KOREAN EXPOSE

A 14-member North Korean spy ring, including a South Korean National Assembly member, has been arrested in Seoul, the Korean Central Intelligence Agency announced yesterday.

The assemblyman was identified as Kim-Nam Kim (40), who was elected in 1967 on the national list of the ruling Democratic Republican Party.

The CIA said the leader of the ring, which included five women, was Tu-Hin Pak (37), a former resident in Japan who studied law at England's Cambridge University.

More than 40 other people suspected of being involved in the spy ring were investigated, the CIA added.

Both Kim and Pak had joined the North Korean Labour (Communist) Party and were used to organize an underground party in the south, the agency said. They were to prepare for an uprising in the event of a North Korean military invasion.

RHODESIA WARNED ON RECOGNITION

Adoption of the Rhodesian Government's constitutional proposals at next month's referendum would put past any change of Rhodesia's status, international recognition of her independence, the president, Mr. Ian Smith, said on Tuesday.

Addressing a public meeting in Salisbury in support of the party's campaign to persuade the electorate to reject the draft Constitution, Mr. Smith said: "When apart from South Africa and Portugal would give recognition to Rhodesia once the proposals were implemented? It would be handing the country to the Communists on a plate."

Review of road transport

Unreserved support should be forthcoming for the ruling by the Transport Licensing Board that no further licences are to be issued to operate buses or lorries on Kenya's main roads. "Never" is too final a word, but the prohibition is justified for the foreseeable future.

When the board's chairman, Mr. Gataguta, made the announcement at Nakuru, he explained the decision had been taken in order to stimulate the country's economic development. He said that everything known about Kenya's highways are congested with buses and heavy lorries. Operators who want to run public service and goods vehicles should look to the countryside, applying for licences to serve, and so help to open up the remoter agricultural areas.

Significantly, Mr. Gataguta was speaking to an audience of no fewer than 500 applicants for licences. He told them they should not look to the trunk roads for traffic, roads joining the country's main towns, but seek to serve the rural areas where passengers and traders suffer from the paucity of transport. That is where scope for expansion in road transport lies.

Recently, the Government invoked regulations to safeguard the tarmac surfaces of trunk roads against damage caused by overloaded transporters and petrol tankers. The newly surfaced Mombasa-Nairobi road has worn to the extent of causing serious dangers through the risk of accidents. In consequence, there is rethinking on the part of international agencies who naturally want to ensure that

aid is properly expended. Immediately afterwards, a correspondent who has had many years of practical experience in road transport (but is not personally concerned under this edict) pointed out that "for years the policy of the Transport Licensing Board to grant licences almost without limitation along the major trunk routes of Kenya has not only virtually destroyed the economy of the railway (and so will affect it all) but has also destroyed the roads".

He maintained that carrier licences were granted without relation to the amount of traffic available to be moved by rail and road on any particular routes, or whether the roads were suitable for the vehicles licensed. After defending the railway against wasteful road competition, he contended:—

"The whole of the transportation industry needs completely new thinking to bring it up-to-date and to serve Kenya. If this problem is to be tackled effectively, what is realistic view of the industry, its rationalisation with the public interest and that of the railway and strict enforcement of the law. "The Transport Licensing Ordinance needs redefining. Unless all this is done, one more ineffectual exercise will have been carried out to nobody's advantage."

The T.L.B. has gone some way towards meeting this type of criticism by suspending the grant of further licences to cover main road transport. The Ordinance still waits for drastic amendments based not only on the requirements of rationalised public and commercial traffic, but the findings of the Working Party which examined the problems mainly with an eye to road safety.

The President of Kenya, Uganda and Tanzania, Mr. Kenyatta, last week confirmed the splitting up of East African Airways into three separate H.Q. moves to Dar es Salaam. In this article CHARLES M. BRADEN explains the extensive changes being made to the port.

