K.P.U. sweeps to victory  
Gem by-election

Standard Staff Reporter, Kisumu.  
K.P.U. had a resounding victory in the Gem by-election. The K.P.U. candidate, Mr. Wasonja Sijayo, polled 1,035 votes compared with 155 of his Kaniu opponent, Mr. Omonko.

Mr. Omonko, having received less than one-eighth of the total cast, loses his KES 500 deposit.

Mr. Sijayo's election increased the number of K.P.U. MPs to eight. This was one of the first major confrontations between the two parties since the 1961 General Election in Kenya when K.P.U. MPs were reduced to one.

As the last two ballot boxes were being opened, Mr. Sijayo said: "I am happy that the people of Gem have decided to send a K.P.U. representative into Parliament. I promise to work for their welfare and for those who have yet to mass in Kenya who have yet to reap the benefits of uhuru."

"I am also happy that the people of Gem have ignored the threat that unless they vote for Kaniu, the area would not receive Government help."

Railways and Harbours to be split from June 1

From June 1 the East African Railways and Harbours Corporation will be split into two separate units. This decision was agreed on at a meeting of the East African Authority, which ended its talks at State House, Nairobi, at the weekend.

The Railways Corporation will have its headquarters in Nairobi while the Harbours Corporation will have its headquarters in Dar es Salaam.

The Authority also directed the Railways Corporation to complete its move from Nairobi to its new headquarters in Kampala by the end of the year.

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Biafra regains lost towns  
FIERCE RESISTANCE

Biafran forces captured three more towns some 33 miles south of Owerri and regained about 240 square miles of territory in the area during the past week.

A Biafran military spokesman said yesterday that the strategic road junction town of Okpaala, which had been in Federal hands since October last year, had been recaptured.

After putting up a fierce resistance, Nigerian forces were finally driven from the town — 25 miles south-east of Owerri, and pushed four miles to the south, he said.

The spokesman also reported that Biafran forces were making significant gains in the Owerri-Port Harcourt main axis.

According to Radio Nigeria last night, a second batch of 70 Biafran soldiers had surrendered to Federal forces at Umuahia.

About the same number was reported to have surrendered when the former administrative capital was captured by Biafran forces.

The Biafran sector commander, Nigeria is known as the "Republic of Biafra" — said that his forces were also making steady progress in the Owerri-Port Harcourt main axis.

The Federal Information Commissioner, Chief Anthony Enahakor, who is the chief Federal peace negotiator, yesterday ruled out the possibility of future peace negotiations with Biafra, the Federal Information Ministry reported.

BONN TO RETURN FOREIGN CAPITAL

The president of the German Federal Bank, Dr. Karl Blessing, has said he would try to send back from Germany the foreign speculative capital which had been flowing into the country in the past few days.

Dr. Blessing, arriving in Basel to attend a meeting of Central Bank governors, which opened yesterday, told newsmen:

"The German Government has decided not to revalue the Deutschmark. As a result, as president of the German Federal Bank, I must try to send out of Germany the foreign speculative capital which has come to Frankfurt."

He said measures to curb the inflow of foreign capital into Germany were being studied.

Dr. Blessing was considered a major supporter of revaluation of the Mark, but was forced to accept his Government's decision to maintain the status quo. He is expected to explain in detail what the West German Government plans to do to wean off a new wave of speculation in a few weeks.

West Germany's decision not to revalue the Mark was intended to relieve pressure to bear on its Western allies, particularly France, in order to attain Bonn's political objective, the East news agency's Bonn correspondent wrote at the weekend.

Vietcong step up sneak bomb attacks

Two people were killed and 15 injured by bomb attacks on a Saigon police station and an information centre at Gia Dinh yesterday as the Vietcong stepped up their sneak bomb attacks.

In the Saigon attack, a bomb exploded inside a police station in killing a woman and a policeman and injuring 14 including nine civilians. The building was half destroyed.

In the other attack, a 15-year-old girl on a motorcycle threw a bomb at an information office at Gia Dinh, injuring a woman and severely damaging the office. The severely damaged office, the explosive were found at her home.

Three plastic bomb explosions injured seven civilians. Clashes between the Vietcong and Government U.S. forces continued round Saigon yesterday from Tay Ninh to the north-west to Long Khanh on the east.



