## Plan to Raise £200,000 in Full Year

### CHARGES ON INCOME TAX

**Dearer Tobacco And Liquor;  
Gold Royalty; Higher  
Non-Native Poll Tax**

In order that Kenya may in common with the rest of the Empire make its contribution to the general cause the Government has decided upon a policy of increased taxation details of which were announced by the Acting Governor in Legislative Council yesterday.

These new taxes are:  
**Income Tax** surcharge of 50 per cent.  
**Company tax** surcharge of 50 per cent.  
**Increased Customs and Excise duties** on intoxicating liquors, tobacco and cigarettes.  
**Increases in non-native Poll Tax.**  
**Restoration of the 5 per cent. gold royalty.**

It is estimated that these new taxes in a full year will bring in £200,000 but His Excellency pointed out that having regard to the shortfalls expected in the Colony's revenue for the next year this additional amount would be largely required to make these good.

There is to be no increase at present in the direct taxation of Africans who are, however, far and away the largest consumers of cigarettes and will therefore be affected by the new duties.

In a review of the Colony's war effort the Governor paid tribute to the magnanimity of the people and the willingness with which they had borne discomforts and sacrifices. Although these, he said were far less than in the United Kingdom.

**Kenya and the War**  
Carrying the Burden  
His Excellency the Acting Governor of Kenya gave to the King yesterday in his Address to Legislative Council the first comprehensive picture of the country's war situation and the nature of the problems which have now to be faced. During the first two months the people of Kenya have contributed their share of criticism of every kind of authority, Civil and Military, in respect of the tasks that these authorities have undertaken. That criticism has been accepted in most cases in the spirit in which it has been given, because those who know Kenya and its people realise full well that the criticism is the breath of the Nation's life in the circumstances imposed on an articulate and intelligent community by a Crown Colony constitution. Thus we have had frank comment on manpower and agricultural development, on military and civil finance, price control and commercial difficulties, developed freely and naturally because the Colony had been spared immediate contact with war. The value of that outpouring of criticism was apparent in the review yesterday and in the references to the nature of the work which is being done by the war-time organisations operating cooperatively with official

and unofficial membership. The noteworthy fact is that at the end of two months the war-time machinery is working smoothly and effectively as a consequence of much service uncomplainingly performed, and the whole of the Colony's direction has been changed.

The main tasks now lie ahead. The first of these, and it will always be the first, is to organise the productivity of the country's agricultural and industrial resources so properly that the maximum national contribution can be made to the economic needs of the United Kingdom and the rest of the Empire, and that the markets wisely and energetically exploited. The most task which depends on the first is to carry the burden of the tax which, within our means this Colony can bear a fair and reasonable share of the general war costs. The necessity to increase the burden will of course be generally regretted. It is intended in a full year to produce £200,000, but it will not yield that figure in 1940. The Government assumes that there will be heavy shortfalls in normal revenue, particularly from Customs duties (though price rising commodity price levels that is arguable) and according to the official view the maximum may not completely make good these shortfalls. Therefore, as His Excellency said, the revenue estimates for 1940 may still be less than those for 1939, even after including the yield from the new taxes. In addition to these shortfalls in the public income due to the war, restricted purchasing power of the individual, the psychological effect of new taxes, the decrease in the use of petrol and many other revenue ramifications of the present dislocation and distortion, the country has also to face increased expenditure for military purposes. Experience of many Budgets and of two slumps since the last war has shown us the difficulty of suddenly adjusting the expenditure side of the Budget to falling revenue and the Government must therefore be content to allow the normal practice of Colonial Governments when faced with that unpleasant position. They have increased taxation. The parallel drawn between Kenya and the sacrifices of the British taxpayer does not alter that fact. The burden will be borne, of course, as uncomplainingly as possible but it will not be accepted as the only solution of a financial difficulty. It is not a solution which can be often applied. We have said on many occasions in past years, and it is appropriate to say it again, that the only sound way to enable this country to carry the military burden is to make good the dislocation in normal revenue brought about by war is to improve the capacity of the country to produce goods. It is a well-known fact that only a very small proportion of the farmers of this country pay income tax. Yet agriculture is the basic industry and the whole wealth of the Colony, its public revenue and the prosperity of its commerce, derives in the main from agricultural development. If the producers are not prosperous, and manifestly by taxation they are not, there is a serious distortion, and revenue falls upon other sections dependent on agriculture must therefore have a limit.