HARBOURS H.Q. Dar port ready to meet challenge

The waves of Tanzania's rapid commercial and industrial development have been pounding demanding on the harbour and port of Dar es Salaam. The economic transformations, coupled with Zambia's need for an alternate port for her imports and exports following Rhodesia's illegal declaration of independence and the increasing use of Dar es Salaam harbour by Uganda, Congo (Kinshasa), Rwanda and Burundi, have called for radical expansions in Dar es Salaam harbour and port facilities. In spite of the fact that Dar es Salaam harbour is a deep-water area than Mombasa harbour, developments of port and harbour facilities during the colonial era were heavily in favour of Mombasa. This is the situation which the present expansions are intended to rectify, to provide faster and more efficient service to meet the needs of the countries served by the port of Dar es Salaam.

Late in a series of these planned expansions has been the construction of three deep-water berths south of the present port area. The first of these berths is being spent on the construction of the berths, each of which will be 600ft. in length. This sum will also cater for the erection of a number of new sheds and the purchase of several new transfer equipment and cranes. The first of the three berths is expected to be ready for use this October. Construction of the other two is expected to be completed late next year. These will bring the total number of deep-water berths in Dar es Salaam harbour to, as against 14 for Mombasa, 17. Plans have already been laid for the building of two more deep-water berths as soon as construction of the present berths is completed. These berths will have stronger foundations to meet container traffic.

In addition to the three berths, a new show jetty for coastal ships will be constructed in the near future at a cost of £100,000 and is scheduled to be ready for use early in 1971. Dar es Salaam harbour, a tidal basin with a deep-water area of approximately 237 acres, started off in 1905 and has since been developed mainly as a lighterage port. It has a maximum permissible draught at various tides vary between 22 and 33 feet. Because of its narrow entrance channel, pilotage is compulsory at all times and the berths which can enter the port are limited to a few. The only berth facilities Dar es Salaam harbour has had hitherto consisted in three deep-water berths constructed in 1956 at a cost of £25,000. One of the berths was constructed at the expense of the Belgian Government to serve as an outlet for the imports and exports to and from the Congo and the then colony of Ruanda and Burundi. Administration of this berth and its related transit shed and backing facilities is handled by the Agency Maritime International (E.A.) Ltd, which acts as agent for the three countries. Handling of cargo on shore and on ships is handled over by the East African Cargo Handling Services as contractors to the Railways and Harbours Corporation, who are shareholders of the company. The company came into being in 1964 as a result of the amalgamation of the Handling and Shipping Company of East Africa and various shipping companies. Although there has not been a very spectacular increase in the number of ships calling on the Dar es Salaam harbour since 1964, the total tonnage handled over the period has more than doubled. Inadequate port and harbour facilities have largely been responsible for such a state of affairs. However, with the present improvements and developments now going on, more vessels are already using the harbour. In 1964, a total of 99,349 tons of cargo were handled in 1964 a total of 97,173 tons were dealt with last year. This increase in port traffic reflects the dynamic social, agricultural, commercial and industrial developments and transformations taking place in Tanzania and her neighbours.

Copper has been a recent addition to Dar es Salaam's list of main bulk ports. The Dar es Salaam Oil Refinery, equipment, vehicles and industrial plants and equipment amount to 200,000 tons. This, together with the purchase of additional equipment for the port, has cost the Government some £75,000 in form of a loan from the Zambia Government. However, they have not turned out as expected. The Cargo Handling Services Branch has only a total of 296,619 tons of cargo last year, 78,381 tons being imports and 218,238 tons of exports. This is less than the tonnage we anticipated and as a result the port has had an operating loss of £100,000. Nevertheless, prospects are more brighter and according to Mr. J. M. Mumbi, the Chief Commercial and Traffic Manager of the Harbours and Shipping Corporation, the Zambia Government has given reassurances of more tonnage for the forthcoming years. This, coupled with the construction of a railway link between Zambia and Tanzania, should result in higher tonnage of cargo and the maximum use of the facilities available at the Harbours Corporation.

