the spending of £1,000,000 on Britain's own National Theatre. The first Director was Sir Laurence Olivier. At the time Kenya, which was only a young colonial country, already had its own National Theatre. Britain was its coloniser, but Britain had no National Theatre of its own.

But even then, the Kenya authorities showed little interest in the theatre. The Kenya theatre had to exist on its own.

Even after independence there was still little Government participation. In March, 1964, Charles Ollington, a Nairobi actor and producer, told a meeting at the United Kenya Club that Kenya should raise funds to launch a real National Theatre.

He said that Nairobi had a National Theatre which was bricks and mortar and seats, but a national theatre had to be a living organism. It must have a full-time director who would be in charge of policy. The Uganda National Theatre, he pointed out, not only had a full-time director, but was also forming a company.

He said that the easiest method of raising funds for a National Theatre was by launching an appeal. It must be stressed that it would have to be at Government level to show that it reflected the wishes of the people.

In December, 1965, the Director of the Chemburui Cultural Centre in Nairobi, Mr. Ezekiel Mphahlele, claimed that the Kenya National Theatre was useless as a Centre for entertainment and should be handed over to University College for use as a school for drama and music.

Referring to the annual Kenya Drama Festival, he said he agreed with dramatic critics that the competition element should be dropped from the festival so that an indigenous theatre could evolve.

The preceding statements indicate clearly that attempts to evolve a truly Kenyan theatre are not new. Full African participation in the National Theatre was initiated in June, 1968. At about that time Mr. Adagala was appointed Executive Director. Before being he made tentative plans for the theatre school which has now 15 students.

Apart from the manager, Mr. L. Parks, the staff of the National Theatre is all African. Mr. Adagala is assisted by Mr. Mark Marsha who is Assistant Director (Field).

