Mrs. Nehru certain of election victory

SOME 250,000 Indians are eligible to vote in India's third General Elections which began yesterday. Because of the numbers involved — there are nearly 15,000 candidates — the poll will be staggered over 15 days and first polling will be known late on February 25.

Sixteen parties are contesting 464 seats in Parliament's Lower House and 2,520 seats in 131 provincial legislatures. The Government is expected to be the largest to be elected in the Western democratic pattern anywhere in the world. Mr. Nehru and his ruling Congress Party seem assured of another crushing victory.

All forecasts predict a two-thirds loss of power for the National Congress, which led the previous Congress majority. It will lose seats in state assemblies.

In many places Congress faces a double challenge by both Communists and right-wing parties.

Tough fight
Congress faces a tough fight in Kerala State, where the Communist Party is power behind the scenes. In Cochin, India's biggest city, Communist are trying to win four seats.

At Bombay the Communist Party will dominate in North Bombay, where Mr. V. K. Krishna Menon, Defence Minister, is trying to win four seats. The Opposition has a strong influence in South Bombay. J. B. Kripalani, who claims Mr. Menon as his "Congress" Minister.

The right-wing Jan Sangh Party, which stands for Hindu supremacy, has 196 candidates for Parliament and 1,138 for the Assemblies. The Conservative National Party, formed two years ago, is contesting 172 Parliamentary and 1,023 Assembly seats.

All may vote
The Praja Socialist Party, a moderate Socialist group has 166 candidates for Parliament and 1,070 for the Assemblies. Communist are contesting 172 Parliamentary seats and 833 in the Assemblies.

All Indians over 21 may vote. To help illiterates — two out of every three voters — candidates have printed lists on the ballot papers.

At West Bengal will elect 36 members to the Lok Sabha (Lower House) and 231 to the State Assemblies.

Two Central Government Ministers, Prof. Hanuman Prasad (Minister of States) and Mr. P. S. Vaskar (Deputy Minister of Education) and West Bengal's Chief Minister Dr. B. C. Roy, were among candidates who entered the election fray yesterday.

Yesterday's voting was to elect 19 Members of Parliament and 46 members of the West Bengal State Assembly. The other two-thirds of the West Bengal electorate will vote later.

Flags in ink
As voters entered the polling booths, their left forefingers were marked with indelible ink to guard against impersonators who might try to vote twice — and they were given an inked ballot stamp with which to mark the ballot papers.

India's Defence Minister, Mr. V. K. Krishna Menon, has ruled out the possibility of Mr. Nehru attending the 18-day Dehra Dun Conference at Geneva on forming his "Congress" Party.

Mr. Menon said he did not expect to be a Member of Parliament as a result of Congress' loss of power. He would be "nothing but a circus" if elected.

Mr. Menon's remarks were the first official Indian comment on the Soviet proposal.

New way of treating blood cancers

TEAM of British doctors has devised a revolutionary way of treating blood cancers with atom rays.
The treatment — which the team stress is still experimental — consists of siphoning the blood out of the body and irradiating it with a deep beam of the atom rays. The blood is passed back into the body.

IN a report in the medical magazine, The British Medical Journal, the team say that the three cases so far treated have shown no ill effects.

through a pump
The team, from the United Oxford group of hospitals led by Dr. G. Lofth, borrowed an idea from the heart-lung machine to circulate the blood outside the body of the patient.

They nicked an artery and a vein, drew off blood and passed it through a pump and a heating apparatus.

As the blood circulated through the pump the doctors heated the rays on it. They continued the treatment for up to eight hours — though their patients have given only a slight relief.

Injured body
The new treatment may rule out some of the dangers of whole body radiation which has been tried on leukaemia patients in France, Britain and the United States.

Up to now, doctors who have treated leukaemia with atom rays have placed their patients under a bombardment of rays, which weakened them and often injured parts of the body permanently.

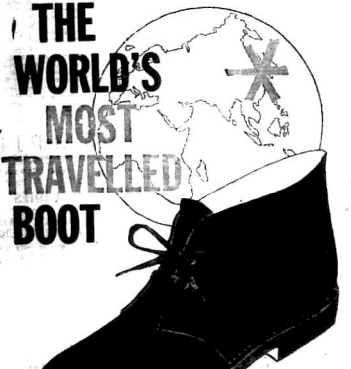

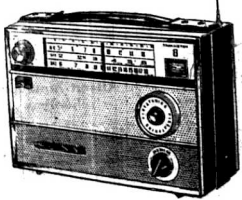

More troops fly from Britain

British Guiana was under a State of Emergency yesterday as British troops and armor-piercing shells battered the shattered capital of Georgetown and guarded strategic points. The situation was still tense after rioting in which at least five people were killed.