During colonial days people at the Coast were often said to be lazy and the result was that the colonial Government did little to help the area to catch up with national development. In terms of education, particularly secondary education, only Mombasa District and the islands of Lamu and Gatoles were doing better than the rest of the Coast. In 1963 for example, there were eight secondary schools with several streams each in Mombasa District and for the whole of the rural area of the Coast there were only three other secondary schools, all with single Form One classes.

There was no secondary school in Kwana District, a single secondary school for Mwapa, and only one in the islands. Dr. Kiyo said that he had been touring the islands and had seen many families who were not willing to send their children to primary school, let alone to secondary school. Some parents had been deceived by irresponsible people who used religious or other reasons to discourage them from sending their children to primary or secondary school.

The Minister outlined the progress made by the Government since 1963. There was a girls' secondary school at Kileleshwa, another at Malindi, Malindi Secondary School at Malindi, and a boys' secondary school at Malindi. A large three-stream secondary school was being built at Mtwapa.

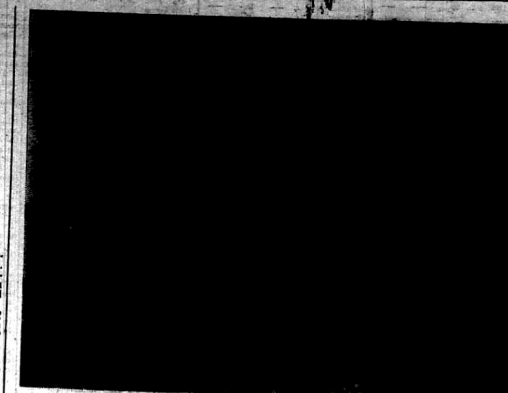
ARABS HELD AFTER GAZA BOMB BLAST

Subject to the satisfactory completion of trial supplies of a vaccine to prevent rubella (German measles) may become available in East Africa next year.

Switzerland has granted the first licence for the production of a vaccine against German measles by the Swiss firm of Sandoz and Ciba.

Trials are taking place in Britain and the company is ready to make a full submission to the Dunlop Committee later this year.

German measles is a minor disease in children but grave in women during early pregnancy. Abortions are common and many infants are born with physical or mental defects.

The most recent epidemic of German measles in America occurred in 1964-65. Its tragic consequences in the United States alone were some 20,000 deaths, blindness and fetal death. The cycle of the disease in Africa is expected to be completed in 1970-71.

More than 60,000 persons throughout the world have been inoculated with the new vaccine during clinical trials. It has proved it to be safe and effective for all age groups.

It has been studied in family studies and large-scale open studies in Africa, the Americas, Western Europe, the Caribbean and Asia.

Used largely in children, young girls and young women, it has caused no significant clinical problems and no significant increase in susceptible people kept in close contact with the vaccinees.

REPORT Bill to change libel law

Legislation to consolidate and amend the statute law relating to libel, and malicious falsehood, is contained in the Defamation Bill, published in a Kenya Gazette supplement today.

The object of the Bill is to bring the law into line with modern conditions. One clause — a new provision — ensures that an action for slander can be taken in respect of matter calculated to disparage a person in office. At present this is confined to cases in which actual damage can be proved.

At present a defamatory statement in an election address may be held to be made on a privileged occasion. The Bill removes this privilege.

Amendments to the law at present applicable in Kenya relating to the qualified privilege of newspapers on certain reports are included in the Bill, which extends wireless broadcasting the same protection as newspaper reports.

Another provision is designed to mitigate the rigour of the law of defamation on unintentional defamation. Changes in defences to actions for libel are introduced by relaxing the present strict rules.

The final clause provides that an action for libel or slander cannot be brought later than one year from the date of the commission that present the period is three years.

