NON-STOP TO BAGHDAD IN THIRTEEN HOURS

Campbell Black Second

BAD WEATHER AND FORCED LANDINGS — BUT NO CASUALTIES

The largest air race the world has ever been taken on Saturday when 20 aeroplanes set out at intervals of a few seconds from Midland in East Anglia near Melbourne, Australia.

Fifty thousand people were present when the race was started by the Lord Mayor of London. Of the original thirty-four entries, twenty-one were expected to race but on Friday it was learnt that the machine entered by the Irish Hospitals Trust had been withdrawn.

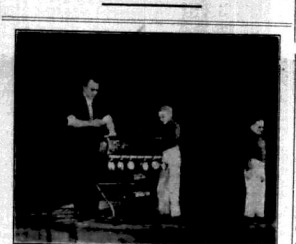

25,000 POPPIES!

Getting Ready for Remembrance Day in Kenya

Though the fact is probably little known by the public of Nairobi, preparations for Remembrance Day have already been commenced by the R.A.F., and the first stage was carried out at high pressure in order that the Memorial Hall might be cleared for the opening of the present Session of the Legislative Council.

For days it had been almost impossible to effect an entrance into the Hall for the stacks and stooks of poppies and lilies and other articles, which the fourteen large vans from the East Hag, Poppy Factory at Richmond had disgorged.

The work of sorting out these and packing and despatching everything necessary for the Poppy Day Collection and the special-making Committee in 65 districts, has been in the charge of the Headquarters Secretary. Over 25,000 poppies have been distributed, besides the necessary foliage etc., all made in the Poppy Factory at Richmond. They had come straight from the hands of that valiant band of 600 war sufferers who only mean of sustenance they reaped.

Many of these 361 poppies when 200 lilies are missing are all 100 per cent. disabled, but the loss of lilies is not the greatest disability for some of them are also sightless. Sensational Arson Case Opened

INDIAN LEGISLATOR AND FOUR OTHER MEN IN THE DOCK

Allegation of Bribery

Witness asserts that he was offered money to change his story

Sensational allegations were made by the Crown in the opening of the arson case in yesterday in which five Indians—one a member of the Kenya Legislative Council (N. S. Mangat)—are appearing in connexion with a charge of being concerned in the destruction of a house in Canal Road on September 9.

One witness asserted that on Sunday he was approached by Mangat who offered him £100 and £10 a week if he would enter the evidence given by him to the police.

The Court was so crowded yesterday that the accused had difficulty in getting into the dock.

Four counsel are appearing for the defence and there are 36 Crown witnesses. The hearing is expected to last for three days.

The hearing of what promises to be one of the most dramatic cases in recent years began on Tuesday in the Municipal Magistrate's Court when Mr. C. A. C. Lane who has been appointed to the post of District Magistrate in connection with a charge of arson which is alleged to have taken place in Canal Road on the night September 9-10.

The recent rise in price is encouraging, and it is estimated to 30% a ton for, before the beginning of the 1935 season, and shortly after, there is every reason to expect that more than 150,000 bales will be exported from Uganda in this case the "available crop" means the cotton cover, independent requirements for free distribution to growers for the following season's planting, plus the amount that has to be conserved for seed.

Transport Factor

Now that an increasing number of gineries are discharging steam for gas engines, the exportable balance becomes proportionately greater and there is no doubt that this quite substantial surplus disposal can only be solved by a price which will at least cover the expenses of transport, labour and transport. The fluctuating factor of transport, however, and the fact that the Uganda ministry rates on the price offered in relation to the distance from an exportable point, has been a great factor. When raw cotton has been brought from the Nairobi greyyer a rough average shows 20 per cent. only in fact, whereas the remaining 70 per cent. is completed by rail. Even those at railhead have paid transport on that 70 per cent. to the greyyer. Here an element of profit exists, for the cost of raising estimates of the 1935 season would be about 10 per cent. that as 65,000 tons of cotton would be available for export during that year pending the price offered, it makes export profitable.