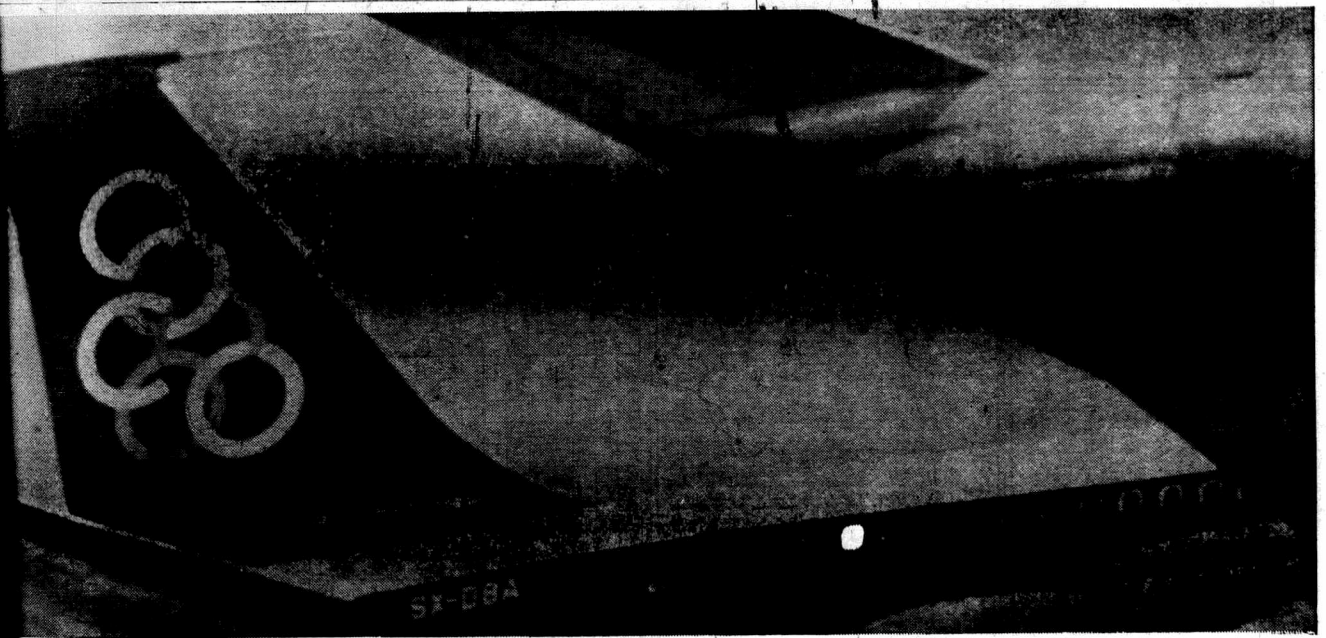

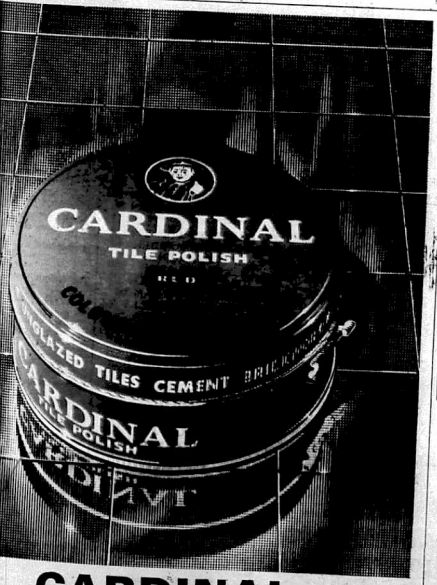

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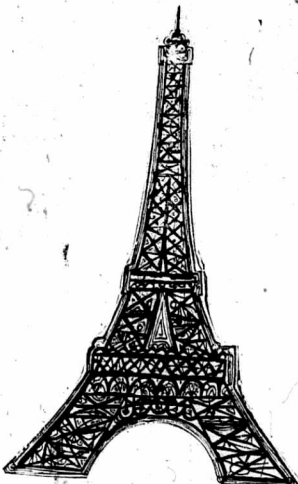

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MUSLIM SUMMIT

Malaysia's Premier wants review of Islamic law

Although it has only 4,000,000 Muslims out of a population of 10,000,000 Malaysia hopes to become the Islamic Centre of the Far East.

Hardly a week goes by without some part of the Muslim way of life being discussed in relation to the interpretation of the Koran — ranging from the wearing of minarets to the question of one man having four wives, or from land ownership to Muslim participation in industries and colonial grading.

The Malaysian Prime Minister, Tunku Abdul Rahman, has been anxious to form a Commonwealth of Muslim nations. But as the leader of only 4,000,000 Muslims — for such an organisation would not support from its "sister nations".

One of a world Muslim population of about 600,000,000, Indonesia has 85,000,000, Pakistan is next with 85,000,000 and India ranks third with 50,000,000. This is twice the size of the total population of the United Arab Republic, and almost equal to the combined population of Saudi Arabia, Iran, Iraq and Syria.

Tunku Abdul Rahman, who firmly believes the Commonwealth of Muslim nations is a real danger to the Muslim world, did not give up his efforts to achieve Muslim unity.

Over the past year he has made numerous visits to Muslim nations and has succeeded in getting more than 100 Governments to agree to send Muslim scholars to the summit in Kuala Lumpur.

The theme — to unite Muslims all over the world and raise the prestige of Islam.

At a prelude to the conference, Muslim scholars from 13 Malaysian States gathered in Kuala Lumpur

A "summit" conference of Muslim scholars has been meeting in Kuala Lumpur. Tunku Abdul Rahman, Malaysia's Prime Minister, is trying to get some new interpretation of Islamic law. It could even be that the one-man four-wives law will be reviewed. FELIX ABUBEGANADEN reports

At the beginning of March they had hoped to take a united stand on certain controversial proposals in the Holy Koran. But views were so divergent that it was thought best to leave some of the major issues to the Muslim Summit.

Much of the difficulty arose over the fact that the Koran is an Arabic and many who read it do not understand a word (Steps have been taken to translate the Koran into Malay — the country's national language).