BAIL NOT A RIGHT, SAY MAGISTRATE

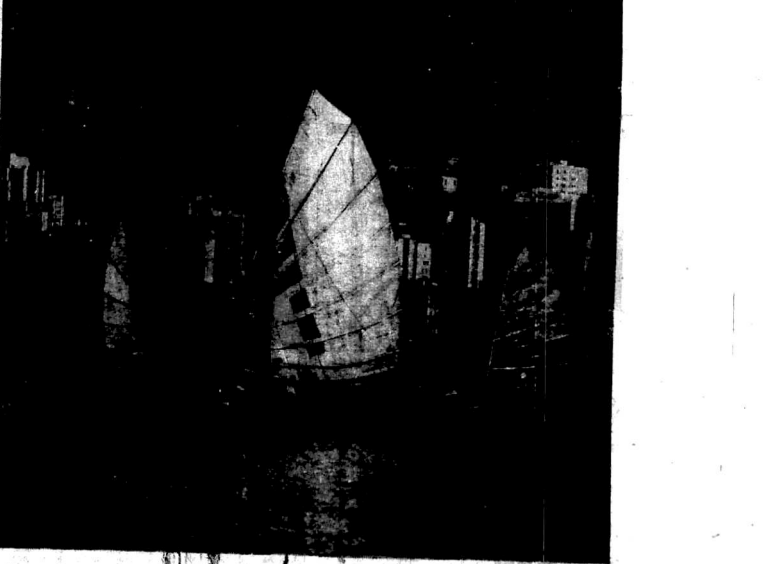

Larry Ruddock meets the... Willing pupils at the school for Alsatians

Every Saturday at 4 p.m. about 50 Alsatian dog lovers meet at the East African Kennel Club grounds at Nairobi's Jamhuri Park to accompany their dogs through a week-long training session the aim of which is to turn out a dog which can be friend and protector.

The members who attend along with their dogs, belong to the East African Kennel Club, which uses the Nairobi Club's premises and is affiliated to it.

Above the only available activity is to be seen in the training sessions is that of training dogs for the blind in this country, the Alsatian League's secretary, Mr. David K. Runyard, said. It is a full-time job and it takes a long time to train a dog to do a lot of things.

Mr. Runyard said that "The dog is founded on trust and we have about 150 members. This

involves about 200 dogs. These Saturday training sessions are broken up into various classes all at different stages of a ten-week course."

The beginners' course includes those who come along for the first time and they can go right up to the last course which, if they pass, will allow them to go on to the most advanced forms of training for an Alsatian. This includes tracking.

As the dog moves through the early stages of its training it becomes, if all goes well, a tractable dog. This means that it will walk to heel; if it is told to stay it will stay; if you want it to stop bothering visitors you can tell it to go away and wait and it will do so. Some animals will stay in one place if told to do so by the owner even if the owner goes out of sight.

It is possible to tell how a dog will shape up at such course at first sight," Mr. Runyard said. This was not always possible, especially if the dog was under 12 months. If it is

over 12 months an expert can tell very quickly.

One of the reasons why puppies under six months are not taken is that, apparently, they go through stages of having complexes which make it difficult to train. Another reason is that at six months and "it is easy to hurt it, both physically and mentally."

Between six months and a year it gets a shell of toughness around it and it can stand up to being trained.

"Half the trouble is that we have to teach the handlers or the owners — they are usually one and the same — how to teach their dogs. They make mistakes like everyone else and if the dog is too young they may spoil it," Mr. Runyard said.

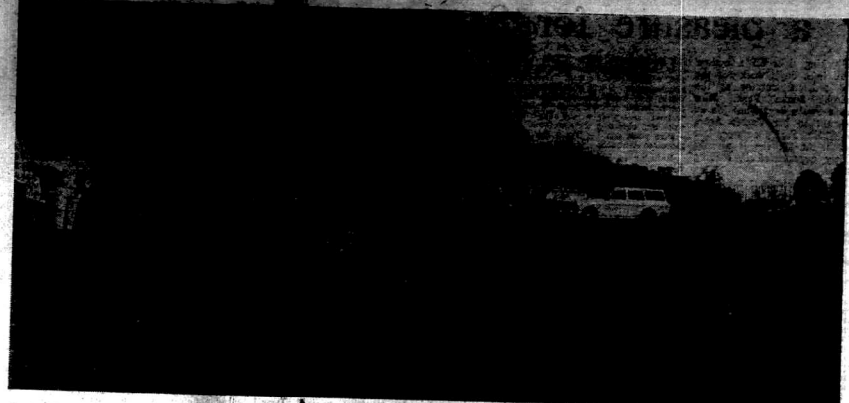
The police take an interest in the courses and they have obtained a number of good dogs from members of the league. They judge league trials from time to time.