It is there suggested that if buyers are at all keen on obtaining a reasonable tonnage of seed for 1935, they should not stay at any with the Railway, but should send their own trucks to pick up cotton, and not, as this year, leave it till it is too late. Annual Trade Report for Last Year

CONFIDENCE LACKING

Clove and Cassia Production Above the Average

The annual trade reports of the Zanzibar Protectorate for the year ended December 31, 1935, show that the total value of the exports of the Protectorate amounted to £1,125,000, which is a decrease of 12 per cent on the corresponding figure of £1,265,000 in 1934.

The value of exports of clove and cassia for the year ended December 31, 1935, was £1,125,000, which is a decrease of 12 per cent on the corresponding figure of £1,265,000 in 1934.

Loss of Confidence

The decrease in the value of imports was attributed to the reduction of exports and a general lack of trading confidence, while the heavier importations of rice and oil of large unit values were mainly responsible for the higher tonnage of total imports.

Import Values

The yearly average import duty for the years 1929, 1930, 1931, 1932 and 1933 was £1,176,000, which is a decrease of 12 per cent on the corresponding figure of £1,325,000 in 1928.

Improvement Expected

The slow rise of the value, however, witnessed a return of confidence in the market and there was reason to hope that an improvement in prices would not be long delayed.

Sugar Imports

The imports of sugar showed an increase of 25 per cent on the corresponding figure of 1934.

ZANZIBAR IMPORTS AND EXPORTS

amounted to Rs. 16,000 lakhs, making the total average net collection of Customs tax revenue during the corresponding period 1929-1935 Rs. 88 lakhs. The total average for 1929 was Rs. 38.8 lakhs, and that for 1935 Rs. 31.0 lakhs.

The value of total imports for 1935 amounted to Rs. 112.16 lakhs, as compared with Rs. 125.97 lakhs for 1934. The decrease of Rs. 14.2 lakhs, which is the value of total imports was almost entirely due to a decrease in the value of imports of raw materials.

Rice and Grain

The value of imports of rice and grain showed an increase of 17.2 per cent compared with the previous year. Rice showed an increase of 107,000 cwt., in volume value per 100 lb. in value, the value per 100 lb. being Rs. 7.40 as compared with Rs. 6.80 in 1934. The total value of rice of 12,000 cwt. in quantity of 107,000 cwt. in value, the percentage of cotton, jute and other goods was 10 per cent.

Petrol and Kerosene

Consumption imported under the heading "Motor spirits and petrol oils" were restricted to motor spirits and lighting kerosene, with balance of stocks in the Zanzibar market at the end of the year was estimated at approximately 100,000 tons.

Imports of Cotton, Jute and Other Goods

KIAMBU RAINFALL STATISTICS

Mr. Gibson-Penny writes as follows:— October is usually the month in which we have our heaviest rains, and further we have quite a good spell of rainfall in November and December. The drought in the lower Kijumia area has been so marked during the last three months that I thought a few statistics might prove of interest to members.

Going back during the last five years the average rainfall during October as taken at Kiambu town is 3.26 inches, the highest being in 1930 with 4.36 inches and the lowest in 1932 with 2.37 inches. In November the average of the same station shows an average of 4.04 inches, the highest being in 1930 with 7.96 inches and the lowest in 1933 with 2.37 inches.

In December the average rainfall for the last 5 years was 5.10 inches, the highest being in 1931 with 7.96 inches and the lowest in 1932 with 3.80 inches.

The short rains in Kiyumia country come sometime between the 15th and 20th October, so with any luck they should be in the way now.

I would like to convey my warmest thanks to the Meteorological Department who have the statistics.

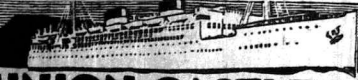

Short Wave Reception

PERHAPS one of the most difficult problems which can come from an individual interested in the matter is to arrive at a conclusion as to how good or how bad the matter happens to be at just that way is the reception from the local S.W. transmissions. In such a case it is necessary to rely on local reports to a very great extent, but a conclusion from these is extremely difficult to arrive at on account of the rather amazing divergence of the opinions expressed.

