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Another 1976 American servicemen left Vietnam yesterday bringing to 21,000—the number withdrawn so far under President Nixon's plan to pull out 25,000 troops by the end of this month.

However, an upsurge in fighting in the past two weeks has delayed the expected announcement of further withdrawals.

President Nixon said he had decided to put off a final decision on pull-outs until he receives additional information on guerrilla activity. His decision will be based on the level of war activity, progress at the Paris Peace Talks and the ability of South Vietnamese troops to assume further responsibility in the field.

Military observers said that as a result of putting off an announcement, Mr. Nixon was unlikely to achieve the target he had set of withdrawing 100,000 troops from Vietnam by the end of the year.

The departures yesterday consisted of 330 Navy men the 653-man Ninth Administration Company from the Ninth Infantry Division, the 812-man 116th Combat Engineer Battalion and the 191-man 231st Transportation Company.

The United States might have its troop strength in South Vietnam and does not rule out an eventual pull back from Europe, the Defence Secretary, Mr. Melvin Laird said in an interview with Time magazine this week.

He was questioned before President Nixon's announcement that he would defer his decision on further American troop withdrawals from South Vietnam until next month.

It said that although Mr. Laird "places little credence in talk of a not just an eventual pullback from Europe."

Technical developments in military transportation such as the C-14 and fast supply vessels have given the US increased capability for keeping a larger part of its forces at home while still being able to react quickly to an overseas emergency.

In Vietnam Mr. Laird said he could conceive a "scenario" in which the United States would

leave its forces, leaving 250,000 men — all volunteers — who would not engage in close combat on the ground unless directly attacked.

He said that this was not the United States' desired policy, but that it would become a fait accompli if the Communists continue to talk at an agreement and refuse to reduce their war effort materially.

"Mr. Laird envisages reviews every three or four months of further manpower reductions" in Vietnam, Time said, adding that this is "not only to satisfy anti-war sentiment at home but also to ensure that the South Vietnamese understand fully the U.S. intention to turn the war effort over to them."

Mr. Laird said the plan to leave 250,000 volunteer troops in South Vietnam might be implemented if the three criteria announced by the Nixon Administration are not fulfilled.

These are: Progress in the Paris Peace Talks, a drop in the level of fighting, and an increase in the South Vietnamese army's military potential.

The National Liberation Front gunmen stepped up shelling attacks in South Vietnam, eight of which were considered significant, an American spokesman said in Saigon yesterday.

A ground attack followed a mortar barrage on a battalion of South Vietnamese infantry near Quang Nam in the north-east.

In the wide ground fighting on Binh Dinh, 24 N.L.F. men were killed in a clash on Carabou Peninsula. American B-52 bombers dropped 80 tons of bombs in five raids.

American casualties in shelling attacks from August 17 to 23 included 20 dead and 249 wounded, the spokesman said. Of the 194 attacks during this period, 90 were aimed at N. targets. — Agencies

Dr. Kiesinger denies new national socialism

The West German Chancellor Dr. Kiesinger yesterday denied there was any rebirth of national socialism or even exaggerated nationalism in West Germany.

He told a Press conference in Bonn: "If there were a rebirth of national socialism I would be ashamed because the German people should be able to prevent it quite spontaneously."

Dr. Kiesinger was asked about severe losses resulting from the growth of the extreme right-wing National Democratic Party, which has a good chance of getting into the Federal Parliament for the first time in the German election on September 28.

Taking to reporters after a day he said all that existed was a right-wing group which had had some success in state elections.

It was composed of disappointed elements, some old-type nationalists and people who were prepared to borrow from deplorable models of national socialism in the past.

"I would not take such a view because such a party has not existed just as the Nazis would have no chance had there not been 6,000,000 unemployed and a Communist Party."

The extreme right-wing National Democratic Party leader, Herr von Thadden, had accused Dr. Kiesinger of "inciting hatred" in a speech at a N.P.D. rally in Bonn last week.

He said the comparison between the Chancellor's statements and a recent interview that the N.P.D. was trying to arouse the spirit of national socialism.

Earlier, he said, he had spoken at a "Sieg Heil" at Herr von Thadden's election rally.

Several thousand yelling demonstrators drowned out speeches by N.P.D. leaders and forced police towards to intervene as they attempted to overturn a radio broadcasting Herr Von Thadden's speech.

Fireworks were thrown at police confining off the Town Hall where the rally was held.