So it comes down to this, the only way Kenya can hope eventually to finance the civil and military responsibilities of war is by concentrating its energy and intelligence of the State on the increase of the national wealth. That is the prime task of the Government and of the people and a diversion of money or effort from that essential task will be a diversion of energy and effort from the most vital of all. ## Valuable Pictures Of Enemy Strongholds

Royal Air Force planes of the Bomber Command brought back over 100 photographs from Germany obtained in a single reconnaissance flight.

The report for October of the Kenya Association records that the extension of the concessions for settlers and farms granted by the Railway Administration, from October 1, 1935, to the 31st of March, 1936, but the new regulations now issued are a very generous contribution by the Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours to the cause of settlement.

In brief the new regulations apply to—(a) the farm settler, that is, any person who arrives in the Colony or Protectorate in partnership with another party; (b) the settler for the purpose of becoming a pupil on an established farm for a minimum of twelve months. Any farm pupil who may be required to refund the value of the settlement advanced, or a person who can produce evidence that he has arrived in the Colony or Protectorate for the purpose of settling on a farm, and that he has purchased a plot of land for that purpose and does not intend to relinquish it.

**Chap Farm and Huts**

The concessions consist of—(1) 200 class tickets for adults from Mombasa or other port of entry to Kenya and Uganda at the rate of 20/- for the full ordinary fare for each adult and 10/- for each child under 16 years of age. (2) Free conveyance of 200 tons of furniture and effects, at a reduced rate, for each adult, at a rate of 10/- per ton per mile.

For the purpose of the concessions—(1) Dependents are defined as persons who at the time of the arrival of the settler in the Colony or Protectorate were members of the family of the settler, or his wife or residential settler, and who at that time were either dependent upon the settler or pupil; (2) dependents are defined as persons, other than the settler, who are household belongings of a person, but who are not dependent upon him in respect of maintenance and stores and other household necessaries.

Reference was normally made in the report for September to the fact that persons who may be expected to come to Kenya during the next few months are those people from the continent of Europe, the East and West Indies, bringing from their country of origin sufficient capital with which to purchase a farm, and who are new comers who particularly to the Association for the purpose of settling and one couple who have just purchased a farm in the interior of the country, in expiating their appreciation, stating that the Association had been like a father to them since their arrival in September.

**CONTROL OF IMPORTS**

**A New Order**

An order under the Defence Regulations for the control of imports into the Colony, appeared in a report in Kenya Gazette. The order provides for the control of imports of all articles of value exceeding K100, subject to exemption in the case of parcels brought by travellers' samples, goods for warehousing for export, goods imported from Tanganyika Territory, and goods imported from the Protectorate into the Colony by road.

The object of these regulations (under the Commissioner of Customs) is to limit the importation of non-essential articles in the light of available supplies for the purpose of conserving such supplies as may be available.

Import licences will be issued by the Commissioner of Customs and application should be made to the appropriate Form A, supplies of which are available in any Customs office. The description of the goods should be filled in on the form and importers should be prepared to furnish, if requested, a copy of the indent or a copy of evidence of previous importations.

Importers are advised to ensure that a licence has been obtained in all instances prior to placing their orders. In the case of goods which normally import goods under the name of a dealer against the name and address of the dealer should be supplied.

NAZI PLOT TO START CIVIL WAR IN UNION Diplomats Broke All Laws of Decency

Cape Town, November 16. MAJOR VAN DER BYL, MINISTER WITHOUT PORTFOLIO SAID AT A MEETING AT CAPE TOWN THAT GERMAN'S DIPLOMATIC CORPS IN SOUTH AFRICA HAD BROKEN ALL THE LAWS OF DECENCY AND DIPLOMATIC TRADITION BY ACTING AS SPIES AND PROPAGANDISTS IN AN ATTEMPT TO BRING ABOUT CIVIL WAR IN THE UNION.

The Minister said he challenged anyone to prove that Britain had broken her word to South Africa in the last 37 years.

The first two elections on the neutrality issue were held in the Smuts Government. They were the Provincial Council by-elections for Bloemfontein East and Brakpan. (Reuter).

Telling The Truth The South African Press Association yesterday by air mail a statement issued by the recently formed Union Defence Force whose object is to counteract enemy propaganda in South Africa. The result is in the following terms: "Our attention has been drawn by an individual without the knowledge of the authority of the Union Defence Force."