The Average View

holding out has, a difficult time to cope with on any basis, there are probably a common denominator in which these opinions may be reduced. That common denominator probably lies in the new wave of accepted theory of the short wave round about 20 metres. That even shorter waves are at present useful with success for broadcasting, much more difficult feat than merely signalling, as perhaps initially of the fact that not only the theory but the practice of short wave work is being mastered.

There are points in the letter from J.H.F. published in full elsewhere in this page, with which I do not agree—principally that there are limits to what even the most perfect receiver can do in the way of making the best of a signal—but it is one of the most constructive letters I have so far received on the subject.

Great Progress

S.W. broadcast transmission has comparatively recently reached a very much higher stage of development than the public in general and the listener in particular, is willing to give it credit for. The development of S.W. transmissions, particularly from overseas stations, has far outstripped the installation of suitable receivers with the result that the 1934 receiver is nowadays an extremely awkward

toy even in the hands of the enthusiast. J.H.F. uses a battery driven receiver and points out that everyone knows of the common ailment to which a receiver is subject. But if I thought that were the case, I would not spell out interesting methods of keeping receivers up to scratch and in reasonably good condition.

May Be the Receiver?

While the local variations in reception from the local S.W. station are possibly explicable from a consideration of the "skin" which even a 50 metre wave is subject to at night, there is very little to account for similar variations at similar times in reception from overseas stations. The only reasonable and possible explanation is that the receiver is defective, failure to manipulate them properly and last but not least the attempted use of a receiver in such a condition as to preclude the decent reception of a powerful station situated only a few miles away.

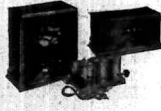

form of tenures ought to be concerned. In the absence of more rights not only is proper economic development impossible, but the soil will inevitably suffer deterioration through mismanagement.

proposed for enquiry including Mr. Singh (one of the secretaries) whom he saw at the Sports Ground about three days after the fire. Mr. Singh made a statement.

At this point His Honour heard arguments regarding the admissibility of the statement, and ruled against its admission. Containing his evidence, the Inspector spoke to Mr. Mangat with a view to ascertaining the time taken to travel between various points in connection with the evidence in connection with the fire which occurred at the house of the friend of Mr. Singh and the house of Abdul's father.

Abdul's Father. Mr. M. Ali's Mother said a bookmaker, said he had lived in the house that was burned for about two or a half year. He was there on the night of the fire. The last witness on Monday was Mr. M. Ali's Mother. She said she had known three of the accused, the Darogas and Mangat. Mangat had visited the house on the night of the fire. He corroborated the evidence which he had given regarding the Darogas on the night of September 13th and added that N. M. Daroga had told him the reason the tenants upstairs had been there was that he had heard the house to someone else. Witness asked him why a Sikh who arrived in the upper part of the house, number 5 was there. N. M. Daroga had said that he had been there after the fire witness went to the house of a woman maker in River Road. Witness had made a statement to the police, but to no effect.

Approached. On Sunday last two men asked him to change his statement; one man was a Hindu, the other a Sikh. They asked him to take Mr. Mangat's house but he declined. He did not see Mangat there. Mangat said his son Abdul had had taken over the house. The witness said he had been talking to Mangat's wife and the witness advised Abdul not to go anywhere connected with the fire.

The Petrol Taxi Again. The next witness called was Said, Saliman Shah, a hotel keeper who lived in Manika Dar's building opposite to the house which was burned. He had seen the room, faced towards Daroga's house. Recalling the night when the fire occurred, he said that at about 9 p.m. he closed his shop and went to see Major Ali who was working. He was lying on his bed and thinking he was sleeping, witness returned to his own house. Later he saw a long red car near Daroga's house and two men came towards him from the car. He heard the door of the car being shut and then he saw those two men. He recognised one of them as Major Ali but not the other. He also recognised the car as being Mangat's and the other was a Sikh. Asked whether he was sitting in the Court with the witness said he thought it was the accused, Kartar Singh. This second man was carrying the petrol tank of petrol. When the two men had walked some 100 or more paces past him he went away. Then he went to the house of his friend Abdullah Khan Chaudhry Road and stayed there for a long time. He was carrying the petrol tank, and was walking about until midnight which was his habit, and finally returned to his own house.