The Brigades Vigilant and Urchin have joined the Troop and Wizard and landed shore parties to help troop reinforcements from Jamaica and Britain. The British Guiana Volunteer Force has also been called in to help maintain law and order in the fire-blackened city.

Thousands have been made homeless, and thousands of people have been arrested. More than 100 people for looting. One has been taken to prison for six months.

The president of Georgetown's Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Pierre Steele, said the riots — "a fantastic tragedy" — would see back the Colony for many years. The target of the riots was the Lefting Prime Minister, Dr. Cheddi Jagan, who issued a joint appeal with two Opposition leaders for a "return to calmness and sobriety" in a broadcast statement.

MP. PUT UNDER ARREST IN GHANA SWOOP

A GHANAIAN Opposition MP, Mr. P. K. Agyemang, has been placed under preventive detention, according to an announcement in the official Ghana Gazette.

Mr. Agyemang is understood to have been arrested because he was suspected of being involved in a plot to overthrow the Government.

More troops

The report from the Governor of British Guiana, Mr. A. G. Agyemang, said only very minor disorders occurred during the day.

Troops and police had been deployed to contain the situation in Georgetown and British Guiana.

MAJ. SALEM DIES

Major Salah Salem, former Egyptian National Guard commander, died in London yesterday.

ALGERIA

Secret talks on border end

France has reached an agreement with Algerian insurgent negotiators on ending the seven-year-old war in Algeria, according to a semi-official source quoted in Paris yesterday. Talks between the two sides at a secret rendezvous in France near the Swiss frontier on Feb. 19 of the agreement — which is subject to the approval of the executive committee of the Algerian insurgents' Provisional Government — were immediately disclosed. The agreement will also be submitted to the "National Council of the Algerian Revolution," the insurgents' parliament.

An official spokesman for the Algerians — believed to be in Tunisia last night that all the delegates — for an agreement in number between 60 and 80 from the field in Algeria and 20 from Tunisia and Morocco — would be in Tripoli, Libya, within 48 hours for a National Council meeting. The existence of the talks in some still undisclosed spot on the French side of the Swiss border was stated officially in Paris for the first time yesterday in a statement made by the Elysee Palace, Gen. de Gaulle's office. It said only that week-long talks had ended and that the "temporaries" will be submitted to the Government.

Temporary executive

According to reports in Paris, a cease-fire in Algeria is in effect. There was no official French confirmation of the reports, but an Algerian Government spokesman agreed that the cease-fire is in effect. READ John Kanan's letter with great interest and fully endorse his views. It is difficult to see why the Government should waste the taxpayers' money training persons for law when there are a number of people with English and equivalent legal qualifications available at once to take up the posts in question.

The many years the Education Department has been refused to grant overseas scholarships for law studies on the ground that this country was flooded with members of the legal profession. The list of training largely applied when there is no room for them, is not available at the present moment.

A topic not alluded to by your correspondent, but which deserves close consideration and is of greater public importance, is the burning question of the selection of applicants by the Civil Service Commission. The vital purpose of this Commission is, as we imagine, to ensure that the money of the taxpayers is utilized in the best interests of good public administration; to attract the best people into the Civil Service; that the selection of applicants is based on merit and ability, free from pressure or favouritism and reasonable having regard to all the circumstances of the case.

Undoubtedly, certain discretion is very properly vested in the Commission but, as every lawyer knows, this discretion has to be "judicially" exercised so as to dispel any suspicion of arbitrariness or bias that may otherwise be created in the right-thinking members of the general public. Unquestioned and blind obedience to the laws is the rule of the tyrants and slaves it does not, as yet, obtain on English soil.

The recent selection of some candidates for public posts is open to criticism and the methods adopted remain a mystery.

Some time ago two posts of Executive Officers in the Judicial Department were advertised. These posts called for legally qualified applicants. Some seven advocates of three shortlisted and interviewed by the Commission. Only three of them were selected and the posts were filled before a barrister who is considered to appear before the highest courts in the eyes of the Commission, went to conduct routine office work.

Another post of Assistant Executive Officer (criminal side) is shortly to be filled in the same department carrying a commensurate salary. The post would probably require a candidate with knowledge of criminal law and administration. Criminal law is not even advertised. One may wonder why for the law, substantial posts are always advertised to young, untrained lawyers and not by an qualified man, whatever his merit may be. Obviously the best man should get the job.

Instances are not uncommon where persons are already acting in the posts for some months before the posts are advertised and the candidate pre-selected by the department concerned. The advertisement appears some months later inviting applicants from the members of the public.

Among the applicants there may be persons of exceptional ability and superior qualifications who are led to believe that the post is still vacant. Little do they realize that there is already a person acting in the post advertised.

A polite letter is later sent to the applicant who has been notified and that the applicant was not successful. This pre-arranged acting selection, without the members of the public know/feeling, seriously undermines the confidence which the public have thought fit to repose in the Commission.