"At this preliminary meeting the Tunku and his colleagues played on the theme that Muslims must keep abreast with changing times and discard old habits and customs. For example, the age-old practice of bowing for the most part to designate the date of the Fasting Month, should be replaced by mathematical calculations, they said.

The conference, however, was undecided whether mathematical calculations (advocated by the Chinese) to fix their festival dates, infringed the teachings of the Koran. So this word was referred to the Summit.

The theme — or the question of close proximity between man and woman — provoked considerable discussion with delegates calling for legislation interdicting the Arabic word

In Malaysia, a Muslim couple found together in a room with the door closed — not necessarily locked — may be found guilty of the offence of *Khulwat*.

The penalty, imposed by a Shariah (religious) court, may be anything up to three months' imprisonment or a fine not exceeding \$300.

Khulwat need not necessarily be committed indoors — especially in cars or in the park are open to prosecution.

The conference committee chairman, Dato Haji Abdul Rahman Yakub, told the delegates that it was because he was scared of being accused of *Khulwat* that he had never employed a woman secretary. But no suitable definition of "Khulwat" was forthcoming and the conference decided to postpone discussion.

Another subject discussed was correct grading operations and whether Muslims should be allowed to participate. At least 15,000 Malaysians are blind because of childhood diet deficiencies, and 10 per cent of them could have their sight restored if they underwent correct grading.

The Malaysian Government has consulted the Al Azhar University in Cairo and the Mufti of the United Arab Republic on matters of "Kulwa" and "Kulwa" — but the removal of the eyes from the dead to give light to the living is impossible under the Koran.

But the big question for the Summit was certainly the status of women.

Modern Muslim girls are sick of the one-man-four-wives law. They desire the easy divorce and polygamy — *Islam*. And they are clamouring for a government to

"Let's try to get out of the door," said father. "We might be able to make our way to the boats."

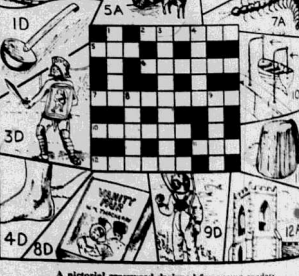

Creamed Prawns
Casserole of Lamb with Cider
Maitre d'Hotel Potatoes
Strawberries Chantilly

A medium priced wine such as Alsace Riesling (about 17/- a bottle) from the wine merchants Saccane and Speed would suit the menu and complement the slightly fruity flavour of the main course.

Alsace wines are cheaper than Rhine wines which have a relatively high market price but as the vineyards are on the border of Germany, they have been produced for more or less the same type of soil and conditions.

An alternative wine to use with this menu is the Hock, Niersteiner, also available from Saccane and Speed at about 18/- a bottle.

CREAMED PRAWNS
1 kilo prawns, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 pint cream, 1 pint water, seasoning, salt, pepper, 1 tablespoon cayenne pepper, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 heaped tablespoon grated cheese.

Poach the prawns in wine, water and lemon juice for 10 minutes. Allow to cool, drain and pat dry. Melt butter, flour and seasoning together with the liquid, stir until thick, add prawns and cook for 3-4 minutes. Add the cream and boil for 5 minutes. Add the cheese and brown under grill.

CASSEROLE OF LAMB

WITH CIDER
1 kilo leg or shoulder lamb, lean without bone, flour, 2 tsp butter, 2 small onions, 2

clove garlic, 2 tbs Worcester sauce, 1 level tsp salt, 1 level tsp pepper, 1 pint stock, 1 pint cider (dry cider best)

Cut the meat in pieces and coat with flour. Peel and chop the onion and garlic. Wash and chop the parsley. Heat the butter and fry the meat brown in it. Put in a casserole with the onion, garlic and parsley. Add the stock and cider to the frying pan and stir until boiling. Add the Worcester sauce and seasoning and cook 3 minutes.

Four over the meat and simmer one hour or until tender, at 325 degrees F. or Gas No. 3.