At Recklinghausen, police used water cannons to clear demonstrators backing Herr Von Thadden at another N.P.D. rally. — Agencies

New blow for publisher

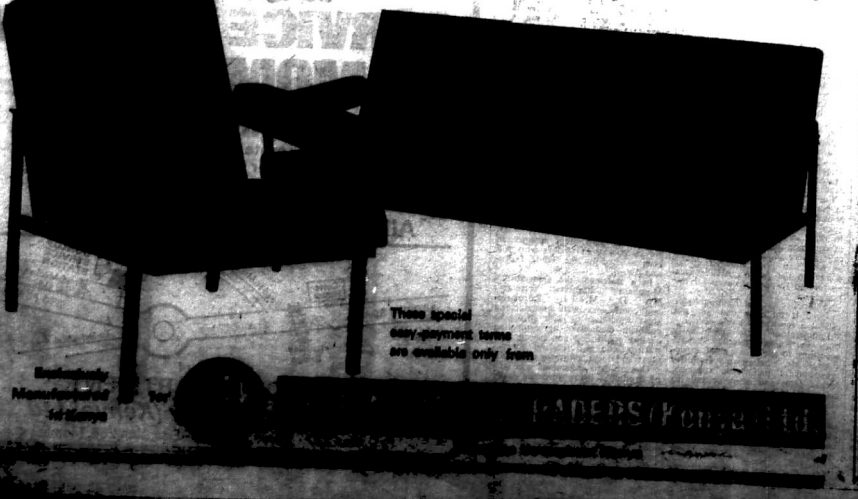

RUBEN OLIVARES TAKES OVER TITLE
 The hard-punching Mexican, Ruben Olivares, became the new world bantamweight boxing champion when he knocked out the former champion, Lionel Rose (Australia), after two minutes 24 seconds of the fifth round in their scheduled 15-round bout at Los Angeles on Friday night.
 It was the first time that the Australian Aborigine had been knocked out in his professional career but the Mexican boxer had predicted on the eve of the fight that he would win within the first nine rounds.
 Olivares, who was generally recognized as the No. 1 challenger to Rose previously, bludgeoned an all-out attack from the very first bell, punching with both hands at a 17,000 crowd, mostly Latin Americans, over their encouragement.
 It was Olivares' sixth victory within the distance of 52 fights. He has never been beaten as a professional but has drawn one match. He follows his compatriots, Manuel Ortiz and Joe Deceza, as holders of the bantamweight crown, having justified his clear favoritism for Friday night's fight.
 Lionel Rose's only chance was to make the fight go the full 15 rounds, when his better boxing skill might have allowed him to score a points win but Olivares took the initiative from the start, relying mainly on strong lefts, with an occasional fierce right hook. Rose was continually forced onto the defensive and despite his speed, was unable to contain Olivares' fierce rain of blows on the face and body.
 Rose tried in vain to avoid Olivares' blows but despite his size he was the canvas in the second round. Olivares landed stinging and more powerful punches which sent Rose reeling with a few left hooks to the head which stunned the Australian bantam.
 As he dazed toward Olivares in the Mexican, sensing that the crowd was within his grasp, Olivares landed a series of four and fourth rounds, and only the going saved the Australian from a fourth round stoppage.
 Olivares kept up his continuous rain of blows in the fifth round, and after two minutes 24 seconds

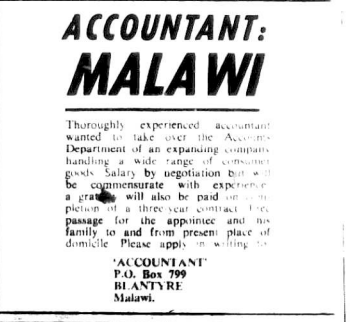

The whole transplant programme is being reassessed, he said, but it does not mean that no further operations will be performed.

A spokesman for the Methodist Hospital, also in Houston, admitted that the emphasis was of human heart transplants there is still.

This, however, is not the case at Stanford University Medical Centre, in Palo Alto, California, which has the best survivor record.

Thirteen Africans have been mysteriously murdered in the slum in the six most recent killings last month, three married couples were stabbed in the heads and necks.