Further, doubt arises as to whether the Commission aims at attracting the best talent available in the Colony or is moved by some other considerations about which the public are not aware. One realizes that people who possess the necessary qualifications, on the other hand, some contingent control must be retained over them in case they act in an unreasonable way.

It is evident that there is something radically wrong with the present method of public selection of candidates. On one hand this country is crying out for experts and qualified persons for the Civil Service and the other hand we find when such persons do apply many are quickly rejected. It has truly been described as the "Land of the Unqualified".

If the Commission wishes to restore the confidence of the public, then a new approach as regards the selection of applicants is urgently needed.

No long-term plan for East or Central Africa and far base

Britain hopes for Kenya facilities

British military requirements in East and Central Africa will be re-examined in the Sixties "in the light of a continuing need to support the civil power," says the Defence White Paper, published in London yesterday.

"This may require the maintenance of forces in the area, but there will be no long-term requirement for a base," the document states.

"In addition, we shall hope to retain facilities there for transit, staging and force training normally accorded by Commonwealth countries to each other."

Announcing the setting up of a unified command in the Far East "as soon as practicable" the White Paper seeks first to meet Britain's commitments outside Europe. It was not enough to provide her forces with the necessary mobile air, equipment and base facilities.

Command arrangements must also be streamlined to allow unified control to be exercised over joint service operations. The unified command in the Middle East (with its headquarters in Aden) was set up with these considerations in mind.

For possible operations in the Persian Gulf, Britain had relied on Aden as a base and on reinforcing from Kenya. "Hereafter, we plan to keep land forces permanently stationed in Aden and the Gulf, and to reinforce them rapidly in emergency, not only by air but also by means of an amphibious joint service task force east of Suez, capable of putting ashore in the threatened areas land forces, and their heavy equipment, and of providing air and communications support."

West still has A-superiority

Britain at present maintained a part of her armed Strategic Reserve in Kenya. This was available for supporting the civil power in the African territories for which Britain was responsible, and as a reinforcement for her forces in the Middle East, primarily for operations in the Persian Gulf. Alternative arrangements would be made to support operations in the Middle East, theatre, says the White Paper. Military requirements in East and Central Africa would have to be re-examined in the light of a continuing need to support the civil power.

Other important points made in the document include:

- 1—Britain would maintain the strength of the British Army of the Rhine. This could, if the Berlin situation deteriorated further, be brought up to war establishment within a matter of days by the recall of reserves.
- 2—Britain would continue to need naval and air operating facilities at Gibraltar and Malta.
- 3—The West still had superiority in the capacity to deliver strategic nuclear weapons.
- 4—In 1962-63 the Defence Budget will be £1,721,000,000 compared with an estimated £1,655,000,000 for the current year.
- 5—The efficacy of Britain's deterrent would be maintained throughout the 1960s by using her V-bombers and fitting them with stand-off weapons — Blue Streak in the first instance, and later Skybolt.
- 6—The R.A.F. would continue to need staging facilities at El Adem and Tripoli and the continued presence of a small land force might prove necessary in order to fulfil Britain's treaty obligations to help in the defence of Libya against external aggression. (Special comment in Page 4)

BOY, THAT WAS 'FIREBALL' American astronaut safe after three word orbits

AMERICA'S first spaceman, Lieut. Col. John Glenn, was picked up safely from the Atlantic late last night after circling the earth three times in a little under five hours.

As his space capsule re-entered the atmosphere, swirling under the parachute, Col. Glenn's voice was heard shouting over his radio "Boy, that was a real fireball!"

It was evidently a reference to the heat caused by atmospheric friction.

Hit at 20 m.p.h.

Col. Glenn fired his retro-rockets over the United States. They slowed the capsule, which fell out of the sky in a long glide arc over the Florida coast. A big drogue opened, slowing the capsule even further.

Then the main parachute opened, dropping the capsule down to hit the sea at 20 m.p.h.

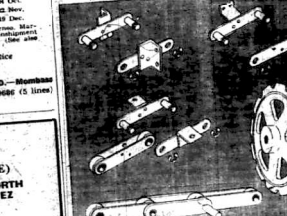

Team work, courage, won day

THE pictures tell only part of the tale of courage and endurance. There is the courage of the doctor and that of the helicopter, which took Mr. Newham off the mountain top 12,000ft. Then there is the feat of Mr. Josef Blatter, who descended the mountain slope in nine hours, without ropes.

Appears on these is the feat of the party of German climbers, who carried Mr. Newham down the mountain, to where the Mount. Club of Kenya undertakes good climbs. "They were very generous for the fact of the rescue work," Mr. W. Lyall told. "Without their help it would have taken an hour or more than 24 hours to get him down."