Sleep Disturbed. Before he entered his house, he saw two men coming out of Daroga's house. They were Sikhs; they had beards and white turbans, and wore black tall. He only saw them by chance and did not pay much attention to their movements. It was night and he did not see them properly. This was before the fire occurred. After he had been lying on his bed for about 15 minutes he saw a light about 100 paces in his room. He thought it was a signal calling the Mohammedans to prayer so he got up and praying mat and was ready for his prayers. There was also a light on the wall. He got up and looked out to see that the whole of the upper story of Daroga's

house was on fire—this was the explanation of the light that he saw. He got up and went outside. He saw a light about 100 paces and started shouting. He also shouted "Jimmy". Jimmy (one of the accused) at once came out. Jimmy said to him "Don't you worry; this thing has happened for a long time. It is all right". Jimmy was dressed in his pyjamas trousers and shirt and had a pair of shoes. He was also holding his hat in his hand. He told Jimmy that he had shouted to see other people to come out but they did not appear to be coming. So Jimmy at once went to Mehar Ali's door and knocked.

Asked Not to Speak. Continuing his story the witness said that about three days ago he went to see Capt. Neil Stewart of the C.I.D. in his office. He told Capt. Stewart that the statement which he had already given to the police was quite correct and true. He was asked by Capt. Stewart whether any one had approached him requesting him to decline to give evidence in this case. He replied that some people had approached him but he had refused to give evidence in this case. Witness asked him whether he had already given a statement to the police. He replied that he had given a statement to the police on the day that the fire occurred. He said that if evidence was given it would remain to be seen whether they were three men, or the witness who gave evidence, remained alive. This was what he said in his statement "What about you?" 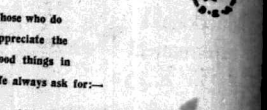

Land Titles

With regard to land titles, Major Robertson stated that he had asked a question earlier than that of these titles. It could not be supposed to go into the question of land titles at the time and was said that a Committee had already been appointed to report. He was glad to hear that there was a general agreement up here to go into the question of these titles. He stated that in the next few days the Government would be able to give the elected members some information with reference to the Tana. If more land was required for natives, there was a very large area available, there for natives, and this would open up a large tract of country.

Cases for the Natives

His Majesty's Government, with the concurrence of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, has been proposed by at least two of his colleagues in the Cabinet has decided to introduce legislation making the prohibition effective. This decision was communicated to the Ropemakers' Federation and made public without any reference to the Tanganyika Company's Board.

The Board has decided that it cannot agree to any suggestion that binder twine manufactured in Tanganyika from sisal shall not be marketed in Britain and Major Conrad Walsh disputes the contention of the Colonial Office that when he was encouraged in 1932 to manufacture sisal bags it was on the understanding that such bags and other sisal products would not be marketed in East Africa.

Figures are produced by him to show that though the British Ropemakers agreed to encourage the use of Empire Sisal, the tendency has been in the other direction and that increasing quantities of foreign Manilla are now being imported.

It is clear from the correspondence that the prohibition is intended to apply to all Colonial cordage and not only to the products of the Tanganyika Company.

Game photographers can noiselessly drift down streams working closer to animals on river banks than would otherwise be possible. Small lakes and bodies of water can be safely crossed at a moment's notice saving miles of tedious walking.

Originally designed and built for Naval use these boats proved an outstandingly successful that they are now made available to the public for the first time.



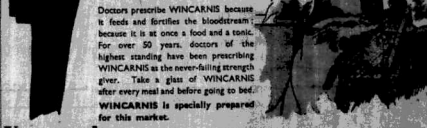

Acquisition Act. Subject to well thought and proper ultimate procedure, but he would not believe that the Commission intended this Acquisition Act to be applied to India except in 1934 which he indicated in a general statement in his view that the Indian applied Act be amended by a Kenya Ordinance.

Compensation In regard to compensation, the Hon. Member believed that the principle that had emanated from the Trust must be repeated by the Indian Government should be taken away with. 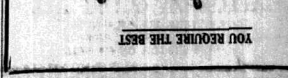