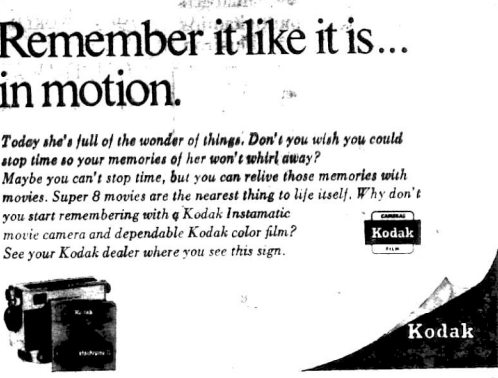

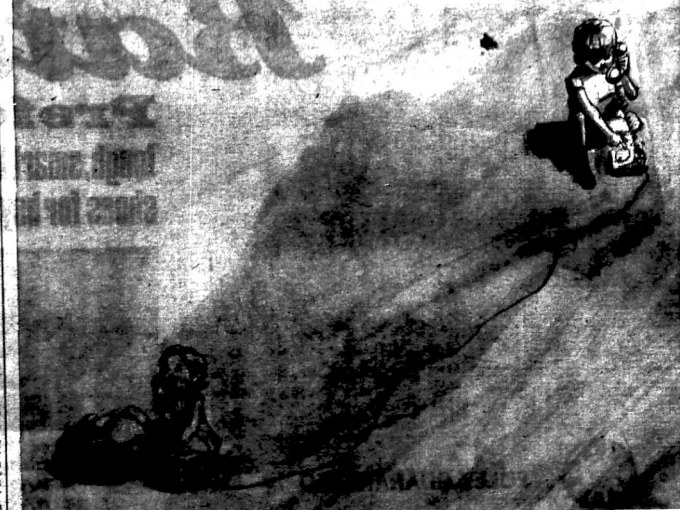

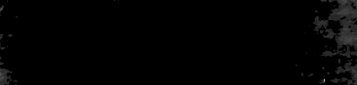

You never stop learning to be a good driver

"Women drivers" he hines contemptuously as the brakes are slammed on to avoid collision with the female-driven mini that cuts in from quite unconcernedly—no signal and no backward glance at the blaring horns.

This is the typical situation with which women drivers are associated, even though in reality there may be only one or two of them who are guilty of such offences.

Is the woman driver reputation really justified? I asked myself

then proceeded to ask some driving instructors the same question. I am glad to report that we women are not so badly thought of by the good male drivers after all, who seem to consider that there is, basically, no difference between men and women drivers. Drivers of both sexes can be equally good and equally bad.

What women generally lack is experience. Often they start driving a car late in life and even after they have passed the test, they seldom get the chance to drive when their husbands are with

them. Women often try to economise on the number of lessons they take. This is a great mistake. Husbands, friends, relatives may all seem to be very good drivers but they have not been trained to pass on their knowledge to beginners in easy-to-understand terms. What is a purely reflex action to an experienced motorist will be new and strange to a learner.

Some of us feel at a disadvantage because of our lack of mechanical knowledge. However, one driving instructor told me that women who know very little about cars are often easier to teach for this reason.

They come without preconceived notions, listen attentively and respond better.

A factor most instructors rely on is that you will do a great deal of practising between lessons. When I was learning I chose a patient friend who sat calmly in the passenger seat while I practised hill starts, reversing and turns in the road, again and again.

Once you have become confident with the gears, the next obstacle to conquer is acquiring road sense. This can be done at any time, even when you are on foot. Apart from studying the Highway Code you can quit yourself to see how familiar you are with the road signs. As you walk down the street, you can watch traffic with new eyes. Train yourself to look ahead. Ask yourself how you would deal with each problem the cars on the road are encountering.

A NAIROBI NURSE IN AMERICA

Mrs. Ann Etherington of Nairobi's Aga Khan Hospital has just completed a three-month tour of hospitals in the United States, during which she studied hospital organisation and nursing methods.

Before arriving in Kenya Mrs. Etherington gained a Winston Churchill Memorial Trust Fellowship which enables students and people in different fields of work to travel abroad for research studies and to experience international living.

Mrs. Etherington was interested in travelling to the United States to study the new team nursing method used there, and during the programme sponsored by the trust she spent time in hospitals in Hartford, Pittsburgh, Texas and Tennessee.

The hospitals chosen for Mrs. Etherington to study were a cross-section of different hospital administrations. Some were State-run, some were private and others were run by religious organisations.

Mrs. Etherington studied training methods in the six States and found that there were at least five different training courses for State-Registered Nurses, some of which required five years of theoretical training.

Nursing training in America differs from that in Kenya. In America the girls must pay for their training which consists mostly of theory and class work. At the Aga Khan Hospital in Kenya student nurses are paid allowances during training, and practical work is an important part of the three-and-a-half-year course.

Not altogether impressed by the long period of theoretical work that

American student nurses undertake, Mrs. Etherington said that this makes them view themselves working in Kenya. Much of the emphasis was on psychology.

One aspect of nursing education that Mrs. Etherington said the service education in Kenya could revise the curriculum and be brought up to date with the latest medical information.

Mrs. Etherington said that at present as this method is not available, Mrs. Etherington's job assignment was to study her own job to do and to be assigned to her according to status.

Nurses in America use a split-shift method of work which enables students and people in different fields of work to travel abroad for research studies and to experience international living.

Mrs. Etherington came to Kenya with her husband and two children. She intends to return to Edinburgh next September on an Arts degree.

On her return to Kenya she hopes to be able to use the knowledge she has gained on the study tour and perhaps to direct the team nursing method at the Aga Khan Hospital.