It has been used by a certain section of the Afrikaans Press as the basis for an allegation that the Union Defence Force is engaged in, by means of propaganda, to prepare South Africa for the despatch of troops. In view of this distortion a restatement of the immediate objects of the Fund is necessary. "We will fight those pro-Nazi sympathies, the object of which is to hinder our effective participation in the war; we will carry that fight on far north as Kenya to the boundaries of our military, racial and economic interests except the qualifications of Nazi leaders of world domination do not act on the basis of the League of Nations. "Reports are preparing booklets dealing with 'losing' other things."

Hitler's misleading references to the Government's weekly review of the war was given in the House of Commons this afternoon by Sir John Simon though he informed the House that Mr. Chamberlain's health is now excellent.

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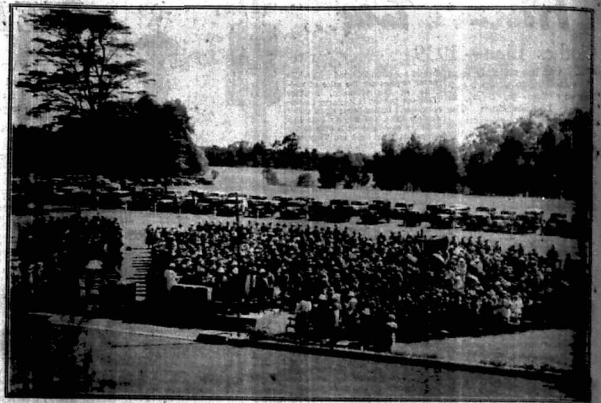

# The War of 1914 and the War of 1939

By Dr. Edward B. Edwards  
Former President of the East African Club

AFTER the conclusion of the so-called Locarno period of European policy, when Germany began to feel free again, it occurred the first efforts at a repetition of German expansion, the annexation of Austria, the dispute concerning Czechoslovakia, and finally the war over Poland.

Let us have no illusions. This is not a dispute concerning Austria, nor Czechoslovakia, nor Poland, it is also no means a dispute over the German minorities, a problem which in all these struggles is only a well-chosen excuse. It is a new great struggle over the same problems as in 1914. The European trend during the twenty years of the last war has again reached its climax and has resulted in a great conflict between the Powers.

It is a clash between democracy, authoritarianism, National-Socialism and Communism. It is a clash between Central European absolutism and the new European democracy. From the point of view of the world, it is a struggle between two great Powers, one of

which wants to force a new division of the world, a new demarcation of European equilibrium, Eastern Europe, the Southern and the Far East, and the wide extension of view of nationality, it is an attempt to enslave the small nations of Central Europe and Balkan nations and to destroy their political and national independence. This briefly indicates the political and social position of the world since 1919-1922.

The historic developments of Europe and the world today form a sequence. Great events, such as they appear to be, even when they are always in fact a single, continuous chain of events, are the result of the other. From the point of view of the world, it is a struggle between two great Powers, one of

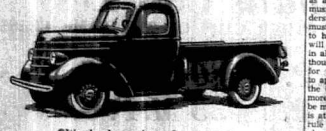

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### REMEMBRANCE

1918-1939

**SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 11, 1939.** November 11 has for all of us this year a new meaning. Two decades ago when it marked the end of the great conflict we detected in it the beginning of those who had died for the generations of the future might see peace. We hoped that this year, succeeding as it would be, would be marked on a better and brighter world would be secured for all civilized people by the sacrifices of four years of war. Men and women are marching again today, and amidst them remember vividly those events and hopes for which they were part of their lives. But they are marching to win, and they are expecting that it seems as if the blood which was spilt over twenty years ago was a useless sacrifice. But it is not so. Twice in the life of our many it has been their duty and their duty to offer their lives in the service of their country and their duty to offer their lives in the service of their country. The day is the same, and the enemy too. Once more Freedom is at stake and the right to live is in jeopardy. The blood which was generated on that first Armistice Day have not been spent. They have lived and died. They are not discouraged by reversals and failure. They are with us now in redoubled strength, great hearts and a firm determination that when the victory is won an effort must and shall be made to ensure that the world for humanity which we hoped would emerge from the last war has been jeopardized by the war conflict.

The memory of those dreams of a better world which came to us with the joyous peace in 1918 is with us still. It is the inspiring legacy of that first Armistice Day; it holds for us the true meaning of November 11, 1939. We must cherish it and carry it forward with us, growing in power as this war proceeds. For it can only be a hope and a dream, a strength and political practices, unsuspected weaknesses in our first attempt to build the new world, have through these two decades of remarkable history. They have culminated in a challenge that could not be refused, and that we must accept without surrendering the world to hopeless bondage. And that is why we are on the march again this day.

