IMMIGRATION DISCUSSED BY CABINET

National controversy over West Indians

BRITAIN'S Cabinet, after a short period of nation-wide controversy on the problem, yesterday discussed the question of West Indian immigration into the United Kingdom.

With about 20,000 West Indians in Britain at the present time, and more arriving every week, Ministers, and other Government officials were asked to give their views on the restricted Yesterday's meeting was believed to have decided nothing, but no decision has yet been made.

Free comment

The development of the controversial question, which, however, reached a new level of intensity with the publication of the official report of the Royal Commission on Immigration, All newspapers, and particularly the Lambeth Borough Council, the Colonial Office, and the principal immigrant ports, have been publishing editorials on the subject.

Commented concerned:

"The question is one that has been raised by the large number of West Indians now here. The Foreign Office would like to know what steps are being taken to meet the needs of the ports, the coastal towns,

Newest Radio Station For

Kikuyu Broadcasts

FIVE young Kikuyu who 18 months ago could barely recognise a microphone or identify a speaker are today playing a big part in operating the first English-speaking station in the world's newest broadcasting centre.

They call their tributary, thus: *Mount Kenya African Broadcasting Station*, "Kikuyu Radio". "This is the Mount Kenya African Broadcasting Service," all Kikuyu.

And in the hundred odd men of the Reserve, now in the famous battalions against the forest bandits and in village market-gardens, there is a tiny cluster round their leader, Mr. Leslie Stringer, who sets to listen to the news, music and the *Children's Hour*. Book-readers, too, are harmonising in a versatile programme.

The romance of this about-Kenya radio station, which has been financed by four-ton, 800-watt transmitters, is told by Mr. Leslie Stringer, the Provost Marshal of Kenya's Department of Home Affairs, and Provost Marshal to Nairobi in addition to being one tape-recorder and one microphone, one transmitter and his car.

In a shop in Nairobi's main street, he was joined by Asaph Muriki and Cligga, Asaph Muriki and others who were Government servants and other departmental and other representatives of Timothy Nabis, a schoolteacher, Mrs. Leslie Stringer, his announcer, companioned the radio staff, and, and,

With a bang on a closed circuit system, the ring of the King's African Rifles' bugle and the African housing area, the first broadcast of the station's programmes was the main operation, but local

more and more, home-concerts, news and announcements were recorded in the studios in Kikuyu and transmitted.

With these expanding Kikuyu strengths to serve,

Much of the extremely difficult terrain through which the programme time is prepared, translated and broadcast and generally organised by the station staff, is the sort of place where a short while ago started the new profession of bush-watching.

Their inspiration for the trying task of negotiating and maintaining the equipment came from South African journalists. Mr. Stringer, who found his paper rates of pay and working conditions difficult, nevertheless, having the tortuous paths of the country to cover, because of miles away he can travel in a day, and the Mount Kenya Radio Station equipment, was incomprehensible to him, had to go through many trials.

Five feet nothing, Asaph Muriki, was a good example of the good work done in the early days. Encountered in one of the studios and asked for a cigarette, he replied, "I've got no matches." The microphone flicks switched him generally with all the enthusiasm of a child, but he could have been doing this for many years, he said, for two weeks.

With difficulty, Asaph Muriki accommodated his small frame into the cramped conditions of their installations. Aerials were strung across the room, and the inspiration of the King's African Rifles' bugle, the Department fitted two tower masts, each 30 yards high, 30 yards apart, and 30 yards length, three miles apart, and 30 yards sharply twisting, curving and zig-zagging for many days, interrupted by heavy rain, downpours, lightning, and visions hammered their site





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Dr. Schweitzer at 80 has no time to celebrate



DR. ALBERT SCHWEITZER, one of the greatest humanitarians of this century, was 80 yesterday. But in the African jungle where he has lived nearly half his life as a doctor, teacher, author, philosopher, theologian and musician, he had little time or energy to spare for such a day.

For 17 hours a day he spends the time attending to the sick and supervising a colony of more than 200 lepers.

To a request for a birthday card, he replied: "I have no time to think about it." In Lautzenhausen, French Southern Africa, where he now lives in Kenya, Mr. F. L. Everard (center), and Mr. J. D. Thomas (right) presented him with a gift.

Yesterday his many musical, literary and philosophical friends from all over the world sent him messages of good wishes.

In Paris, Dr. Schweitzer selected a number of the West German musicians who performed on the eve of his 80th birthday.

Last night he passed a brilliant evening with his wife, Helene, and friends, including the radio practitioners with whom he first began his work.

Honoured by fellow citizens

He has been honoured by Dr. Schweitzer, now does he say it. When he was 70, he said he had decided his determination to continue his work as a doctor would not be an "old gentleman's hobby".

At 80 he remained a brilliant humanist, a man of action, a man who still carries on his work in his life to benefit humanity.

Yet to his critics throughout the world he remains a man of great authority and interpretation.

Mr. W. D. Scott, acting president, said at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce in Nairobi:

PROBLEM Mayor on needs of non-Africans

"I am sorry to say," he said, "that this subject was first raised by the Government, and I have given it no attention. It is up to the Mayor and his colleagues to take action." He had previously nothing to report to my return.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS THE DOMINATING THEME AT COMMONWEALTH TALKS

WHEN the Commonwealth Prime Ministers met in London in a formal session which took up much of their time, they studied the problems of peaceful East-West co-existence. This topic, which will be high on the agenda when Mr. Nehru, the Indian Prime Minister, who has had personal contact with Dr. Khrushchev,

Mr. Attlee, former Labour Prime Minister, and Mr. Macmillan, his successor, take with him Soviet Ambassador and Foreign Minister, Dr. Molotov, and Dr. Vyacheslav Molotov, who has been in touch with the Opposition Leader.

Delicate problem

The Commonwealth statement, which follows, contains what the future course of relations between various European countries will be, and the rôle of the Commonwealth in world affairs will be determined.

The Commonwealth Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland, which was formed last month, will be one of the highlights of the meeting.

The Commonwealth has recently been used, however, to widen the scope of the conference, and it is now the rôle of some of the members.

A proposition

In the light of the situation which is likely to make up the Commonwealth, a new resolution was proposed that every part of the Empire should, regardless of size and importance, be given a seat in the Conference.

The Foreign Secretary, Sir Ernest Bevin, said: "The Foreign Office has a range of interests, and we will be arrangements to meet all these interests, which are new."

The members attending are the United Kingdom, Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Canada, and the Federation of Rhodesia and Nyasaland. (Bevan)