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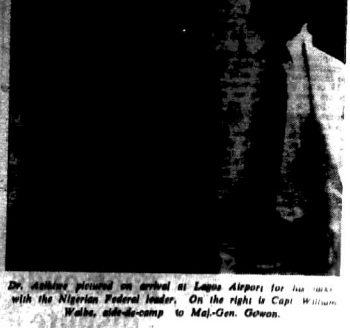

It was not known how many of Ghana's 9,010 policemen and 15,000 army forces had registered as voters.

A Parliamentary candidate, J. C. Ofori, was seen at the Central Police Station after he became the first politician to canvass the People's Representation Deacons governing the election.

Mr. Ofori, a candidate for the National Alliance of Liberals, got into trouble with police and army election supervisors when he displayed the N.A.L. moratorium symbol within 400 yards of a polling booth in the capital's Ayawaso constituency.

The High Court ruled this week that Ghana's People's Popular Party was legally prohibited and its founding members disqualified from holding public office.

The ruling followed a writ filed by the P.P.P., asking the court to declare that the party is not a prohibited organization, and that by proscribing it the National Liberation Council had acted beyond its powers.

The presiding judge, Mr. Justice H. C. Windu, said the plaintiffs had established no prima facie case and he dismissed the summons, awarding 150 new shillings (about \$75) costs against the plaintiffs.

On June 4 this year the Government prohibited the P.P.P. and disqualified its 68 founding members from holding public office on the grounds that the party's activities were not in the national interest.

The six plaintiffs named in the writ include the party's chairman, Dr. Willie Limerick, and its secretary, Mr. G. Aducci.

This month I found four operators, professional hunters and people in the host business who solve these doubts on the future of East Africa's most popular reserve.

One of East Africa's foremost wildlife authorities and a former hunter, Mr. S. P. Dowry, said: "This will be the ruin of Ngongoro and it will spell disaster for the Serengeti too, if it is allowed to go ahead."

"Many of the animals in the crater, particularly the elephant, rhino, lion and all the principal carnivores, have to move out of the area during the wet season. What will they do when they find themselves adrift?"

"And what about the Serengeti animals? It has been proved beyond doubt that a large proportion of the wildlife leave the National Park and go on to the plains that are now the Conservation Area for grazing and water."

"The area has been their route for centuries. What will they do when they suddenly find their way blocked? This is the worst threat that the wildlife of Tanzania has ever suffered and I cannot speak too strongly on this issue."

An interesting discussion on import-export policy and Kenya's foreign trade has followed the reference made to the pattern of trade by the Minister for Commerce and Industry, in the National Assembly.

The cost of Kenya's imports, Mr. Kibaki pointed out, had been running much higher than earnings from exports. During the past year, imports had risen in value by 9.6 per cent and he felt a point had been reached where an examination had to be made to see where restrictions could be introduced. He argued that a developing country, such as Kenya, could not allow itself to get into a situation where imports regularly outran exports, since funds would not then be earned to finance more exports through raised capital.

The rate of increase in imports is exceeding the rate of growth of the national income. Mr. Kibaki quoted the figure of £38,000,000 as the deficit in the balance of payments; but stressed that "more disturbing is that more and more money is being spent on consumer than on capital goods". With danger signals ahead, this led him to conclude commerce would be asked to check luxury imports, on the principle that foreign exchange earnings should be spent on capital goods to swell internal production.

An unfavourable balance of payments, as with Britain, is one cause of inflationary tendencies, and then comes the credit squeeze intended to have disinflationary effects, which inevitably restrict industry, causing unemployment, or what is synonymously called redeployment of labour.

Sir Derek Erskine linked the assurance about the strength of the Kenya shilling, given by the Governor of the Central Bank, with Mr. Kibaki's assertion to the necessity for curtailing imports. It is true, as Sir Derek wrote, that Kenya's vital imports have always outrun the value of its exports. While Kenya has appeared to be "wallowing" in the "red" with an adverse trade balance, Uganda and Tanzania have achieved favourable balances. Yet Kenya's economy has developed more quickly and the per capita income is ahead.

the argument that Swahili should take the merit of being indigenous is absolutely futile. Kenya is in command of the two languages sufficiently and are able to communicate and express everyday ideas through the two media to standard requirements.

I would, therefore, emphasize that we should continue to use the two languages alongside each other. We should be taking the first priority in official communications and expressions as is the case at present.

The question of culture is a subject of enormous magnitude in Kenya and to a third party in today's Kenya, I would, for example, advocate the compulsory teaching of all tribal vernaculars in all primary schools as one of the effective means of fusing and understanding the different cultures. This system will also help to reduce tribal suspicions and tensions.

The exercise could take the form whereby teachers from different tribes are assigned to teach their own vernaculars in tribal areas

other than their own, for example, a Kisii being posted to a Kalenjin primary school to teach the Kalenjin primary pupils the Kisii vernacular, and so on. This is a complete network of an inter-communal staff of teachers throughout the primary schools.