MAITRE D'HOTEL POTATOES

Half kilo even size potatoes, 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 tablespoon butter, salt and pepper, 1 small onion, chopped.

Scrub potatoes and boil in their skins until tender but firm. Drain and dry. Peel potatoes, slice and arrange in a hot dish and keep warm. Melt butter in a small pan, add onion and cook until soft. Add parsley and seasoning and pour over the potatoes. Put in oven for 2-3 minutes before serving.

TOMATOES CHANTILLY

Cut four firm tomatoes in half and brush the cut sides generously with melted butter. Sprinkle with little salt, pepper and sugar, arrange on baking sheet and broil about 10 inches from heat for about 10 minutes or until soft. Arrange on heated serving dish and cover with hot buttered toast.

STRAWBERRIES CHANTILLY

1 punnet strawberries, 1 cup cream, 1 cup custard sugar, 3 tablespoons Kirsch.

Prepare strawberries and cut in half. Sprinkle with sugar and chill for 30 minutes. Whip cream until stiff and fold in Kirsch. Fold strawberries into the cream and keep cold until ready to serve. This dessert looks attractive served in stemmed glasses, and garnished with a few whole strawberries.

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FOOD AT TSAVO SOON INSUFFICIENT

Standard Staff Reporter. Efforts to stock the elephant population at Tsavo National Park have not been entirely successful, a Swiss wildlife expert, Prof. C. A. W. Guggisberg, said in a lecture delivered in Nairobi this week.

Prof. Guggisberg, who has been in Kenya for 20 years, has written several books on East African wildlife and made his latest books on giraffes, written up shortly. He said the African continent had been closely connected with Eurasia from pre-historic times. The Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife yesterday had no comment on Prof. Guggisberg's estimate of 20,000 elephants at Tsavo. Last year the former director of the Tsavo Research Project, Dr. Richard Laws, estimated the elephant population in Tsavo to be 35,000 and proposed the shooting of 2,700 animals a year.

COTU ADVICE ON KEEPING PEACE

Standard Staff Reporter. Speaking in Nairobi at the East African Railways and Harbours seminar on industrial relations at the Railway Training School, Mr. Akumu said effective collective bargaining could be obtained if workers were well organised. He said workers' rights were being taken over by their union and once a union was recognised as the sole representative of workers, then generally employers were expected to deal only with union leaders.

Mr. Akumu said a negative and inflexible attitude by an employer and a worker could lead to lock-outs or strikes. This right, just like any other right, had its limits. It was always important that both parties should have the interest of the industry at heart and regard the use of strikes as unnecessary. Kenya unions were mature and that was why the number of strikes had gone down considerably, while at the same time through collective bargaining wage rates had gone up gradually.

African farms 'must not be sub-divided'

Standard Staff Reporter. Bahati. Large farms bought by African companies in partnership must not be sub-divided into individual holdings and turned into subsistence plots, the acting D.C. for Nakuru, Mr. David Olocho, has warned farmers.

Mr. Olocho told the partners that the farm must be farmed commercially. "We cannot permit this farm, which is a very good one for wheat and dairy cattle, to be turned into subsistence plots," he said. He told them that the Government would not allow the sub-division which they had embarked on. "This most sorry forethought and the farm should be farmed as one unit under the management of the partnership."

Mr. Olocho, accompanied by the District Agricultural Officer, Mr. Pinter, the branch manager of the Agricultural Finance Corporation, Mr. Muthonda, and the land bank valuer, Mr. Slaughter, had gone to the farm to investigate reports that the 14 partners were sub-dividing the farm into individual plots. The partners were lent £10,000 by the Government in 1964 towards the purchase and development of the farm. Only £250 has so far been repaid.

He explained some of the reasons which made administration of the farm as a single unit difficult. Changes of managers were frequent and some of the 14 families living on the farm was employed on it, although there were 20 labourers.

Bulgarian boat may be named after Kilimanjaro

Standard Staff Reporter. Moshi. A Bulgarian climbing boat may be named after Mount Kilimanjaro, if a climb started yesterday by a 14-strong team is successful.