According to research officers there, the present method, called the "blood slide test", where a needle and a glass slide absorb a blood mark for testing is not very satisfactory.

In this form of diagnosing, the blood mark on the glass is placed under a microscope and is tested to find out if malaria parasites can be detected. Often the diagnosed has given negative results though the patient is suffering from malaria.

The reason is largely because the blood slide method, when used under the microscope or by does not give a true picture.

Until early this year, the Institute sent capillary tubes, with serum sealed at high pressure, to Holland to be analysed, as it did not have the machine to do the job.

When the Institute started the experiment, research officers visited Mbarika, Zanzibar, Pemba, Handeni, Mamba Hills and Pare to collect blood serum samples which were later sent to Holland to be analysed.

For five years all the methods used in the malaria eradication schemes were employed. The main result was the failure to control malaria, as the Pare-Taveta Malaria Scheme showed that malaria transmission could be completely broken by spraying houses at frequent intervals.

The project gave useful information essential to the planning of any malaria eradication campaign in East Africa. It was also confirmed that more studies on the mosquito responsible for the transmission of the disease was necessary before malaria transmission could be completely broken.

# £25,000 bribe rumour reputed ASIAN JAILED

He made the statement after the fourth accused, Madhusudan Mangabhai Patel, 36, who pleaded 'Guilty' to three charges, had been sentenced to a total of four and a half years' imprisonment by a Nairobi magistrate, Mr. A. R. W. Hancock.

The rumour said that a bribe of £15,000 was offered to a C.I.D. officer, Mr. Baker, as an inducement not to oppose bail and suggested that the bribe, later increased to £25,000, was paid as an inducement to himself (Mr. Hobbs).

What concerned the Attorney-General was that another sum of money had changed hands to secure the *nole prosequi*. It was understood that the total amount of large sums of money had changed hands.



A notice filed to quash the subpoena was unsuccessful and an order was made for production of the documents. The respondent failed to comply with the order and civil contempt proceedings were instituted and he was ordered to show cause why he should not be held in contempt for his failure to produce the documents.

The civil contempt was subsequently converted into criminal contempt and Mr. Justice Farrell recalled that the U.S. in the case, his determination of the issue before him was not in dispute.



West Germany is likely to offer Britain a big credit to support the Found following Friday's decision not to revalue the Deutschmark, authoritative circles said in Bonn.

According to the same circles, the Found refused far more than the French Fringe in the new wave of speculation on a DM revaluation since — they said — about three times more people than France were involved in "speculative manoeuvres".

The support operation was felt to be all the more necessary inasmuch as the "hot money" which the speculators poured into West Germany was judged unlikely to flow away in the direction of one of the international monetary system's weakest points — following the speculators' crushing defeat.

The position of the West German Chancellor, Herr Kiesinger, was regarded as having been strengthened by his victorious fight against revaluation.

The Chancellor is understood to have been encouraged not only by his own Christian-Democrat Party

but also by certain French Ministers and Social Democrat leader, Guy Mollet.

Herr Brandt's financial expert, Herr Meisner, presented a report stating strongly against revaluation, contrary belief.

Support for the Chancellor also came from other leading German parliamentary personalities, apparently determined to give backing to "boldness" capital market manoeuvres", in particular the Social-Democrat Parliamentary Group's president, Dr. Helmut Schmidt.

Dr. Schmidt said he would be against heavily subsidising West German farmers in the event of a revaluation, a measure regarded as one of the likely side-effects of an upward adjustment of the mark.

In Parliament, the Government was yesterday due to face necessary questioning on what it intends taking to back up its refusal to revalue the mark upward.

## Nato may increase Mid-East air power

Western air chiefs have decided that Nato might have to take counter measures if the Soviet Union tries to increase its air power in the Middle East and North Africa, an official statement said yesterday.

Top representatives of five Nato air forces — those of the United States, Britain, Italy, Greece and Turkey — agreed at a meeting in Naples on Saturday that any appreciable increase in Soviet air power in the area could warrant additional measures by Nato to defend its southern flank.