Circumstances have dictated the departure from the ritual and the ceremony which has become part of our lives. On this day when we buy the symbol of the struggle on the Flanders field a quarter of a century ago, and when we think of the membership we dedicate a Sabbath to recollection of the Divine purpose and our obligations as a nation, we shall remember those who from 1918 to 1939 prepared the way for the new world. We shall not let the day be remembered as a day of perpetuating the true meaning of Armistice Day as we have known it in the past, and shall know it again.

### LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL

This Week's Session  
**WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1939.**  
The session of the Legislative Council which opens tomorrow in the circumstances is likely inevitably one of the most important in the history of the Colony. It is also the prelude to the first war budget, which is expected to be introduced on or about December 4,

and the public are already being placed upon the financial burden of the Government to be met by them. But while they will be willing to accept all reasonable and necessary responsibilities for the sake of security and proper organization of the country's war effort, they are no less anxious to be satisfied that the case for the war is made out and is supported by the determination of the Government to carry through every possible and necessary measure of economy. There have been indications in recent questions in the House of Commons that opinion there supposes that the social services of peace time will be maintained as far as possible but not to the same extent as in the past, and to draw a sharp distinction between the ideal and the practical. The point to be remembered is that if the money is not available it may not be possible to maintain any spectacular change in the recurrent burdens of the Colony. The Government's expenditure is low far the Department concerned are being harnessed to the real war needs of the country. It is an error to forget that the sources of the East African Dependencies are in the last resort the national wealth of the Colony, which is primarily agricultural, and that its finance rests on a thorough-going development policy which will be applied to organized marketing and on the profit margin which the primary products, European and African, will be able to generate. It is closely related to actualities.

His Excellency the Acting Governor may well find it difficult to exercise his personal responsibility to provide the country with a closely detailed statement of major policy but it will be able to present to the Council a full review of the action that has already been taken, knitted together into a recognizable pattern of the problems and difficulties which have already arisen. Though much of the war effort is being shared today with numerous other territories, the Council still remains the final responsibility of the individual Government and its own war effort, which is not to be dependent on the Government producing plans and policies like rabbits out of a hat. It is the duty of the Council, and the adequate organization of the special services of the State, but beyond that people themselves cannot expect to be shared.

There are many points on which the public would like to inquire into the next two months of hostilities. They will want to know more exactly the recommendations made by the Government's Committee, particularly respecting the contribution which these Territories should make to the cost of preparations, too, something of the measure of the war expenditure already undertaken and precisely how far the Civil Government is prepared to meet the charge, by supervision of that expenditure, their inalienable responsibility to the public in general, and to the requirements of production and what steps, if any, have already been taken to arrange the financing of the war effort. It is also a stage where there are questions of finance for the producers to enable them to expand their production and so far as the Government is concerned it is known that proposals have already been made to Government whereby the Land Bank in particular can play its part in the financing of the war effort against the security of the crop. And in addition to war-time finance for agriculture, there is the question of an ample and

contended African labour supply about which there is some uncertainty today though it may be primarily a Government matter, but the attitude of the labour question is not unimportant. In fact, in the main it is an aim of the Government, but the situation is complex and the policy of the Government is to be determined by war-time factors particularly the rising cost of living, the falling price of cotton machinery, and the alleged unrestricted competition in the market. It is also a matter of authority, and in the absence of any clearly enunciated principle of public policy in respect of the use of African labour.

Among other matters, too, is the precise effect and intention of some recent military legislation, particularly the East African Dependencies Military Bill which though primarily an enabling Bill to legislate, but also has the effect of being being read by some as providing authority for the unrestricted movement of the military and air services, and thereby raising the question whether in the case of some countries such as the K.D.F. and the Crown African Service Corps the terms of enlistment are now to be arbitrarily altered. It is to be remembered that in this connection the Government has wide powers over the individual, which practically amount to complete control. It is a matter which we would list the question, will unneeded, of a Kenya War Charities Fund, the terms of the Royal Warrant Committee and the delay in carrying out the enquiry into the Customs frauds. This latter is a matter which will be taken up when the revenue sources are being tightened.