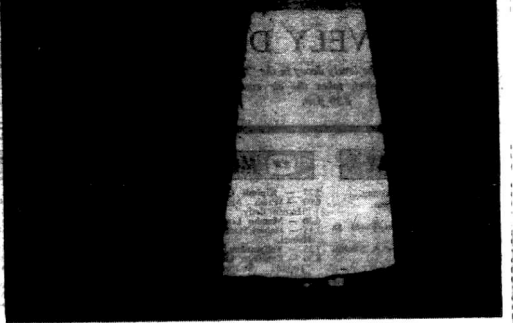

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
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Visitors to this year's Mombasa Show will be disappointed if they do not see the magnificent stock of the province in the Coast Province by Kenya into line with those areas of the country where high quality stock has been established for a long time, the Coast Provincial Animal Husbandry Officer, Mr. S. W. Sprague, states.

He adds that the production of animal products of all kinds is claiming the imagination and energy of stockmen in all parts of the province.

Elucidating his point of view, Mr. Sprague says that from the heights of the Taita Hills through the vast fertile areas of the hinterland to the lush coastal belt, our farmers are determined to show that they have they may be new to modern improved husbandry and exotic breeds of cattle and other kinds of farm stock, they can produce animals and birds of a quality equal to the best in Kenya.

He adds: "All along the Coast from north and south the farms of Mombasa can now be found farms which are stocked with superb and high-grade cattle, sheep, goats and pigs.

"While poultry farms producing eggs, table birds, day-old chicks and reliable pure-bred and commercial strains of stock birds are firmly established in the province, most of these poultry products are for local consumption by an ever-growing market brought about by the tourist trade."

But this farming revolution is not confined to the coastal belt alone. In the drier parts of the province inland stock owners are gradually bringing their farming methods up to date by introducing the local breeds of zebu cattle by selective breeding and improving grade stock. Numerous farmers in settlement areas are now also interested in keeping high-grade cows and growing the fodder necessary to feed them.

In the Taita Hills, grade dairy cattle are increasing. Jerseys have been found to do well in the hills around Wundanyi and Jersey bulls are available at bull camps in the area to grade the local cows.

Also in the hills farmers are interested in pig keeping, rabbit meat production and poultry farming.

"How widespread this interest and activity is may be judged by a visit to the show, says Mr. Sprague.

Just how efforts are being made to control and curb livestock diseases in the Coast Province is explained by the Acting Coast Provincial Veterinary Officer, Mr. S. K. Mutai. His Veterinary Service Division of the Ministry of Agriculture has the responsibility of controlling diseases through field and laboratory work.

Manned by professional and

technical personnel at all levels, the main functions of the division include controlling notifiable livestock diseases in order to stop the death toll and reduce or eliminate the loss of lives of livestock through ill-health.

Among the well-known diseases in Kenya are foot and mouth disease, rinderpest, East Coast fever and rabies. Their control measures involve restrictions of livestock movement, vaccination and cleaning with acaricides.

Contagious pleuro-pneumonia and Contagious Panniculitis are also livestock diseases well-known in East Africa.

Mr. Mutai says that rinderpest, once a serious plague of cattle, is being controlled in Kenya by an annual compulsory free vaccination of all cattle over nine months old, and the same measures are being applied at the Coast.

The problem of lack of easy communication and bad weather in the island district is well-covered by a special Q.A.U. project for eradication of cattle every year for three years. The campaign has been reasonably successful in the Taita Hills.

Contagious pleuro-pneumonia which is still existing in parts of the North-Eastern Province has appeared in Lamu district as clean cattle and infected animals from the neighbouring North-Eastern Province.

The Veterinary Division is currently engaged in measures to reduce the damage of the disease spreading in the district by directing infected animals to slaughter after their infection has been detected through blood testing.

Trypanosomiasis, caused by tsetse fly and which attacks all kinds of farm animals as well as dogs, is said to be probably the most dangerous single disease which retards livestock industry in the Coast Province.

As elsewhere in the country, the method being used at the coast to control the disease is by treating infected animals with prophylactic and curative trypanocidal drugs at regular intervals. The efforts so far working well.

Another menacing livestock disease in the province is East Coast fever which has taken a heavy toll of the high bred cattle in particular. Treatment which has proved effective is cleaning with acaricides — the only way to keep the disease at bay — and vaccinating stock owners to dip and spray their cattle.

The Veterinary Division has a stand at the Mombasa Show where some of the techniques employed to combat trypanosomiasis as well as general tick control methods will be demonstrated.

Provincial Kangaroo Officer, Mr. J. A. Ayoko, says that the Coast Province's total area is 3,800 square miles, about 29,700 square miles is range land and 3,512 square miles is ungrazed land.