The air chiefs agreed that any such increase in the air power of either Russia or the North African States under its influence could pose a potential threat of some magnitude.

They acknowledged that the present threat was not particularly serious. Informed sources said the air chiefs were thinking particularly of the possibility that the Soviet

Union might want to back up its naval build-up in the Mediterranean by deploying more aircraft to Egypt and other Middle Eastern and North African States.

The sources said such a Soviet move could be expected, since no modern State was likely to increase its naval strength in an area without a comparable rise in air power.

It was also known that Egyptian airfields were capable of handling Russian aircraft because the Mediterranean has been a theatre already, the sources added.

It will now be the only Soviet-built planes seen regularly over the Mediterranean have been Badger bombers with Egyptian markings, usually equipped with sophisticated surveillance equipment for watching Nato ships.

## Countdown begins for trip round Moon

Technicians at Cape Kennedy prime the Apollo 10 spacecraft and its lunar ferry yesterday as the countdown for the eight-day round-the-Moon mission began.

From now until Sunday, when the crew of the giant Saturn V Moon rocket are fired to launch the Moon, engineers will adhere to a rigorous time schedule to make final preparations for the flight.

Technically known as a pre-countdown programme that begins yesterday will include activation of the mechanical systems of the spacecraft which will be launched eight days before the astronauts Thomas Stafford, Wally Schirra and John Young.

The ferry which will carry Schirra and Young to within eight miles of the Moon will be checked out by the lunar module before the official launch.

The official countdown will continue for 19 hours before another

scheduled six-hour fuel is called, just before loading the hot to power the Moon rocket. It will resume on Sunday morning.

The three astronauts spent most of yesterday practicing the critical manoeuvres they will carry out during their 30 orbits round the Moon.

During the flight, Stafford and Schirra will fly the lunar module around the Moon in a loop released for the Apollo 11 crew, scheduled to land two men on the lunar surface in July.

## African railroad planning

Railways and railroad planning continue to figure in the forefront of the news in Africa. Because of the Tanzam link and projects in Central Africa, a rail consultancy service has been set up in the U.K.

Last week, President Nyerere was reported discussing the Chinese offer of help with the construction of the railway between Tanzania and Zambia, which is intended to give Zambia another outlet to the Indian Ocean for the movement of copper exports and the importing of supplies which, on the East African side, is dependent on the erratic use of the road from Dar es Salaam to Morogoro.

At the weekend, the Portuguese Army Command announced the fifth incident in 20 days of sabotage on the Benguela railway, carried out by Angola guerrillas. Here is an instance of nationalist activity having adverse effects on the economy of friendly African States. The railroad joins both Zambia and Congo-Kinshasa to the Atlantic port of Lobito, running across Angola from Diloio and turning north for the bulk of Benguela; and is used by both countries to ship out copper.

A British concern, Tanganyika Concessions, has a 90 per cent interest in the Benguela railway, has put forward proposals to improve the throughput at the port end by forging a 91-mile link inland between Cubal and Lobito, the shortest distance between two points of the triangle — at an estimated cost of £10,000,000.

In Lusaka, a railway source says the Zambian and Portuguese Governments are holding talks in the hope of reopening a section of the Benguela line damaged by the guerrillas, though there is no official confirmation. On account of the closure, Zambia has been forced to route more copper exports through S. Rhodesia to the East Coast, across Mozambique, again territory under Portuguese rule. One report says the Portuguese and the Benguela railway authorities are demanding better security in the eastern part of Angola; otherwise, Zambia cannot be guaranteed uninterrupted access to the Atlantic by its route.

Proposals are taking shape for what would, in effect, be a parallel route, well north of the Benguela railway, and entirely across independent African territory in Congo-Kinshasa, to link Katanga with the West Coast. # Insect pests sabotage Kenya's maize surplus

By C. Ojwang'o Abusor

Several million pounds of maize grown in Kenya go to feed weevils and other insects which devour thousands of people daily from hunger throughout the world. But not many of us, particularly the small farmers and the housewives, really feed these insects.

Yet it has been established by the experts that five out of every 100 lbs. of maize in a housewife's larder are eaten up by these insects within six months of the harvest in any one season. Many of our maize-growing areas have two seasons a year.