Generally, we hope that the Council will decide to dispose of all outstanding matters of the war and domestic affairs before the Budget is introduced. And finally we would remark that having regard to the fact that so many of the public representatives are involved in the various war-time Boards and Committees, the Council will be able to exercise their free right of criticism of much on the Council and that the Council is still necessary. Legislative Council in the conditions of today has not lost any of its power as a clearing house of public opinion, and the constitution has not been abrogated in any single respect in that connection.

### MEDIATION

#### A Royal Offer

**TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 14, 1939.**  
The British Government and its associated Empire Governments will give every consideration to any proposal which will bring the war to an end. But such proposals must rid Europe of the fear of aggression, restore reality to international obligations and faith in the pledged word, and must not in the process gain the gains which have been the fruits up to date of German policy. That, in effect, is the British and French reply to the offer of mediation made by the King of the Belgians and the Queen of Holland. There could be no doubt that the door has been opened for Herr Hitler to make suggestions which are worthy of consideration. Another side against the Allies, another attempt to justify the savage subjection of Poland in the interests of a German peace with her enemies, and which, if it is indeed, no reason to hope or expect that the offer of mediation made with such a high purpose, and the fore-ordained of two neutral States will lead us nearer to peace at the present stage. King George and President Churchill have continued their efforts, but pointing out that the act of aggression which finally determined them to go to war occurred after King George's death. It is their hope to keep the peace of Europe, and that the full responsibility for the war rests upon German shoulders. They have made it

immediate contact with the value of that outpouring of criticism was apparent in the review yesterday, and in the references to the nature of the work which is being done by the war-time organizations operating cooperatively with official and unofficial membership. The noteworthy fact is that at the end of two months the war-time machinery is working steadily and effectively as a consequence of much service uncomplainingly performed, and the whole of the Colony's direction has been changed.

Two main tasks now lie ahead. The first of these, and it will always be the first, is to organize the productivity of the country's agricultural and industrial resources so prosperously that the maximum material contribution can be made to the economic needs of the United Kingdom and the rest of the Empire, and that the agricultural and industrial resources are not being energetically exploited. The second task (which depends on progress to carry the burden of taxation so that within our means this Colony can bear a fair and reasonable share of the burden of the war effort) is to increase the burden of the tax of course generally regulated. It is intended in a full year to yield that figure in 1940. The Government assumes that there will be heavy shortfalls in normal revenue, particularly from Customs duties (though with rising commodity price levels that is arguable) and according to the official view the new money may not completely make good these shortfalls. Therefore, as His Excellency said, the revenue estimates for 1940 may be less than those for 1939, even after including the yield from the new taxation in addition to these shortfalls in the public income due to the war, restricted purchasing power of the individual, the psychological effect of new taxes, the decrease in the use of petrol and many other revenue ramifications of the present situation, and in addition, the country has also to face increased expenditure for military purposes.

Expenditure on many Budgets and of two slumps since the last war has shown us the difficulty of suddenly adjusting the normal revenue in a Budget to falling revenue and the Government has again adopted on this occasion the normal practice of the Colony to carry this burden, faced with that unpleasant position. They have increased taxation. The parallel drawn between the Colony and the Budgets of the British taxpayer does not alter that fact. The burden will be borne, of course, as uncomplainingly as possible but it will not be accepted as the only solution of a financial difficulty. It is not a solution which can be often applied. We have seen many occasions in past years, and in the circumstances of today it is appropriate to say again that the only sound way to establish this country to carry the military costs and to make good the dislocation in normal revenue brought about by war is to improve the capacity of the country to bear these burdens. It is a well-known fact that only a very small proportion of the farmers of this country pay Income Tax. Yet agriculture is the basic industry and the whole wealth of the Colony is its public revenue and the property of its possessors derives in the main from agricultural development. If the producers are not prosperous, and manifestly by taxation tests they are not, there is a serious distortion of revenue raised upon other sections dependent on agriculture must therefore have a limit.

So it comes down to this: the only way Kenya can bear eventually to finance the civil and military responsibilities of the Colony is to increase the efficiency and intelligence of the State on the increase of the national wealth. That is the primary war-time task of the Government and of the people and diversion of money or effort from that essential task can be reckoned today in avoidable cases as wasted money and wasted effort. That is the point of view from which the public will approach this new taxation burden. Give the producer an adequate margin, remove all handicaps on the development of sound production to that end, use every available organization at the service of the country to increase the national wealth by wise and vigorous development of all its sources, and the consequent and natural distribution will increase the capacity of the Colony to carry this burden. There is no other way. Increased tax in normal revenue is merely a budgetary device ultimately destructive in its effects.