What is termed as zone IV — high potential for livestock production — makes up most of the area and includes the hinterland area extending from Taita and Taveta areas north of Tana River coastal strip just behind the coast.

Most of this zone remains undeveloped because it is not suited for agriculture and it is where the rangeland division has potential for livestock production in the area is very high. All the ranchers need to do is to manage their ranches carefully, avoid overstocking and burn with care, says Mr. Ayoko.

There are 14 established ranches in the Coast Province of which five are co-operative, six company and three individual, involving a total of just over 2,000,000 acres, over 2,000 families and about 30,000 cattle and goats.

For Lamu District it is proposed to develop one large ranch and smaller ones of 30,000 acres on leasehold. A similar survey of the district by the same department is under way.

The eastern part of the Kenyan triangle in Kwana District is to be reserved for use by Kwale people and will comprise Cherani and Operative Ranching Society, while the semi-arid Taita Taita lands will be added to the block and the area developed as a large-scale project.

It was estimated that livestock stock in the Coast Province had year 282,000 cattle, 130,000 sheep and 204,000 goats, including 100,000 lambs and 100,000 kids.

The breakdown for range areas was 125,000 cattle, 114,833 sheep and 120,000 goats. In the same period approximately 20,662 head of cattle were sold at auction.

The number of cattle exported from the province was 18,965 in 1952, 17,100 in 1953 and 18,912 in 1954.

'Determined to pay our way'

The Chairman of the Coast District of the Agricultural Society of Kenya, Sir Wilfrid Havelock, said that although the A.S.K. said bad financial standing, his district was determined to pay its own way without being subsidised by anyone.

Sir Wilfrid said they believed they can achieve this aim by staging popular events throughout the year, by providing permanent amenities for the public and, of course, by giving the Mombasa Show a special coastal flavour and endeavouring to make it increasingly popular.

"Thanks to our show committee chairman, Mr. Pape, and to his committee and the sub-committees, everything is ready for the Mombasa third show.

"There are many new members this year of the different and essential sub-committees and this is a very welcome development.

"More and more people are taking an active part in staging the show, bringing with them new ideas and fresh enthusiasm. The show itself has increased in popularity each year and has now established itself as the major annual event at the Coast.

"I sincerely hope this year that more farmers from outlying districts will go through the turnstile. Although farming in the Coast generally has suffered from less rain than we can usually expect, at least one result should be that communications should be easier and regularity of transport should be able to organise their transport especially from Tana River and Lamu.

"They should also take advantage of the Special Party tickets for groups of 10 or which offer a much cheaper entry per head to the Showground than individual tickets.

"These tickets are on sale now at the Showground up to August 28, and must be purchased in advance. 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COCONUTS may be one of the Kenya Coast, but as a productive crop they are not fully exploited. An article by an expert from Ceylon explains how to tap into an efficient economic force on the coast.

In the coastal province of Kenya and of other countries the most profitable. By reason of the fact that the commercial produce of the coconut is the copra, it has the most promising future. Some 7,000 farmers are said to depend upon the palm for much of their livelihood and oil mills in the province would be hard hit if the supply of copra failed.

It is estimated that the average production per palm is 25 per acre as against a domestic consumption of 10 per acre. The surplus is exported to small and large landowners in the province and that, in 1963, the minimum total of coconut products, including that of whole nuts exported, was in the region of 192,000 tons.

2,000 tons of whole nuts exported of unknown value, 4,033 tons of copra sold to local oil mills worth 127,768, 1,800 tons of copra fibre exported to the value of 56,000 and an unknown quantity of coconut shells and husks valued at 100,000.

It was estimated in 1963 and again this year that the output of coconut in the Kilifi District is 1,500,000 gallons a year worth 250,000, and that in the entire province, worth 223,000. Improvements in the future will be at least half as much.

Such a tree crop with so many economic and subsistence uses, with still many other uses too numerous to mention here, cannot but be regarded as an indispensable agricultural asset.

However, unlike cashewnut and mango, which are seasonal and produce only one substantial crop a year, coconut bears fruit all the year round producing at least one bunch of ripe nuts every month.

Further, coconut kernel is convertible not only into copra but also into desiccated coconut — another valuable commercial product not yet manufactured in Kenya — and today and coir fibre produce two other money-earning commodities.

Cashewnut and mango, on the other hand, very valuable though they are, yield one product in each case — the fruit or the nut — and offer no additional commodities for trade. The coconut palm, therefore, is regarded as a safe investment which yields regular daily or monthly dividends, or as a bank from which money can be drawn producing at the year.

Situated within the latitude limits of four degrees north and four degrees south, Kenya's Coast

Province is within the tropics and the climate is ideal for the growth of coconut. The soil is good and the rainfall is abundant. The average rainfall in the Coast Province is 45 to 50 inches a year, which is low compared with other parts of Kenya where the rainfall ranges from 20 to 100 inches.

