THE VICTIM

Coastal Vessel Sunk: Captain Taken Prisoner

NAZI COMMANDER SEIZES SHIP'S PROVISIONS

THE PRESENCE OF A GERMAN RAIDER, WHICH MAY BE A CRUISER OR AN ARMED MERCHANTMAN, OFF THE EAST COAST OF AFRICA HAS BEEN DEFINITELY ESTABLISHED.

News was received yesterday of the sinking of a well-known East African coast pilot yachting between Mombasa and Durban.

Captain Pat Dove of Mombasa has been taken prisoner on board the raider. The remainder of the crew have landed in Portuguese East Africa.

A Curious Air Raid



Divorce and Domicile
 The Kenya Government has found time, despite preoccupation with war questions, to moderate the divorce legislation of the Colony by introducing sweeping amendments, amounting in fact to a new Divorce Law, based on the celebrated provisions of Mr. P. Herbert in the House of Commons. The Herbert Act has now been in operation for a considerable period and despite the controversy to which it gave rise—a controversy very largely based on theoretical assumptions rather than on established and proved fact—the legislation has not been challenged by its public opinion or any widespread demand made for its amendment. The fact of the matter is that the great majority of people, being contentedly married, are not interested in divorce itself or in the law on the subject and consequently there is no very active body of detached opinion that the conditions of civilized society call for such legislation and the constant pressure of the State machinery in the direction of changes is to move sufficiently with the times in recognising the importance and relevancy of social factors without at the same time legalising anything which will encourage the marriage tie to be taken lightly from its sacredness and the whole progress and security of the civilized State, at least in Democratic countries, rests on the social and family life, and no social order, and no order of society which is worthy of Christian thought will survive unless the legalised restrictions and responsibilities which have created the family unit are constantly safeguarded and respected.

The Kenya Government is now in choosing this moment for the introduction of the new measure because in war conditions many young people tend to marry in haste and repent for

the duration and it is well that they should know where they stand. The Bill provides that with two exceptions (exceptional hardship and exceptional depravity) divorce may be granted until the expiry of three years from the date of marriage. The extended grounds are desertion for three years and incurable insanity for five years. It is included, though it is a little difficult to see why, that the petitioner should have to wait for two years longer than in a case of desertion, cruelty or adultery. It should be pointed out, however, and it is the answer to those who oppose the three years period, that a judicial separation can be obtained at any time and a divorce granted on the basis of that separation order at the end of three years. One of the most valuable sections of the new Bill strengthens the hands of the Court in dealing with petitions in which collusion or connivance is suspected. The reasons for which the Courts can nullify a marriage are also suitably widened and provision is made for divorce if the respondent has disappeared for seven years without trace.

Divorce legislation will never be without controversy, especially as the views of Church and State differ on the principle. But without irreverence we believe we can say that the new measure, as set up in the phrase in the wedding ceremony, "Whom God hath joined together..." is capable in the conditions of Christian life today of imposing terrible suffering and hardship if it is too literally interpreted. It is the antithesis of the Christian ideal to deny a man or woman happiness by maintaining opposition to legal divorce in cases of unfaithfulness, desertion, cruelty or incurable insanity. "What society should be mainly concerned in is the proper recognition of responsibility by those who enter the marriage state and opposition to any legal enactments which would make divorce too easy and reduce the marital relationship to a mere convenience. A period of three years is a reasonable time to show whether a marriage is going to be a happy union and whether the children born of it are likely to enjoy the fruits of that happiness.

These curious legal complications would seem to invalidate much of the intention of the amended Divorce Law, particularly the ground of desertion, and it seems probable that the problem will at least be fully studied—when, a rare occasion, the Divorce Law of the Colony is under review. If the accepted domicile were stated and recorded at the time of marriage and that statement was recognised by law in under-accepted divorce cases, the jurisdiction of the Court in divorce cases arising out of these marriages would be much clearer, the petitioners would be on surer legal grounds, less likely to be faced and judged not to be so troubled by the question of their discretion and jurisdiction under this amazingly complicated law, and contradictory to the intention of the Legislature facilitating divorce in all deserving cases.

The German campaign of frightfulness at sea has now been officially admitted over the radio, which, as late as Monday, was blaming Great Britain for the laying of mines in the path of shipping in the North Sea.

Further losses of British and neutral shipping are reported today.

November 21. The new German campaign against shipping during evening hours, yesterday—five ships being mined and two torpedoed. This brings the total number of vessels reported lost in the last three days to 13. Seven of them were British, five neutral and three believed to be French. One of the vessels is thought to be the loss of the sea.

Great indignation and resentment at Germany's ruthless destruction of vessels, Allied and neutral alike, is reflected in this morning's press.

Admitted

And now comes the official admission, a confession tinged with boastfulness. It was confessed by the press last night that Germany's aim was to strike at her foes by mining shipping in the North Sea. The "unprovoked" declared, "we are not in a position to make any statement as to whether our own ships or neutral shipping."

"Results" it was stated, "are rather sad for neutral shipping. It is a possibility that German submarines are active in the North Sea."

"Another British steamer," the Atlantic Court (London) says, "was sunk by a mine on the 19th. Another vessel but by the time they were rescued the crew had been killed. Whether the profit went to the retailer or wholesaler, it doesn't matter. It did not go to the Government and the public paid.

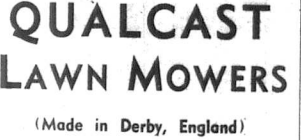