There are several reasons for this complacency, one of them being that we are not a starving nation now that we have a lot of maize surplus particularly in the highlands which are as self-sufficient as far as maize production is concerned.

Bluffed by these surpluses, a farmer normally gets himself too much pre-occupied with the immediate advancement of his family in our rapidly developing society that he attaches very little value to what is being consumed by the insects around him.

Because of these surpluses again, the millers have a wide choice of stocks to choose from, thus enabling them to supply consumers with very high quality flour. This is the reason for the distribution in warehouses. The stocks are mainly worked in towns. Although they comprise large numbers of individuals, they are not being stored for long periods. The search in the field of grain storage loss, wheat, pyrethrum and other agricultural products because they are fully employed by the Government on various other important projects of development in the country.

Of course, in the matter of deterioration, every one of us realizes that our stored grains lose their original quality and quality as we keep them longer before use.

We also see live insects in the unground maize, but tend to take it as a matter of course. It is not really enemies, because they are not poisonous.

But the Government, which is concerned with wholesome progress in the development of the agricultural economy, are disapproving of the development of that Kenya where the fruits of many farmers are not supported from the Government — a destructive force.

The Government has procured the services of a team of two national agricultural experts to try to find ways and means of putting a stop to this unnecessary wastage of maize by insects in smallholdings in Kenya.

The team, which arrived last November, is organized by the British Ministry of Overseas Development and financed by the United Kingdom Committee of P.F.H. Committee and Ministry of Agriculture, who are all concerned with the loss of stored maize and other grains from insect and rodent damage.

The P.F.H.C. contribution is in the order of £20,000. Other facilities are provided by the Kenya Government.

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**BACKGROUND TO WORLD NEWS**  
**COAL FOUND IN COLOMBO HARBOUR**

By DALZON de SILVA Colombo

The Ceylon Government Railway has found an unusual source of supply of coal — the bottom of Colombo Harbour. During the past few days dredgers have been fishing out hundreds of tons of coal from the harbour's seabed.

This coal had been accumulating during the past 100 years — ever since ships from different parts of the world started bringing coal to power the steam engines of the Ceylon Railway.

It all started a few days ago when a serious shortage of coal, owing to irregular supplies from the usual sources abroad, threatened to bring the steam locomotives to a halt.

Government Railway officials raked their brains trying to find some way of obtaining coal urgently to ensure the smooth running of trains.

One of them, the Superintendent of Railway Stores, Mr. M. Zareen, had the bright idea. But he also had to put up a strong case to his superiors before they would allow him to go prospecting for coal in Colombo Harbour.

Mr. Zareen pointed out that for 100 years coal ships have been unloading at Colombo harbour. They are berthed in mid-stream and the coal is unloaded into lighters, which in turn bring it to the quay for transhipment to wagons.

Mr. Zareen argued that during this unloading operation a considerable quantity of coal always spills over and, it must be down there somewhere.

After much deliberation railway executives gave the go-ahead and Mr. Zareen, in collaboration with the Colombo Port Authorities, started dredging the bottom of the harbour. They soon struck coal.

The Ceylon Railway, which was started by the British in 1863, now has about 250 steam locomotives operating on 360 miles of rail track.

They are gradually being replaced by diesel locomotives, many of which have been given by countries like Britain, Canada, the Federal Republic of Germany and the People's Republic of China under their aid programmes to Ceylon.

The steam engines at their peak used to burn about 200,000 tons of coal every year. Since dieselisation started about 10 years ago the requirements have gradually decreased. Last year Ceylon imported only about 165,000 tons and this year the imports are expected to drop to 50,000 tons.

Ceylon used to get most of its coal from South Africa, but during the past four years, however, it has all come from India.

With the completion of the dieselisation programme in September this year a romantic chapter in the history of the Ceylon Government Railway will come to an end.

**INDIAN OCEAN - POWER VACUUM**

**Sub-continent in search of a defence policy**

The apparent inability of the Australian Prime Minister, Mr. Gorton, to make up his mind on defence is beginning to worry an increasing number of people throughout Australia.

Ever since Britain's decision to withdraw its forces east of Suez, Australia has been waiting for a firm line from the Government.

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**Pattern changed**