But for reasons which are still not fully understood, the coconut province does not appear to be as productive as it should be. It is severely affected by prolonged droughts as palms in other countries. No one in the province has yet seen palms seriously damaged or killed by long spells of drought as in India and Ceylon.

The environmental conditions in the coastal belt and the actual production of the palm in such conditions leads to the conclusion that coconut production in the Coast Province has a promising future, provided that necessary attention is given to the crop and the manufacture of its products. While there are quite a few high yielding plants available about in the coastal belt, by far the larger number are poor yielders, producing on an average about 1,000 nuts per acre per annum, as compared with 4,000 to 5,000 per acre on well-managed plantations in Ceylon.

Moreover, the nuts in Kenya are required to produce a large quantity of copra, as compared with an average of 40 per cent in other countries. Better husbandry in certain other countries though better dried than the sun-dried ones, is still far below generally accepted standards of quality.

Copra of high quality can be made only from fully ripe coconuts dried in kilns for a correct length of time over smoky fires or in box- or kiln of correct design. Copra so made is clean and white on the inner surface with a smooth brown skin outside and contains not more than 80 per cent of moisture. It is also sweet-smelling and odourless and when properly stored is not prone to mould infection or insect infestation.

It has more oil than sun-dried copra and does not require storage for the purpose of reconditioning such copra is in fact ready for instant milling and on passing through a sizer it produces a water-white oil containing less than one per cent acid. The oil is of high quality and ready for use with hardly any refining or reconditioning.

Naturally, such copra and oil command a high price in the world markets and the residual copra cake or meal is a superior food stuff for livestock.

The manufacture of copra of such high quality is not at all difficult. All that is required is fully ripe nuts, a simple kiln and a little work according to a set timetable.

A simple kiln capable of drying 100 to 200 nuts in two to four days which is well suited to small holders is shown as an example of which is on display at the Mombasa agricultural show, has produced an exceptionally high-grade copra. Similar kilns for the purpose of demonstration to the farmers are to be built at Mombasa, Kajiado, Malindi and Lamu. One has already been built at the Farmers Training Centre at Mtwapa, near Mombasa.

It should be noted that the kiln can be used not only for copra drying but also for drying cassava, fish and other food products.

There now remains the problem

of increasing the quantity of copra produced in the Coast Province. That can be done (a) by improvement of the yield in the present coconut holdings through better cultural practices and by application of fertilizers, (b) by reducing the density of palms in overcrowded holdings, (c) by expansion of the present acreage, using properly selected planting material and developing new plantings according to correct methods of coconut husbandry and (d) by stringent control of the Rhinoceros beetle.

It should be noted here that, for both the transformation of copra quality and increasing the quantity of copra, specially trained personnel will be required as well as a coconut extension service. While it is possible to start implementation of such an improvement programme immediately with great advantage by utilizing the results of research carried out in other coconut growing countries, such results may not however, be fully applicable in the conditions prevailing in Kenya.

It follows, therefore, that the final answers to the many questions that will be raised in the future will be given only through locally conducted research on selection and breeding (genetic improvement), soils, fertilizers, cultural practices, suitable gear crops to bring in the future, the first five or six interproductive years of the life of the palm and techniques of inter-cropping with such crops as banana, pineapple and similar cash crops.

It has not been possible hitherto to provide the necessary technical manpower, laboratory and field facilities or adequate funds for coconut research and extension of the scope required.


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OLDEST HARDWARE HOUSE ON THE COAST

At the side of water in the Shimba Hills of Taita District continues to deteriorate because of coffee berry disease and bush disease. It is now evident that the main cash crops in the Coast Province at present are for some time to come are coconut, cashewnut, cotton and vegetables.

Biz, a dye crop which was introduced in 1961, and the most successful campaign the province has ever witnessed. It was due to an abrupt end in 1967 with the slashing of the price of biz from 140 to 55 cents a pound.

The Coast Provincial Crops Officer, Mr. Enoch M'rabu, says the price of biz was around 100 cents when it started farmers in the Shimba Hills, compared with 100 cents in 1967. It was a very important cash crop particularly for farmers in the Shimba Hills settlement scheme.

Mr. M'rabu says that cotton, another important money earner to the Coast farmer, has also witnessed a gradual decrease in production since 1963, when the situation reached a critical point last year when only 12,300 acres were under the crop compared with 27,300 acres in 1967.

Still there are no indications that the crop will reach anywhere near the 1967 figure this year. The target for this year was 15,000 acres but only 11,000 acres, he has been planned.

Bad weather over the past four years which has been erratic and forced to plant for one of the multiple reasons for the decline of cotton.

In some cases the acreage that would have gone under cotton had been taken by other crops. An example is Malindi, where coconut mangoes and cashewnuts are increasing acreage, consequently resulting in the reduction of cotton acreage.