Police training methods are somewhat different from those employed by the league. They have a specialised line which is not duplicated to any great extent by the league although aspects of it are touched upon.

"A police dog," Mr. Runyard explained, "may be capable of going out at the age of eight months and catching a criminal whereas we would not expect any of our dogs to do that. It is quite a dangerous thing to send off a dog to bring down a criminal unless you are reasonably sure that you can handle it and can stop him if he goes for the wrong person."

One of the essentials of training a dog of an Alsatian's temperament is to get it familiar with the presence of other dogs. This is called socialisation and forms an important part of the course. Until they stop fighting or bickering among themselves the course cannot move along.

The key to all training is praise; praise for even a small and simple jump executed well. Dog handlers spend half their time saying "good boy" and patting the lively dogs on the neck. Coupled with words of praise is the choke chain which is another important training device. The slight and harmless tug given and for all intents and purpose, is

an Alsatian, but for which good grace can be produced.

As long as these requirements are fulfilled there should be no trouble for would-be Alsatian League members.

The League has been doing very well in shows. The most recent one took place two weeks ago and was presided over by a German judge Herr Alfred Hahn, who has been breeding Alsatians since 1924. His work for the breed was finally recognised last year when his kennel won the Progeny Class at the German Sieger Show, considered the highest award in the world for German shepherd dogs.

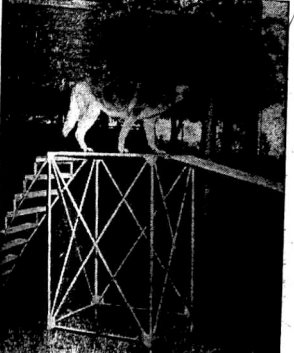
The Best of Breed at the last show went to a two-year-old dog bred in Ireland, Allenbay's Hartman of Britain, owned by Major and Mrs. J. E. Ludlow of Uganda.

The dogs compete in obedience tests, Kennel Club shows and the League's own events. In the obedience tests and 60 in the dog show there were 40 dogs in the obedience tests and 60 in the dog show. Other items are often donated as prizes by well-wishers and interested parties.

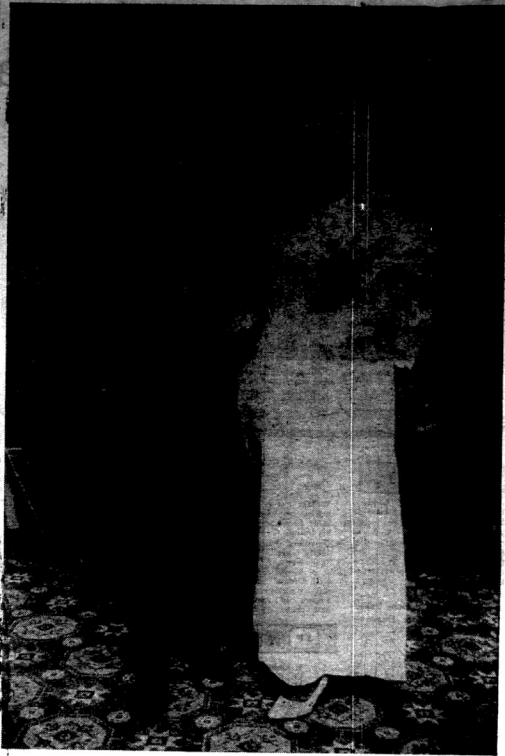

N. Vietnam rejects President Nixon's eight-point peace plan

North Vietnam's delegation to the Paris peace talks yesterday rejected President Nixon's proposal for a mutual ceasefire and a political program on Wednesday.

