Balancing the Budget in Tanganyika

£100,000 PUBLIC DEBT CHARGE REMITTED

By Imperial Government

1934 DEFICIT REDUCED BY RIGID ECONOMY AND INCREASED REVENUE

His Excellency the Governor, Sir Harold MacMichael, in opening the budget session of the Tanganyika Legislative Council last week revealed that the Imperial Government has agreed to grant a temporary and provisional remission of interest upon the Exchequer Loans.

The sum remitted amounts to about £100,000, of which £35,000 was payable by the Territory and £65,000 by the Railways.

With this assistance, the budget for 1935 shows—
Revenue— £1,728,000
Expenditure— £1,772,000
Surplus— £5,000.

Reviewing the finances of 1934, His Excellency recalled that the estimated deficit on the combined account was £180,000. The deficit, he explained, was not now expected to be much in excess of £125,000, showing an improvement of £57,000 on the original estimate.

The chief factor in this recovery had been the rise over £29,000 in the Railway estimate of revenue.

£6,000 Surplus

TRUNK TELEPHONES

Eldoret to be Linked with Nakuru

In the Kenya Legislative Council last week the Postmaster General moved a resolution the effect of which is to approve the expenditure of £3,000 upon the construction of a trunk telephone between Nakuru and Eldoret.

The Hon. Member explained that the money had actually been saved out of money voted in connection with certain telegraphic and telephone line developments works. The savings had been affected partly as the result of placing favourable contracts for material and partly because the work had been done more expeditiously than was originally intended.

He stated that in a time of depression any expenditure on extension of services should be very carefully considered and he was satisfied that the expenditure proposed was on essential work. Eldoret, a fairly busy commercial centre, possessed a telephone exchange and Kiambu in addition to which there was a fairly extensive trunk system. The work which it was proposed to carry out would not only link Nakuru with Eldoret but would give the services at present held by Eldoret access to the main trunk system of the Colony. The work was justified and would be self-supporting. There was in addition the important fact that the extension would bring the Kenya and Uganda telephone systems nearer to each other and aid towards granting the Kaimosi area in due course necessary telephone and telegraphic facilities.

Unofficial Report

The Hon. A. C. Hoey (Unionist) said he was glad to find that the Postmaster General had not been able to make provision for a few feet want. He was particularly in connection with the development of the existing industrial trunk extension was very much overdue. He hoped that when the work was approximately completed it would be found possible out of savings further to extend the line from Eldoret to Kakamega, since Eldoret was becoming increasingly linked with the goldfields.

Public Security in Kenya POLICE DECREASES IN RELATION TO CRIME STATISTICS

No Ascertainable Connection

SPECIAL REPORT BY THE ACTING COMMISSIONER OF POLICE

In view of the Acting Commissioner of Police there is no relationship between crime figures and the percentage of decrease in the Police Force.

One of the factors in the situation stressed by him is the outlook and mental attitude of young Africans. He suggests that the nature of Administrative control in a district should be considered in relation to crime.

Importance of Administrative Aid

At the request of the Executive Council, the Acting Commissioner of Police has prepared a special report on the prevalence of crime in settled and urban areas, particularly in relation to the decrease in the strength of the police force.

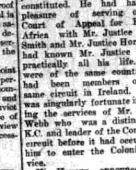

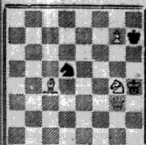