Another reason is that many farmers think that cotton may work in growing cotton while they could easily make an equal amount of money from other crops like simsim, green grams, chickpeas and peas.

Coconut, as one of the main cash crops, earned the province in the form of £250,000 while in Kilifi District it earned farmers £10,000 from the sale of today's shells.

At present, coconut occupies 60,000 acres and the Government aims to increase the acreage by 5,000 acres every year.

Cashewnut has been rather static with very little increase in acreage. Records of the crop's production for the last four years show that the crop yield in 1965 was 10,000 tons in the following year 7,000 tons in 1967 and 9,000 tons last year.

The crop suffered very badly from rains and strong winds during the flowering stage in November and December last year. At present work is in progress as the agricultural research station at Mtwapa to find varieties of better yields.

Mr. M'rabu says that the main supply of assorted vegetables to the Shimba Hills where large acreage is now under vegetable. The main crop of the Shimba Hills is being taken to the Shimba Hills. 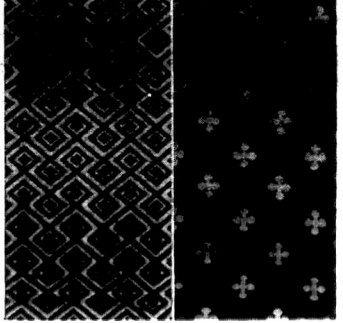

The harambee college that is going places

MERICIANA OTIENDE recently visited 'Uhoro Girls' School in Siaya District after hearing that the students had expressed the opinion that it was the "best harambee school in the country". This is her report.

But the girls are very sweet teaching me their songs and I sing and friendly. They have been singing. We have been learning a great deal from each other.

Each girl is provided with a bed, mattress, eating utensils, text books and exercise books, and one uniform which consists of a dark-red skirt and a white blouse.

The Head Girl, Florence Opiati, said she: "I have little disciplinary problems with the girls. Most of them are too occupied to think of causing trouble."

Occasionally there is the odd one who will stay too long at tea and get late for games, but on the whole we are a happy family here.

We have certainly problems which arise because we lack certain facilities. But we realize that as this is a new school and it is not government-aided we cannot get every facility at once. I refer to the problem of water.

The school employs water carriers who bring in about 100 gallons a day. But this is not enough for all our needs, so that often some of us go to fetch more. The source of water is about 800 yards from the school. This is not too much for us as we usually fetch water for our mothers at home. However the manager has had a bore-hole made and next term we shall have tap water within the premises.

She took me to see the bore hole which was some twenty yards from the dormitory. All that is needed is a pump, tanks and pipes to send water to every part of the compound. A pump has been offered by the Ministry of Health and will be installed during the second term holidays.

The curriculum includes English language and literature, history, Swahili, geography, mathematics, general science, biology, religious studies, home economics, music and book-keeping.

The principal said: "We intend to introduce some practical subjects such as typing and when the girls have learned sufficient English, say at Form IV level, we will introduce shorthand typing."

"Next year we intend to inculcate the love of agriculture in the girls by introducing that subject in the school. There is no reason why girls cannot learn poultry-keeping and get sufficient eggs to sell and eat as well. Neither is there any reason why they cannot learn to keep flocks and look after them. It is a feeling of the authorities in the institution that this would be a better way to educate young Kenyans."

The manager Mr. Zachariah O'Keefe, added: "We would like to accommodate more and more girls as there is such a large number of girls that wish to come here. We are still unable to do so because our building programme has behind us. We have a number of girls who are very interested in certain practical subjects such as typing, book-keeping and agriculture. We would like to include these subjects in the curriculum next year."

But for the moment, the college is faced with the following problems of expansion which should be solved before the beginning of next year, when there will be a Form III class.

"First, we would like to put finishing touches to the classrooms by glazing the windows, plastering the remaining rooms and equipping them. This will cost about £200."

"Second, there is an urgent need to provide more science laboratory apparatus and equipment to enable us to teach general science and biology properly. It is estimated that this will cost at least £400."

"Third, as a girls' school, home economics has a firm place and we need to provide two sewing machines amounting to £100. We also need a number of text books, library and reference books."

"The college will depend entirely on donations from the public to enable it to provide the facilities listed above. Any help or suggestions will be gratefully appreciated and will be given a high priority in solving the current problems of the school. Such donations or gifts may be sent to the Manager, Uhoro Girls' College, P.O. Limuru, Via Kiambu, Kenya."

"There is no reason why handicrafts in this country should be left to the hands of the men. It is a feeling of the authorities in the institution that this would be a better way to educate young Kenyans."

"Turning to the staff, Mr. O'Keefe said that this was the worst problem faced by the school. He said: "Not only was good teaching difficult to find, but some found they were very tired."