### THE K.D.F.

**THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 16, 1939.**  
Some of the difficulties which will face Members of the Legislative Council who are also members of the K.D.F. are the conflict of interests and responsibilities which may easily arise from time to time, were that the Government's decision to take place yesterday on the Bill to amend the Kenya Defence Force Ordinance, 1937. The

point was made, we rather think unconsciously, by the Chief Secretary when in the course of his reply to the debate, and dealing specifically with the question of the role to be played by the Kenya Defence Force (now under discussion between the General Officer Commanding and the Government of Kenya) he declared his own view that the matter was one on which the Officer Commanding Local Forces might well have sought information from the G.O.C. That is only true in the military sense; it is far from being the case when the Officer Commanding the Local Forces is also a member of the Legislative Council. As a Member of Council his primary duty in the Legislature is to speak on behalf of his constituents and he is not called upon to take into consideration the military side of the purpose, the fact that in another capacity he has access to certain authorities. There are many circumstances in which a Member of Council believes it to be his duty to seek a statement from the Government in the Legislature as a military matter. In fact, though he may be fully aware of all the facts before him to his feet to put his case as a member of the Legislature, though he is one of the duties of Members of Council to extract from the Government statements of official policy and the Council is one of the properly appointed places for the exercise of that responsibility. Otherwise, in time of war, if every Unofficial Member of the Council was also at the same time a Member of the Military Forces we should reach the strange position that in connection with all military matters they should seek information from their superior officers And, unless the country appointed a new group of representatives not in uniform, an information and relative criticisms might well be excluded by the fact that the Council would be in a position to do so. We do not believe that the principle is really in question, or that the Chief Secretary as a member of the Government would challenge it, but as it is important to the public life of the country it is one which should be stated.

The fact of the matter is, of course, that this is not a purely military matter in any case. The Council is being called upon to debate and vote on a Bill dealing with two really separate issues (a) the military role of the members of the Kenya Defence Force and (b) the military responsibilities which in time of war it is proposed to impose upon them by virtue of their membership of the K.D.F. In effect the Government is taking powers enabling it to compel members of the European community who are in the groups covered by the K.D.F. Ordinance (18 to 25) to do any personal services which the Government may think necessary to order, in aid of, or in connection with the defence of the Colony. The qualifying phrase is "in defence of the Colony" but clearly in time of war that is a wide qualification which can mean anything at all, and certainly need not necessarily be work of a military character. In some cases those called upon to do such "work or personal service" will be entitled to the current rate of pay for similar work in the district of employment and in other cases, when the work is done for another private person, the Government may fix the rate of pay of the conscript's pay. This power to compel "personal service" may be applied in any case where a person has not been called out and mobilized. The Bill also empowers Government compulsorily to call upon those who are liable for service in the Force to manage the business of other men mobilized for military service. We believe that the Member for Nairobi South was well justified in asking, in the face of this Bill, what is the exact role of the K.D.F.—whether it is to be primarily and solely a unit with military responsibilities for the defence of the Colony inside and outside its borders, or whether it is to be that plus a body of workers and professional men which can be conscripted for any undefined task in civil life considered by Government to be necessary for defence purposes. The K.D.F. in the past is generally admitted has had a "raw deal" it was never thought by the country when the original measure creating the Force was passed by the Legislative Council that one day the Government would make such a strange change in the terms of service. It is true that under Defence Regulations the Government already has power to call upon any individual to do anything at all. It is true also that the Government proposes to do so far as possible to embody Regulations in the ordinary laws of the Colony wherever possible. But we are anxious to understand why the Kenya Defence Force legislation has been selected for this wide application of the powers of the State over the individual who is not in uniform. INADEQUATE TRAINING

The Kenya Defence Force (Amendment) Bill was given first and second readings in Legislative Council on Wednesday.

The acting Attorney-General, moving the second reading stated that Clause 2 of the Bill directed the out for active service within the Colony and substituted the words "shall be liable to be called out for active service for the defence of the Colony either in or beyond the Colony."

After referring to certain other amendments of minor importance, the mover stated that the total numbers of the Defence Force not called up and mobilized for military service liable to perform periodical service in aid of the defence of the Colony, and also made provision for the supervision of business belonging to members.

Under the original Ordinance, 20 per cent of the Defence Force were exempted from military training. The position had changed with the outbreak of war, for which three-year preparations were being made, and it was not possible from an economic or equitable standpoint to restrict the number of employers to the liabilities entailed.