The team from the Silver Alpine Club of Bulgaria, competing against other clubs in the country for the privilege of climbing the mountain and, at the same time, testing their Bulgarian equipment and clothes, including the new boat.

The alpinists party has travelled by road from Egypt through Sudan, Ethiopia and Kenya to Tanzania turning a blind eye to tempting mountains on the way, which they intend to climb on their journey home. But first, they wanted to tackle Kilimanjaro.

Although taking the normal route to the summit the party is not taking any guides. So far, they have tried out their equipment and clothing in the desert and now hope to see how it fares in the cold. The party have been carrying five gold-plated medals which they hope to present to the Heads of State of each of the African countries through which they pass. Already one has been accepted by Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia.

Egyptian raiders cross Canal TANK KNOCKED OUT

A special commando of the Egyptian armed forces crossed the Suez Canal, killed or wounded 30 Israeli soldiers, occupied fortifications and returned across the Canal with only two men wounded on Saturday night, a Cairo military communique said yesterday.

This was the first official announcement of a Canal crossing by regular Egyptian forces. Actions announced in the past were credited to Sinai Liberation Organisation commandos and never involved so ambitious a project as taking over fortifications on the Eastern Bank.

The raid lasted two hours, the communique said. The Egyptian force, whose number is not given, knocked out a tank fighting with a column of Israeli reinforcements.

The escalation of hostilities represented by the raid followed another new development. During a meeting in which the Egyptian daily feature about the Canal, firing occurred on Saturday afternoon for the first time since the Canal's northern end, where Soviet troops are stationed.

IRAN AND IRAQ IN BORDER ROW

Iraq announced yesterday that it considers the 1937 border agreement with Iran on navigation rights along the Shatt Al-Arab river still valid and binding to both countries, Baghdad Radio reported.

Iran on Saturday declared the agreement null and void because it claimed Iraq had violated its principles and committed acts of aggression against Iran.

The Foreign Ministry spokesman said the Iranian Ambassador was called to the Foreign Ministry in Baghdad during the night to receive an Iranian protest against the denunciation of the treaty.

A Foreign Ministry spokesman said at the broadcast that Iraq still intended the treaty to be in operation and to be binding on both countries. The Iraqi Government reserves the right to take all legitimate and legal measures.

Iran denounced the treaty, saying it was 'repeated aggressions' by Iraq against Iranian fishing-boats on the estuary.

Reports from Teheran said there had been Iranian troop concentrations along the Shatt-Al-Arab border between Iran and Iraq.

The use of containers for carrying cargo is cutting the operating overhead costs of ships by at least a half according to an analysis in the *National Wharves Review* reported in the monthly fore report of Wigginworth and Co. Ltd.

Containerisation is described as probably the most important single development in international freight transport since the production of the marine engine in the nineteenth century.

The theory behind containerisation is that by packing goods into a large metal container at the manufacturer's depot and transporting it to its destination the manual operations, time and cost of transport are substantially reduced. Although the concept is applicable to the movement of goods by road, rail and air, it is mainly in the shipping industry that containers are making the most radical changes.

A ship is the most expensive prime mover in transport field, costs of around £100,000 being incurred while stationary in harbour. The time being bill, the traditional time of five days to a minimum of three days, is not more than a third of the cost of the ship to transport goods as a form of transport.