The North Vietnamese delegate stated Hanoi's insistence on the total and unconditional withdrawal of American troops and the troops of those countries supporting Washington.

He invited the other delegations at the talks to negotiate a solution based on the ten-point plan put forward by the National Liberation Front.

Earlier the American negotiator, Mr. Henry Cabot Lodge, flew into Paris carrying President Nixon's plan and described it as "constructive, flexible, generous and fair."

Key differences between the American and N.L.F. plans center on the question of defining and withdrawing external forces from the country, and the N.L.F. demand that a provisional coalition Government be installed in Saigon to prepare for the elections.

Mr. Nixon proposed a phased withdrawal of North Vietnamese and American forces. The Front calls for unconditional withdrawal by the Americans, but its programme contains a broad hint that the question of Northern

troops in the South is negotiable among the Vietnamese parties.

Mr. Cabot Lodge said he would reply to the N.L.F. plan at the talks.

The touring U.S. Secretary of State, Mr. Rogers, met South Vietnam's President Nguyen Van Thieu yesterday for ten minutes of private conversation before beginning expanded talks on President Nixon's peace plan.

Discussions continued through the morning with the American Ambassador, Mr. Ellsworth Bunker, the Saigon Vice-President, Nguyen Cao Ky, and high American officials taking part.

Mr. Averell Harriman, former chief American negotiator at the Paris talks, yesterday urged the United States unilaterally to pull out 50,000 troops from South Vietnam.

America should adopt a more defensive position in the war, he said.

"We cannot expect the Vietnamese to stop their attacks as long as we are exerting maximum military pressure on them," he said at a dinner in New York.

Violent gunners have shot down three more American helicopters, killing one man and wounding four, the U.S. Command announced in Saigon yesterday.

A spokesman said Thursday's incident brought to 2,664 the total number of American helicopters lost in the war.

U.S. troops trying to seal off infiltration routes from Laos killed 74 North Vietnamese in a machine-gun battle for strategic mountain positions only two miles from the border.

A U.S. military spokesman said one American was killed and 47 wounded in the two-hour dash on Thursday 30 miles south-west of Hanoi.

The U.S. troops are part of a big airborne force sent into the area to stop movement of North Vietnamese troops and supplies from Laos into the strategic Ashau valley in an operation named "Apache Snow."

The bitter fighting was close to the spot where 53 North Vietnamese agents killed three days ago in fighting across mountain passes regarded as the "back door" of the key northern cities of Danang, Hanoi and Quang Tri.

In Saigon police remained on alert after the recent wave of Vietcong terrorist attacks, but there were no serious incidents in the capital. Only 12 shelling attacks were reported throughout the country overnight and casualties were light.

The ten-year-old son of a local official was killed on Thursday in the Cholon Chinese district of Saigon by a Vietcong terrorist who got away with a South Vietnamese spokesman said.

There were widespread fears in the capital that terrorist attacks would be stepped up over the weekend to mark the birthday of the North Vietnamese President, Ho Chi Minh, on Monday.

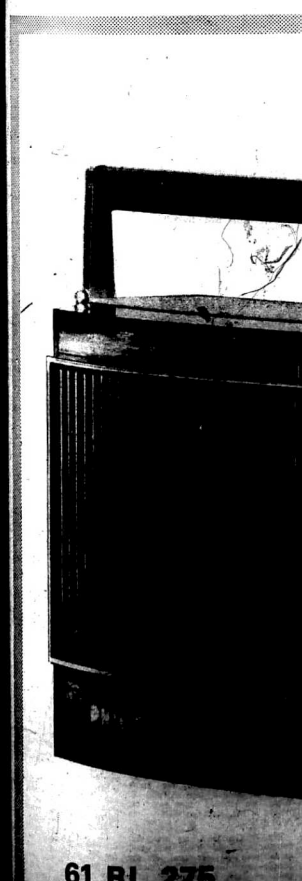