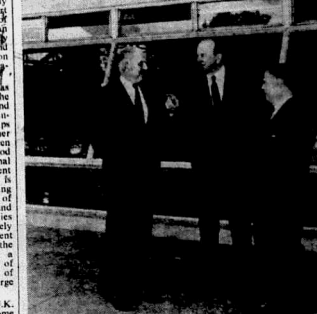

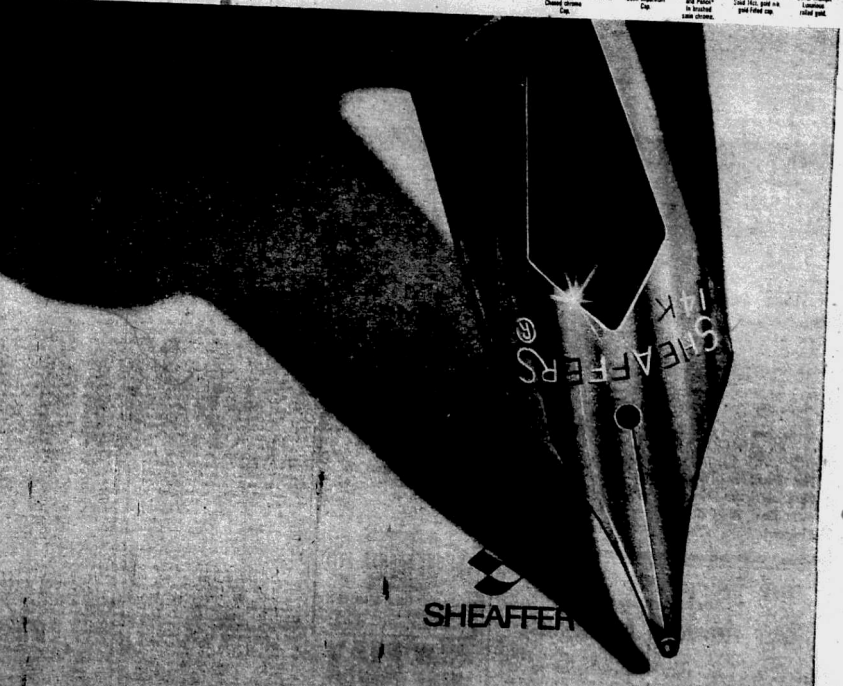
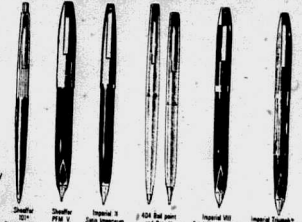

What authority does this give him in a country where the party is omnipotent? Under this kind of socialism, Parliament means nothing. The President is merely a figurehead. The appointment means a seizure in the political twilight.

When Britain sent a small contingent of troops on a leafy raid to Angkor, it was the constitutional Government of the Associated States, led by a cascade of abuse fell on London. Who raised the protest against Soviet meddling in Czech internal affairs?

TRADE UNION CO-OPERATIVE EDUCATION

Co-operatives and education

There is a common core of interest between the co-operative and the trade union movements. Indeed, in some countries they have developed side by side.

Even the leadership in the two movements in some countries is common. Both demonstrate that individuals are able to cooperate by association and by joint effort with their fellows who share with them common interests.

Trade unions work ceaselessly for the improvement of workers' wages, and derive considerable social and economic benefits by joining their craft co-operatives, consumer and housing co-operatives. It is, therefore, in these fields that the two movements collaborate in protecting the industrial workers' exploitation and ensuring that the best value of money is received by them. What is wanted is the liberalisation of the régime, clearly expression of the demand for greater freedom of efforts to achieve the purpose.

Kenya has a long movement in the field of co-operative societies which from the 1920s to the 1950s, has been steadily growing. It is now a well-organized movement, with a structure of the movements, operations and the problems of the co-operative societies in the periodicals and publications brought out by the movements.

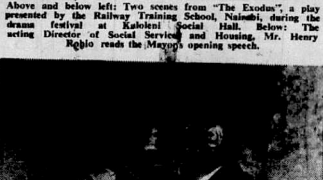

Two-week quarantine period against foot and mouth disease has been imposed on all animals entering the country.

Officials from Tanganyika Packers are expected to move on to the spot investigation of conditions around Dodoma next week.

Figures from the Meteorological Department in Dar es Salaam show that the cumulative rainfall in the Dodoma region between September 1, 1959, and March 31, is down by 54 per cent.

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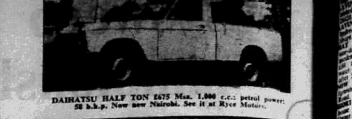
